Douglas Smith of Colorado City was the winner in the Colorado City RECORD Jackpot Football Contest this past week, missing only four of the 26 games.

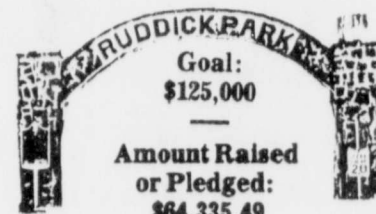
Smith wins \$50 for his efforts since it was homecoming week for Colorado City.

Physician applies for staff privileges

The Mitchell County Hospital District board of directors left their meeting Tuesday night with smiles on their faces after Root Memorial Hospital Administrator Ray Mason told them that a physician has agreed to move his practice to Colorado City.

Mason said that Dr. Joseph Mullinaux, M.D., 64, of Mason will be here Thursday to meet with hospital staff and administrators to finalize his application for staff privileges at the hospital.

Mason said Mullinaux is presently a family practitioner in Mason, employed by a physician's group.

Mason said that Mullinaux has visited Colorado City and met with hospital personnel.

Mason further explained that Mullinaux was for many years a family practitioner in Colorado, but that after joining the physician's group was sent to Mason where he has not been happy.

Mason said he has already

checked Mullinaux's credentials and they "appear to be super." He anticipates no problem in the medical staff's approval of Mullinaux's application.

Mullinaux has indicated he can begin his practice within the next couple of weeks. He will share office space with Dr. Rod Caldwell at the hospital district-owned medical clinic on Chestnut Street.

In other business Tuesday, the hospital board approved the budget for 1985-86 as well as the budget for the Home Health Care Agency which should be in operation within the next few weeks.

The hospital district budget calls for tax collections of \$1,184,125 and net patient revenues of \$2,445,975. The hospital district should reach a break-even point next year, said Assistant Administrator Richard Murphy. The home health care program will be operating on a \$183,000 budget.

Following the budget approval, the board opened and accepted the only bid submitted

for insurance for the coming fiscal year.

Colorado City insurance agent Bob Ratliff submitted the bid, which is about \$25,000 higher than what insurance premiums cost this current year.

Ratliff said that workmen's compensation is about 30 percent higher as of October 1 and that hospital professional liability is about \$10,000 more than the current year.

At the beginning of the meeting during the regular hospital financial report presented by Murphy, it was noted that the total net loss for August was \$239,629, but the adjusted loss for August is \$82,147.

Murphy explained that operating revenues for the 11 months are \$781,969 below budget and \$1,535,687 below last year. Admissions are 719 patients under target.

"This has not been a good year financially," said Murphy, "but we have pulled ourselves out of a big hole and everything points to

"Deathtrap" requires a cast of three men and two women. Sydney Bruhl, a fading playwright in his early 50s is the focal character. He is married to Myra, a devoted, gentle woman in her early 40s whose health is diminishing.

The fourth Annual Bake-Off sponsored by the Colorado City RECORD will get under way this Saturday at the annual Mitchell County Fair.

Entries will be received starting at 2 p.m. and judging will begin at 5 p.m. An auction will follow at 7:30 p.m. for all entrants who would like to donate their items. The proceeds will go to the Ruddick Pool and Park Fund. Those who do not wish to donate their baked good need to be there in person to pick up their entries after judges have announced the winners. If the item is not picked up, it will be auctioned off.

Sheila Plagens, chairperson suggests that all "entries are to be on disposable plates and the recipe must accompany it."

There will be five divisions

consisting of cakes, pies, cookies, breads and candies. Grand prize winners will receive, first place, recliner, \$429 value; second place, 13 inch color TV; third place, \$150 worth of groceries from E-Z Way; fourth place, portable stereo from White's Auto; and fifth place will be \$75 worth of groceries from Fuller's. Previous grand prize recipe entries will not be eligible.

Five additional prizes are to be given away in each category: first place, \$25 cash; second place, \$15 worth of groceries from Safeway; third place, \$12 worth of cleaning from Better Cleaners; fourth place, sewing basket from Perry's; fifth place, portable phone.

New this year will be a men's and youth's divisions. Men will be permitted to enter cakes only and youths will consist of cookies and will need to bake at least

two dozen. Men's prizes will include, first place, \$50 cash; second place, \$30 cash; third place, \$20 cash. Prizes in the youth division are first place, \$50 cash; second place, \$30 cash and third place, \$20 cash.

C-City man charged in car theft

A 19-year-old Colorado City man was charged with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle on September 18 following a short chase with police officers.

Colorado City Police Chief Bobby Sparks said that Henry Garcia was charged with the offense after Macca Findley, 145 East 14th, reported earlier the same day that his 1985 Oldsmobile Cutlass had been taken from his residence.

Shortly after the theft was reported police officers spotted the vehicle and a short chase ensued, said Sparks. The subject jumped out of the car in the 1300 block of Oak Street and officers noted that the subject was carrying a pistol. The subject ran through several backyards in

the neighborhood before surrendering without incident.

Sparks said the pistol, a Ruger 357 magnum, had been fired once, but apparently not at the officers. The pistol had been in the trunk of the car when it was taken, said Sparks.

Sparks reports that the police department has been busy during the past few weeks with a number of arrests recorded for various offenses.

better times. Revenue regaining appears to be our biggest obstacle and I know we can do it this next year."

Although revenues have declined over the past 11 months, so have expenses, said Murphy who noted that operating expenses are below budget by \$223,709 for the 11 months of operation and \$491,403 below last year. Labor is 9.9 percent under.

supplies are 21.2 percent under and other expenses are 6.5 percent over for an overall 7.7 percent under, he explained.

"August is generally not a good month for revenues nor is it a month when expenses fall," said Murphy. "It seems that August and September are always the months to replenish the supplies and other expenses. Expenses seem to always go up

in July, August and September."

The board asked Mason to further investigate the possibility of having an evaluation or overall survey of the hospital done. Mason said he had contacted the Texas Hospital Association which would charge \$3,900 for the survey which would take from 8-12 weeks to complete.

The board at a previous meeting indicated that such a survey might result in cost cutting measures.

In other business, Root Valley Lodge Administrator Marsha Rickard reported on new regulations that took effect September 1 regarding nursing homes in Texas. She noted that nursing homes are the most regulated agency in the United States, but that the new regulations are nothing that should concern the local facility.

Kirk named

Governor Mark White has appointed 32nd District Judge Weldon Kirk to preside over the Seventh Administrative Judicial Region of Texas.

Kirk will remain as 32nd District Judge, but will take on the new duties which include assigning judges within the region to sit in the place of district judges who are unable to preside over a case for one reason or another.

Kirk will be in charge of a 39-county region which has 24 district judges as well as 19 other retired or former judges who can be called upon to sit in.

Once a year, the Chief Justice of the Texas Supreme Court meets with each of the judges from the nine regions to make administrative rules and to try to increase the flow of cases in the court system.

"I consider it a privilege and a big challenge," to be appointed to the position, said Kirk Tuesday.

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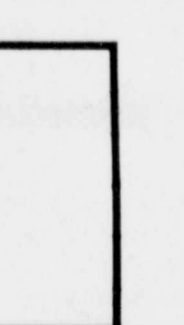

Normal Among The Elderly

The number 98.6 is indelibly etched in most people's minds as one's "Normal" temperature in degrees Fahrenheit. However, there was a recent study at the University of New Mexico's College of Nursing. Its purpose was to determine the normal temperature among a group of healthy adults group between the ages of 65 to 90. The study revealed an average temperature of 97.7 degrees, substantially below the old standby norm of 98.6. It is important for elders to realize that they have lower body temperatures than the general population. A temperature elevation of 98.6 or above, particularly in those over 75, should raise suspicion of fever. It should prompt a search for the underlying causes.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is cooperating with the Internal Revenue Service in offering 39 Tax Practitioner Workshops across the state.

Twenty-five general workshops will be held in all major Texas cities. The general workshop nearest Mitchell County is in San Angelo, on November 21-22. There will also be 14 advanced workshops offered in major cities. The general tax workshops will concentrate mostly on personal taxes—the advanced workshops' emphasis will be on business tax problems.

In addition to the general and advanced tax workshops, there

will be three partnership workshops, six oil and gas tax workshops, and—new this year—three workshops dealing with IRS-taxpayer disputes. Four estate planning and tax form preparation workshops especially developed for accountants will be offered in November.

The tax practitioner educational program has been highly successful. Last year about 3,200 people participated in this statewide series. These practitioners reported filing more than 535,000 tax returns. For additional information, please contact Mitchell County Extension Office, 728-3111, Courthouse Annex for a brochure explaining more about the program and registration information.

Lockhart was born in West Virginia. His parents and grandparents were members of the church. He began preaching at the age of 15. While a student at Freed-Hardeman College, he met Carolyn Randolph of Kentucky, whom he married. He received his B.A. degree from Abilene Christian University, and his M.A. degree from Eastern New Mexico University.

The Lockharts lived in West Texas for 22 years. He preached in San Angelo for 15 years and

during that time the church built a colonial style auditorium that seats 1,400. They moved to Skillman Avenue in Dallas in 1971, and then to Westbury in Houston in 1977. In May, 1978, the Westbury church gave \$1.2 million to build a family center, which was built in 1979 and added 80,000 square feet of space to their facilities.

Lockhart has preached over radio for many years, and had a weekly television program for 21 years.

He has served as president of the Family Counseling Service, is a board member of Abilene Christian University, and has participated on numerous Christian college lectureships. He has conducted gospel meetings from

California to North Carolina. He preached for the army retreat in Berchtesgaden, Germany. The Lockharts conduct a marriage seminar, "Power Ideas for a Happier Home."

Lockhart is a staff writer for "Christian Family" magazine. He is the author of a new book, "Fragile Moments."

CHS Wolves working on weak spots for Friday

Colorado High School head football coach Tom Ramsey and the Wolves, now 2-1 after three weeks of competing against 3-AAA South Plains teams, have a "motto" for tomorrow's clash at Abilene Wylie.

"It's their Homecoming," said Ramsey. "We messed up one Homecoming last week and we're going to see if we can mess up another one this week."

The Homecoming the Wolves "messed up" last week was their own. After season opening

victories over Slaton and Seminole, the Pack fell to the Denver City Mustangs in front of a packed home crowd of rain-soaked exes.

"It was our worst performance of the year," said Ramsey. "We did not play at all."

"I feel it's behind us. Whether you win or lose, come Monday, you have to forget it. You can't dwell on a victory or defeat."

Where did the Wolves break down?

"We made them look pretty good. We stood around offensively and defensively."

"The offense had scoring op-

portunities all night long. We just seemed to stop ourselves. I don't think Denver City ever really stopped us."

Although Colorado City ball handlers continue to get hit in the backfield, coach Ramsey said, "I feel our line is progressing."

"The five guys are playing good, but one can cost you a tackle. We had some breakdowns. It was not always the same one missing the block. The backs didn't pick up the blitz a couple of times and that makes the line look bad."

"Cody Stice not being in there hurt us too."

Stice, a 185 pound senior line-man has a neck injury, but "will be back Friday."

"We did have some individuals that performed pretty good."

"Albert Rivera (middle line-backer) had 18 tackles," but, said Ramsey, "when you have one with 18 tackles, that means he's not getting a lot of help."

Edwardo Melendez was in on nine tackles and Mike Ligon eight while Robert Lemons and Raymond Martinez had seven assisted tackles.

"They did exactly what we expected and what we worked on," said Ramsey.

"With Denver City coming in here 0-2, I don't know if they took them too seriously or not."

"We're learning valuable lessons. They're costly. We could be 3-0 very easily. I rate them (Denver City) third behind Seminole and Slaton."

This week "it's over and it's up a new hill," said Ramsey.

Abilene Wylie, who the Wolves twice defeated last year, (34-13 in the regular season and 20-12 in the area championship), is 2-1 after a season opening win over Seymour, followed by a loss to Ballinger and last week's big thumping of AA Jim Ned.

"They're more balanced and play better defense," said Ramsey.

They dominated Ballinger the first half, but Ballinger came out in the second half and played like the Ballinger of old.

"Jim Ned's not a world beater and Wylie played good. They're very similar to last year. They run sweeps, run the Power I and throw the ball."

Gone is quarterback Bobby Lilljedahl, who was given All-State recognition, but "they definitely throw it" and will on first downs.

In last week's contest against Jim Ned, quarterback Justin

Reeves pitched 13 times each to Jeff LaFrance and Mark Redwine, who gained 127 and 117 yards respectively enroute to a 35-0 halftime lead and 29 first downs.

"I guess they want us for Homecoming because they think we'll be easy."

Ramsey said the Wolves will experiment against the Bulldogs.

"We're going to try to have no sophomores going both ways." "We're going to get back to the one back set totally and utilize the four receivers."

Also in the cards for Colorado City is junior Terry Jackson, who is just now getting back from an injury sustained in an automobile accident over the summer.

"We'll work him in at receiver and secondary back. We could use him anywhere." Jackson ran with the ball for the JV last year.

Kickoff at Abilene is at 8 p.m.

"The whole team on the sideline was yelling at him to throw it. He didn't know what to do." "I wanted him to throw to Dell Haltom. He threw to Eddie Benitez and the secondary player did not move."

A third quarter blocked punt by Haltom resulted in a faked field goal that saw E. Benitez throw a 15 yard scoring strike to Haltom.

"We're still looking to do many more things offensively. We're not as far offensively as we should be—with the backs and linemen. At this time last year we were a little further along."

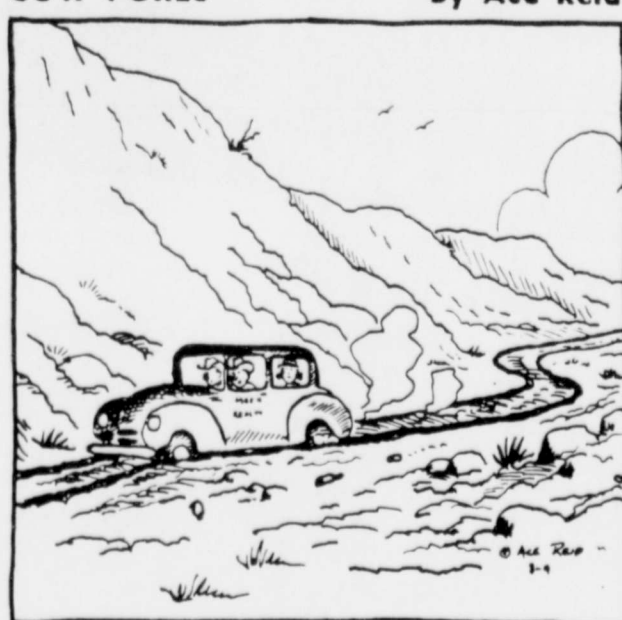

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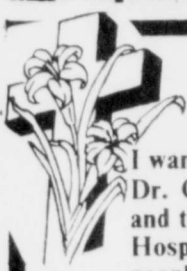
