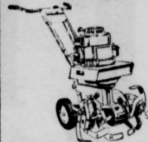

Onions and other strong smelling foods or beverage have no effect on the newly approved breath test which scientifically measures the amount of alcohol in a driver's blood.

The Texas Safety Association says only the amount of alcohol present in the blood is shown by the test thus helping to tell the difference between drunk and sober drivers.

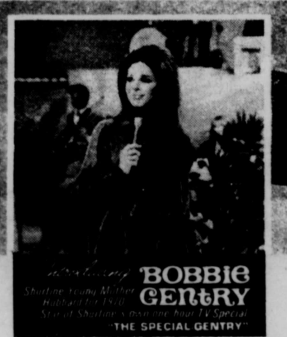
