Good news, bad news about water situation

Glenn Hemphill, project engineer, had good news and bad news about the city's water situation, during a speech before members of the Noon Lions Club Friday.

The good news was that the pump stations were completed on the city's new water system and water was coming from Lake Champion. Once the new filter plant is completed, the water will be as clean and pure as bottled water, he said.

The city's new water system

was the good news. The amount of water was the bad news. "Hopefully, we'll have the filter plant in operation in about 60 more days—if we don't run out of water," said Hemphill.

Hemphill said that officials at TU Electric have told him that they don't see any problem for two or three months.

"Two or three months isn't very far down the road," he said.

The lake levels Tuesday were: Lake Colorado City, 10.3 feet low

and Lake Champion, 11.5 feet low.

"The lowest I've ever seen Colorado Lake was 19 feet, so that gives us nine more feet," he said. "When it gets down to 19 feet, there's not that much more to go. So that one's coming down fast."

The useful water in Lake Champion is about 24 feet, said Hemphill.

He explained that Lake Champion is almost a third larger than

Muddy water caused by faulty check valve

Recent problems with muddy water throughout the entire system was due to a faulty check valve at the old filter plant, said Glenn Hemphill, city water project engineer.

Speaking before the Noon Lions Club Friday, Hemphill explained that the filters at the city's old water filter plant were put in in 1949 and have only been changed once.

The weight control mechanisms that go through the filters are not working, he said.

"So, a lot of the muddy water we're getting is coming through the filters in such a small amount that it finally sludges on the inside," he said.

The short-circuited water creates mud balls, he explained.

Whiteway Motel damaged by fire

One room destroyed, three others damaged

A fire at the Whiteway Motel destroyed one motel room and damaged three others early Monday morning.

According to Fire Marshal Billy Ray Williamson, 20 Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department firemen responded to the report of a fire at 3:12 a.m. at 741 E. Second.

Motel resident Calvin Parnell, two other adults and three young children were asleep when the fire broke out.

"It was a ball of fire in the ceiling," said Parnell.

No one was injured. One room was destroyed, two rooms had extensive damage and one room had heavy smoke damage, said firefighters.

The fire was caused by a short in the electrical wiring, said Williamson. The structure and contents were valued at \$5,000.

Power supply loss meant no long distance

Loraine was isolated Tuesday afternoon when an office equipment failure prevented long distance phone calls.

Around 450 customers were unable to make long distance calls from 11:30 a.m. until 4:15 p.m., according to a GTE telephone company area manager.

The cause was determined to be a failure of power supply equipment at the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company office in Colorado City. The equipment powers the power optic cable that carries the toll for that exchange.

Four charged with burglary at Lake Colorado City house

Four people have been charged with the April burglary of a Lake Colorado City house, according to the Mitchell County sheriff.

One man was arrested in Big Spring and charged with burglary of a habitation, two were picked up in Utah and a fourth was arrested Sunday and charged with the burglary, said Sheriff Patrick Toombs.

Jonathan Shane Allen, 20, arrested in Big Spring, was indicted last week by a Mitchell County Grand Jury for burglary of a habitation.

Zachariah Allen Kimmel, 18, no address given, and Heather Newman, also known as Heather

Bjork, 22, were arrested in Utah in connection with the burglaries. The Mitchell County Sheriff's office is in contact with Utah authorities concerning extradition of the two, said Toombs.

Another female, Charly Renee Stewart, 24, of Big Spring was arrested and charged Sunday.

The burglary was reported when Midland owners of a lake cabin returned in April to find their house and garage had been broken into and several items stolen, including new jet skis.

In addition, the owners could tell that one or more people had stayed in the house as meals had

been cooked and the dishes put in the dishwasher.

The jet skis were later found damaged in a pasture northeast of Big Spring on the Snyder Highway.

Items reported as stolen were seen outside the unoccupied house next door. Mitchell County sheriff's deputies obtained a search warrant and found other stolen items inside the house and information that led to the arrest of Allen and the other two.

Stewart is in Mitchell County Jail. Allen, the grandson of the owner of the unoccupied house

A Colorado City man, Ervin Butler, 44, died early Saturday morning in a one-car rollover.

Butler was an employee at Fuller Foods. He had lived in Colorado City for four years.

The accident occurred at 1:15 a.m., according to Department of Public Safety Trooper Monty Kea.

Butler was northbound on South Austin when he lost control of the 1990 Plymouth Voyager van he was driving and ran off the road, said Kea. The vehicle overturned and plunged down a 20-

Man arrested for Loraine burglaries

A Loraine man was arrested Tuesday for a rash of burglaries that have occurred in the Loraine area over the past year and other suspects are expected to be arrested soon, according to the Mitchell County sheriff. David Carrasco Barrera, 34, was indicted by a Mitchell County Grand Jury May 23 on three charges of burglary of a building and one for burglary of a habitation.

Evidence indicates that Barrera did not act alone in some of the burglaries and other suspects are being questioned, Sheriff Patrick Toombs said last week.

"There could be a local burglary ring involved in this but we'll have to get more information," said Sheriff Toombs. "We'll just have to wait and see."

There have been 12 unsolved burglaries in the Loraine area in the past year and one half. "This could clear up eight of those 12," said Toombs.

New 35° angle parking will increase visibility

Downtown parking on Second Street is being made safer this week through a Texas Department of Transportation project coordinated with the city.

The old 45 degree angle of parking has been reduced to a 35 degree flatter angle.

City Manager Steve Shutt said the change in the parking striping will make traveling lanes wider, safer and improve visibility.

Once drivers become accustomed to parking between the new lines, they'll probably notice the benefits of the new parking angles, said Shutt. It's estimated that visibility will increase by 50 percent.

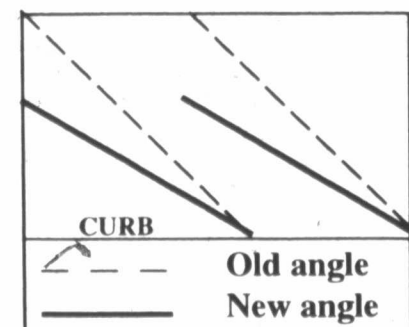
Backing out will be safer, especially when one is parked adjacent to a van or large vehicle. In addition, the new angle will make it easier to open the car door when exiting without hitting the side of the adjacent parked vehicle.

The striping work included center striping on the recently completed road pavement downtown.

The work has been coordinated with a future TxDOT project, downtown landscaping, to begin this fall.

The landscaping project with peninsular designs, trees and shrubs will change the curbing at the intersections. The enlarged curbing will cut one or two parking places at the downtown intersections, which is being allowed for in this week's striping work, said David Elmore, TxDOT project engineer.

Crosswalks at the intersections will not be painted until after the landscaping project is completed.

Carlos and Lucy Ortiz, owners and operators of the Cold Spot Restaurant, have both been cooking for many years. In fact, the couple cooks so much at work they often find that they're too tired to cook again at home. Carlos has been cooking for himself since he was a child. He said he "likes to barbecue" mostly. Although they both cook well, Lucy admittedly does most of the cooking at home.

Carlos and Lucy moved to Colorado City in 1976. They have three children, Carlos, Lori and Cheryl and two granddaughters. The couple will have been married 25 years in August. To keep the flops to a minimum, the couple has a rule that applies to work as well as home: the one who makes the mistake has to eat it. They both admit it works well. Carlos and Lucy are sharing two of their favorite recipes with us today. If you like Mexican food, you will surely enjoy these.

CARNE GUISADA

- 2 lbs. round steak
- 4 Tbs. flour
- 1/2 cup onion, chopped
- 2 whole jalapeno, sliced
- 1 can tomato sauce
- 1 can water

Garlic, cumin, & black peppercorns, to taste

Brown meat in oil. Remove from skillet. Brown flour in drippings. Add onions, peppers, water, and tomato sauce. Add seasonings to taste. Cook until thick.

SPANISH RICE

- 1 cup rice, uncooked
- 2 Tbs. oil
- 1 med. onion, diced
- 1 med. bell pepper, diced
- 1 can tomatoes with green chilis
- 1 can tomato sauce
- 1/2 tsp. red pepper
- 2 1/2 cups water

Fry rice in oil until golden brown, then add onion and bell pepper. Fry until onions turn brown, stirring constantly. Add tomatoes, tomato sauce, salt, red pepper, and water. Let simmer, stirring occasionally until rice is tender and most of the juice is absorbed. If rice is still firm, add a little more water.

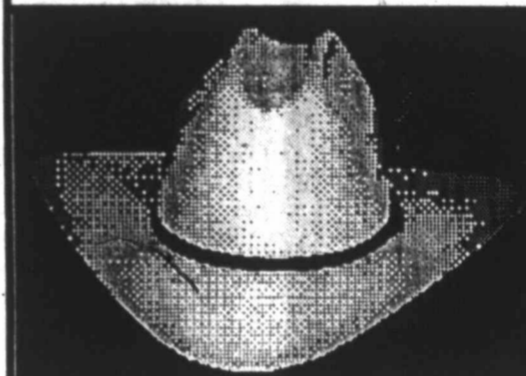

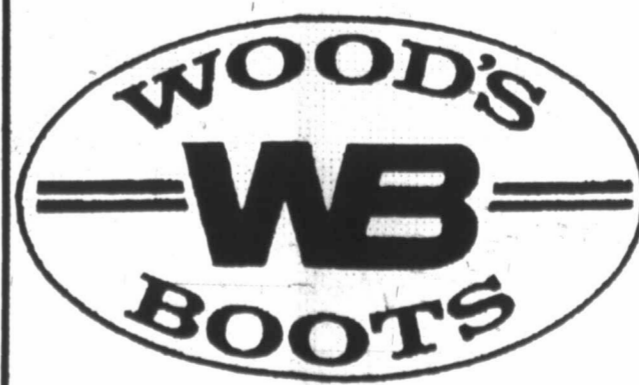

CHIEF LONE WOLF

Back in the late 1880s there was a stopping off place south of Colorado City known as Nan Hatty. The site was little more than a rock building which served as a post office and general store.

There are two versions of why the location was known as Nan Hatty. According to some recollections, there were two old maid women who ran the store and their names were Nan and Hatty. The other account credits the two with being offspring of a widowed settler named Westfall. That story seems to have more credibility.

Nan Hatty was actually in Coke County, some 25-28 miles south of Colorado City. It became part of the Spade Ranch when some land was bought years ago from Lay Powell. And some of the Spade oldtimers know a few things about Nan Hatty.

"Long time ago," cowboy Fred McClellan says, "there used to be some settlers down there and they had a post office. A man by the name of Westfall had two daughters and they were named Nan and Hatty. So he called it Nan Hatty."

McClellan says he heard about the place from the late Otto Jones, ranch manager. Another former Spade employee, Wright Hock, tells about the same story as McClellan.

"Well, the old man had two daughters," Hock explained. "One was named Nan and the other was Hatty. That's what he named the post office."

Neither Hock nor McClellan ever saw the actual building, but its remains are evident today. Hock says the structure was just as "square as it can be and just as straight as it can be."

Frank Bassham, one of the Spade Ranch owners, along with his mother, Marion Bassham, uncle Frank Chappell, and brother Brian Bassham, is well aware of the ranch's history.

"All that area was sparsely populated [in the 1800s]," Bassham states. "There were a few windmills and a few buildings. Nan Hatty was a place where the stagecoach stopped and there was a store down there, they tell me."

Bassham says the man who owned the store was "something like a retired cavalry officer and he had two daughters named Nan and Hatty. So he named it the Nan Hatty store."

Bassham also says all that's left of the old building is a faint outline, a pattern of rocks which set in the ground "alongside the front walk, then down the front of the yard and then the corners of the yard." There's also a hole which he surmises might have served as a basement.

Another Mitchell County man who has an interest in the site is Leonard Morris. When asked about Nan Hatty, he repeated the words.

"Nan Hatty, Texas! My daddy came from Ennis, Texas, in 1894 looking for farmland. He was a clodhopper farmer. He came on horseback with a wagon train and when they came to Nan Hatty, he left the wagon train."

Morris recalls hearing his dad tell the story many times. "Dad stayed a couple of days helping the man there round up his work horses when they swapped teams." And Morris says, "the fella running the place had two daughters, Nan and Hatty, and that's where they got the name for the community."

Not too long ago, Frank Bassham took Morris to Nan Hatty so he could see firsthand the spot where his dad had camped before moving to Colorado City more than a hundred years ago!

"It's a rough son-of-a-gun down there," Morris said as he described the landscape. And he came away somewhat disillusioned.

"I couldn't find a rock with a date on it," he added, referring to the rocky remnants of the building. "I wanted one so bad, but I sure did enjoy the trip anyway."

Current ranch manager Bob Northcutt agrees with Morris on his description of the area around Nan Hatty. "It's down there in a God-forsaken place," he told us. And Northcutt says there's an earthen tank in that area and it's called the Nan Hatty tank. There's also a Westfall pasture, all of which pretty well embraces the notion of a man with two daughters being responsible for naming the site Nan Hatty.

Frank and Jessica Bassham, with a keen appreciation for the Spade Ranch history, named their third child Nan Hatty.

"That name just popped into mind," he stated. "We thought she might not like that name, but it's turned out quite well."

The Basshams' decision to make their third child (they have six) a namesake of two girls who lived more than a hundred years ago was a wise one.

After all, a man named Westfall had honored his daughters by naming his store after them. Frank and Jessica have paid tribute to the memories of Nan and Hatty by carrying on the names.

Nan Hatty Bassham will be a senior at Colorado High next fall. Now, if we just knew whatever happened to the first Nan and Hatty!

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

To the Citizens of Mitchell County:

On Wednesday, May 22, the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department, Westbrook Volunteer Fire Department and Loraine Volunteer Fire Department had been called out to fight a fire at Cuthbert. As most of us arrived out there, another call came in about a fire at County Roads 139 and 143, just north of Colorado City.

By the time some of us came back toward town for the latter fire, our personnel had trouble getting to the scene because of the Sunday drivers (fire chasers) looking at the fire. This was not just a grass fire; it included power lines that had been knocked down which caused the fire plus this land had at least five homes that were in the path of this fire. The winds were very gusty, moving the fire in this drought stricken land at an incredible speed, so much so that it even jumped a county road, allowing the fire to continue.

Because of these fire chasers in the way, it slowed our response time to the fire by two to five minutes. Now this doesn't sound like much delay but those few minutes could have cost someone their home or their family's lives. But the Lord really looked out for these families because all the fire departments (either nine or 10 departments) were

able to protect these homes.

Also, there were two firefighters and one civilian transported to the hospital for treatment of smoke inhalation and heat exhaustion. The civilian was in her car which goes without saying that no one is safe, even in a vehicle.

My point is this: if your home was in jeopardy of being on fire, would you be highly upset with the fire chasers being in the way of fire and EMT personnel having access to save your house and especially your family from danger? How many of our residents realize that chasing fires and interfering with emergency personnel is against the law? How about receiving a ticket for this offense, which could be a fine up to \$250?

I just wonder, if you were possibly one of these fire chasers and someone had lost their home or a member of their family from this fire, would you have guilty feelings

knowing that you had a hand in this devastation? Please keep this in mind when you hear the sirens and see the lights of emergency vehicles. Unless you have family or property involved, please do not go to the emergency scene.

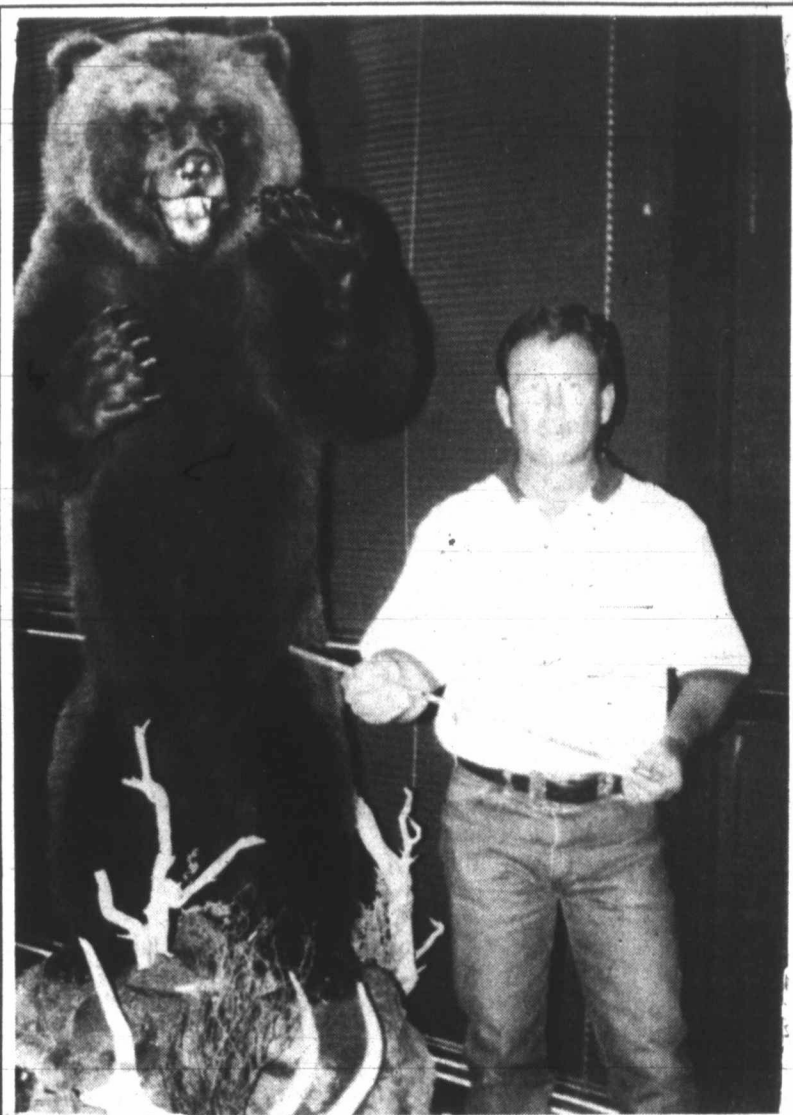

Bear hunting trip termed "experience of a lifetime"

An eight and a half foot Alaskan bear, killed by Donny Lindsey of Colorado City, towers over bank customers and those who have visited the First National Bank in the past few weeks specifically to see the unusual exhibit.

The story of Lindsey's experience in hunting the bear is an extraordinary adventure—it's an account of how he shot the bear with a bow and arrow, lay still while the fatally injured animal sniffed his boots and lived to tell the story.

The local businessman said he had planned on a bear-hunting trip to Alaska for about five years. A bowhunter, he has hunted numerous other animals, such as elk and deer, but never a bear.

After choosing the best outfitter and guide he could find, he embarked on a 15-day hunt on the Alaskan peninsula last October.

The bush plane, carrying Lindsey and his guide, Bob Womack, landed on the Pacific beach, one hundred yards from spike camp. Although Womack had led many rifle hunters on similar shoots, he had never guided a bow hunter.

The following afternoon, after the tide had gone out, they spotted two bears feeding on the beach and decided to stalk a sow.

"The bear was feeding along the edge of the water in the bay," he said. "We worked our way into position. I located a spot about 60 yards from the bear where Bob confirmed he would feel comfortable as my backup. He carried a .338 caliber rifle in case something happened.

Lindsey moved slowly down to the shoreline to intercept the feeding bear.

"The only cover I could find was a log washed up from the bay.

"I had barely gotten set up behind the log when the bear began feeding straight for me. At 25 yards, the bear turned broadside.

"I came to full draw with my 85-pound pull Hoyt bow. I had to let off and redraw my bow twice as the bear kept feeding toward me. The third time I drew she stayed in a quartering away position as my arrow found its mark at 15 steps away.

"The fearsome, roaring growl from her instantly reminded me what kind of an animal I had just stuck with an arrow."

The arrow struck high on a downward trajectory, passing through the lung and burying deep into the outside shoulder bone.

"After the bear spun around twice and bit the arrow out, she looked my way," said Lindsey.

"I slowly put down my bow and laid face down on the ground

behind the log. "At this point, I could only see part of the bear's hump over the log.

"As I lay there thinking, 'this is not happening to me', I saw the hump getting larger and larger."

Then Lindsey said he could see the head and saw that the bear was coming straight for him.

"I knew my only chance was to stay still," he said, expecting a shot from the guide at any moment.

"The wounded bear came around the log and turned to look at me four feet away. Her head looked as big as a bus," he said.

Still, no shot came from the guide.

"The bear then walked up over my feet and put its nose down on my hip boot. She quickly drew her head away, making a loud woofing sound out of her nose like she had just got a whiff of the most disgusting smell she had ever smelled," he said.

Then began what Lindsey described as the scariest time of the entire experience when the bear stepped around behind him and was out of sight.

He said his entire body was rigid as he anticipated an attack from the bear. He could see blood on the grass where the bear had been standing over him.

"As I looked at it, I thought my own blood would soon be mixed with it," he said.

He turned his head around slowly to see the bear and then put it back down when he saw the bear still standing there.

In what was probably minutes, but seemed like hours, he looked again and saw only the guide.

"There is no way to describe the relief I felt when I turned and saw Bob was still there," he said. They followed the bear for about 50 yards and watched her fall, more than 300 yards from where he had first struck her.

Lindsey said he immediately asked the guide why he hadn't fired a shot.

"Bob assured me he had the cross hairs of his scope on her the whole time," said Lindsey. "He said he made the decision not to shoot because she never laid her ears back or gave any other signs of being aggressive."

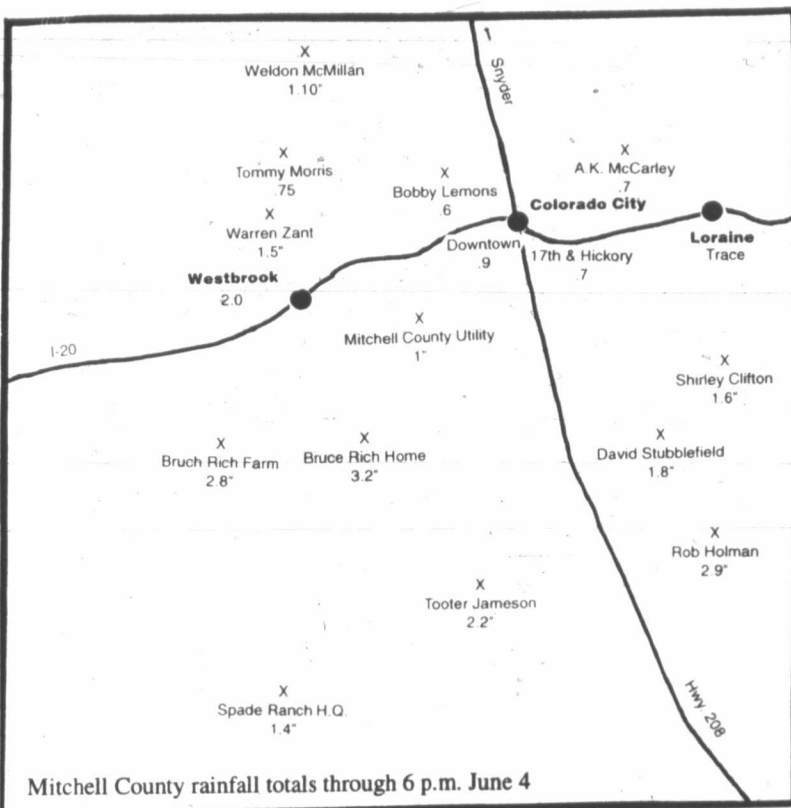
The guide told Lindsey he was afraid that if he shot the bear that close, it could have triggered a violent attack.

"Besides," the guide told him, "I didn't want to shoot your bear."

The local businessman, a self-described adventure junky, said it was an experience of a lifetime.

The recent case of muddy water throughout the system occurred when a check valve went out at the filter plant.

"The pumps cut off about three o'clock in the morning," he said. "We have no one out there from midnight until six or seven o'clock in the morning."

"When the operators got out there and found the check valves were open, they had to drain all the water back from all the towers, going back into the reservoir. "So, when you reverse the flow, you're going to stir that mud up," said Hemphill.

Although the muddy water is not pleasant to look at, it's not a health hazard, he said.

The city's new water filter plant is expected to be in operation in two months.

Vacant house fire is under investigation

The cause of a fire at a vacant house Friday morning is under investigation, said Fire Marshal Billy Ray Williamson.

A fire was reported at 7:24 a.m. Friday morning at 137 Austin Street.

The inside of the unoccupied house was destroyed in the blaze.

"We'll be monitoring every hour of the day, so we'll know exactly how much water we're actually using."

Amanda graduated at the top of her class with a 4.3 grade point average.



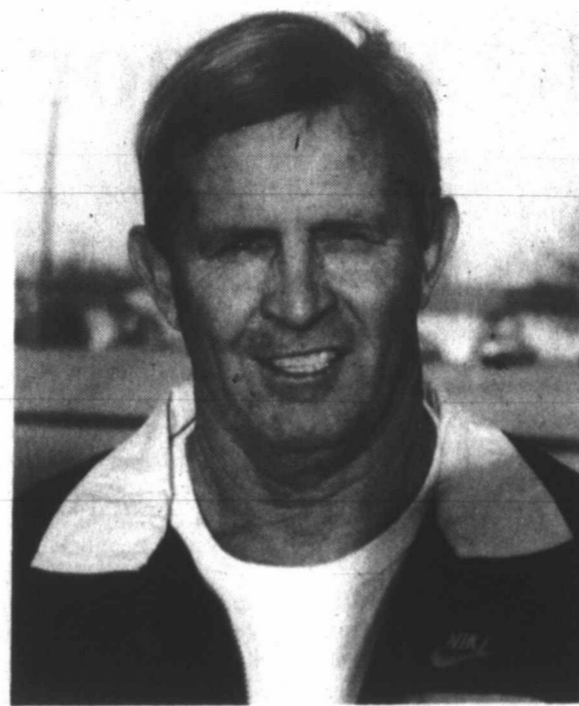

One coach from each division, 1-A through 5-A, received that honor.

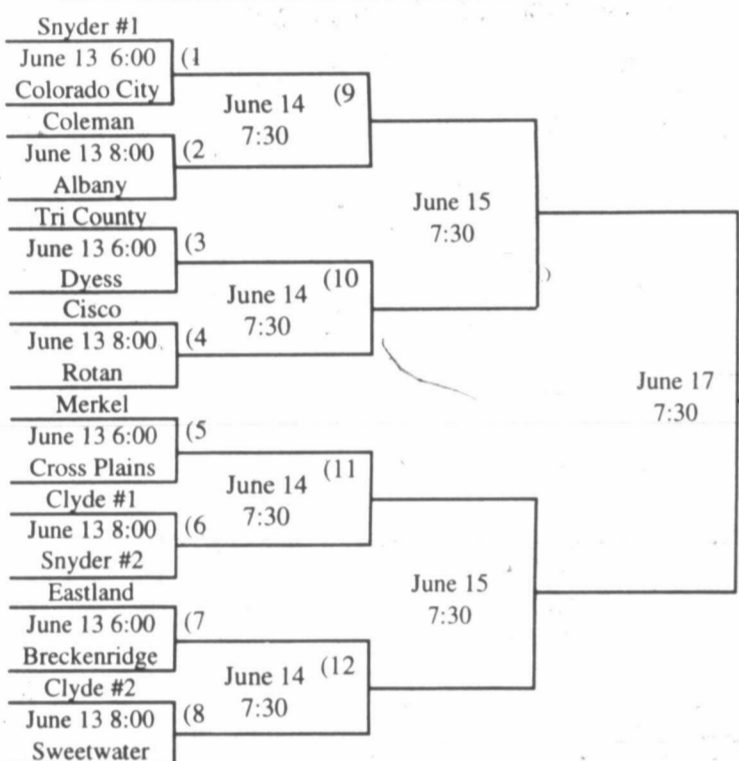
Now Grissom will compete with four of the other coaches from the other divisions to decide the overall coach of the year.

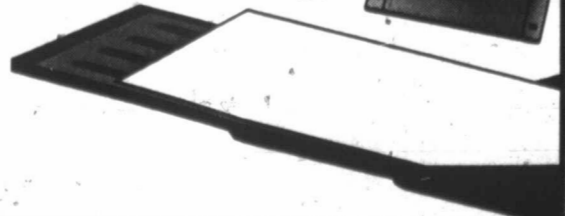
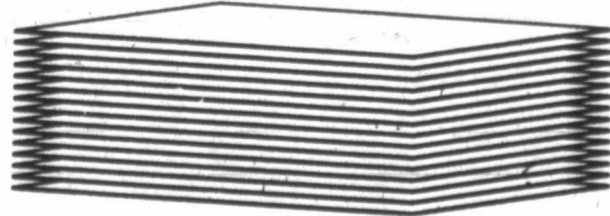

Texas Tomorrow Fund

Next enrollment announced

John Sharp, State Comptroller of Public Accounts, has announced that the next enrollment period for the Texas Tomorrow Fund will open on Monday, November 18, 1996 and run through Monday, February 17, 1997.

The Texas Tomorrow Fund is the state's innovative program that allows families to lock in the costs of their children's future college tuition at today's prices.

"Shrewd shoppers know that early summer is the time to plan for the end-of-the-year holiday season," Sharp said. "Now they have another option to add to their gift giving lists—much of the cost of a college education with the Texas Tomorrow Fund."

The program's second enrollment period was approved by the Texas Prepaid Higher Education Tuition Board at its quarterly meeting in Austin.

The debut enrollment period for the Texas Tomorrow Fund opened on January 2 and closed on April 1. More than 41,000 contracts were purchased with an estimated total of \$372 million.

Sharp said 81 percent of the initial contracts purchased were for the senior college plan, which covers tuition and required fees for up to 120 credit hours at any public senior college or university in Texas. Another 12 percent was for the junior-senior college

plan, covering up to 64 credit hours at a public junior or technical college, plus up to 60 credit hours at a public senior college or university, for a total of 124 credit hours.

Five percent of the contracts purchased were for the junior college plan, which pays for up to 64 credit hours of tuition and required fees at a public junior or technical college, and two percent were for the private college plan, covering the average cost of tuition and required fees for up to 120 credit hours at any of the state's private colleges and universities.

Sharp said that the most popular of the four available payment options for contracts purchased during the initial enrollment period, was the monthly installment plan until graduation, with more than 44 percent of purchasers signing up for this plan. The lump sum payment option was chosen by 23 percent of those who bought contracts. The five-year monthly installment payment was chosen by 17 percent of purchasers, and nearly 16 percent chose the 10-year monthly payment plan.

In addition, about one fifth of all contracts purchased were changed from one plan to another.

"Some parents realized that after taxes, there was more money left to spend on their

children's education than originally planned," Sharp said. "As a result, they changed their payment plans and contract options from one to another—proof that the flexibility built into the Texas Tomorrow Fund works."

The prepaid college tuition plan, first proposed by Sharp in 1994, is considered one of the largest and most flexible plans in the country.

Sharp said that although the program isn't currently accepting registration applications, his special toll-free 1-800-445-GRAD hotline is still taking approximately 200 calls a day from families who want more information about the Texas Tomorrow Fund.

Inch of rain makes \$91 million impact

An inch of rain means about \$91 million in market value for corn, wheat, grain sorghum and cotton grown on 15 southern Panhandle and northern South Plains counties, said Carmon McCain, information/education director for the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District.

Using a multiplier effect, the overall economic impact of one inch of rain translates to \$318 million for the region.

Those dollar amounts resulted from data collected by the water district and Dr. Leon New, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, who looked at the average crop production per acre-inch of irrigation water, McCain said.

An inch of rainfall equals 27,154 gallons (a layer of water one inch deep over one acre), or acre inch of water, he said.

With each inch, the value of corn increases by \$26.50 per acre, an increase of 700 pounds, or about 12 bushels.

That inch of rain generates an extra 10 bushels of wheat, or \$25 per acre. Grain sorghum production increases by \$16.87 or 500 pounds. And cotton yield goes up by 100 pounds, or \$37.50.
