

Demos Hold County Convention; Name Delegates To State

The Precinct Delegates to the county convention of the Democratic party met in the District court room in Lamesa on May 5 at 3:30 p. m.

The meeting was called to order by M. Q. Martin, temporary chairman. V. Z. Rogers was elected permanent chairman of the meeting by acclamation and M. Q. Martin was made secretary.

Delegates were seated and the Convention was addressed by Carl Rountree and Louis Reed and the following resolution was voted on and carried unanimously:

"Be It Resolved by the Democrats of Dawson County, Texas, in convention assembled this the 5th day of May, A. D. 1936:

"That we unhesitatingly, unreservedly, and wholeheartedly endorse the administration of Franklin D. Roosevelt as President, and John Nance Garner as Vice-president.

"That we endorse their candidacy for reelection, and pledge them our unstinted support and recommendation to the people of this country, as two of the greatest men who have ever occupied their respective positions.

"That we endorse the Honorable Myron C. Blalock, and his administration as State Democratic Chairman, urge his re-election to said position, and pledge him our full support and co-operation.

"That we congratulate the Democrats of this county upon its selection of the Honorable M. Q. Martin, as its county chairman, wholeheartedly approve his administration of such office, and urge his re-election, and ourselves to bring about such a result.

Jack attained a record of 137 feet eleven inches, for the best showing of his athletic career in competition. His best throw was the last one of five and at that time he was in second position.

Jack also won fourth place in the shot-put with a throw of a few inches more than 48 feet. This was two feet more than his previous record. Jack has consistently made his best showings in the stiffest competition, and now has two first place gold medals as winner in the State Meet, along with a long chain of district and regional medals. Examination For High School Credits To Be Given May 15

Pupils of the tenth grade of Dawson county schools of the unaccredited class are to take examinations for admission in the eleventh grade of all accredited schools. Lamesa high school will be attended by several such pupils and in order that they may have the advantage of taking the examinations while the school minded, the tests are to be given this spring.

Mr. McCollum, principal of the Lamesa high school, has announced that the examinations are scheduled for Friday, May fifteenth, at the high school building. All pupils desiring to enroll in the eleventh or senior grade are urged to take the examinations rather than to await the opening of school in September.

The examinations will cover subjects of the tenth grade only since the local high school is authorized to accept credits for the first two years of high school for the next school year.

E. C. Nix Enters County Judge Race

Texas Old Age Assistant Plan Gets Federal OK

It is particularly fitting that this law to provide financial independence for thousands of the aged needy of Texas should have been approved by the federal board on our own San Jacinto Day. Director Carpenter said this week.

The National Social Security board declared the Texas plan one of the best and most liberal that had been presented to them. Dollar for dollar matching of state funds with federal funds was definitely agreed upon.

"This approval should be a definite answer to the fiction which has been broadcast to the effect that Texas funds would not be matched by federal funds. It will be possible for applicants in Texas to receive a maximum pension payment of \$30 per month if their needs, as defined by the Texas law, justify this sum," Carpenter explained.

"Because of the liberal features of the Texas law and the liberal interpretation that has been followed by the Old Age Assistance Commission, it seems very likely that a larger percent of applicants will be eligible here than in many other states," the Texas director said.

Carpenter stated that he could not say definitely now whether payments would commence in June, inasmuch as a great amount of work must be done before payments can start, but that everything possible, including a night shift in some of the office departments, is being done so that an early payment can be made. Payments will start July 1 in any event, Carpenter emphasized, but earlier if possible.

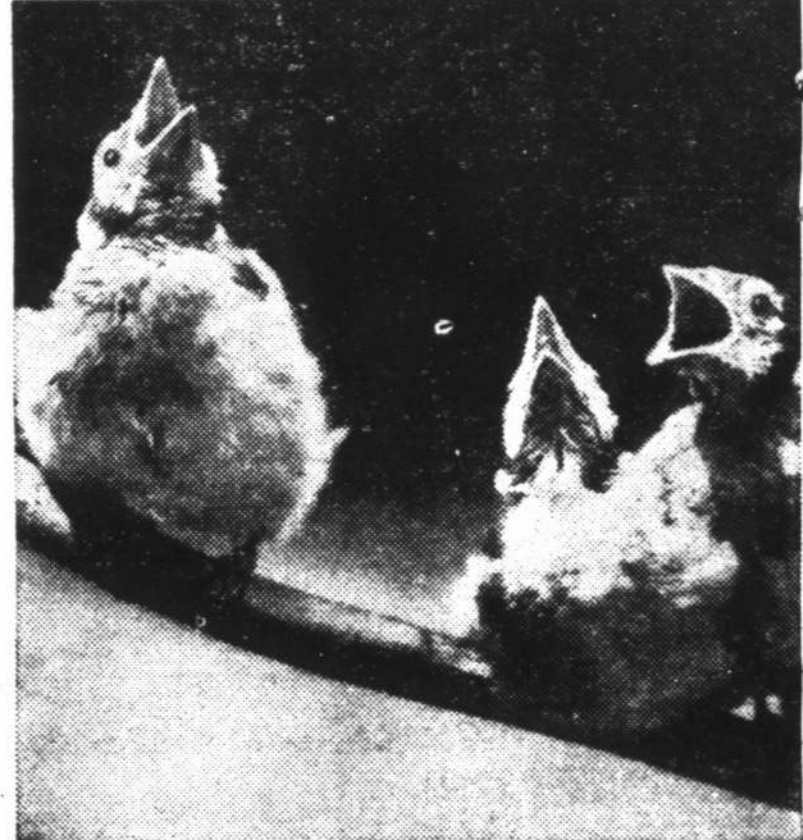

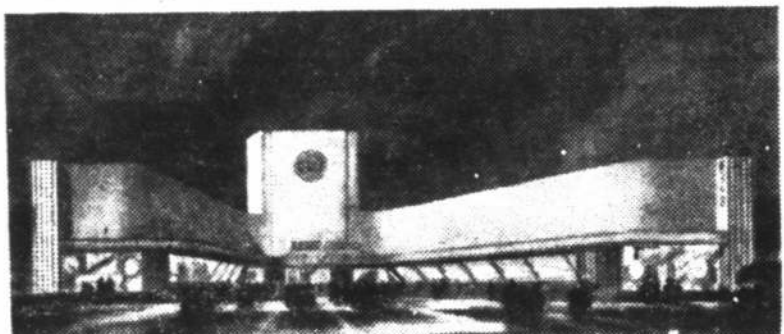

Architect's sketch of the Gulf Radio Studios building now under construction on the grounds of the Texas Centennial Central Exposition in Dallas.

Besides the two glassed-in products exhibit space at either end of the U-shaped structure, the building includes two large radio studios, a monitor room for each of the studios, a central control room, offices for the programming and production staff, a shop for the technicians, and adequate conveniences for the artists who will appear here.

The whole front of the building is fitted with plate glass so that the visitor can see how radio programs are produced, enacted and sent out over the air. All radio programs originating on the grounds of the Exposition will originate in or be controlled from this building.

Controlled from here also will be the

music, entertainment and announcements sent out over the twenty public address units located at strategic points over the grounds. These public address units will be, in effect, large outdoor radio receiving sets so placed as to make it possible for a voice from the Gulf Studios to be heard anywhere on the grounds; and so hooked up as to make it possible for six different programs to be heard in six different areas at one and the same time.

Important Dates Voters In Texas Should Remember

Along with the other Centennial celebrations which take place this year in Texas, the Democratic form of government will celebrate its 100th year of existence. Texas Democracy has a record of service which merits its participating in the celebration. May 26—State convention to nominate and instruct delegates to Democratic national convention.

June 1—Last day for candidates to file for place on primary ballot for State and district office.

June 8—State Democratic Executive

Committee meets at Austin and prepares first primary ballot and selects September convention city.

June 13—Last day for filing for county offices.

June 15—County Democratic Executive Committee prepares ballot.

June 25-July 1—First campaign expense reports must be filed.

July 5—Absentee voting by persons out of the county or expecting to be away on election day starts.

July 13-17—Second campaign expense report.

July 23—Last day for absentee voting in person for first primary.

July 25—First primary. Precinct conventions.

July 27—County executive committee canvasses returns, or if not filed, must meet not later than Aug. 1.

July 25-28—Third campaign expense report.

Aug. 1—County convention elect state delegates.

Aug. 2—Absentee voting by mail starts.

Aug. 4—Final campaign expense statements of those nominated in July primary.

Aug. 7—Absentee voting begins for persons expecting to be absent from county for second primary.

Aug. 10—State executive committee canvasses returns of first primary and certifies candidates in run-off primary. Candidates must file expense statement.

Aug. 19—Absentee voting ends.

Aug. 22—Second primary.

Aug. 24-Sept. 1—Final expense report second primary.

Sept. 7—State committee canvasses second primary returns.

Sept. 8—State convention declares party nominees, adopts platform.

Sept. 21—Last day for independent and nonpartisan candidates to file for general election.

Oct. 14—State executive committee certifies candidates to Secretary of State for official general election ballot. Absentee voting begins by mail for general election.

Oct. 19—Absentee voting in person begins for those expecting to be out of county on general election day.

Oct. 31—Absentee voting ends.

Nov. 3—General election.

Nov. 18—State Election Board canvasses returns of election for State office.

Nov. 23—State board certifies election of presidential electors.

Chicks From Hen's Eggs More Valuable Than From Pullet's

Eggs laid by pullets during the first year of egg production, even though the percentage of hatch is better, are not worth nearly so much for hatching as the eggs laid by hens after the first year of egg production has been completed, according to J. R. Couch, Poultry Husbandryman, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, who states that the chicks hatched from pullet eggs are not so strong and healthy and are not so productive as chicks hatched from mature hens. In checking the

behavior of chicks from pullets as compared with those from hens it was found that fewer chicks from pullets survive to laying age as compared with those from hens. And during the first laying year, losses from death were 10% greater among the pullets from pullets than among the pullets from hens.

Furthermore, the pullets from hens laid two dozen more eggs per fowl during the first laying year than the pullets from pullets. In discussing this difference, Mr. Couch, in a paper read before the Texas Baby Chick Association recently, stated that even though this superiority of pullets from eggs laid by hens might be only one dozen eggs per fowl for the first year, the poultryman should consider this difference which would be about 40 dozen eggs per 100 chicks. This estimate assumes that 40 pullets would be raised from 100 chicks. Thus, if chicks from pullets are selling for \$8.00 per hundred and eggs are worth 25c per dozen, the purchase of the chicks from pullets would involve first a loss due to deaths of say four laying hens at \$1.25 each, next a loss of forty dozen eggs at 25c per dozen, and these two items together with the \$8.00 paid for the 100 chicks from pullets would mean \$23 which the poultryman could afford to pay for 100 chicks from hens in preference to chicks from pullets at \$8.00. Certainly there is not that much difference in the price of chicks from hens over the price of chicks from pullets. Thus it is obvious that it is more profitable to buy chicks hatched from eggs laid by older hens rather than by pullets regardless of the high producing quality of the pullets themselves.

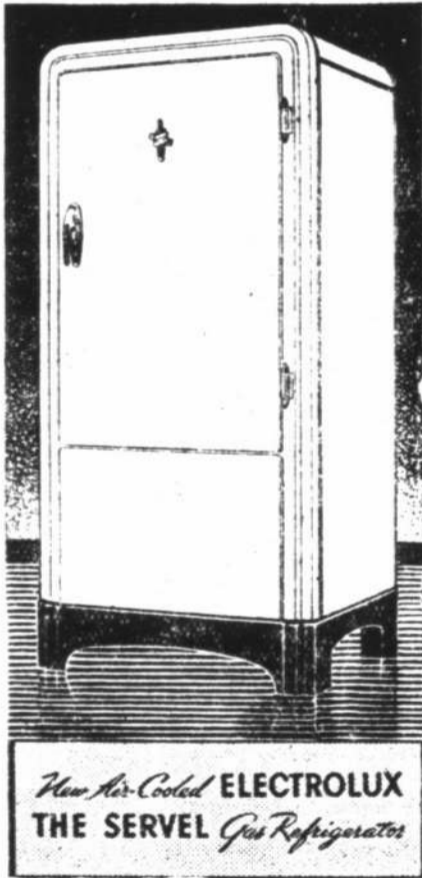

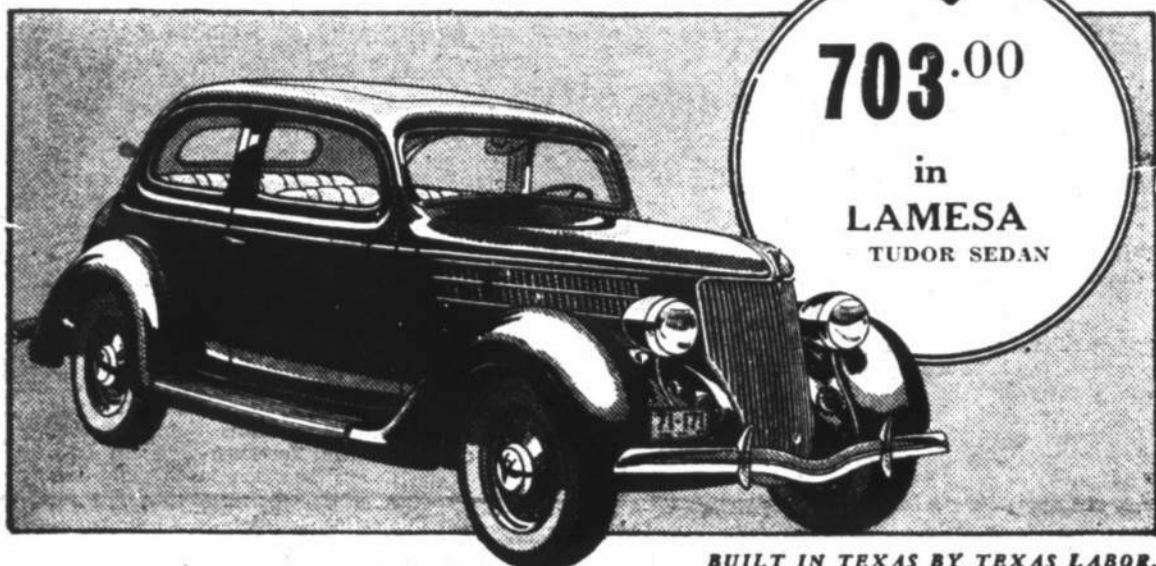

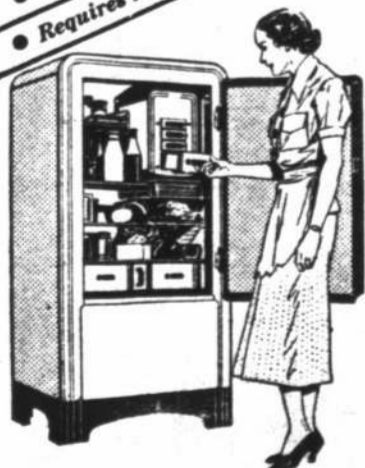
