Endurance Plane Still Aloft After Nineteen Days

Retiring Prohibition Head Says Treasury Officials Insincere

Fear Mob Action In Oklahoma Slaying

NEW YORK, June 30.—Major Maurice Campbell, retiring tonight as New York prohibition administrator, issued a statement charging "certain treasury officials" have not been sincere in their efforts to enforce the prohibition law, and that local politicians and certain administration officials in Washington feel the same.

Campbell tendered his resignation last week after coming from Washington transferring him of Boston.

Advocate Repeal
In his statement, in addition to the charges he made, he said that after years of winning the "results of prohibition from the inside," he had concluded that "prohibition is not the logical solution for temperance in our form of government, and I now publicly advocate the repeal of the 18th Amendment before the nation is consumed in the fires of its consequences."

Reporters asked him to name the politicians and administration officials he had referred to but he refused to amplify his statement.

"I have been extremely conservative in my administration with regard to permit matters," the statement said, "I have revoked or refused to issue for cases which have been universally sustained in trials in federal courts, many permits with political backing, and

Expenses For Campaigns Are Given Monday

Five Candidates For Texas Governor List Expenditures With Secretary Of State; Two Spend Over \$5,000

AUSTIN, June 30. — Five candidates for the democratic nomination for governor and one republican candidate for governor made the first preliminary report of their campaign expenses to the secretary of state today.

Barie B. Mayfield, former United States senator, and James Young of Kaufman, both reported total expenditures in excess of \$5,000. Mayfield's total was \$5,442.43, while Young reported expenditures of \$5,374.32, of which a small amount was unpaid when the report was prepared.

Not Complete. — William Stroupe, campaign manager for R. S. Sterling of Houston, reported office expenditures of \$1,504.12, with a notation that Mr. Sterling would send in his personal expense account.

Barry Miller of Dallas spent \$1,308.75. Paul Loren, "wet" candidate, had expenses of \$774. He reported the only republican candidate for governor reporting, George C. Butte of Austin, had no expenses. Reports of other candidates for state office were:

Chicago Tribune Takes Cognizance of Rumors About Career of Jake Lingle

CHICAGO, June 30. (AP) — The Chicago Tribune today, in editorial and news columns, took definite cognizance of the sinister rumors that have attached themselves to the career of its slain reporter, Alfred Jake Lingle.

It sets forth, editorially, that the first report of the state's attorney's investigators, which goes into detail concerning the reporter's finances, "would indicate that Alfred Lingle was killed because he was using his Tribune position to profit from criminal operations and not because he was serving the Tribune as it thought he was."

Pointing out the developments resulting from the investigation, the newspaper says:

Different Character. — "Alfred Lingle now takes a different character, one in which, he was unknown to the management of the Tribune when he was alive. He is not and cannot defend himself, but many facts now revealed must be accepted as eloquent against him; he was not, and could not have been, a great reporter. His ability did not contain these possibilities. He did not write stories, but he could get information in police circles. The reasonably appearance against LINGLE now is that he was accepted in the world of politics and crime for something undreamed of in his office and that he used this in undertakings which made him money and brought him to his death."

"X X X" — The murder of this reporter, even for racketeering reasons, as the evidence indicates it may have been, made a breach in the wall which criminality so long maintained about its operations here. Sometime, somewhere there will be a hole found or made and the Lingle murder may prove to be it. The Tribune will work at its ease

upon this presumption and with the hope. It has gone into the cause in this fashion and its notice-to-gangland is that it is in for duration.

"Well To Do" — In a news page story under the signature of Robert M. Lee, city editor of the Tribune, a picture of Lingle was shown. This account states that Lingle was understood to be well to do and not dependent upon his \$65-a-week salary.

"Eight years ago, Lingle explained that through the death of his father he had come into considerable money," the story said. "It is true that the records of the probate court have since revealed that this estate was around \$500. No one on the Tribune ever took the trouble—before the murder—to look into this estate and ascertain if in fact the father's estate was large."

Lee's story traced Lingle's large acquaintance, not only among gangsters and police heads but also among lawyers, judges and financiers. The gangsters' acquaintances were looked upon at the time as necessary if Lingle were to be in a position to report properly and accurately the affairs in gangland. In view of developments since his murder, the story points out, some of these acquaintanceships have taken on a different significance.

Report On Finances. — The report of the state's attorney's investigators, made public yesterday, went into detail concerning Lingle's money affairs as revealed by a survey of his banking accounts. It revealed deposits running into many thousands of dollars, far in excess of his \$1,100-a-week salary.

The report did not indicate from what source the money came, but said every effort was being made to find out. Some running up to several thousand dollars were loaned

Mrs. A. T. Biggers Presides For Business Session, When Detailed Reports Are Given

Detailed committee reports featured a business meeting held preceding a program on world peace for members of the Lubbock Church Women's Federation Monday afternoon at the Episcopal church.

Mrs. A. T. Biggers, president, presided over the meeting, and Mrs. V. H. Hankins, general chairman of welfare committee, introduced chairmen of the various sub-committees.

Tell Of Aid Society
Mrs. V. A. Bickley, chairman of the missions committee told of the work being done by the Sanders Aid Society, which meets each Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The society now has 24 members.

Mrs. K. D. Bondurant discussed the Mexican work now being done, and announced that four bundles of clothing had been given needy families. She read letters from the Mexicans stating the Mexican people were needed during the remainder of the summer, but that with the beginning of school in the fall, the needs would be increased.

Rummage Sales
Reporting for the Charity committee, Mrs. Russell Morrison stated that two rummage sales had been held and that preparations were being made for others. The group has assisted a number of persons who were ill, and has given 27 magazines to Miss Mae Murray for distribution in the rural school.

Because of ill health, Mrs. Morrison has resigned her office as chairman of the charity committee and Mrs. Claude Harbut has been appointed to fill the vacancy.

Six Operations
A report from the hospital committee stated that six operations for tonsillectomy had been performed, and that 346, contributed by the various churches, had been spent.

Mrs. F. E. Friend announced that flowers had been sent to the children having these operations, as well as to funerals, which otherwise have had no flowers, and to the hospital.

Tells Of Tea
Miss Della Wilkinson reported on the silver tea given last Wednesday afternoon in the home of Mrs. W. G. Murray, 3419 19th street, the money received being placed in the hands of the hospital committee.

An interesting program on world peace, which was given under the direction of Mrs. I. C. Enoch, was opened with a devotional based on Isaiah 2:3-4 and led by Mrs. G. D. Robison.

Influence of Women
Mrs. Robison told of ways in which women could use their influence for world peace. Although the adventure of war appeals to young people, she explained, they might be made to see that there is as much heroism and adventure to be found in time of peace as in time of war, and used as examples the experiences of such men as Byrd and Lindbergh.

The National Trend Toward Peace was the subject discussed by Mrs. John C. Granbery, who emphasized the fact that international friendships developed by such organizations as Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Camp Fire girls, Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. exerted a powerful influence toward establishing world peace.

Mrs. Granbery discussed the International Woman's Conference held annually at Washington, D. C. and told of Secretary Stimson's report of the International Disarmament Conference.

Contribution Made
A free-ill contribution was made at the close of the afternoon. Twenty-two women were present, including six from the First Methodist church; two from the First Baptist; one from the First Christian; six from the Presbyterian; five from the Episcopal.

Hoover Says Commission to Continue Work

President Strikes Back at Senate Action for Restricting Group to Study Alone of Pro Law Work

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, June 30.—Striking back at the senate for restricting his law enforcement commission to a study of prohibition laws alone, President Hoover declares the commission would continue its investigation of general crime conditions with the aid of subscriptions from private sources.
The president acted soon after the senate had defeated, 30 to 20, an amendment to the second deficiency bill to provide another \$250,000 for the commission to complete its inquiry into enforcement of all criminal statutes, and approved a provision of only \$50,000 with a strict limitation confining the work to the dry laws.

Replying to questions at the White House press conference after he had conferred with five members of the enforcement commission, Mr. Hoover said:
"With growing crime of all kinds and with insistent recommendations from every bar association and public body concerned that we should have an accurate study of the reforms necessary in our whole judicial and administrative machinery, that we should have some constructive program for decrease and control of crime as a whole, I cannot abandon the question for one moment or allow the work of this commission to cease."
"I have asked the commission to proceed with its bill program of work and it has consented to do so," the president added.

He added he had no doubt there were private citizens sufficiently anxious for the nation to know the "whole truth as to what constructive remedies may be suggested by so eminent a body of men and women as this commission," and that he would be able to obtain from private sources \$100,000 to carry the work to completion.

TEXAS GIRL HELD Tries to Sell Subscription To Wrong Person

MEMPHIS, Tenn., June 30.—A 19-year-old girl of Bang, Texas, was held here today by police who said she attempted to sell a magazine subscription to a bona fide agent of a company she claimed to represent.
Following her arrest on complaint of the local agent for the company, police said she confessed selling 50 worth of fraudulent subscriptions at Shreveport, La., and half that amount here. She told police she had solicited subscriptions in Mississippi and Arkansas also, offering five magazines for 18 months for one dollar.

SENT FOR BURIAL

VICTORIA, June 30. (AP)—The body of Frank W. Kutach, 63, carpenter, who drowned in Goretas creek near Iner yesterday when he dived into shallow water and fractured his skull, today was sent to Hallettsville, his former home, for burial.

Evacuation Of Mayence Ended By Frenchmen

Germany Starts Celebration At Midnight After Final French Troops Leave Occupied German Territory

MAYENCE, Germany, June 30. (AP)—The last troops of the French army of occupation evacuated Mayence today at 1:31 p. m.
The French flag was taken down at dawn from the headquarters at Wiesbaden and from the French general military headquarters here at 11:15 a. m. The last battalion of troops, comprising 800 men, are leaving early in the afternoon and France then will be out of the occupied territory.

Plan Celebration

But until the town clock marks midnight and the church bells sound the "liberation," the French occupation will continue. The German celebration is to start at midnight and continue until dawn.

There were a half million troops along the Rhine after the armistice. French, British, Italian and American troops had withdrawn and the zones were evacuated the army of occupation divided to about 25,000 men these last few months.

A word of honor replaced force today as guaranty for German reparations. The Young plan with its bank for international settlements and the recent issue of German reparations bonds in nine countries, now has the half-century job of settling German war indemnities to the allies.

Called "Invasion"

The occupation of the Ruhr which the Germans called "invasion" was the high point in action in controversy and its psychological effect during the ten and a half years of the occupation under the treaty of Versailles.

When Germany was declared in "default" by the reparations commission, January 9, 1923, Premier Raymond Poincare took possession of the Ruhr, the size of Rhode Island, one of the richest spots in the world, with 4,000,000 inhabitants.

Before the occupation of the Ruhr ended the German mark had fallen and whatever the reasons, always a matter of bitter dispute, German finances were wrecked and the allies had to loan money to Germany to give her a gold reserve to start doing monetary business again.

Mer. Wall Paper

German banks during that period ceased entering anything less than thousands in their books and the German mint came to printing billion mark notes only on one side of the paper to save ink. Finally it

cost more to print most of the notes than they were worth before they got into circulation. The paper mark was issued for wall-paper and sou-venirs.
Four principal posts of military operations, controlled the three zones of occupation. The French held Mayence and the left of the Rhine to close to Coetens, the area the United States army garrisoned until the beginning of the Ruhr occupation. The British were at Cologne. The Belgians held the Aix-La-Chapelle region. Italian representation never was more than a formality.

Fixed Damages

In the beginning the reparations commission had fixed 132,000,000,000 gold marks as the damages Germany must pay. A committee headed by J. P. Morgan gave the allies the suggestion that Germany ought to be able to pay a certain figure, given at the time as about 50,000,000,000 gold marks. Later the Dawes plan was adopted, providing a scale of payment without a total. Last year the Young plan fixed payments and a total calculated as having a present value at the time of about 37,000,000,000 gold marks, extending until 1928, payments the last 22 years being the exact amounts needed to settle interrelated debts.

To Form Program For Postal Meet

Final plans are to be worked out early this week for the joint convention of three state postal associations to be held in this city July 2, 4 and 5, according to announcement late Saturday by local officials.

The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce has been busy the past several weeks sending out hundreds of invitations to postal men all over the state and answers which have been received indicate that between 750 and 800 persons will be in attendance at the sessions.

The three bodies meeting jointly are the Texas Rural Letter Carrier association, Texas branch United National Association of Postal Supervisors and the Texas branch United National Association of Postal Clerks. The rural letter carriers auxiliary also will attend.

"There is little, if any, prospect that the known members of the murderous mobs who dethroned the courts and orderly government in this country and who disgraced us before the civilized world will be prosecuted or punished. State government has again broken down in the face of this form of murderous anarchy and the conclusion will become inevitable for many law-abiding, decent citizens of both races that it will be necessary for the federal government to step in and preserve trial by a jury, a basic constitutional right, for its citizens."
"The sending of a brass band to England by the governor of Texas and the fact known to all the civilized world, that Texas this year leads the roster of in-

famy with four of these murderous outrages, one of them committed in the presence of members of the Texas Rangers and involving the roasting alive of a human being who has confined in jail awaiting trial."

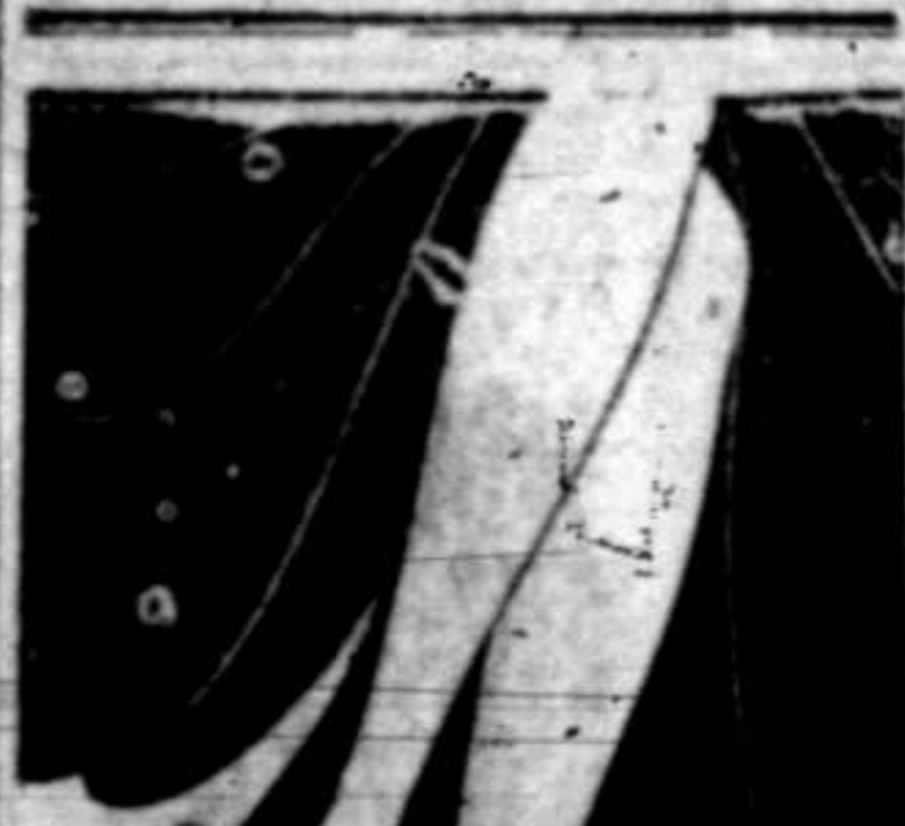

ANNEXING TERRITORY

While virtually all other large cities are wallowing in the slough of despond because the census has proved their pre-census population claims to have been slightly exaggerated, Los Angeles alone can cite the 1930 enumeration as verification of her claims to a population that continues to grow while that of other cities dwindles.

The City of Angels, a town of 11,000 people 50 years ago, is the fifth city of the country. If not the fourth, today, it much more than doubled its population in the last decade, while other large cities ruefully contemplated the slowing-up of their rate of growth.

The secret of the success of Los Angeles from a population standpoint is that when the exodus of the suburbs set in she annexed all the suburbs. Today, with 440 square miles, she has the largest area of any city in the world. New York has 300 square miles, Chicago, 200. But for this policy of annexation the city would, like its sister municipalities, be losing citizens to the suburbs.

A HABIT THAT IS GROWING

Dairymen are the most careful farmers in the world. They seem to be getting the world eating out of their hands, or rather, drinking out of their bottles. Their business is growing.

Charles L. Hill, one of the ablest authorities on dairying, in Wisconsin, and president of the National Dairy Association, announced in a recent speech that consumption of dairy products is increasing much faster than the growth of the population of the country.

"Milk consumption," said Mr. Hill, "has gained 20 to 35 per cent in 10 years. Now the American people are using 120,000,000,000 pounds annually."

Apparently the dairymen have little to worry about. There is but little fluctuation in the demand, for there never is more than 15 or 20 days' supply of products on hand, and this is true even including the supplies of butter and cheese.

Farmers welcome the recent reduction in price of butter," said Mr. Hill, "for it means increased consumption. If we can have the price of butter stabilized at a reasonable price to the consumer it is much better for the dairymen than high prices. Right now the use of substitutes for butter has dropped off a great deal; that means more butter consumed and a steady market."

U. S. GOVERNMENT POWERLESS TO GET RID OF RUSSIAN REDS AFTER THEY ENTER COUNTRY

By CHARLES F. STEWART Central Press Staff Writer

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Much as the U. S. government objects to the presence of Russian-red propagandists in this country, once they get in it is powerless to get rid of them.

It can stop them before they step on our soil and prevent them from stepping on it, if it sees them coming, but that is different from deporting them.

Other countries' communists, anarchists, miscellaneous radicals and assorted undesirables not only can be barred out; if they do slip past our immigration authorities, they can be rounded up later and shipped back to the various lands whence they came.

Not Russia's. THE EXPLANATION IS: From the government's standpoint no country exists except countries having governments with which this country's government has some sort of official relations, good, bad or indifferent.

The present Russian government, as has often been advertised, never has been recognized at all by our state department.

Russian-American relations have not even been broken. Washington still recognizes the Russian regime which preceded soviet rule in the one-time czarism of the czars.

When the last ambassador from Petrograd (the then capital) went to Europe ten years ago, or thereabouts, he left M. Serge Ughet, financial attache of his diplomatic staff, to represent him in America—and that arrangement stands, so far as the state department is concerned.

However, M. Ughet represents only the ghost of a government—and, correspondingly, according to the state department's theory, only the ghost of a country.

When the United States government has a batch of Russians it would like to deport, it realizes that there would be no sense in telling M. Ughet about it—and there is no one else to tell, and no government to notify; that is, none that the state department will admit ever having heard of.

And naturally deportees cannot be sent to any country, except the one they came from.

Labor and other departmental officials (particularly those of the labor department, because it is especially identified with the government's activities in opposition to alien agitators here) recently have been describing their difficulties to Representative Hamilton Fish's congressional committee on investigation of the communistic menace in America.

As to Russians, officialdom is decidedly up against it. Of course Russians, who are caught doing anything illegal can be locked up—but that is true of anyone else.

The truth is, they enjoy a privileged status, by very reason of the fact that this government disapproves of theirs so heartily that it is not on speaking terms with the latter.

If it were not for the diplomatic fiction involved (that Russia is non-existent, because it is not recognized by our government) undoubtedly the Russian undesirables, as fast as they are caught, could be loaded onto ships, carried overseas and dumped on their own shores—but that would be recognition, of a sort; enough to be undiplomatic, anyway.

Although the late Colonel Falcon, when police chief of Buenos Aires, did, indeed, solve just such a problem quite simply a number of years ago, it is doubtful if public opinion here would approve his method.

Persistently annoyed by foreign revolutionists in the South American republic, the colonel one night ordered a battalion of leading conspirators towed to sea, ostentatiously bound for Europe, by a tug whose captain subsequently reported the barge's loss with all on board—in a storm, just outside Argentine territorial waters.

Your Health

HOW MANY CALORIES IT DEPENDS CHIEFLY ON THE WORK YOU DO

By D. R. MORRIS, FISHERMAN, Editor, Journal of the American Medical Association, and of Hygiene, the Health Magazine

Again and again in this column the energy values of various foods have been mentioned. The coming of exact knowledge regarding the importance of the vitamins and the mineral salts in food has taken interest away from the calories, but the fact remains that the calories are the one measure of value of energy.

A child one year old requires almost 1000 calories a day; nine years of age, 2000; 13 years of age, 4000. The average adult requires anywhere from 2400 to 4000 calories per day, depending on the kind of work he may be doing.

There are innumerable books available which tell the important facts regarding the amount of calories provided by various food substances, but few people seem to be able to carry these figures in mind.

The best way to remember caloric values is to associate them with some portion of common food; thus, one slice of bread one-half inch thick and about six inches by three inches provides 100 calories. The same amount is supplied by an ounce of oatmeal; one large egg; one-third of a pint of milk, a large apple, banana, or orange; two dozen peanuts or raisins; two ounces of beefsteak; six cubes of sugar, or one shredded wheat biscuit.

It is possible to eat a considerable amount of food without overeating, and only by eating an amount of food sufficient to take care of the ordinary work and rest of the body can good health be maintained.

Some industries demand many more calories than do others. A brain worker uses about 2000 calories a day, since he does not do any muscular work. If he has to travel around, he increases his number to 2300 or 2500.

A tailor or box maker uses an additional 300 to 500 calories; a metal worker, carpenter or painter uses an additional 800 to 1000; a stone mason or lumberman uses an additional 2500 to 3000 calories; a lady of leisure uses about the same number of calories per day as a brain worker, although her brain may never think a thought; a seamstress uses 50 more calories per day; a typist 200 more; a housemaid 700 more, and a laundress 1800 more calories per day.

The range varies then from the sedentary office worker with 2000 calories in 24 hours to the lumberman with 3000 calories in the same period of time.

Radiophone Signals Make Circuit Around World in One Eighth Second

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., June 27.—Radio-telephone signals made a complete circuit around the world today in one eighth of a second.

For approximately 30 minutes, starting at 7:05 a. m. (E. S. T.), a talk by C. D. Wagoner, of the General Electric company staff here, was sent around the earth by a series of radio relays. The received signals, after traveling approximately 25,000 miles through the ether, were rebroadcast by station WGY.

The talk traveled from West to East. Mr. Wagoner spoke into a microphone at the General Electric experimental station W2XAD, 1935 meters, and by means of a directional antenna the words were carried to Phil, the Edinboro, Holland, station of Phillips radio, which rebroadcast them on a wave length of 16.68 meters.

...and relayed by Station W2XAD, at Sydney station, 28.5 meters, relayed the signals across the Pacific ocean and the Northern American continent to Schenectady.

During the test, which is believed to be the first of its kind, radio engineers made a film record by means of an instrument known as the oscillograph which measured accurately the time of transmission as one eighth of a second.

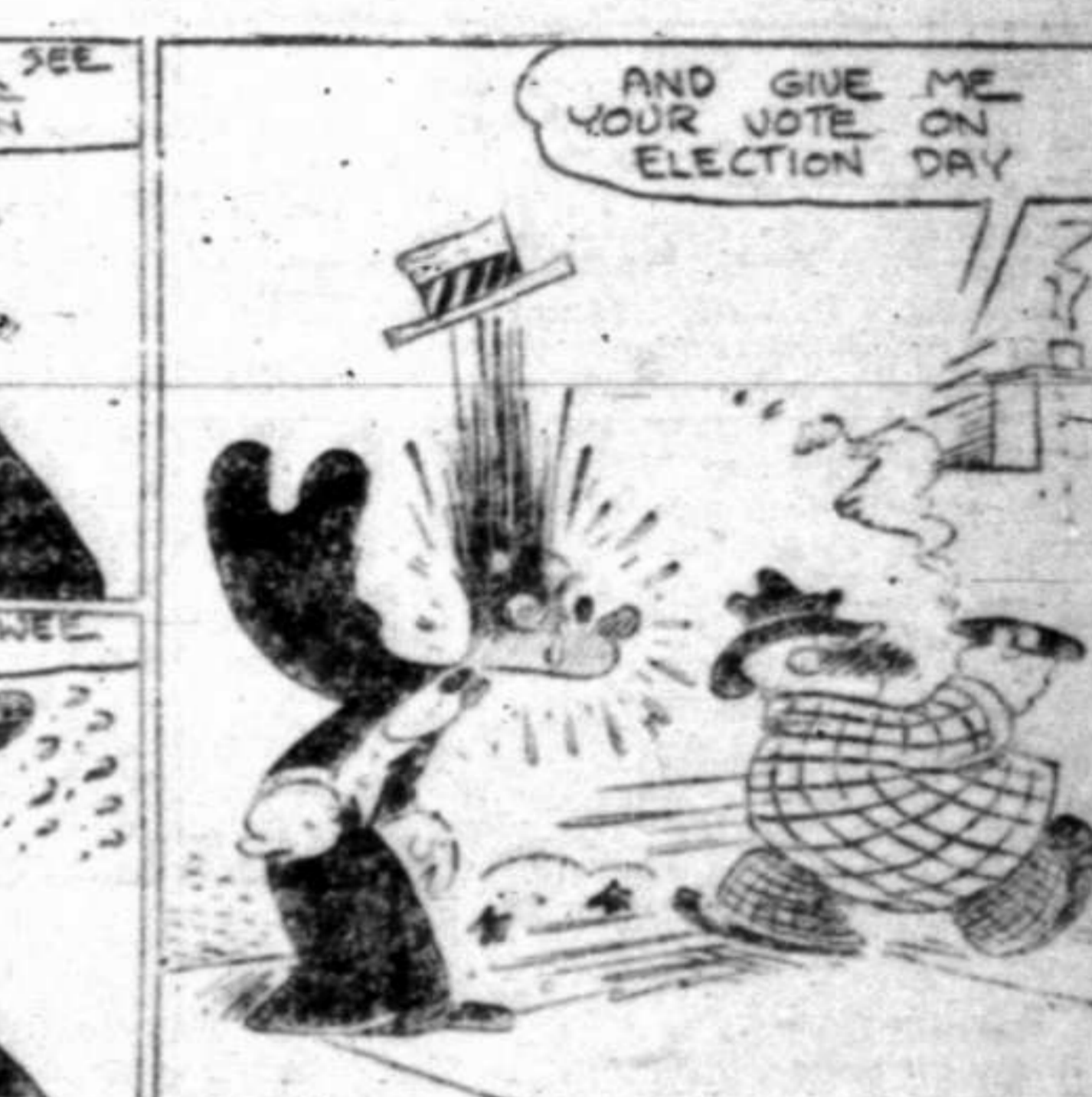

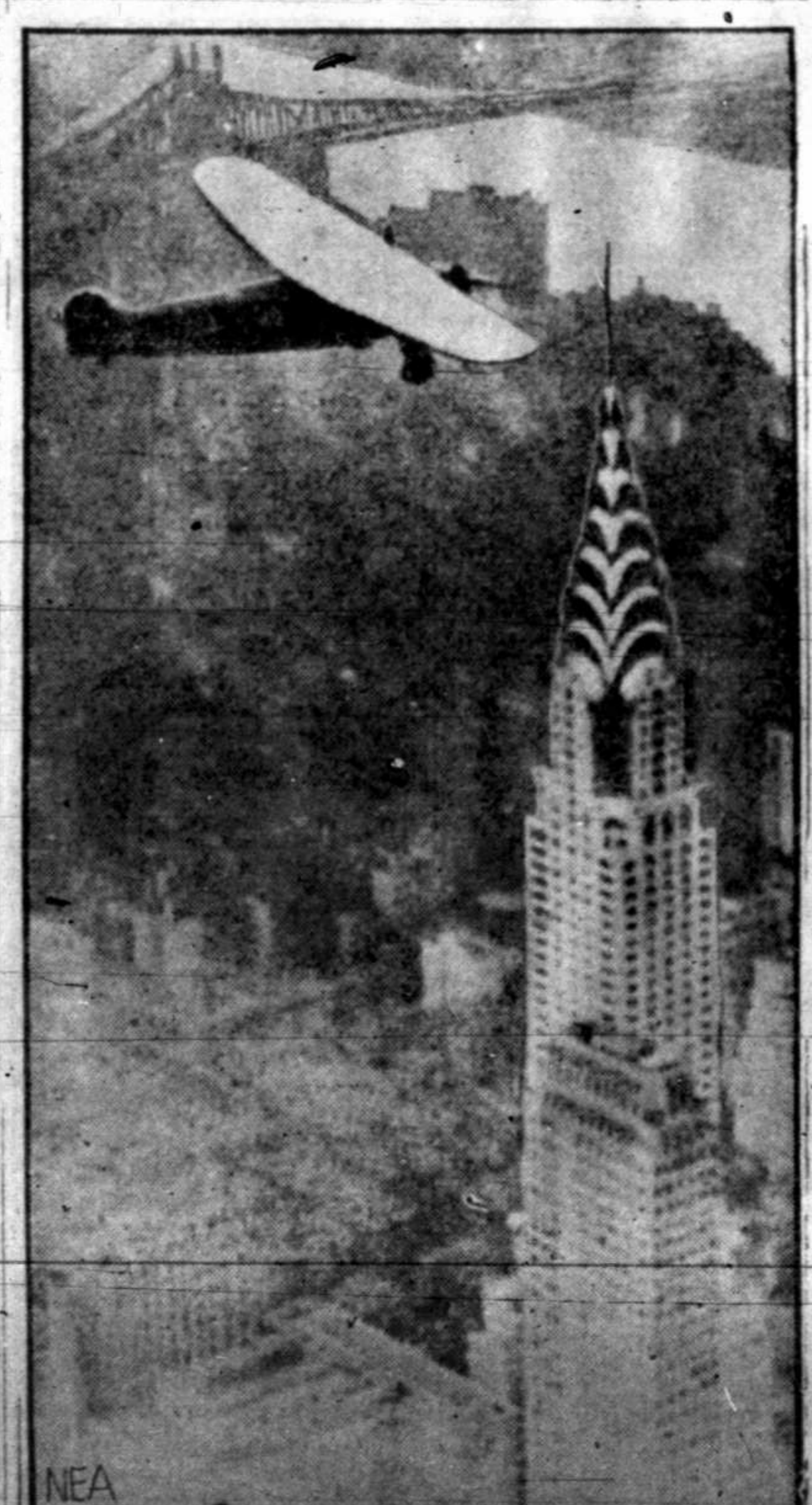
