Will Renew Efforts to Secure PWA Funds to Build Pease River Dam

NEW PROGRAM BEEN FORMED

Senator Sheppard Advises Prospects for Project Very Encouraging

C. E. Carlock, general superintendent of the Chillicothe Cotton Oil Company, was appointed by Governor James V. Alfred Monday to serve on the newly-created Pease River Valley Flood Control District, as a director for a two-year period.

Others named on the board includes E. R. Brown, Electric, R. H. Nichols, Vernon, M. S. Henry, Crowell, six year terms; Harry Koch, Quannah; Dr. Hines Clark, Crowell, J. H. Allison, Wichita Falls, four year terms; and W. O. Jones, Jr., Paducah; T. Edgar Johnson, Vernon, two year terms.

Set-up of the new board was completed at a meeting held in Vernon Wednesday afternoon at the call of E. R. Brown, Electric, president of the Pease River Valley Development Association.

With the exception of Henry and Johnson, members of the new board were serving on the board of the association, organized in September, 1934.

According to word reaching the secretary's office in Vernon from Senator Morris Sheppard, upon his return to Washington, the proposed project is in line for further consideration by army engineers, with all signs pointing favorably to its approval.

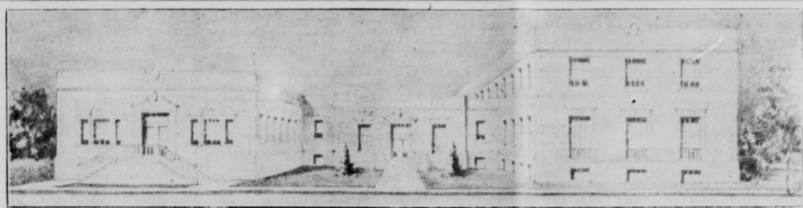
Mercury Slides Down to Forty Degrees

New Hardeman County Hospital At Quannah Is Modern Structure



Hardeman county's new \$80,000 hospital, pictured here in an architect's drawing prepared by Voelcker and Dixon, Inc., of Wichita Falls, will give Quannah one of the most modern and attractive hospitals in Northwest Texas and Southwestern Oklahoma. This brick structure of fire-proof design will replace the Quannah hospital, a wooden building that has served this section for many years. The county hospital is being built at the corner of Fourth and Mercer streets—site of the razed Quannah hospital. Adjoining the hospital to the south is the Quannah clinic, also a brick structure of one story. The new hospital is a federal aid project, listed as public works administration project 6726. Supplementing a \$83,562 bond issue voted by Hardeman county, the government is making an outright gift of \$17,000 toward the cost of the building. The J. L. Hair Construction company of Wichita Falls holds the general contract.

SATURDAY VOTE TO DETERMINE CORN-HOG PLAN

Boxes to Be Located in Chillicothe, Quannah and Medicine Mound

With approximately 35,000 corn hog contracts expiring on November 20 and another marketing year just opening, Texas farmers are preparing to participate in the nation-wide corn-hog referendum which will be held Saturday, October 26, to determine whether they want controlled or uncontrolled production.

Voting boxes will be placed at Chillicothe, Quannah, and Medicine Mound.

According to E. M. Regenbrecht chairman of the State Corn-Hog Review Board, Texas is not a major corn and hog producing state yet Texas corn and hog producers no doubt will have considerable interest in the coming referendum. He pointed out the 35,000 contracts of 1935 brought into the state about \$2,750,000 on corn-hog payments, in addition to other benefits in form of stabilized production and improved prices.

An increase in hog production is desirable both from the standpoint of pork producers and users since hog numbers have not drastically cut as a result of feed shortages brought about by the 1934 drought," he said.

"Violent fluctuations, however, in pork production react against not only the farmer but also live stock handlers, processors, retailers and finally, consumers," he went on to say. "Ten such production cycles occurring since 1899 have created periodic gluts and shortages. These excessive swings in production have been harmful."

BEAUTIFICATION PROGRAM TALKED AT LIONS MEET

Already if local market quotations are an accurate index, sliced bacon, the kind that is used on the table in many a home, has passed 40 cents a pound and is going strong. Other meat prices are proportionately high. There must be a happy medium somewhere one that will give the farmer a just return on his pig feed and his labor and other investment, incidental to raising pork and at the same time not tax the table of the consumer so high that he has to cut down heavily on the amount of food consumed.

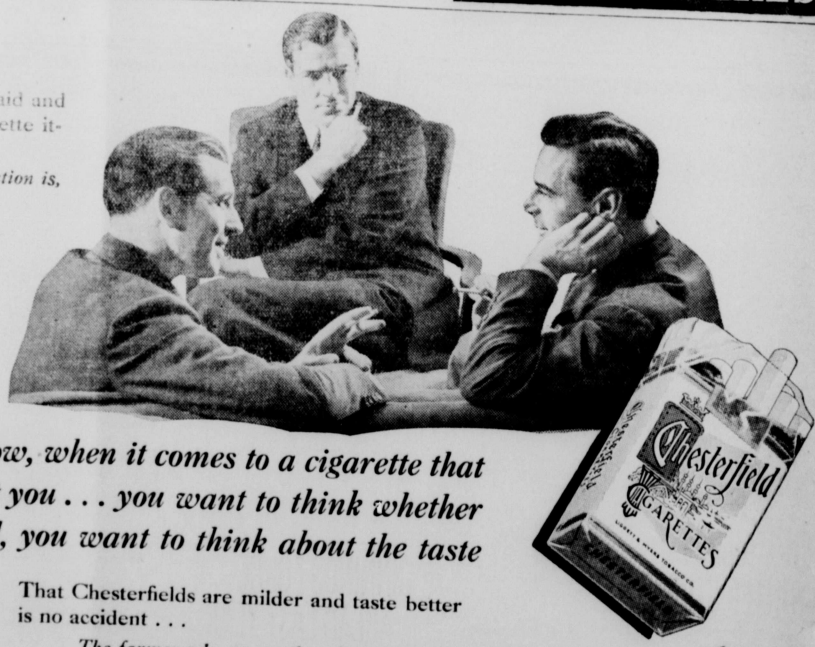

\$246 PER MONTH BEING LOST BY COUNTY PUPILS

HIGH SCHOOL YOUTHS NUMBERING 41 FAILED TO APPLY FOR NYA ASSISTANCE

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 23.—In Hardaman county there are 41 high school students losing \$246 per month through failure to make application for NYA aid allocations. Lyndon B. Johnson, State Director, announced today.

"On September 12, socially desirable part-time jobs paying \$6 per month were offered 8,547 high school students, who are members of families on relief rolls or members of rural resettlement families at a total monthly expenditure of \$51,282. Response to this offer has been retarded, and the National Youth Administration is desirous of filling the quota immediately in order to

give those eligible for student aid the full sum of cash due them," he said.

Students between the ages of 16 and 25, who for lack of financial assistance are unable to attend school, should make application directly to the principal of their school, Johnson said. The principal then submits to the county superintendent a project application in affidavit form asking for his quota of jobs, together with students' applications properly executed. Applications should then be forwarded to the National Youth Administration, Littlefield Building, Austin, Texas.

LAW CREATING FLOOD CONTROL HAS BEEN MADE

May Now Apply for Funds From Public Works Administration

Creation of a Pease river flood control district was assured with the passing of a bill by the Texas Legislature during the first special session, and presented by Senator Ben G. Ornel and Representative George Moffett. The bill was signed by Governor Allred last Thursday.

The law creates a flood control and reclamation district for five counties: Hardaman, Wilbarger, Poard, Cottle and Wichita.

A board of nine directors will be named by the governor. Each county will have at least one member of the directing body. Organization is expected to begin at once. The legislature appropriated \$5,000 for the formulation of the district to carry on the work.

It was found necessary to pass this law before renewing efforts to secure an appropriation from the Public Works Administration, amounting to \$4,803,000 for construction of a proposed dam on Pease river, near Margaret, Poard county.

A mile long dam would be constructed to form a lake covering

several thousand acres. The water would be available for the cities of Quanah, Crowell and Vernon, in addition to providing irrigation for this area.

"American Boys Do Not Respect American Girls"

FOI. WORTH, Oct. 24.—Twenty years ago the late Louis Henry Anderson left Fort Worth for Ecuador to install a modern telephone system at Quito.

This fall his son, Jose Luis Anderson Y Rivadeneira, enrolled as a sophomore in Texas Christian University. He plans to attend school here three years and then enter the diplomatic service of his country.

In his possession is a letter of encouragement from the president of Ecuador and the promise of a consulate when he is prepared.

Jose likes Texas but he admits that he gets homesick for Ecuador. "My home is almost 2000 miles away, you know," he points out.

Jose doesn't like the American custom that makes him drop the surname of his mother from his name. He is afraid his countrymen might interpret it as dis-

respect for his mother.

"The American girls are charming and beautiful," he says, "but the boys do not respect them. For instance, in South America a boy would not dare to shove a girl playfully as I have often seen it done here."

HEALTH TALK

By John W. Brown, M. D.
(State Health Officer)

Beware of patent medicines that make too extravagant claims as to its ability to cure diseases, is the warning issued by the Bureau of Food and Drugs of the State Department of Health. When purchasing such remedies be sure and read the label in order that you may know what you are getting.

During the past year the inspectors of the Department have condemned and destroyed many thousands of packages of patent medicines, totaling more than 39,000 pounds in weight. These drugs were condemned for a variety of reasons, chiefly due to untrue claims as to their value, old, worthless, and in some cases dangerous ingredients.

Some of the claims for remedies destroyed were so impossible that it is wondered that anyone would believe them. One medicine claimed that it would positively cure thirty-seven different diseases, including hookworm in humans and screw worms in stock. Many people do believe these claims as it is estimated that many millions of dollars are spent each year in Texas for drugs that cannot do all that is claimed for them.

One dangerous drug that is being sold for reducing weight is

dinitrophenol. The fact is that many who are using this drug may be endangering their health and even their lives. The human machine is too complex to risk self medication. When something goes wrong with the human body and one does not feel well, he should see his family physician and then follow the advice he gives.

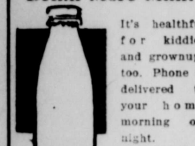

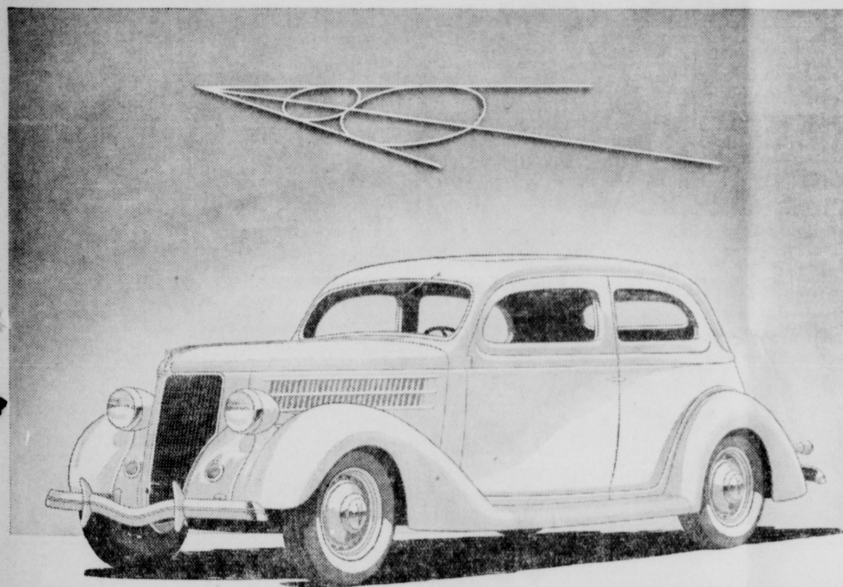

LAW-MAKING BODY CONTINUES WORK

Another Special Session Begun Last Wednesday

Representative George Moffett of this city, who has been at Austin in attendance at the special

session of the legislature, and which closed Tuesday night, a week ago, has been forced to remain there due to Governor Allred's call for another session with the main purpose of considering the old age pensions, and how they will be paid.

In a communication from the Representative Moffett, he says:

"The first thirty-day Special Session of the Legislature closed last night. Governor Allred has called another one to start work

today and has submitted as the only subject for consideration the question of old age pensions and how to pay them, and this matter certainly ought to be attended to."

"I sincerely believe that the Legislature will be able to solve the old age pension matter and raise the money to pay them, much easier than it can solve the liquor question. There was very little disagreement among the wets and the dries in the Legislature concerning the regulation of the sale of wine and beer for there is already a very good beer law on the books which operates fairly well in the counties that desire to sell beer.

"But when it comes to the question of regulating the sale of whiskey there is a certain group in the Legislature that stubbornly and persistently insist on the re-establishment of the open saloon in spite of the fact that the people voted less than two months ago to bar the open saloon in Texas. But those who want to make millions out of the sale of hard liquor care nothing as to how the people voted or anything else that stands in the way of the profit that they expect to make out of selling hard liquor. For this reason it would be best to remove the private profit motive from the sale of hard liquor altogether, and to adopt a State Dispensary Plan for its sale, with the provision that there be one Dispensary in each county voting to have same, with possibly more than one in the larger counties. Under this sort of arrangement there would be no large whatever to sell hard liquor. But there would be a legal way for those to buy it who sincerely wanted to do so. The state would make all of the profit instead of permitting three-fourths of it to go to private parties. This way the state would get money for old age pensions that it needs badly.

Fourteen states have this plan at this time. All of the Canadian states but one have it, as well as two foreign countries. It is my sincere judgment that it is the best way to handle the sale of hard liquor. However, since this matter was not settled by the Special Session of the Legislature just closed, and since it will be up for consideration again, I would sincerely appreciate an expression of opinion from the folks back home as to their attitude in the matter.

Using well developed wood six or eight inches long, Louise Lowe, a 4-H club girl of Glen Paxon in Rusk county has rooted 30 rose cuttings for her yard improvement demonstration. She put them out about a year ago. Planting close together in a small space made the cuttings easy to care for.

Louise Lan, 4-H club girl of Jarrell, in Williamson county, planted 11,934 feet to 21 varieties of vegetables in her work as garden demonstrator. She estimates the value of the produce used fresh and canned for home use to be \$127.32. The expense of the garden was \$11.21.

F. J. Smith, 4-H club boy of Stonewall county, bought two Hereford calves in May weighing 190 and 205 pounds. The calves now weigh 430 and 445 pounds. They were not started on feed until the latter part of August.

Sixty bushels of yellow dent corn is the harvest from one acre of land worked by George Huffman, 4-H club boy of Brannon community in Hopkins county. In the same field his father's harvest ran about 15 bushels less per acre. Young Huffman attributes his success to methods of cultivation.

VALIDITY OF DISCOUNT LAW TO BE TESTED

Hearing to Be Given Soon By State Supreme Court at Austin

Jack Brazil, assessor-collector of Hardenman county, stated this week a mandamus has been filed in the Supreme Court at Austin to test the validity of the discount law on taxes. A hearing is scheduled soon.

Brazil says in fairness to the taxpayers he suggests they take advantage of the discount, should the court hold the law constitutional, and make tenders of payment, less discount, and receipts will be issued for the amount of tax, less discount, if paid immediately after the court's decision.

Should the law be ruled constitutional it will provide a discount of 3 percent if paid in October, 2 percent if paid in November, and 1 percent on taxes paid in December. However, this affects current taxes only. Poll taxes are not included.
