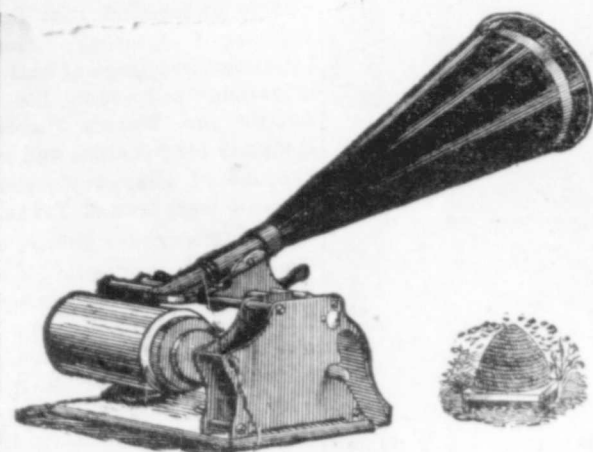

THE GRIM REAPER CLAIMS UNCLE JONATHAN BITTICK

At the ripe old age of 71 years and eight months, Rev. Jonathan Bittick, that much beloved and honored old gentleman, was taken away to a haven of rest in that bright Celestial City.

Seemingly he was in apparent good health a few hours previous to his death, having gone to church at Liberty Hill Sunday night and took part in the services, his usual custom. He and wife returned that night to the home of his nephew, Albert Bittick, and 5 o'clock in the morning he was found to be in a dying condition, and soon thereafter expired. Paralysis was thought to be the cause of his death.

Uncle Jonathan was born in Panola county, Texas, January 1, 1835, and had stood the trials and tribulations of this life with great fortitude. He was a staunch believer in Methodism, having preached the gospel on the frontier many years ago and likewise has often been termed the "Pioneer Preacher." He was loved by everyone, scorned by none, and his familiar face and kindly expressions of an undying love, will be sadly missed from the sight of the people.

He was twice married—the last time to Mrs. Maggie White, who yet survives him. Interment took place at 10 o'clock Tuesday a. m. Rev. Z. V. Liles and Rev. Pledge, of Willow City, conducting the funeral services. A large crowd of people attended. We extend condolences to the bereaved ones.—Leader Record.

Rev. Bittick was a preacher in this section twenty-five years ago, and lived in Goldthwaite until about ten or twelve years ago. He was well known to the old settlers in this county and his death has caused sorrow among all who know him.

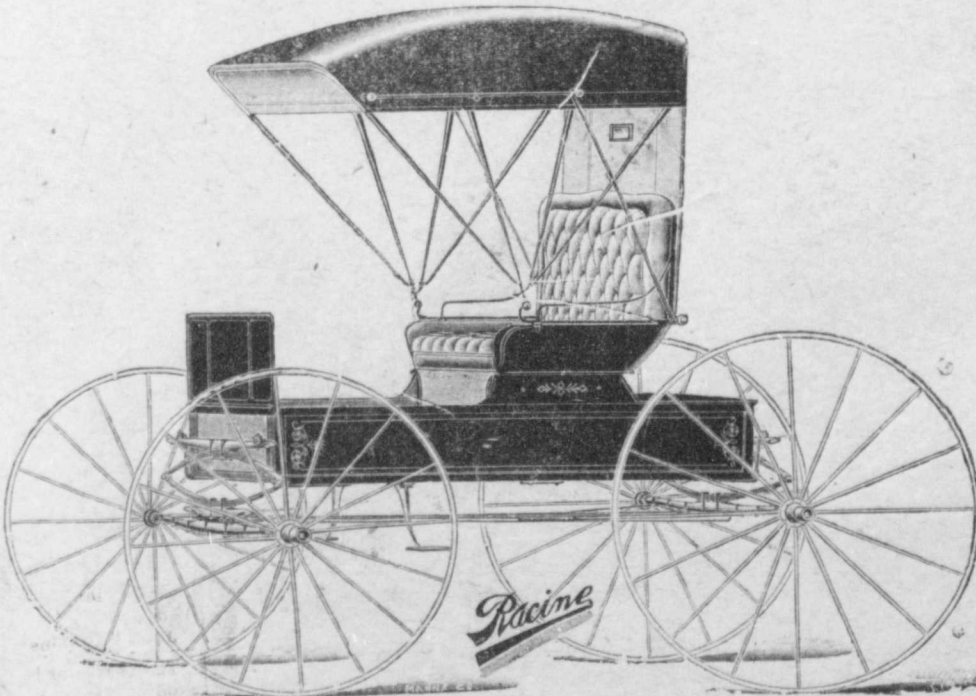

Will Hall, who was also confined in the jail, took no part in the assault on the officer or the attempt to escape.

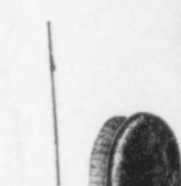
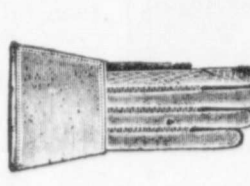
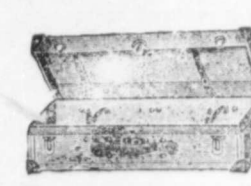
