INDUCTION LAW CHANGES

—According to Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, deferments for students at commercial colleges or vocational schools will not be mandatory under new draft laws. Congress left this decision to local boards. They alone make the decision, based on the merits of each individual case.

Draft classifications will be changed to Class 2-A for those deferred because of civilian occupations other than agriculture jobs; and Class 2-S for students working toward a degree.

Schwartz says that local boards give serious consideration to students receiving at least 25 clock hours of instruction a week.

Deferment of students enrolled in graduate schools of medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine, osteopathy or optometry now is mandatory. However, they are subject to military service upon completion of schooling.

A student may be deferred as long as five years for a doctoral or professional degree or its equivalent.

OIL ALLOWABLE — State-wide oil allowable for August has been raised by the Railroad Commission to 54 per cent of potential.

This will permit an all-time record production of 4,186 barrels a day.

That will be some 345,000 barrels more than the previous record set on July 15 of this year.

A four-lane divided highway from Red River in Lamar County through Lamar, Red River, Titus, Camp, Upshur, Gregg and Rusk Counties and on to the Gulf is the proposition which delegates of the East Texas-Gulf Highway Association will present to the Texas Highway Commission in Austin on July 31. The purpose is to promote the use of 271 as a major north-south route. The association, formed after it was learned that the Indian Nation Turnpike out of Oklahoma would cross Red River above Paris, will hold its first official board meeting in Austin Sunday afternoon, July 30, prior to their appearance before the Commission.

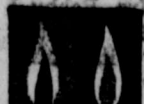

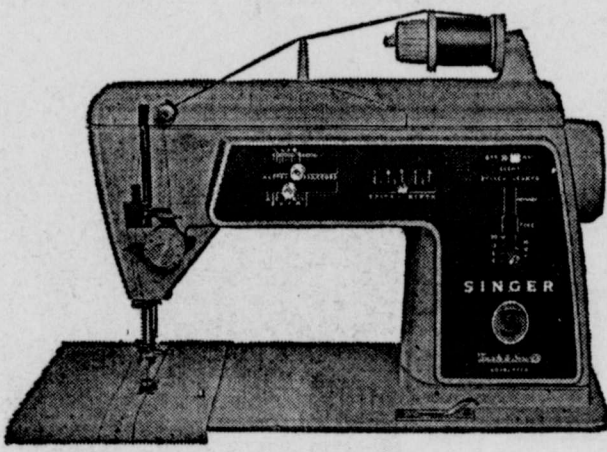

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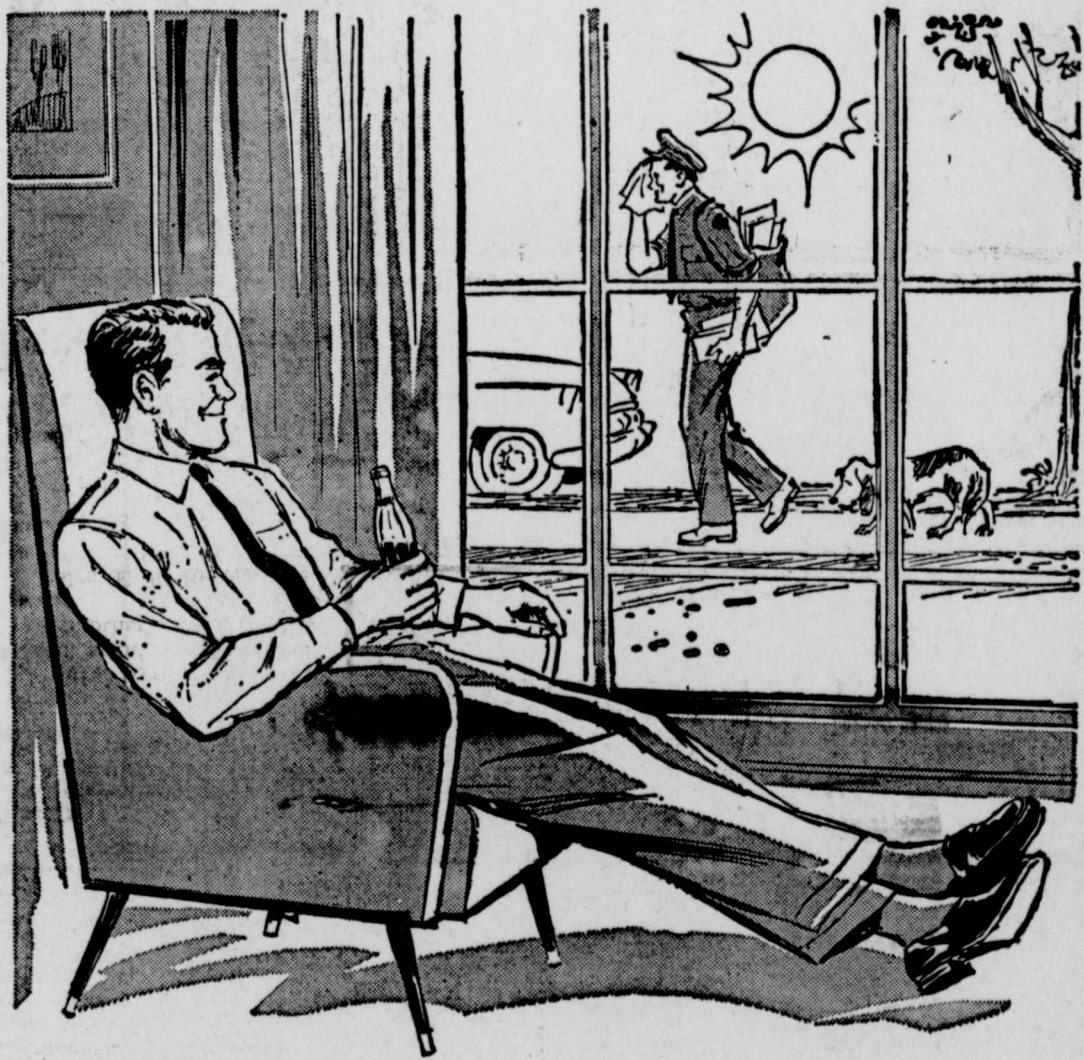
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
