# Greene Accuses NCAA of Racial Discrimination to Start Dallas Meet

## Sanity Code May Meet Its 'Waterloo' at Convention

DALLAS —(P)— Delegates to the National Collegiate Athletic Association convention, headed by President Hugh Willett of Southern California, streamed into Dallas today. A few came to town last night but none of the officials were on hand to comment on the first controversial question to be projected — Negroes in an NCAA meeting in Texas.

Mack M. Greene, director of athletics at Wilberforce State College of Ohio, accused the NCAA of racial discrimination by bringing the convention to Dallas in the first place.

He said in a letter to Kenneth L. Tug Wilson of Chicago, secretary-treasurer of the NCAA who arrives today, that he would not be in Dallas "to subject myself to the social indignities that Texas law declares I deserve because of my ancestry."

Greene declared Willett had previously told him there would be free access to meeting rooms without discrimination but that the discrimination already had come to the fore. He said the convention into an area where the social patterns are openly and pointedly against part of its membership, without giving the adversely affected members an opportunity in open meeting to express their approval or disapproval. He said some Negro members had been told they would have to ride freight elevators while others said they had been advised they would not be welcome at a coaches banquet.

First division of the convention included Dean Stanley Freeman and Athletic Director Bratts Hamilton of the University of California; John Curley, athletic director of Boston College and Walter Byers of Chicago, NCAA publicity director.

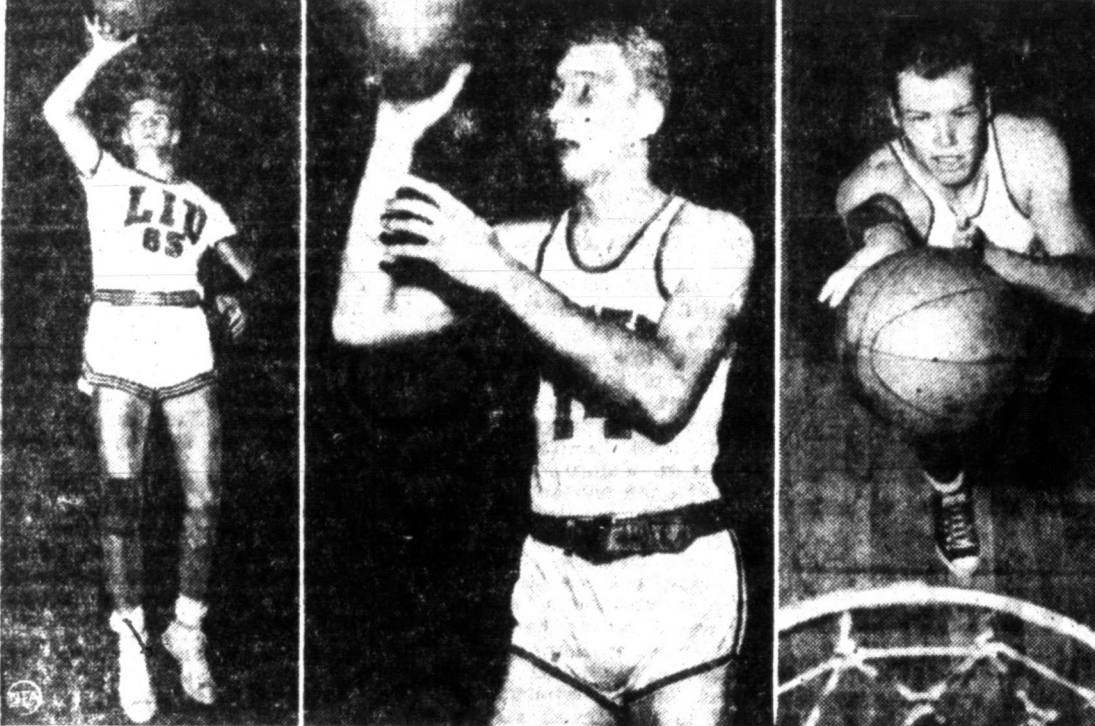

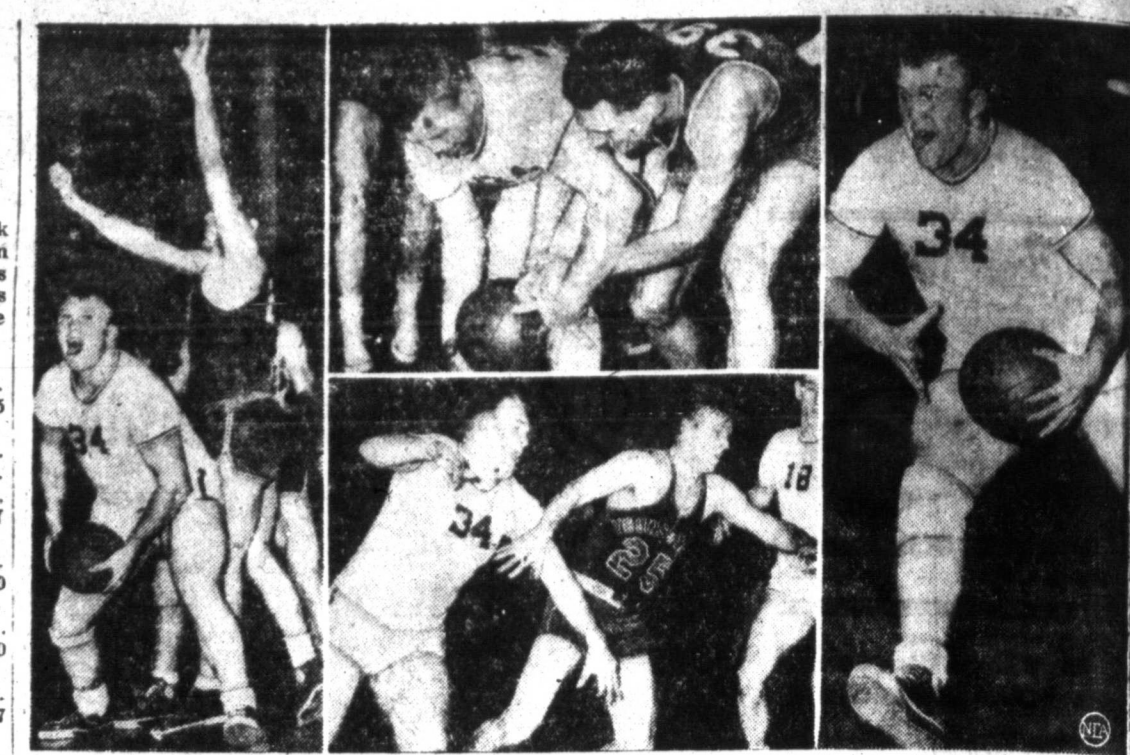

## Safety Rules Cut Accidents

Last year's home accident toll of 30,500 deaths will not be repeated if a few safety precautions are taken in the home, safety officials assert.

Falls, the experts point out, account for the largest number of home mishaps. The majority of them occur in kitchens.

To prevent falls, small ladders or step stools are recommended as standard kitchen equipment. It is makeshift ladders—stacks of books, wobbly tables and chairs—that cause most falls.

Stairways are the scenes of many falls. All stairways should be well lighted, painted in light colors, equipped with sturdy handrails and free of loose boards and nails.

Burns and scalds are common home accidents. There are several measures which can be taken to prevent them.

One way to prevent burns is never to dry clothes hanging at home. And if flammable liquids must be kept in the home, they should be stored in galvanized gasoline or oil cans. These cans may be tightly covered to prevent explosive fumes from escaping.

Electrical appliances which are defective are another leading cause of burns. All such equipment should be kept in good working condition at all times.

Another safe practice is to keep rubbish in fireproof cans. Recommended are galvanized refuse pails. They have close-fitting covers. Rust-resistant, they may be kept outside if desired.

Scalds are most frequently caused by tipping cooking utensils filled with hot liquids. The suggested safety measure is to keep utensil handles facing toward the backs of ranges.

Throughout homes, carpeting should be laid flat and in a way to prevent slipping. Pathways on waxed floors should be covered with non-skid carpets.

### Small, Inefficient Lamps Can Be Made Over Easily



After Before

If you've ever wondered if a small size lamp does an efficient lighting job, just study the before and after photographs above for a minute.

As you can see in the "before" picture on the lower right, a short lamp gives a small, confined circle of light that can only light about one-half of the book or magazine you are reading.

Helping a short lamp grow up to the size recommended by lighting experts for good lighting equipment is a fairly easy job once you know what to do.

First of all, you must give the lamp height. The small hobby-mall base in the "after" picture above was raised with the aid of six-inch wooden base turned out in a basement workshop.

Raise the base enough to bring the shade 15 inches above the desk or table top.

Notice how the small, overly-bright shade was replaced with a larger shade 15 inches in diameter at the bottom. This is important not only for better appearance but for a wider spread of light.

Although you can't see it in the photograph, the lighting unit under the shade was modernized too for better lighting results. The 60-watt bare bulb was replaced with a 150-watt inside frosted bulb and an eight-inch plastic diffusing bowl was added to soften the light.

When remodeling a small lamp for a study desk keep in mind that the new shade should not be too dark in color nor too transparent to light.

## Dining, Living Area Good Combination

There has been a great deal of discussion in recent years about whether or not the builders of new houses should include dining rooms. No longer is there need for discussion. For most of us, the matter has been settled by the high cost of construction. Most areas in a household must not only "double"—but "triple"—in brass and give us the maximum service.

Actually, the dining room vs. dining area contention doesn't add up to much. It is, of course, a little awkward to be readying a table for serving a meal while your guests sit within a spoon's throw. And there's always the problem afterward as to whether it's better to leave a disordered table within view or to disquiet your guests by clearing decks when dessert has disappeared.

Oh, yes, the separate dining room advocates had their points! On the other hand, there are advantages to having a large table surface in a living room. You'll never realize how often it can serve you until you have it there... for games, for sewing, for homework, for family conclaves.

Many homemakers have, of course, solved the problem with a great artistry. Many of the leading stores develop solutions in their model rooms. In one nationally known store here, attractive modern furniture is adroitly arranged against a color scheme that shows every sign of becoming top news in the home furnishing field.

The most outstanding impression at first view is of the colors that are so skillfully combined—olive green, brown, coral and beige. The walls and woodwork are painted a rich and pleasing olive green. The floor is covered with a gray-beige rug.

As for the solid walnut furniture, the simplicity of its modern design and arrangement adapts itself well to small quarters. It has been given a fine finish that is light in tone.

The draperies are of a woven texture, with a modern design of deep coral and olive green on a beige ground. ### Worn Door Panels In Auto Replaced By Leatherwood

Replacing unsightly door linings of an automobile can be a simple operation and the results attractive. Removal of the window frame, the door handle and window crank are readily accomplished. The old backing board may be pried from the door with a screwdriver.

Take a sheet of 1/8 inch Masonite leatherwood, a hardboard with a simulated-leather surface, and on it trace the pattern you need, using the old backing board with a cross-cut saw. Drill out-holes for the door handle and window crank. Edges of the board should be filed round.

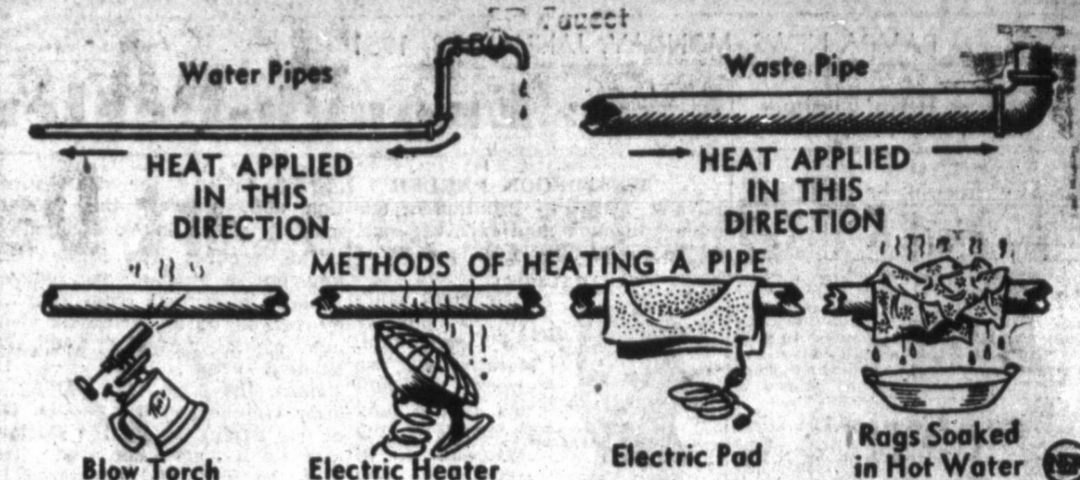

## Pipe Freezing Is Common Misfortune During Winter

Fortunate indeed is the homeowner who never needs to worry about frozen water pipes. However, for those others, any pipes which are exposed to freezing temperatures should be covered, especially if located out of doors or in unheated spaces.

Smaller water pipes are more likely to freeze than larger water or sewer pipes, since the latter carry water that has usually been warmed to some extent, and which flows off quickly, leaving the pipe empty.

For pipes located in an unheated basement, attic, garage, or out of doors where they are likely to freeze, it is well to incase them in rock wool or hair felt, in asbestos pipe covering or in cork.

In severe climates, it is advisable to apply two thicknesses of this insulation and to break or stagger the joints and seams in order to make the insulation tight. If exposed to the weather, insulation should be protected by wrapping it spirally with cotton fabric tape or strips of saturated felt, followed by two coats of asphalt-varnish.

When pipes are laid underground they must be buried deep enough to be protected

from damage by heavy vehicles passing over them and to eliminate the possibility of freezing. In the extreme northern states a depth of 4 to 6 feet is required; in the central latitude states, pipes should be placed from 2 1/2 to 3 feet in the ground, and in the southern states a depth of from 1 1/2 to 2 feet is usually enough covering to protect them from freezing damages.

Should your water-supply pipes become frozen, they require prompt thawing out to avoid possible bursting. In lead and soft copper pipes, a bulge in the pipe will generally disclose the location of the frozen area, while in other metal pipes, no such bulge will appear.

To melt the ice in the pipes, some form of heat will be required. The heat may be applied to the exterior of a frozen pipe by direct flame or application of hot water. In thawing out water pipes, it is best to work toward the supply end, keeping a faucet open to indicate when the flow starts. When thawing out a waste or sewer pipe, it is best to start at the lower end and work upward, to allow the water to flow off as the ice is melted.

Direct flame may be applied to frozen pipes with a gasoline blow torch, provided there is no danger of burning the adjoining woodwork. The flame should be played gradually along the pipe to spread the heat evenly.

A small electric reflector heater is a safe and excellent substitute for the blow torch. The radiant heat quickly warms the frozen pipe.

Hot applications on a frozen pipe do not produce as quick results as direct flame, but are much safer because they lessen the fire hazard and the possibility of bursting the pipe. The frozen pipe can either be wrapped with cloths saturated with boiling water or the boiling water can be poured directly over the pipe. In both cases, a receptacle should be placed below the pipe to catch the water.

Frozen traps, waste pipes, drains, rain spouts and sewer pipes may be opened by pouring boiling water into them through the drain opening, gutter opening or trap. If this is not successful, a can of lye or drainpipe cleaner dissolved in two gallons of cold water in a porcelain container should be carefully poured into the drain opening or trap. Do not use hot water with lye or cleaner and avoid splashing the solution on face, hands, or clothing.

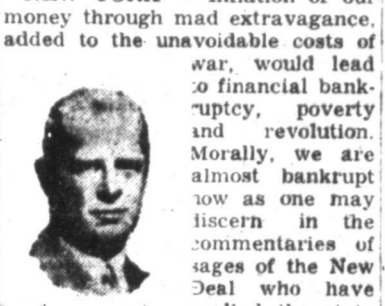

She did not go into detail as much as Hopkins did, but the fundamental proposition was the same. She wanted the state to take charge of the people and tell us all, "women as well as men," what to do.

Already, although "labor" was being squandered in strikes and overstaffing on many jobs, the War Labor Board was thumbing its nose at the occupations act on the pretense that it was needed in "the war effort." Actually, the purpose was to drive them into unionized jobs so that they would come under the control of the New Deal unions who were collecting, all told, more than one billion dollars a year off the top of the workers' wages.

The draft act was intended only to recruit men for the armed forces. But, by this trick, it was used to dragroon citizens into the unions because those who were ruled out of "unessential" occupations had to join unions or join the Army. Naturally, most of them joined the unions. The price in money was little.

At least the American taxpayer is no longer supporting the Russian brand of socialism. Shucks - all we have to do from now on is support socialism in America.

Meaning of Consistency A reader sent a note trying to belittle our motto of consistency. He quotes the usual Emerson quotation, but not of course explain what Emerson meant by consistency. Remember Emerson said: "A foolish consistency is the hobgoblin of little minds, adored by little statesmen and philosophers and divines. With consistency a great soul has simply nothing to do." Note the word "foolish."

This statement was made in Emerson's essay on "Self-Reliance." Two paragraphs before this statement Emerson said: "The other terror that scares us from self-trust is our consistency; a reverence for our past act or word because the eyes of others have no other data for computing our orbit than our past acts, and we are loath to disappoint them."

Then following this quotation about a foolish consistency—not just consistency, but a foolish consistency—he said: "Speak what you think now in hard words and tomorrow speak what tomorrow thoughts in hard words again, though it contradict every thing you said today."

Of course, one cannot be consistent with error. One can only be consistent with principles. Trying to be consistent means trying to be consistent with principles. When a man finds that what he has thought before or said before is inconsistent with principles, he immediately repudiates what he has said before or thought before in order to try to be consistent with principles or axioms or natural law.

Consistency of course comes from the word consistent, and the first definition of consistent is "to exist in a fixed or permanent state, as a body composed of parts in union or connection; to hold together; to be supported and maintained." Another definition of consistent is "firmness of constitution of character, substantially, persistency, as friendship of a lasting consistency." Another definition is "agreement or harmony of parts, traits, or of different things, congruity."

One cannot reason without being consistent. Neither could there be any physical law unless there was harmony and eternal unity in laws. There could be no mathematics if there was no consistency, no permanence, no sequence, no rules or natural laws governing numbers.

Of course, being consistent as Emerson has used the word is trying to be consistent with one's former opinions or former beliefs. If one was always consistent with the beliefs of his youth, he would never develop; he would never grow; he would be stagnant. But trying to be consistent with principles, with moral law, with natural law, is absolutely necessary if there is to be a peaceful and harmonious or prosperous society.

There is no more chance of peace and good will without constancy and consistency than it is possible to play any game without rules or being consistent. No socialist, no collective planner, no communist can be consistent. He cannot be consistent because he believes in initiating force. He believes in "might makes right," that the majority has a right to coerce the minority.

A man on the witness stand is consistent when he does not contradict himself. He is cross examined to find out whether he contradicts himself. Consistency is the nature of truth. One truth, one principle, one axiom, is always in agreement with every other truth, every other principle, every other axiom. If there were no truth, there could be nothing but chaos.

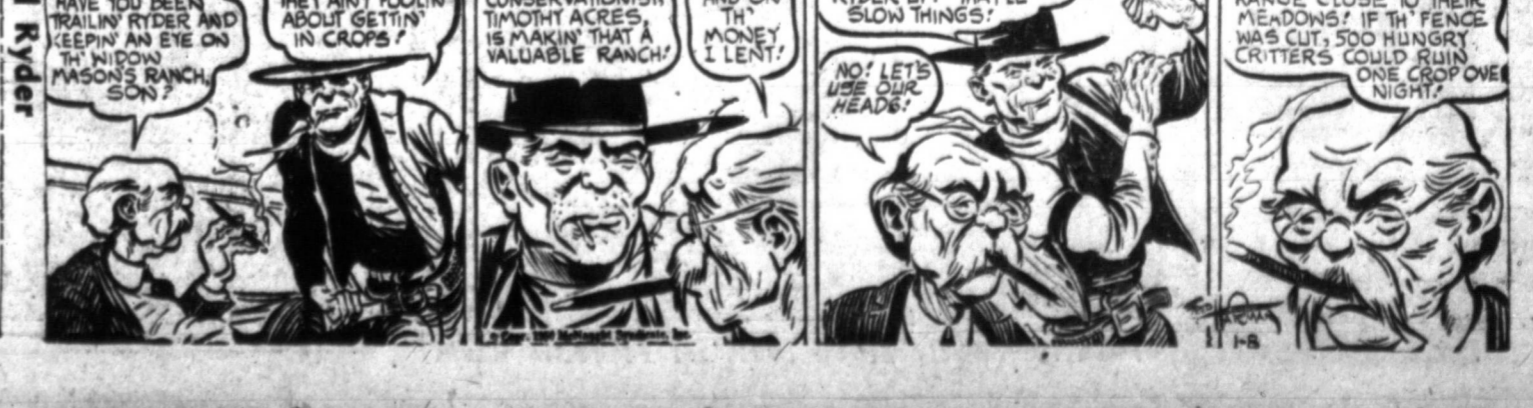
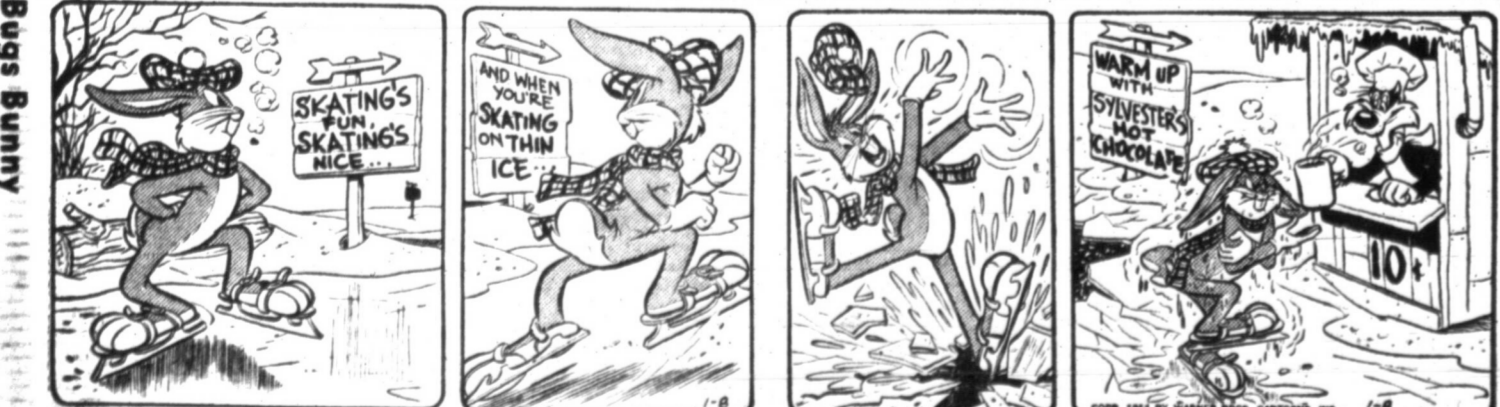

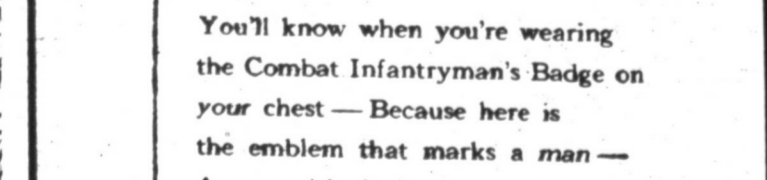

Rayburn Breaking Record as Speaker

By TEX EASLEY. WASHINGTON — (AP) — Texas' veteran Congressman Sam Rayburn soon will have served as Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives longer than any other man.

With no opposition to his election as speaker for the 82nd Congress starting Jan. 3, he was within short distance of the goal set more than a century ago by Henry Clay.

The famous Kentucky statesman in broken periods of service in the House held the speakership for a total of 8 years, 4 months and 11 days, according to research experts in the Congressional Library.

On Jan. 27 Rayburn will have equalled that mark. He first became speaker on Sept. 16, 1940, succeeding the late William Bankhead of Alabama. He has been presiding officer of the House ever since, except during the Republican controlled 80th Congress, Jan. 3, 1947 to Jan. 3, 1949.

While the Congressional Library research experts come up with the year, 4 month and 11 day record for Clay, a layman's check of the newly-published Congressional Biographical Directory covering the years 1774 to 1949 (including Continental Congress rosters) shows the Kentuckian served as speaker only 8 years, 4 months and 11 days.

The periods Clay served as speaker were: Nov. 4, 1811 to Jan. 19, 1814; Dec. 4, 1815 to Oct. 28, 1820; and Dec. 1, 1823 to March 3, 1825. He resigned in 1814 to serve as a commissioner in the negotiation of peace with England, and in 1825 to serve as secretary of state.

During the past three months Rayburn also has exceeded the eight-year records as speaker chalked up by two other men. Joseph G. (Uncle Joe) Cannon of Illinois served as speaker for 8 years, 4 months and 11 days.

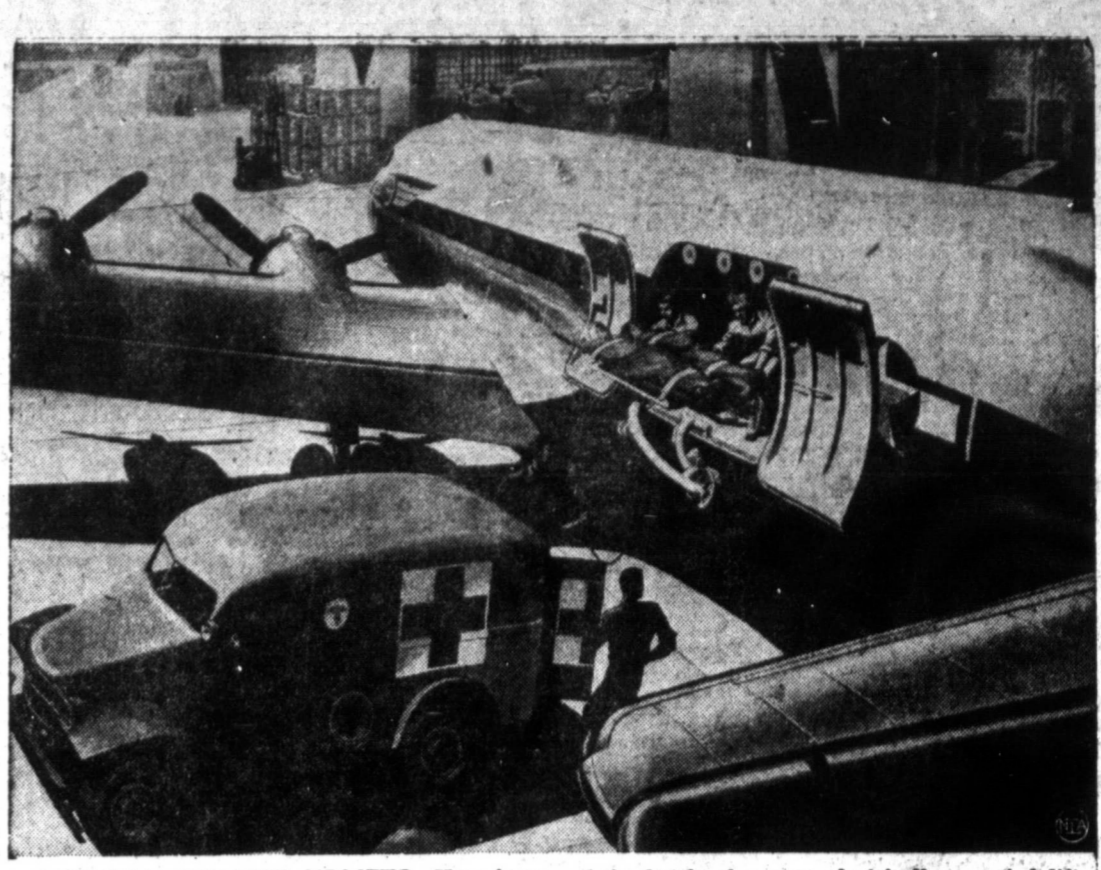

DOG NOTES by PETER BOGGS

DOG INVENTS HIS OWN RAT TRAP. The other day we were talking about how inventive some dogs could be when the story of "Rex" was told. Rex was an inspired Rat Terrier. He had driven out all the rats in the home of his master, Harold Munson, of New Haven, Connecticut. True, there were still rats in the walls, but they dared not venture out through the rat hole in the kitchen while Rex was in sight. That is when Rex became an inventor — an inventor of a rat trap. Here is what he did: He fetched three lumps of bread, one of which he stuffed into the rat hole. The second he placed on the floor a few feet away, and the third he left well out in the room. Then he hid and watched. Soon the rats ate the bread in the hole. Next, a rat darted out and seized the second morsel. Another pause and then a hungry rat crept cautiously out toward the more distant chunk of bread. It was then that Rex sprang into action by jumping between the rat and the hole thus cutting off its line of escape and killing it.

Do you think that indicates a clear ability to think? To me it does. Foxes have been known to lure chickens to their kennels by sprinkling a line of crumbs along the earth as bait but never before have I heard of a dog doing the same kind of a thing and doing it better. Have you?

WHY A PUPPY? This past Christmas a new puppy came into your home and you have been confronted with the problem of how to keep him from chewing up cushions, rugs, chair legs, etc., when he is left alone in the house. The answer to your problem is simple enough. Don't leave the dog alone in a room where there is anything to destroy.

Of course, as the pup grows older he will get over his yearning to rip the furniture to pieces. Until then use patience and common sense by keeping him out of rooms where there are things he can injure unless some person is there to prevent the damage. A little child could not be relied on not to break china or glass or write on the walls or to get into some form of mischief if he were left alone in a room with such attractive objects within his reach. You really cannot expect more of a baby dog than a human baby.

A puppy is full of mad vitality and must have some outlet for it, or he will go wild. Because he is cutting his teeth, his jaws ache and biting into some object tends to ease the pain of his aching jaws. This destructive urge in a pup will abate in time, usually by the time the puppy teeth are replaced by his permanent ones. He will remember all pups chew things but like the rain, they will stop some time.

LET MOTHER DOG TELL YOU. Just before Christmas I was asked by friend of mine to help him choose a pup as a gift for his nine-year-old son. While looking at a litter of new born pups we noticed something that is rather common with all dogs but understood by only a few humans. The mother dog, like many, was neglecting the weakest of her newborn litter, giving all her attention to the stronger ones. It seems that when one pup in a litter is a weakling, the mother sometimes shoves it away from her, refusing to shelter or feed it. And, it is not an uncommon happening if she kills it. Even the best of canine mothers will do this.

You perhaps wonder at such seeming cruelty on the part of a dog who would gladly risk her life for the other pups in her litter. However, she is unconsciously obeying Nature's iron law of "the survival of the fittest."

When a dog pushes aside a sickly or defective newborn pup you can figure that, even with the best of care, almost invariably this puppy will die. The mother dog's maternal instinct tells her this long before you or I are aware of it. She is the doctor who knows it will not live. She does not waste time in trying to treat or care for such hopeless cases.

INEXPENSIVE MEAT FOR YOUR PET. Knowing the high cost of meat these days and of the universal practice of dog owners buying meat for their pets at their local markets I decided to check and see what they were doing in these days of high prices. So this past week I stopped in at a local meat market.

I had quite a discussion with the proprietor about meat for dogs. It surprised me when he told me of the number of people who are feeding pig's liver and kidneys to their dogs.



Hog's liver and kidneys are excellent sources of vitamins, proteins and minerals. Either of these is an excellent addition to any dog's diet. However, it is wise to restrict the amount of liver when first feeding it to a dog. If more than small amounts are given, it will tend to diarrhea. Yet the average dog will soon become accustomed to it and like it. It isn't necessary to cook these organs; in fact, they have more food value if uncooked. I don't advise feeding this to a steady diet, yet once or twice a week will not be harmful to your dog.
