Washington Booze Party Described by Brookhart

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Stories of a "Wall Street booze party dinner" in Washington were told to the expectant, closely attentive Senate today by Senator Smith W. Brookhart, progressive, of Iowa.

In a reception room at the dinner, Brookhart declared, there was a rack, and when a curtain was lifted there was revealed a row of silver hip flasks. "I was told to 'help yourself.' A considerable number did help themselves."

Wall Street notables are said to have attended the dinner. Senator Smoot, Republican, of Utah, with Senator Brookhart, were among those who attended the affair but refused the liquors.

GIVES A "HOT CHECK" TO SAVE A LIFE

DALLAS, Nov. 5.—Here's an alibi that was accepted by the Criminal Court attaches, without even having to go to court:

A drug store complained that it had received a "hot check." The writer of the check was found and called to explain. He said the other day when he returned to his car, he found a woman beside it. FREE-FOR-ALL IN THE "FLAT" GETS 2 NEGROES ARRESTED

A fracas in Thompson's Cafe in downtown Saturday night resulted in two negroes being brought before the city court Monday afternoon. L. C. Johnson and Leslie Flowers were charged with inciting the riot.

It is alleged that a large crowd was present when the fight commenced but after the air became impregnated with pepper sauce and catsup bottles the place was entirely vacated. Only two casualties were reported. Johnson being nicked on the hat-rack with a bottle, and a small negro boy, 4, mere bystander, being scragged with a microcheting sauce container.

Elkins Case Will be Tried Thursday

John Elkins, of Coleman, tried several times on a charge of murder growing out of the slaying of his nephew in the Coleman county court house in 1921, will be tried in Ballinger for manslaughter Thursday.

In a previous trial here in 1926, Elkins was found guilty of manslaughter, but a reversal was gotten by the defense counsel and the case is being tried again on a remandment order.

This case has been aired so much and tried so many times that it will not attract much attention, it is thought, as this will be the third or fourth time it has been called in the 35th district court. No special venire has been called and the jury sitting this week will try the case.

One Dead; One Hurt; In Houston Slaying

HOUSTON, Nov. 5.—Ferris Moses, 33, and I. J. Watkins, his brother-in-law, fell here last night under pistol bullets fired from a parked automobile. Moses died today, while Watkins sustained only shoulder wounds.

Michael La Tonia, 22, who said his address was "anywhere," is charged with murder.

PARISIANS ARE BORN MOST EVERYWHERE ELSE

PARIS, Nov. 5.—If it is true that the real Californian was born in Kansas—the real Parisian was born in Marseilles or Calais or anywhere else in France but Paris.

According to official figures there are 2,408,000 souls in Paris but only 837,000 of them were born here. The rest have wandered in from all points of the compass.

The Auvergnats lead with 213,436 representatives and Corsica trails with 7,669.

FRENCH ARTISTS PLAN ONLY "LIVING PAINTINGS"

PARIS, Nov. 5.—Picture-galleries and Salons of Exposition threaten to disappear in the near future if the Parisian painters carry out their latest project of using living models to expose their art works. They propose to paint their pictures either on the back or front of the girl, sometimes with large exposure and sometimes with small, as the case may be necessary.

These "living paintings" will be seen at the cafes frequented by artists, or in the studios of the artists themselves and will make visits to the homes of likely buyers. The business of art critic will not be such a disagreeable one if the new plan is followed.

MANY ANCIENT FINDS NEAR GERMAN CITIES

KONIGSBURG, Germany, Nov. 5.—The excavations conducted by the Prussia Museum, which recently disclosed a great Viking burial place, continue to turn up finds from the most various periods—the early Iron Age, the Bronze Age, the days of the Roman Caesars and of the migration of the peoples.

The oldest find, a bone ax, was made in Lindenwieze. It comes from the later Ice Age, 6,000 to 8,000 years ago.

Sheriff Fred Bowles obtained custody of Walker after his trial for the killing of a Berger, Texas, policeman two years ago, was postponed.

"Whitey" made a desperate effort to escape as Texas officers turned him over to Oklahoma officers last night near Stinnett.

WAR VETERAN SHRINKS IN SIZE WITH EACH YEAR

SAWTELLE, Calif., Nov. 5.—Shrinking in size an inch each year, Joseph Mayott, 54-year-old World and Spanish War veteran presents a strange problem to medical science, it became known today.

Mayott is suffering from Paget's disease, the technical name for dissolving of the bony structure of the body and medical science has admitted that it is unable to help him.

In the past eight years he has lost nine inches in height, Mayott declared.

Two years ago he came to the soldiers' home at Sawtelle for treatment and since that time more than 400 physicians have examined him.

GERMAN SKIN SPECIALIST SEES FLEAS DYING OUT

BERLIN, Nov. 5.—The flea is dying out, Dr. H. Loeb, Munich skin disease specialist, reports in the Munich Medical Weekly.

Dr. Loeb attributes its disappearance to modern hygiene and especially to short skirts. He points out that the flea played a big role in gallant literature whenever fashions were most cumbersome.

"Now weeks and months pass before we even see a flea bit," he reports. "Better care of the body and especially the modern way of dressing which admits lots of air and sun to the body, mean death to the flea."

WANTED CUP OF TEA; STOPPED FAST EXPRESS

MANCHESTER, Eng., Nov. 5.—Rushing at more than sixty miles an hour on its journey northward, the Manchester express was halted by the pulling of the emergency cord. Amid the screaming of brakes, the guard went to investigate.

2 Texans Killed In Plane Crash

DALLAS, Nov. 5.—Two former Texans were killed in an airplane crash in Mexico yesterday which took four lives.

John Carmichael, former all-Southwest football player from Trinity University, and Robert Lowery, formerly of Dallas, an official of the air line, were killed. Two Mexicans also lost their lives in the fall.

Three Sites Before Prison Commission

HOUSTON, Nov. 5.—At least three sites for the proposed centralized penitentiary system will be recommended to the legislature by the Texas Prison Centralization Commission.

A minority group favors Huntsville or Livingston, while a majority faction will insist that the new plant be located within twenty miles of Austin.

HOUSTON, Nov. 5.—W. L. Mead, general manager of the Texas penitentiary system, resigned his position today. The State Prison Board in session here to decide the relocation of the system, accepted the resignation with "regret," thanking Mead for his "valuable service."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—While election contests drew voters of a dozen states to the polls today, the eyes of the nation were fixed primarily on Virginia for an indication of what might be expected of the Old Dominion in future national campaigns.

The majority elections in New York, Boston and other cities attracted much attention but today's balloting in Virginia was considered a crucial test for the Democratic organization there and the efforts of the Republican party to hold their gains of last year in the presidential election under Herbert Hoover's leadership.

Minor elections were being held today in Michigan, Indiana, Kansas, Ohio, Illinois, Pennsylvania and Kentucky.

EFFECT OF REPARATIONS IS SHOWN IN MUSEUM

DUSSELDORF, Nov. 5.—The National Museum for Sociology and Economics has added a department designated as "the German People and the Reparations." It shows in graphic form the history, significance and effect of the reparations payments.

Illuminated models demonstrate the four stages of the problem—the German offer of 1919, the London Agreement, the Dawes Plan and the Young Plan.

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The MONTH IN THE SKIES
November: Capella

(Professor of Astronomy, University of Illinois)

URBANA, Ill., Nov. 5.—(AP)—In the northwest early in the evening in November there is a conspicuous configuration of five stars resembling an inverted muffin.

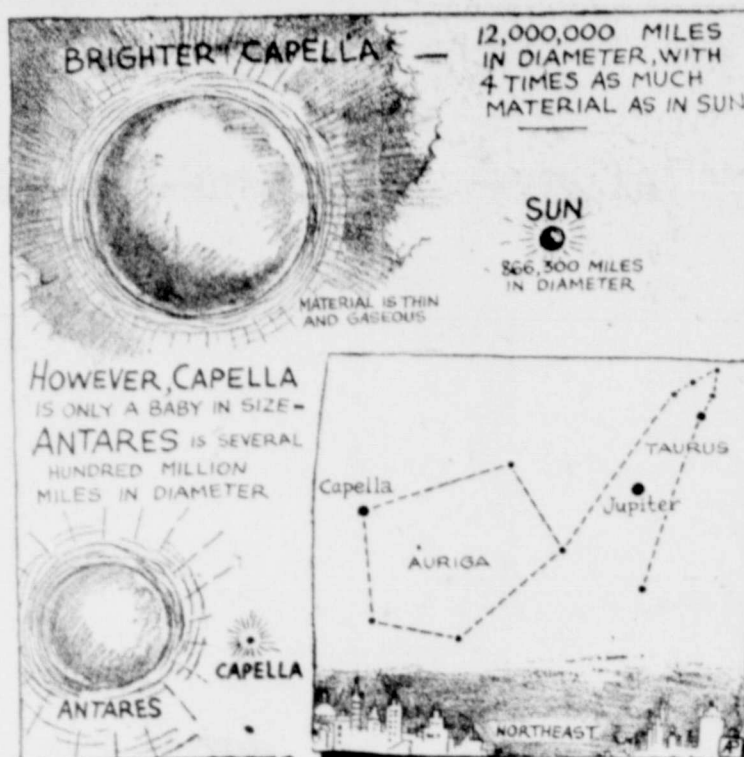
That is the constellation Auriga, the Charioteer.

The star farthest to the right

and without the telescope, turns out to be two stars nearly as far apart as the earth's distance from the sun and of nearly the same color and brightness.

This pair of yellow stars is in revolution, once around in 104 days, in a nearly circular orbit. We refer now to the brighter star of the pair.

This star contains four times as much material as there is in the



really belongs to the neighboring constellation Taurus. It is at the tip of the upper horn of the Celestial Bull, whose head, still farther to the right, is marked by the V-shaped group of the Hyades.

Between this star and the Hyades the planet Jupiter attracts the attention, for it is by far the brightest star-like object in the evening sky. Only Venus, now the morning star, surpasses it in brightness.

Capella, at the upper left corner of the inverted muffin, is the brightest star of Auriga and one of the brightest stars in the heavens. It shines with a yellow light, like the color of sun, while Jupiter always shines with a steady light.

What appears to be a single bright star in Auriga, both with

sun, expressed in tone it is one followed by 28 ciphers. This material is entirely gaseous. It can not be solid or even liquid because the star is so hot.

Even at the surface the temperature is nearly 10,000 degrees Fahrenheit. Below the surface it is still hotter, and at the center of the star the temperature runs into many millions of degrees. In general, the center of a star is the hottest place we know about.

The brightest star of Capella is 12,000,000 miles in diameter. In this enormous globe the material is spread rather thin; on the average the gas is no more dense than ordinary air. Capella is a giant star, but it is by no means the largest of the giants. The great red star Antares in the Scorpion is several hundred million miles in diameter.

STATE POLICE LINKED BY TYPEWRITER MESH

(By Associated Press) HARRISBURG, Pa., Nov. 5.—The advantage of the criminal with a high-speed automobile will be offset in Pennsylvania by installation of a system of instantaneous communication among all police departments.

Major Lynn G. Adams, superintendent of the state police, has selected cities along the two main thoroughfares of the state, the William Penn and the Lincoln highways, approximately 20 miles apart, for the installation.

The system will also be employed to aid in such matters as tracing lost airplanes, and advising aviators of weather conditions.

The vast, old red plush house, with its tier of boxes, balconies and galleries like the layers of a semi-circular cake, is a gala scene in a self-conscious way. The audience is there not so much to hear, as to see and be seen.

That is, almost everybody excepting Otto Kahn, the Meeenas of the opera.

Mr. Kahn this year stood in the director's box, instead of his own, to better hear the music of "Manon Lescaut" and watch Lacerzia Bori's elegant performance.

It so happened that the banker's figure cut off the view of a standee, a woman, behind the adjacent loge, and she was angry about it. Her noisy complaint finally attracted Mr. Kahn's attention and he turned his head to see what the trouble was. The woman waved the patron of the Met to one side with an imperious arm and he obligingly stepped out of her way.

Exclusive Opera Club

Hungarians and Belgians Fail To Forget War

(International News Staff Correspondent)

PARIS, Nov. 5.—Belgium has not forgotten the war. She and Hungary are the two countries of Europe which have conserved the most vivid memories of it, according to Maurice de Waleffe, writing in "Le Paris Midi."

"The first ambassador sent by the Reich to Brussels after the armistice was scarcely tolerated and he did not take long to have his position changed. The one who is there today is a perfect gentleman, nevertheless, eleven years after the close of the war, he frequents only the diplomatic circles. No Belgian family invites him to their home."

"Belgium hasn't yet forgotten how disagreeable was her awakening when the country was totally invaded and then the series of private vengeance she met when reconquering her country in 1918."

At Belgrade, Monsieur de Waleffe found that people are more occupied with the Italy of tomorrow than the Austria of yesterday. At Bucharest, Prague and Warsaw everyone is too busy with the future to think for a moment of the past. At Rome, Fascism has effaced everything that went before it and at London the four corners of the globe have reduced the memory of the war of 1914 to the rank of an expedition to the colonies, something on the order of the war of the Transvaal. In Belgium, the four long years of war still remain upon everybody's lips.

"We often reproach our Belgian friends for not having as light hearts as we have; we even say they are sometimes a little heavy. But anyway, this is much more reassuring."

Let the women do it! urge a score of Parisians who are trying to persuade popular Prefect of Police Chiappe to let the women

have their share of street patrolling. They find that the style center of the world is far behind the other great cities. London has its women "bobbies"; New York has its policewomen, and Berlin's police force has been assisted for more than a year by women with most imposing and formidable titles.

French women are now to be found in practically every profession and in a great many of them are to be preferred to the men. They are indefatigable workers and in many cases show more originality and ingenuity than their husbands, fathers or brothers.

It has been suggested to try

them first on the "softer" beats, controlling traffic near schools, etc.

The women themselves are anxious to know what sort of uniform will be allowed them. A few would prefer short riding-breeches but others would like short fashionable skirts. At any rate, it must be chic.

The old custom of offering gifts to the sovereigns one visits was not forgotten when President Doumergue recently spent a few days with the king of the Belgians in Brussels. In his bag there was a wonderful mechanical doll for the little Princess Josephine-Charlotte, the daughter of

the crown prince, and for Queen Elizabeth, her daughter, Princess Marie-Jose and the daughter-in-law, Princess Astrid of Sweden, there were the finest objects the porcelain factory of Sevres could produce. As for the king himself and the two princes, they were obliged to content themselves with signed portraits of the smiling president. No doubt, they would have preferred a fine pipe but the protocol indicated the portrait.

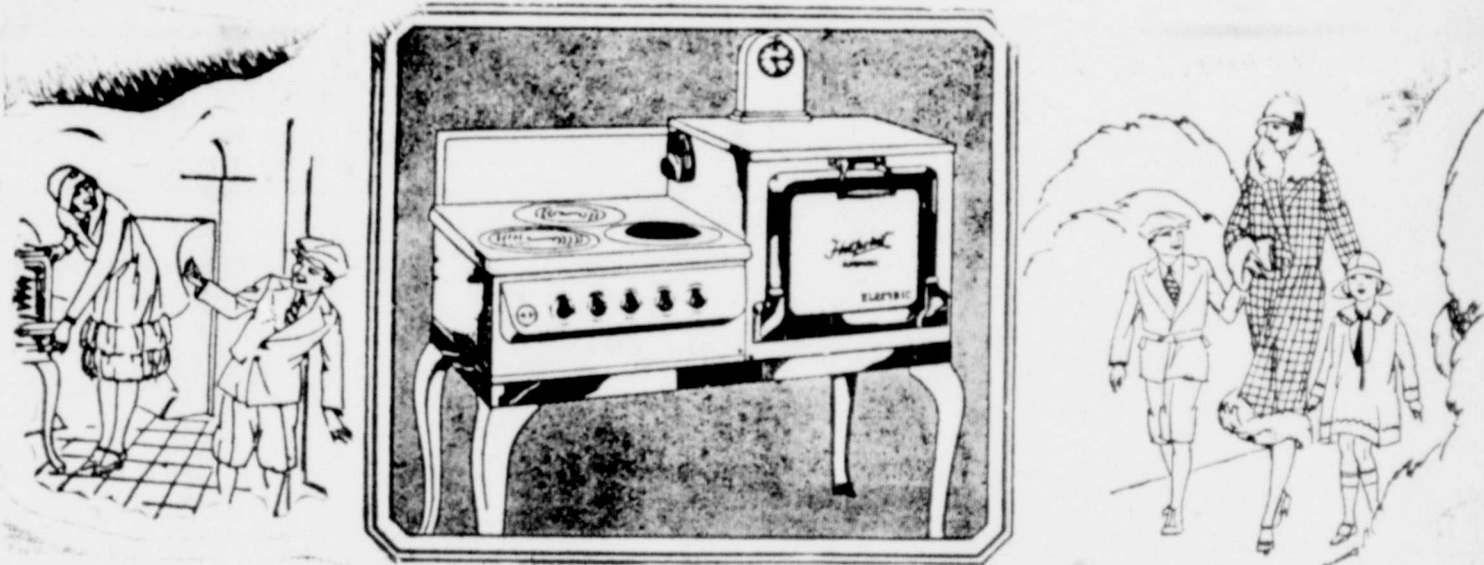

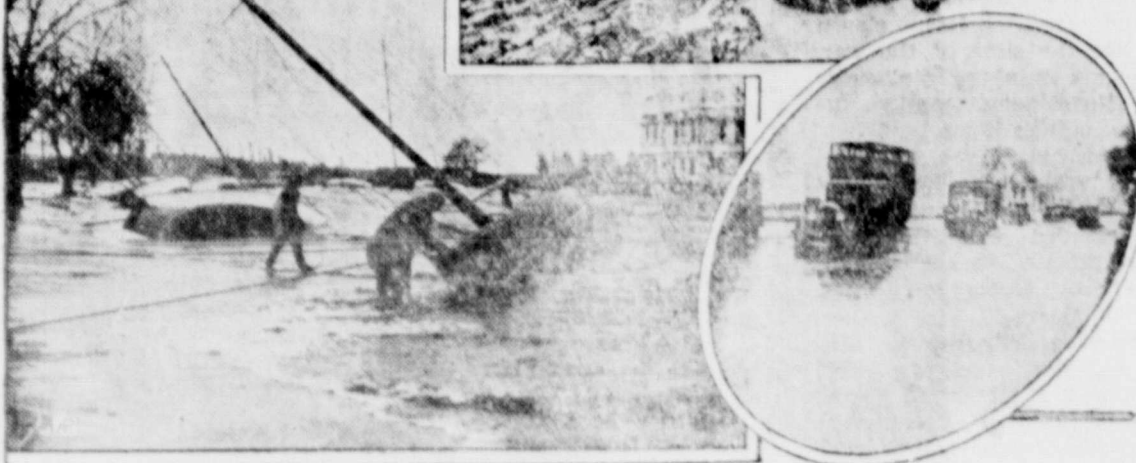

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—Lake Michigan's first winter storms will cost Chicago millions.

As it ponders the wreckage, however, the city finds cause for a smile, albeit grim, of satisfaction.

For years Chicago has defended itself against claims of other cities that diversion of water through the Chicago River, to carry away pollution, lowered the lake's level.

Chicago thinks it has won the argument.

The first of the recent storms sent the lake two feet above normal and lashed the whole

waterfront along a 200-mile stretch on the west and south shores.

As far as the city could tell, Lake Michigan was as high as ever.

Each year Chicago quietly reveals a little more of the lake's domain and every winter the booming lake fights to have it back. The attacks this fall were launched with violent north-easters, battering and crushing great concrete breakwaters and costing many lives.

The most spectacular climax of the storm was the loss of 52 men when the car ferry Milwaukee

served. 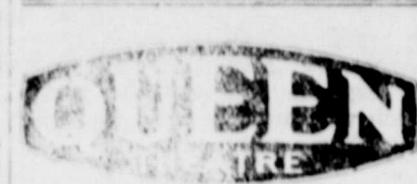

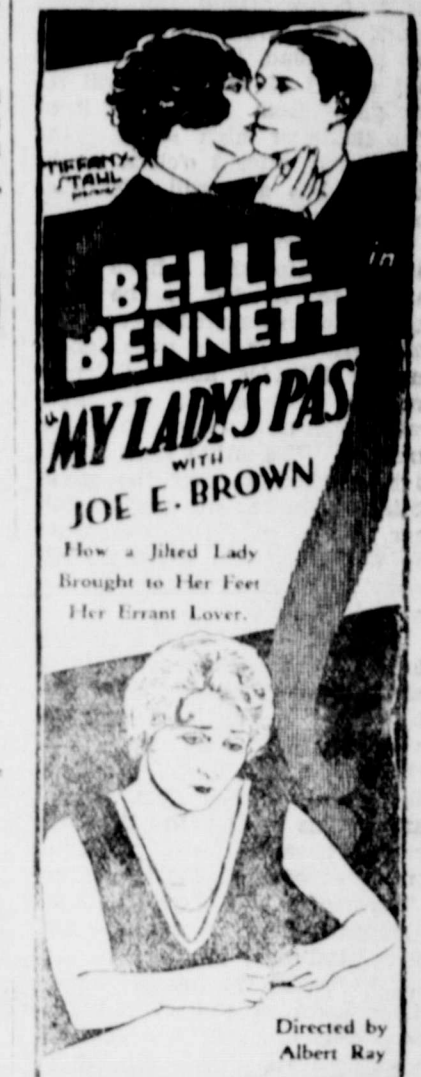
