J. A. Bowling Receives Letter From Chaplain

Following is a letter received by J. A. Bowling from a chaplain stationed in the Admiralty Islands where Woodrow W. Bowling was killed in action Mar. 17:

Dear Mr. Bowling: Many friends have already extended to you expressions of sympathy since the death of your dear son, Pfc. Woodrow W. Bowling. Truly we all feel deeply the great loss of such a fine and noble soldier and loved one. His sense of duty and his courage was a source of inspiration to all his buddies. May God grant us light to understand and faith to sustain us.

You may rest assured Mr. Bowling, that everything connected with the care and burial was done with dignity and respect. Immediately following his death I gave him a Christian burial with Scripture reading, prayer and the committal service.

Then, following the cessation of hostilities, a reverent memorial service, attended by Woodrow's entire regiment, was held. Words of solemnity and deep appreciation were spoken by the Commanding General and by the Regimental Commander. A copy of this service is enclosed.

Woodrow lies at rest in our beautiful cemetery. Over his grave, with his name lettered upon it, stands a white cross. A white fence surrounds the cemetery. Beautiful shrubbery is planted throughout. The American flag flies at the top of a white flag pole. In a corner of the quiet cemetery stands a lovely little white chapel, symbol of the eternal presence of our Good Shepherd. The cemetery is given constant care and keeping by U. S. soldiers. A more attractive burial place can hardly be pictured.

May God's grace and peace abide with you, Mr. Bowling.

The following Memorial Service was held on April 30, 1944, in the Admiralty Islands, in honor of our Comrades killed in action:

I. Formation of Troops (band playing)

II. Arrival of Division Commander (troops called to attention)

III. Invocation: Chaplain Charles V. Trent

"Our Gracious Heavenly Father, Thou who didst declare that greater love hath no man than to lay down his life for his friends—we are met together today to pay respect and honor to our fallen comrades. We thank Thee for their noble examples of unconquerable courage. Grant that their unselfish devotion may make us cherish more deeply that freedom for which our nation stands.

Now, Our Father, speak Thou comfort to those loved ones at home in their hour of bereavement for these dearer than life to them. Let Thy strength sustain them. May they have the comforting assurance that neither life nor death nor any other eventuality shall be able to separate them for the love of God.

Now grant unto us, the quick, eyes to see and hearts to understand that those ideals for which our comrades died are the things that make life worth the living. Endow us with fitting tokens of esteem. In the Name of Him who

is our life and light. Amen.

IV. Hymn: Rock of Ages
V. Address: Major General I. P. Swift, Commander 1st Cavalry Division (The substance of his address is as follows:)

"We are met here today for a purpose which we hold to be sacred—that of paying honor, tribute and respect to our noble comrades who have fallen in battle. It is with the greatest humility that we come to this occasion, for they—the fallen—have left us a standard and an example of heroism and devotion excelled nowhere in the annals of history.

These of our noble fighting men joined the service of our glorious country for a purpose. It was for decency, freedom and democracy that they left business, homeland, families and friends to bravely bear arms against an insidious foe. They gave their last, full measure of devotion. God grant that they shall not have died in vain.

VI. Address: Colonel Hugh T. Hoffman, Regimental Commander

The living light of the sun strikes the spinning earth, and changes night to day in eternal rhythm. The myriad stars, in unnumbered disciplined squadrons, patrol the outer darkness of the limitless universe. Divine! Provident! Therefore all men know in their hearts also, there is infinite Power, there is Divine Intelligence; there is infinite authority; there is Divine Providence. Everything tangible and intangible exists forever. Even as the deeds of mortal men live after them, so too their souls shall never perish, but remain a part of the infinite Living Universe. Our comrades are dead? But no. With loyalty and courage they have but answered His Divine call to join the vaster ranks of Eternity. Our comrades live with God in glory Everlasting. Though they answer not, we call their names:

Thus we honor them. God give us strength and courage, and resolution that they gave not in vain. God bless and keep them in Peace forever.

"Now, O God, whose mercies cannot be numbered accept our prayers and praise on these who have paid their last full measure of devotion. Grant unto us who are still in our life pilgrimage the privilege of carrying the torches of devoted patriotism bequeathed to us by our fallen friends. To that end, lead us into the true way of life and grant us Thy peace which passeth all understanding." Amen.

Sgt. Jackie S. Johnson Is Awarded Army Air Medal

The following appeared in last weeks Memphis Democrat:

A veteran heavy bomber crewman of Giles who flew against the Japs in early action of the western Aleutian area, was decorated at the Ardmore Army Air Field Saturday, at a formal presentation ceremony in which units of the entire garrison passed in review to pay him tribute.

S-Sgt. Jackie S. Johnson, son of Mrs. Moyne Ranson, was awarded the Air Medal for over nine months service as an aerial gunner with the 11th Air Force. His citation reads: "During the period June 1, 1942, to March 14, 1943, this enlisted man participated in numerous attacks on enemy installations and surface vessels, in the western Aleutian area. All flights were made over water, with undesirable flying conditions predominating and in the face of accurate and concentrated fire from enemy ground installations and vessels. Many of the missions were completed in spite of pursuit opposition. The courage and skill displayed by this enlisted man is worthy of the highest praise."

Sergeant Johnson, now a gunnery instructor at this 2nd Army Air Force combat crew training field, entered the service August 2, 1940. He was decorated by Col. H. H. Upham, station commander. Commander of troops in the review was Major Donald C. Douglass, secretary to the director of training.

John McCauley, who is stationed at Camp Gordon, Georgia, has been promoted to Corporal.

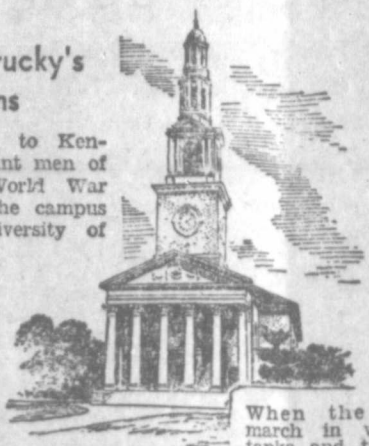
Marines graduating from this school will be assigned to Infantry Battalions and their training has prepared them for amphibious landings and establishing and securing beach heads.

Christmas Mailing To Overseas Forces

This year the Christmas mailing period for both Army and Navy overseas forces is the same—September 15 to October 15. After October 15 no gift parcel may be mailed to a soldier without the presentation of a written request from him. More care must be taken in wrapping and packing parcels securely and addressing them clearly and correctly.

If the gifts are to be protected in transit they must be packed in boxes made of metal, wood, so'd fiberboard, or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard, reinforced with strong gummed paper tape or tied with strong twine. If both tape and strong twine are used, so much the better. If the outer wrapper is crushed—and this is likely to happen—the loss of contents may be prevented if fiberboard boxes are wrapped in heavy paper. We advise that everyone write the address of the sender and addressee inside the package as well as outside.

Because strong twine, heavy paper and boxes and fiberboard will prove of real help in making delivery of gifts possible I urge those at home to begin saving these materials now. As time goes on they are going to become even more scarce than they are now.

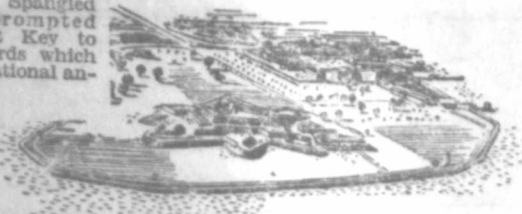

Try This "Egg Shortcake" Recipe



American hens have set new records in production and eggs are cheap and plentiful now. They're nutritious, too, rich in iron, vitamins A, B, and D, and also contain calcium, phosphorus and thiamine. They can be used in breakfast, lunch or supper dishes.

The flexible, easily controlled gas range is practical for cooking eggs because they must be cooked slowly to prevent the protein from becoming tough. No longer are the advantages of modern gas cookery limited to city housewives, for home-sitters everywhere, in cities, semi-rural or rural communities, are using liquefied petroleum gases as cooking fuel. This fuel, known as "cotton" or "tank" gas, is being delivered to nearly 2,000,000 homes away from the city gas mains.

Protein-rich eggs are point-free and make satisfying main dishes. Try them creamed, in between layers of shortcake, as in this recipe:

Egg Shortcake.
(Serves 6)
6 hard-cooked eggs
3 tablespoons butter or substitute
3 tablespoons flour
1½ cups milk
Rich Shortcake Dough.

Melt butter, blend in flour. Add milk gradually, stirring constantly. Cook until thickened, then add sliced hard-cooked eggs and cook for a few minutes. Serve between layers of shortcake and garnish with quartered egg, paprika and parsley.

The association represents the industry which produces propane and butane gas and delivers them in bottled or tank form to homes away from city gas mains, for use as fuel in gas refrigeration, gas ranges and gas water-heaters.

1. Remove paper wrappings from foods before storing in refrigerator.

2. Wipe off milk and cream bottles.

3. Wash and clean vegetables and fruit before storing. Wash berries just before serving.

4. Place uncooked meat (unwrapped) under freezing unit.

5. Allow foods to cool before storing and make sure they are covered.

6. Watch leftovers and use them attractively.

7. Place foods to allow for free circulation of air throughout refrigerator.

8. Keep bottles and cans at room temperature until ready for chilling and serving.

9. Open and close doors as quickly as possible to preserve cold.

10. Clean refrigerator by wiping with a damp cloth often. Wash with a weak solution of baking soda.

11. Use ice trays for frozen salads, ice creams, mousses, and for colored and flavored ice cubes.

12. Defrost regularly according to manufacturer's instructions.

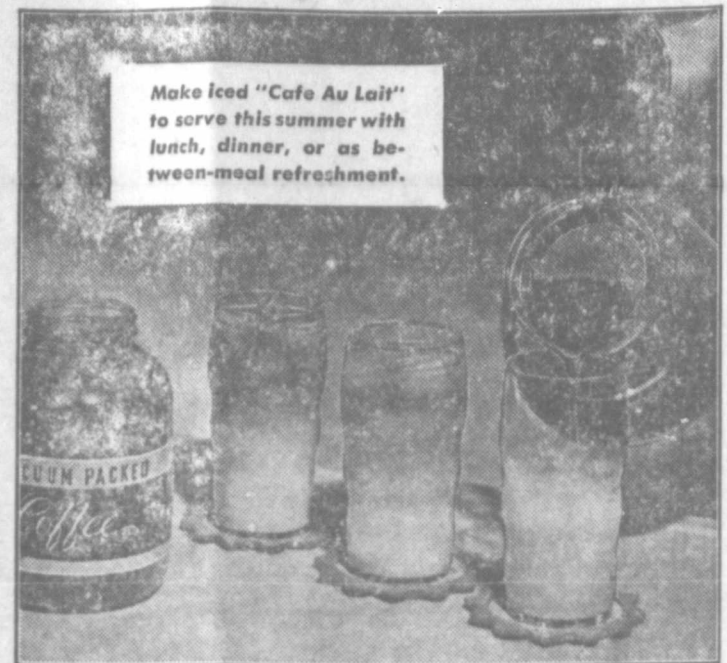

Iced Coffee and Milk Combine In Cooling, Hot-Weather Drink

Iced Cafe Au Lait: (For 5 servings.) Scald one pint of milk and cool. Make one pint of double- or triple-strength coffee. Fill tall glasses with ice cubes. Then, half fill the glasses with scalded milk, and fill to top with freshly made hot coffee.

With Ernie Pyle at the Front

Brave Medics Carry On Under Heavy Nazi Shelling

While Hundreds Are Hit, Ernie Has Charmed Life and Escapes

By Ernie Pyle

ON THE WESTERN FRONT.—The afternoon was tense, and full of caution and dire little might-have-beens. I was wandering up a dirt lane where the infantrymen were squatting alongside in a ditch, waiting their turn to advance. They always squat like that when they're close to the front.

Suddenly German shells started banging around us. I jumped into a ditch between a couple of soldiers and squatted. Shells were clipping the hedge-tops right over our heads and crashing into the next pasture.

Then suddenly one exploded, not with a crash, but with a ring as though you'd struck a high-toned bell. The debris of burned wadding and dirt came showering down over us. My head rang, and my right ear couldn't hear anything.

The shell had struck behind us, 20 feet away. We had been saved by the earthen bank of the hedge-row. It was the next day before my ear returned to normal. A minute later a soldier crouching next in line, a couple of feet away, turned to me and asked, "Are you a war correspondent?"

I said I was, and he said, "I want to shake your hand." And he reached around the bush and we shook hands.

That's all either of us said. It didn't occur to me until later that it was a sort of unusual experience. And I was so added by the close explosions that I forgot to put down his name.

A few minutes later a friend of mine, Lieut. Col. Oma Bates of Gloster, Miss., came past and said he was hunting our new battalion command post. It was supposed to be in a farmhouse about a hundred yards from us, so I got up and went with him. We couldn't find it at first. We lost about five minutes, walking around in orchards looking for it. That was a blessed five minutes. For when we got within 50 yards of the house it got a direct shell hit which killed one officer and wounded several men.

The Germans now rained shells around our little area. You couldn't walk 10 feet without hitting the ground. They came past our heads so quickly you didn't take time to fall forward—I found the quickest way down was to flop back and sideways.

In a little while the seat of my pants was plastered thick with wet red clay, and my hands were scratched from hitting rocks and briars to break quick falls.

Nobody ever fastens the chin straps on his helmet in the front lines, for the blasts from nearby bursts have been known to catch helmets and break people's necks. Consequently, when you squat quickly you descend faster than your helmet and you leave it in mid-air above you. Of course in a fraction of a second it follows you down and hits you on the head, and settles sideways over your ear and down over your eyes. It makes you feel silly.

Once more shells drove me into a roadside ditch. I squatted there, just a bewildered guy in brown, part of a thin line of other bewildered guys as far up and down the ditch as you could see.

It was really frightening. Our own shells were whanging overhead and hitting just beyond. The German shells tore through the orchards around us. There was machine gunning all around, and bullets zipped through the trees above us.

I could tell by their shoulder patches that the soldiers near me were from a division to our right, and I wondered what they were doing there. Then I heard one of them say:

"This is a fine foul-up for you! I knew that lieutenant was getting lost. Hell, we're service troops, and here we are right in the front lines. Grim as the moment was, I had to laugh to myself at their pitiful plight."

I left a command post in a farmhouse and started to another about 10 minutes away. When I got there, they said the

one I had just left had been hit while I was on the way.

A solid armor-piercing shell had gone right through a window and a man I knew had his leg cut off. That evening the other officers took the big steel slug over to the hospital so he would have a souvenir.

When I got to another battalion command post, later in the day, they were just ready to move. A sergeant had been forward about half a mile in a jeep and picked out a farmhouse. He said it was the cleanest, nicest one he had been in for a long time.

So we piled into several jeeps and drove up there. It had been only about 20 minutes since the sergeant had left. But when we got to the new house, it wasn't there.

A shell had hit it in the last 20 minutes and set it afire, and it had burned to the ground. So we drove up the road a little farther and picked out another one. We had been there about half an hour when a shell struck in an orchard 50 yards in front of us.

In a few minutes our litter bearers came past, carrying a captain. He was the surgeon of our adjoining battalion, and he had been looking in the orchard for a likely place to move his first-aid station. A shell hit right beside him.

That's the way war is on an afternoon that is tense and full of might-have-beens for some of us, and awful realities for others.

It just depends on what your number is. I don't believe in that number business at all, but in war you sort of let your belief hover around it, for it's about all you have left.

One afternoon I went with our battalion medics to pick up wounded men who had been carried back to some shattered houses just behind our lines, and to gather some others right off the battlefield.

The battalion surgeon was Capt. Lucien Strawn, from Morgantown, W. Va. He drives his jeep himself and goes right into the lines with his aidmen.

We drive forward about a mile in our two jeeps, so loaded with litter bearers they were even riding on the hood. Finally we had to stop and wait until a bulldozer filled a new shell crater in the middle of the road. We had gone only about a hundred yards beyond the crater when we ran into some infantry. They stopped us and said:

"Be careful where you're going. The Germans are only 200 yards up the road."

Captain Strawn said he couldn't get to the wounded men that way so he turned around to try another way. A side road led off at an angle from a shattered village we had just passed through. He decided to try to get up that road.

But when we got there the road had a house blown across it, and it was blocked. We went forward a little on foot and found two deep bomb craters, also impassable.

So Captain Strawn walked back to the bulldozer, and asked the driver if he would go ahead of us and clear the road. The first thing the driver asked was, "How close to the front is it?"

The doctor said, "Well, at least it isn't any closer than you are right now." So the dozer driver agreed to clear the road ahead of us.

While we were waiting a soldier came over and showed us two eggs he had just found in the backyard of a jumbled house. There wasn't an untouched house left standing in the town, and some of the houses were still smoking inside.

At the far edge of the town we came to a partly wrecked farmhouse that had two Germans in it—one was wounded and the other was just staying with him. We ran our jeeps into the yard and the litter bearers went on across the field.

The doctor took his scissors and began cutting his clothes open to see if he was wounded anywhere except in the arm. He wasn't. But he had been sick at his stomach and then rolled over. He was sure a superman sad sack.

Shell Shocked GIs Wring Ernie's Heart

Two shock cases came staggering down the road toward us. They were not wounded but were completely broken—the kind that stab into your heart.

They were shaking all over, and had to hold onto each other like little girls when they walked. The doctor stopped them. They could only talk, barely understand. He told them to wait down at the next

corner until we came back, and then they could ride. When they turned away from the jeep, they turned slowly and unsteadily, a step at a time, like men who were awfully drunk. Their mouths hung open and their eyes stared, and they still held onto each other. They were just like idiots. They had found more war than the human spirit can endure.

AROUND THE HOUSE

Knitted woollens and wool dresses and skirts washed by hand are less likely to shrink or become matted than if cleaned in a washing machine.

When clothes must be ironed soon after dampening, always use hot water as it penetrates the material more quickly.

If ice cubes are held under warm water for a few seconds, they will have no sharp edges to jab or cut the precious rubber icebag.

Garden tools free from rust are easier to work with and, if a small can of tractor oil and an old shaving brush are kept handy, it takes little time to clean and oil the tools after using.

To clean rust from any kind of farm implements, dissolve one can of lye in five gallons of water and apply with an old broom or brush. Scrub well. The rust will come off quickly.

Oftentimes a pretty flower arrangement cannot be achieved because the frog is not the right size or shape. In this case, make one by melting paraffin, molding it in the desired shape and punching holes with a heated ice pick.

When the metal tip comes off a shoe lace, it is not necessary to discard the lace. A satisfactory tip can be put on quickly and easily by dipping the end of the lace in melted paraffin or beeswax and shaved to a point before the wax hardens.
