Esteban Alvarez, 75

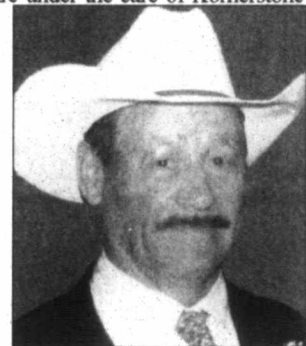

Leo "Bill" Sublett, 85, died August 30, 2010, in Pampa.

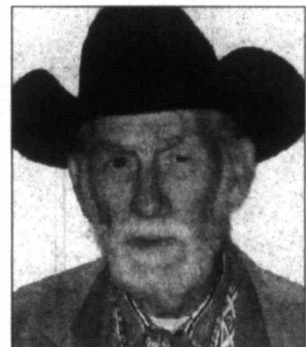
At Mr. Sublett's request, there are no services scheduled. Cremation and arrangements are under the direction of Carmichael-Whitley Funeral Directors.

Private Burial, Plainview Memorial Park Cemetery, Plainview. Robert Weldon Trice, known as "Birdog" to most and Coach Trice to others, passed peacefully on August 29, after a lengthy illness. He was born December 4, 1922, in Childress, to Delia and Max Trice and married Evelyn Ogden Roach in 1951.

Weldon had many accomplishments during his several careers. He served in the U.S. Army Air Corp from September 1942 - January 1946 when he received his Honorable Discharge. After receiving his B.S. degree from West Texas State University in 1950, he took his first coaching and teaching position in Lefors High School and then moved to Pampa High School to continue his coaching and teaching from 1951 - 1960. During this time, he completed his Masters of Education in 1954 at WTSU. He served as the Pampa High athletic director from 1960 - 1965 and assistant principal from 1966 - 1968.

While a student at WTSU, Weldon organized and played on the first golf team in 1950 and was co-captain of the football team in 1949. From 1969 to 1980, Weldon returned to WTAMU as dean of men. He loved WTSU since he was a student and football player at WT. He enjoyed working with the students and maintained close relationships with many of them. Upon retirement at WT, he was hired by the Canyon Chamber of Commerce to be the interim executive vice president. After his tenure with the Chamber, he served as a coach at Canyon Junior High School in 1981 and then as the principal at Rex Reeves Elementary from 1982 - 1986. At Rex Reeves he made many lasting relationships both young and old.

Weldon's love for WT is marked with many accomplishments including the creation of the Herdsman and serving as the first sponsor and reestablishment of the live buffalo mascot named Thunder. He initiated the campaign to establish a fund raising committee for renovation of the Buffalo Courts. He started many activities in student life that are still in place today. Students that were touched by his leadership established a scholarship fund in his honor called the "Weldon Trice Ring Award" presented to an outstanding male resident's hall student. He served as chair of the homecoming committee from 1969 to 1980 and worked with athletics to bring back the "T" club for graduates. He received the WTSU Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1989-90 and was named to the WT department of athletics' Hall of Champions in 1993.

Service to West Texas State University and the people of Canyon was very important to Weldon. He served two terms on the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors and was president twice. He was also named Citizen of the Year in 1995. The American Heart Association was a cause that he supported for 35 years serving at both the local and state levels. He served on the Hospital Board for the High Plains Baptist Hospital Executive Committee beginning in 1984. He was a member of the Lion's Club from 1969 - 1986 and served as president and was a member of the Pampa Masonic Lodge #1381 and Canyon Masonic Lodge # 730.

Weldon was an active member of the Canyon First Baptist Church and served as a deacon for over 20 years. He and his wife were directors of the young married adults department for many years. He was a Gideon and regularly distributed Bibles.

He was preceded in death by his parents; two brothers, Milton and Jack Trice; and sister, Bea Roberts; his first wife, Marietta Miller Trice; a son, Terry Trice; and a granddaughter, Constance Pearl Hutcherson.

White calls for term limit

AUSTIN (AP) — Democratic gubernatorial candidate Bill White said Tuesday that Texas needs to limit the governorship to two four-year terms.

White is trying to unseat Republican Gov. Rick Perry, who's seeking an unprecedented third full four-year term in the Nov. 2 election.

White, the former Houston mayor, said in a statement there should be a voter referendum on term limits. His spokeswoman said he favors a proposed constitutional amendment that would have to be approved by voters.

Texas does not limit the number of times its governor can run for re-election.

"Texas needs term limits to avoid excessive centralization of power in Austin and the use of power by special interests to entrench a governor in office," White said. He said Perry's use of appointees as a "fundraising machine" demonstrates a need for term limits.

Dress donations hit \$30,000

AUSTIN (AP) — Yes, those legions of "Gone With the Wind" fans really do care.

The University of Texas Harry Ransom Center says it has met its \$30,000 fundraising goal to pay for restoring five of Scarlett O'Hara's gowns from the multiple Oscar-winning Civil War drama.

Ransom Center officials announced Tuesday that contributions came from more than 600 people in 44 states and 13 countries.

Actress Vivien Leigh wore the costumes in the 1939 film, including O'Hara's green curtain dress.

The Ransom Center is planning an exhibit to mark the movie's 75th anniversary in 2014. Once restored, the dress may be put on loan to museums.

Wood County worker dies

QUITMAN (AP) — A tree trimming accident has killed a 31-year-old Wood County worker.

The Wood County Sheriff's Office identified the victim as Matthew Don Crowell, who had worked for the county since January 2008.

The sheriff's department says Crowell late Monday morning became trapped between two large limbs, while cutting a tree from the county road right of way.

Crowell was transported to a hospital in Quitman, where he was pronounced dead.

An autopsy has been ordered. The preliminary cause of death was ruled blunt force trauma.

Quitman is 80 miles east of Dallas.

Mexico captures 'The Barbie'

MEXICO CITY (AP) — A Texas-born fugitive known as "the Barbie" who allegedly led a violent smuggling network grinned as he was paraded in handcuffs before reporters on Tuesday — the third suspected drug lord to fall in Mexico in the past 10 months in a coup for President Felipe Calderon's war on cartels.

Edgar Valdez Villarreal, who got his improbable nickname from his fair complexion, is wanted in the United States for allegedly smuggling tons of cocaine. In Mexico, he is blamed for a brutal turf war that has included bodies hung from bridges, decapitations and shootouts as he and a rival fought for control of the divided Beltran Leyva cartel.

As he was displayed to reporters on Tuesday, he still wore the green polo shirt in which he was captured the day before. He grinned often as police described a high-flying and violent life.

Security forces had been closing in on Valdez for over a year, the biggest breakthrough being the death of his boss, Arturo Beltran Leyva, in a December shootout with marines, Federal Police Commissioner Facundo Rosas said.

Ike dike reopening

TEXAS CITY (AP) — The Hurricane Ike-battered dike in Texas City will reopen Sept. 11.

Officials say repairs are being completed for the dike to reopen two days before the second anniversary of the hurricane.

Boat ramps, fishing piers and bait camps lined the 5-mile-long dike before Ike stormed ashore. The pier was built to protect the Texas City ship channel, but became one of the busiest fishing and boating spots on the Texas coast.

Mayor Matt Doyle says a \$5 fee per vehicle will be charged on weekends through October and then resume next Memorial Day weekend, running through Labor Day 2011. Admission also will be charged on the Fourth of July.

Texas City residents can use the dike at no cost, if they have a city-provided sticker.

No video in 'Fight Club' trial

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) — Cell phone video of residents fighting at a state facility for the mentally disabled in Corpus Christi will not be allowed in the trial of the man who allegedly shot it.

The *Corpus Christi Caller-Times* reports an appeals court has affirmed a judge's decision to ban the video in the trial of now-former employee Timothy Dixon. Prosecutors planned to meet Tuesday to review the ruling.

Someone gave the cell phone to an off-duty police officer in early 2009. The video was used in the conviction of four other now-former workers.

Dixon is charged with four counts of injury to a disabled person.

Dixon attorney Ira Miller argued the man who found the phone admitted he did not intend to return it. Miller says that amounted to theft and cited law that evidence obtained illegally cannot be used.

Note in blood ends with charge

PLYMOUTH, England — A man has been jailed for harassment after sending a letter written in blood in a bizarre dispute over land.

Plymouth magistrates heard that 39-year-old Mark Chambers sent the letter to a family in the St Dominick area of South East Cornwall, and appeared at their isolated home the same day, making threats.

Sandra Washington, prosecuting, said: "It included a map, over-written in what appeared to be blood. It stated 'tittle note' and 'this is my property'."

The court heard the letter, sent by recorded delivery, also included a photograph of the defendant, and some obscenities.

Chambers, of Ford Park Road, Mutley, Plymouth, was convicted of harassment and criminal damage at Liskeard Magistrates Court on August 23.

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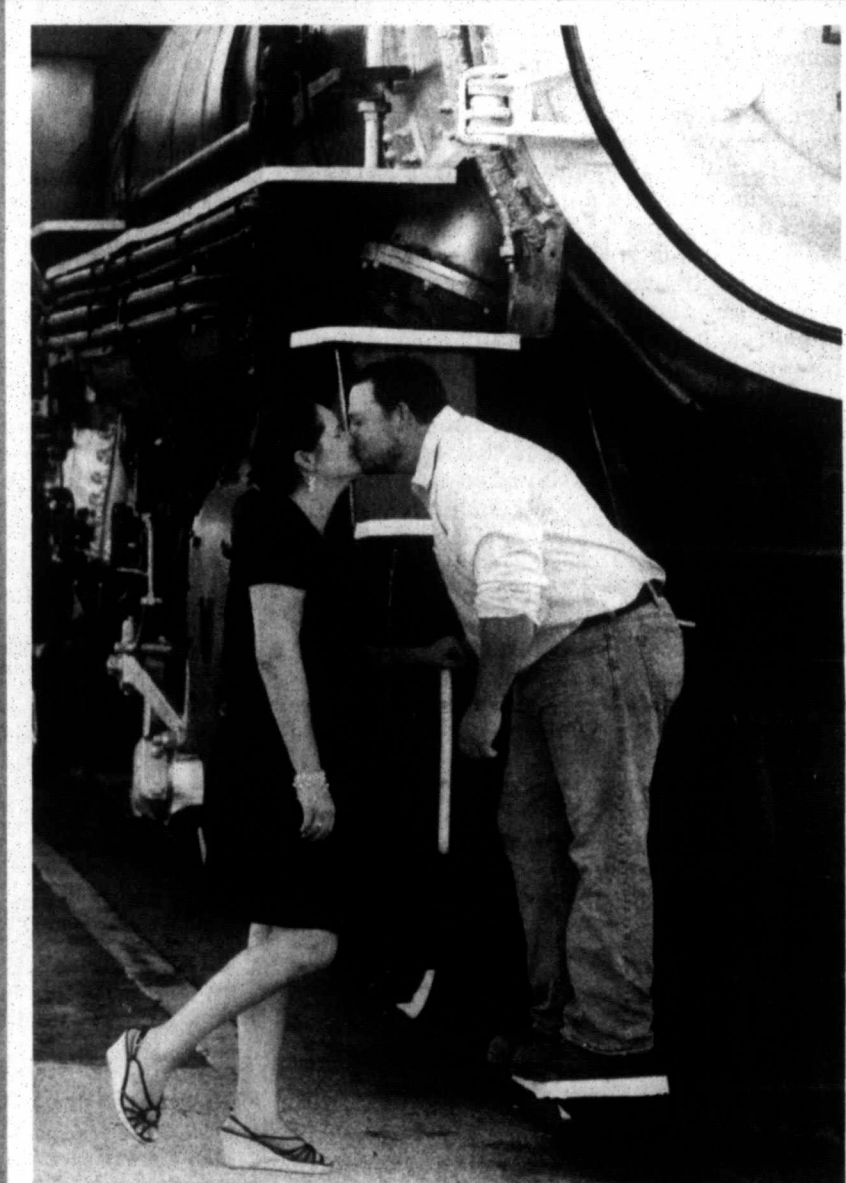

Today in History

Today is Tuesday, Aug. 31, the 243rd day of 2010. There are 122 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:
On Aug. 31, 1980, Poland's Solidarity labor movement was born with an agreement signed in Gdansk that ended a 17-day-old strike.

On this date:
In 1888, Mary Ann Nichols, the apparent first victim of "Jack the Ripper," was found slain in London's East End.

In 1954, Hurricane Carol hit the northeastern Atlantic states; Connecticut, Rhode Island and part of Massachusetts bore the brunt of the storm, which resulted in nearly 70 deaths.

In 1985, Richard Ramirez, later convicted of California's "Night Stalker" killings, was captured by residents of an East Los Angeles neighborhood.

In 1988, 14 people were killed when a Delta Boeing 727 crashed during takeoff from Dallas-Fort Worth Airport.

Ten years ago: President Bill Clinton vetoed a bill that would have gradually repealed inheritance taxes, saying it would have benefited the wealthiest Americans while threatening the nation's financial well-being.

Five years ago: New Orleans Mayor Ray Nagin said there was "a significant number of dead bodies in the water" following Hurricane Katrina; Nagin ordered virtually the entire police force to abandon search-and-rescue efforts and instead stop increasingly hostile thieves. President George W. Bush, who viewed the devastation from Air Force One, pledged to do "all in our power" to save lives and provide sustenance but cautioned that recovery of the Gulf Coast would take years.

One year ago: Extremely dangerous and strengthening Hurricane Jimena roared toward Mexico's resort-studded Baja California Peninsula. Walt Disney Co. announced it was acquiring comic book giant Marvel Entertainment for \$4 billion.

Bush had it right about Islam post-9/11

Just days after the Twin Towers were destroyed in 2001, President George W. Bush set the tone that ought to govern U.S. attitudes in the New York mosque controversy today.

While visiting the Islamic Center of Washington, he declared that "the face of terror is not the true faith of Islam. ... Islam is peace. These terrorists don't represent peace. They represent evil and war."

He went on to say that American Muslims "need to be treated with respect. In our anger and emotion, our fellow Americans must treat each other with respect."

Why Bush won't speak up now on behalf of the Muslim community center at the center of the New York controversy, I don't know.

But what he said then — even as he was launching a war against the Taliban and al-Qaida — ought to guide attitudes and policy today.

Our war is with radical Islamists who use terror and preach violent jihad — not with the religion of Islam.

It seems a distinction so simple and obvious that everyone ought to get it — especially someone as smart as former speaker (and apparent presidential aspirant) Newt Gingrich, R-Ga.

"Nazis don't have the right to put up a sign next to the Holocaust Museum in Washington," he said, and "we would never accept the Japanese putting up a site next to Pearl Harbor. There is no reason for us to accept a mosque next to the World Trade Center."

For all his erudition, Dr. Gingrich (Ph.D., Tulane University) does have a tendency to pop off demagogically when the opportunity arises — as in calling Supreme Court nominee (now Justice) Sonia Sotomayor a Latina "racist," a remark he later withdrew.

In a lecture at the American Enterprise Institute, Gingrich himself said, "I believe it is very important to draw a distinction between radical jihadists, which I define as those who want to impose Shariah (strict Islamic law), and those Muslims who seek to practice their religion within a framework of the modern world."

There is little evidence that the

imam sponsoring the 13-story center two blocks from Ground Zero. Feisal Abdul Rauf, is a radical or jihadist, or that locating the mosque there is — as Gingrich charged — "an act of triumphalism."

In his book, "What's Right With Islam Is What's Right With America," Rauf specifically declared that "killing innocent people is always wrong — and no argument or excuse, no matter how deeply believed, can ever make it right."

Rauf has been judged by both the Bush and Obama administrations to be a voice of moderate, nonviolent Islam and has been sent on State Department missions overseas.

Critics seeking to make Rauf out to be a radical cite his 2001 remark on CBS' "60 Minutes" that "United States policies were an accessory to the crime that happened" and that "in the most direct sense, Osama bin Laden is made in the USA."

But lots of U.S. conservatives, too, think that the U.S. erred in supporting Islamists battling the Soviet Union in Afghanistan and then leaving the country to be taken over by the Taliban and al-Qaida.

And if Rauf opposes U.S. policies in the Middle East — especially our support for Israel — that's a political matter Americans strongly disagree with (as do I), but it does not make him an extremist.

Gingrich and other opponents cite the name of the project — Cordoba Initiative — as evidence that Rauf wants to foster worldwide Muslim supremacy such as what once existed in Spain.

But Rauf's website declares that "the name Cordoba was chosen carefully to reflect a period of time during which Islam played a monumental role in the enrichment of human civilization and knowledge."

"A thousand years ago Muslims, Jews and Christians co-existed and created a prosperous center of intellectual, spiritual, cultural and com-

mercial life in Cordoba, Spain."

The Rev. Franklin Graham, son of famed evangelist Billy Graham, declares Islam to be "a religion of war" because Muslims once conquered much of Europe.

It's fair to remember, however, that the same year — 1492 — that Christians reconquered Spain, they expelled the entire Jewish population of the country, too. Muslims have no monopoly on violence.

Not all opponents of the Ground Zero mosque are motivated by anti-Islamic prejudice, to be sure. But relatives of 9/11 victims who object still are confusing Islam with terrorism.

They'd like the mosque to move somewhere else — but how far away from Ground Zero is acceptable? If two blocks is too close, would four be better?

Logically, if the mosque is meant as an exercise in "triumphalism," it ought not be allowed in New York City at all.

The fact is that New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg had it exactly right when he said, "Let us not forget that Muslims were among those murdered on 9/11 and that our Muslim neighbors grieved with us as New Yorkers and Americans."

"We would betray our values — and play into our enemies' hands — if we were to treat Muslims differently than anyone else. In fact, to cave in to popular sentiment would be to hand a victory to the terrorists — and we should not stand for that."

And President Barack Obama had it right (the first time) when he said that America's bedrock dedication to religious freedom "includes the right to build a place of worship and a community center on private property in Lower Manhattan."

It's a shame that Republican howls caused him to backtrack on the statement. And it's a shame so many Republicans have forgotten the distinction between Islam and extremism so clearly delineated by Bush.

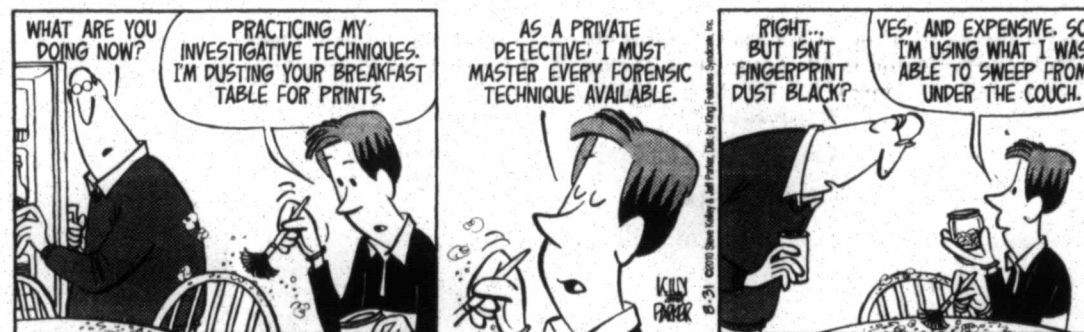

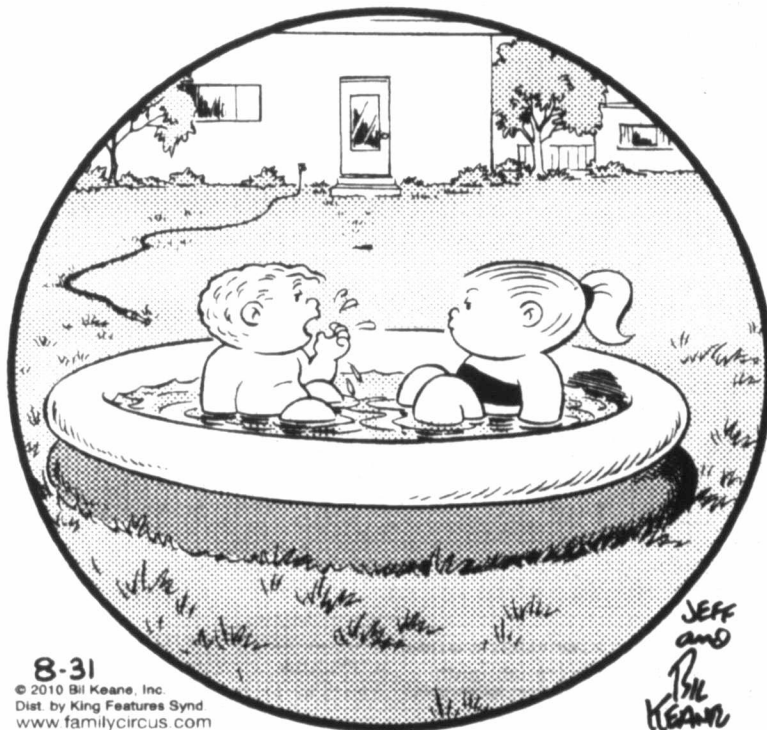

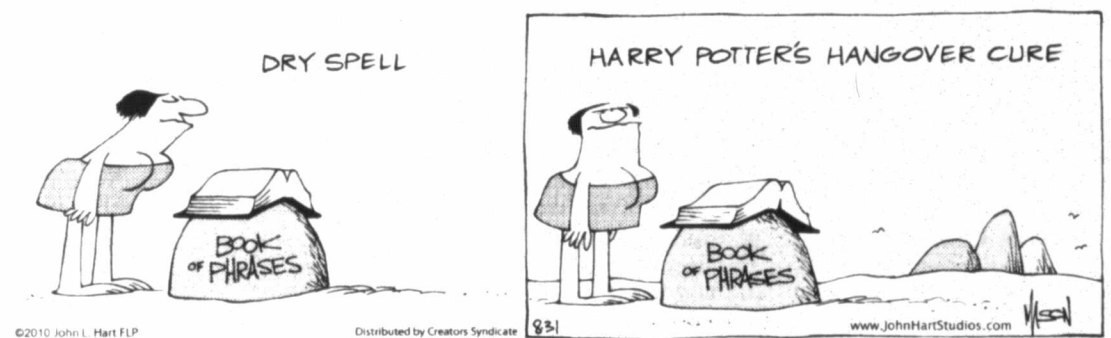

Cowboys undecided on using starters amidst preseason woes

IRVING (AP) — Wade Phillips has watched the tape and wonders what all the fuss is about.

He realizes the Dallas Cowboys aren't scoring touchdowns because of problems running, throwing or both. And the defense he coordinates was quite unimpressive in the latest game, a loss at Houston.

But Phillips maintained Monday that things aren't as bad as they seem. He acknowledged "some mistakes on just our base stuff and that bothered me," yet insisted the bigger obstacle for Dallas is that opponents are digging deeper into their playbooks than he's willing to do for games that don't count.

"I thought the last two games we pretty much had the short stick by what we did offensively and defensively," he said. "When they put four and five (receivers) out there and you don't come after them, they've got a big advantage."

Phillips said that during the Houston game, he told coaches he realized there were certain plays they should be running at certain

times — he just didn't want to until the regular season.

"That's what we believe in," he said, "and I still believe in that."


He also believes players need to show a certain proficiency to build confidence for the opener, which is why he's considering using his starters in the final preseason game Thursday night, at home against Miami. He threw that out as a possibility after the Houston game and said Monday it is still up for debate.

Phillips hasn't used starters in the finale his three previous seasons with Dallas. So even considering it indicates at least some displeasure in how the preseason has gone.

"We didn't play (the Texans) like we were ready for the regular season," Phillips said. "That doesn't mean we won't be ready in two weeks."

Phillips further downplayed the importance of preseason results by noting the Colts are usually terrible in the preseason and terrific in the regular season.
