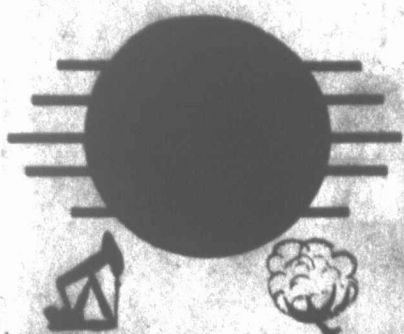

County OKs lease

Mitchell County Commissioners Monday approved a fire station lease contract with Colorado City in which the county will pay \$75,000 to lease space in the city's new fire station for storing rural fire fighting equipment.

The city is in the process of constructing the fire station on 11th Street. County Judge Bill Carter said once the fire station is completed, a lump sum payment of \$75,000 will be made to the city.

In other business, the commissioners studied, but took no action on, a proposed set of rules and regulations concerning sep-

tic tanks at lakes Colorado City and Champion.

Once approved, the regulations will concern all new septic tanks installed at the lakes and will require that an inspector be hired to oversee the program. The commissioners are expected to approve the regulations at their April 14 meeting.

Commissioners also agreed to place an advertisement in the RECORD listing new courthouse telephone numbers. The county recently installed a new telephone system which required changing the numbers of most of the county offices.

Hospital has revenue gain

A four-page summary comparing revenues and expenses at Mitchell County Hospital for the current fiscal year to the two previous fiscal years shows the hospital "trending back up" Richard Murphy, assistant administrator and comptroller told the board of directors Tuesday night.

"The summary shows that we're beginning to receive the revenue we lost in 1984-85," said Murphy.

He said for the fiscal year 1983-84, which he described as the last "good year" the hospital experienced financially, the hospital had an average monthly revenue of \$246,538.33 and average operating expenses per month of \$305,027.85 with an operational loss per month of \$58,489.52.

The fiscal year 1984-85 showed the average monthly revenue drop to \$139,623.01 and average operating expenses per month drop to \$245,773 for an operational loss of \$106,149.99 per month.

For the first five months of fiscal year 1985-86, the average monthly revenue has climbed to \$143,445.21 and expenses have dropped \$228,185.38 for an operational loss of \$84,740.12 per month.

Murphy said that salaries have decreased from \$150,000.53 per month in 1983-84 to \$124,532.46 per month this fiscal year. Supplies have dropped

from \$64,174.02 per month to \$35,470.37 while other expenses have dropped from \$90,793.20 to \$68,185.33 per month average.

Earlier, in his regular monthly financial report to the board, Murphy explained that the hospital had an operating loss of \$59,381 for the month, but explained that the loss was about "\$40,000 to \$60,000 better than in months prior" because of an increase in revenues for the month. Because of a \$250,000 transfer of tax money, the hospital actually showed a net income of \$183,185 for the month.

For the five months ending February 28, Murphy explained that inpatient revenues remained below budget by \$42,368, but that February's revenues exceeded budget by \$10,112. Outpatient revenues continue to fall below budget, now at 23 percent under he said. Overall patient revenues are \$80,092, 9.6 percent below budget.

Total operating revenues are under budget by \$61,224, (7.9 percent) but February's revenues exceeded budget by \$4,916. Current revenues are \$81,411 below last year's actual, said Murphy.

"Expenses for the five months continue to fall under budget by \$34,956 with labor 6.6 percent under, supplies 3.3 percent under and other expenses 4.3 percent over for an overall 3 percent under," said Murphy. "Current expenses are \$32,083 below

last year's actual."

Murphy said the financial picture at Valley Fair Lodge remains bright and that patient services revenues are just under

budget by \$2,679 (1.1 percent) for the five months. Current revenues are \$11,047 greater than last year. The lodge has a fiscal year to date operating loss of \$18,802 compared to the anti-

ipated amount of \$50,000. Last year's operating loss for the same period was \$40,397, said Murphy.

In other business, the board approved the quarterly report of the Home Health Advisory Committee and approved a recommendation to hire a part-time secretary and a full-time LVN because of the increased case load handled by the home health care facility.

Hospital administrator Ray Mason said that since October, when the program was initiated, the home health care staff has made 546 visits and said the program "cannot expand unless we get more help."

Presently the staff consists of two RNs, an LVN and an aide, said Mason. He said once Dr. Dee Roach begins his practice here this summer, another RN might be needed for the program which provides health care for patients in their homes.

Mason said he doesn't expect the program to be a big money-maker for the hospital, but added that he expects it to break even the first year.

The board also approved the recommendation of a committee report by board member Bob Reilly that hospital charges, other than for rooms, be raised 25 percent for all those other than Medicare and Medicaid patients.

Reilly said a survey showed that the local hospital room rates "are pretty well in line" with the rest of the state but that the charges for other costs are about "75 percent of what they could be." Reilly said the 25 percent increase would put the local hospital "more in line with state figures."

The board also reviewed deficiencies cited during the annual Medicare survey team conducted last week. Mason said a team of five inspectors from Lubbock spent two days at the hospital and found only minor deficiencies. "The survey team was extremely complimentary," said Mason.

The CHS production, directed by Carl Beery Moore, competed against five other 7-AAA schools Saturday in San Angelo and won the honor to advance to area competition along with Sonora's production of "A Doll's House." Coahoma was chosen as the alternate.

In addition to the play advancing to area, two of the CHS cast members, Yvonne Lujan and Staci Wood, were named to the all-star cast. Amy Beinbauer and James Woods were named to honorable mention all-star cast.

Members of the cast include Moises Molina as Poseidon, god of the sea; Yvonne Lujan as Hecuba, queen of Troy; Lisa Garner, Dee Shifflett, Dawn Filppo, Trisha Phillips and Melanie Aston as Trojan women; Don Hurt, Andrew Pineda, Moises Molina and James Mayberry as Greek soldiers; James Woods as Talithybus, herald of the

Greek army; Amy Beinbauer as Andromache, daughter-in-law of Hecuba; Blake Bingham as Menelaus, general of the Greek army; and Melanie Rees, as Helen, former wife of Menelaus. Technical director is Bhavesh Patel.

"The Trojan Women" was written by Euripides and takes place shortly after the last battle of the Trojan War outside the ruins of Troy.

Moore explains that the play is an anti-war statement written in

415 BC. The story describes what happens as the women of Troy are about to be taken by ship to Greece after the Greek army has either killed or chased away the Trojan men and boys.

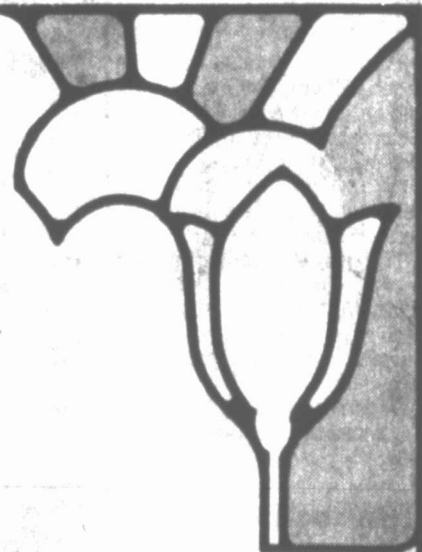
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Gardening Tips

(Q) We saved the seeds from some really good peaches. Can we grow trees from them?
(A) The answer to this question also applies to every other fruit and nut crop. While you can grow fruit and nut trees

from seeds, it's a poor investment of time, effort and space. Problem is: fruit and nut trees are hybrids. Their seed will not reproduce the variety you ate. There's a good chance that the seedling you get won't bear fruit for many years. When they finally do start bearing, the fruit may be of terrible quality. And, another drawback: you lose the special flavor of the parent tree. To keep the seeded varieties rootstock the seeded varieties have. It's better adapted to Texas soils. Seedlings don't have it.

Showing ability to pump 163 barrels of 25-gravity crude per day along with 23 barrels of water, the No. 1504 North Westbrook Unit has been completed in the Westbrook Field, Mitchell County, by Chevron U.S.A.

Drillate was in Chevron's 7,000-acre lease holding seven miles northwest of the Westbrook townsite.

Chevron bottomed the well at 3,197 feet and perforated for production in the Clear Fork Formation, 2,952 to 3,104 feet into the hole.

Tom Rasmussen has posted first production data for a newly completed well in the East Westbrook Field three miles northeast of the Westbrook townsite.

It is designated as the No. 11 Newby.

Tested on openchoke, it pumped 74 barrels of 25-gravity oil

daily. It bottomed at 3,345 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Clear Fork Formation, 2,838 to 3,213 feet into the wellbore.

Location has been stated for a 2,000-ft. developmental try in the Sharon Ridge Field four miles southeast of Cuthbert, Mitchell County.

The well is designated as the No. 4 Minatra "B," with William H. Zahone of Mattoon, Ill., as the operator. Location is in a 320-acre lease in the T&P Survey A-484.

The No. 1 Mary Foster has been brought on line in Mitchell County's portion of the East Howard Isan Field, nine miles southwest of Westbrook. Mobil Producing is the operator.

The well potentialized at 87 barrels of 25-gravity crude and 242 barrels of salt water daily,

pumping an open choke.

Mobil took the hole to a 3,400-ft. bottom and perforated the Clear Fork Formation for production at 2,829 to 3,254 feet into the wellbore.

Pumping 23 barrels of 25-gravity oil daily, the 2127 North Westbrook Unit has been completed in the Westbrook Field, Mitchell County, six miles northwest of Westbrook. Chevron U.S.A. is the operator.

Bottomed at 3,234 feet, the well was plugged back to 3,184

and will produce from Clear Fork perforations ranging from 2,944 to 3,123 feet into the wellbore.

Drilling operations have been concluded at the No. 4-17 E. T. Strain, a developmental well in Mitchell County's Sharon Ridge Field. Phillip Russell is the operator, with drillate in a 189-acre lease in the C. J. Reiger Survey, about 12 miles northwest of Colorado City. No details on drilling depth or potential shows have been divulged.

CHS track team ties for fourth

The young and ever improving Colorado High School boys track team tied for fourth at Sonora's Bronco Relays Friday where Guy Compton and Mike Ligon won first places for the Wolves.

"We had more in the finals than ever before," said coach Rick Robinson.

Compton, a sophomore who has gone 6'2", won the high jump with a leap of 5'10" and senior Mike Ligon, one of three Wolves to run in the 51's last year, won the 400 meter dash in a season best 51.77.

"Ligon won pretty easily," said Robinson.

Michael Swann won second in the 300 intermediate hurdles at 42.09 after running a 42.78 in the preliminaries and Terry Jackson, who ran a 53.6 in the prelims, took fifth in the 400 with

a 54.38.

Distance runner Ismael Silva came within five seconds of establishing a new CHS record in the 3200 meter run by taking second in the event at 10:18.00 and ran a sixth place 4:59.29 in the 1600.

The 400 meter relay team of Ligon, Jackson, Swann and Ralph Gonzales ran a season best 45.49 to take third in that event. Larry Mays and Gonzales took fourth and fifth in the 100 meter dash with times of 11.86 and 11.94 respectively. In the prelims, Mays had run an 11.86 and Gonzales an 11.82. Mays also won sixth in the 200 with a 24.70 after running a 24.2 in the prelims.

"Swann's looking to possibly get out of district," said Robinson. "He's getting better. Com-

ton and Jackson made the finals of the high hurdles. Marty Clec-kler improved again. He ran a 2:13 in the 800 and 5:11 in the 1600.

The lone point scored for the Wolves in the field events was Cory Flanagan's sixth place throw of 123'2" in the discus. "Stu Howell has gone 13' in the pole vault but he hurt his back Friday."

Coach Robinson was particularly pleased with the junior varsity team. "They're getting after it."

Robinson said a victory by the 400 meter team of Manuel Martinez, Mark Russell, Pat Ridge and Dennis Smith in 47.14 "set the tone for the rest of the team."

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following manuscript was written by the late Flora Bozeman prior to 1917 when she married John Brown. The story tells something of the early history of the Cuthbert area. Mrs. Brown was the sister of Mrs. Alice Coles of Colorado City. The Brown home was located at 532 Elm Street and was recently remodeled by the present owners, Mr. and Mrs. Randy Phillips.

A Few Firsts
By Flora Bozeman

My father, David T. Bozeman, came to Mitchell County in 1890, and purchased a claim which had already been lived out.

He taught the first rural school in the county - a little school house known as the Graves Creek School which stood south east of where Cuthbert now is. The school house was later moved to a lot which my father gave in the northeast corner of his pasture, and still later was moved a few miles eastward and became East Cuthbert or Fairview.

The Cuthbert Post Office was established in 1891. It had daily mail from the first because it was on a previously established Star Route extending from Colorado (City) to Lubbock. The mail was carried in hacks, drawn usually by little mules, which could stand the long drives better than horses could. A fresh team was kept in father's pasture, and the mail carrier changed teams each time he passed through Cuthbert. He was met at the river, far to the northwest of Cuthbert, by the carrier who started out from Lubbock each morning and their mail sacks were exchanged. Since there were no bridges on the river except the South Colorado Bridge, a small boat was kept at the crossing so that the exchange could be made by boat in times of high water.

The Post Office was kept in a corner one room of our dwelling house, and was cared for almost entirely by my mother, as father taught school all the winter months.

The counters, pigeon holes and etc. were handmade. Uncle Sam furnished fourth-class postmasters nothing and paid them only as much as the stamps they canceled.

The first telephone line extending out into the country from Colorado came to Cuthbert about 1901, extending on to the Bush and Tillar Ranch. Judge Coe also had a phone on this line which extended to Vincent, Ira and Westbrook as well as Colorado.

The first phonograph of which Cuthbert could boast was secured with tobacco tags which mother saved up for months.

Father never used tobacco in any form, but many of our neighbors chewed plug tobacco of various brands. When they came to the store to buy another plug, they took off the tags and put them into a small box kept for that purpose. Finally they got the required number - 2,000 I think was reached - and we were very happy to send for the phonograph. It was almost community property, you see - so we kept it in the store in the daytime, playing it for each customer that came in. It was very small, but I don't remember that any of us felt greatly disappointed in it. Later many of our neighbors got larger ones.

The first automobile which passed through Cuthbert created a great sensation. It could be heard for a mile and when it came to a stop in front of the

store, many of the horses had broken away from the hitching racks and the ones that were left were tightly held by their owners. All the men crowded around the car, asking the driver, a stranger, a lot of questions. A year or more later, Mr. Scott Green, who then owned a ranch at Vincent, bought a car, and one day Mrs. Green asked all of us children to go for a drive. I still remember the thrill of that first drive!

The church at Cuthbert was built in 1906. People from all the communities about helped with the building of it and rejoiced with Cuthbert and the pastor, Rev. M. Phelan, when it was dedicated in June.

As a last first, let me say that this is my first attempt at a paper for an "Original Manuscript Day."

Activity holds weight down

The average person gains 15-25 pounds between the ages of 25-50. Most of this weight is gained gradually, a pound or two a year.

The good news for people who like to eat is that this weight gain typically does not result from overeating.

The bad news for people who don't like to exercise, is that extra pounds most often result from our decreasing physical activity and lower calorie needs as we get older.

To maintain your weight, the calories you burn through physical activity has to equal the calories you consume. If you stick to certain eating habits, but become less and less active, those extra calories will be stored as fat.

So the key to losing those extra pounds is becoming more physically

active. That can be a tough problem for people who work at sedentary jobs, and don't have the time or money for exercise classes or equipment.

Added physical activity doesn't have to be time or money consuming. It can be as simple as taking a bike ride instead of watching television after dinner; parking your car at the far end of a parking lot so you will have to walk greater distance to the entrance, or

using hand powered tools instead of the more convenient power models.

Weight loss researchers agree that one of the best methods for increasing physical activity is to walk every day.

By walking for 30-40 minutes five times a week, you can raise your metabolic rate to more efficiently burn calories. Once a year that can add up to a weight loss of 10-20 pounds.

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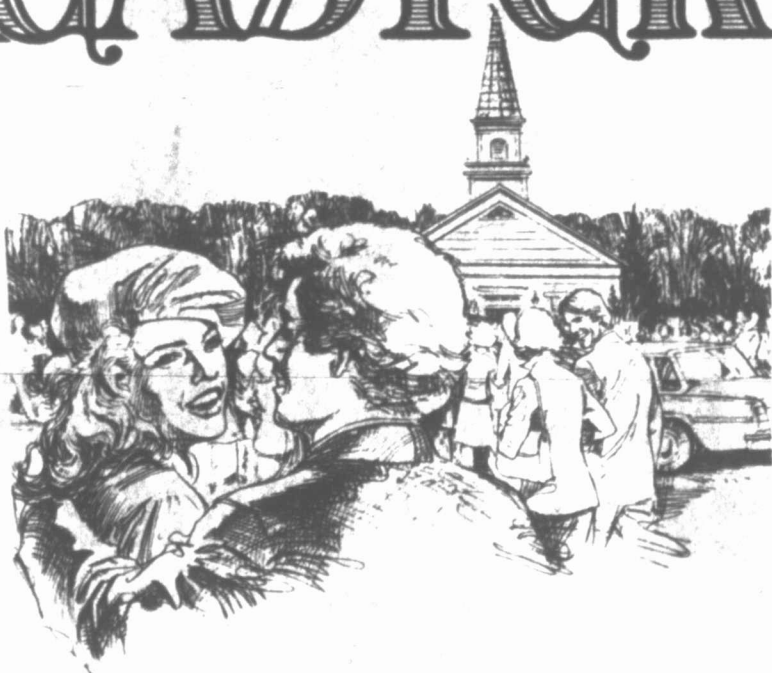
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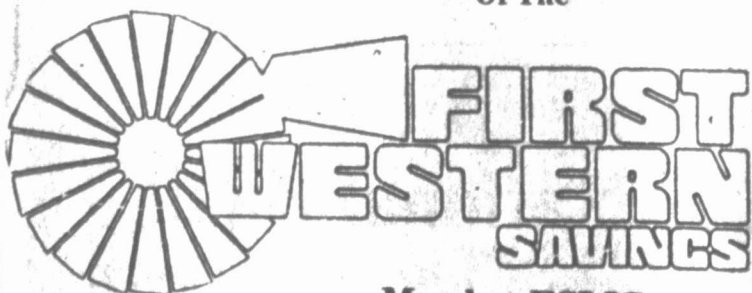

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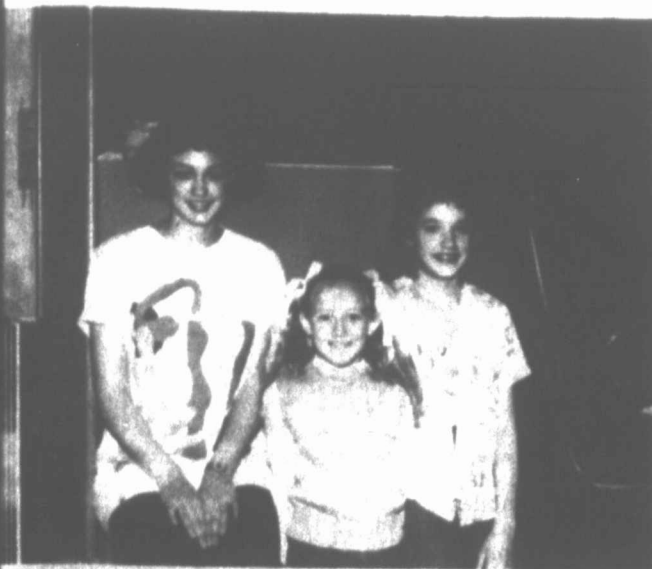

New ruling for oilfield approved

AUSTIN—Moving to protect more than half the state's producing oil wells from premature plugging and abandonment, the Railroad Commission approved an emergency rule change March 19 extending the required time period for plugging an inactive well from 90 days to one year.

Stripper wells, those producing 10 barrels a day or less, have come under increasing economic pressure as falling prices for a barrel of crude approach the costs of production. Out of 212,000 producing oil wells in Texas, 142,000 fall in the stripper category.

The Commission rule change will allow well operators to shut in uneconomical wells for up to a year without going through the expensive plugging process. Once plugged, the cost or reentering a marginal well makes it unlikely the well will ever produce again.

Wells becoming inactive on or after January 1 are covered by the rule change. The Commission emphasized that it is not relaxing its pollution standards and that problem wells would be subject to plugging.

The Commission said it amended its plugging rule "to prevent loss of reserves through premature abandonment of marginal wells and to allow wells vital to our national defense, health, safety, and welfare to remain unplugged and readily available for production in time of emergency."

Recent figures compiled by the Commission show Texas stripper well production at about 435,000 barrels a day, some 19 percent of the state's total daily production of 2.27 million barrels.

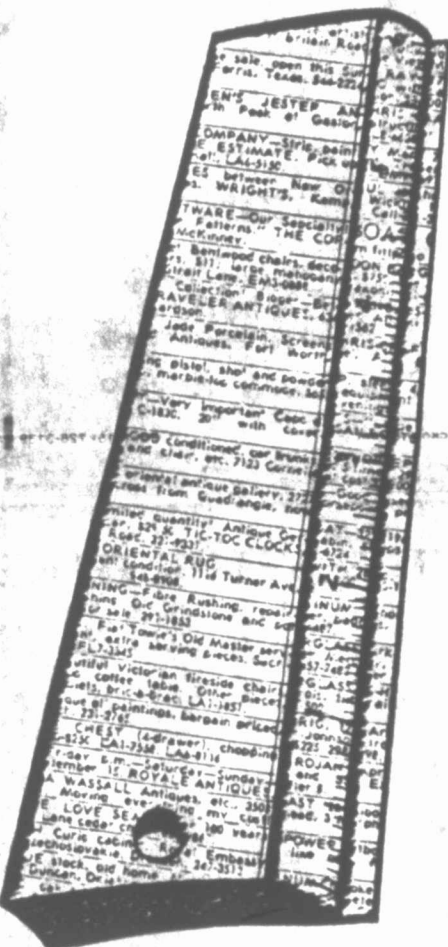

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Reduce fat -- reduce cancer chance

Eating at your favorite diner or brown bagging your lunch, whatever, can catch you taking in high fat diets.

Fat laden calories are going to mean weight gain for you, especially if you do not get much exercise.

The American Cancer Society reminds that a high fat diet just by itself increases your risk of developing breast, colon, and prostate cancers. A healthy diet is one in which no more than 30 percent of the calories come from fat. Less than 30 percent is even better.

Compare Fat In These Foods
1 cup ice cream, 14 grams of fat; 1 cup ice milk, 6 grams of fat; 1/2 cup cottage cheese, 5 grams of fat; 1/4 cup low fat cottage cheese, 2 grams of fat; 3 oz. tuna, drained, 7 grams of fat; 3 oz. tuna in water, drained, 1 gram of fat; 3 oz. chicken with skin, 10 grams of fat; without skin, 4 grams of fat and one muffin, 1 gram of fat.

Where Most Fats Are Found
Meats and high-fat dairy products are the main sources, as well as the "hidden" fat in pastry and candy; vegetable oils also contain fat. Future research will tell us more about the particular effect of different

kinds of fat. Meanwhile, to be safe, your goal should be to cut down on your total fat intake. Eat lean meat, skinned poultry and bake or broil rather than frying in butter or oil, and choose low-fat dairy products.

To control your weight, try to balance the calories you eat with those you burn up through activities or exercise. Talk with your physician about the right goals for you-in maintenance, weight loss or gain.
