## Hospitality Clinic Held By C of C

The tourist industry of the State of Texas and the City of Rockport can very easily become the third leading industry within the new few years, according to the report made by C. S. "Tiny" Rowand, Tourist Director, South Texas Chamber of Commerce.

This statement was brought out during the Rockport Chamber of Commerce Hospitality Clinic held Wednesday in three sessions throughout the day.

Rowand pointed out to the 75 to 80 members attending that a new evaluation is needed on the part of the community's citizens to renew their interests in the tremendous impact that the tourist dollars has on Rockport's economy.

In a statement to the delegates of the meeting, Rowand stated "Each community along the Golden Crescent of the Gulf Coast needs to revamp its community attitude to better improve and increase the number of visitors to our area."

Bill E. Henderson, Director of Tourism, City of San Antonio, pointed out to the attending members of the Clinic that one of the greatest assets a community can possess is, "cooperation, togetherness, and plenty of coordinated effort."

Henderson stated that an everyday inventory on the part of the hospitality groups and the community's citizens is needed in the successfulness of the tourist business in the same way it is valuable to any manufacturer or industrialist.

In evaluating the Hospitality Clinic, Vernon Kleypas, chairman of the Merchant's Committee said, "A new community enthusiasm has been sparked. A vivid and clear picture has been given on the great amount of work and co-operation that is needed among our citizens to better our reaping the share of profits from tourist travel that can be added to our city's economical picture."

Mary Juergens, Rockport Chamber of Commerce Manager, stated that a follow up on the part of Chamber organization will be made through the formulation of a Rockport Beautification Committee in an effort to create community appearance.

She stated that anyone of the Chamber's members interested in serving on this committee may register at the Chamber offices and work will soon start on the committee's program of work.

## Navigation District Sued For \$45,000

Suit was filed in the 156th District Court Wednesday morning, asking \$45,000 damages from the Aransas County Navigation District No. 1, and from a number of individuals, in the deaths of Susana and Margarita Torres and Oralia Tamez.

This is the second suit to be filed emanating from the tragic death by drowning of seven people on May 25, 1958.

Earlier the same plaintiffs had begun action against the Loyd W. Richardson Construction Company of Aransas Pass. Complainants in both actions are Baldemar Torres and his wife, Juanita—parents of Susana Torres; Candelario Torres and his wife, Guadalupe—parents of Margarita Torres; and Encarnacion and Hortencia Tamez, parents of Oralia Tamez.

Each couple is suing both Loyd W. Richardson Construction Company and Aransas County Navigation District No. 1, and the commissioners of the district, Thomas D. Picton, Norvell Jackson and Raymond Owens, in office at the time of the drownings, and the present commissioners, Ted Little Ted Atwood, and Owens.

Each suit is for \$15,000 for the death of each of the three children, making a total of \$45,000 per suit, or \$90,000 altogether.

The plaintiff alleged negligence of the commissioners in the suit filed Wednesday morning. In the suit against the Loyd W. Richardson Construction Company, the complaint alleges that a hole created by a Richardson dredge was the cause of the deaths.

## New Commander Takes Over In Air Defense

Colonel A. V. Walton has been named commander of the Oklahoma City Air Defense Sector, which includes radar sites at Ellington AFB, San Antonio, Zapata, Port Isabel, Rockport, Riviera and Palacios, as well as other installations in this state.

He replaced Colonel John T. Fitzwater, now vice commander of the 93rd Air Division. A native of Shattuck, Okla., Colonel Walton is a graduate of West Point and during World War II, flew 20 combat missions over Germany and France, including raids against the Zeitz and Politzi oil plants.

In his new assignment, he will be responsible for defending some 300,000 square miles of territory and about 10,000,000 people from air attack.

To accomplish this, Walton will command 13 Aircraft Control and Warning Squadrons, including those already mentioned. Fighter and fighter-interceptor aircraft from nine units are available to intercept enemy aircraft or missiles detected by this network.

Three Nike Missile batteries will be added to this later in the year as they become operational in Texas and Louisiana.

# Council Approves Tentative Budget

Also Makes Plans to Clamp Down On Dogs, Sweep Streets and To Co-operate On Signs With C. of C.

The City Council, at their regular meeting, approved a tentative budget, agreed to cooperate with the Chamber of Commerce on signs directing people to the beach, appointed a Board of Equalization, discussed employing a city pound master, and approved the mayor's request that a street sweeping program be inaugurated. Members of the Board of Equalization are James Hanway,

A. L. Holland and C. L. Thomas. The time for their first meeting has still to be set.

Seth Steele and James Kautz were present at the meeting, and asked the council to act as intermediaries with the State Highway Department to obtain signs along Loop 70 and Highway 35, pointing to the beach routes at both Rockport and Fulton, as the Chamber of Commerce was anxious to have this accomplished by the time that tourists started coming for the summer.

Councilmen were reminded that the dog control program would go into effect on June 1, and they authorized Mayor Herman Johnson to start looking for someone to fill the post of pound master for the city.

Mrs. Jeane Tuer, City Secretary told the councilmen that although dog tags had been in for some time, and wide publicity had been given to the matter, only seventeen such licenses had been obtained so far.

Councilmen and mayor were emphatic that dogs found running loose on the streets after June 1 would be picked up and held in the city pound from which they could be redeemed only by purchase of a dog license and payment of the dog's board bill which will be \$1 per day.

Dogs will be held in the pound for a short time only, after which they will be destroyed.

The county will participate in the program, County Judge Wendell said.

Mayor Herman Johnson asked the council to approve use of a city crew to clean streets at least once a week, as with the tourist season starting, trash would accumulate rapidly. The council agreed with him, and Saturday morning, at 4 a.m. the crews will begin their task, which will be carried on all through the summer.

A tentative budget was presented by Mrs. Jeane Tuer, City Secretary, for councilmen's inspection.

Mrs. Tuer estimated that tax collections for the upcoming fiscal year would amount to \$54,000. Of this 90% collections of current taxes would account for \$46,350; delinquent tax collections will bring in \$1500; gross receipts from other sources, \$5150; permits, \$500; occupation taxes, \$500.

Tax distribution is .35 cents to the street improvement bond sinking fund; 42 cents to street maintenance and drainage fund; and 73 cents to the general fund.

The general fund would receive \$26,400 which will be allocated as follows:

Park fund, \$500; fire department, \$2500; building maintenance \$500; social security on city employees, \$2000; insurance, \$500; (continued on page 8)

## Coast Guard Announces New Distress Signal

A new distress signal to be used in daylight by operators of small boats was announced by the Coast Guard Thursday.

The signal is made by slowly and repeatedly raising and lowering the arms outstretched to each side.

The Coast Guard said the new signal "satisfies an immediate need of the boating public without the use of specially required equipment."

It added that no regulation prevents a boatman in distress from holding a conspicuous object in his hand while making the signal.

Many yachtmen had asked the Coast Guard to suggest that some object he held in each hand while making the signal.

The Coast Guard said its Merchant Marine Council will hold public hearings next year and may at that time adopt some device for use in conjunction with the distress signal.

## Roy Hinton Files Suit For Recount

Roy Hinton, low man in a three-candidate race for Aransas County Sheriff in the Democratic primary on May 7, has filed suit seeking a recount and alleging that the election laws of the state were violated by the incumbent, A. C. Shivers and the Democratic Executive Committee composed of E. T. White, chairman, Harold Howard, E. N. Adams, Ernest Jones and Louis Tuer.

By the alleged violations, Hinton's petition says, a run-off election was avoided in the Sheriff's race.

Specifically, he lists a number of violations, among which are failure to place a guard rail so that unauthorized persons may not approach closer than six feet to a voter marking his or her ballot; that unauthorized persons, particularly in Precinct 2, where most of the alleged violations occurred, were mingling with voters marking their ballots;

That Shivers' supporters actually solicited votes within less than 100 feet of the polling place; that the presiding judge in Precinct 2 is related to Shivers and that the election judges in Precinct 2 were almost all relatives of either Shivers or his deputies.

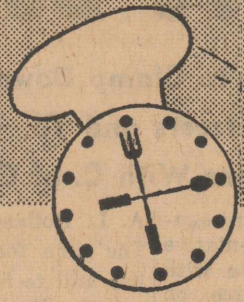

**TEXAS LAWMEN**  
**Thomas P. McCall, Sheriff**  
"Takes a fightin' man to keep the peace!"

Back a hundred years ago there were more Texas acres than Texans. And when a lawman was needed, the Governor usually just commissioned the man he judged best qualified to get the job done. That's the way Sheriff Thomas P. McCall made it, the first time. Born in Belfast, and as Irish as Paddy's shillelagh, McCall had drifted to Texas about 1848, en route to California. But here he found congenial souls, and tarried. He was next heard of as the boon companion of Bigfoot Wallace, the pair of 'em carrying the mail on horseback from San Antonio to Santa Fe. By 1857 he was driving the overland stage out of San Antonio to El Paso, in distinguished company. Light Townsend rode shotgun, while the guards were Louis Ogre, Tom Rife, a stranger named Bader and Bigfoot Wallace. Together they made lots of legend, and some history. A year later Governor Runnels called in McCall and handed him the Sheriff's badge, Medina County. Evidently a wise choice, for in 1860 he was re-commissioned by Governor Sam Houston. Later, when elections for Sheriff became stylish, Bexar County voted him in and kept him in office until he had to "holler uncle" and retire. For the rest of his life he swapped tall tales, tobacco and tankards with ex-outlaws and other friends, in San Antonio.

The lawman has always needed courage and good judgment to keep the peace. We need that, too... to keep our good life and liberty. street lights, \$5000; office salaries \$4000; office expense, \$3000; and operations, \$8400.

Estimated collection in the sewage and water departments amount to \$75,000, according to Mrs. Tuer, and expenditures from this are as follows:

Water maintenance and repair, \$5,000; sewer maintenance and repair, \$5,000; permanent water improvements, \$10,000; permanent sewer improvements, \$10,000; water department salaries, \$14,000; sewer department salaries, \$7,000; gas and oil for the two departments, \$1,200; truck maintenance, \$800; electricity for the water and sewer departments, \$3,400; office expense, \$700; insurance \$1,500; refund on Little Bay Shores water lines, \$2,000; engineering expenditures, \$500; railroad leases, \$10; licenses, fees, dues, school, \$50; and interest and sinking fund, \$13,740.

In the garbage department for which charges will be made for the first time, starting June 1, estimated income is \$20,000 annually.

Of this amount, \$13,000 will go to salaries, \$3,000 to truck maintenance and repair, and \$4,000 into a sinking fund for replacement of equipment.

In other business, councilmen discussed a request by the Chamber of Commerce for a light on top of the Rockport Water Tower to aid boatmen in navigating in Aransas Bay at night. In a letter from the Chamber, Mrs. Juergens told councilmen that numerous complaints had been received from boatmen that the lights of Rockport blurred the navigation lights placed around Rockport Harbor by the Coast Guard and made them indistinguishable. Mrs. Juergens enclosed a letter written to the Coast Guard by the Navigation District, asking for light changes, and a reply from the Coast Guard saying that such changes were not feasible. During the discussion, it was brought out that the light on the water tower, because of its height, would be widely visible.

many of the 109 absentee ballots were cast by voters who "were misled into believing that they could cast absentee ballots regardless of whether they were to be out of the county or not on election day."

Hinton's petition claims that these voters were acting in good faith and in so voting absentee votes "were misled by A. C. Shivers, his relatives, friends and supporters."

Hinton claims irregularities in printing of the official ballots; that the article of the election code preventing loitering near the polls was violated; that election judges permitted many persons including the said Shivers, his friends and supporters to come and go at will in the place where Precinct 2 votes were being tabulated.

Alleging irregularities in the count, Hinton's petition, filed in the 36th District Court at Sinton, says that Hinton relied upon statements by the County Executive Chairman that a recount would be made and did not take immediate action on the matter.

For this reason, the petition says, the Executive Committee cannot say that his petition was not filed within the time provided by law because, had such alleged statements not been made, he would have filed before the deadline for such filing.

Stating that he is ready and able to pay for a recount, Hinton states that he is willing to do so, "To the end that Aransas County may be free from any fraudulent primary elections now or in the future."

Hinton's petition asks that a recount be made, and that if the allegations in his petition are found correct by the court, that the Executive Committee be directed to have his name placed on the official ballots for the second primary.

In the May 7 election, A. C. Shivers, incumbent, received 1071 votes; Elva Mullinax, 476; Roy Hinton, 459; and J. D. Spencer 1.

Judge John Miller was in town Wednesday and set the date for a trial and hearing on this matter for 10 a.m., Tuesday, May 31.

**Western Union Out of Commission For Ten Days Here**

Western Union, once a symbol of speed, would do better to adopt a turtle as its mascot in the Rockport area, for, since May 13, there has either been no service or it has been so poor that it was almost impossible to walk and deliver the message more quickly than to send it by wire.

Trouble started when a line squall moved down into South Texas a week ago last Friday and flattened wires here there and yonder between Rockport and San Antonio. Since then, it has been a case of on again, off again, gone again, Jernigan, with the service being interrupted more than it has been usable.

Crux of the whole matter lies in a jurisdictional hassle between Western Union and the Southern Pacific Railroad. The railroad maintains the wires, Western Union uses them, and Western Union employees must frequently wait on railroad employees who say: "I'll fix it when I get to it," and who aren't too particular about when they get to it.

It seems a pity in these days, when everyone is fighting for business and when Rockport and its area is growing by leaps and bounds that the communication system serving the area is almost as antiquated as a horse and buggy.

Max J. Kurdna, local agent, and the agent in Aransas Pass are the only reason that Western Union messages in this area can be delivered many times. For, when the local wire is out, the lady at Aransas Pass calls Max and he delivers the message.

Nor do efforts by Western Union's wire chief in San Antonio produce any more results than complaints by local agents. The maintenance men, who work for the railroad, merely state that they're working on the trouble and let it go at that.

Rockport, while its population count within the city is only about a thousand more than it was ten years ago, still serves a large and growing population on Live Oak Peninsula, where real estate developments are burgeoning on every side, and where some 6500 people live within a few miles of the telegraph office.

Yet it is still served with the old type telegraph, that uses a key and requires a trained man to operate it. A little over a year ago, after Ed Beasley went into the county clerk's office and supply personnel were working here, there were a number of them that could not use a key, with the result that telegrams had to be phoned or taken to Aransas Pass, just as they do today when the wire is out.

Refugio, while larger, probably generated no more Western Union business than does Rockport, for Refugio has no extensive tourist trade with wired reservations and similar needs for telegrams. Yet Refugio has one of the largest teletype machines, operated by the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce.

And most of the little communities in this part of the country are served in the same manner. Rockport is still rocking along in the horse-and-buggy age as far as this type of communication goes, even though Kurdna does everything he can to alleviate the situation.
