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Tahoka Fire Department Reports Few Fires In '92

The Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department reported only 47 fires in 1992, a figure which one spokesman said was considerably lower than previous years. No gin fires were reported, and only 12 fires involved structures.

The department reported 18 of the fires were inside the Tahoka city limits, with the remaining 29 fires occurring in other areas of the county.

The low number of fires for the year is credited to high moisture levels during the year and to safety precautions by gin personnel and others.

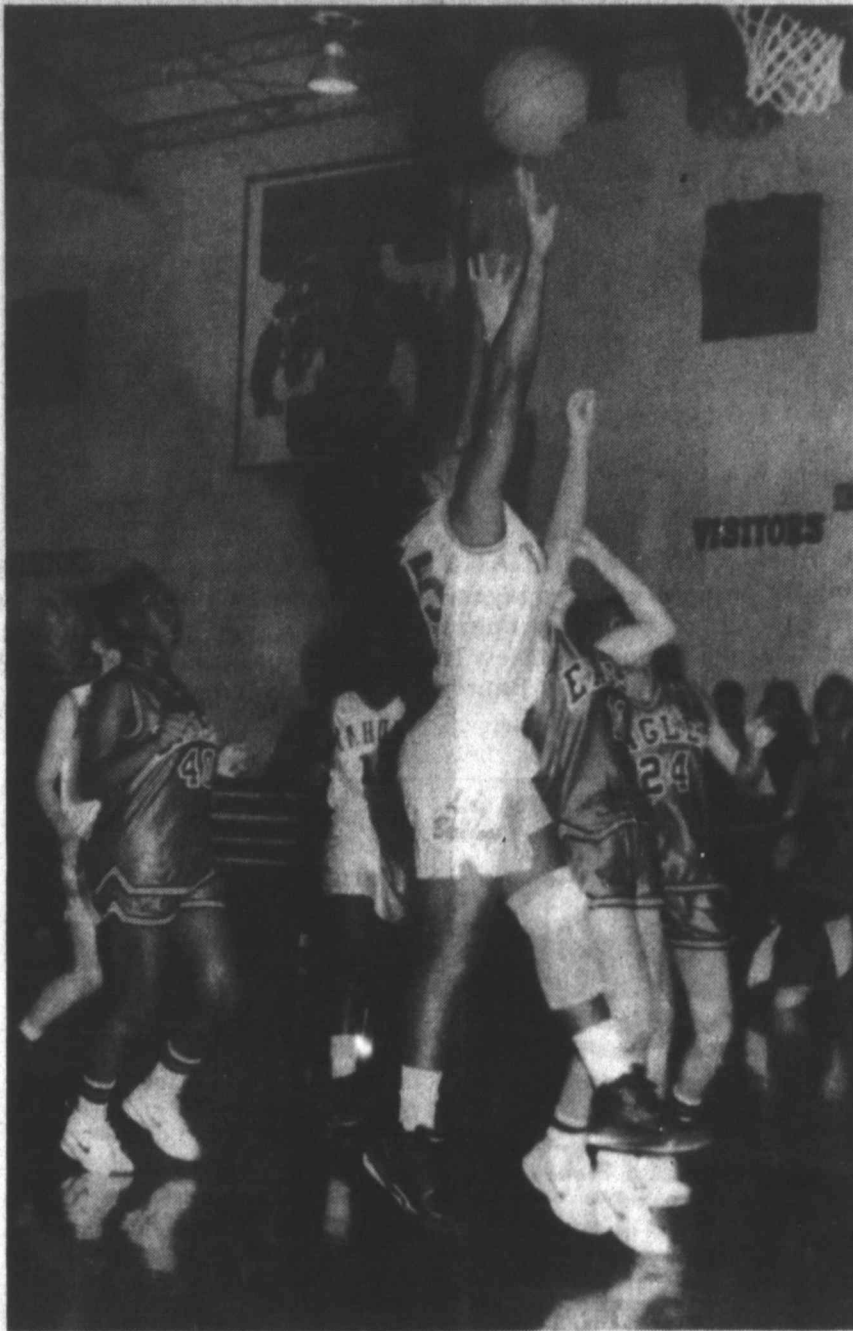

"It was a relatively safe year for the area," said a spokesman for the department. "We appreciate the support of the community in our continuing fund-raising drive, and will also appreciate the support of rural citizens throughout the county as they are asked to participate in raising funds for the department," he added.

The Tahoka Fire Dept. anticipates the need for a new fire truck in the near future, and to update other firefighting equipment. "All money collected through the Volunteer Fire Department Donation fund will be used strictly for much-needed equipment which is used to fight fires," said the spokesman.

City Council Targets Three Dilapidated Buildings Here

Tahoka city officials targeted three dilapidated buildings in the community at the City Council meeting held Monday night, with plans to contact the owners and offer them an opportunity to speak at a public hearing at the next regularly scheduled council meeting next month.

The public hearing for the owners of the targeted buildings is just the beginning of action planned by the city in getting rid of dilapidated buildings, to be followed by assessment of fines and, if necessary, court action if owners do not comply, in accordance with a new recently-passed city ordinance giving city officials such authority.

In other action, council members conducted the last public hearing on the cable television service in Tahoka, with no citizens attending to voice an opinion on the franchise which is up for renewal. Council members discussed the franchise renewal with city attorney Cal Huffaker, but took no official action.

Council members voted unanimously to execute a license agreement with the county on the Lynn County Citizen Collection Station site, leasing the property to the county for \$1 per year.

Chief of Police Jerry Webster gave a report on the department's activities for 1992, with 2,760 calls reported during the year, down

slightly from the previous year's report of 2,848 calls. Police officers were involved in 86 arrests last year, a slight decrease from 1991's report of 92 arrests, and 164 tickets were issued compared to the previous year's total of 167.

Officers issued 248 warning tickets in 1992, a 27% increase from 195 warning tickets in 1991. Only 23 accidents were investigated in 1992, which is a 44% decrease from 41 accidents in 1991. A 26% decrease in burglaries was reported in the city, with 14 in 1992 compared to 19 in 1991. Thefts increased however, with 15 in 1992 compared to 12 in 1991.

Five burglaries were cleared, and seven thefts cleared during the year. Police answered 81 alarm calls, and increase from the previous year's report of 49. DWI arrests decreased from 1991, with 34 arrests in 1992 compared to 42 in 1991.

Joe Hays, representing Love, Hays & Co., discussed the annual audit of the City of Tahoka with council members, noting that the city was in good shape financially.

Councilmen Carl Reynolds and Joe Calvillo were absent from the meeting, and present were councilmen Mike Mensch, Dayton Parker and Wayne Tickell, City Manager Barry Pittman, and Mayor Jim Solomon.

During the week, law enforcement officers in Tahoka also investigated an assault report and a case of criminal mischief. Sheriff's officers Wednesday were investigating a burglary Tuesday at the home of Gerald Gerner northwest of Tahoka. A suspect was being questioned, but no details were immediately available.

A resident of S. 1st St. in Tahoka reported to police that a person he didn't know came to the door of his home about 10 p.m. Tuesday, struck him and knocked him out.

Someone threw a chunk of as-

phalt through the north window of the Dixie Dog Drive In sometime New Year's Eve or early Jan. 1, with damage estimated at \$124. Crime Line, 998-5145, is offering a \$100 reward for information clearing the incident.

In jail during the week were two

persons each on charges of public intoxication, driving while intoxicated and theft by check, and one person each on charges of simple assault, application to revoke probation on a burglary charge and judgment and sentence on charges of possession of marijuana.

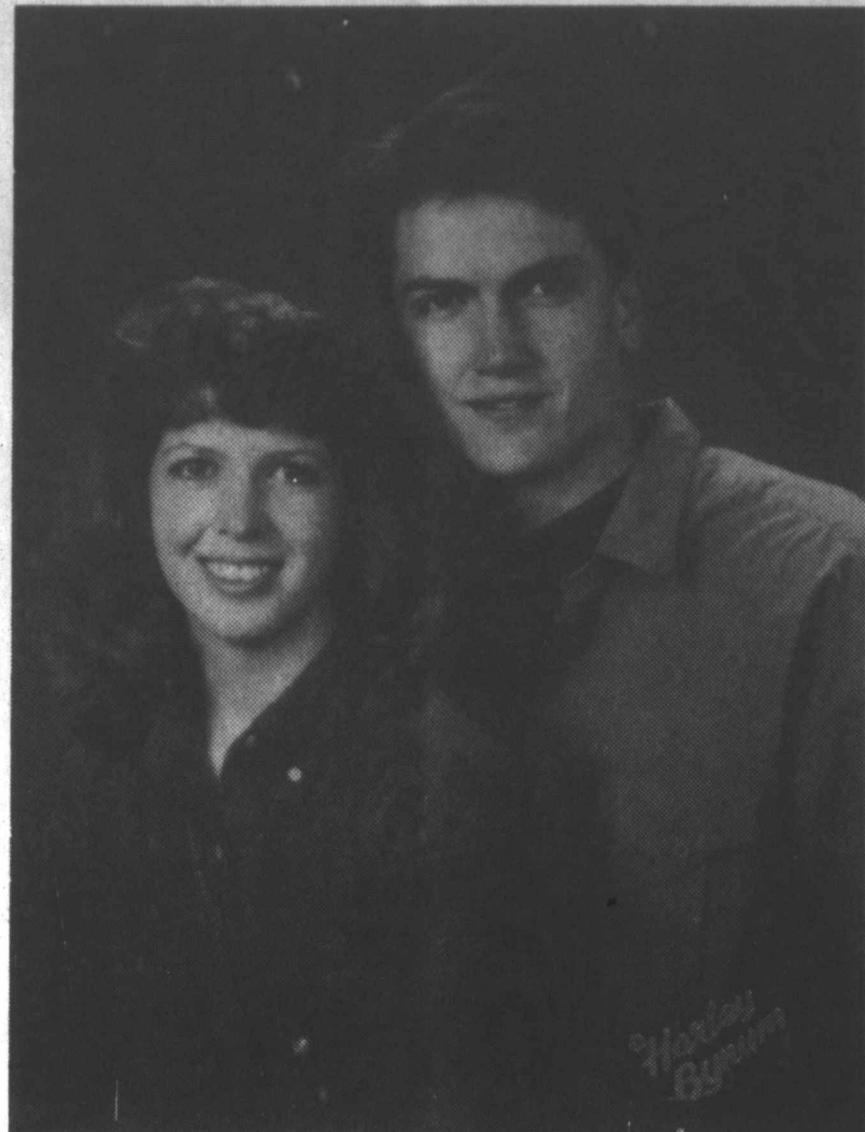

QUESTIONS TO THE CLEAN TEXAS 2000 HOTLINE: 1-800-458-9796

Q: I change the oil in my own car. Where can I take used oil filters for recycling?

A: As we work toward April 1, 1994, when it becomes illegal statewide to throw used oil filters in the trash, Clean Texas 2000 will be compiling lists of collection centers. We're working with businesses right now to help them start collection centers. We're also setting up a demonstration project to show how the materials in oil filters can be recycled. The ban on disposal that began on August 1 in Harris, Tarrant, Dallas and Bexar counties, and has been extended to counties east of Interstate 35 with populations of 200,000 or more, affects businesses only. It is still legal for the do-it-yourselfer to place filters in the trash. If possible, you should drain oil from the filter before disposing of it. To do this, puncture a hole in the filter and allow it to drain into a container for several days. You might ask the store where you buy your oil if

they will take filters. If they know there is an interest, perhaps they will start collection early.

Q: We have a septic tank. Are there any guidelines for what can and can't be put into the tank to avoid contaminated drainage from the system?

A: The Environmental Protection Agency suggests several simple steps, including annual inspections and regularly pumping out the system. EPA also suggests that you not use septic system additives, such as the so-called "enzymes," which not only don't work, but potentially can harm your system and contaminate area groundwater. As in any household, you don't want to dump household hazardous wastes down your drains. Go easy on use of chlorine or chlorine-containing products in cleaning sinks and tubs. You should also reduce or eliminate use of a garbage disposal and avoid diverting storm drains or basement sump pumps into the septic system. If you have a water softener, be sure your back-flush water doesn't go into the septic system. Use good water conservation practices, and finally, the most common advice to septic tank owners: Don't use your toilet as a trash can.

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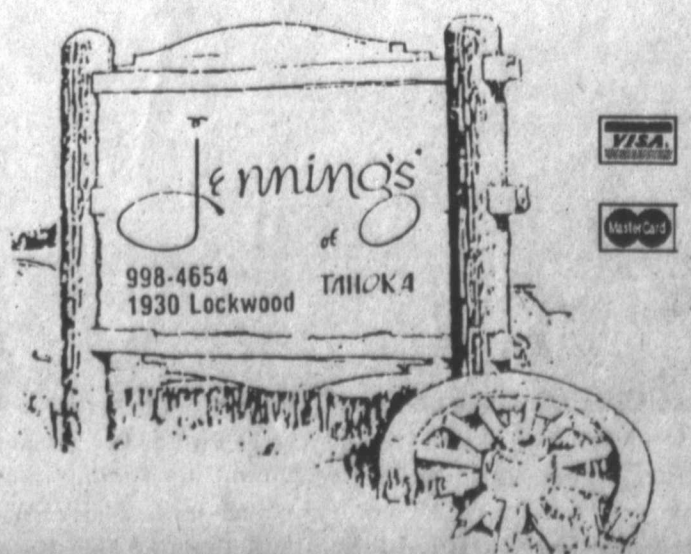

TELCOT[®] Report

A WEEKLY SUMMARY OF COTTON MARKETING NEWS

Despite a holiday-shortened week, sales of Texas/Oklahoma cotton rebounded to their highest level in three weeks as 48,629 bales were traded on TELCOT during the four trading days ended December 31.

Slight advances in New York cotton futures prices allowed buyers to cover their basis risk during the week and meet producers' asking prices for cotton listed on TELCOT. Holiday doldrums helped subdue trading interest to just 22,539 and 28,973 bales on the electronic marketing system in the two previous weeks.

A look at average prices received by producers for cotton sold on TELCOT confirms buyers have been more willing to pay prices listed in the system's Firm Offer program. On December 24, when only 1,528 bales changed hands, cotton traded for a premium of 1,115 points over the adjusted world price (AWP). This coincided with a futures market that closed marginally mixed.

More than 20,000 bales were sold on TELCOT on December 28 as cotton traded for a premium of 1,185 over the AWP while futures closed at or within 10 points of contract highs in the three nearby months. Similar results were reported on the electronic system on December 29, although the futures market recoiled to close down slightly.

High quality cotton continues to dominate daily trading. Predominate grades sold each day continue to be 21, 31 and 41 followed closely by or occasionally exceeded by grades 22, 32 and 42. Somewhat surprising is the fact that 50 to 60 percent of daily sales on TELCOT consistently are bales with premium micronaire of 3.5 to 4.9. However, these are not bringing the highest premiums over the AWP.

The only significant international news during the week was a report that indicates China is becoming more realistic in its own crop estimate. Data released by the country's state statistical bureau suggested China's cotton crop will be

just over 21 million bales, nearly in line with USDA's recent projections. However, the report should not have much of an impact on the U.S. cotton market since the data had already been factored into traders' considerations.

Although it may not have an immediate impact on the market, another development late this week was the final acreage reduction program (ARP) level for the 1993-94 cotton crop. Late on December 30, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) was lobbying for a 10 percent ARP, while USDA was sticking with its previously-announced 7.5 percent.

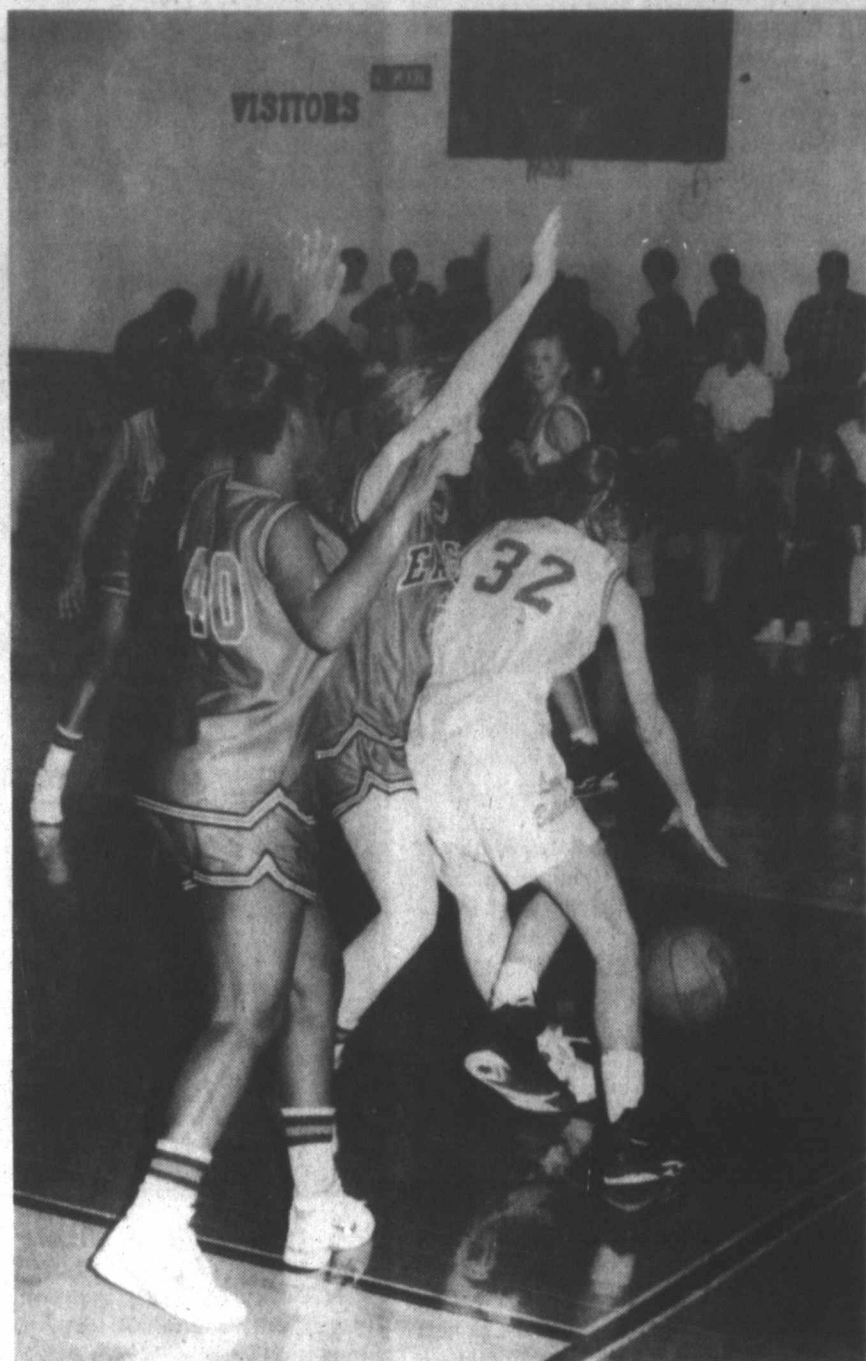
A source close to the departmental negotiation described it as a "war of wills" with OMB claiming a 10 percent ARP would save money even though it would not meet the stocks-to-use ratio mandated by the 1990 farm bill. At press time, the final ARP had not been announced despite the December 31 deadline.

Export sales of U.S. cotton for the 1992-93 marketing season increased a net 32,400 running bales during the week ended December 24. It was a sharp decline from the previous week when export sales increased a net 107,800 bales.

Buyers this week were: Colombia, 10,800 bales; Brazil, 9,700; Taiwan, 6,400; Mexico, 5,900; and South Korea, 4,400.

The Texas cotton harvest was ahead of last year but was slightly behind the five-year average as of December 27, according to the state's agricultural statistics service. The agency reported 94 percent of the crop had been harvested, compared to 90 percent at the same time in 1991 and the 96 percent average.

U.S. 1991-92 cotton under government loan increased 74,536 running bales during the week ended December 22, USDA said. Outstanding loans for the current season now are 3,436,457 bales.

"Smart Jobs" will help Texas compete

I understand a new state proposal is aimed at worker training. I would like to know more about this plan.

In September Governor Ann Richards announced an innovative proposal, the Smart Jobs Fund, to assist Texas businesses in training the work force of the future and provide

financial incentives to create new high-skill, high-wage jobs for Texans. The proposal is driven by the need to help businesses upgrade the skills of their employees in a global marketplace.

The Smart Jobs Fund would be funded by diverting one-tenth of one percent from the state's Unemployment Insurance Tax. If this diversion was made this year, there would be \$50 million in the fund for training and retraining purposes. This small percentage will not compromise the integrity of the Unemployment Insurance Trust Account, because funds will be available only after the Trust

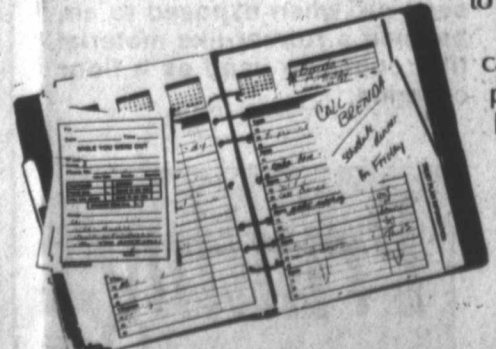

Arthritis Update:
Seniors Risk Increased Adverse Drug Reactions

Studies show that people over 65 may be three or more times likely as younger adults to have problems with medications, reports the Arthritis Foundation.

Although people over age 65 comprise only 12 percent of the U.S. population, they consume at least one-fourth of all prescription medications. The elderly appear more likely to misuse medications in part because of the many different medications they often must take.

Seniors taking multiple medications also are at risk for drug interactions, where one drug alters the action of another. One danger is that adverse reactions can mimic diseases that often occur with aging.

The Arthritis Foundation points out that while no one can eliminate all problems that come with medications, there are precautions people can take to reduce the risk. "One of the most important things you can do is have your doctor explain any medication prescribed for you, its possible side effects and potential to interact with other drugs," says Arthur Grayzel, MD, the foundation's senior vice president for medical affairs.

The foundation offers other suggestions to reduce the risk of medication-related problems in its brochure on medications.

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NOTICE OF FLUORIDE LEVEL IN WATER

The City of Wilson has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water being supplied by our system exceeds the maximum constituent level for fluoride established by the department's "Safe Drinking Water Act."

The samples of water from the Wilson system contain 4.1 milligrams of fluoride per liter, and the department requires the city to notify all customers. There is no immediate health hazard for drinking water containing fluoride at this level except that it could cause mottling (brown stain) on the teeth of children under 14 years of age.

All the dentists in this area are aware of the fluoride level.

The City will continue to search for alternate sources of supply and will investigate any available treatment techniques to lower the level of our fluoride if they are affordable at all.

Bottled water is available for families with children under the age of 14 years at the City Office at no cost.

Pointers For Parents

Parents: Take Charge When A Child's Grades Slip

(NAPS)—Mid-term is frequently the first time parents learn their child is doing poorly in a subject or a grade level. The news arrives, unwelcome, along with tax forms and holiday bills.

Though taxes may be unavoidable and bills are inevitable, parents don't have to accept at mid-term that their child will fail. Rather, the mid-term failing grade should be a wake-up call that it's time for the parent to step in.

In my clinical psychology practice, I recommend the following steps for parents:

•**Meet with the teacher.** This is not a blame-finding session. Ask for information on why your child is failing. Is it because she doesn't understand the subject or because his class attendance is poor?

•**Enlist the teacher's help.** Ask the teacher what would help the child improve. Suggestions may include special tutoring after school, diligence in completing homework or improved discipline. Be open to the teacher's feedback and offer your insight.

•**Take action.** The most effective action I have found is a daily checklist. After you and the teacher have defined the problem, list what the child must accomplish in order to improve. Examples are: turn in homework on time; attend class regularly; bring materials to class; participate in class discussion.

Each of these behaviors should be listed on the daily checklist. Help your child understand that you will



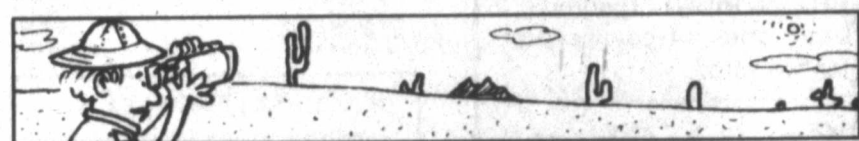
regularly check with the teacher to see that the desired behaviors have occurred. Parents also must establish rewards for a satisfactory checklist and consequences for any day the checklist behaviors are not fulfilled.

These rewards should include privileges your child values—such as playing outside before dinner or shopping with friends. Consequences might include withdrawal of TV or telephone privileges for the day.

•**Be consistent.** The checklist system will work, but only if parents apply it consistently. If you slack off, so will your child. If you persevere, though arguments are certain to follow, you show your child that you care about his or her future, that you value self-discipline and that education is important.

•**Get help.** If your child has missed skills, is showing frustration with school or is far behind in class, consider after-school learning centers such as Sylvan. Sylvan can help your child learn material that was missed while he or she continues to improve in the regular classroom.

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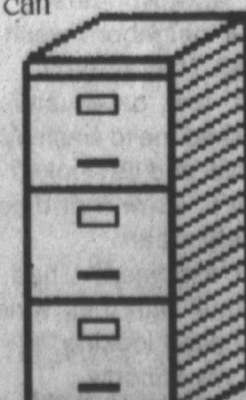
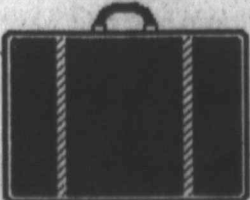
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
