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Rebelettes Remain Undefeated In District Play

The Rebelettes remained undefeated in district play as they pulverized the Pittsburg Pirates Tuesday night and ran over the Detroit Eaglettes Friday night.

In the game against Pittsburg the Rebelettes won by an incredible difference of 86-45. For the past few years the Pirates have dominated

play between the two teams. As the game got off to a start, the Rebelettes tipped off and Scotti Wood drove in for two points to set up an early lead that lasted until the quarter closed with Rivercrest leading 24-6.

Veronica Howerton, a 6'4" sophomore, tipped off for the Rebelettes to begin the second period of play. In this

quarter the Rebelettes extended their lead to 46-16 by the halftime buzzer.

As in the first and second quarters the Rebelettes tipped off and controlled the

ball most of the time in both periods of the last half. They ended the third quarter with

a tremendous lead as the scoreboard read 65-30.

Rebelettes adding up points were Robyn Reeder sinking for 21 points, Scotti Wood hitting for 20 points, and Judy Via with 18 points.

Robyn Reeder also led the defense as she grabbed eight rebounds and four steals. She was assisted by Judy Via with seven rebounds and one steal and Veronica Howerton with six rebounds and one steal.

The Pirates were headed up by Maria Mitchell with 24

points, and Babbette Johnson with 16 points.

In the district game against Detroit, the Rebelettes took a 69-32 decision.

Veronica Howerton tipped off to Rebelette Scotti Wood who drove in for an easy two points to begin the game. The Rebelettes took an early lead and finished the quarter on top 18-11.

The second period began as Veronica Howerton tipped off once again. Rivercrest pulled further ahead of the

Eaglettes in this quarter and as the half closed the Rebelettes led 37-14.

After the half Detroit took possession on the tip off, but failed to score as the Rebelettes dominated them. The scoreboard read 49-24 at the third quarter buzzer.

Senior post Robyn Reeder paced the Rebelettes with 19 points, seven rebounds and one steal. Scotti Wood also scored in double figures with 15 points, and Judy Via had eight points as well as seven rebounds and two steals.

Texas Cities To Receive \$23.4 Million In Rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock stated Monday that Texas cities would receive \$23.4 million in rebates from the one-percent city sales tax during January.

The city sales tax allocation is about \$5.2 million more than cities received in January of 1979, Bullock said.

He said the increase is due more to changes in bookkeeping systems and late sales tax returns from taxpayers than significant

increases in sales in the state.

His office reported that a substantial number of taxpayers filed 1979 third quarter returns late and the rebates were included in this January's allocation instead of last December's figures. DePort, Blossom, Bogata, Avery, Annona and Talco will not receive rebate checks in January 1980; however, Toco will receive a rebate check in the amount of \$1,602.33 which is a six percent increase over the same period in 1979.

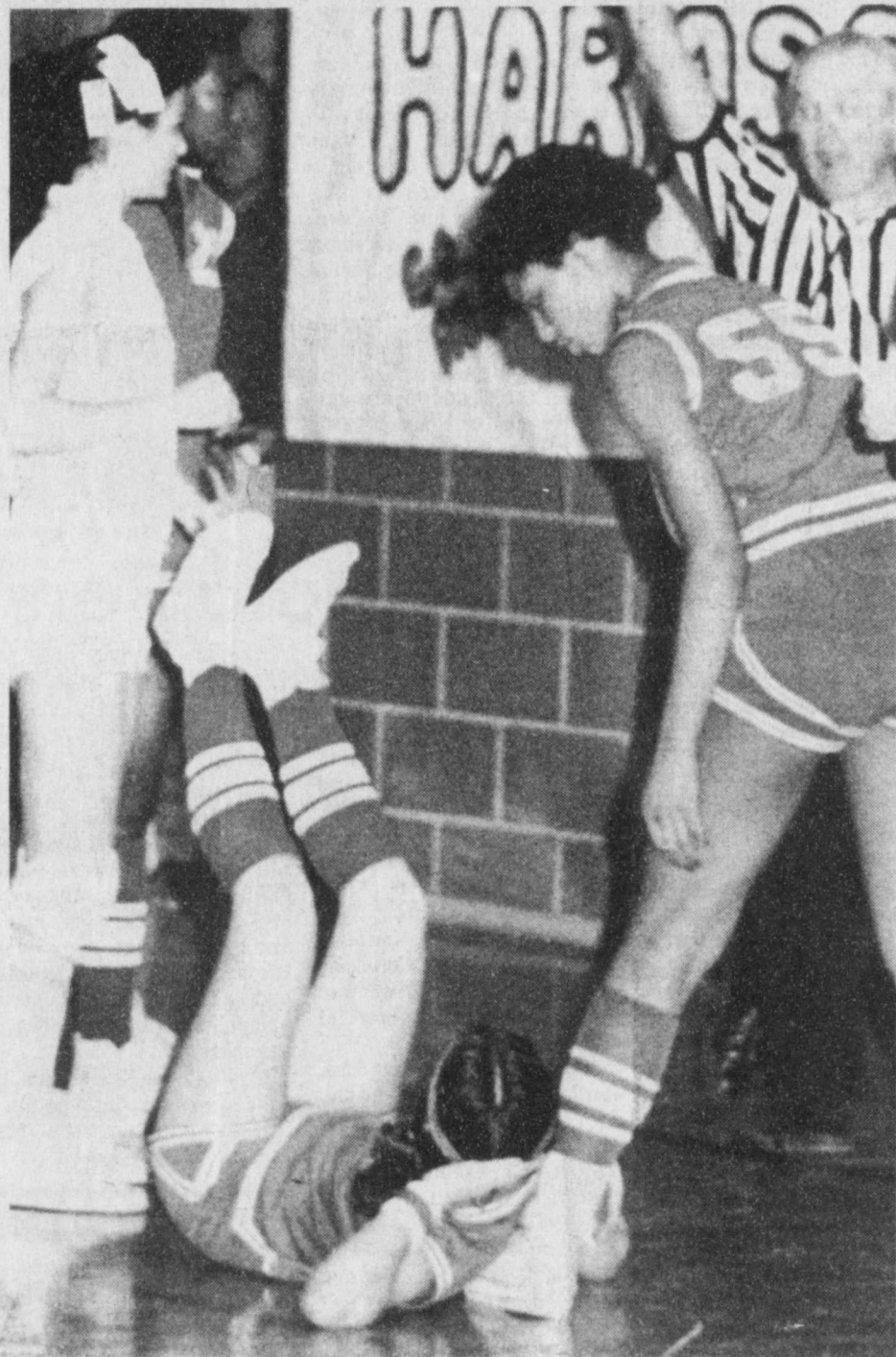

Bond Sales 59% Of Goal

September Sales of Series E & H United States Savings Bonds in Red River County were reported today by County Bond Chairman Ben E. Black to be \$13,351. Sales for the nine month period totaled \$88,088 for 59 percent of the 1979 sales goal of \$150,000.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$23,376,954, while sales for the first nine months of the 1979 totaled \$203,964,266 with 67 percent of the yearly sales goal of 297.2 million achieved.

Rebels To Host Pirates Friday Night

The James Bowie Pirates will be at Rebel Gym Friday night to play the vastly improving Rivercrest Rebels. The Rebels will be hoping for a win to stay in the

thick of things for the first half championship of District 20-A.

The Rebels hope to play before another large crowd as witnessed last Friday

night against Detroit.

The Rebels will be trying to contain the Pirates Randall Granbury, the leading scorer of District 20-A. Granbury is averaging 25

points per game in district.

Granbury is listed at 6'4" and is a strong overpowering player under the goal. The Rebels will have to press James Bowie so they cannot work the ball into Granbury. James Bowie also has another player listed at 6'7".

"The team is definitely capable of beating anyone on any given night," Coach Wake Wood said. "We cannot take the Pirates lightly."

The Rebels became more of a factor in District 20-A action by taking undefeated Detroit Friday night at Rivercrest. Redwater was defeated by Queen City 51-47 and Maud was victorious over James Bowie 70-60.

On Tuesday night Ore City defeated Maud 84-48 and Rivercrest defeated Redwater 47-41. Queen City defeated James Bowie. Detroit was open.

District standings following Tuesday night's games placed Ore City at 3-0, Queen City at 3-1, Detroit at 2-1, Rivercrest at 2-1, Redwater at 1-3, Maud at 1-3 and James Bowie at 0-4.

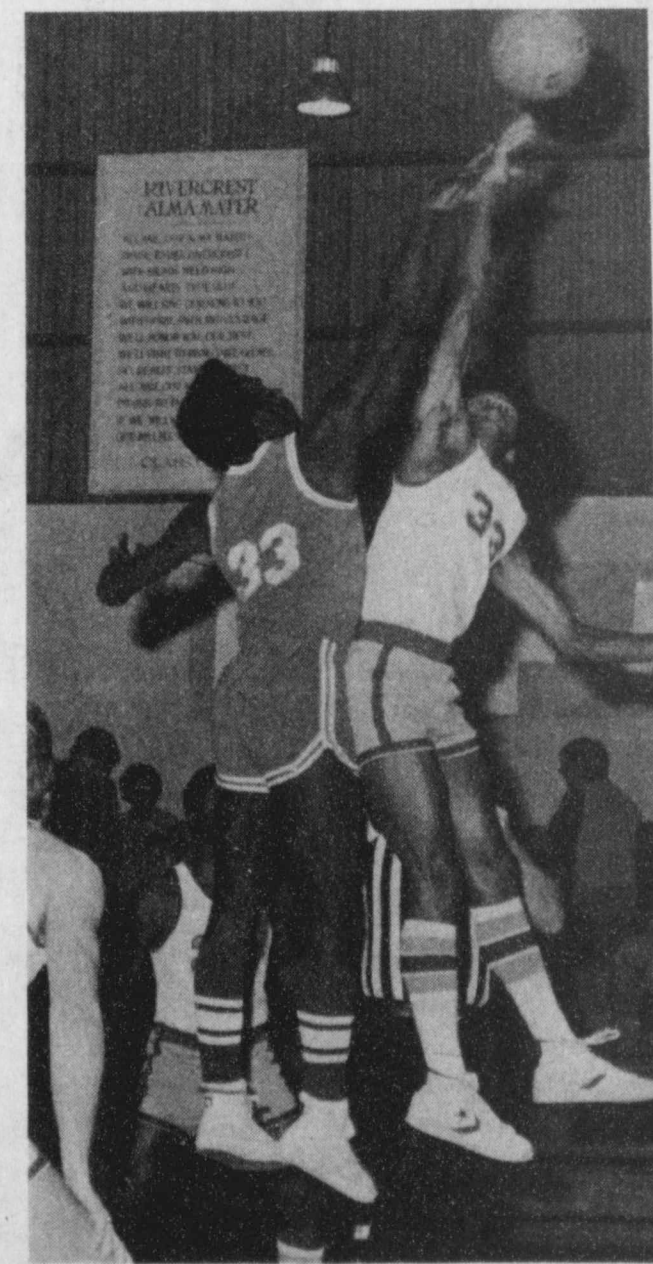

Fitch And Son Injured In Truck Accident

Bob Fitch and his son, John were injured in a two vehicle accident Sunday afternoon when the pickup he was driving collided headon with a fire plow belonging to the Mount Pleasant Fire Department.

Fitch had been to a grass fire near the Cliff Coil home in the Bridges Chapel

Community and was enroute home with his three children to get some burlap sacks to help put out the fire. As he rounded a sharp curve the two vehicles hit headon.

Susan Fitch, Cliff Fitch and the driver of the fire vehicle were uninjured. Bob Fitch and John Fitch were taken to the Titus County Memorial

Hospital and later transferred to the McCuiston Hospital in Paris where Bob Fitch was treated for a serious knee injury and John was treated for injuries to the face and mouth.

Four other Talco residents were involved in a two-vehicle headon collision on the south side service road

entrance ramp of I-30 near Winfield Friday night. The accident involved a 1973 Chevrolet Luv pickup driven by Robin Sharp of Mount Pleasant and a 1971 two-door Oldsmobile Cutlass driven by Mike Easterling of Talco. According to police, Sharp and Laura Stansell, a passenger in Sharp's car,

were taken to Titus County Memorial Hospital by ambulance, along with Mike Easterling and his wife, Marlon, to be treated for cuts and abrasions. Steve and Cindy Easterling, also passengers in the Easterling car, did not receive any injury.

Price Of School Lunches To Increase

Effective the week of February 4, the price of school lunches will be increased by 10 cents for elementary students and 15 cents for high school students. The price of lunches will now be 70 cents for elementary students and 75 cents for high school

students. Adult lunches will be increased to \$1.10. It was stated that the price of school lunches had remained the same for the past five years but that with the increased cost of food items along with other increases in operational expenses, that it was necessary to increase lunch prices.

This decision was made by the Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools when they met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, January 8, 1980 at 7:00 p.m. One of the major items also on the agenda was progress reports from the principals

on the operations of school on the three campuses. Rivercrest principal, Tillman Hale; Bogata principal, Gerald Stegall; and Talco principal, Robert Giddens, reported that they felt the various school programs were progressing well and that in most instances, they were well pleased with teacher performance.

At the December meeting of the Board, bids for an oil and gas lease on the old Lavada School property were opened. Four bids were received for the lease and the Board at that time accepted what it considered to be the highest bid subject to a review by the school attorney. It was reported to the Board that the bid submitted by Texas International Gas & Oil was considered to be the highest bid. The lease has now been submitted to

the Commissioner of Education for his approval. In another matter, the Board went into executive session to grant a hearing related to a student discipline matter.

In matters related to personnel, the contract of Superintendent Talmadge Morgan was extended for an additional year; Barbara Tharp was approved as a cafeteria worker at Rivercrest; and Patsy Moles was approved as a substitute teacher in the place of an aide who had been granted a leave for the remainder of the year.

In final action, a Textbook Committee was approved and the various financial reports were accepted. The next regular meeting of the Board will be on Tuesday, February 5, 1980 at 7:00 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

Statewide Conference Set For Business, Industry

A statewide conference on vocational-technical, adult education and other training areas, entitled "Business and Industry Speak," will be held February 12 and 13 at Austin's Municipal Auditorium.

Purpose of the conference is to identify and address employment needs of business and industry in Texas through the decade of the 1980's explains Angie Grace, staff member of the Advisory Council for Technical-Vocational Education in Texas (ACT-VE).

The statewide conference will explore and determine the types of employment

skills needed by employees in business and industry; identify opportunities as well as constraints of education in supplying to needed skills; and recommend actions in order to meet the employment needs of business and industry, according to Grace.

The Advisory Council is working with other state agencies to assure as wide participation as possible among business, industry, labor and education communities of the state.

Addressing the first general session the afternoon of February 12 will be Ms. Maurice Frasier, Motorola, Inc., Austin, and

other speakers from industry.

Following the talks, the first session of 12 seminars on employment by career groupings will follow. Chairing each session will be a leader from industry, while the vice chair will be a representative from education.

Highlighting the second general session the morning of February 13 will be presentations on the transition from school to work, and the overall image of vocational education. The second session of seminars on employment by career groups will follow.

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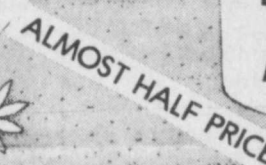
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Palmer-O'Brien United In Marriage

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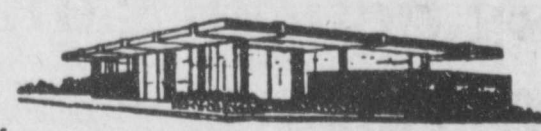
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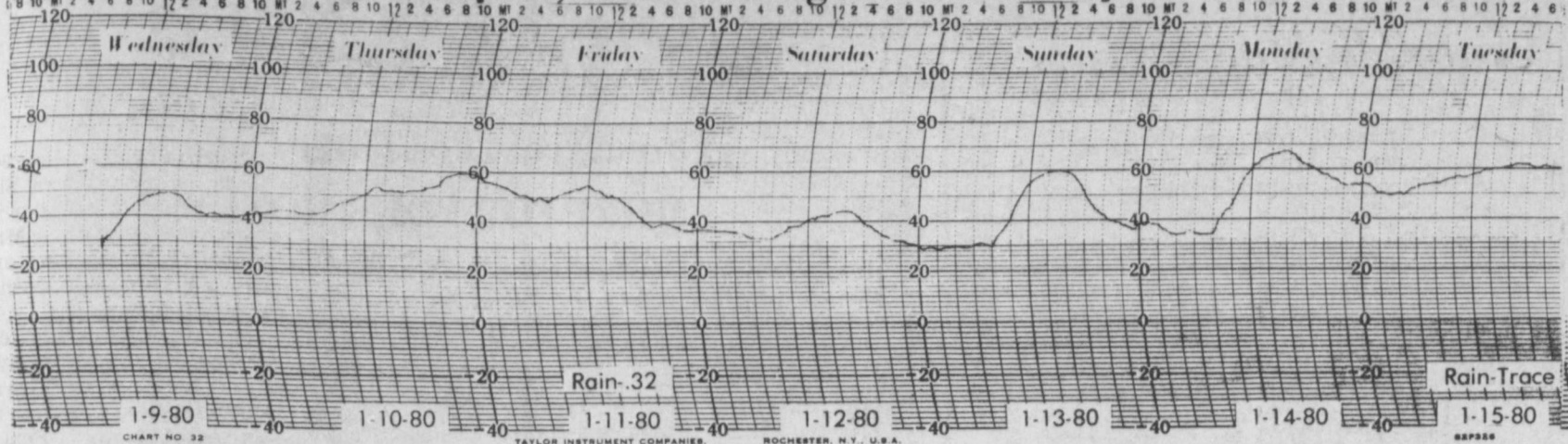


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Weather Recorded In Deport, Texas During Past Seven Days

If you are among the East Texas homemakers who received a micro wave oven for Christmas your reaction probably falls somewhere between "I use it for everything" and "I'll trade it for a freezer!"

Comments such as the above led to an informal poll of several area micro wave oven users. I talked with nine homemakers who use their micro wave ovens frequently. Most said, "everyday." However, they did not use the ovens so frequently when they first got them. "I sort of had to give myself a push," Martha Glover stated. "It's an entirely different method of cooking. You've got to make up your mind before you can change your habits."

When asked what problems they encountered at first, most of the women said, "I overcooked everything." Juanita Sparks said, "I could not believe that even though the book said 2 minutes, that would cook anything. I thought I'll give it two and a half—and it was overcooked."

The homemakers queried offered the following suggestions to help new micro wave oven users:

1. Read and reread the instructions that accompanied your oven. Bonnie Singleton, a relatively new micro wave oven user, says, "I keep my book right there on the counter and then I go by that. It's becoming more automatic. I don't have to refer to the timing as much as I did."

2. Seek answers to your questions and problems—first, from the instructions; next, from the cook book that came with your oven, and then from the dealer that your oven was bought from. If you still don't have a

solution, write the manufacturer.

3. Attend a micro wave oven cooking school. Several homemakers stated that attending the micro wave cooking schools at Paris Junior College and at the Red River County Extension sponsored Food Fair, after they had their ovens, helped them learn to use them.

4. Consider using your micro wave oven at least once a day. Ask yourself "What can the micro wave oven do faster and easier? The experienced micro wave oven users most frequently suggested: bacon for breakfast; defrosting frozen foods, meat loaf, casseroles, warming prepared foods, and baking potatoes. Martha Kate Wood stated "It's worth the money just to have it to thaw out things from the freezer and to warm things."

Larann Denison said "I cook ahead, then warm it up in the micro wave."

5. Set the timer for the minimum time suggested. Then, if the food is undercooked, set it for a few seconds or minutes more. Remember, the food will continue to cook after it is removed from the oven. Allow for this.

6. Talk with other micro wave users. Find out what foods they most frequently cook in it and how. Bonnie Singleton cooked their entire Christmas dinner, including a 10 pound turkey, in the micro wave oven. "Yes, the turkey was nicely browned," she said.

7. As you become better acquainted with your micro wave oven you will find additional uses for it and learn to convert your own favorite recipes.

8. Use your micro wave oven to complement or supplement the other appliances in your kitchen, and vice versa. Evelyn Dorr said that she often browns a chicken pot pie by turning it over and browning the top in a skillet on her regular range, then flips it over and browns the bottom a few minutes. "You don't want to thaw it in the skillet, you just want to brown it, then cook it in the micro wave. You can do two of them in 15 minutes, that way," she says. Several homemakers stated that they still prefer to do big pieces of meat by conventional methods.

Beth Dannheim, Red River County Extension Agent, encouragingly advises homemakers to take time and be patient and the microwave oven will soon become a vital part of your kitchen.

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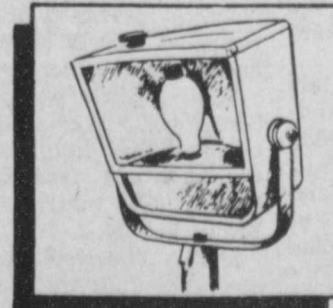

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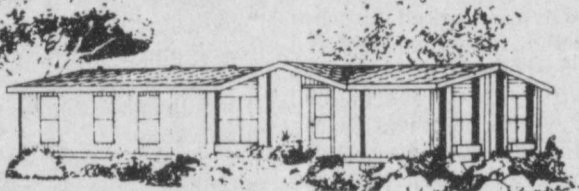

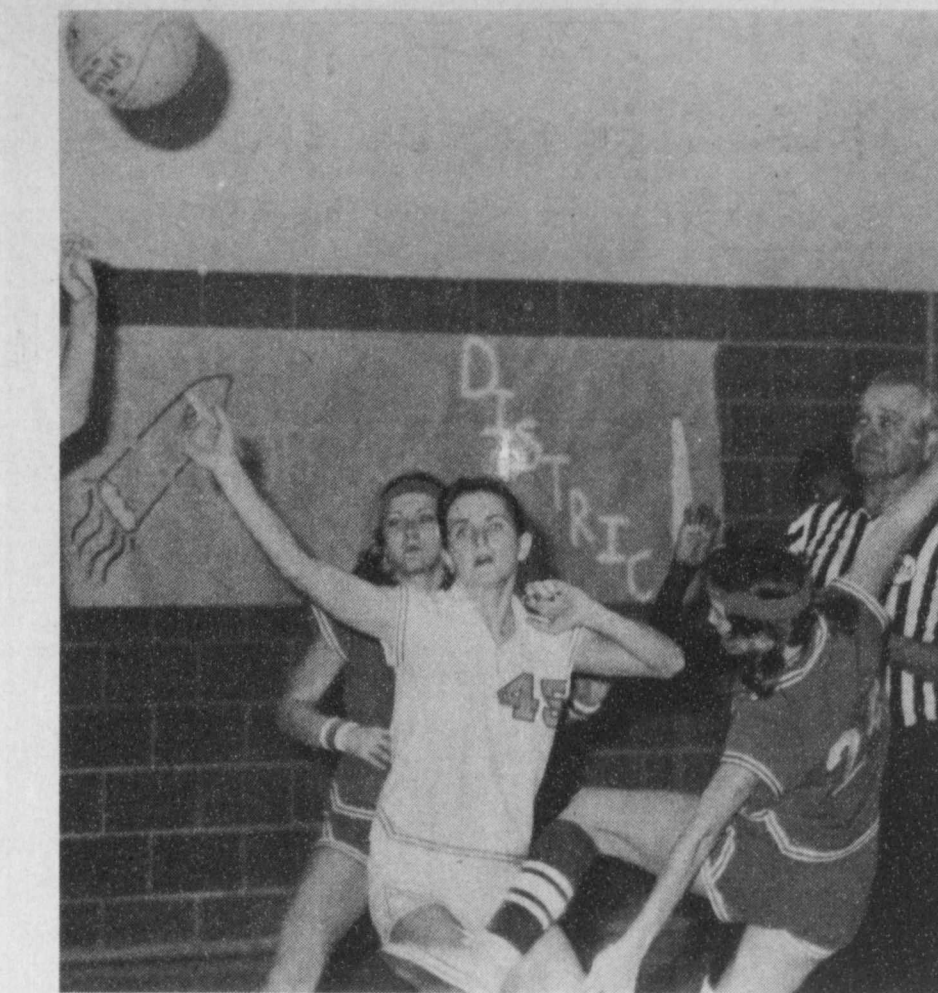

Beef Producers Urged To Vote In Beeferendum

Beef cattle producers are urged to participate in the upcoming referendum on the Federal Beef Research and Information Order, according to Larkin Gooch of Detroit, president of the Red River County Farm Bureau. Producers who owned cattle anytime in 1979 are eligible to vote in the 1980 "Beeferendum," the farm leader said. They can register at the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office anytime between January 28 and February 6. They can vote at the ASCS office anytime

between February 19-22.

"The best way to determine how the majority of producers feel about this matter is for all producers to participate," Gooch said. Details on registering and voting and on the Order itself are available at the county Farm Bureau office at Hwy. 82 west in Clarksville, he said.

"We want to remind cattlemen that it's their money at stake in the check-off vote," the county farm leader said. "A good turn-out should determine whether or not beef producers want a mandatory check-off for beef research and promotion that is run by a quasi-governmental agency," he added.

For approval of the Order, ballots must be cast by at least 50 percent of the producers registered to vote in the referendum, and a majority of those voting must favor or approve the issuance of the Order, Gooch said.

In essence, the check-off program provides for a mandatory deduction from each sale of cattle, the farm leader said. The law permits a deduction of up to 1/2 of one percent from the sale price. The deduction would be limited to not more than 2-10 of one percent for the first two years, and after that can be increased up to 1/2 of one percent without a referendum.

The law requires purchasers of cattle to make the deduction. Failure to comply is subject to a \$1,000 fine. The deduction would be made at each point of sale. The buyer would pay the purchase price minus the amount of the check-off to each seller of cattle. The check-off money would be paid to the administering agency at the point of slaughter.

Explaining how much money is involved, the county FB leader used a \$450 calf as an example. For the first two years, the assessment authorization would be limited to 90 cents on such a sale. After that, the assessment could go to \$2.25, he said.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that initial collections at the 2-10 of one percent figure could total about \$40 million annually, and about \$100 million annually at the 1/2 of one percent figure.

The proposed order provides for refunds of assessments if demand is

made within 60 days after the end of the month in which the transaction occurred... Cattle producers desiring refunds would have to keep up with their own refund deadlines and may be required to keep sale records up to eight years or more on heifers purchased and sold later as aged cows, Gooch said.

The USDA Beeferendum Order proposes to establish a Beef Board (a quasi-governmental agency) composed of not more than 68 producers to administer the program. It further provides that the Secretary of Agriculture "shall appoint to the Board up to five non-voting consumer advisors deemed to be knowledgeable in nutrition and food." These advisors would be reimbursed from producer assessments, the county FB leader said.

The USDA would also be authorized to employ new employees to monitor the beef research and promotion program, and all expenses incurred by USDA, including salaries, would be paid from the cattlemen's assessment funds.

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Admiral Sam Moore To Speak At PJC

Guest speaker for Paris Junior College's Homecoming luncheon on Saturday, February 2, will be Admiral Sam H. Moore, a 1938 graduate of PJC who retired from the U.S. Navy after a long and "eventful" career. At the 11:30 a.m. luncheon in the Student Center Ballroom, Admiral Moore will discuss what Paris Junior College has meant to him, his family and his peers, and will include aspects of his outstanding Naval career.

The Outstanding Alumnus Scholarship Award, given annually by the Association of Former Students and Friends of PJC, will be named in honor of Admiral Moore. Other honor guests at the luncheon will be members of PJC's first Board of Regents of 1949 and their families. Special seating arrangements will be provided for each of the 54 graduating classes of the college.

Tickets for the luncheon, priced at \$4 each, will be sold in the College Store the week

of Homecoming. In addition to the luncheon, dedication ceremonies for the Jess B. Alford Center for Lifelong Learning will be held at 10 a.m. with tours of the center to follow. The center, designed to meet educational needs of citizens beyond the traditional college age, is named as a memorial to Jess B. Alford, who was a trustee of the Paris Independent School District and PJC when the college district became separate in 1937.

Born in Rugby, Texas, Admiral Moore is a 1936 graduate of Bogata High School. After graduating from PJC and East Texas State University, Moore was commissioned an ensign in the Navy in May of 1942. During World War II, he served in the Atlantic and Pacific Fleets, and, after that, served in various positions such as commanding officer and executive officer of ships and completed courses at military schools in Texas, California and Virginia.

From 1958 to 1960, Rear Admiral Moore was assigned to the Office of the Deputy Chief of Naval Operations (research and development), and, in July of 1960, he became executive officer of the First Talos Guided Missile Ship, USS Galveston, in the Atlantic Fleet. He assumed command of a destroyer division in 1962 and was involved in the Cuban Crisis of October, 1962. During that period, he was the on-scene commander for boarding at sea and a search of Marucla, the Soviet-chartered merchant ship, during the quarantine operations.

Following duty as director of plans and programs for the Surface Missiles Systems Project in the Bureau of Naval Weapons, Moore served as commanding officer of the guided missile cruiser USS Chicago during 1965-66 immediately prior to attending the National War College in Washington, D.C. He was selected for flag rank one day prior to his graduation from the college, and served as commander of several cruiser-destroyer groups before assuming command of Military Sea Transportation Service, Far East.

After serving as director of budget and reports in the Office of the Comptroller of the Navy, he became the deputy comptroller of the Navy in 1972. He became commander Military Sealift Command, in 1975, and served in this position until his retirement in 1977.

WMA Hostess

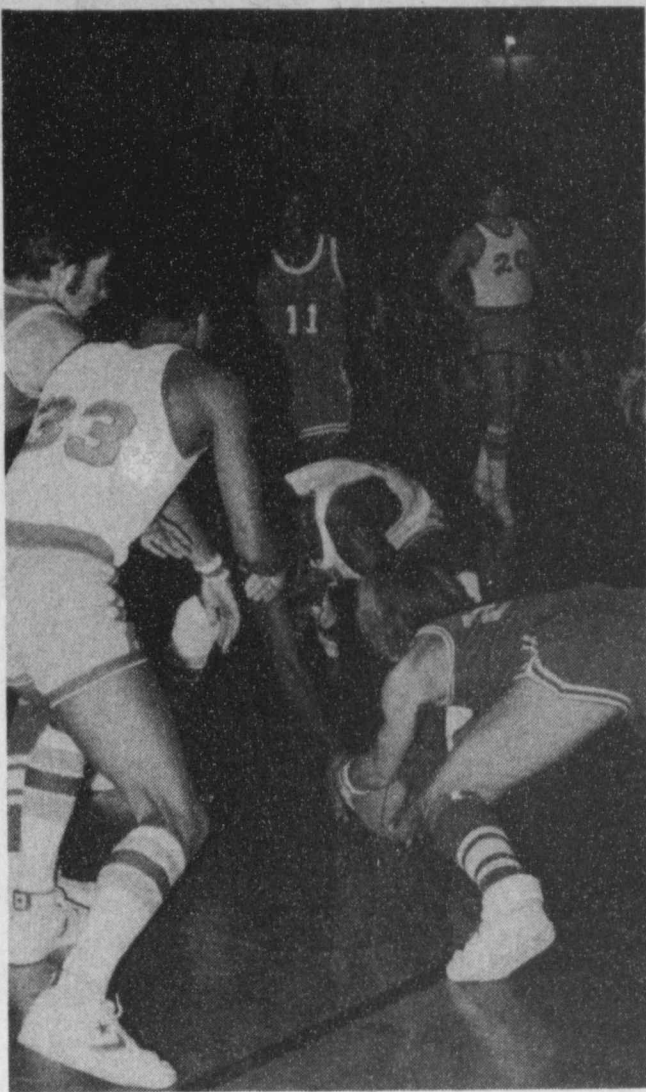
Mrs. Donald Jones was hostess to the WMA of the First Baptist Church Tuesday night, January 8 in her home.

Industrial Production Shows Slight Decline

Industrial production in Texas fell slightly in October, according to initial estimates. The shallow decline was evident in all major components of the index.

In manufacturing, durable goods output was weighed down with reduced production in refining, paper, and printing and publishing. Lower output in electrical machinery; primary metals; transportation equipment; and stone, clay, and glass products accounted for the

decline in durable goods production.

Mining output decreased as crude oil production fell off for the second month in a row. Output of metal, stone, and earth minerals was also off, but drilling activity was up sharply.

Reflecting the decline in factory output, the manufacturing capacity utilization index fell in October to 101.9 percent of the 1972 base.

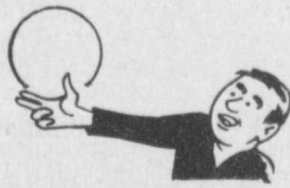
Auxiliary Hold Joint Meeting

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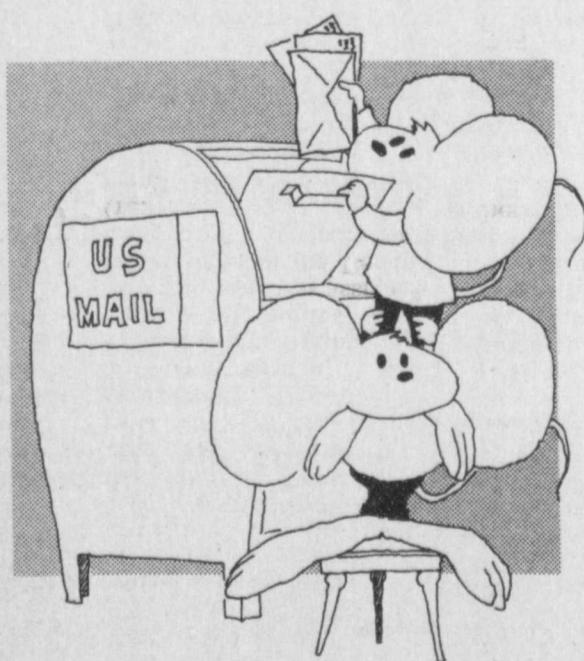
