ADAMS JURY IS UNABLE TO AGREE

SINCLAIR CONTRACT AGAIN IN COURT

FRAUD TRIAL ECHOES SALT CREEK LEASE

SINCLAIR AND FALL ARE NAMED IN LITIGATION TO BE LAUNCHED

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—William J. Donovan, assistant to the attorney general, told a Senate investigating committee today that fraud proceedings have been prepared against the Sinclair Crude Oil Purchasing company which held a contract for the Salt Creek royalty oil, recently cancelled.

The suit under consideration, Donovan said, is for the recovery of profits made by the company in its operation of the government oil fields since it obtained the contract from Albert Fall, former secretary of the interior, in 1922.

It has been estimated that a sum of about \$4,000,000 is involved. The Sinclair contract was renewed last February by Secretary Work of the interior department, but it was cancelled last October after an inquiry by the department of justice.

"What is the object of filing fraud papers now?" asked Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, "after the contract is cancelled?"

"For recovery to the government," replied Donovan.

The department's fraud proceedings, read by Donovan to the committee, named Albert B. Fall, Harry F. Sinclair, the Sinclair Crude Oil Purchasing company and the Sinclair Pipe Line company. It asked an accounting by them of the contract let to Sinclair in 1922 for the Salt Creek royalty oil and a statement of "all gains and profits made by them" until the contract was invalidated last October.

The Donovan statement came in the midst of the public lands committee inquiry into the justice department's handling of the renewal of the Sinclair contract. Donovan

The touching story was given newspaper and press associations by a country correspondent for Kentucky papers and was printed widely in this country and Canada. The day after it was published telegrams and letters began pouring into Paris addressed to Tillie Oakley, assuring her that in all truth there is a Santa and urging her to get well in time for his visit on Christmas eve. ARRESTS ECHO FUSS WITHIN SCHOOL BOARD

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT
CHARGED; CARRYING
PISTOL ALLEGED

Growing out of an alleged fist fight at the Monroe school Saturday night which culminated a meeting of the school trustees, two men of that community were arrested by county officers yesterday and then released under bonds of \$300 each.

J. B. Hunt, Monroe school trustee, was arrested on a complaint of aggravated assault and W. B. McIlroy on a complaint of carrying a gun. The complaints were signed by local officers. Both men were bond immediately following their arrest.

According to County Attorney L. A. Howard two well defined opposing stories have been told of the Saturday night affair. It is reported that the free-for-all followed a meeting of the trustees for the purpose of investigating alleged discourtesies of a pupil of the school.

Mr. Howard said today that the investigation would be continued with the possibility that a court of inquiry would be held.

The breach Saturday night, in which a number of persons, including several board members, were badly bruised and skinned, was the first serious outbreak at Monroe following friction of two warring factions for several months. The community feud began last fall with the election of school trustees. The election was contested.

TATUM RANCHMAN
DIES IN LUBBOCK

W. A. Adams, 72, pioneer ranchman of near Tatum, N. M., died in a local institution at 11 o'clock last night following an illness of about five months.

Other than his widow, he is survived by one son, O. A. Adams, of Tatum, and one brother, Tom Adams, of Mineral Wells.

Funeral services were held at Tatum at 3 o'clock this afternoon under the direction of Bynum Brothers, with the Rev. B. A. George, of the First Christian church, officiating, assisted by the Masonic Lodge of Lovington, N. M.

Mr. Adams has been a rancher in that section for the past fifteen years, owning one of the largest ranches in eastern New Mexico.

ARBITRATION MOVE MADE IN BORDER FUSS

PAN-AMERICAN GROUP OFFERS SERVICES FOR PEACE

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—With Bolivia absent and Paraguay refraining from voting, the Pan-American Conference decided today to offer its good offices to the two countries to conciliate their boundary dispute.

With exception of the two nations, the vote was unanimous. The conciliation proposal was presented by Victor Matus of Peru, and seconded by Ambassador Ferrara of Cuba, its author. It provides that the special conference committee constituted to look into the controversy should be maintained to render whatever services are accepted.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—As has been the case ever since the present dispute between Bolivia and Paraguay reached the danger stage, late developments can be taken to indicate both a peaceful settlement of the difficulty, or a continuation of the crisis.

On the whole, however, those working for conciliation have been heartened by the trend of affairs, especially by the news that Argentina had no objection to efforts by the Pan-American conference on conciliation and arbitration meeting here to bring about a solution of the trouble.

Argentina was the only one of the American republics not represented at the convention. A Bolivian-Paraguayan commission is meeting in Buenos Aires to discuss boundary claims. These facts have caused the conference to proceed carefully, it being felt that Argentina might think she had priority in mediation efforts.

Even before the sessions opened, a special international committee intended to solve the row was in the process of formation.

WOMAN WHO CONFESSED TO MURDER OF OHIO COAL DEALER DIES SUICIDE

(By Associated Press)

CANTON, Ohio, Dec. 14.—Mrs. Margaret Heidman, 21, of Lorain, Ohio, last night fired a bullet into her heart. A week ago she called Vernon E. Fearn, 35-year-old coal dealer, to the door of his home and shot him to death in the presence of his wife and child.

The young woman's husband, W. O. Heidman, a furnace salesman, was enroute with her from their home at Lorain to the office of Sheriff Edward Gibson here when she took her life. She had confessed everything to her husband and had agreed to surrender.

Chance revealed her illicit acquaintance with Fearn during the last few months. Heidman picked up from a waste basket in their home yesterday a crumpled suicide note she had written several days ago and then discarded. Confronted with its contents she admitted she

was the comely young woman slayer for whom a wide search was being made.

"Put on your hat and coat," Heidman yelled at her.

Tells Husband Her Story

They got in their car and started for Canton, where they lived until they moved to Lorain on October 22. On the long trip Mrs. Heidman told her husband Fearn had "pulled on earth."

She said that she had resolved to revenge herself at any cost. On the night of December 2, four days before the slaying, she went to Canton to visit a sister and there awaited her chance. The moment came, she told Heidman, when she found Fearn at home. She called him to the door and emptied the contents of an automatic into his body. Then

"I guess it's a good thing you got me, I might have killed someone else," Peter Kudzinowski, confessed slayer of Joseph Sturell, 7-year-old New York boy in a New Jersey swamp, told police after his arrest.

Kudzinowski was arrested as a "drunk" in Detroit and after his confession was returned to New York for trial on the murder charge. He also is reported to have admitted slaying another child in Pennsylvania several years ago.

New York officers believe he can help them clear up other slayings which have thus far gone unsolved.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—Testimony that the pink boll worm problem facing cotton growers on the Mexican border will be a continuing one until the pest is driven out of Mexico through co-operative efforts on the part of both countries was made public along with the report of the agriculture department appropriations bill to the house.

Mariatt, chief of the plant quarantine and control administration of the department, testifying before the committee that framed the bill, predicted that the cost to this country if the pest remains, even if it were halted by increased appropriations for eradication work, would be "vastly greater

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Decrease In Cotton Consumption Is Seen

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—The census bureau announced today that cotton consumed during November totaled 610,884 bales of lint and 68,599 bales of lint compared with 618,788 bales of lint and 76,093 bales of lint in October and 618,742 bales of lint and 63,938 bales of lint in November last year.

Cotton on November 30 was held as follows:

In consuming establishments 1,666,878 bales of lint and 131,864 bales of lint, compared with 1,194,961 of lint and 109,047 of lint October 31 this year and 1,551,776 of lint and 172,077 of lint on November 30 last year.

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VOTE STANDS NINE TO THREE IN FAVOR OF ACQUITTAL FOREMAN TELLS JUDGE IN GIVING REPORT

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, Texas, Dec. 14.—Illness of three jurors, and an apparent inability to agree on a verdict soon, today led to the discharge of a jury which had been deliberating in the trial of V. Ray Adams, Bartlett farmer, charged with slaying Orville L. Mathews, bank employee, here on Sept. 1, after a disagreement over a \$1,000 election bet.

The jury began deliberations at 2:40 p. m., yesterday and was discharged at 9:55 a. m., today.

Nine For Acquittal

J. B. Ford, foreman of the jury, told District Judge C. A. Pippen that from the first to the last poll taken the jury had stood nine for acquittal to three for conviction.

Judge Pippen told jurymen that they would not have been discharged at this time but for the illness of three of their number, stricken with influenza.

The three ill jurymen were taken to their homes by deputy sheriffs.

Adams bet \$1,000 on the Earle B. Mayfield-Tom Connally senatorial election, testimony at the trial showed, with Ben C. Richards, Dallas county Ku Klux Klan leader. With the stakes, which Mathews held, was posted a signed agreement that the money should not be paid until all parties to the bet were present.

One day before the bet was to be paid, Adams went to the bank where Mathews was new accounts manager, and asked that the \$2,000 be given to him, since his man, Connally, apparently had an overwhelming lead. Mathews told him, Adams testified, that the money had been paid to a "Clyde R. Vest," as yet unidentified, who had been introduced to Mathews by Richards.

Vest also presented a letter certified to by a Waco notary public and signed by "W. Tom Ramsey," authorizing "Vest" to collect the money. Investigation showed, witnesses declared, that the name of the notary public was fictitious, and that there was no hotel in Waco by the name of the "Worth," where the letter said "Ramsey" resided.

Ramsey, in whose name Adams posted the bet, testified that his initials were W. T., but that the "T" was for "Taylor" and not for "Tom."

Later, Adams met Mathews at a downtown street intersection in the busy forenoon. Mathews told him, Adams and Ramsey testified, "You are not going to get a dollar of that money, and if you don't leave town

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TEXAS RANKS NEXT TO TOP IN ROAD HELP

BILLION AND HALF IS
SPENT ANNUALLY ON
U. S. HIGHWAYS

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—During the past eight years the country as a whole has spent from one to one and a half billion dollars annually for highway purposes, the federal government contributing about eight per cent of the total.

The annual expenditure for roads was related by Thomas H. MacDonald, chief of the bureau of public roads, at a hearing of the house appropriations agriculture subcommittee. He added that there is an insistent and growing demand for an increase in federal support of the highway program.

MacDonald said that the federal government paid out \$80,802,232 in federal aid for the construction last year of 8,184 miles of highways. The federal aid highway system of about 188,000 miles is more than half complete, he added.

New York received \$5,061,107, he reported, and Texas \$4,367,555 in year. Iowa was third, having received \$3,507,729.

QUASH CHARGES
AGAINST BANKER

Three of the five counts of the indictment against Kirk F. Allright of Littlefield, charged with violation of the National Banking laws, were quashed this morning in the Lubbock Division of the Federal district court for the northern district of Texas before Judge James C. Wilson. The defendant was represented by W. D. Girand and the government by Alex M. Wood, U. S. assistant district attorney.

Two other counts were continued until the next term of Federal court, according to Mr. Wood.

A motion was being prepared today by Mr. Wood to be presented to the court for the removal of Brewster Dillard, 17-year-old local youth who has been held for violation of the Mann Act, to California where he was previously convicted and paroled on a charge of violation of the Dyer Act. The parole granted him there has been revoked.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14. — Little cocktail jackets or bridge jackets, as they are called depending on which part of the country they are worn—have entered the fine arts class.

Couturiers find themselves spending a great deal of their time incorporating the idea of such a removable jacket in the design of many evening gowns. The jacket theme is so very good both for the insouciant deb and the sophisticated older woman it is no wonder that it is so popular. But the unskilled designer or the woman who lacks excellent and restrained taste may find this style a terrible pitfall. For no little jacket is correct for evening that does not complete the gown it tops. To put just any shining jacket over an old chiffon gown is a breach of good taste. It merely emphasizes the gown's lack.

The new jacket costumes more often than not use the gown's fabric for their starting point. If chiffon, sometimes crystals entirely cover them. But the basic color and fabric is there. If velvet, the jacket may be rich embroidered fabric, but it should have a touch of the frock's velvet about it.

Brilliant Colors
The new little jackets make much of necklines and sleeves. One new gown of blue tulle has a spangled cape topping it. Instead of a jacket. Others have boleros, sleeveless cardigans or some other sports idea borrowed for the late afternoon or evening. Stock collars, scarfs, bow ties and other novelties appear on the most distinguished, brilliant little things for formal balls.

Lelong creates a stunning little sleeveless jacket for one of his black velvet evening gowns, with circular dipping skirt and a bodice embroidered in peacock design in black and silver bugles. Paisley patterned velvet, in red, green and beige shades, makes a distinctive and most dashing little jacket to top a beige velvet afternoon frock. The velvet of the frock is used quite modernistically for long cuffs, to give a yoke effect to the jacket's scarf collar and to get a staggered plain effect up the back.

The paisley velvet joins the plain on a line of the design so from anything but the closest inspection, it looks as if it were embroidered on the plain edge. This smoothness in effect is highly desirable, this season, especially in such accessories as the little jacket.

Metal cloth, in a modernistic pattern of brown, rose and gold, is used to fashion a little jacket of originality that completes a brown crepe roma frock, with cascading front and back.

DOVER GIVEN ENTHUSIASTIC WELCOME BY PEOPLE OF ARGENTINA ON ARRIVAL

(By Associated Press)
BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 14.—Herbert Hoover was highly pleased today over the hearty welcome given him by the people of Buenos Aires, the first capital that he has visited on the Eastern coast of South America. His trip down the slopes of the Andes and across the fertile Pampas gave him a feeling of exaltation at the accomplishments of the people of Argentina.

The Argentine government, anxious that no untoward incident mar Mr. Hoover's visit, continued today to surround him and his party with every precaution for their safety. Secret service men guarded every move. Troops and other guards lined every route over which Mr. Hoover traveled.

Mr. Hoover and members of his party seemed inclined to doubt that there had been any plot against them. The enthusiastic welcome given the president-elect indicated there was no anti-American feeling on the part of the people. This enthusiasm prompted Mr. Hoover to issue this statement:

"I could imagine no more wonderful introduction into Argentina than through the Andes. One is grateful at once into a realization of its greatness, its splendid development and its magnificent resources. As a student of human advancement, I have a feeling of exaltation at the accomplishment of the people of Argentina to which I have been witness. I am deeply grateful for the genuine spirit of kindness and welcome extended to me by President Irigoyen and evidenced by the many thousands of people along the way here."

The enthusiasm of the greeting given Mr. Hoover disrupted an elaborate reception that had been planned and prevented a parade from the station to the United States embassy.

A red plush carpet had been laid at the railroad station and Mr. Hoover and members of his party stepped onto it as they left their special train. The first person to shake hands with the president-elect was President Irigoyen, who rarely appears at public functions.

Thousands were gathered around, cheering and shouting "Viva Hoover."

Expect Land Title Case To Jury Today

AUSTIN, Dec. 14.—The state's suit against the Phillips Petroleum company and others for title to about 200 acres of valuable oil land in Hutchinson county, probably will go to the jury some time today.

Retrial of the case, in Travis county district court, has consumed nearly two weeks. On the first trial, the state won a judgment worth several million dollars, but the defendants were granted a new trial on a promise to bring in new testimony concerning the disputed surveys. The state claims the acreage involved is school land belonging to the state.

The presentation was made by Pierre Etienne Flandin, vice president of the French Chamber of Deputies, at the conclusion of a session of the International Civil Aeronautic Conference, to which the aviator is an official delegate. Orville Wright, escorted Lindbergh to the platform for the presentation amid applause.

MORIARTY IS UMPIRE
CHICAGO, Dec. 14.—George Moriarty, manager of the Detroit Tigers for two years, will return to the American League as an umpire next season. President E. S. Barnard of the League announced today. Dave Barry of Boston was added to the list as a reserve umpire.

LOSERS WILL ASK CONTEST

REPUBLICAN LOSERS IN
HIDALGO ARE TO FILE
AGAINST WINNERS

(By Associated Press)

EDINBURG, Tex. Dec. 14.—All unsuccessful Hidalgo county "republican independent" candidates except one, will contest the election of their winning democratic opponents, it was learned today, as the latest development in a complex political situation which resulted in an investigation by the house campaign expenditures committee. Contesting suits probably will be filed in district court tomorrow. Notices of intention, alleging several election illegalities, were served yesterday and only one democrat, S. M. Hargrove, county commissioner, was not cited. Robert Henderson, "independent," elected to another county commissionership, will face no action, so far as is known. The officially announced reelection of J. E. Leslie, democrat, district judge, is before the courts in Austin already. The campaign expenditures committee inquired into the race after independents had asserted Gordon Griffin, their candidate, would have been elected had not the county commissioners thrown out a box.

Under state statute, contests must be filed by the 15th of the month and, as this limitation will run against the contesters after Saturday, most of the litigation was expected to be entered tomorrow.

DENIED OWN BABY

Court Rules Mother
Must Leave 23rd
Baby Alone

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 14.—Mrs. Filomena Castillo, who today sought return of her twenty-third child which she gave away three months ago because of inability to support it, was disappointed when Judge McCrory of district court decided the infant should remain in custody of its foster mother, Mrs. Mary Rangel.

Admitting she was unable to care for the child at birth, Mrs. Castillo told Judge McCrory she now was able to support her baby and wanted it back. She and two of her sons, 17 and 18 years of age, make \$25 a week between them, she said.

Judge McCrory granted the mother permission to see the infant at regular intervals but warned her against attempting to gain permanent possession.

Mrs. Castillo was not exact in testimony of her own age. She declared she was married at the age of 13 in Mexico, 19 years ago. There were three sets of twins among the 23 children, she said. Only six of the children are living.

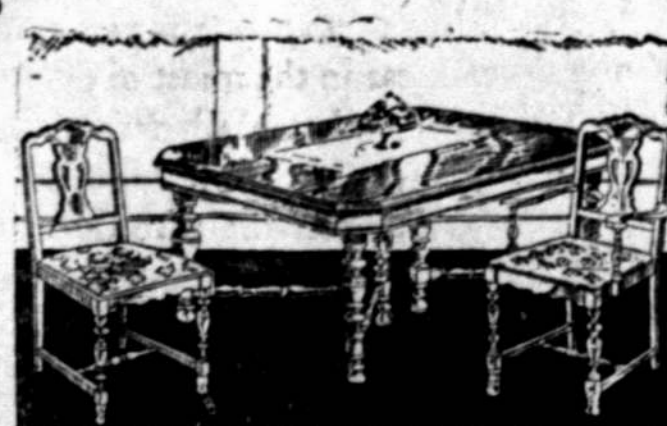

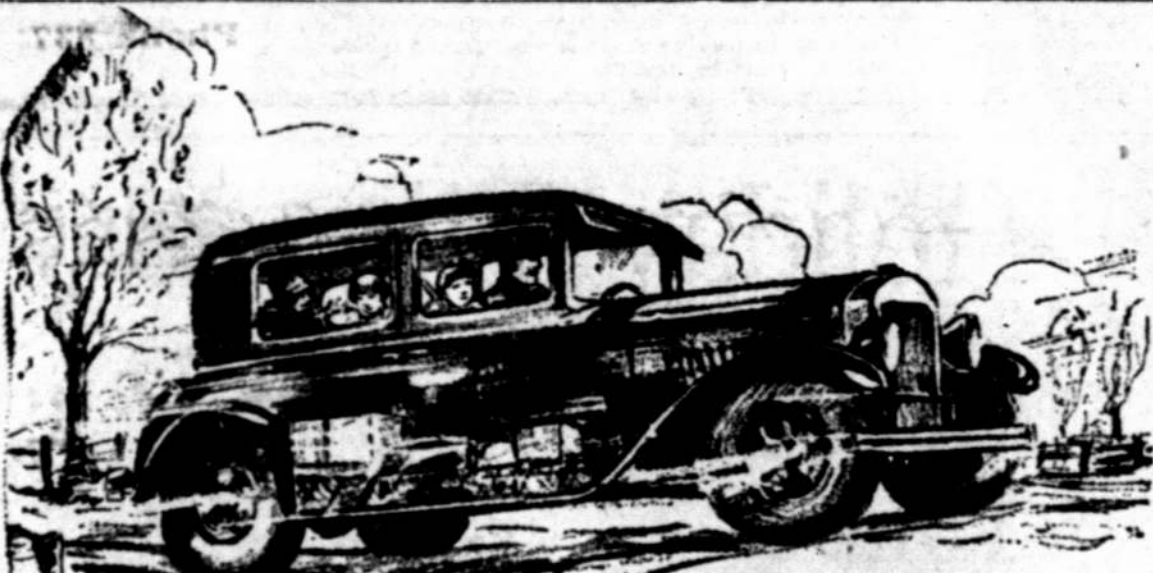

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (P). Henry Ford's advice to youth is to work and spend.

On his way to a White House dinner last night, he stopped long enough to give this bit of counsel. In so doing he ran somewhat counter to an old maxim, and one generally regarded by most as the laws of the Medes and Persians: Work and save.

"Youth often hears advice given to young boys that to succeed they must work and save their money," Mr. Ford said. "This is partly wrong. No successful boy ever saved any money. They spent it as fast as they could for things to improve themselves."

As a case in point, he mentioned Thomas Edison as never having "any money until he got so much he couldn't spend it."

Whatever his attitude toward saving, Mr. Ford believed in work.

"Instill in the minds of the young men that they will never get anywhere without work," he said. "I never knew a young man that was worth five cents that wouldn't work and even

occasionally get into trouble in his efforts to learn."

Plodding Along

The chap who makes a sensation
and bursts on our attention like a
meteor is all very well as a sub-
ject for literature, but it is the
steady, unexciting plodder that
makes the wheels go round.

There isn't anything especially
original in that statement, to be
sure. But it is called to mind by a
consideration of aviation in general
and the air mail service in particu-
lar.

During the last year and a half
we have witnessed any number of
highly spectacular flights—north,
south, east and west. Some of the
flights got through to reap glory and
honor, and some of them died mysteri-
ously out in empty space; but all
of them claimed a great deal of
attention.

Many of us, no doubt, drew our at-
tention toward aviation as whole-
ly from the emotions aroused by these
hazardous, long-distance flights.
These flights were thrilling and
dangerous; so is all aviation. They
were just a bit uncertain; so is all
aviation. They were romantic and
exciting; so is all aviation. That is
about the way a lot of us look at it.

It happens that we're mistaken
in this attitude. The air mail service,
spanning the continent and fly-
ing day and night through good
weather and bad, is a living proof
of it.

While all of these spectacular
flights were being made the air
mail service pilots were going about
their daily routine, plodding steadily
ahead without any bright lights or
welcoming crowds, developing the
science of aviation to a point
where it is safe, reliable and unex-
pecting—reducing it from an adven-
ture to a business, and saving noth-
ing about it.

We seldom hear of the air mail
except when some pilot has an ac-
cident. Then, with our minds color-
ed by the headlines that attend so
many of the stunt flights, we
shake our heads and mutter, "Ah,
aviation—there's a dangerous call-
ing for you all right."

How dangerous is it, anyway?
Take the route between New York
and Cleveland, considered the most
hazardous leg of the whole trans-
continental line. For eight years or
more this line has seen continuous
service—two trips a day, each way
day and night. And how many pil-
ots have been killed on this dan-
gerous route? Just eight! An av-
erage of one a year—on the riskiest
route in the service, where flights
are made in snowstorms, blizzards,
fogs and gales, at night as well as
in the daytime.

The air mail's great defect, from
the standpoint of public interest, is
that it is not exciting enough. It is
perilously close to becoming rou-
tine plodding—which means, of
course, that the air has just about
been mastered. While the ocean
hoppers have gained the most atten-
tion, it has been the air mail that
has made aviation a serviceable
means of transportation.

Get out the old stocks, put a
fire under the lead to be poured
into the boots of lawbreakers,
resurrect witchcraft and let's re-
vert to the old days of early
Salem! A mother of ten chil-
dren whose husband and father is
in jail and can not help sup-
port them, is facing life im-
prisonment for violation of the
dry laws of the state of Michi-
gan!

And while this is all going on in
the public prints are being filled with
the tales of murderers who are
dodging the gallows via the well
known legal loophole route. What
are we coming to?

Someone has said that what this
country needs is more winter under-
wear which will not itch. As a
matter of fact we are much more
sorely in need of a common-sense
revision of our laws. Statutes in
Michigan should correspond with
those of Texas, laws in California
and Maine, Florida and Washington
should be the same when the same
crime is in question. Our slap-bang
hit and miss system of "justice" is
badly in need of a house cleaning.

In the language of the lower
strata, our old pals Loeb and Leo-
pold, with millions of dollars be-
hind them, are "doing it all"—serv-
ing a life term, in other words—
for the most brutal killings in the
history of our nation. That's
Illinois law. Now, in Michigan, the
statutes demand that the mother of
ten children, depending solely upon
her for support, pay exactly the same
penalty for selling booze.

Where is the justice here?

Every time some moron, young
or old, gets his picture on the
front page for beating his
grandmother over the head with
an axe or for cutting the throat of
a five-year-old child we hear the
screams of the misguided
opponents of capital punish-
ment. We hear of testimony
on the part of alienists, psy-
chologists, brain specialists and
what-have-you to the effect that
the self-same moron was "not
himself" when he committed the
crime. He was suffering with a
"complex," which, when com-
bined with hallitosis or flat feet,
as ascribed by the experts, was
being fatal to the brain. Then
the cry rolls across the coun-
try: "Temper justice with mercy—
civilization admits that it can
not deal with the criminal when
the death sentence is applied." And
said to say, the cry oft-
times has its effect when it
should be thrown in the figura-
tive ash-can.

If you ask The Plainsman, there
is much more need of tempering
justice with mercy in the case of a
mother who sells beer to keep her
children from being cold and hun-
gry than there is in protecting the
pampered sons of the ultra-rich
from a last squat in the electric
chair. If the brutal murder of a
helpless child can be atoned in the
eyes of the law and society, by a
life sentence which, according to law
may be twisted into a parole in a
few short years, then it certainly
shouldn't take a similar punishment
to appease the courts of our
land for the sale of illicit liquor.

This is no plea for immunity
for the whiskey peddler. It is
a plea for common sense in the
administration of our laws.
The Michigan mother, in ques-
tion here, should be made to
pay her debt to society while a
responsible organization cares
for her children. But that debt
should not be any greater than
the degree of her crime in com-
parison with other acts of law-
lessness.

THE TOLL OF ACCIDENTS

In a single week during November
88 persons were killed and 461 others
injured in this state. As one
might naturally expect, the auto-
mobile was the major cause of the
week's accidents, leading with 320
injuries and 39 deaths; but the list
of accidents as compiled by the
Texas Council of Safety shows that
there were many other causes, some
of which we do not generally regard
as especially dangerous.

During the one week three people
died from burns and a dozen were
injured. Firearms caused eight
deaths—not including murders—and
18 were injured. During the hunt-
ing season when thousands of peo-
ple are handling firearms almost
daily the accident toll from this
source is always high. Eight people
were killed in airplane accidents.
Fifteen were killed and 16 injured
in railway accidents. Four persons
were drowned and three narrowly
escaped water graves. Two persons
were killed by falls, and 37 were in-
jured. Vehicles other than auto-
mobiles, trains, street cars and air-
planes caused two deaths and 23
injuries. And so on down the list,
including three deaths caused by
explosives.

In the periods from January 1 of
this year to the middle of Novem-
ber, 8,210 persons were injured and
1,700 were killed in accidents in this
state. In addition, there were un-
told thousands of unreported minor
injuries occurring in all manner of
accidents any of which might have
been serious or fatal.

"Be careful!" isn't merely a slogan.
It is a solemn warning. When it
is disregarded, accidents occur
and when accidents occur death is
near at hand.—Brownwood Bulletin.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—If you
ask them, as so many people do,
hotel employees, chambermaids,
elevator boys, waiters, porters and
floor clerks, aren't so all in an
ecstasy about the return of the na-
tive congressman and senator from
his great open spaces as might be
expected.

No man is a hero to his valet
they say, except about the time he
decides to give away all his old
suits, and by the same token, there-
gards by "those who serve them"
"on the hill" seem in highest
at the time of departure rather than
arrival.

Washington hotel employees know
the genus congressman—his habits,
customs, prospects, even more than
one might think, for at least 90 per-
cent of these temporary residents
of the capital live in hotels during
the congressional term.

A larger percentage of repre-
sentatives live in hotels than sena-
tors, which, considering minimum
hotel rates of \$30 a week for every
member of the family, and average
rentals of \$50 a week, seems strange
until one begins inquiring about house
and apartment rents. Then one
understands why Mr. Congressman
fleets to the hotels while Mr. Sena-
tor has his house.

Hotel employees list their causes
for dissatisfaction according to their
own jobs. Elevator boys, for instance
say that their speed is appreciably
turn, and that lesser mortals who
decreased after the congressmen re-
are just as anxious to get to the
coffee shop or the barber shop get
grouchy and blame the boys.

"They're so gabby," one vasa-
lined-haired clerk confided. "They're al-
ways seeing somebody they know
just as the elevator stops, and they
have to stop to talk before getting
in. Then they go through all this
monkey business of jockeying around
trying to decide who'll get aboard first."

Chambermaids display a becom-
ing reticence but indicate that they
could "write volumes" if encourag-
ed. Causes of complaint seem to
range from the congressional cus-
tom of always kicking the sheets
up from the bottom of the bed, ne-
cessitating a complete bed overhaul-
ing every day, to charges even more
heinous.

"I suppose they have so much on
their minds that they can't sleep
quiet like other people," one naive
maid philosophized, "but they don't
use their sah trays, either."

"It's because they come from
such funny places and ain't so used
content until they have run the
highest thermometer up to the
trouble with most people, thought-
lessness is another of the big causes
for accidents and carelessness is an-
other of the main avenue of acci-
dents. All of these can be correct-
ed if the people will do it. There
are very few accidents that are not
avoidable while most of them are
said to be unavoidable. Let's not
agree with the verdict in this re-
spect."

If the people who drive cars and
the people who walk, will use the
precaution that they might there
would be a heavy reduction in the
number of accidents. Look before
you leap. Stop, look and listen at
the railroad crossing. Use your head
as well as your feet when you are
driving an automobile, or when you
are crossing a street, and there will
be fewer maimed persons, less suf-
fering and little grief, and this will
be a happy old world to live in.

Diet and Health

BABY SENSITIVE TO MILK RE-
QUIRES SPECIALIST'S CARE

Answers to Mothers.

God could not be everywhere;
therefore He made mothers.

—Jewish Proverb.

"Fresh cow's milk does not agree
with my baby. What shall I feed
him when I wean him? Please
write on caked breasts. MRS. M."

It may be possible that if you boil
the milk for two or three minutes
it may agree with the baby, or if
you put a little bit of corn or gelatin
solution in with it.

If it is proved that your baby
is really sensitive to cow's milk,
then you may have to give him
milk made of soy bean or almond,
or he will require a special-
ist's care, so do
not try to feed him yourself.

You should call in your physician
about your caked breasts, Mrs. M.,
for if neglected, an abscess may
form, and the methods of treat-
ment differ with each case. For in-
stance, sometimes a binder and
bags are applied, and at other
times hot compresses. Massage may
have to be given by a nurse, and
this also has to be done by a special
method.

The method of massaging as
given in DeLee is as follows: The
nurse sterilizes her hands, anoints
the breasts with sterilized olive
oil; then spreads both hands out
evenly over the breast and applies
even compression. After this has
been practiced for a few minutes,
gentle circular stroking are made
from the nipple to the edge of the
breasts. This presses out the en-
larged lymph. After this, with one
hand steadying the breast, the other

hand massages toward the nipple,
thus squeezing out milk that is
formed. Then the even compres-
sion is applied again, and the
breasts are banded.

Twins.
—M. wants to know if a baby boy
and girl born of the same mother,
a few hours apart, are twins?

Yes, M. Sometimes twins are born
even a day apart. These twins are
not identical or homologous twins
which come from a double germ
cell, but are the result of the fer-
tilization of two separate germ
cells. The identical or homologous
twins are always of the same sex
and look so closely alike that they
are difficult to tell apart. Those
resulting from two germ cells may
be as different looking as strangers
and be of the same or different sex.

Here's another question on twins:
Mrs. C. has often heard that in the
case of twin girls, one of them
cannot have children. Is this true?
If it is, which one is sterile—the
first born or the last?

No, Mrs. C. it is not true at all.

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WETS AMUSED AT BRUCE BILL

SENATE GIVES QUARTER
BILLION DOLLARS
FOR DRY WORK

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The senate went to work today with some of its members, particularly the wets, still chuckling over an event of yesterday.

The treasury-postoffice appropriation bill had already passed, when Senator Bruce, democrat, Maryland, proposed an amendment raising the funds for liquor law enforcement from \$13,500,000 to \$270,627,384. It was accepted, apparently few knowing what had happened. When the realization came the wets laughed and the dries took comfort in the belief that the Bruce addition would be stricken out in conference, since the added appropriation would upset the government's fiscal program if it went through.

The senate began this session's legislation in lamb-like fashion, but it may sweep through its program like a lion before adjournment comes. The treasury-postoffice bill has been disposed of handily and Boulder Dam has succumbed to amendments and compromises until the vote on it was looked upon as an assured thing.

The house also was nearing a vote on the second of the appropriation bills, that providing funds for the interior department and the agricultural department appropriation bill has been whipped into shape until it was about ready for the floor.

Two senate committee hearings commanded attention today. One was on the Kellogg-Briand treaty by the foreign relations committee.

The other, which began as the consideration of the nomination of Roy O. West, secretary of the interior, had branched off into what resembled another of inquiry. Beginning with questions asked West about the renewal of the Salt Creek royalty oil lease to Harry F. Sinclair, the committee later called Dr. Hubert Work, secretary of the interior, when the contract was renewed, and today William J. Donovan, an assistant attorney general, had been summoned to testify.

The senate foreign relations committee has had two brief hearings on the Kellogg-Briand pact and began the third with the prospect that observations might be offered.

NEWEST TEXAS FIELD IS OF PRETENSIONS, LATE DEVELOPMENTS SHOW

PLAN REFORM IN TAX LAWS

ASSESSMENT CHANGES
ARE SOUGHT BY
S. H. TERRELL

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Dec. 14.—Changes in the tax assessment laws, designed to eliminate many existing defects and increase taxable values on the assessment rolls by several million dollars, are advocated by S. H. Terrell, state comptroller, in his annual report to the governor.

He proposes a corps of expert appraisers for handling the difficult assessment of oil and mineral properties and of the industries exploiting these products.

"The matter of equalizing property values has been one of the constant perplexing questions of our complicated system of taxation, and our various boards of equalization are in continuous conflict with the tax paying public," he said.

"As a striking example of the existing inequalities in values, I direct attention to the fact that at the time the present law governing the method of assessments was passed, the best improved farm land in the state could doubtless have been bought at from \$15 to \$25 per acre. Then the vast territory of West Texas was state land, subsequently sold by the state for \$2 to \$3 per acre. Large areas of these lands are no more productive now than 40 years ago. The many changing conditions have so unbalanced the equities of properly fixing values, that I have reached the conclusion, after a careful study of the situation, that the only just and equitable solution of the problem is to amend the law prescribing the basis of value by striking out the sale provision and making the productive value the basis for purposes of taxation."

\$6,000 SOUGHT THROUGH
ACTION FILED IN
COURT HERE

Naming twenty-two defendants, alleged to be connected under the organization of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico Bus Owners association, a suit for more than \$6,000 was filed in district court here today by W. D. Benson.

In his petition, the plaintiff alleges that this organization was perfected January 8, 1927, prior to the time Motor Bus law was passed, placing bus operators under the jurisdiction of the Motor Bus Transportation and Railroad Commission of the State of Texas, and requiring that petitions to operate be obtained. SLIGHT DECREASE IN APPROPRIATIONS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The house received from its appropriations committee today the third of the nine big annual supply measures, that for the agriculture department, providing \$142,588,047, a decrease of \$1,115,246 from the total of the current year.

In lopping off \$585,648 from budget estimates for next fiscal year, the committee adhered to its policy of trimming original recommendations as it did in both the treasury, postoffice and interior bills.

Among the important items in the bill are \$74,000,000 for federal aid highways; \$388,000 for corn borer control; \$8,000,000 for forest roads and trails; \$567,500 for gypsy and brown-tail moth control; a reapportionment of \$97,500 of an available unexpended balance from pink boll worm eradication, and \$1,440,000 for agricultural experiment stations.

A total of \$2,780,000 is provided for co-operative agricultural extension work; \$500,000 for investigation by the weather bureau of atmospheric phenomena; \$738,000 for eradicating the cattle tick; \$497,000 for eradicating hog cholera; \$388,000 for administration of the packers and stockyards act, and \$454,700 for blaster-rust control in the wheat areas.
