When the time comes that we are about to lose something in our town that we have become accustomed to relying on its service it is a little hard to take.

For more than a half century the Texas and Pacific Railway has served this community well. For a great part of that time the community patronized the T&P and both enjoyed prosperity. The automobiles, buses and airplanes have taken away the passenger business from the railroad. Trucks have made great inroads into the freight business and the railroad is having to cut expenses to the bone to survive.

For several years the T&P has been asking merchants to have their merchandise shipped by T&P. They have had some success in this but have not received full cooperation and now it is coming to the point where Loraine may have her depot closed.

We do not want that to happen and we doubt if there is a business in town that does. For years we have specified that all of our merchandise be shipped via T&P.

Sometimes people lose sight of the real value of things until those things are lost. We forget that the railroad is the source of much of our tax values and we fail to remember that truck lines are not worth a plugged nickel to us so far as taxes are concerned.

But people are prone to forget many things that have meant a great deal to the community. For the sake of saving a few pennies on a bill of groceries, printing or anything else they sacrifice a local business.

It could come about some time that the local merchant—like the railroad—will come to the point where it will have to curtail his services too.

The people here, as well as those who live in hundreds of other places throughout our land, need to take another look at what is happening. Sure, we know, Bill Smith has the right to spend his money anywhere he wants to. He also has a duty to perform as a citizen of a community.

Many farmers and ranchers are glad to take a few minutes of time to answer the questions asked on livestock numbers in order to have information available for making business decisions. Information obtained from this survey is returned to farmers and ranchers through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, radio and television.

This annual survey has been a joint undertaking of the Post Office and the Department of Agriculture since 1924, concluded Mr. Coffee.

Thursday, November 19, is "Open House" at Texas Electric Service Company's power plant on Lake Colorado City for all residents of Mitchell County.

Celebrating the recent completion of its fifth turbine-generator unit to be installed in the modern outdoor steam-electric generating station, the electric company has designated next Thursday as "Mitchell County Day" at the plant. Students from high schools in the county have been especially invited to tour the plant and see the many types of equipment that are required to make electricity.

The open house will be from 1 p. m. to 6 p. m. Visitors will be shown through the plant, around the plant grounds and through the buildings and plant structures.

The plant is located just off the Colorado City-Sterling City highway, about four miles south-west of Colorado City.

Visitors to the plant will see four towering boilers, the newest of which is 143 feet tall, or about the height of a 14 story building. This boiler makes steam that is so hot it could set wood aflame in an instant and melt most metals.

They will see the new turbine-generator unit recently installed which can produce more electricity than all four of the previously installed units at the power plant. This new unit more than doubled the net generating capability of the plant, which is now 333,000 kilowatts and is the largest power plant in West Texas.

In the plant control room they'll see the delicate instruments that tell at a glance how each part of the plant is functioning.

Among the special visitors to the power plant will be directors of Texas Electric Service Company who will hold their quarterly meeting Thursday morning at Colorado City. The directors and top officials of the electric company will be honored Wednesday night, November 18, at a banquet of appreciation at the Colorado City Civic House arranged by business and civic leaders.

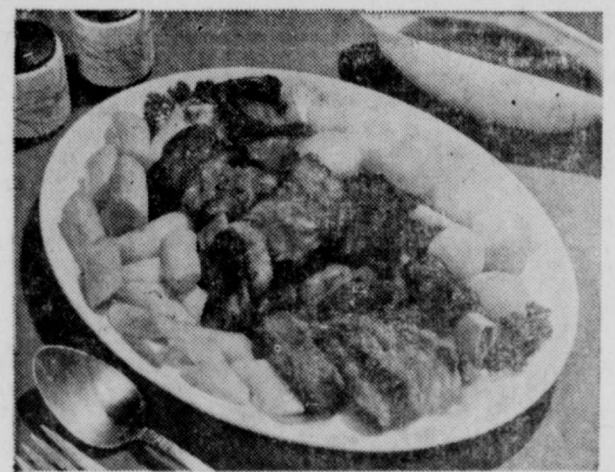
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PROMINENT TEXAN RECEIVES GOLD MEDAL AWARD

1960 Cotton Acreage Allotment Proclaimed; Choice B Growers Permitted 40 Percent Increase

Cotton quota; 40% increase Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson October 14 proclaimed a national marketing quota of 13,133,000 bales and a national acreage allotment of 16 million acres for the 1960 crop of upland cotton. December 15 was set as the date for the referendum on 1960 upland cotton marketing quotas, which must be approved by at least two-thirds of the upland cotton farmers voting if the quotas are to be effective.

The Secretary also announced his determination that alternate—Choice (B)—farm allotments for the 1960 crop of upland cotton will be 40 per cent larger than the "regular" Choice (A) allotments for the same farms. This determination is made under Section 101 of the Agricultural Act of 1958, which authorized the Secretary of Agriculture to increase regular upland cotton farm acreage allotments (for 1959 and 1960) by "not to exceed 440 per cent" for those operators who elect Choice (B) under the cotton allotment program. The 40 per cent increase in upland cotton acreage permitted for 1960—provided marketing quotas are in effect for the crop—is the same as was in effect for 1959.

The national acreage allotment for 1960 has been set at the level required under Section 342 of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended, and the national marketing quotas has been set at the number of bales required to provide an acreage allotment of this size. A national marketing quota and a national acreage allotment for upland cotton must be proclaimed for the following year if the Secretary finds that the total supply of upland cotton for the current marketing year exceeds the normal supply. According to the latest available statistics, the total supply of upland cotton for the 1959-60 marketing year is estimated at 23,154,000 bales (running bales or the equivalent). This is 4,434,000 bales above the "normal supply" of 18,720,000 bales. The "normal supply," as defined in the legislation for determining whether marketing quotas shall

be proclaimed, is the current marketing year's estimated domestic consumption of 8,900,000 bales and exports of 5,500,000 bales, plus a 30 per cent reserve of 4,320,000 bales.

The total supply figure of 23,154,000 bales includes an August 1, 1959, carryover of 8,611,000 bales, a 1959 crop (Oct. estimate) of 14,483,000 bales and estimated imports of 60,000 bales.

The national marketing quota is defined as the amount of cotton needed from the 1960 crop to make available a "normal supply" of cotton for the 1960-61 marketing year. The amount of the 1960 quota has been determined under Section 342 of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended, which, in effect, provides that the 1960 quota shall be the larger of:

1. the number of bales of cotton needed, together with the estimated carryover and imports, to make available a normal supply of cotton; or

2. the number of bales of cotton required to provide a national acreage allotment of 16 million acres.

Under the second provision, the national marketing quota for the 1960 crop of upland cotton has been determined to be 13,133,000 bales (590 lbs. gross weight).

The national acreage allotment for 1960 crop upland cotton will be apportioned to States, the State allotment to counties, and the county allotment to farms according to provisions of law.

In 1960, if marketing quotas are approved in the December 15 referendum, each farm operator—as in 1959—will have an opportunity to choose the kind of allotment price support program he will comply with—Choice (A) or Choice (B).

Choice (A) includes "regular" farm allotments, with price support available to growers who comply with their regular allotments at not less than 75 per cent of parity. Choice (B) includes 40 per cent larger farm allotments and price support to growers who comply with their Choice (B) allotments at 15 per cent of parity less than under Choice (A).

Individual farm allotments under both Choice (A) and Choice (B) will be determined by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Under Choice (A), "regular" farm allotments, with price support available to growers who comply with their regular allotments at not less than 75 per cent of parity. Choice (B) includes 40 per cent larger farm allotments and price support to growers who comply with their Choice (B) allotments at 15 per cent of parity less than under Choice (A).

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Choice (B) will be made available to producers prior to the referendum.

If marketing quotas are not in effect for the 1960 upland cotton crop, only the "regular" allotment program will be in effect, and price support will be available to cooperators at 50 per cent of parity, as provided by law.

Under the 1960 quota program, growers who exceed their chosen farm acreage allotments will be subject to penalties of 50 per cent of the cotton parity price as of June 15, 1960, on the farm's excess production of the crop. In addition, none of the upland cotton produced on the farm will be eligible for price support. Marketing quotas are in effect for the 1959 crop of upland cotton, having been approved by 92.2 per cent of the growers voting in a referendum on December 15, 1958.

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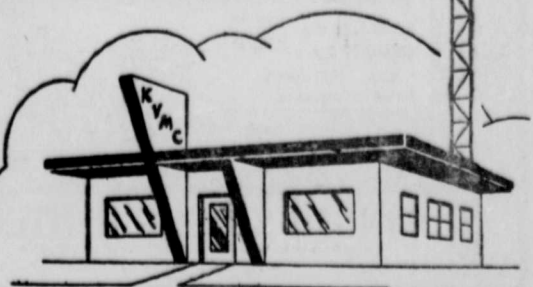

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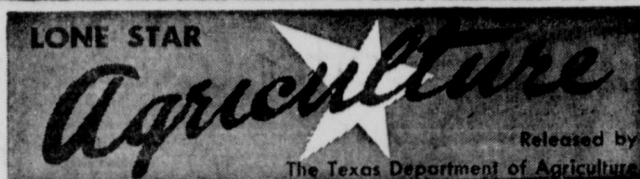

REALIZED FARM INCOME OFF 10-15%

Two top spokesmen for the U. S. Department of Agriculture got up before the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture in Nashville, Tenn. the other day and gave conflicting versions of what our farm income looks like in these waning months of 1959.

True D. Morse, the under-secretary of agriculture who often speaks for Secretary Ezra Taft Benson, painted a somewhat rosy picture in which he saw

agriculture in general in a stronger position than at any time in the past several years. Then Oris V. Wells, administrator of the Agricultural Marketing Service, appeared to give us an entirely different version but one which we knew was more nearly in line with the facts back home. It made some of us wonder whether one top hand in our USDA sometimes is completely uninformed on facts another top hand knows all about.

Wells reported to us that so far in 1959 farm prices have

averaged four per cent lower and net realized income of farm operators some 10 to 15 per cent below the prices and incomes for the same months in 1958. This, of course, was in sharp contrast to a similar report Wells had given us the year before, when farm prices had run six per cent and realized farm income some 20 per cent higher for the first eight months of 1957.

But the economist was able to remind us that 'the current trend in farm prices and farm income comes as no surprise. We had expected 1959 to be not so good a year generally in terms of farm prices and income as 1958 but nevertheless better than 1957.'

He quoted his prediction from last year on the 1959 outlook, to the effect that "although an in-

creasing flow of products from farms will probably maintain total cash receipts from farm marketings, the elimination of acreage reserve program payments after 1958, and prospects for a further slight rise in production expenses could well bring a reduction of some 5 to 10 per cent in realized net farm income, depending largely on the level of crop production next year."

This prediction has been more than borne out, with realized net income dropping some 10 to 15 per cent instead of the anticipated 5 to 10 per cent. But it made some of us wonder just where Under-Secretary Morse got the information for his own report on the same program.

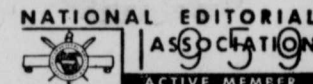

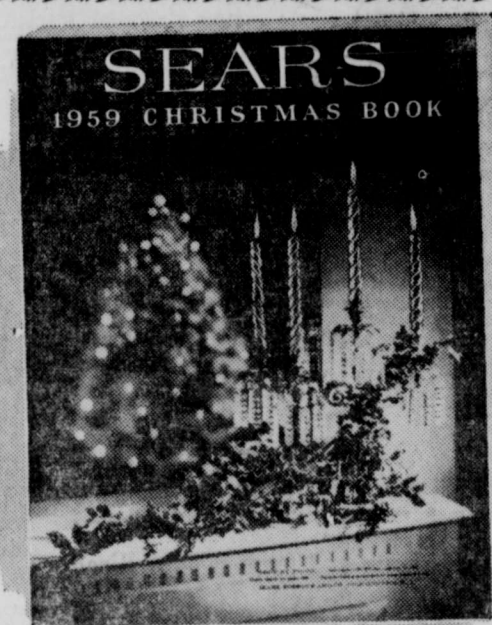

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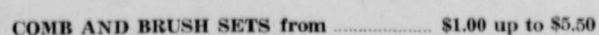

Sometimes it pays to count your own resources.

I have just been reminded of this by looking over a new brochure of the Game & Fish Commission. It deals with the lakes and streams of Texas.

It is quite complete, and has very helpful information for all who want to fish either in fresh or salt water. Lakes are listed on a watershed basis. These major watersheds include the Colorado, Brazos, Trinity, Red and Rio Grande. A number of smaller streams and tributaries also are listed, with the impoundments on each.

With this handy little two-colored 6x9 brochure, you can find almost any lake in which you may want to fish. Furthermore, it tells how to get there and something about the lake.

Perhaps you never thought of it before, but Texas has no large natural lake as such. Caddo, on the Texas-Louisiana line, is the nearest approach. But it has a small retention dam on the Louisiana side.

All of the other lakes in Texas are man-made. All have been developed within the last 50 years, and most of them in the last 20 years. In fact, Texas still is building lakes.

This interesting little booklet was compiled by L. A. Wilke, editor of the Game and Fish Magazine. He has fished on most of the lakes and likes them all. Each is good in its own way, he

reports. Wilke's booklet is a free publication. You need only write a letter or postcard to the Game & Fish Commission in Austin requesting the booklet, and one will be mailed to you without charge.

It is just one of many interesting publications developed in the commission's conservation program. Also in the commission files are some very interesting 16mm sound-color movies which are available to service clubs, schools and organized groups. A card to the film booking department will bring a list.

Most of us think of fishing in connection with sports. We fail to recognize the tremendous industry of fishing. A recent report by the U. S. Department of Interior points up just how big the industry is.

U. S. fishermen, processors and distributors have a capital investment which runs more than \$1,000,000,000.

Estimated value of retail products during 1950 amounted to \$1,700,000,000. Domestic fishermen landed 3,720,000,000 pounds for a record catch amounting to \$370,000,000.

Our country imported another \$320,000,000 in fish products. The total of domestic and imports amounted to \$788,000,000 to the processor; \$1,384,000 to the wholesaler; and \$1,702,000 to the retailer.

Of the terrific tonnage, only 31 per cent was used for food.

Light Bulb 80 Years Old This Year

The other was processed into oil, paints and by-products.

San Pedro led all ports in poundage. Texas was not among the top ten.

Too often we overlook the tremendous importance of the fishing industry itself. Sports fishermen are far more numerous and it is easy for them to set up a hue and cry. Furthermore, the amount of money we sportsmen spend, in addition to recreational value, is tremendous. If you don't think so, ask my wife. In fact, ask yours.

This is merely to point out the necessity for us to work together... sports fishermen and commercial fishermen... in the conservation of our fishery resources. This can't be done if we net our nursery grounds dry in the back bays, or catch shrimp and fish by the millions when they are too small for commercial value.

It means we must use every bit of the skill and diligence we have to protect our oyster beds. We need to exercise care, lest we destroy these areas with dredging or with the destruction of the natural ecology.

This not only is contrary to the laws of nature, but contrary to economics.

Since the advent of the \$2.15 license, which covers both salt and fresh water fishing, the Texas Game & Fish Commission has had more funds with which to carry on coastal research. But, our biologists, in co-operation with those of the Marine Institute of the University of Texas, the marine research division of A&M College, the Gulf Coast Compact Commission, and even the fishing industry, are making slow headway.

We can't hope to accomplish all our research overnight. It took many years to lay down our present resources. They can be destroyed very quickly.

We can apply science to our program, however, and in time develop our resources for the benefit of both groups.

Most of us would prefer to take our fish on the hook rather than out of a can. But there are

just as many more who are not so fortunate. If they are to eat fish, those fish must be commercially caught.

So the commercial fisherman has a responsibility too... as well as a financial interest.

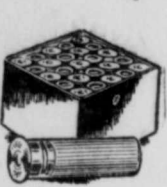
