AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—Still standing,

COURT ROOM, AUSTIN, Feb.
5. (AP)—The jury in the John W.
Brady murder case retired at
11:15 p. m. tonight, eliminating
the chance of a verdict if any
ever is reached, before tomorrow

deliberated around the clock with
no verdict.

At 4:55 P. M. it had been 24 hours
since the jury received its case.
Twice today the jurors went out
to Judge J. D. Moore they were
"hopelessly deadlocked." He in-
structed them to keep on working.

Crowds Gather
All during the day their pantomime
could be seen clearly from the
street, where the curious gathered
to stare. There had been much
vehement debate in their gestures
this morning but as the afternoon
waxed there was little sign of activity.

The lawyers and the principals
who stayed around a while this
morning gave up hope of any decision
for the time being and left
the court house.

Brady With Wife
Mrs. Brady spent most of the day
in jail with her husband. Her
husband, who killed Miss Leila High-
smith, 28, and pleaded insanity.

Removed To Jail

Raid On Infirmary By Gang
Feared By Officers At
Fort Worth; Oglesby Is
Suffering Of Wounds

(By The Associated Press)
FORT WORTH, Feb. 5. (AP)—Fear
that a nationally notorious gang
would attempt to rescue Cole Oglesby,
alias Albert Oglesby, wanted on a
murder charge in Abilene, prompted
his removal today from Fort
Joseph's infirmary, where he was
being treated for a bullet wound
inflicted by a Fort Worth policeman,
to the hospital ward of the
Tarrant county jail.

Whether Oglesby will live or not
was in doubt. Police Chief Henry
Lee and Chief of Detectives T. W.
Jackson decided to remove him
rather than chance a raid on the
infirmary by a gang.

Shot By Officers
Oglesby was shot Monday after-
noon by Policeman Bobby R. Ken-
ney, who also arrested Joe Newton
who admitted serving three years
for his part in the daring \$3,000,000
mail train robbery at Roundout,
Tex., June 12, 1924.

Lying on a cot in the hospital
ward of the jail, Oglesby this af-
ternoon mumbled answers to ques-
tions about his trouble between law-
men and cons.

Denies Guilt
Although very sick, Oglesby re-
fused to be held for Taylor county
officers on a charge of murder. He
denied his guilt in connection with
the murder and said he never lived
in Taylor county. He said he had
known Newton, his companion in
agony here, all his life.

EXTORTION CHARGED
Former Oklahoma Official
Faces Complaint

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Feb. 5.
(AP)—Evidence collected by the
attorney general in the prosecution of
alleged participants in a gigantic liquor
conspiracy in Pottawatomie county
resulted late today in the issuance
of a complaint charging W. Oscar
Gordon, former assistant attorney
general of Oklahoma, with extor-
sion.

Gordon was convicted in Fort Worth
of misuse of the mails in oil
schemes. The government charged
he obtained \$23,000 through sale of
worthless oil stocks. In addition to
the sentence, he was fined \$12,000.

Expect Thousand Today

On Subject Of 'Exercise'Chicago's Gunmen
Boost Death Toll
Of Week To Seven

Mad Symphony Of Killers
Plays On With Staccato
Deadly Notes; Two Are
Hovering Near Death

(By The Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—The mad sym-
phony of gunmen played on today
with deadly staccato notes.
One man was wounded, another died
of yesterday's wounds. Score for one
week: seven dead, two hovering on
the brink of death.

Names Assassins
William Healy, seventh target of
gunmen in the week's terror, died in
a hospital after naming his assassins—
three racketeers. He quarreled
with them in a beer flat early yes-
terday, he said. Two of them shot
him.

Officials and police adopted ex-
traordinary patrol measures. The
state's attorney ordered his assis-
tants to obtain indictments for gun-
toting against any gangsters who
could be picked up. Chief Municipal
Court Justice Olson urged insanity
proceedings to isolate racketeers and
gunmen for life.

**Recommend Parole
For Dr. F. A. Cook**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5. (AP)—Once
again will Frederick A. Cook be a
free man. If the recommendation
of the federal parole board today
that he be released from prison
March 5, is approved by Attorney
General Mitchell.

Through his own claim the one
time explorer years ago was widely
credited with having discovered the
North Pole. He is about 65 years
old, and the proposed parole would
be granted the day he becomes eli-
gible.

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**Record Shattered
By Second Annual
Event In Lubbock**

H. J. Bower, Director Of
Affair, Voices Apprecia-
tion For Cooperation In
Successful Course

Plans for Future
"Cow Testing By Mail" Is

OFFICIALS last night stated that
attendance figures at the second
annual Texas Tech Farmers'
and Homemakers' short course easily
totaled 2400 for the three days,
far exceeding all former predictions,
and shattering last year's attendance
mark by almost 1,500.

In a closing statement yesterday
afternoon at the final session, H. J.
Bower, director of the short course,
expressed his appreciation for the
wonderful attendance and made a
strong plea for an even greater in-
terest for the coming year.

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Just a faithful few have made
this occasion possible for all the
farmers of the Panhandle and
Plains," said Mr. Bower, "they have
worked unceasingly and given both
of their time and money. Next year
we want a committee composed of
every man and woman who at-
tended this year to advertise the
short course, tell their neighbors
just what we have here to offer.
We need your help if we are to
grow."

The first subject of the afternoon

**Believe Head Torn
From Body By Dogs**

Death From Natural Causes
Is Verdict After Finding
Of Decapitated Body In
Hill County

(By The Associated Press)
WACO, Feb. 5.—Belief that Frank
Veska, 48-year-old farmer, had
died from natural causes and that
dogs had torn the head from his
body, was expressed tonight by offi-
cers who investigated the finding of
his body early today back of a barn
on his farm near Abbott, Hill
county.

Death from natural causes was
the verdict of J. C. Clark, justice of
the peace at Abbott, who held the
inquest. Dr. J. W. Gidney, surgeon
of West, who performed the autopsy,
declared he could find no marks in-
dicating foul play, and could make
no recommendations changing the
coroner's opinion. They believed the
man had been dead several days.

Robbery motive for his death was
eliminated when Krenk said he
found \$488 on the body. A part of
the head was found 50 yards from
the body.

Short Course Put
On Despite Empty
Treasury At Tech

Success Of Affair Due To
Individuals, Farm Groups,
C.-C., And County Agents
Says H. J. Bower

In spite of an empty exchequer,
Texas Technological college today
marked up the achievement of a
Farmers and Home Makers Short
Course which saw a total attendance
of 2,400 men and women, boys and
girls; an event which should go
down in history as comparable to
the school's remarkable enrollment
record, of from nothing to 2,270
students in five years.

Such is the declaration of H. J.
Bower, general chairman of the
short course and professor of agronomy
in the Texas Tech school of
agriculture.

"The wonderful attendance," con-
tinues Mr. Bower, "I attribute mostly
to the splendid publicity given by
the newspapers of West Texas. But,
to the organization of our program,
the footing of expenses—not a penny
came from the college purse, for the
simple reason there were no pennies
in the treasury, nor available, for
such a purpose.

Farmers Get Praise
"Individual farmers, farmer or-
ganizations, the Lubbock chamber
of commerce, county agents, ex-
tension workers and other individ-
uals, dug down into their pockets
to pay every bill."

Prof. Bower states that every

TO SELL WARRANTS

Chicago School Head Would
Avert Financial Crisis

CHICAGO, Feb. 5. (AP)—Just as it
appeared that Chicago's improv-
vised government would have to
turn to the Citizens' Rescue Com-
mittee to bring the community out
of its financial mire, H. Wallace
Caldwell, president of the school
board, left on a hurried trip to New
York, bent on selling \$54,000,000 of
tax warrants to eastern capitalists.

Caldwell already had a representa-
tive in New York negotiating for
the sale and had said he would not
go east unless assured it would not
be a futile trip. His hurried depar-
ture, therefore, was taken as an in-
dication that he would make a deal.

Ortiz Rubio Shot In Jaw Only
Few Hours After Inauguration
By Youthful Would-Be AssassinProsperity Seen
In Inauguration
Of Pascual Rubio

Fifty Thousand Spectators
See New President Of
Mexico Take Oath Of Of-
fice In National Stadium

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO CITY, Feb. 5.—The
second civilian in the recent
history of Mexico to take over the
government, Pascual Ortiz Rubio,
today was inaugurated president
amid most favorable prospects
for the republic's peace and pros-
perity in a simple, brief ceremony
in the national stadium crowded
with at least 50,000 spectators.

As many more were massed out-
side listening to the new president's
inaugural address which came to
them through loud speakers.

Delivers Speech
President Ortiz Rubio, who took
the oath at 12:25 p. m., delivered
the brief inaugural speech in which
he pledged his government to ad-
here to the principles of the revolu-
tionary party and above all to la-
bor for the betterment of the
working class.

A hot sun beating down into the
stadium bowl made the tempera-
ture uncomfortably warm for the
great masses of spectators who
stood with bare heads for fifteen
minutes while a dozen bands ren-
dered the national anthem before
the new president and his prede-
cessor, provisional president Portes
Gil, entered the stadium. A presi-
dential salute of 21 guns boomed
through the valley adding to the
din of the ceremonies.

Taft Recuperates
As Hoover Visits

Former President Surprises
Physicians By Staving
Off Death; Little Hope
Offered For Recovery

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—Display-
ing recuperative powers which sur-
prise even his doctors, William How-
ard Taft, dangerously ill at his
home here, was able today to re-
ceive his friend, President Hoover.

The chief executive and the bro-
ken man who once held the presi-
dency and only a few days ago re-
linquished the office of chief justice
of the United States, were together
only a few minutes. There was a
lingering handicap as they parted.

Mr. Taft, for whose ultimate re-
covery physicians have little hope,
was sitting up and cheerful when the
president called. Mr. Hoover took
his hand and greeted him with a
smile and an expression of grati-
fication that he was feeling better.

The former president smiled and
freely expressed his pleasure at the
visit, the first time the two had had
since before Mr. Taft entered a
hospital here early last month for
treatment.

Accompanied only by Mrs. Hoover
and secret service men, Mr. Hoover
drove to the Taft home on Wyoming
avenue late in the afternoon. He re-
mained for about a quarter of an
hour.

Accident Victim
Reported Better

Condition of J. W. Wiggins, de-
liveryman for the Avalanche-Journal
publications, who was injured
yesterday morning in an automobile
accident, last night was decidedly
improved, according to reports from
the Lubbock sanitarium.

Wiggins sustained severe bruises
and slight cuts about the abdomen
yesterday morning about 6:15 o'clock
when the car in which he was rid-
ing collided with a Tech dairy truck
at intersection of Avenue Q and
16th street.

Two others, Hal Yoder, driver of
the truck, and Alpha Wiggins,
driver of the other automobile
were uninjured.

The Wiggins car ran into the
south of the residence of Rev. L. O.
H. Williams, 1902 Avenue Q, after
the collision, and the dairy truck
was forced into the yard.

Naval Conference
Seeks To Abolish
Submarine Power

Right Of Existence To Be
Challenged Tuesday In
Public Plenary Session;
Problems Discussed

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Feb. 5. (AP)—Whipped
into action by the heads of the
American British and French dele-
gations, the naval conference to-
night decided to hold a public plenary
session Tuesday morning, the
first of a wide-spread plot instead
of being an individual attempt by
Miguel Flores. By dusk seven other
persons had been arrested on
orders given by the department
of the interior. Their identity
was not at first revealed.

Three of the other bullets fired
at the presidential automobile found
marks. One grazed the face of Sen-
ora Ortiz Rubio, wife of the presi-
dent; another slightly wounded
Ofelia Ortega, small niece of the
new chief executive, the third
wounded a bystander, whose iden-
tity had not been established early
tonight.

Windshield Shattered
The other missiles shattered the
windshield of the car in which the
president and his immediate party
were riding. His secretary, Fernan-
dez Chazaro, his sister-in-law, Sen-
ora Ortega, whose daughter was
wounded, and the chauffeur were
all cut by flying glass, but none of
them was seriously injured.

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Concern For Taft In Canadian Town

North Shore Village Where Former President Spent Vacation For 30 Years Anxious About Condition

(By Associated Press)
POINT AU PIC, Quebec, Feb. 5. — Probably in no other community is there more sincere concern felt for the health of William Howard Taft, whose serious illness had forced him to resign as chief justice of the United States, than in this little North Shore village on Murray Bay. For 30 years, with the exception of the four years when he was President of the United States, Mr. Taft has been one of the first of the summer colonists to arrive here in the spring and the last to leave in the fall.

In all those years, Mr. Taft, by his kind and constant interest in the lives and thoughts of the habitants, his benevolence and hospitality, has won a group of "subjects" whose loyalty and devotion are undiminished. They number every man, woman and child in the community. When he returned to his summer home atop the point overlooking Murray Bay, after his period in office at the White House, he still was referred to as "The President," and that is the title he has held here ever since. Today all the villagers who had heard that Mr. Taft was seriously ill were expressing fervent hope that "The President" would vanquish whatever ill was besetting him and return to Point Au Pic in spring.

Fear of being buried alive has grown to such an extent in Europe that the society for the Prevention of Premature Death has been organized. It is arousing public interest in Britain in the building of a large mortuary where bodies may be kept until there can be no doubt that death has taken place. It will be conducted along the lines of that in Munich, Germany, where attached to each body is a cord connected with a system of bells which ring at the slightest movement of the body. Attendants are on duty day and night, and if a bell rings they dash for a doctor. The new society has 11 tests of death.

Letter Carriers Plan Convention

LOCKNEY, Feb. 5. (Special). — The South Plains Rural Letter Carriers association composed of rural mail carriers of Hale, Bristow, Floyd and Lubbock counties, will hold their semi-annual convention in Lockney, according to G. N. Shirley, president of the association.

The program as outlined for the convention will be the discussion of ways and means of obtaining a refund of four cents per gallon on gasoline used in the service, now imposed as a State Highway tax and the prevention of proposed extra duty legislation.

Whether Nidaros, Norway, shall retain its new name or return to the ancient one of Trondhjem has caused almost a rebellion by the people of the town. The name was recently changed by a Parliamentary decree. When M. Markus, one of the proposers of the change arrived in the town to take over the office of school director he was met by several hundred irate inhabitants, who prevented a taxi driver's attempt to drive him home while they whistled and cried "Trondhjem." It is now reported that M. Lykke, the former premier, intends to introduce a proposal that the town should again adopt the name of Trondhjem.

House Committee Makes Report On 1931 Supply Bill

Measure Carries Over Five Hundred Million Dollars For Veterans' Bureau; Decrease For Farm Board

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5. (AP)—Carrying \$511,228,000 for the veterans' bureau the 1931 annual supply bill providing \$552,123,173 for 28 independent government offices and agencies was reported today to the house by its appropriations committee.

The total is \$141,687,627 less than the outlay for the current fiscal year. It is \$1,511,825 below the budget estimates.

Reduction Brought About
The reduction was brought about in the appropriation for the federal farm board. The measure did not increase the \$150,000,000 farm loan revolving fund created for the current year. Actually, with this sum omitted, the committee explained, there was an increase of \$9,312,373 over the current year.

In reporting the measure, the committee explained that officials of the farm board were unable at this time to estimate how much of the \$500,000,000 authorized would be required for 1931 farm relief work. However, the board was allowed \$1,700,000 for administrative and cooperative marketing expenses, or \$200,000 less than the budget estimate.

Boost Appropriation.
Outlay for the veterans' bureau represented an increase of \$11,250,000 over the current appropriation.

It is to be taken up largely in compensation to emergency naval and army officers, improving hospital services adding personnel and in settling insurance claims. Veterans' hospitals are allowed \$2,000,000 for construction or \$4,000,000 less than 1930.

The permanent appropriation of \$78,530,000, made automatically, also was included for the veterans' bureau.

President Hoover set an example of economy. The outlay for the executive office was placed at \$422,330, a reduction of \$24,900.

Deficit Reduced.
Having reduced its deficit to \$6,000,000 compared with \$11,000,000 for last year, the shipping board was allowed \$6,346,000, a reduction of \$5,148,000 and the lowest amount requested since it began functioning. However, unspecified sums of \$300,000 for research and experiments and \$800,000 for coal carrying ships to aid the coal export business were reapportioned.

The federal post commission was given \$455,500, an increase of \$25,000 over its current year and \$15,000 more than the budget estimate. Broadening of the powers of the growing difficulty of controlling radio facilities.

SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 5. (AP)—The accusing finger of J. P. Murphy, prohibition agent, pointed to Altha Harbaugh as the "decoy woman" who stopped Charles Stevens, prohibition agent on the Pleasanton road a few minutes before he was ambushed last September, when testimony opened in the woman's trial for murder here today.

Murphy and R. H. Hirsch, another agent, were with Stevens when he was killed.

Murphy testified the federal officers were returning from a raid in Atascosa county. A short distance from San Antonio, they found the road blocked by another car. A woman stood beside the parked car, Murphy testified, and when the officers stopped the woman flashed a light in their faces. She then waved the light over her head, the state contends, as a signal to the ambushers who were farther down the road.

On questions from District Attorney Lamar Seelinson, Murphy pointed to the defendant as the woman who blocked the road and flashed the light.

Five Lectures For Women Hold Interest On Final Day Of Short Course

Mrs. Charles W. Sewell Addresses Group On "Rural Social Life"; Is Concluding Talk Of Series At Tech

Miss Louise Baird Speaks, Using As Subject, "Uses For Cottage Cheese In The Home"

The history of the social life of a people is almost as old as the history of the people themselves, said Mrs. Charles W. Sewell, director of the home community department, American Farm Bureau Federation, Chicago, in addressing a group of women in the home economics building at Texas Technological college Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, on the subject, "Rural Social Life."

This lecture was the last talk addressed to women delegates to the Farmers and Homemakers Short Course which convened Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

"Man is by nature a gregarious animal and even our earliest pioneers were interested in the outside world although their contacts were limited. The school teacher and the circuit minister the agent—all were heartily welcomed and shared alike in the hospitality of the early settlers."

"This social instinct is preserved by many of us today. The social life should begin in the home. It would be a fine idea if you have been hospitable in the past to be a little more so in the future and if you haven't given it much thought heretofore to make a resolution to be hospitable from now on."

Of unusual charm

The speaker, who is a woman of rare charm, made her audience laugh several times with the witticisms which were interspersed with her serious thoughts.

A reference was made to "Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch" and her philosophy of living with her children and making them happy.

"Every member of the family ought to feel free to bring his friends or acquaintances home with him. Many an undesirable acquaintance has been broken up after the light of the home has shone upon them," said the speaker.

Continuing she said, "We should give more thought to homemaking and less to housekeeping. Social life begins at the table where the family gather three times a day. Use the best manners at all times, develop the art of pleasant and interesting conversation at the table and also account of the fact that it is a good place to train children to form good habits and also to develop the ability to relate interesting topics in an interesting manner."

Mrs. Sewell said that much should be made of anniversaries and birthdays. This will mean a great deal to the children she pointed out and form ties which are never forgotten.

Social Life In Home

"Two other means of developing social life within the home are the use of music in the form of singing and playing musical instruments and the practice of reading aloud."

"Enter into the community life by getting into touch with your neighbors and develop a social interest that can be compared to your agricultural interest," said Mrs. Sewell and in closing paid a tribute to the farm women and advised them to "live well, love much and laugh often."

Miss Baird Speaks
At 2:30 o'clock Miss Louise Baird, county home demonstration agent, lectured on "The Uses of Cottage Cheese in the Home" in room 108 and Miss Jean Dorrell repeated a demonstration on "Good and Bad in Home Decoration" in room 104.

Miss Baird compared food value of cottage cheese with other foods and made three dishes using cottage cheese which she prepared at the lecture. An illustrated lecture was given on posture and correct eating habits.

At 4:30 o'clock an informal reception was held in the home management house with men and women attendants at the short course as guests.

One hundred women were present at the women's program Wednesday.

"CHILD Management Problems" were discussed by Miss Bonnie K. Dysart Wednesday morning in an address made before women members of the Farmers and Homemakers' short course. Miss Dysart is associate professor of education at Texas Technological college.

"There are four habits which introduce behavior in a child," said the educator. "These are previous environment, the thing responsible to this misconduct, his mental ability and his physical condition. One of the chief responsibilities of a parent is to break down bad habits and build up good ones. You can not start too early to build up good habits in a child."

Miss Dysart said that the first three years determine the child's disposition and his independence and physical habits such as eating and sleeping.

"The problems of the average child may be divided into willfulness, disobedience and childish habits," declared Miss Dysart. "If your baby does not show stubborn traits he is not normal. In a study made of 300 children, it was discovered that the

peak of willfulness is reached at two years and passes off at five years. The youngster is trying to establish his own personality and is torn between a conflict between his wishes and those of his parents; he lacks adequate language to express himself; is timid and imitates older persons."

Understanding Important.

The speaker said that a treatment of understanding and sympathy with respect for the baby's personality will go a long way towards a remedy for the situation and a redirection of his activities is necessary.

"Let him learn from the cradle the first great law—that of obedience," she said.

An illustrated lecture on "The Selection of Ready Made Clothing" was given at 10:15 o'clock by Mrs. Buster, instructor in clothing.

Becoming Clothes.

"The selection of beautiful and becoming clothing is a challenge to any woman's art ability and sense of fitness," said Mrs. Buster. "She must at all times keep in mind that every detail of her costume must express her personality. Suitable color, styles and accessories must all be in harmony with the person and in harmony with each other. The effect of color texture, design

and finish of the material should receive a great amount of consideration by anyone."

Pamphlets were distributed which showed the difference between clothes which suited a distinct type and those which were unsuited. Mrs. Buster displayed several ready made dresses, explaining the good and bad features of the models.

"Fewer and better clothes" should be the slogan of most women, according to the lecturer, who warned the women against buying cheap clothes in order to have a large wardrobe.

Miss McFarlane Speaks.

Menus were given for "Easy Guest Meals" when Miss Dorothy McFarlane discussed that subject in the kitchen laboratory of the building.

One of the dinner meals was prepared by the lecturer and demonstrated to the audience. It was as follows:

Pigtail, Chambery potatoes, buttered carrots, pickles, whole wheat rolls, butter, Waldorf salad, mayonnaise, snow pudding and soft custard.

Other dinner menus were baked ham, scalloped potatoes, baking powder biscuits, butter, perfection salad, mayonnaise, sponge cake, pineapple, whipped cream, coffee, cream and sugar. A third menu: chicken Maryland style, candied sweet potatoes, buttered peas, cranberry sauce, lettuce salad, French dressing, fruit jello, whipped cream, coffee, cream and sugar.

Four suppers were given with the first consisting of creamed chicken on toast, peach pickles, devils food cake and tea. The second one included cream of corn soup, saltines, stuffed peppers, hot rolls, butter and fruit cookies. The third menu consisted of baked beans, brown bread, orange and grapefruit salad, baked custard and cookies and the fourth menu was made up of scalloped corn and cheese, watermelon pickles, whole wheat bread and butter and lemon cream pie.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5. (AP)—Cincinnati's Reds of the National league today drew on clubs of greater New York for two players, surrendered one, and promised to deliver another later. The transfer of Leo Durocher, flashy fielding shortstop but light hitter, was effected by the Yankees to the Reds for an unannounced sum of money and an unidentified player. The Cincinnati player, however, is not expected to join the Yankees, but will be used to pay an obligation the clubs owe in the Pacific Coast league.

League To Brooklyn

Cincinnati gave Adolfo Luque, veteran Cuban pitcher to Brooklyn in an even trade for Douglas McWeeny, a big pitcher with a world of "stuff," but weak last year in control.

Alert observers along the baseball trail were surprised that Durocher could be waived out of the American league. The Springfield, Mass., boy hit only 264 last season, but he was regarded as the best fielding shortstop in the business. He has played with the Yankees two seasons, but has been the property of the club four years, spending one year at Atlanta and another at St. Paul on option.

He is only 24 years old, but one of baseball's most gifted conventionalists and famed from one end of the diamond to the other in "riding" opposing players.

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Senate Expresses Itself On Prison Action Wednesday

Legislators Vote 15 To 10 To Table Amendment For Rehabilitation Of Present Properties

AUSTIN, Feb. 5. (P)—The senate expressed itself on penitentiary concentration legislation today, when it voted 15 to 10 to table an amendment by Senator A. J. Wirtz of Seguin, providing for rehabilitation of the properties as they exist on present owned state lands.

The amendment was offered to the bill sponsored by Senator Edgar Witt of Waco, compromising of a central, industrialized plant near Austin.

Measure Considered
The house worked on prison legislation, considering the measure by Rep. Harry M. Graves of Georgetown providing rehabilitation of the Huntsville plan for central headquarters, but debate flowed on and the day was spent without a vote.

To get an expression in the house on the matter of a site, Rep. Walter Beck of Fort Worth sent up an amendment to the Graves measure proposing location within "20 miles of Austin" as suggested in the administration bill, but wanted to settle that point, as soon as possible.

Substitute Offered
Rep. Alfred Petch of Fredericksburg put up a substitute to the Beck amendment, proposing location of the central plant "not less than 20 miles nor more than 75 miles of Austin." Petch is behind the Austin site bill, and his proposal to put it as far away as 75 miles was considered by some as a compromise gesture to attract support of some house members, against limiting the site to not more than 200 miles of the capital.

The senate debated an amendment to the Witt bill, providing appropriations of \$350,000 for reclaiming and improving the Harlem, Imperial, Ramsey and Darrington farms below Houston. Senator W. E. Thompson of Nacogdoches offered a substitute providing for an expenditure of \$500,000 for reconditioning the farms.

The senate then considered spending more money on the prison farms after already passing a motion which virtually abandons Huntsville as the seat of prison activities.

Follows Debate

The vote on the amendment of Senator A. J. Wirtz came after 10 days of debate in which the leaders of the opposing factions challenged the other to show cause why the prison should be moved to near Austin or retained at Huntsville. Witt charged there was no plan advanced by Wirtz' group for constructive progress in prison reform, while Wirtz charge this opponents with having failed to act although the senate had given the prison board plenary power to revise the system.

Debate on the question of spending more money on the farms was led by Senator W. N. Martin who characterized the idea as foolish and contrary to common sense. Senator Thompson had just taken the floor to state his position when the session adjourned.

Management Flayed
Senator McFarlane, who occupied the floor throughout the morning session and at the start of the afternoon, made a sweeping charge that bad management had placed the farms in their present condition.

"Joke" Ending In Death Of Two Is Told From Stand

Threats Of Insane Brother Played Part In Slaying Of Prohibition Officer, Woman Defendant Claims

SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 5. (P)—Forced by the threats of an insane brother to participate in a ghastly "joke" ending in death for two men, Mrs. Altha Harbaugh played a leading part in the killing of Captain Charles Stevens, prohibition agent. Sept. 24, she testified today here where she is on trial under a charge of murder of Stevens.

Mrs. Harbaugh was identified as the decoy who stopped the car carrying Stevens at the top of a hill six miles from San Antonio on the Pleasanton road. Stevens was slain at the bottom of the hill by a gang, one of whom was killed in an exchange of shots.

Testimony Interrupted
Her testimony was interrupted with tears which broke through her statements several times when she spoke of her brother, Lynn Stephens also under indictment in the same case but not arrested.

The night of Sept. 24 she had worked in a cafe until 10:15 p. m. when her brother was to take her home, she said. When he did not arrive, her sister took her to her home, where she lived with her brother.

About 10:30 o'clock Lynn Stephens is said to have entered the room and spoke to Mrs. Harbaugh, Mrs. Frasier and his wife, Mrs. Mary Stephens. Stephens wore no clothes, the defendant said, and with him was Joe Rhomer, also under a murder indictment, a man named Thurman and several other men whom Mrs. Harbaugh did not know.

She testified Stephens had been acting very queer for several weeks preceding the shooting. At times, she said, he seemed crazy, and in

August she called Constable Duke Carver who with Police Chief Owen Kilday placed Stephens in a sanitarium for a few days. She called police because her brother had been beating her, she said.

After Stephens had gone through the room with the men, Mrs. Harbaugh said she laid down on a sofa until Mrs. Frasier told her Lynn wanted her to accompany him on a trip.

She said she was forced into an automobile by the half crazy brother, and was speeded through the city. The only explanation was, "I'm going to have some fun. I'm going to play a joke on some one." The car proceeded into the country for several miles and stopped with a jerk which almost threw Mrs. Harbaugh from the car.

Some one came to the car and

Lynn talked in Spanish, she said, and a second car arrived with "Skeet" Horbrecht. It was very dark, she told the jury, and the only persons she could identify were Horbrecht and Joe Rhomer.

Lynn Stephens and Rhomer came to the side of the car, and Lynn told Rhomer to take Mrs. Harbaugh to the top of the hill in a roadster.

"Just stop the first car that comes along over the hill," Lynn told her, she said. "Act like you are drunk and do whatever they tell you to do." The car carrying the federal agents came over the hill. She walked from her car which partially blocked the road. No coherent word was spoken, she testified. She heard no shooting, she said.

R. H. Hirsch, another prohibition

agent took her in her car and proceeded to San Antonio leaving Pat Murphy, the third agent, in the car with Stevens. She was booked at the police station.

TO HOLD HEARING

Proposed Petroleum Duty Will Be Considered

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5. (P)—The house ways and means committee decided late today to hold hearings Saturday on the proposal to place a duty on petroleum and its products.

A delegation of more than 300 independent oil operators gained the consent of Chairman Hawley of the committee and Representative Garner of Texas, the ranking minority member to be heard on the Hastings bill to place a \$1 a barrel tariff on oil.

VALLS CONFIRMED

Nomination Of Attorney At Laredo Okeed By Senate

AUSTIN, Feb. 5. (P)—It required only a few minutes for the senate to confirm the nomination of John A. Valls to be district attorney of Laredo today. While the vote was taken in executive session and it is against the rules for members of the senate to divulge what transpires in closed meetings, the brief period consumed indicated there was no opposition to report of the committee on governor's nominations recommending the veteran prosecutor's confirmation.

Valls was the center of a bitter controversy after the Mexican government had closed its consulate at Laredo for 30 days because, it was claimed, the district attorney had

been unfriendly in his dealings with nationals of that country.

BETTERMENT AIM

DALLAS, Feb. 5. (P)—Betterment of social and financial conditions among Mexican laborers in the United States today was given as the keynote by J. Ontiveros Jordan, local attorney, in an address opening the first annual convention of the union of Mexican laborers in the United States. The convention will be in session until Sunday.

The steam controlled platform elevator, operated on a three-fourths inch steel cable, carried the two men on the fatal descent after a cathead on the crown block at the top of the steel shaft slipped, ripped off the block and tearing the cable from its place.

Nnew His Master Dog Decides His Ownership

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 5. (AP)—Milton D. Gorton, an airplane pilot, Charles Lacy, a foreman for the People's Motor Bus company and Ace, a police dog were in Justice Werremyer's court at Clayton today, Gorton and Lacy claiming ownership of the dog and Ace just looking on.

Gorton said he purchased the dog at Wichita Falls, in 1924. Lacy said the dog had been given to him by a policeman several years ago.

Justice Werremyer was frankly puzzled. Then he decided to have both claimants ask the dog to perform tricks. Among other things Ace did for Gorton was extinguish a lighted cigarette the butt carelessly tossed to the floor, bark loudly when told to do so and merely whimper when told to whisper. Gorton was declared the rightful owner.

GROWING CONVENTION-MINDED

SURPASSING the most optimistic pre-session estimates, attendance at the Texas Tech Farmers' Short Course, which closed here yesterday, proves among other things that the tiller of the soil has taken a tip from his city brother, who is engaged in some other business or profession. In other words, the farmer, like the doctor, lawyer and merchant and chief, is growing convention-minded.

And why shouldn't he? This business of farming, as we all know, is of major importance to the public welfare. Bill Smith, who works 100 acres in Lubbock county and John Jones, who farms "an eighty" in Cochran county, can profit just as much from an exchange of ideas as a Lubbock surgeon and an Amarillo surgeon, who regularly meet in the Panhandle Medical society.

Then, too, there are the experts—men who have given their lives to problems of the agriculturist and the horticulturist, the stockman and the poultryman. Their advice and counsel, given in farmers' meetings, are surely as valuable to Bill Smith and John Jones as the advice of a renowned surgeon, who appears upon the program of the Texas Bar association, is to the average attorney.

The Morning Avalanche sees far more to Tech's annual short course than another avenue of bringing visitors to the city and the college. It sees in the offering a great benefit to the farmers of this territory, which benefit, of course, will react to the advantage of the general citizenship of this territory.

The fact that our farmers are annually growing more convention-minded forms an optimistic background for South Plains agriculture and general prosperity. This newspaper is happy to note the fact.

AVIATION ON TRIAL

When an airplane crashes on a commercial flying field, the first and natural impulse of those in charge is to remove all evidence of the disaster as soon as possible. It is supposed that the visible signs of tragedy are too great a deterrent to business to be allowed to remain in sight of passengers and pilots or curious spectators. It is apparent from reports of the latest air transport accident, in which four men and a woman were killed at Kani-Kani, that this idea is responsible for the hasty destruction of every scrap of evidence which might have thrown light on the causes of the tragedy.

Hasty action of this sort is not only in defiance of the regulations of the department of commerce, it is also essentially shortsighted and of no help to aviation. The accident which cannot be explained is more conducive to distrust and apprehension than those which can be blamed on a specific failure of men or machinery. Though the wreckage of an airplane is hard to read for causes of accident, the effort must be made in accordance with the strict requirements of governmental authority or else an additional cloud of suspicion and uncertainty overhangs the tragedy.

This is an unfortunate feature of the third disastrous accident which has lately befallen air transport. These three crashes, in which more than a score met their death, loom large in the news and are dangerously discouraging to air travel. It requires an effort to consider them in proper perspective, particularly in those sections of the country where air travel is not yet a familiar and regular thing. Department of Commerce figures just published show that scheduled air transport during the first half of 1929 more than double the mileage of the same period in 1928, while the accident rate declined from one fatal accident for 896,922 miles to one in 1,222,371 miles. In the whole field of commercial aviation, the accident rate is even more marked. Mileage flown was quadrupled and the accident rate was cut to a third.

It is apparent from these figures that scheduled air transport makes the least favorable showing. The probable reasons for this condition are that this is a relatively new mode of transport, that it has been afflicted with sundry evils of over-expansion and that the big planes crash badly when they crash. These are vital problems affecting the whole future of aviation, and which may determine the direction of its development. In dealing with them there should be no evasion of the facts or any excess of zeal in destroying or concealing whatever evidence may contribute to solution.

BILL OF RIGHTS SET ASIDE

Have the courts and public officials of the fair state of Iowa never heard of that section of the constitution of the United States commonly referred to as the Bill of Rights? Or perhaps they are not over-zealous constitutionalists, accepting only such parts as meet with their convenience and convictions?

The Bill of Rights guarantees "the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures," and provides that "no warrants shall issue but upon probable cause."

These constitutional guarantees notwithstanding, agents of the state have entered private homes without search warrants and without "probable cause" to search for liquors prohibited by state laws. And to compound the injustice the Iowa supreme court has held these raids to be legal.

Prohibition is not at issue here. The issue is the federal constitution and American liberty. When the highest tribunal of a state condones an undignified violation of the constitution it is a matter for national concern, an assault on the very foundations of American liberty and human justice.

The nation can ill afford to leave this Iowa decision unchallenged. Its review by the United States supreme court is imperative.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—Congressman Edgar Howard, of Nebraska, has a streak of humor in him. A streak at least a foot wide.

Nobody would believe it, from his looks.

Folk in the house of representatives' gallery are fooled by his quips right along, he utters them so lugubriously. It seems impossible for anyone to josh from within his exterior.

The Nebraskan began as a Quaker.

In appearance he still is a caricature of one, though he succeeded from the Friends' society long ago. It was too prim for him.

He wears his hair in a longish bob; flappy-brimmed, somber, black slouch hat of the Pilgrim Fathers' model; an ample-skirted Prince Albert coat, evidently cut by a tailor who must have gone to his reward about the period of Rutherford B. Hayes' administration.

The Cornhusker statesman is pretty old, for another thing. He does not tell exactly how old. He was born before the Civil war, anyway. He admits it. Old enough to have outlived frivolity, one would think, at all events.

His face is seamed and lined; funeral as an undertaker's.

His manner is unctuous; that's the word. He likes to recite poetry of the uplifting sort—but my! he does adapt it to the funniest occasions.

His voice is a deep, pulpit bass. It throbs with solemnity. The heck of it is it throbs most when the Nebraskan is using it to make a jest out of some darn serious matter.

Representative Howard is a country newspaper editor and a cracking good one. Let nobody imagine that this description is meant to be complimentary to him either. It will please him if eccentricity, it simply is because he feels like it. Underneath it all, he is one of the ablest men and most enlightened liberals in congress.

He used to be William Jennings Bryan's private secretary.

Anyhow, when the house representatives Democrats wanted to hand a magnificent lemon to their G. O. P. brethren a few days ago, and hand it to them in the guise of a 24-carat gold nugget, they made no mistake in choosing Representative Howard to deliver the presentation speech.

There was no doubt that the G. O. P.-ites would recognize the lemon.

The trick was to present it to them in such fashion that they would have to feign belief in the genuineness of the donor's good intentions and pretend deep gratification. That was to be the cream of the joke.

Faithful students of events in Washington will recall that President Hoover recently asked the senators and representatives to provide a joint committee to handle all this session's prohibition business in one bunch—and that, while the senators were willing the G. O. P. bosses in the lower house turned Mr. Hoover down cold.

It amounted, in fact, to a mean disagreement between the president and the house's three bosses—Speaker Longworth, Col. Tilson and Congressman Snell.

Of course, however, for party reasons, the three bosses offered the politest kind of explanations for their policy, the president said, "Don't mention it," in the most affable style and everything was supposed to be perfectly lovely.

The Democratic purpose was to puncture this pretense of loveliness.

That was Representative Howard's assignment. He did a workmanlike job—and marvelous in its simplicity.

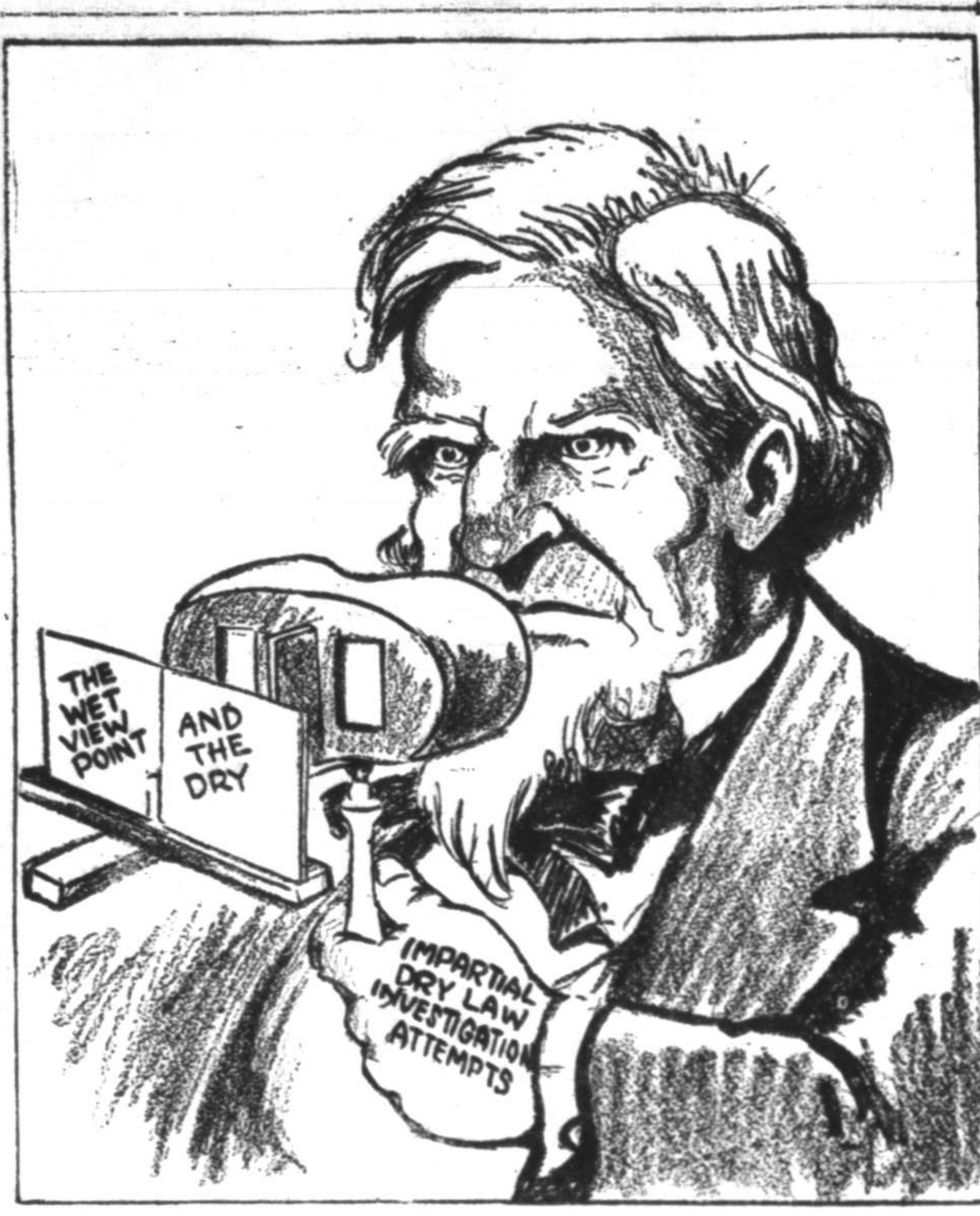

ACTION DECLINED

Solons Silent Of Oklahoma Offer To Buy Land

AUSTIN, Feb. 5. (Special).—The joint legislative committee on the Oklahoma-Texas Panhandle boundary today declined to make a recommendation on the offer of Oklahoma to purchase the land which would become a part of Texas under a survey by a commission of the United States supreme court.

While the committee report, submitted to the legislature, did not make a recommendation on that matter it did urge that in the event the offer was rejected the claimants to the land in the territory affected be allowed to have prior right to purchase for a nominal consideration. This was done to protect the property owners in that area.

FARM WORKERS MEET

Annual Session Under Way In Jackson Wednesday

JACKSON, Miss., Feb. 5. (AP).—The annual meeting of the southern agricultural workers and the conference of the cotton acreage committee of the American Cooperative association opened here today.

Program of the agricultural workers gathering included an address by Dr. Bradford Knapp, president of Alabama Polytechnic Institute at Auburn, Ala., on application of the research plan of industry to agriculture, while members of the cooperative committee took up reduction of cotton acreage.

Carl Williams, member of the federal farm board, followed proceedings with close interest. Another participant was Dr. J. A. Evans, associate chief of cooperative extension work in Washington.

The cotton acreage conference was called by Dr. Tals Butler of Memphis, chairman of the committee.

HEARING REOPENED

Activities Of Importers Under Investigation

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5. (AP).—Activities of importers and others interested in lowering tariff rates were reported to the senate today by its lobby investigating committee.

The report, prepared by Senator Robinson, republican, Indiana, gave first attention to the National Council of American Importers and Traders, incorporated, during 1929.

The report said "The council was quite active and through its personnel and various branches expended large sums both in Washington and New York."

The report added that the council was "particularly successful in its effort to employ men who had been connected with the customs and other branches of government service." A letter sent out by the council soliciting funds to carry on the "lobby activities" was put in the report. Some members were asked for \$100 and others for \$250, the report disclosed.

APPROVE WOOD RESOLUTION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5. (AP).—The Wood resolution to appropriate \$5,386,000 to finance the pilgrimage of Gold Star Mothers to European battle fields and cemeteries, was adopted unanimously today by the house and sent to the senate.

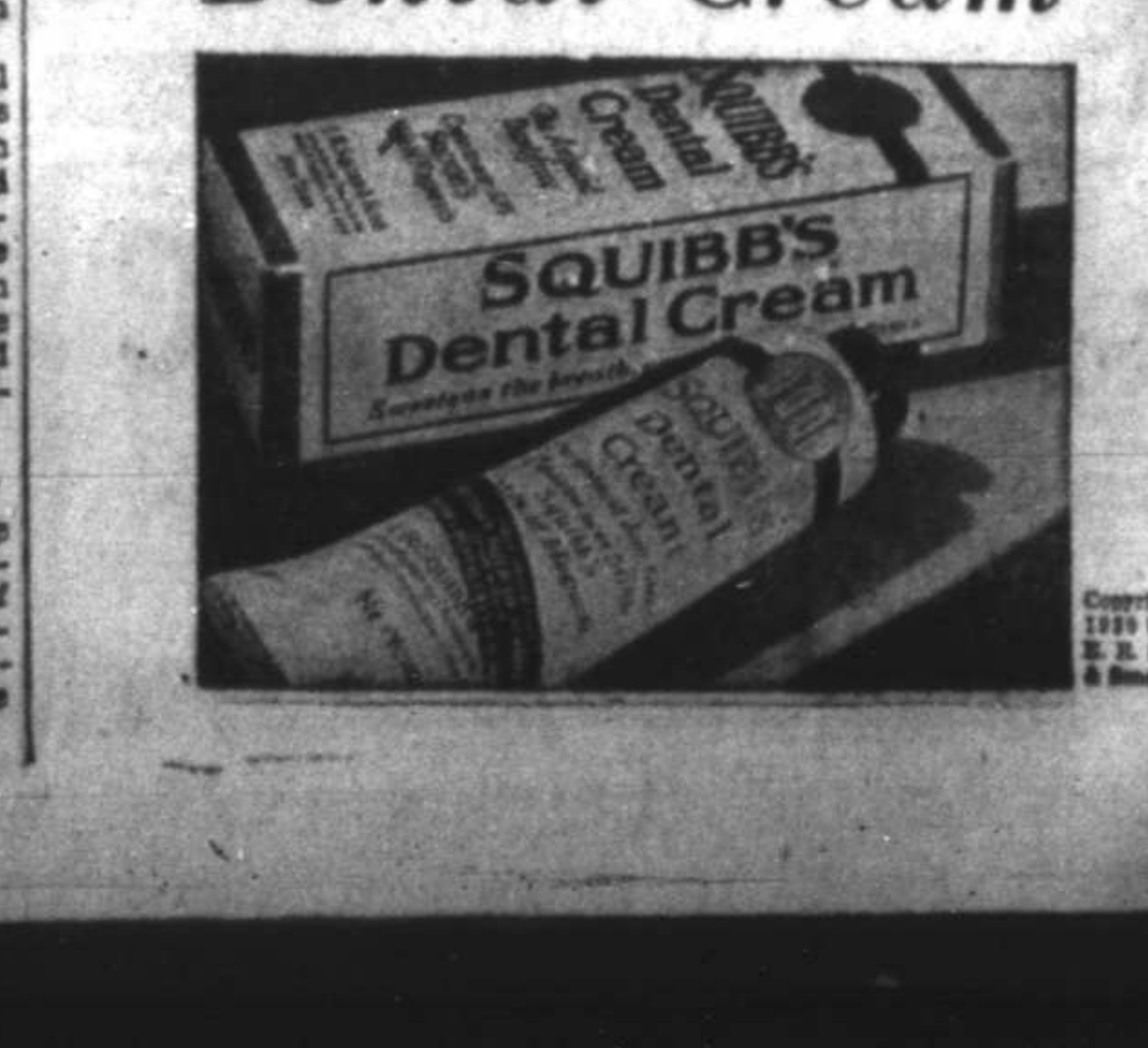

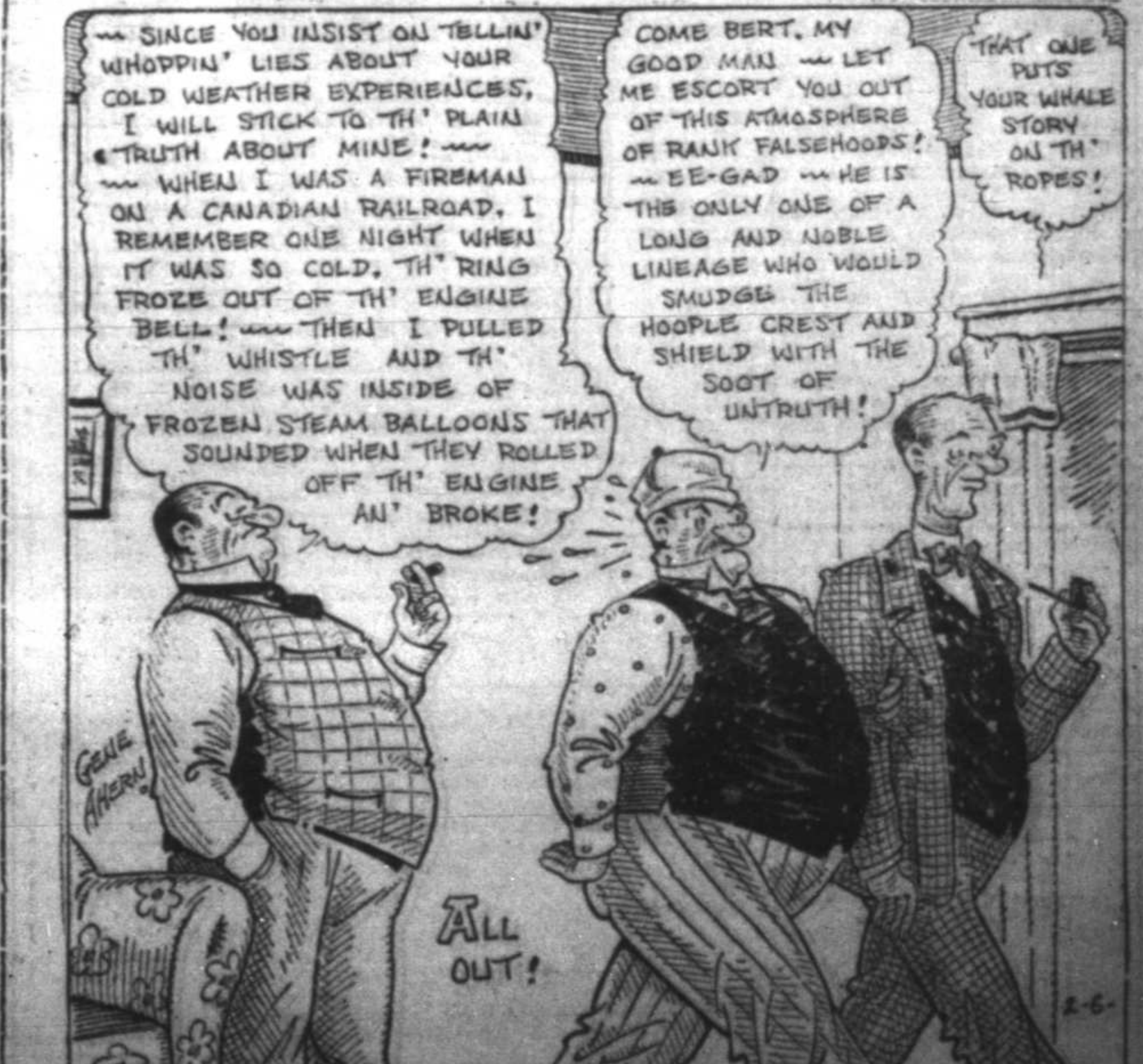

RHINE TROOPS' FUTURE
What is to be done with the 6,000 men that will be returned to Britain from the Rhine when it is evacuated, is being discussed in England.
