Weather's Fine as 66 Rodeo Begins

Large Crowd At 1st Performance

Clear skies, a full moon and a huge crowd heralded the start of McLean's 66 Roundup Rodeo and Horse Show celebration Wednesday night at Felton Webb Arena.

It was perfect weather as the four days of festivities kicked off, with more than 125 entries in the rodeo and 21 girls signed up for the barrel racing.

Most of the cowboys who won the trophy saddles in last year's rodeo have returned for another try.

The rodeo will be held at 8 p.m. each day through Saturday.

Top cowboys are entered in the six events—saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, heading and heeling and bulldozing.

\$2,400 Purse
They are competing for a total purse of \$2,400—\$400 in each event—and the six \$225 trophy saddles.

Ratjen Brothers Rodeo Co. of Happy is stock contractor.

In the girls barrel race, a jackpot of \$15 is provided, with the first, second and third-place riders receiving a buckle, spurs and belt, respectively.

Admission to the rodeo is \$1.25 for adults and 50 cents for children.

Highlights of the celebration Saturday will be the Horse Show and Cutting Horse Contest starting at 9 a.m. at the arena; Old Fiddlers Contest at 2 p.m., and a calf scramble featuring 4-H and FFA boys during the rodeo performance.

Fleming Announcer
Dancing is being held nightly in the American Legion Hall.

Nat Fleming of Wichita Falls is rodeo announcer, with Richard Walters of Amarillo the rodeo clown.

The sound truck is being provided by Gulf Oil Co.

Old settlers registered Wednesday afternoon for their reunion, shortly before the traditional parade opened the celebration at 4 p.m.

In addition to numerous local and area horseback riders and covered wagons, a large number of out-of-town persons participated in the parade.

According to a letter from Complete Sports received this week by MHS Coach Derral Davis, young Welch's picture and biographical information—including his outstanding basketball record—will be published in the next issue of the magazine.

Senior Next Year

Welch, who will be a senior at McLean High School next year, is one of 15 players selected from District 6—which includes Texas, Arkansas, New Mexico and Arizona.

The McLean youth was named to the All-State team, the All-Panhandle team and the All-District 2-A team during the 1962-63 season.

He also made All-District as a sophomore, and he was on the all-star team of every basketball tournament McLean entered in the past season.

Leading the McLean Tigers to the District 2-A championship last season, he averaged 26.5 points per game.

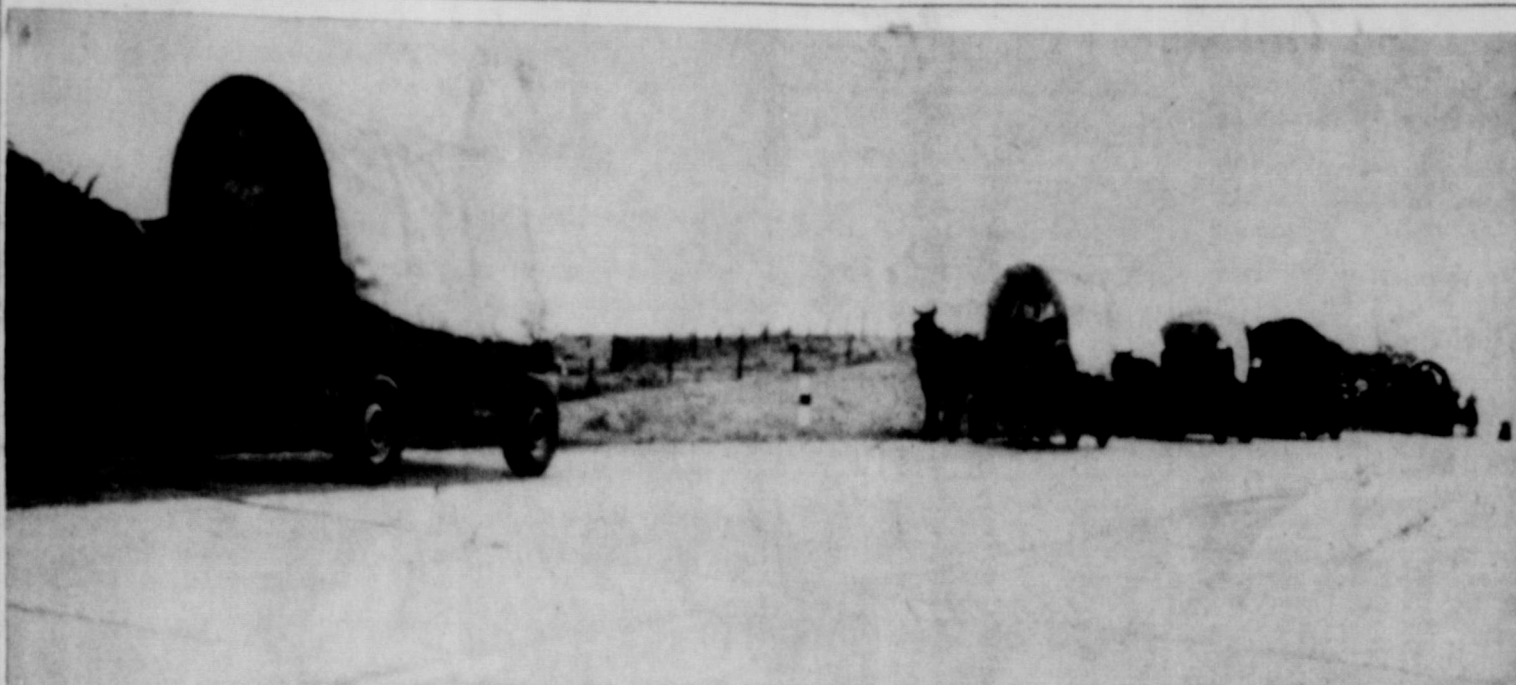
This is the second school term scholastic honor students at McLean High School have been recognized by the presentation of letters.

Horses Due Here From 5 States

Horses from five states will be entered Saturday in the fifth annual Quarter Horse Show and Registered Cutting Horse Contest at the Felton Webb Arena here.

Mrs. Ruby Back, co-chairman of the show, invited residents of McLean and this area to attend the affair, which begins at 9 a.m. There will be no charge for admission.

Mrs. Back reported that owners of outstanding horses from Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Kansas and Colorado had indicated they planned to have entries in the local show, which has gained in popularity every year since it was started.

Almost a full day of activities is planned as the entries compete for numerous trophies, ribbons and prize money.

H. D. Dolcater, animal photographer from Amarillo, will be here for the show, Mrs. Back said.

New Mexico Judge

Judge will be R. C. (Punch) Jones of Tatum, N. M., and John M. Haynes is superintendent.

The show is approved by the American Quarter Horse Association and Golden Spread Association.

Fifteen divisions of competition are scheduled in the halter classes. A trophy buckle and six ribbons will be awarded in each, plus trophies to the grand champion mare, reserve champion mare, grand champion stallion, reserve champion stallion, grand champion gelding and reserve champion gelding.

Performance Classes

In quarter horse performance competition will be in: Registered western pleasure, all ages, stallion, mare or gelding; registered barrel racing, all ages, stallion, mare or gelding; junior reining, stallion, mare or gelding; foaled in 1959 or later; senior reining, stallion, mare or gelding; foaled in 1959 or before; junior quarter horse cutting, stallion, mare or gelding; foaled in 1959 or later; senior quarter horse cutting, stallion, mare or gelding; foaled in 1959 or before; \$150 novice, and \$250 novice.

A silver platter donated by Neville and Ruby Back will be awarded to the best all-around quarter horse in the show. To be eligible for this award a horse must show in halter and at least two of the performance classes.

showed .95 inch of moisture on May 23, .74 on May 30, .49 on May 31, .65 on June 1, 1.32 on June 2 and .60 on June 4.

Even larger amounts were reported in rain gauges kept by individuals around McLean.

Threats of tornadoes and light hail accompanied some of the thunderstorms. But the hail didn't come in damaging amounts, and only straight winds occurred.

The rains during the past week more than doubled the total mois-

ture McLean had received prior to the weather break, increasing the amount for the year to 7.36 inches.

On this same date in 1962, the city had received 6.11 inches. But June was wet, and this was boosted to 9.43 inches by the end of the month.

Soggy fields were delaying farm work in this area at mid-week, but grass in the pastures was beginning to show the effects of (See RAIN, Page 5)

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Bill Crisp has completed drilling an irrigation well on his farm north of Alanreed. Bill Rice drilled an irrigation well on his farm south of Alanreed.

Elmer Balch has installed 2,000 feet of irrigation pipe on his farm south of Pampa. This pipeline will conserve irrigation water by reducing evaporation seepage. Elmer also plans to seed some switchgrass under irrigation.

Homer Powell plans to construct a pit-type pond on his farm north of Laketon. He also plans to do some land leveling for irrigation.

Level land will produce uniform crops and there will be less runoff or irrigation tailwater as a result.

Harris King is planning to plant approximately 120 acres of forage sorghum to provide a cover for grass seedling on his farm north-east of McLean. He also plans to construct a cross fence and drill a well for better distribution of grazing.

Jane Woods constructed a fence on his farm east of McLean.

Farmers or ranchers who have erosion problems or pastures that are not producing the quality or quantity of forage that they are capable of producing should take a close look from a conservation standpoint.

Conservation practices in most cases will pay their own way in a few years. Terraces, diversions and waterways will provide protection from erosion as well as conserve moisture for crops.

Cross-fences, wells and stock

tanks will aid in distribution of grazing. Brush control will help reduce competitive weeds and shrubs and give the grass a chance to grow.

If you have not developed a conservation plan, now is the time to make an inventory of your resources. Conservation farming or ranching can prove to be a profitable investment.

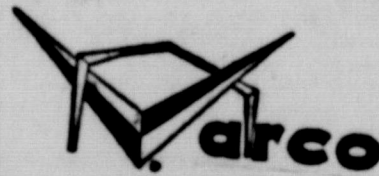

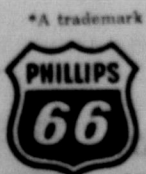
