Penny Collection Campaign Extended

Encouraged by public response to its appeal that pennies be returned to circulation, the federal Department of the Treasury has decided to extend the campaign through the summer, according to Elsie Hawes, First National Bank assistant cashier, who is in charge of the program for the local bank.

Also, the Treasury has lowered the return amount for which a Treasury Special Citation will be issued to \$5, Miss Hawes added. During the June campaign it was necessary to turn in a minimum of \$25 worth of pennies to qualify for a certificate.

It was explained that the change as to time and amounts is expected to encourage more children to participate in the drive during vacation and bring out more of the billions of pennies that are in hiding in penny banks, socks and pickle jars. Pennies are needed to facilitate commercial transactions and there has been an acute shortage of them in recent months, apparently in the mistaken belief that they would increase in value as collectors' items, Miss Hawes said. However, in view of the fact that more than 62 billion pennies have been minted in the past 15 years and that the price of copper continues to drop, there is no likelihood that they will become valuable to collectors, she added. First National will arrange for the Treasury's Special Citation to be issued to those who turn in the required number of pennies at the bank.

Landmark Gets Face Lifting

With the help of several volunteers, the large crab which sits in the Navigation District Park was taken down last Friday to have a face lifting. The crab was bought by the Chamber of Commerce in March 1966 for \$200. It previously had sat atop the old Del Mar Grill. The crab has become synonymous with Rockport. It has appeared on television, in state and national magazines, newspapers and is a unique background for picture taking vacationers and residents.

Furnishing manpower were Rex Littleton, J.C. Gurley, Lupe Gutierrez and Danny Cox, employees of the City of Rockport; G.H. Langley of Langley Repair Service; and operating the fork lift furnished by Wagley Lumber Co. was Stu Soulsby. The men tied the crab to the fork lift and carried it to the city warehouse grounds. Then members of the Rockport Art Association took over. Lois Mosier, Iris Jenkins, Pat Donohoe, Bobby Donohoe and Carl Duckworth applied elbow grease and patching, sanding and painting the crab for its new look. Plans are for the landmark to be sitting on its perch before the art festival this weekend.

Store Owner Foils Attempted Robbery

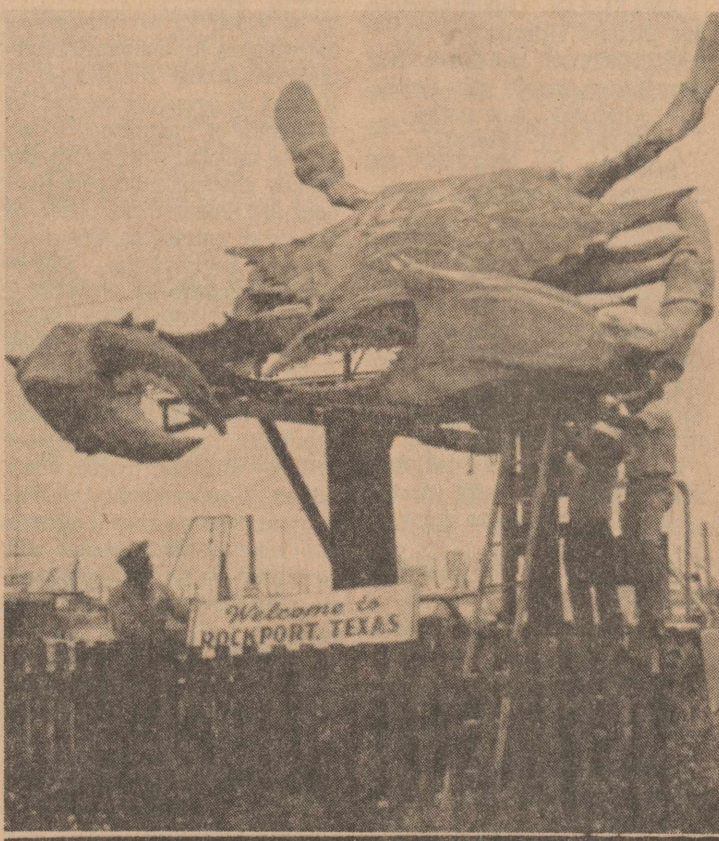

The holiday weekend, sponsored by the Rockport Art Association, is an annual event attracting over 125 artists and craftsmen from all sections of

Texas and as far away as Colorado.

Social Security Benefits Amount to \$252,000 Monthly

Social security benefits were being paid to 1,845 residents of Aransas county at a rate of \$252,000 a month at the close of 1973, A.L. Flnck, Jr., social security manager in Corpus Christi said today.

Of the social security beneficiaries living in Aransas county, 1,235 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 355 are receiving benefits as the survivors of workers who have died, and 250 are getting benefits as disabled workers or their dependents.

Flnck pointed out that although most social security beneficiaries are older people, about one out of every four nationwide is under age 60. In Aransas county, 425 people under age 60 are collecting social security payments each month. This reflects the younger population in this area as composed to the nation as a whole. Nearly 230 are under age 18, receiving payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits. Most of the 35 beneficiaries in Aransas county

between 18 and 22 years of age, are getting student's benefits under a provision in the social security law permitting the continuation of a child's benefits beyond his 18th birthday, and up to age 22, if the child is attending school full time.

Also in this 18-22 age group, Flnck said, are some other types of beneficiaries, illustrating the broad family protection that the social security program provides workers of all ages. Some are children of retired disabled, or deceased workers who became disabled before they reached 22 and who will probably never be able to work and become self-supporting. The monthly benefits of these young people, severely handicapped by physical or mental disabilities, will continue indefinitely. Many are 40, 50 or 60 years old. Benefits are also payable to the mother if the disabled son or daughter is in the mother's care.

Since December 1973, Flnck said, social security benefits have increased 11 percent for June 1974. About \$280,000 a month is now coming into Aransas county in social security checks.

The figures shown in this article do not include Medicare and Supplemental Security Income benefits.

Recording Star Coming Here

Barry Sadler, who wrote and recorded the best selling record, "The Ballad of the Green Berets," will perform at the Rockport Racquet & Yacht Club on July 4 and July 5.

In addition to playing the piano and singing during a one-hour



performance beginning at 9:45 p.m., Sadler also will be present at an autograph party at the Club at 1 p.m. on Friday to which the public is invited.

More than nine million records of "The Ballad of the Green Berets" were sold after Sadler wrote and recorded this hit song.

In addition to performing at the Rockport Racquet & Yacht Club, Sadler also will appear at the Chief Petty Officers Club at the Naval Air Station in Corpus Christi at 11:30 p.m. Friday. Sadler was a member of the Green Berets from 1957 to 1967 and served in Central and South America, the Far East and Vietnam.

Before entering military service he had been a drummer but when he returned to civilian life he became an actor and performed in several movies and TV dramas.

Later he got the idea for composing and recording the song that made him famous, "The Ballad of the Green Berets." The song "sort of grew," he explains, and it took him about 18 months to get the words and the music just the way he wanted them.

The rest is history. The song was an instant hit and Sadler became much in demand as an entertainer.

You can't ever hold a job where you must be licensed or bonded and you can never work for the city, the county or the Federal government. You can't be admitted to West Point, Annapolis, or the Air Force Academy; but you can enlist in the military service -- and be assigned to a labor battalion.

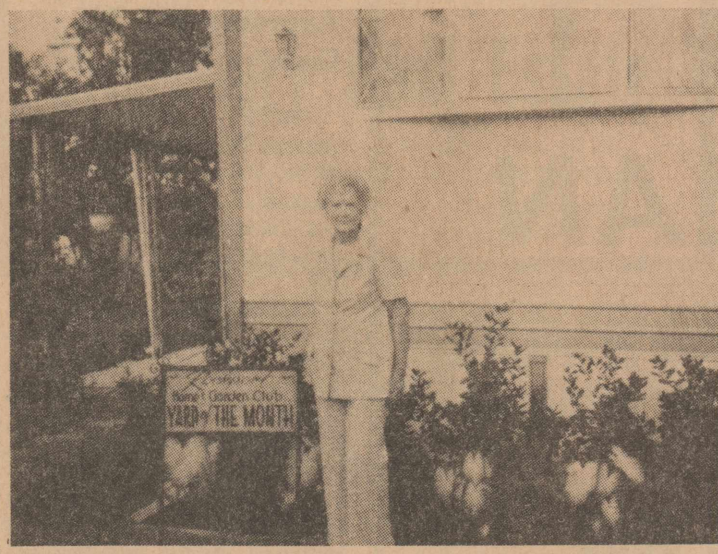

Yard of Month Award Won by Bradfords



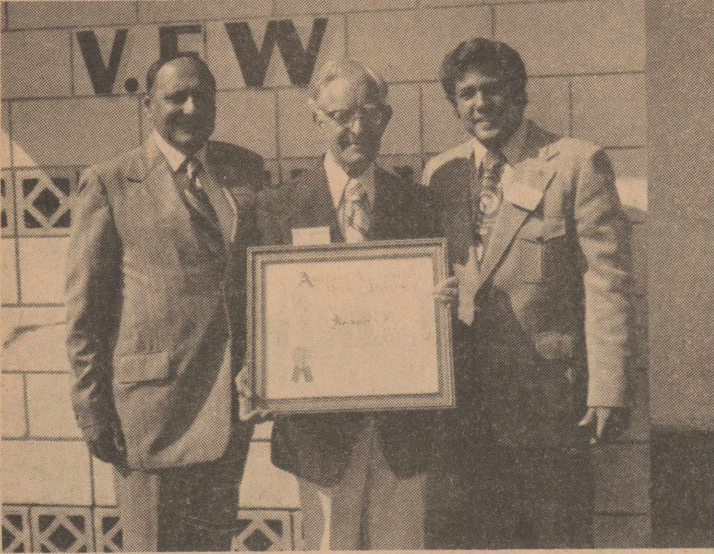

Gov. Dolph Briscoe Approves \$40,700 Grant to COG

AUSTIN -- Governor Dolph Briscoe has approved a grant of \$40,700 to the Coastal Bend Council of Governments, Corpus Christi, for improving law enforcement and criminal justice.

Coastal Bend COG will develop a comprehensive criminal justice plan for the counties of Aransas, Bee, Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleburg, Live Oak, McMullen, Nueces, Refugio, and San Patricio. Emphasis will be placed on improved administration of criminal justice and law enforcement and reduction of crime and delinquency in the region.

The money comes from the Criminal Justice Division of the Governor's Office. CJD administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Crime Control Act of 1973.

The local grant was among 50 approved by the governor totaling \$7.2 million.

Aransas Treatment Plant Wins Approval of TWQB

AUSTIN -- The Texas Water Quality Board last Wednesday approved an uncontested discharge permit for a proposed water treatment plant near Goose Island State Park.

The discharge will be effluent from a reverse osmosis unit and will consist of prechlorinated, concentrated, dissolved solids from deep-well water. The Aransas County Muni-

cipal Utility District No. 1 water treatment plant will be located 10 miles north of Rockport on Lamar Peninsula, south of Eighth Street and 450 feet west of Park Road 13.

The permit allows an average discharge of 66,000 gallons per day through a steel discharge line.

The permit requires discharge of no floating solids and that samples be taken at an outfall line placed in St. Charles Bay at least 50 feet outside the mean low tide line.

his range he is found only along the rivers and streams. He can't make it out on the treeless plains.

The possum is a good climber. That long, hairless, scaly tail is prehensile, that is, he can use it for grasping and holding. The big toe on his hind foot is clawless and apposable. That makes it like a thumb and lets him hold things with his hind foot as you would do with your hands.

Hollow trees and logs are preferred den sites, but he is really not all that particular. He will use wood piles, rock piles, crevices in cliffs, under buildings, in attics, and underground burrows. Since the possum is not a good digger, when he uses a burrow he uses one dug by some other animal.

The possum is more or less solitary, and strictly nocturnal. He comes out right after dark and ambles around most of the night looking for food. In this department he's really easy to please, it seems that he'll eat absolutely anything. Stomach analysis has turned up insects, rabbits, horses, other mammals, birds, chickens, eggs, lizards, frogs, snakes, snails, crayfish, fruits and berries, and other various and assorted fare. We know, of course, that much of this food was already dead when the possum found it, because he's perfectly content with carrion. That's why so many of them are run over by cars. They're out on the roads looking for the bodies of other animals that have already fallen prey to the traffic. This is a mark in favor of Mr. Possum. He helps to keep our fields and woods clean as he goes about disposing of the dead

bodies of other animals.

The breeding season in Texas extends throughout the year, and in spite of the old wives tales, possums mate very much like other animals. The nostrils of the female have absolutely nothing to do with her impregnation. The young, 5 to 21 at a time, are born after a gestation period of only 11 or 12 days. They are born tiny, half developed in the front limbs. Using these, he pulls himself up and into his mother's pouch. At this time it would take 2,380 of them to weigh a pound. In the pouch, no more than 13 of them will find a source of life-saving milk. The teat will swell up in their mouth and attach them permanently until they grow big enough to open their mouth wide enough to turn loose. This takes about seven weeks. All the excess, over 13, simply die of starvation.

Possums are famous for their trick of playing dead. Scientists tell us that they do not do this deliberately. Their tiny, primitive brain simply can't cope with an emergency or extreme fright, and they go into a coma.

Biologists report that in one East Texas county 10,000 possums are killed each year for fur and meat without any apparent decrease in their numbers. They say that in good possum country you will find about one of the little furry scavengers to every four acres, and that's a lot of possum. These biologists admit that the possum does some damage to domestic fowl, to some field crops, and to ground nesting birds. They contend, however, that the economic value of the fur, and, in some sections, his value as food, outweighs his bad traits. I believe I would also add his value as a scavenger - he is an important member of nature's clean-up corps. In any event, he certainly has a place in the scheme of things.

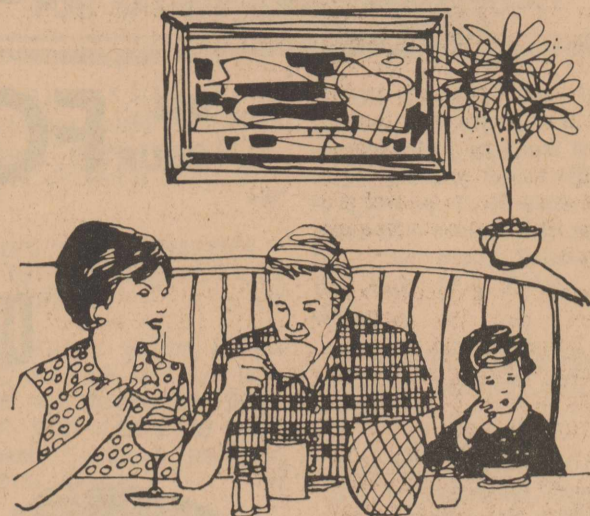

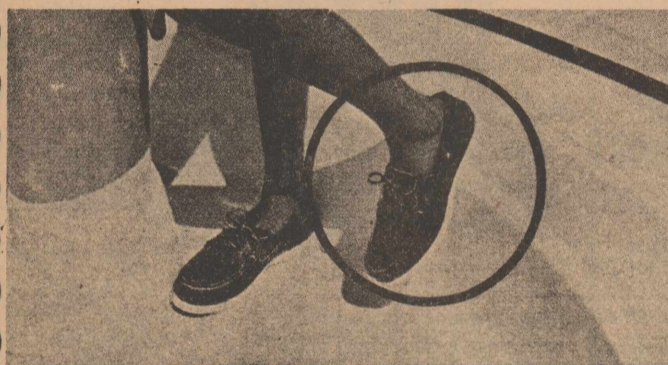

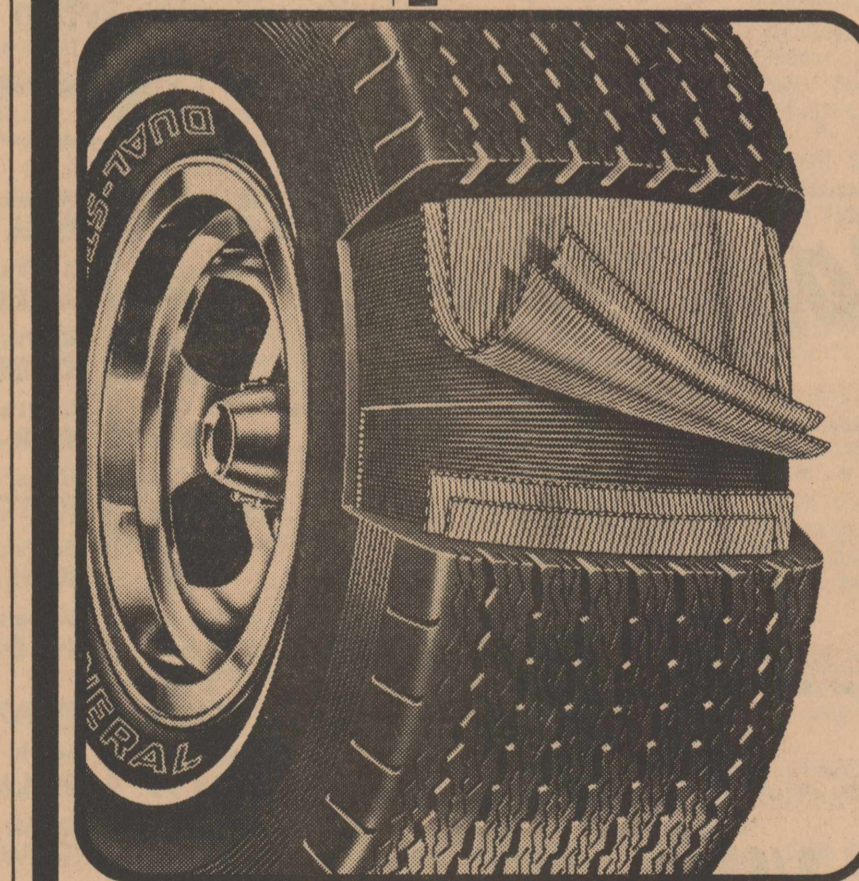

Social Security Pay Hike Due

More than 32 million Social Security and adult welfare recipients will be getting fatter federal checks in July, but many also will be billed more for their medical care.

Social Security payments for 30 million persons will reflect a 4 per cent increase, the second part of an 11 per cent boost authorized by Congress last year. The first 7 per cent raise was paid in April.

Maximum Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments for 2.1 million aged, blind and disabled recipients also will be going up, from \$140 to \$146 for individuals and from \$210 to \$219 for eligible couples.

But in a situation which the administration has asked Congress to correct, another 1.3 million SSI recipients will not see any more money because the Social Security boost will be deducted from their other check.

And another 20,000 persons will be dropped from the federal adult welfare program altogether because of the larger Social Security checks, probably disqualifying them for other benefits such as food stamps and free Medicaid.

Coincidentally, the 22.6 million aged and disabled persons who chose the optional Medicare medical insurance coverage will have to pay 40 cents a month more in premiums, or a total of \$6.70 monthly, beginning this month.

The premium hike is blamed on rising medical costs. Most of the enrollees have their premiums deducted from their monthly Social Security checks but 2.4 million of them in Medicaid have theirs paid by states.

The government gives these examples of how average Social Security benefits increase in July: from \$173 to \$181 for retirement, \$191 to \$199 for disability, \$417 to \$433 for a widowed mother with two children. Increases include \$90.50 to \$93.80 minimum to an individual worker, \$293 to \$304.90 maximum payable at 65, and \$757.50 to \$785.80 maximum payable to survivors of a deceased worker.

August 31 will be recognized in a special ceremony at the State Fair this year and short history of their family and land will be published in a land heritage directory. In addition, local recognition will be provided to the families for their long dedication to agriculture.

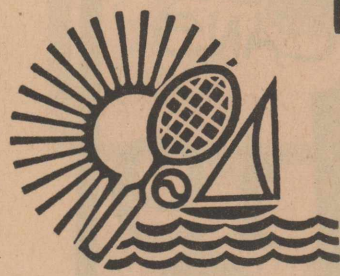

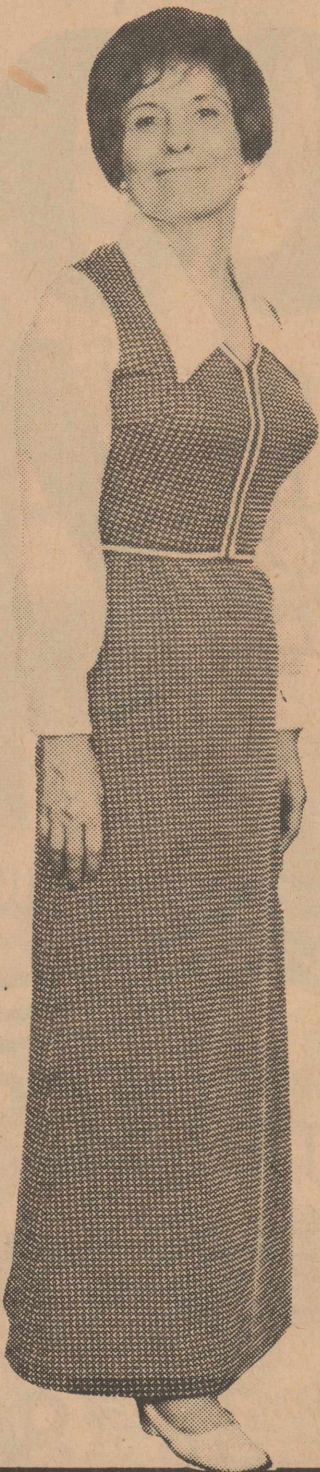

Do the Wader's Shuffle To Avoid Stingrays

If you're naturally too lazy to lift your feet and you walk with a shuffle, then you probably don't have to worry about stingrays when you visit the coast.

Shuffling your feet along the sand when you are wading is the recommended way to avoid being attacked by stingrays. The rays can feel you coming and move out of the way. Other folks, however, had better be wary.

Approximately 1,500 persons in the United States are victims of stingray barbs each year, and although there are no official figures, you can be sure that Texas has its share.

According to an article in the June issue of TEXAS PARKS AND WILDLIFE magazine, a publication of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, provocation of a stingray may be no more than an unwary wader's stepping on it as it lies half buried in sand.

Sometimes, stingrays move into an area in enormous schools, resting in the sand with scarcely any room between them. "You won't know they're there until you feel a slippery, squirming body under your foot and, if you let it thrash long enough, the sharp stab from its venomous barb," according to author of the article, L. D. Nuckles, the department's information and education officer in Rockport.

The time has passed when we can afford to drift along in blissful assurance that America, the land of plenty, will always end up with a surplus.

Our nation is still blessed with the ability to meet the growing food needs of our own population as well as increased demands from other countries.

And we have the manpower, the technology, the know-how, and the abundance of rich agricultural land. But success will not just fall into our laps.

What we need now is the coordination and leadership that government must provide in developing a national food policy.

dagger is located on the upper side of the ray's whiplike tail, approximately one-third the distance from the tail base in most species.

The barb is less than an inch long when the rays are newly born, but in adult rays it can be more than six inches long.

As if the barb wasn't enough to make things miserable for waders, nature also equipped the ray with a poison sheath to cover the barb.

The slightest cut on a human victim can result in extreme pain and immediate swelling of the affected area and lymph nodes.

First aid after a stingray attack should begin by letting the wound bleed for a few minutes to help clean it. Additional

swabbing is recommended to further clean the wound.

Immersion in water as hot as the victim can tolerate is the next step. Recent research has shown that the toxin released by the stingray is extremely sensitive to heat and that 90 percent of the toxin is harmless after 15 minutes of soaking.

After soaking, a mild antiseptic should be applied and a doctor consulted. The doctor is important because he must clean the wound inside and out to make sure all the sheath material is removed. This material is likely to cause severe infection if left in the wound.

Some naturalists say the big-headed turtle, with its long tail and sharp claws, is capable of climbing trees.

NEW BABY AT HOME

Those first hectic weeks of adjusting to a new baby in the house are complicated by the fact that your infant is distinctly individual, one family life education specialist said.

Jene Carrington, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System noted that each infant reacts differently to parents, other people and his immediate environment.

"Parents should be alert to their infant's temperamental characteristics and conscious of their own expectations of the newborn," she said.

"Each baby's temperament is different from that of siblings. If parents try to compare his behavior to brothers and sisters when they were the same age, they see his difference," she continued.

Parents are more likely to understand and enjoy their baby when they can discuss personal feelings and observations of the infant's behavior. This helps eliminate unrealistic ideas about child rearing, the specialist said.

Family members will enjoy and understand the baby more if they are alert to the baby's temperamental characteristics.

Miss Carrington suggested some signs of the baby's behavior to notice.

--How active the infant is and how quickly he adjusts to change in daily routine and his immediate surroundings.

"Some babies are more sensitive than others to light, noises, temperature changes, and taste and texture of food variations," she explained.

--The infant's regularity in eating, sleeping, waking, and elimination.

--A baby's general mood during his waking hours and the intensity of his response to interaction with others.

--How attentive and persistent the infant is.

"Some infants may be easily distracted by sounds or sights, while others may be intent on some activity for long periods," she continued.

"None of these characteristics is either good or bad. They just indicate a need for different responses from parents.

"Adjustments to a new baby in the house will be smoother and happier when family members understand what kind of person their new baby is," the specialist concluded.

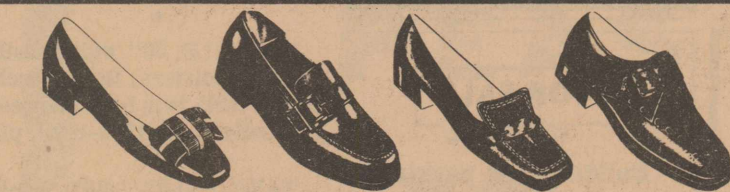

Summer Best Time To Visit America's Mountains, Parks

By Edward H. Sims

ASHEVILLE, N.C. — For easterners the North Carolina mountains are the highest easily visited east of the Rockies. But there are beautiful eastern mountains from New England to Georgia — and a bit further west. For westerners, mountains are almost an accepted part of the scenery, except in the plains and prairies.

There they rise up to about 15,000 feet, more of the taller peaks being in Colorado than in any other state.

With mountains the traveler is offered many beautiful national parks and those who never visit them are missing much of the natural beauty of the nation.

In the east, wildlife is not so abundant, but from the writer's mountain place, at Arrowhead east of this city, there are bears in Great Smokies Park nearby, deer, foxes, cats and other wildlife, and beautiful birds—though few eagles are left.

In the west there are elk, some few wild horses, moose, bear, big cats, wild mountain goats, birds of all kinds including eagles, and much else in the remote tracts of the less populated states.

But most of the nation's population lives in the eastern areas, and therefore such highways as the Blue Ridge Parkway (coming down southwesterly from nearby Washington into the North Carolina mountains) are escapes from the flatlands, swamps, humid coastal areas, hot days.

At some points along the Blue Ridge Parkway the road gets up to an elevation of almost 6,000 feet. Since Mount Mitchell, the highest peak east of the Rockies, is only something over 6,600, that's all one can hope for in elevated motoring in the east.

In the western states the writer has driven higher, so high going over passes in Colorado and California driving becomes a problem because the engine lacks enough oxygen for proper combustion in the cylinders. On Skyline Drive in Virginia or up near 6,000 feet in North Carolina, one feels he is high enough. Often the clouds cover the roads, it is always relatively cool and the view with so much altitude is spectacular.

New England's mountains, New York's, Pennsylvania's all offer outstanding views, though not matching the Rockies in height. In fact, one might say that the real splendor of the earth can only be appreciated fully from a mountain view.

Young Homemakers Sponsors Breath of Life Campaign

The Aransas County Young Homemakers will sponsor the Breath of Life Campaign to fight Children's Lung Diseases, according to Mrs. J. H. Grizzard, president of the Lone Star Chapter, National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation.

The Homemakers of Rockport, Texas, will lead local volunteers in raising funds to support research and care programs for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, and a condition called "childhood emphysema."

Cystic fibrosis, an incurable genetic disease, is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for C/F. It is believed that one in twenty persons or 10 million Americans may carry the C/F gene, usually without knowing it. Current research funded by the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers.

Because of improved therapy and constant research, many C/F patients are living beyond infancy to their teens and into young adulthood. That same kind of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from other respiratory afflictions whose symptoms resemble those of C/F.

Most people don't realize that

there are six million children in the U.S. affected by Pulmonary illness. For some of these children, breathing is not the natural function that most, who are lucky, take for granted.

The Breath of Life Campaign supports not only research but over 100 C/F Centers for diagnosis and treatment across the country, six of which are located within Texas.



Do high radio and television towers have a tendency to draw lightning and thereby lessen the danger to lower structures and trees nearby?

Yes, high metal towers will often draw electrical discharges from clouds passing low overhead. So will especially tall buildings. Since the electrical charges of clouds are attracted by the nearness of high grounds, like transmission towers, these towers often pull the lightning that would otherwise discharge later elsewhere.

If you live in the vicinity of very tall buildings or high metal towers these structures will act as the old lightning rods—draw the lightning and ground it harmlessly.

The tendency of these tall towers to attract lightning is recognized to an extent that builders install special lightning devices to carry off the frequent bolts that strike them. During a lightning storm stay away from such structures, tall trees and other high objects which might suddenly become a ground for electrical discharge from the clouds.

Seized in the raid was approximately 8 ounces of marijuana and a variety of narcotics paraphernalia. Arrested in connection with the raid were Cheryl Des and Debbie King, both from Rockport.

They were each placed under a \$4,000 bond.
