Farmers meeting slated

Castro County Farmers Union will hold its county convention Monday, beginning at 6 p.m. at the Legion Hut in Nazareth.

Among the issues to be discussed will be resolutions which will be forwarded to the state resolutions committee Dec. 4.

Doug Higgins, president, noted Tuesday that at least one resolution will involve a response to President Jimmy Carter's recent remarks about wage and price increases. Higgins said some of the resolutions committee members were unhappy with provisions to allow wages to rise a greater percentage than crop prices.

Other issues on the agenda include election of county directors. Last week the Hart Beat incorrectly reported that two vice presidents would be elected from each township into the county. The correct information is that two directors will be elected from each town including Hart, Dimmitt, Nazareth, and Sunnyside.

Vice presidents are Harold Bob Bennett and Vic Nelson.

Schedule of events Monday includes a registration period beginning at 6 p.m. with dinner at 7 and the business session at 8. Speaker will be Bedford Forest, of Channel 7.

Hart High graduate is award winning writer

Hereford Brand Farm Editor Jim Steiert, a 1969 graduate of Hart High School, has received a first-place award in the 1978 National Newspaper Association Better Newspaper Contest for his weekly farm column, "On The Turnrow," it was announced last week.

Steiert's entry was the winner in the "best columns, serious subjects" category, and beat out some 4,700 nationwide entries for the division open to newspapers with 5,000 circulation and less.

The NNA award is the second garnered by the Brand,

the first coming several years ago for a column written by former Brand publisher Jimmie Gillentine.

Steiert's winning entry was a column about his late grandmother, Francis Davis Steiert, the bread she baked, and the traditions she and farm women like her have fostered within their families over the years.

The NNA award was the second received by Steiert this year for his farm column.

In April, he was awarded a second place prize in the Panhandle Press Association

Property Valuations Lowered

Members of the Hart school board and Superintendent Ted Averitt won an appeal on valuation of property before a State Appeals board Nov. 1, in Austin. The victory lowered valuation of Hart district property about 9.24 percent.

The favorable decision given to school representative Wamon Foster, Harold Bob Bennett, Ted Averitt, and Jim McMorries of McMorries & Company of Hereford, the schools assessment representative, means dollars in the pockets of district residents.

According to Averitt, the amount of local tax dollars which are used to finance on going school costs is determined by the state's valuation. A high valuation means the district has to pay a greater percentage of the bill cost of operating the schools while a lower valuation means paying a lower percentage.

The State's Assessment Practices Board had set the total value of property in the district at \$125,530,277. The board argued successfully that the value was too high by \$11,610,958.

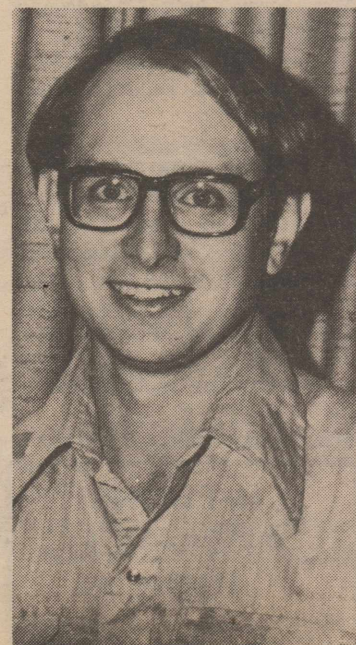
The state lowered the valuation to \$113,919,319.

The biggest savings, which amounted to about \$11 million, was in the value of land. According to McMorries testimony the state used value per acre figures taken from one land sale. McMorries used about a half dozen sales to demonstrate a lower average value per acre, Averitt said.

The school district's contribution to total funding varies each year depending on the daily average attendance at the school and the valuation of property in the district.

Last year the district contributed about 15 percent of the minimum funding figure which is set by the state.

Hart spends additional funds for teachers and other expenses in addition to the minimum figure set by the state. These expenditures are taken at the discretion of the school board in order to upgrade the standard of education in the district above the minimum state standard.

In addition to the two farm awards, Steiert received a second place award for his outdoors column "Whistling Wings" from the Associated Press Managing Editors Association of Texas this year. Along with Brand staff member Bob Nigh, he received an honorable mention in the community service category of the APME contest for a series of articles on problems in the San Jose community south of Hereford.

The series also won the coveted Community Service award in the Texas Press Association contest this year.

Steiert, who grew up on a farm in Hart, moved to The Brand in 1975 after a two year stint as news editor of the Castro County News. He received a first place award for the best newspaper special edition from the Panhandle Press Association in 1976 for a tabloid salute to agriculture. He

was honored last year by the National Shooting Sports Foundation for a tabloid on National Hunting and Fishing Day which he wrote, edited and illustrated.

He is a 1973 graduate of West Texas State University, where he served as editor of the student newspaper, "The Prairie."

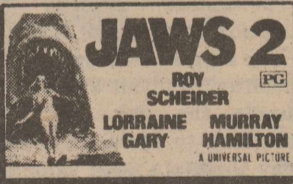

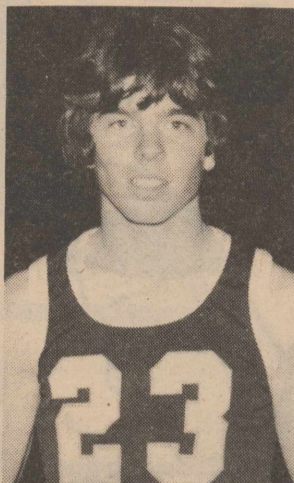

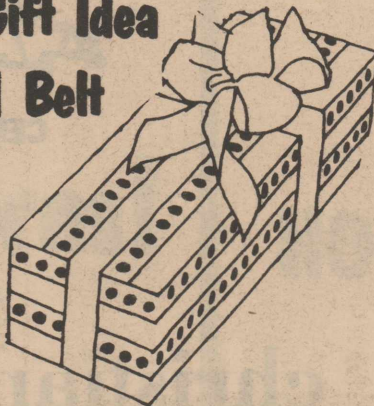
