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Ochiltree's Ever Normal Granary Overflows



Food for Freedom in a big way was produced in the Southwest this year and the Perryton area ranked at the top of the heap with thousands of bushels still piled on the ground awaiting storage space. In the above picture, County Agent E. W. Thomas, Audie Conley, county AAA chairman, and W. M. Dock, president of the Ochiltree County Farm Bureau and vice president of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, look over some of the wheat piled on the ground in this county.

Ochiltree county made an all-time record yield this year to lead Texas again in wheat production. At the close of the harvest season, all storage space on farms and every elevator in the county had been filled to capacity, with an overflow of thousands of bushels. Local elevators were very successful in securing room for thousands of bushels of grain in terminal houses. They have stored every possible bushel in their own bins.

Storage facilities of every kind have been pressed into use. Many new farm granaries were built. Hundreds of pre-fabricated granaries purchased from the Commodities Credit Corporation were erected on farms.

At the start of the harvest, 371,000 bushels of 1941 wheat owned by the CCC was stored in elevators in the county. Of the 1941 wheat, 260,000 bushels have been removed into emergency granaries erected by the CCC. Approximately 111,000 bushels of the 1941 CCC wheat remains in the elevators.

Local AAA and CCC officials have been impressing on higher officials of the CCC, the necessity for removing the remainder of the 1941 CCC owned wheat from storage in order to make room for the wheat crop on the ground. A definite decision is expected this week. The CCC state that they do not want to go to the expense of moving this 111,000 bushels as they expect to ship it out in the immediate future. Rites for Fire Victim Here Today

Mr. Bertrand was severely burned at his home in the east part of Perryton early Tuesday morning when an oil stove exploded in his kitchen. Damage to the residence was slight. Mr. Bertrand rushed outside the house and a neighbor wrapped him in a blanket and placed the enveloping flames.

Rev. Garland Farmer will have charge of the services. Burial will be in the Gray cemetery. Pallbearers will be A. F. Cutler, T. P. McLean, J. E. Yaden, A. E. D. Brooks, John Cook and W. L. Collins.

Oren J. Bertrand was born Oct. 11, 1866 in Ohio to Mr. and Mrs. Thomas J. Bertrand. When just a small boy, he came with his parents in 1871 to Kansas. They first settled in eastern Kansas, pushing on to about where Liberal is now located a few years later.

In 1888 the Bertrand family moved to the Oklahoma Panhandle and settled on the Beaver River in what

But the Perryton area can have the biggest and best celebration in history if its people will go to the banks and post office and buy thousands of dollars worth of War Bonds on August 22. Most of you can well afford to go all-out for your government.

Let's really celebrate Perryton's 24th birthday by making it the record day for investing in United States War Bonds.

Herman Hargrove, senior field officer in charge of county performance for the AAA program is back on the job at the court house after a two months leave of absence while he looked after his wheat farming interests. We want to apologize to Herman for omitting his name from a recent writup of the employees of the farm administration office. He is an important cog in the farm program and a valued employee.

Ochiltree county folks showed a decided lack of interest in public affairs when less than one-half the voters went to the polls July 25. Let's have a reversal of this indifference and get out a full vote Saturday for the run-off primary.

Now since we have resigned from the Ochiltree county rationing board, we want to ask the good people of this county to give a little more consideration to the men on this board.

Rationing regulations are made by the Federal government. Members of the board take a Federal oath of office that they will enforce these regulations. The regulations say who is eligible and the board has no choice in the matter.

Eligibility does not mean that the board can issue all a certificate to purchase tires and tubes. Each county is assigned a definite quota. Boards cannot issue more certificates than the quota.

The Ochiltree county board receives about ten times as many applications for tires from eligible users as they have tires in the quota. This means that many eligible users do not get tires.

Have a little consideration for the board members. They are serving without pay, giving their time for the war effort. The writer, during the harvest weeks, gave from one-half to two thirds of his time to the rationing board. This means that when the wheat farmer was reaping a harvest of golden dollars, we were giving our time for nothing at a sacrifice of many dollars of profit to See No. 1, Back Page

Scrap Metal Drive Begins August 29

Pile on Lot East Of Perryton Equity Exchange Elevator

Plans were laid Monday night at a meeting held in the Ochiltree County courtroom for the biggest scrap metal drive yet undertaken in this county. The drive will start Saturday, August 29, giving farmers having scrap metal time to gather it up so it can be brought in.

The lot east of the Perryton Equity Exchange has been secured to pile the metal. It will be known as the Ochiltree County Scrap Pile. All metals brought to this collection point must be weighed at one of the Perryton elevators and the scale tickets turned over to one of the Perryton implement dealers. The campaign is scheduled to last thirty days. At the end of that time the metal will be sold to the highest bidder. Junk dealers from over this area will be called in to make bids. The money received will be donated among those bringing in metal on basis of amount of metal brought in.

Anyone having scrap that is impossible for them to haul, such as a tractor that has not been taken down or some other heavy piece of equipment, should notify the salvage committee and they will see that transportation is available.

The Ochiltree County Victory Council is being called upon to work in their communities along with the Perryton implement dealers and the salvage committee. Train Wreck East of Follett

Nine cars of No. 52, the eastbound mixed train on the Santa Fe, were derailed east of Follett, Tuesday afternoon. Cause of the wreck was not announced by railroad officials. Five of the cars which left the track and turned over were loaded with wheat. Another car was loaded with merchandise. Three of the wrecked cars were empty. There was only one car of livestock, a load of hogs, in the train. It was just behind the engine and did not leave the track.

Trains over the Santa Fe into Perryton were late Wednesday. The west bound mixed train was four hours late. The westbound motor car, due at 2:35 a. m. came through at 2 p. m., about 12 hours late.

Men Entering Service Must Give Up Ration Books

Many persons, either from lack of information or through negligence, are failing to surrender their War Ration Books to the War Price and Rationing Board, when they are inducted or enlist in the armed forces. Heirs and next-of-kin also are failing to surrender to the board, the books of persons who have died. War rationing regulations are very strict in this regard and the local board will have to call on the Office of Price Administration to invoke the penalty provisions against persons who fail to return books of relatives who die or enter the armed forces.

First National Bank Deposits Now Exceed Two Million Dollars

The plant has been operated in the past at the Mont Cook farm but Mr. Calhoun plans to move the equipment into Perryton as soon as a suitable building can be obtained. The plant will be known as the Panhandle Hatchery with Mr. Calhoun in charge.

On the Home Front of World War II

(A weekly summary of developments in the Victory Program, prepared by the Regional Information Office, OEM)

Southwestern merchants, sometimes baffled by complicated OPA price schedules, will be glad to learn that Washington officials have taken a major step toward "streamlining" their price control program. This was apparent in the revision of Maximum Price Regulation 163 which previously covered only consumer services, such as shoe repair, dry cleaning, farm machinery repair, hat blocking and cleaning and developing and printing of photographs. Coverage is extended to include wholesale services and commercial and industrial consumers as well as ultimate consumers. The newly-revised regulation, which became effective August 19, drops the word "consumer" from its title and becomes simply "services."

The few services previously under the consumer service regulation and not listed in the new regulation automatically revert to the controls of the General Maximum Price Regulation unless specifically exempted by regulation. The basic principle of establishing ceiling prices at the highest levels of last March remains unchanged, but the mechanism has been simplified. The broad groups of services set forth in the new regulation make clear just which operations are to be controlled by its provisions, and the practical difficulty of determining whether a service is a "consumer" service has been eliminated.

Meanwhile, one of the Axis' most helpful little colleagues in America today—the rumor monger—took a severe beating at the hands of Paul M. O'Leary, deputy OPA administrator in charge of rationing.

commenting on rumors that certain commodities are to be rationed shortly, Mr. O'Leary declared that OPA is planning the rationing machinery for many commodities in which there is no present need for rationing, but he said, in this respect, were like the fire department. It gets its fire-fighting equipment ahead of time so when the alarm sounds, they don't have to go shopping for a fire engine in order to get to the fire. He added that "a competent discharge of our duties requires that we be ready to meet any emergency as it arises."

In a followup on Region OPA Administrator Max L. McCullough's recent statement that the policy of OPA was rapidly moving from education to enforcement, region officials last week sent out their first notice to a Southwestern retailer that he must cease violating price regulations or face the threat of having his business closed. The warning notice was sent by registered mail to a retail beer and soft drinks dealer in Arkansas. Under provisions of the Emergency Price Control Act of 1942, OPA can ask suspension of a business' license if, after receiving notice, the business continues to violate the regulations. OPA spokesmen said that additional warning notices are being prepared.

Already playing a major part in the war on the Home Front, farmers in Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma have been asked to participate in another great harvest—a National Scrap Harvest. That old "go-devil" or harrow you've had out behind the barn so long but for

which you have found no use, can be quickly transformed into a war weapon if you will get it into the scrap heap. It may be made into a bomb which will blast Tokyo or Berlin. It may well serve in a powerful American tank when the soldiers of Uncle Sam and of all the other freedom-loving countries hit the high road to Berlin. If you have been asking how you can help in the war effort, this giving of scrap metal is a practical method and has the sanction of every governmental war agency.

Of great interest to all in the Southwest this past week was the announcement by the War Production Board that production of 300 civilian articles made of iron and steel had to cease on August 14. This move is one of the key objectives of officials running the war. As the output of civilian goods drops, the production of war goods will climb. It will mean less buying of luxury goods and more buying of war stamps and bonds.

Approximately 1000 metal manufacturers in Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Texas are affected by this far-reaching order. Here are a few of the things on which production is being stopped: Watering, dipping and feeding tanks for animals (strapping excluded), barn pushers and scrapers, dishwashing racks, buttons for clothing, except for overalls, overall suits and dungarees, many types of fencing, wagon bodies, frames, and wheels, all metal (maintenance and repair excepted)—except for construction, ironing boards and stands, garden trowels, garden sprinkling cans and See No. 4, Back Page

Red Cross To Make 400 Kit Bags

As a reminder that the Red Cross is with him no matter where he goes, every service man sent on foreign assignment will be given a kit of comfort articles at the port of embarkation. The local chapter has accepted a quota of 400 kits to be made and filled by December 1. Mrs. G. L. Kengle, acting under Mrs. J. F. Cox, production chairman, is chairman of this committee. National headquarters will send materials for the kits and they will be made at the local work room.

Everyone will want a part in this work whether you have a boy in service or not—every church, club or lodge will want to provide a number of these kits, a personal gift to the service man.

The kit bag, according to regulations, will weigh not more than one and one-half pounds when filled. It will be of olive drab cotton fabric 11 inches wide and 14 inches deep. Soap, playing cards, cigarettes, shoe polishing cloth, pencils, envelopes and paper, chewing gum, shoelaces, waterproof matchbox, razor blades, small book, and a sewing case will be placed in the kit.

During the next few weeks the Ochiltree Chapter plans to collect around \$600 for this project. The exact cost of each kit has not been figured but will probably be near \$1.50. Mrs. Kengle will announce coworkers and plans of collection See No. 7, Back Page

His parents have been in Missouri at a camp meeting. Efforts are being made to contact them in Arkansas and Oklahoma as they have left the meeting and are enroute home.

The entire day and evening meeting during the school will be devoted to the program.

Instruction will be given on installing such a program in high schools.

Texas Fire Insurance Rates Reduced

AUSTIN, July 30.—A sweeping statewide reduction in fire insurance rates, announced today by Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner, will result in an estimated saving of \$3,200,000 to Texas policy holders during the next 12 months. The new rates, effective in today's order by the Board of Insurance Commissioners, will become effective on fire insurance policies written after August 1, 1942.

The broad reduction affects many classes of insured property, and in the case of dwellings amounts to as much as a 25 per cent saving in future insurance costs.

A few classes of property will receive increases in rates due to unusually heavy losses experienced in these classes during the past few years, Hall said.

"The revision of rates in today's order," Commissioner Hall added, "has resulted from an exhaustive study of fire losses experienced in these classes. The Board of Insurance Commissioners is continuing a study of loss experience in other classes with a view of determining whether other reductions may be justified. In addition, the Board is giving serious consideration to the subject of broadening the coverage of insurance policies to give the policy holder added protection."

"Recently the Board urged companies to reduce their operating costs in order that this saving also might be passed on to the public. Cooperation of both companies and agents to this end has been splendid. The agents, as a whole, are due particular credit in the unselfish attitude displayed in a willingness to see all savings possible passed on to the insurance buyers."

The greatest saving in any class will apply to dwellings. This benefit, estimated to exceed \$2,625,000 within the next 12 months, will reach more individual property owners than any other class. Premiums on insured dwellings last year accounted for approximately 40 per cent of the fire insurance business written in Texas.

Savings to insurance buyers in Texas as a result of today's order, coupled with reductions during the past six years, reach an approximate total of \$10,000,000. Hall said. "Insurance costs in Texas today are the lowest at any time," he continued. "The lower rates for insurance protection is the direct dividend to the policy holder for preventing fires. In 1937 we promised the people of Texas lower insurance rates if they would cooperate in fire prevention practices. Our citizens have cooperated and thereby the

insured losses in Texas have been reduced. With reduced fire losses it has been possible for the insurance costs to be lowered."

Hall stated that in some instances the saving on fire insurance premiums since the early part of 1936 will amount to 63 per cent. As an example, he said the annual cost of \$5,000 fire insurance on a one-story, frame dwelling with shingle roof and tenant occupancy before June 15, 1936 was \$37.50. Now the same amount of insurance on the same type dwelling will cost \$13.88. This will vary slightly in Texas towns according to their respective key rates and fire record credits.

In recounting the substantial insurance savings effected during recent years, the Board recognizes that many factors have contributed to the continued downward revision in fire insurance rates. These include fire prevention practices; the cooperation of city officials with both the insurance department and local fire departments in providing more adequate protection against fires; active cooperation of the firemen; helpfulness of insurance agents in extending aid to insurance buyers, and the cooperation of the insurance companies.

The good fire record credits benefiting 506 Texas towns and cities this year will mean a total saving over normal insurance costs in the amount estimated at over \$2,733,000. In 1939 the Board of Insurance Commissioners made the maximum 25 per cent good fire record credit applicable to all towns and cities. Prior to that time the maximum benefits applied only to towns and cities with an annual volume of \$20,000 or more in insurance premiums.

"Our efforts on a constant fire prevention program are now paying substantial dividends," Hall asserted. "Texas ranks foremost in the nation on fire prevention education. Texas firemen have done an excellent job as a whole in fighting fires and in the improvement of fire fighting practices. Given an opportunity they have been able to materially reduce potential losses after fires were discovered."

"Besides the property saved from fire destruction every year, the cost of protection has steadily decreased. There is only one way in which we can preserve the savings record already attained, and that is to continue with a vigilant practice of fire prevention in every home and place of business."

Insured property records on Texas property are established over a five-year period, with adjustments made annually and it is upon this record that rates are determined.

'Trench Mouth' May be Prevented

AUSTIN—Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has released some interesting information concerning Vincent's angina which was commonly called "trench mouth" during World War I.

Dr. Cox states that Vincent's angina is a specific infection producing inflammatory condition of the mucous membranes, more commonly those of the mouth, and the disease is spread by indirect as well as direct contact.

"Because of the readiness with which this disease is transmitted, it has been occasionally found in epidemic form among school children and other groups," Dr. Cox states. "Vincent's angina assumed epidemic proportions in the front line trenches in 1914-1918 and it was during this period that the disease became generally known as trench mouth."

Although trench mouth is now worldwide in distribution, reasonable application of preventive measures which are merely those in line with approved personal health practices will be found a sufficient defense against this infection.

According to the State Health Officer the most common causes of Vincent's angina are neglected mouths, broken teeth fillings, and other types of oral irritation. Daily hygiene, plus the periodic visit to the dentist can be relied upon as reasonable buffers against this infection. However, persons who are very careful regarding oral hygiene can acquire this disease by using infected drinking cups and eating utensils and other personal articles; also by kissing, though healthy gums and mucous membranes have a much superior resistance to the infection than does an unclean mouth.

School Bus Use Tightened: Reorganization of all school bus routes to eliminate duplications, less-than-capacity loads and unnecessary trips are among the conservation measures called for in a plan for allocating new vehicles to school districts. The plan, worked out by the National Council of Chief State School Officers, has been endorsed by ODT Director Joseph B. Eastman as a "yardstick" for distribution of new school buses. About 93,000 school buses are in daily service over the country, providing transportation for about four million children, or one-sixth of the juvenile population. Normally about 12,000 of these buses would have been replaced this year.

No Asphalt to
Repair State
Highways

District Engineer
Asks Cooperation in
Preserving Pavements

Due to "freezing" of asphalt material by Federal Agencies, resulting in curtailed maintenance of Highways, Mr. James G. Lott, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department, requests the co-operation of County Officials, County Agricultural Agents, the Department of Public Safety and the Press in providing the public with the following information.

In order to provide the necessary asphalt for construction of Army Training Camps, Air Bases, Defense Plants and other War Activities, the Petroleum Co-ordinator has restricted the use of asphalt to military installations and the Strategic Military Highway Network.

As a result of this restriction, no asphalt is available for patching of holes, cuts or other damaged conditions developing on the major portion of the highway mileage in this District. Therefore, the Texas Highway Department will not be able to maintain the highways at the standard to which the traveling public has become accustomed in the past. The attention of the traveling public is directed to these conditions and it is urged that the highway users be patient and that they exercise the fullest care possible in driving over highways so that wear or damage to tires as a result of depressed road conditions will be held to a minimum.

The particular attention of farmers and other individuals who find it necessary to transport equipment or implements along or across highways is directed to these conditions. Their fullest co-operation is requested in handling equipment in such a manner that damage to highways will be avoided. Damage to asphalt surfaces through carelessness or unlawful operation is not only subject to legal action and fine, but is definitely unpatriotic at this time when asphalt for repairs is not available to care for the damage. Farmers and other operators in general have been very co-operative, but some individuals persist in violating the laws in this matter. It will be necessary to take full legal action against violators in the future.

Must Make Tax Returns for Casual Workers

All wages paid for services rendered, regardless of the length of time involved, should be reported on the regular quarterly Social Security tax returns. Dewey Reed, manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Board, announced today.

The announcement was made to correct the false impression of many employers that work of a short duration need not be reported.

"Temporary, part-time, intermittent, or casual labor, which is in the course of an employer's trade or business should be reported, even though the amount of wages involved is small," Reed said. "Employers should record the name and Social Security account number of each such worker, and the required information should be reported the same as that for regular employees who work steadily for one employer."

Reed added that night watchmen, janitors, and others who may be employed by several firms at the same time are entitled to the old-age and survivors insurance benefits which are provided by the Social Security Act. The benefits are computed on the basis of the total wages received from all employers who are covered by the Social Security Act.

COLLEGE STATION—There are many localities in Texas in which enriched bread is not available. And while enriched flour is generally available to consumers, there still is considerable lower price and grade unenriched flour on the market. This situation has led a national organization of bakers, millers and retail grocers to begin a concerted drive to obtain the enrichment of all white flour.

"Enriched flour" is white or near white flour to which required amounts of Vitamin B1, niacin and iron are added, explains Hazel Phlips, specialist in food preparation for the A. and M. College Extension Service. In line with the recommendations of leading authorities in the field of nutrition research, the Extension Service has long encouraged the use of whole grain products, she says, but since many people continue to use refined flours and cereals, enrichment of all flour and bread will pay dividends in better diets.

Nutritionally speaking, whole wheat or whole grain products are best; enriched flour and breads

should be second choice. County extension agents recently have been encouraged to cooperate in the enrichment drive and to inform rural Texans on the comparative nutritional value of whole wheat, enriched, and refined flours.

Miss Phlips explains that a yeast bread or quick bread made with whole wheat flour or half enriched white flour and half of 100 per cent whole wheat flour makes a very good flavored and nutritious product. Greater use of yeast breads rather than biscuits will go a long way toward conserving the vitamins in flour products. This is because the soda and/or baking powder used in biscuits destroy part of the thiamin in the flour, she explains.

One day Dad got a bright idea. He called the whole family together for a special meeting at the dinner table.

He told them he was tired of checking up on them all the time. He said he thought they were old enough now to check up on themselves. The older children would watch the younger ones. They would have meetings every so often and hand out rewards or punishments.

Well, it was a crazy idea but the kids liked it and they started behaving better than they ever had before. The idea worked and Dad finally did get a little time for himself.

I mention this story about Dad Hoskins because it's something like what I understand the beer industry is doing to regulate itself.

As I see it, most of the beer industry behaves itself perfectly all right . . . but every now and then, I guess, a retailer comes along who runs a place that isn't up to scratch . . . sort of like a wayward kid.

So like Dad Hoskins' family, the brewers and beer distributors have united together in an industry self-regulation program to help the proper authorities "clean up or close up" offending retail places.

The brewers, who want to protect beer's good name, cooperate wisely with the authorities who enforce the laws.

From where I sit, that's a fine thing for the brewers to do . . . particularly when you realize that after all they're really not responsible for retailing conditions.

Dependency Waivers Not Required of Navy Enlistees

Applicants for enlistment in the U. S. Navy are no longer required to secure waiver of dependency affidavits from their dependents, L. H. Ridout, Jr., Officer in Charge of the Navy recruiting district of North Texas announced today.

"Since the recent enactment by congress of the bill providing for allowances for support of the service-

man's dependents, men may now be enlisted in any navy rating without the necessity of dependents executing such waivers."

Navy beginning base pay ranges from \$50.00 to \$126.00 a month depending on qualifications of applicants. Married men in pay rating of \$78.00 a month or less receive under the new pay bill \$28.00 a month allowance for wives, \$12.00 for first child and \$10.00 a month for each additional child. Men in pay rating of \$96.00 a month or above receive \$34.50 a month for

dependents. Other men, who have dependents receive similar allowances," Lieutenant Ridout, Jr., said. Age limits for naval service are now open for qualified men. Navy recruiting stations are located at Abilene, Amarillo, Big Spring, Dallas, Fort Worth, Longview, Lubbock, Paris, San Angelo, Sherman, Tyler, Waco and Wichita Falls.
