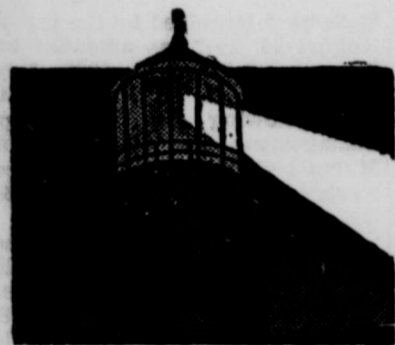

Virgil Bell Lasater, 54, former Andrews County judge, was found shot to death near Andrews in a hunting accident Friday. Peace Justice Owen Doggett ruled death from accidental shooting.

Sheriff J. H. Gregory said Lasater apparently laid his gun on the ground to climb through a barbed wire fence and it accidentally discharged, wounding him in the chest.

He was county judge from 1955 to 1962.

Funeral services were held in Andrews Sunday afternoon.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Don Lasater of Hobbs, N.M., and two grandchildren.
