Watch the paper next week for more about F. H. A. week which will start November 4, and continue through the 10th.

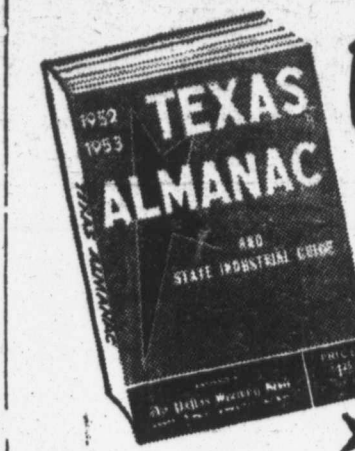

Mitchell County and Colorado City News

Last week Mrs. Leonardo Moralez of Colorado City was awarded \$10,000 when federal judge Whitfield Davidson ruled that her son had become totally disabled before his GI insurance lapsed.

Colorado City's newest entry in the entertainment field opened Tuesday night with about 1200 attending the opening performance, at the Lone Wolf Drive in east of Colorado City.

Colorado City's P. T. A. will sponsor a Fun Festival for the kiddies on October 30, as the major entertainment of the Halloween season, according to Mrs. Royce Mahon, PTA president. The program is set to open at six Tuesday evening with a chuck wagon supper, to which tickets are on sale. The festival is to be held in the new Wolf Stadium, weather permitting, and if not there, will be presented in the new elementary school.

The undefeated Anson Tigers invaded the lair of the Colorado City Wolves Friday night for the 5AA conference opener and came away still undefeated. The hapless Wolf pack which has been unable to score for two games, made it three in a row and the Tigers won 27 to 0.

Petty thieves broke into the Methodist Church Sunday night and ate a watermelon, drank soda pop, ransacked the pastor's and secretary's office and left.

At the Home Furniture Store persons unknown removed a cigar box from the office safe, containing two checks and a money order and less than a dollar in change. Early in the week a civil case was completed in District Court. The suit concerned the adding of new provisions to the will probated in the estate of J. C. Hooker. A letter was offered in the case tending to change present property arrangements. The question before the jury was whether the letter was written prior to the will or after. The decision of the jury headed by J. W. Randle, was that the letter was a prior instrument and the present arrangements were not changed.

There has been almost as much economic progress in Texas during the last ten years as in all preceding history, according to data in the 1952-53 edition of the Texas Almanac which has just been issued by The Dallas Morning News.

Highest percentage of gain was scored by the manufacturing industry which more than doubled during the last decade, as measured in employment and volume of physical production. The number working in Texas manufacturing plants increased from 163,978 in April, 1949, to 449,800 in June, 1951. All classifications of industry showed gains, but especially notable were developments of the chemical, aviation, and iron and steel industries.

Retail stores of the state now do approximately seven billion dollars of business annually as compared with \$1, 803,716,000 in 1939. This leaves a wide margin of increase in turnover of goods after allowing for price inflation.

These changes have been accompanied by an increase of 20.2 per cent in the total population, 1949-1950, and with an increase of 66.2 per cent in urban population. The great shift of rural to urban population consisted primarily of removal of tenant farmers to industrial centers.

Figures presented in the new Texas Almanac show comparable gains in civic, educational and cultural activities. Changes in the public school system after two years under the Gilmer-Alkin act are presented, including tables giving data on all independent and common school districts.

About 10,000 subjects are covered in the new volume, including Texas history, population, government, politics and elections, natural resources, weather crops and livestock, industries, trade, transportation, finance, commercial services, recreation and athletics. A pronunciation guide to names of Texas counties, cities and towns is included. The new state senatorial and representatives districts are shown.

All articles and maps for the 254 Texas counties have been revised to include new highways and other developments. A large folded map gives detail in four colors, including highways and railroads.
