Lamesa Public Schools To Open Monday Morning

The Lamesa Elementary and High Schools will open for pupils on Monday morning, September 6, according to the schedules following. Attention is called to changes for the benefit of both pupils and faculty in the elementary grades wherein pupils are requested to report to their rooms according to alphabetical arrangement.

High school pupils are reporting this week to Mr. McCollum at the high school building and most of these will have enrollment proceedings completed. However, all high school pupils are requested to report first to the general convocation in the High School auditorium at nine o'clock for the official opening.

The first general faculty meeting will convene at 2:30 p. m. Saturday, September 4, room 110. High School building and all teachers are expected to have reached Lamesa by that time.

Judging from the housing problem, the increased scholastic census and the large number of transfers, the school authorities expect a heavy roster of pupils and have made preparations for their reception within the limitations of school room facilities all of which are now in use.

Mr. Carr Spraberry from Rising Star has been chosen to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mr. J. M. Kayser who resigned to go to Mineral Wells. Miss Valda Moore of Abilene will succeed Miss Grace Thurman who has gone to Kingsville.

Elementary School to Follow New Plan Of Enrollment

In order to avoid rush and the making of many errors, and so that the process of enrollment will be less tiresome to pupils and teachers, enrollment in the elementary school will be conducted under an entirely different plan this year. In years past, all children came to school early in the morning and many had to wait more than a half day before becoming enrolled. This year, it is planned to enroll pupils alphabetically at various hours so that enrollment will continue throughout the day and so that no pupil will have to spend more than a couple of hours in the process. After studying the schedule below to determine which room he should report to, each pupil should notice the exact hour he is scheduled to appear, and present himself accordingly. Pupils are urged to be prompt, not too early nor too late. Hours scheduled for the enrollment of the various pupils are as follows:

Children whose last names begin with A, B, C, D, E, report at 9:00 a. m. Children whose last names begin with F, G, H, I, J, K, report at 10:30 a. m.

Children whose names begin with L, M, N, O, P, Q, R, report at 1 p. m. Children whose names begin with S, T, U, V, W, X, Y, Z, report at 2:30 p. m. Enrollment cards will be filled out, books will be issued and covered and children will be temporarily assigned to seats the first day. After this is done and the child has been dismissed he should return home and not loiter in the building or on the grounds. Every child should report back to his respective room on Tuesday morning, September 7, to begin classes proper. Parents are urged to cooperate to see that children observe these and all other requirements for enrolling.

Vaccination against smallpox will be required of all children not now immune from the disease either by contraction or vaccination. Records are kept of children who have previously attended this school, but children entering here for the first time should present certificates of immunity.

Book cards and report cards from the school last attended will be required of all children. Failure to present these records will delay enrollment until they can be secured. Pupils desiring to secure such records from this school may do so on Friday and Saturday previous to the opening of school. Book accounts which are not paid must be paid before enrolling.

Each pupil should report to the exact places assigned him in this schedule and parents and pupils should refrain from asking for changes. Changes and transfers positively will not be granted until it becomes apparent to the faculty that such changes are to the best interest of the child.

Children under six years of age on September 1, 1937, will not be admitted to the first grade.

Parents who have had children transferred from other districts to the Lamesa district should make sure that such transfers were approved before starting in the local school. Pupils are allowed about four and one-half months free tuition by virtue of their transfer after which time tuition charge will be made to non-resident pupils. Boarding in town or moving to town for the school term does not constitute residence unless such arrangements are permanent to all intents and purposes.

For the purpose of enrolling, pupils should report at the hours designated above at the following places:

Beginners, age six to six and one-half years of age, September 1, 1937.

NYA Jobs for County Allocated Schools

The 1937-38 quota of part-time jobs, at a maximum of six dollars per month, for Dawson county is 15 jobs. County quotas were determined by the State Youth Director, Mr. J. C. Kellam, on the basis of the latest and most reliable figures available on youth population and financial need, after consultation with state school officials and relief and welfare agencies.

The Dawson county NYA quota was 40 jobs last year. This cut indicates a return of better conditions in the county as a whole.

The County Placement Committee, composed of Mr. V. Z. Rogers, Mr. P. K. Humes, Mr. H. T. Copeland, Mr. W. C. McKenzie, Mrs. J. M. Medlin, and Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum made the following allocation of jobs in the schools of the county, based on the latest available information in regard to the number of eligible students in the various school districts:

Lamesa 9 jobs; Klondike 2 jobs; Union 1; Sparenberg 1; Ackerly 1; Key 1.

Students to participate in the NYA program must be between the ages of 16 and 24 and must be able to qualify on the basis of need for such assistance to enter or to remain in school.

Mrs. P. D. Daniels Dies Last Wednesday

Mrs. Daniels was a devoted Christian and mother and will be missed by a host of friends. She was born in Alabama and came to Texas with her parents at the age of 13. She married at the age of 18 and to this union seven children were born, all but one of whom are still living.

Funeral services were conducted at the first Baptist church at 10 a. m. on Thursday morning with Rev. Cole, pastor of the church officiating. Burial was made in the local cemetery.

Survivors are her husband P. D. Daniels, and the following children: George Daniels, Sam Daniels, both of Lamesa; R. P. Daniels, O'Donnell, Mrs. W. I. Jones, Waco; Mrs. Oscar Spheres, Texas City; Mr. Dutch Yates, Whitney. All were present for the funeral services except Mrs. Spheres and Mr. Yates.

Warns Destitute Families Against Going to California

Destitute farm families of other states are being warned of the risks they run in going to California, expecting to support themselves by work in the crop fields, or if that fails to find free shelter and relief in Resettlement Administration camps, according to Mr. S. P. Collins, county rural rehabilitation supervisor.

"Distorted reports, picturing California as a paradise for the dispossessed of other areas are now being circulated," Mr. Collins said. "These stories hold out false hopes and are likely to lead to cruel disappointments and increased misery if they induce people without money or prospects of employment to move to California expecting to find the easy living conditions pictured in these tales."

Mr. Collins referred to a communication recently received from Jonathan Garst, director of the Resettlement Administration program in California in which the hardships of migratory farm families were defined. "On the basis of this experience," Garst wrote, "I want to advise farm folks who are in hard luck in other areas to look carefully before they leap at the lure held out in some of the fanciful statements now in circulation about easy living in California."

1937 Fair Dates Announced For October 14-15-16

The dates of the 1937 Dawson County Fair have been announced for October 14-15-16. The dates were set by the temporary committee soon after its formation in January, but announcement was withheld until the permanent fair organization could be well started.

Pledges for more than \$2,000 of the Dawson County Fair Association stock has been made by firms and individuals of Dawson county. The committee planned to sell \$5,000 in two hundred \$25.00 shares of non-assessable stock. The stock will be used to provide permanent grounds and buildings which can be enlarged from time to time with the proceeds from fair operations. The association will be controlled by the stockholders who will elect directors and officers.

The committee is very anxious to have every community exhibit the best that its particular community has to offer in agricultural exhibits and they therefore suggest that each produced take a copy of a score card for community exhibits and from his crops select the best samples of those crops which appear on the card. If necessary, he should enlist the aid of someone in the community to help him.

With the excellent crops this year the community booths should be a source of pride to the community and county.

O. C. McBRIDE BUYS PLAINS GIN HERE

Through a business deal consummated this week, Mr. O. C. McBride of Granite, Oklahoma, became the owner of the Plains Gin Company, buying the gin from the Lubbock Cotton Oil Co.

Mr. McBride is not a stranger to Dawson County farmers and business men, he having operated the McBride gin here a few years ago, before the gin was destroyed by fire. He has had many years experience as a ginmer, and is a brother of W. C. McBride, who has gin interests over Dawson County.

Mr. McBride states that he will be actively associated with the gin and will use practically the same crew as was employed there last year.

Federal Government Announces 9c Cotton Loan; 3c Subsidy

Commodity Credit Corporation officials announced on Monday the Government would make loans of 9 cents a pound on this year's cotton crop. They also announced plans to pay a subsidy not exceeding 3 cents a pound to producers complying with next year's production control program.

The subsidy, it was announced, will be paid on only 65 per cent of this year's basic acreage. It will be paid next year after the growers have complied with the control program.

Loans, the Commodity Credit Corporation said, will be 9 cents a pound on cotton classing 7-8 inch middling cotton, or better; 8 cents on 13-16 inch staple and middling or better in grade; 7 3/4 cents on 7-8 inch staple or less than middling grade.

No loan, the corporation said, will be made on 7-8 inch cotton or better which is of a grade not deliverable on contract under regulations of the New York and New Orleans cotton exchanges. No loan will be made on 13-16 inch cotton under middling grade.

The loans will bear interest at the rate of 4 per cent and will mature on July 31, 1938. To be eligible for loans, cotton must be stored in warehouses as soon as the necessary arrangements can be completed, but not later than September 15.

A condition of each loan is that the producer-borrower must agree to participate in and comply with the 1938 adjustment program.

The RFC has authorized a loan of \$150,000,000 to the Corporation for the cotton loan program.

After the musical program, Rev. Crimm spoke to the club for a few minutes and told his famous "Hound Story" which was very interesting to the members of the club. Rev. Crimm invited all members to attend the revival, which is being held on North First Street near the school house.

Committees were appointed by President Weekes to assist with the Donkey Softball games, and players for the Lions Club team were chosen by Seaborn Collins, who is in charge of the games.

Contract Let For New Post Office

The Treasury department awarded a \$62,237 contract Wednesday of this week to Algernon Blair of Montgomery, Alabama, for construction of a post office building here, it was announced from Washington today by the Associated Press.

The building will be one block west of the square on North First and Houston streets. The old buildings on the site have been moved and the lots are now being cleared and leveled.

The new Federal building will be one of the most modern on the South Plains when completed.

It is planned that only a few, who, because of age or infirmities are unable to work in the fields, be kept on the W. P. A. work.

It is necessary to keep a skeleton organization on our county road work in order that the project will not be lost. However, the work may be stopped for short periods of time and still not lose the project. It is hoped that every able-bodied person will assist in gathering this crop, and the Planning Board is determined that no one able to work can use the W. P. A. as an excuse not to work.

STATE PER CAPITA AP-PORTIONMENT SET AT \$22

The State Board of Education at its last meeting in August finally established the scholastic apportionment at \$22.00 per capita, after a great deal of discussion pro and con as to whether it should exceed the \$20 level. This figure represents the highest in the school history of Texas. The per capita for the 1936-37 school year was \$19.00.

The total amount of money coming to Dawson county this year on its 3678 scholars is \$80,916.00 according to Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, county superintendent.

RURAL SCHOOLS START EARLY TO STOP FOR COTTON HARVEST

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FORMULA FOR FALL GARDEN SUCCESS GIVEN BY EXTENSION HORTICULTURIST

College Station, August 24.—"Fresh vegetables, as supplied by fall gardens, are necessary to supply variety in the fall and winter diet," says J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist of the Texas Extension Service, who gives a series of suggestions which will make the fall garden more successful.

Rosborough divides vegetables into three groups on a basis of maturity. South Texas gardens may contain all three groups, early, medium and slow maturing plants. Central and North Texas gardens may carry the medium and early maturing plants. Only the early group can reasonably be expected to mature in the Panhandle and Plains section.

Included in the early group are mustard, radishes, turnips, leafy lettuce, and similar vegetables which will be ready for harvest in around 45 days. The medium group is made up of Irish potatoes, beets, onions from sets, Swiss Chard, collards, and the like, which mature in 60 to 70 days. The slow maturing group includes spinach, carrots, cabbage, beans, and similar types, which require about 100 days to mature.

Summer weeds should be cut and removed from the garden site. Rosborough said, as they will dry out the soil through heat generated by decay. From three to four wagon loads of well rotted manure per half acre of garden will hold moisture and help growth.

Rosborough warned that fall gardens should not be planted until rains prizes will be placed for competition. To insure a fair stand of fall vegetables under favorable fall conditions, fall sown seed should be planted at a much thicker rate than is necessary in the spring.

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**PROVE THAT SOIL CONSERVATION
PRACTICES WORTH THE MONEY**

Lamesa, August 31.—When Boyd and Echols bought a 320-acre farm some miles east of Lamesa last November some of their neighbors shook their heads and commented that the

youthful brothers certainly had "cut out a task for themselves." This apprehension was well justified. The farm probably was in just about the worst condition of any tract of land in the Soil Conservation Service camp area at Lamesa. The sandy land, having a slope of four to five per cent,

is at the head of a drainage area. The field had been washed down to the subsoil in many spots, and deep gullies were being cut by the run-off water. The western half of the farm had been planted to cotton for 12 years. Since cotton provides little cover during the blowing season, this part of the field had been damaged severely by wind erosion. The eastern half had been damaged to such an extent by wind and water erosion that it had failed to produce a crop for five years and had been idle for the last three years.

This farm not only was non-productive, but stood as a menace to the surrounding land. Located at the head of the drainage way, the unprotected field allowed water to sweep down upon a large ranch, creating gullies, and resulting in valuable range land being flooded. During the blowing season, soil from the barren field was carried over a large area to damage productive farms.

Since the Echols family owns two full sections of land immediately adjoining, the brothers were especially interested in doing something to control the field that was menacing hundreds of acres of surrounding farms and ranches.

When the Echols brothers purchased the 320 acres, they knew exactly what they wanted to do. They became co-operators with the Soil Conservation Service Camp at Lamesa and adopted a program of soil and moisture conservation.

Nine terraces were constructed on half of the field before planting time. Sudan grass was planted on the terraces, and a strip-cropping plan was adopted, grain sorghums and cotton being seeded in strips of equal width. Despite the severely eroded condition of the land, moisture conservation resulted in good stands being obtained except in a few spots where all the topsoil had been lost. The entire field is being cultivated on the contour and has been stabilized against blowing. The terraces are holding the water on the field where it falls and damage to land further down the drainage way is being eliminated.

The young farmers estimate they will harvest a ton of grain sorghums to the acre, and at least a half bale of cotton. Such a yield will be more than the land has produced in the previous six years they say.

This fall, they plan to terrace the remainder of the field and to strengthen the structures built last year. The crop strips will be rotated next season to furnish additional residue for the soil.

"I am greatly pleased with the crops this year, but best results cannot be expected for a year or two when full benefits of terracing will be realized," says Boyd Echols. "Just to prove how well pleased I am, I have just refused an offer of \$5 per acre profit for the 320 acres," he adds.

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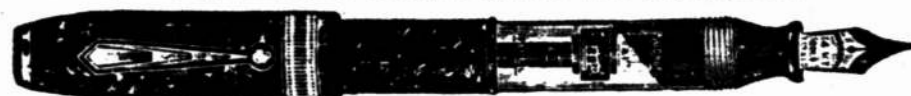

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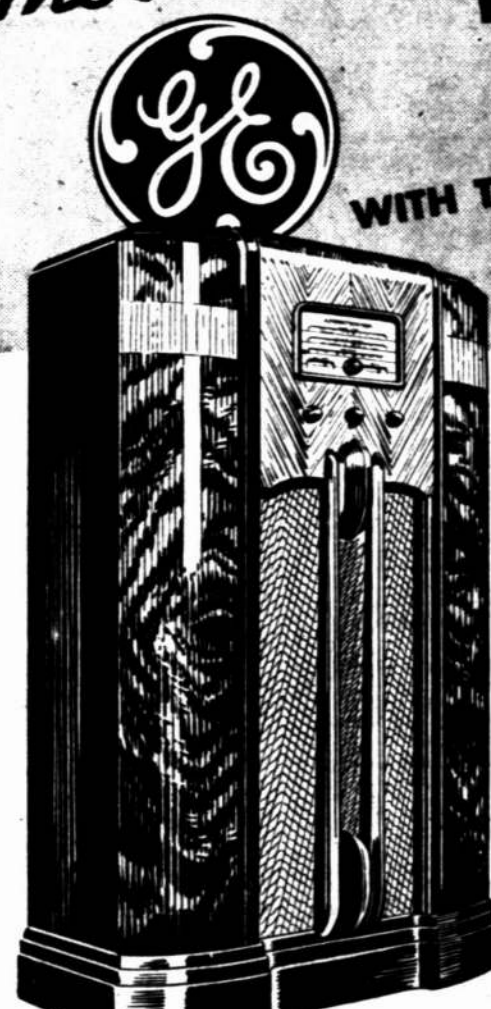

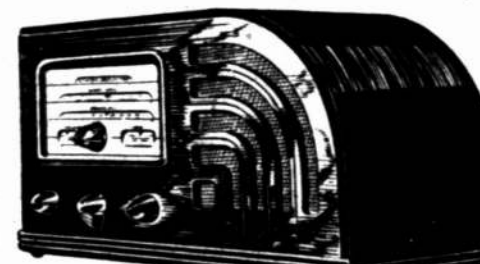

"Good Roads"

All-weather roads are desired by all highway users. All-weather type roads of hard surfaced nature, known as "feeder" or "farm-to-market" roads are desired for Dawson county by the highway minded sponsors of the forth-coming bond election. The highways, Numbers Nine and Fifteen, already paved across Dawson county are parts of the State and Federal highway systems and it is believed that the road leading from Lamesa to Stanton and Brownfield, respectively, will soon be on a state designated system as a part of the cardinal road system traversing this county.

It is known that these roads serve many Dawson county citizens but also serve travelers from other sections. More and better roads are desired to serve a larger number of Dawson county citizens that they have surfaced roads leading to the main highways. The larger loads which may be taken from farms to market or shipping points, the freedom from mud, snow, ice, sand pits and mud-holes, sharp turns and narrow roads, the escape from so much wear and tear on cars, pickups, and trucks, the freedom from "flats" on tires, all offer advantages in favor of the all-weather roads. The conveniences to physicians in making calls, the accessibility to schools and churches made more certain and the comfort and safety of driving on such roads are advantages sought. The cost per quarter section or equivalent is less than one flat tire per year and about one fourth the cost of a flat if the inner tube is ruined.

Federal aid to farm-to-market roads is available as a part of the Emergency legislation and these funds are allocated through the Texas State Highway Commission. An opportunity exists now for Dawson county to secure additional improved road mileage which may not come again. The designated roads are requiring more and more maintenance funds from State and Federal sources and the time may soon come when all available resources will be needed for this one purpose thus cutting off the increases in designations and farm-to-market construction. The road program is proposed for the benefit of ALL Dawson county citizens and those who come to visit us.

New Enrollees To Be Accepted for CCC

A call for approximately 11,000 white and 1,200 colored boys to be enrolled into the Civilian Conservation Corps during October has been issued by Adam R. Johnson, Director of the Texas Relief Commission, to the various county welfare boards.

This number far exceeds any former enrollment and will give almost all boys in the State an opportunity to enroll if they are unemployed. Qualifications for enrollees are that they must be from 17 to 23 years of age, in need, and whose parents or themselves, due to financial limitations, are not in a position to secure or provide comparable training. Full strength of the Texas quota is 16,000 white and 1,700 colored, and due to discharge of enrollees reaching the age of 24, and completion of maximum enrollment of two years, replacement will be necessary.

Heretofore rules did not allow boys from other than the groups receiving or eligible to receive public assistance to be accepted, but these have now been modified. Such boys who have no dependents may allow two thirds of their pay to remain on deposit and upon discharge or completion of their enrollment, receive the full accrued amount. Where there are dependents, an allotment will be made each month direct.

Over \$500,000 each month is brought to Texas through these allotment checks to dependents which materially relieve the burden that otherwise would be carried by the communities.

CITIZENS ASKED TO LOOK OUT FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

Chief of Police Jack Phinizy is asking the citizenship of Lamesa to observe traffic lights and watch out for school children in the streets. With school starting Monday children will be crossing streets and traffic lights must be observed, stated Mr. Phinizy.

"THE REST OF THE RECORD"

Several months ago, when the industrial North and East were paralyzed with sit-down strikes, I issued a statement that we were not going to have any confiscation of property in that fashion down here in Texas. I said I was convinced that the sit-down strike method did not represent the desires of an overwhelming majority of organized labor in our State; and that while I was and had always been friendly to organized labor, it was "un-American and unlawful to sit down on somebody's property and try to remain there. If a man wants to quit a job, or strike, he has a perfect right peacefully to do so; but after quitting he has no more right to sit down on property or premises without permission than he would have to sit down in a private home uninvited."

The people of Texas approved of my statement because it represented the sentiments of an overwhelming majority of them. We haven't had any sit-down strikes in Texas and have had very little labor troubles as compared to other states.

Now another unfortunate situation has developed. Recently in Dallas a man who was trying to show a pro-labor picture in a public park was kidnapped and taken out into the country by a bunch of hoodlums who tarred and feathered him. Another labor organizer was kidnapped and beaten so brutally that he was laid up in the hospital for over a week. Other outrages of a lesser nature were perpetrated and threats were freely being made as to what was going to be done with labor organizers.

Everyone concedes that labor has a right to organize and to select organizers and leaders of their own choosing. The freedom of speech and the right to assemble peacefully are guaranteed by both State and Federal Constitutions. The brutal treatment accorded these men in Dallas is indefensible. I recall a few years ago when the unfortunate Ku Klux epidemic broke out and many men were taken from their homes at night and flogged because they had violated the laws. The people of Texas rose up in their might and took the position that even if a man had violated the law he was entitled to trial in a court house and not in a creek bottom. Today it isn't even claimed that the men who were kidnapped or tarred and feathered were violating the law. All that was said by those who perpetrated the outrages was that the men belonged to the CIO. It isn't a violation of the laws of our country for these men to belong to the CIO regardless of what we may think of that organization.

In my opinion, it is just as important to protect people from outrages of this kind as to prevent the taking of property from the rightful owners by the sit-down strike or other unlawful method. Because I didn't want to see the thing get started again in Texas I immediately sent 25 members of the State police to Dallas with the instructions to protect men in their right to speak freely and to assemble lawfully. These officers are instructed not to take sides in any controversy but simply to prevent violence on

I was surprised to get a bunch of inspired telegrams apparently approving the treatment given these organizers because, the telegrams said, they were members of the CIO. I don't care to what organization they belong. If they violate any law they ought to be prosecuted for it; but no set of men has the right to take the law into their own hands and kidnap, or beat, or tar and feather, these men. I think the people of Texas are backing me up in this stand.

I really wish the general public could know in detail the many fine things that have been accomplished by the Public Safety Department. I am particularly proud of the intelligence branch. In this division we have fingerprint, handwriting and ballistic experts. This has been a great help to local officers everywhere and, of course, has materially assisted the State in dealing with the more hardened type of criminal.

Just as illustrative of what has been done in the one field of ballistic work. As perhaps most of you know men in this department can take a bullet that has been fired and trace it to the gun that fired it by markings on the bullet. They have done this in many instances and solved cases that might otherwise have gone down as "perfect" crimes.

For instance, recently in one Texas town a man was murdered at night as he slept. He was not robbed, and officers were at a loss for a motive. They did, however, find shotgun shells of a certain type. They picked up every gun of this caliber in the little town and fired some test shells from them and sent them together with the ones found on the ground in to Austin. The fired shells from each gun had been numbered and the experts in the Public Safety Department soon advised that the shell with a certain number on it was the same gun as that which fired the shells at the scene of the crime. It was no trouble to trace the ownership of this gun and its use to a negro in the community who promptly confessed the crime. This is just one of a number of similar cases that illustrate how quickly the department can assist your local officers.

SCS Practices Aid In Controlling Highway Erosion

The practices that are being carried out by the SCS are proving to be a big factor in controlling highway erosion. While the rainfall is being retained on the land to aid vegetation it retards erosion along the road ways, and eliminates the accumulation in the wet weather lakes on the road. The conservation measures that are most effective for the prevention of highway erosion are terracing, contour tillage and pasture furrowing. Mr. Burdatt, a commissioner in Borden county says, "I find that in most cases the entire watershed to the lakes along the road can be terraced for less than the actual cost of making a high fill that is necessary to put the road beds above the flood level."

Mr. Burdatt operated a county outfit for 3 months last winter terracing land adjacent to roads in his precinct, and considered the work of more value for road maintenance than the same amount of work in the roads. He charged the farmers \$150 per hour, which covered the cost of fuel and labor, and gave the farmers a good terrace at a very reasonable cost. Considerable work has been done in the area mentioned by Mr. Burdatt, by the Soil Camp at Lamesa.

Vocational Education Program Expanded By Government

The need for vocational education has become so evident that the Federal government is sponsoring the training of individuals in many lines of work. The work had its beginning with the passing of the Smith-Hughes act in 1917. Since that time various appropriations have been made and the annual sum expended increased. The Federal Government, regardless of its attempt at expense reduction, has seen fit to increase the appropriation for the coming year approximately six million dollars. The fundamental objectives of the program are to train boys and girls so that they may earn a livelihood and to offer training to those already employed to increase their efficiency.

For two years the local authorities have taken advantage of these opportunities by organizing a class in diversified occupations and classes in home making. The class of diversified occupations offers training in practically all types of occupations existing in Lamesa and is open to High School students who are 16 years of age, or over, and who have completed two years of High School Work. During the time the program has been in operation several young men and women have been trained and placed in responsible positions. Those interested in receiving training in this type of program should, with their parents, see Mr. Chas. T. Hatchett, September 2-4 at the High School.

School Lunches, Clothing, Fall Gardens In Program of Farm Supervisor

School lunches, school clothes and fall gardens are the things uppermost in the present program of Miss Wright, county home management supervisor, with offices in Lamesa. Miss Wright works with all borrowers of the Re-settlement administration in Gaines county in a comprehensive rehabilitation program.

Planning and advising with the farm women in this county, whose homemaking budgets were necessarily limited by conditions over which they

had no control, is one of the major projects of the home management supervisors, and with another school term near at hand she is emphasizing the importance of adequate clothing for school children, and well-balanced school lunches.

Quoting from a Department of Agriculture bulletin, Miss Wright says growing children have special needs in the way of food. Even when they eat all of their meals at home, it is no easy matter to see that they are properly fed, and when they eat part of their meals at school the difficulty is far greater. This is not because healthfulness and cleanliness are more important in this meal than in any other but because they are harder to secure. It is not easy to keep food clean and attractive when it must be packed and

carried in a lunch basket. Nor is it easy to prepare meals in schools which are not specially fitted for the purpose.

Miss Wright points out that economy, warmth and durability are the keys for school clothing, although style and finish are by no means neglected. One particular item in this project is the making over of old garments until they look and wear almost like new ones.

She says the value of fall gardens is an important factor in a successful rehabilitation program because in addition to meeting dietary needs, they provide a valuable barrier against food costs.

Lubbock, August 24.—All previous attendance records for the West Texas Pharmaceutical Association convention were broken here last week when the final check-up indicated an attendance of approximately 400 with the actual registration at 340. The previous record registration was 321.

July Prosperous Month for Loan Ass'n

Little Rock, Ark., August 21. (Special)—July was the most prosperous month enjoyed by insured savings and loan associations in Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico, and Texas, since 1932, according to B. H. Wooten, president of the Federal Home Loan Bank of Little Rock.

Both loans and investments showed substantial gains, 1870 loans, aggregating \$3,615,591, being made during the month. Of these 495, aggregating \$1,330,272, were for construction of new homes. In addition 486 loans, amounting to \$1,074,000 were granted to assist in the purchase of homes.

Insured shares of associations in the five states, amounting to \$3,622,897 were purchased during July by local investors. Insured members in Texas made loans of \$1,538,317 during the month and received \$1,403,527 in local investments.

The Lamesa Federal Savings and Loan Association in Lamesa have their shares insured, are members of the Little Rock bank, and are caring for the needs of local investors and borrowers. Their loans and investments for July are included in the above totals.

NYA SCHOOL QUOTA FOR DAWSON COUNTY 15

Lubbock, August 30.—J. C. Kellam, Texas director of the National Youth Administration has informed County Superintendent Pauline Bulsterbaum of Lamesa that the quota of part-time NYA School Aid jobs for Dawson county will be 15 this year.

The county allocation was made by the State Youth Director, after consulting state school officials and relief and welfare agencies, on the basis of the latest and most reliable figures available on youth population and financial need. The total number of jobs available to Texas this year was only 75 per cent of last year's original quota.

Superintendent Bulsterbaum has been requested to organize a County committee from among the school officials of Dawson county for the purpose of making recommendations to the State Youth Director regarding the allocation of jobs to schools within the county. As soon as this recommendation has been made, local schools will be notified and supplied by the County Superintendent with forms necessary for execution of an application for approval for participation in the NYA program.

Local school officials should communicate with the county superintendent to inform her and the County Committee regarding the needs of their schools for part-time NYA jobs Mr. Kellam said.

Youths seeking NYA jobs should apply to the principal or superintendent of their school, since it is the function and responsibility of the local school officials to select those students who shall be given employment.

Lubbock, August 24.—Officials of the Panhandle South Plains Fair Association announced purses amounting to approximately \$3,000 for the annual racing meet to be held during the 24th exposition of the Panhandle South Plains Fair in Lubbock, September 27 to October 2. The program will call for five races each day of the fair.

The Boy Scouts of America, who are members of the South Plains Area Council, will have a greatly increased program for participation of all troops in the Area. Suitable awards and cash had provided plentiful subsou money. The rules and regulations will be so arranged that all troops will be on an equal basis as far as possible, regardless of location. The entire poultry building has been designated as the Scout exhibit hall following a decision of fair officials to discontinue the poultry show.

Fair catalog and premium list is now in the hands of the printer and will be available for distribution the latter part of this week. The 1937 edition will be the largest ever printed for Panhandle South Plains Fair and will contain approximately 125 pages.

STORY OF MY BEDROOM

I entered the bedroom contest when our club was reorganized in January. The first thing I did was to make pictures of my room as it was and plans for improving my room.

My room is a southeast room. The furniture in my room when I started improving it was a bed, a dressing table, dressing stool and a bedside table which was made from an old apple box, with legs made out of material one inch thick. My bed was an old iron bed and had no spring cover or mattress cover, mattress pad or necessary number of sheets. The bed was set up against the wall in front of the closet. My dresser had only two drawers in it and my dressing stool had almost fallen apart. My chest was not papered and contained only one shelf and a very short rod. My floor had only one coat of varnish put on several years ago, but this had just about worn off. The walls were bare except for a few calendar. All the woodwork needed varnishing. The screens were pulled off in several places and a new hook was needed on one of the windows. There were no curtains and the shades were torn off at the bottom.

There is a bathroom next to my room. This bathroom contained a bathtub, a very inconvenient closet in the corner built from the floor to the ceiling and a medicine cabinet built by my brother. This cabinet was in need of revamping.

My first score was 363.

I started improving my room by first improving the closet. I papered the closet with paper left over from one of the other rooms and added four shelves on one side made of lumber that was laying around the place. I made the rod the length of the closet from an old iron pipe. I cleaned my winter clothes wrapped them in paper and put them in boxes in the bottom of the closet. A hat stand was made of pasteboard and the shoe rack from an old bedside table.

After I completed the closet with the help of my mother I canvassed and papered the ceiling and walls of my room. The paper has a blue background, which is my favorite color, and it makes the room look very cool.

The bedroom suite which was purchased for my sister and me was temporarily placed in the back bedroom as that room was papered. This consists of a bed and a dresser which needed refinishing because it had been scratched in several places. I restained the scratched places with burnt umber, varnished and waxed them and they looked like new. I added four slats to the bed and made a spring cover, a mattress cover, a mattress pad, four pillows each three yards long, four pillow protectors and cases and a piece of quilted spread.

The bedside table was made from an old library table. As there was so much complicated work to be done I had a carpenter to make it. I refinished it by first applying one coat of walnut varnish. I let this get thoroughly dry and rubbed it down with pumice stone and linseed oil to give it a smooth finish and remove the high gloss of the varnish. After doing this I applied another coat of varnish, waxed and polished it.

The lamp which is an Aladdin was given me by my aunt. I had to get a center piece, mantle and globe before I could use it. To complete my bed group I refinished an old rocking chair and remade the cushion. The springs were broken and the padding just about all gone. I tore off the four covers of cretonne which had been put on and repaired the springs. I then padded it and covered the cushion with ducking. I then made a cover that could be slipped off and on of blue duck with a white thread in it. I also keep flowers on my bedside table.

I made by study table out of an old library table. I refinished it in the same way that I did my bedside table. I then bought a large blotter that almost covered the entire table. My container for flowers is a vase that my brother had made and given me. I keep my stationery in a box. Other things that are on the table are books and bookends, and an ink well carved out of wood.

I varnished my dresser and then waxed and polished it. I made my dressing table out of an old machine, using the iron framework for the legs and the lid for the seat. I made a cushion out of an old pillow covering

it with the same material as the chair cushion.

I then systematically organized my dresser drawers. I keep my cosmetics and manicure set in one drawer, my underwear in one, comb, brush and a box for buttons, buckles and beaution pins in another drawer, then in the fourth drawer I keep handkerchiefs, headbands and ribbons and my kodak. The dresser is placed near the closet making my dressing center complete.

To improve my windows I washed the window pane, tacked the screen back on and put a new fastener on. I then cut the bottom off the shades and hemmed them. I then made my curtains out of cream colored scrim with a large blue ruffle at the top. I hung two small pictures on the wall.

I tore down the closet in the bathroom and built a wash stand under the medicine cabinet. Added shelves in this to put my wash cloths in. I also put up two racks, one for my towels and one for my bath mat. As I had water piped in and out there was no need for a waste water bucket or a pitcher. There with the wash pan I bought and the tub already in there, completed my bathing center.

As I had completed the rest of my room I was ready to varnish the floors. I cleaned them with a cloth and coal oil removing all dust. I then applied the first coat of varnish, let it dry, rubbed it down with linseed oil and pumice stone to obtain a smooth surface, applied the second coat of varnish let it dry and applied the third coat of varnish. After this had dried I waxed and polished it. I then put a crocheted rug by my bed.

My room now looks quite different. It is restful and cleaner. I have the bed in the southeast corner with the bedside table under the window and an easy chair near it for convenience in reading. Then I have my study table and straight chair placed against the west side.

7. Ink well .25

I have enjoyed improving my room because I have learned what constitutes a standard bed; I have learned to refinish furniture, and have learned the comfort of having a room adequately equipped.

Four cooperators have refinished their floors, six girls have hung their pictures correctly and have bought a bedside table.
