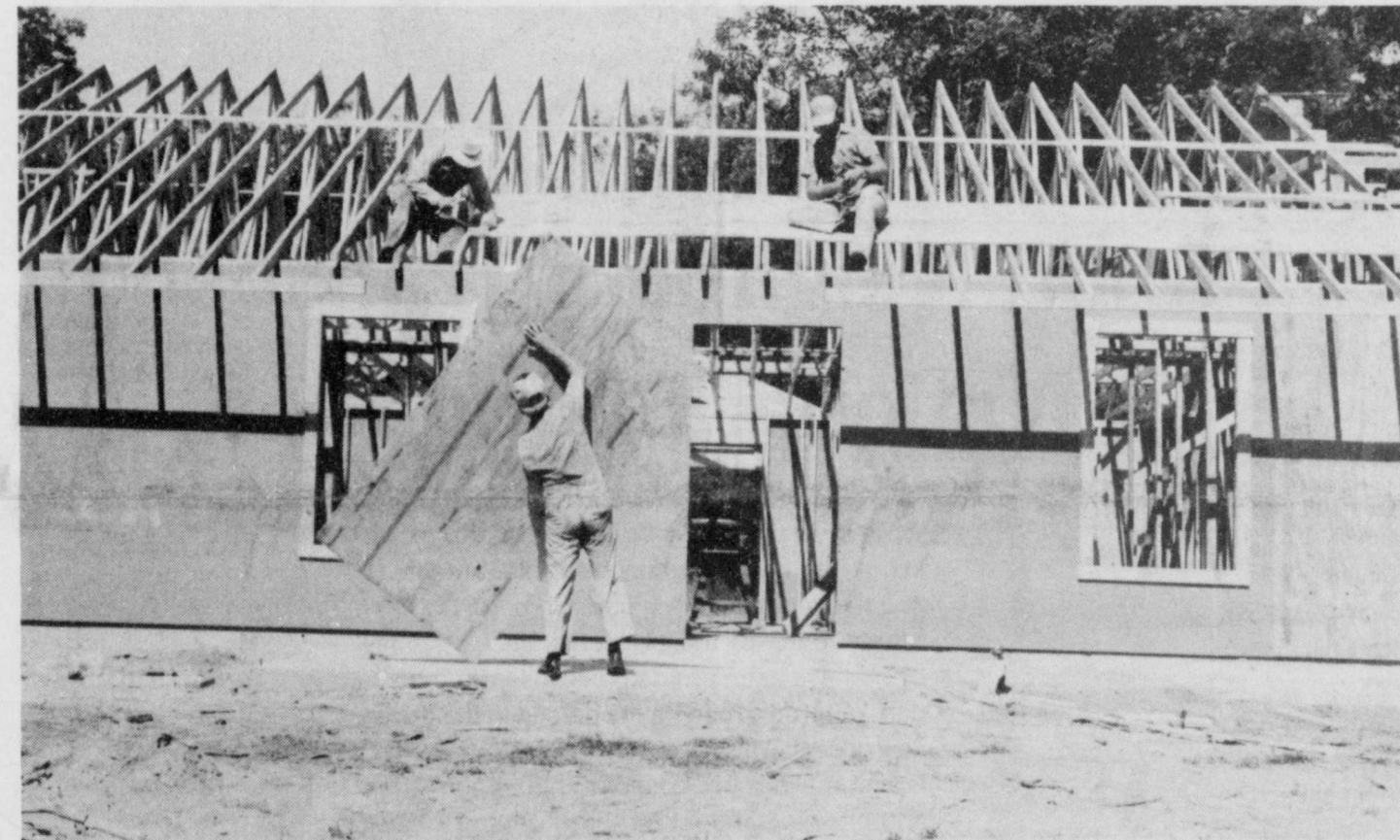
The Rev. Bob Posey, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Bogata, has not resigned his post at the Bogata church.

Plans Finalized

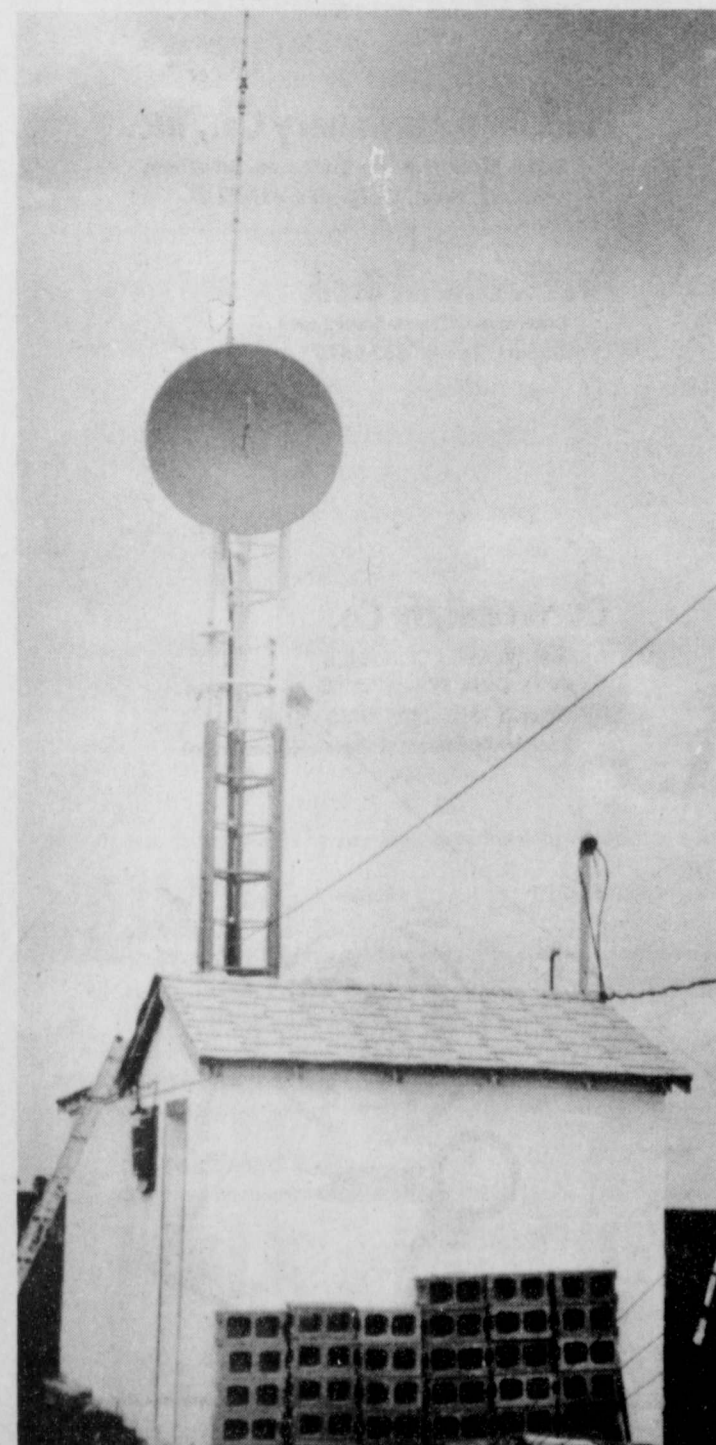
The annual baby and children's editions which are published in The Blossom Times, The Deport Times, The Bogata News and The Mount Vernon Optic-Herald are being planned for October.

Every child whose picture is made by the Magic Valley photographer will have his picture run, with some pictures being sponsored by local advertisers.

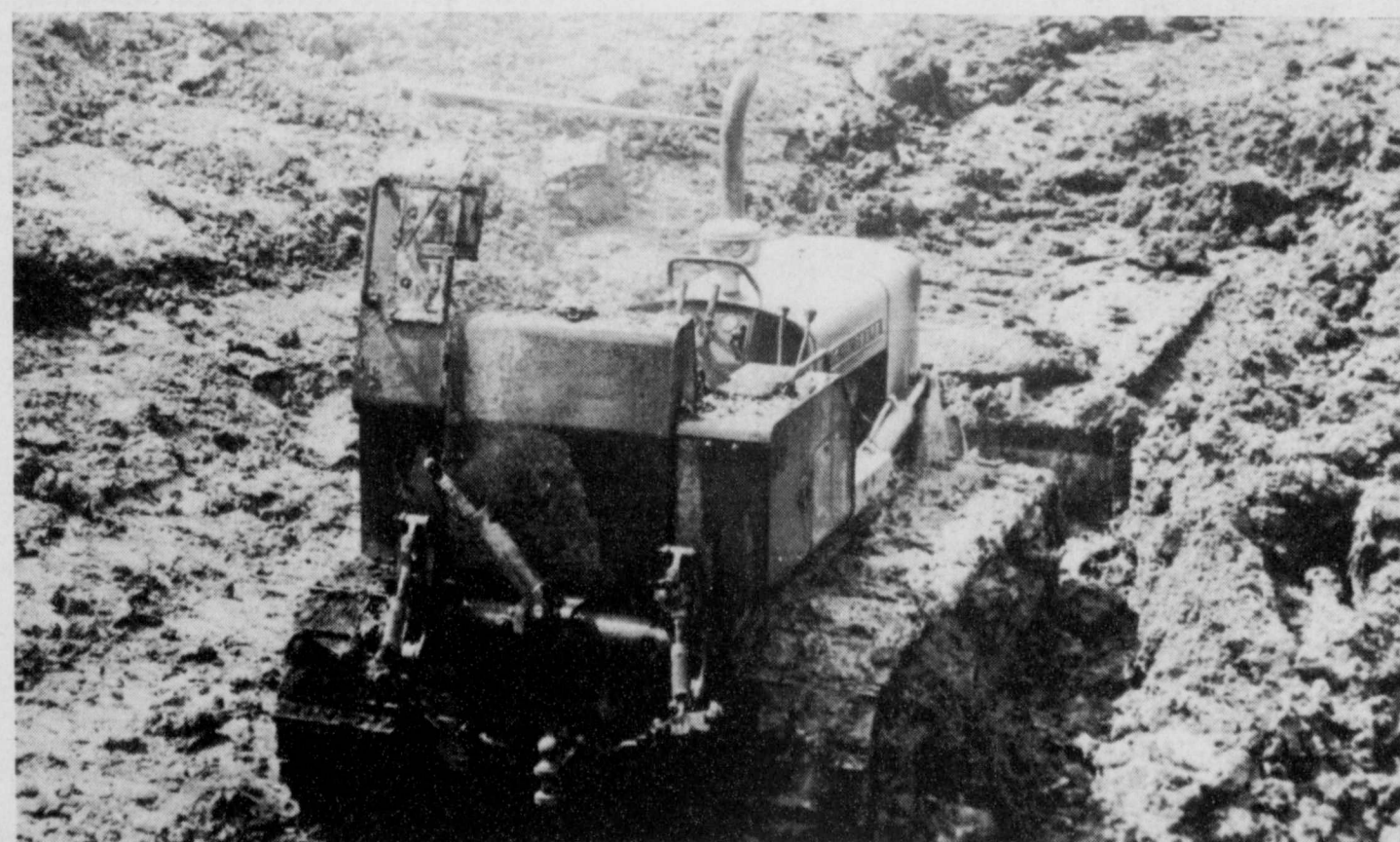

Microwave TV For Blossom August 1

Systems Awarded Federal Grant

Emergency Medical Services in nine Northeast Texas counties have been awarded a federal grant for \$227,000 to help finance emergency medical care development during the next 12 months.

Geri England, EMS Systems Coordinator for the Ark-Tex Council of Governments, says the grant will assure the continued improvement of emergency care throughout this area.

"This is the third year we've received federal money from our EMS system," she said, "and the impact is obvious. A large part of this year's grant will help pay for ambulance and communications equipment, tangible items that give long-term benefits in emergency patient care."

The grant was announced by the Division of EMS, U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. It was officially given to the Texas Department of Health, which was awarded five such grants for EMS systems statewide. Ms. England administers the grant locally through the Council of Governments.

Counties that will benefit from the grant are Bowie, Cass, Delta, Franklin, Hopkins,

Lamar, Morris, Red River, and Titus.

Funds for development of EMS Systems are available because of the EMS Systems Act of 1973. The Act provides grants for up to five years. According to Ms. England, this is the third year for the Ark-Tex area.

"By the end of this year, she says, we will have received a total of more than \$470,000."

Immunization Clinic

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations.

The clinic will be conducted at the City Hall, Bogata, Texas.

The next clinic will be held August 10, 1978. Clinic hours will be from 2 to 4 p.m. Future clinic dates will be announced.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all children, preschool and school age, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations to be offered include Mumps, Measles, Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (DTP) and Tetanus-diphtheria (Td). All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record if it is available.

The Tetanus-diphtheria (Td) vaccine is also available to adults.

Sue White Feted With Shower

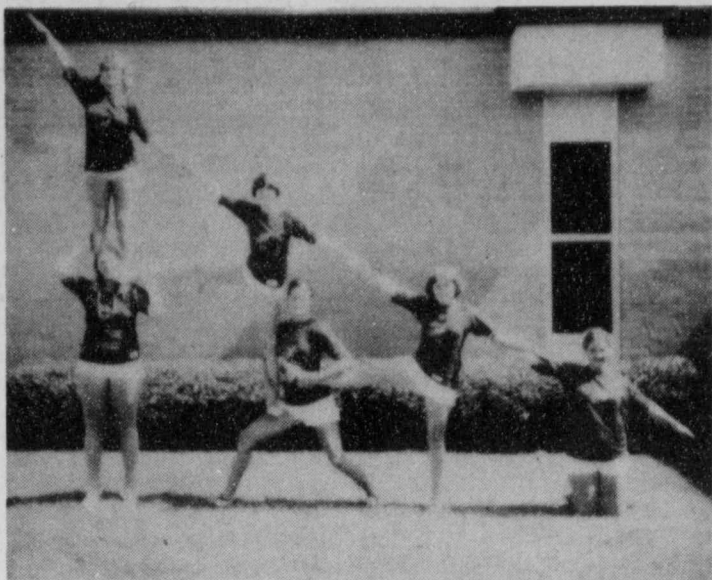

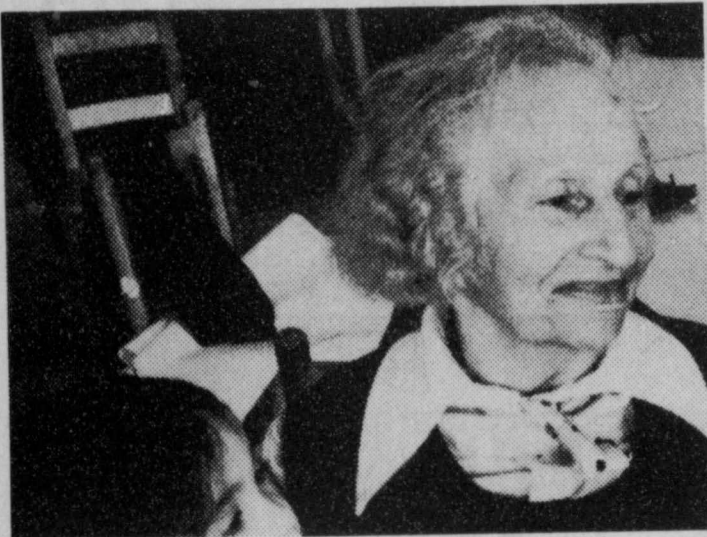

South Carolina's new merit rating plan should benefit the state's elderly.

Statistics show older drivers tend to be involved in fewer automobile accidents than those in other age groups.

In July, a revised automobile insurance "Uniform Merit Rating Plan" went into effect. It awards discounts to drivers who have had no accidents or violations and places surcharges on those who have.

According to the South Carolina Department of Insurance, "Future rates for drivers with clean records should be held down because the new system places more of the premium burden on drivers with accident and traffic convictions."

All automobile insurance companies in South Carolina are required to use the system.

Q. I've always wondered what safety measures I could take if my brakes ever failed.— N. M., Diboll

A. If you have an automatic transmission, shift to a lower range and apply the emergency (parking) brake. With a standard transmission, shift to a lower gear and apply the emergency brake. Pump the brake pedal. This may build up pressure in the brake lines and get the brakes to work. If necessary, find something to sideswipe and use your horn or lights to warn others that you are out of control.

Q. I'm confused about how to make a right turn on red. I've seen some drivers treat the red light as they would a stop sign; others treat it as a yield sign.— D.H., Uvalde

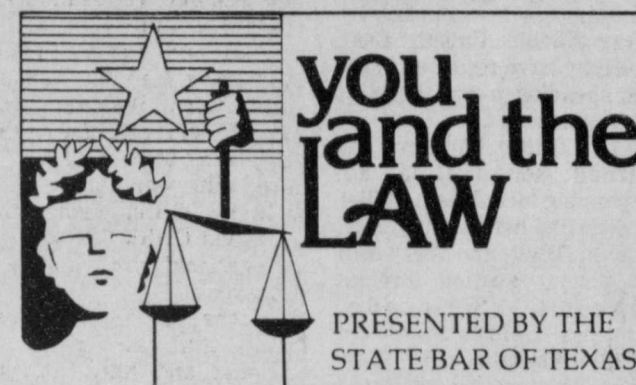
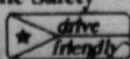
A. Right turns on red are now legal throughout the state of Texas. This means that a driver may turn right at a red light after stopping and yielding the right-of-way to traffic at or near the intersection. Some intersections prohibit right turns on red, so first check to see that there is no sign present saying NO RIGHT TURN ON RED.

The same law holds true for making left turns from a one-way street into another one-way street. First stop at the red light, yield, then turn. Make sure you have signalled your intention at least 100 feet before the turn. And remember, never make a turn on red if a sign at the intersection prohibits it.

Q. Are the speed limit signs in construction areas in effect on weekends when the workmen aren't there? — R. C., Knox City

A. Yes. Those are black and white signs, and according to law they must be observed. Sometimes the black and white signs are removed when work is not underway, and sometimes orange and black signs are used, which warn of obstructions and debris from ongoing construction or repair.

Q: I ordered Christmas cards and have not received them. I have asked the lady who sold them to refund my money, but she has not kept her promises to do so. How can I get my money back?

A: Any claim involving a dispute of \$150 or less in money can be taken before a small claims court. You may contact your local justice of the peace for information on how to file such a suit. If a suit is properly filed, the court will issue a citation to be served on the defendant. A trial can be held before the justice of the peace or a jury if one is requested. A lawyer is not required to present your case in small claims court.

Q: Do the desires of the children have any bearing on which parent gets custody of the children in a divorce case?

A: Under Texas law, the best interest of the child is the primary consideration in determining which person shall be given custody of that child. The court may interview each child privately to ascertain the child's wishes. The older the child, the more likely the court will be to follow the child's wishes.

Q: My son is staying with friends out of state this summer. Does my ex-husband have a right to withhold child support payments because my son is not living with me during the summer?

A: The child support payments set in a divorce decree must be obeyed as long as the court order is in effect. Neither parent has a right to change the order without the approval of the

court. Anyone making court-ordered child support payments who intentionally withholds payment, without first requesting the court to modify the order, risks being punished for contempt of court.

Q: My wife and I are selling our house. We have some expensive drapes in the living room. Will we be able to take these drapes with us when we move?

A: Drapes are personal property and therefore not necessarily part of the real estate conveyed in the contract of sale. To prevent misunderstanding with the person who buys your home, the contract of sale should specify which items of personal property—such as drapes, light fixtures and fireplace hardware—are to be sold with the house.

Q: How can I copyright watercolors I have painted?

A: Artists cannot always prevent unauthorized reproduction and distribution of their work. Their rights are controlled by common law copyright and Federal copyright laws. Before art works are publicly displayed, the artist has absolute control. Once art works are publicly displayed, the artist must comply with the Federal copyright laws which require that a statutory copyright notice be affixed to the art work, and a copyright form be filed with the United States Copyright Office. The result of failure to comply is that the artist loses all control over reproduction and sale of his work. Send your questions to "You and the Law," State Bar of Texas, P.O. CRIME SHOULD
NOT PAY

WASHINGTON—Texas, traditionally, has not been thought of as a state rampant with criminal activity.

Most of our cities, where crime is usually at its worst, have not yet been ruined by urban decay, and as a result, crime has not been as prevalent nor as all encompassing as it is in so many cities in the north and northeast.

But a report released recently by the Texas Organized Crime Prevention Council indicates that beneath the relative tranquility simmers a dangerous and uneasy element, an element that should give all Texans cause for concern.

The report said organized criminal activity last year cost Texans \$3.3 billion. Illegal drug traffic and gambling accounted for much of it, the report said, but prostitution, pornography, motor vehicle theft, arson, cargo theft and fencing stolen merchandise are other problem areas.

In fact, Texans during 1977 had \$328 million worth of property stolen from them, the report states, only \$177 million of which was recovered.

The figures reflect the climb in crime rates nationwide during the 1970s.

A recent survey showed that half of all Americans are afraid to walk within a mile of their homes after dark.

Other statistics show that during the 1970s, crime has increased eight times as fast as the population; the average burglary nets the burglar at least \$500 in goods; crime costs Americans \$60 billion a year; and the rate of serious property crime has risen 150 per cent since 1960.

Statistics also show that only one in every fifty burglars serves time for each burglary committed. As a result for many, crime does pay.

Crime has become something that many Americans must contend with daily. It is no longer just a household word; it is a household fear.

Our systems of justice, meanwhile, seem to be making, at best, only nominal headway in coping with this country's growing crime problem.

I have several specific proposals that I believe would bring about the changes that must occur if crime is to be curtailed.

Earlier this summer, the state enacted the Speedy Trial Act which requires that persons come to trial within a certain number of days after they've been indicted. I believe this act is a move in the right direction. With it must come a genuine commitment by the legal profession and the taxpayer, however, to make certain that expeditious and fair trial processes are a vital part of the spirit as well as the letter of the law.

I have proposed that, at the federal level, we enact a mandatory jail sentence for all persons convicted of serious offenses, such as armed robbery, assault and other crimes of violence.

Studies have shown that as the likelihood of punishment increases, the likelihood of criminal activity decreases. If every person considering a serious crime knew that if apprehended, he would face certain punishment, our system would have a built-in deterrent which currently does not exist.

Too many variations exist as well in the sentences that are handed down. Some judges develop reputations for being extremely harsh, while others are known for their leniency. Either extreme is not in the best interests of the rest of the population.

I would never wish to remove the human element from sentencing, but more stringent guidelines for specific crimes instead of the open-ended and informal structure now in existence would be a step in the right direction.

One of the procedures that has done a great deal to ease the burden of overloaded court dockets and overworked prosecutors has been the practice of plea-bargaining. Through this practice, defendants may plead guilty, usually to lesser charges than the ones for which they are indicted, thereby avoiding a costly and timely trial and expediting the legal process.

We all know, however, that there are instances when plea-bargaining is abused, cases in which it works to the advantage of career criminals who have the best legal counsel money can buy.

This should not be the case. Plea-bargaining can be and is an essential tool in our legal system—but the judiciary and legal profession must use it wisely in order to make sure it is not abused.

Another area which needs careful scrutiny is our penal system. Great strides have already been made in Texas in regard to upgrading our prisons, but further advances can and must be made. There must be closer coordination between the legal profession, penologists and public officials in order to make sure that our prisons are curbing the growth of crime, not perpetuating it.

If the steady growth of crime in this country is to be halted, it must be met head-on by a legal system and citizenry determined not to leave a legacy of fear to future generations.

For many criminals these days, crime does pay. Working together, we can, and must, reverse that trend.

Eat Less For Dieting

Everyone needs proteins, carbohydrates, fats, vitamins and minerals in the daily diet. Without them, the body can't function efficiently and health may be endangered.

A pamphlet of the American Medical Association points out that the secret to a successful reducing diet is not a dramatic shake-up in your eating habits—it's just a little bit less of everything.

Of course, if you want to lose weight, there are some extravagances you can't afford, like whipped cream-topped chocolate double-dip sundaes. Discretion and common sense is the better part of dieting.

You're more likely to stick to your diet if you balance and vary the menus. Select foods from the four broad categories of (1) the milk group—milk, cheese, and ice cream (2) the meat group—beef, veal, lamb, pork, poultry, eggs and fish (3) the vegetable-fruit group—fruit and vegetables rich in Vitamins A and C (4) the bread-cereal group—whole grain, enriched or restored.

Special low calorie foods can be helpful. They will give a bit more food with fewer calories. Exercise is of value while dieting because it tones up your muscles and tissues and helps burn your stored calories. You can exercise in a reducing salon, at the Y or at home. Beware, however, of over exertion.

Crash diets usually are not recommended. You can and probably will lose weight, but you won't get all the nutrients you need to stay healthy. And you certainly cannot stay on a bizarre crash diet the rest of your life. When you resume normal eating patterns, the fat creeps back. An adjustment of the regular lifestyle of eating is the only effective weight control program in the long run.

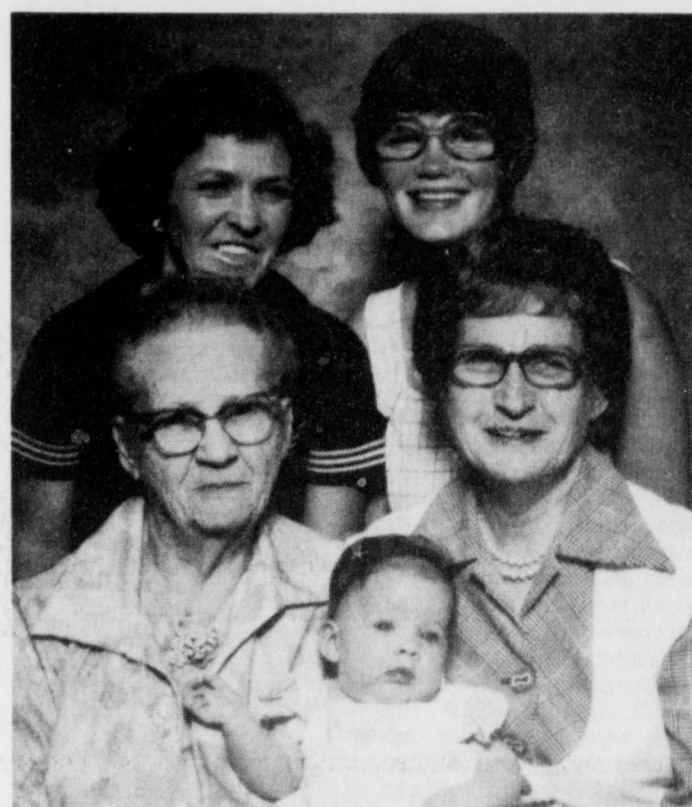

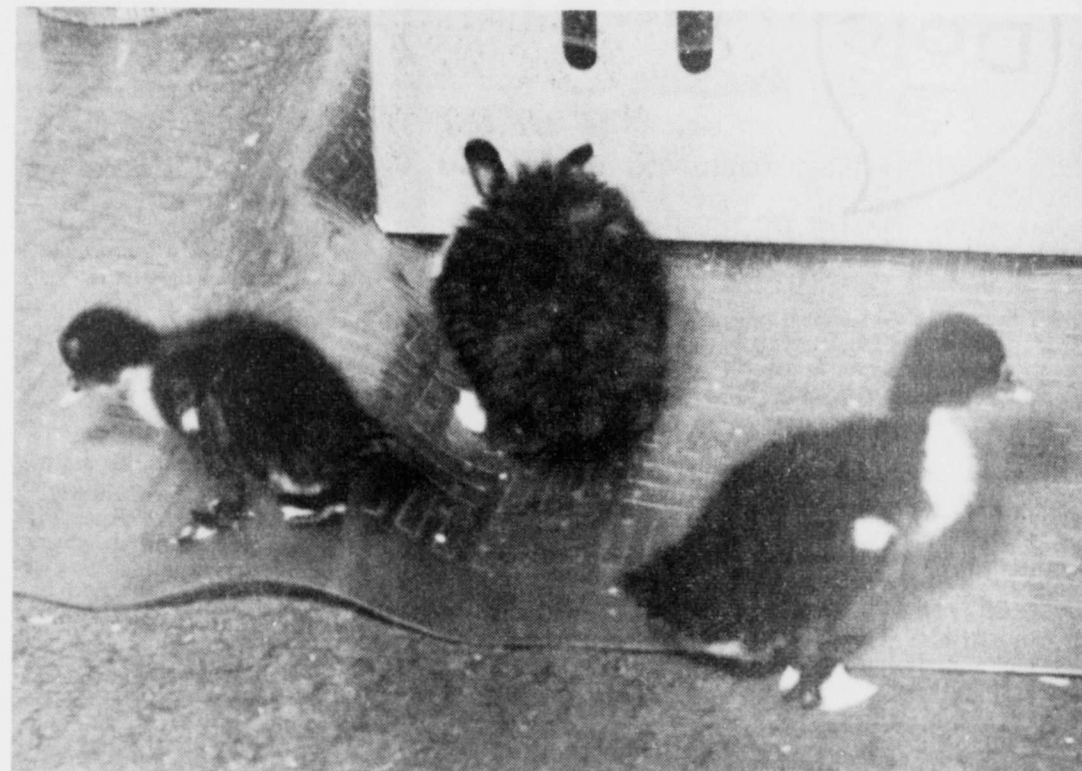

Chinch Bugs Are A Lawn Problem

Lawns should be checked for Chinch Bugs. Chinch bugs were found in damaging numbers in several laws checked this past week.

Chinch bugs normally cause damage from spring until frost, but may remain active during mild winters. Adult chinch bugs are about one-fifth to one-sixth inch long with a black body and white wings folded over the back. Immature chinch bugs may range in color from yellow to red with a light colored band across the abdomen. Seven to eight weeks are required to complete the life cycle.

Damaged areas in the lawn first appears as yellow or brown discolored patches of grass. This discoloration is caused by the insects sucking the sap from the host plants. Damaged areas increase in size as the insect population increases. Chinch bug infestation can be accurately diagnosed only if the insects are found and identified.

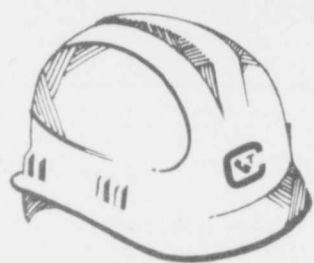
One method of determining the infestation is by using a large coffee can with both ends removed. Press on end of the can about two or three inches into the soil at the edge of the yellowing grass. Keep the can filled with water about five minutes. If chinch bugs are present, they will float to the surface. This procedure should be repeated at several locations in the lawn.

Best control is obtained when the entire lawn is treated. Suggested insecticides for chinch bug control in lawn include Aspon, Carbophenothion, Diazinon or Ethion. Manufacturer's directions should be followed.

Granular materials, often preferred by home owners, can be applied with a cyclone-type fertilizer spreader. Following application of granular materials, water the lawn for about one hour to wash the granules into the matted turf.

STATE GOVERNMENT NEWS

By Brady Fisher

As is often the case when major issues are considered by the Texas Legislature, it appears that a good deal of compromise will be necessary before lawmakers arrive at the final product of this special called session on taxes.

As of this writing, two weeks into the session, the House of Representatives has passed only one major bill, which abolishes the State sales tax on utilities and increases the

inheritance tax exemption. The Senate has also passed these measures, as well as a constitutional amendment and an accompanying bill allowing assessment of school district property taxes on agricultural and timber land on the basis of productivity.

The measures providing for assessment of school taxes on the basis of agricultural productivity sparked lively debate in the Senate. An amendment by Senator Lloyd Doggett of Austin, which would

have limited the tax break to smaller farms and ranches and would have prohibited its extension to large corporations and timber companies, was defeated by only one vote. Doggett contended that extending the tax break to large corporations and timber companies provided help where it was not needed, and would jeopardize the chances that the measures would pass the House and be approved by the voters. After the narrow defeat of the Doggett amendment, the Senate went on to pass the measures by wide margins. They will now go to the House for consideration.

Texasans for equitable taxation, a non-profit Statewide coalition of property taxpayers, have outlined their priorities for the special session of the Legislature.

TET emphasized its opposition to the proposal to require a two-thirds vote of each House of the Legislature for approval of any new State tax or increase in existing State taxes.

TET's reasons for opposing this measure are two-fold:

1) Limits on state taxation will likely encourage increases in local property taxes. In recent years, the Legislature has developed a tendency to mandate local programs without providing adequate funding. For example, the 1975 school finance bill required increases in spending of \$1 billion, but provided only \$600 million in new State funds. TET believes that capping State taxes would encourage this trend. Instead, they would require that the State fund programs that it mandates.

2) The two-thirds requirement would discourage Texas from taxing resources which leave the State—either by the use of a refinery tax or an off-shore first-user tax, such as Louisiana adopted last month, or by a tax on currently un-

taxed resources, such as uranium. By contrast, Texas would continue paying from 10 to 30 percent in add-on taxes for coal to Montana, Pennsylvania and other states.

On the other hand, TET came out strongly for three other measures which would reduce the load on taxpayers: 1) taxing agricultural land on the basis of productivity; 2) abolishing the State property tax; and 3) increasing the State inheritance tax exemption to \$200,000.

Food Stamp Participants To Work For Stamps

Assistant Secretary Carol Tucker Foreman today announced publication by the U.S. Department of Agriculture of proposed regulations for 14 pilot projects in which food stamp participants will work off their food stamp benefits.

Foreman said that the Department is also publishing a Notice of Intent soliciting applications from political subdivisions to conduct the projects in their local areas. The projects, known as workfare, are mandated by the Food Stamp Act of 1977 and will be administered under the joint authority of USDA and the Department of Labor.

The Food Stamp Act specifies that the projects should be conducted in one urban and one rural area in each of the seven administrative regions of USDA's Food and Nutrition Service. Cities, counties, states or other political subdivisions may apply to USDA to operate the projects.

Under the pilot projects, food stamp recipients who are required to register for employment will also be subject to a requirement to work in the workfare project if their household's monthly food stamp benefits are greater than their household's monthly earned income. Such recipients will be required to perform work, without additional wage compensation, in return for their food stamp benefits. The food stamps themselves, will be considered the compensation for the work.

The number of hours a recipient will be required to work will depend on the size of his or her household's food stamp benefits. Each hour worked will earn the recipient an amount of food stamps equal to the hourly rate for the federal minimum wage.

workfare requirements will result in suspension from the food stamp program. Under the proposed rules, each time that a recipient fails to fulfill workfare requirements, the recipient will be removed from the program for one month.

Congress determined last year that the 14 pilot projects should be conducted so that workfare in the food stamp program could be thoroughly studied.

Workfare projects now exist in some areas in general assistance or general relief programs. Food stamp workfare will operate on similar principles to these projects but will differ in that compensation will be paid in food stamps rather than cash. Also, most food stamp recipients will be

working fewer hours (usually less than half-time) because food stamp benefits are generally lower than general assistance benefits.

The proposed regulations appeared in the Federal Register on July 12.

Public comments should be sent to Nancy Snyder, Acting Deputy Administrator for Family Nutrition Programs, Food and Nutrition Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250. These should be received by August 12. Proposals to sponsor the project should be received no later than 30 days following publication of final regulations for the workfare project. The workfare sites selected will be published in the Federal Register subsequently.

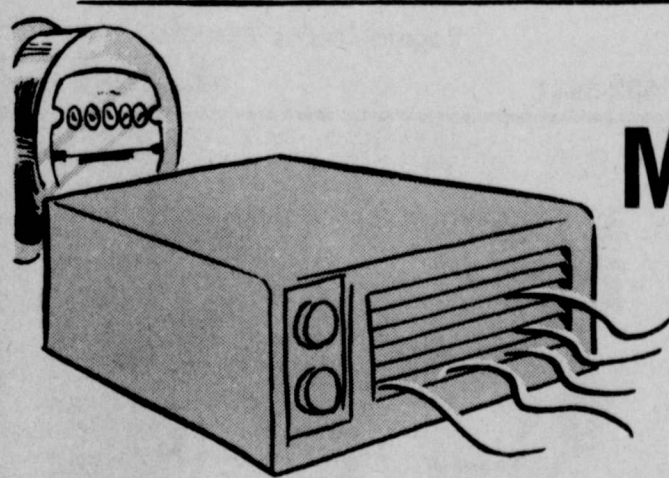
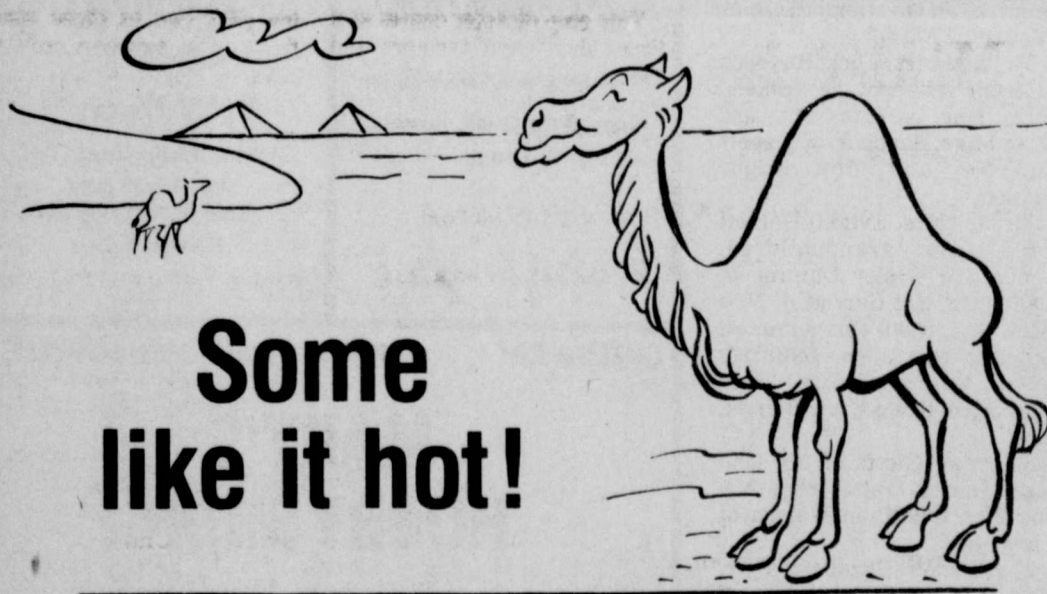

Milo Damage Heavy

Field after field of milo in Lamar County will never see a combine this season. The reason for this situation is dry weather. Producers from all areas of the county estimate from one third to one half of the crop is lost. Yields on the remainder of the crop will be drastically reduced.

This crop disaster comes at a time when most farmers and ranchers cannot stand further losses. Most producers borrowed all of the money that was available to put this year's

crop in the ground. The outlook certainly doesn't look very promising.

A complete crop failure in milo and soybeans would result in a five million dollar loss to the agricultural sector of the county and an even greater loss to the business community.

Unless rain is received within the next two to three weeks, this year's soybean crop will also be lost. In fact, many producers are contemplating cutting the crop for hay where there is ample stalk.

After completing the program, students receive graduation certificates and are eligible to take the state board examination and become licensed vocational nursing.

Since the program began at PJC, twelve classes have graduated, and graduates are employed throughout Texas and Oklahoma.

Bilingual Education Policy Outlined In Regional Workshops

A new state bilingual education policy designed to make special language programs available to all Texas public school students with limited English speaking ability will be outlined for school district officials in a series of 20 regional workshops to be held July 20 through July 28.

The one-day sessions, designed to help district board members, superintendents, and other key administrators implement the updated policy, will be presented at the state's 20 regional education service centers by the Texas Education Agency.

The expanded bilingual policy, adopted by the State Board of Education on June 10, requires school districts to provide special language programs for all children identified as limited English speaking.

Bilingual education programs will be required for children with limited English speaking ability in kindergarten through fifth grade. In addition, English language development programs must be provided for a minimum of one period each day for limited English speaking ability students in grades six through 12.

The new policy extends requirements outlined in the Bilingual Education Law passed by the Texas Legislature in 1975. This earlier measure required the dual language instruction through the third grade in schools with 20 or more children in a single grade who had a limited knowledge of English. The law also authorized school districts to offer bilingual programs in the fourth and fifth grades, providing state support and textbooks for the optional as well as the required programs.

Financial Aid

Available At PJC

Prospective students of Paris Junior College should apply immediately for financial aid in the fall semester if they have not applied, explains Jerry deBin, director of admissions services at the college.

"Anyone needing assistance in meeting educational costs should apply and determine eligibility for one of the many types of financial aid available in the forms of loans, grants and jobs," deBin said. About 40 percent of the PJC student body receives some type of financial assistance, but deBin estimates that many students who are eligible fail to apply.

Applicants for financial aid may be obtained in the Financial Aid Office of the PJC Administration Building during college hours Monday through Friday. Area students may obtain financial aid applications from the three area centers in Mount Pleasant, Sulphur Springs and Honey Grove.

A student applying for aid completes the needs analysis form to determine whether he is eligible, the amount for which he is eligible, and the type of assistance he will receive, deBin explained. Approximately \$500,000 in student financial aid is given at PJC annually.
