## POULTRY HINTS

The feeding of milk will help in the size and quality of egg. Eggs should never be washed—washing spoils their keeping qualities. Poultry meat has never been so low in price as to be unprofitable. Cut your flocks closely and cash in. Quit feeding the non-producers. Poultry keepers who have used the all-mash method of feeding chicks and growing pullets may continue the method for laying pullets. One of the advantages of the shed roof type of poultry houses is that it is easier to keep warm. Any room with a high ceiling is likely to be drafty. Tankage or sour milk must be fed if eggs are to be produced in satisfactory quantities. Too many hens are not laying simply because the farmer will not help them lay. Electric lights may be used to advantage. A warm, moist mash fed in the evening, especially in cold weather may prove beneficial.

## Texas And Texans

Escape Gas Tax Payments  
State Comptroller Terrell says that between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000 that should accrue to the State Highway Department has been lost. The State officers because the Comptroller's Department hasn't a sufficient force to check up on dealers over the state. He states that all the large companies pay the tax but that many small dealers do not, and that these tax evaders may be found in nearly every large city. The State Legislature provided for four additional men for this work, but Mr. Terrell says the force is insufficient. In most counties the tax collectors have little to do most of the year and it seems there might be some legislative provision for county collectors or county auditors to look after so important an item of State revenue.

## From Field to Home

A modern cotton gin is to be the next equipment added to the farm of the Texas Technological College at Lubbock. When this is done, Texas Technological students may study the process of cotton from the planting of the seed to its final use in the home by way of the school of agriculture, the textile mill and the home economy school. The college may give complete education in growth, the manufacture and the use of cotton.

## Fertilizing pays

Bob Hicc, who lives in Eastland County, is showing his neighbors how to farm. Last year he applied a mixture of 100 pounds of acid phosphate and fifty pounds of nitrate of soda to the acre of peanuts on nineteen acres at a cost of \$25.5 an acre. From this land he harvested forty bushels of peanuts to the acre, while an acre left in the middle of the tract unfertilized made only 24 bushels. On still another acre, on which fertilizer had been used two years in succession he harvested fifty-two bushels. Hicc's neighbors have gone into a pool to buy fertilizer this year.

## SMALL FLOCK OF SHEEP FOUND TO BE PROFITABLE

The live stock requirements of no corn belt farm are complete without at least a small flock of sheep, preferably breeding ewes. There is no other animal that a farmer can own that will make use of as much feed that otherwise would go to waste, and no hired man who will mow weeds as cheerfully or as thoroughly as will the sheep. A great many farmers complain that their fenses are not arranged for handling sheep, but in the main this excuse is largely imaginary. Of course in order to handle a large flock it is necessary to have good pastures, but for an average farmer who creates 80 to 100 acres, the keeping of from 10 to 15 ewes requires nothing more than the ordinary barn lots, doors and orchard fences. Barring a light-kept appetite for rose bushes and other shrubbery around the yard, sheep make by far the most profitable and consistent lawn mower imaginable for yards either large or small. Shrubby of course may be protected by wire netting drawn about it, or by movable frames which may be shifted into position when it is desired to "mow" the lawn. The flock may be moved about the place from day to day as desired, and lots may be cleaned up of noxious weeds that other stock will not eat. When the potato vines begin to die down the flock may be turned into the patch to clean up the careless weeds and foxtail which nearly always spring up after cultivation ceases, thus doing away with the necessity of having to mow and rake the patch before digging the spuds.

Dr. Cross made the statement that he found the children in that particular school were in better condition than the children in the city schools. Dr. Ater made an interesting talk on the growth and care of the teeth. He also offered a prize for the boy and girl making the best drawing to exemplify a section of a tooth.

PLANS WORKED OUT FOR NEW TEXAS LIBRARY  
Details for the plans for the extension of the University of Texas Library building have been practically worked out, according to E. W. Winkler, Librarian of the University. The general plans were approved some time ago by the Board of Regents of the University. The cost of the planned expansion of the Library building will be approximately \$600,000 and when finished the Library will be about four times as large as the present building.

It was from this institution that I received my first teacher's certificate. The rest of my college work was done at the West Texas State Teacher's College at Canyon, Texas.

The school year of 1924-25 found me a candidate for a Bachelor of Science Degree. June 4, 1925, I was granted this degree, together with a permanent certificate.

June 5, 1925, I moved into the teachership at YL where I am now serving my third term as school superintendent.

I give the above information in order that the voters, if they so desire, can make an investigation of my entire life.

I feel that my education and experience in dealing with the public qualifies me to fill the office of County Judge and School Superintendent efficiently. 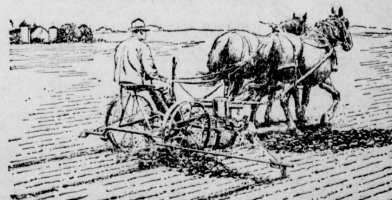

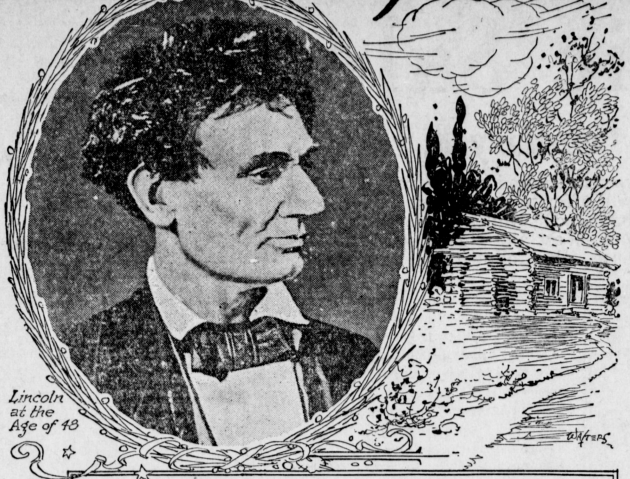

**POULTRY RAISERS**

**GROUND WHEAT IS GOOD FOR LAYERS**

Poultrymen with home-grown wheat can often use ground wheat in the laying mash with good results. It saves buying both bran and middlings. The best results come from substituting 150 pounds of ground wheat and 50 pounds of bran for the 100 pounds of bran, plus 100 pounds of middlings. A good home grown laying mash can be made of 100 pounds of ground corn, 100 pounds of ground oats, 150 pounds of ground wheat, 50 pounds of bran, and 100 pounds of meat scrap.

When plenty of skim milk or butter-milk is available, the amount of meat scrap in the mash can be reduced one half. In that way the farmer raising wheat, corn, oats and milk, can make up 500 pounds of laying mash by purchasing 50 pounds of meat scrap and 50 pounds of bran.

The home-grown mash is greatly improved by adding minerals in the form of 2 per cent ground limestone, 2 per cent bone meal, and 1 per cent table salt.

The use of minerals tends to improve the strength and quality of the egg shells, thus avoiding the egg-eating habit in the flock, as well as the production of soft-shelled eggs. Some poultrymen believe that more minerals and less meat scrap will be the tendency in making egg mashes within a few years. Their cost per pound is so small, considering their value, that they should not be omitted from the home-made mashes.

**DAIRY NEWS**

Give the good dairy cow a rest of from six to eight weeks before fresh-ening for it will mean more production than if she is milked up until she freshens, declares Burt Oderick, extension dairyman at Iowa State College.

Through selection, feeding and breeding, Iowa's most progressive dairymen have developed high producing herds in which there are many cows that will milk continually throughout the year from one fresh-ening to the next without a rest, unless their owners see to it that they get a rest.

The profitable cow of the future will be one that produces 300 pounds or more of butter fat in 10 to 12 months, takes six to eight weeks rest so build up her body for the next lactation, and drops a good calf each year. A cow that will continue such a program year in and year out will prove most profitable.

Cows bred so as to freshen in the fall, when properly fed, will milk heavily through the winter and when put on grass, will continue satisfactorily until hot weather arrives.

They will then naturally go down in production and may be dried up. If there is difficulty in drying up a cow before she is to freshen up, she should be taken away from grass and not allowed to eat any other succulent feed for a time. She may be milked only once a day for a while and other milkings skipped later on.

The feed given good dry cows before freshening will be well paid for when the cow freshens. Hence feed the dry cow so as to get her in good condition.

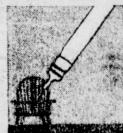

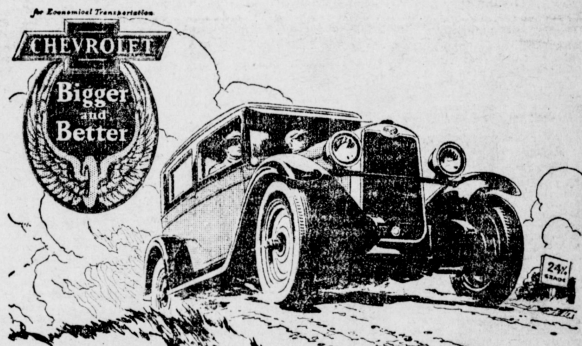
