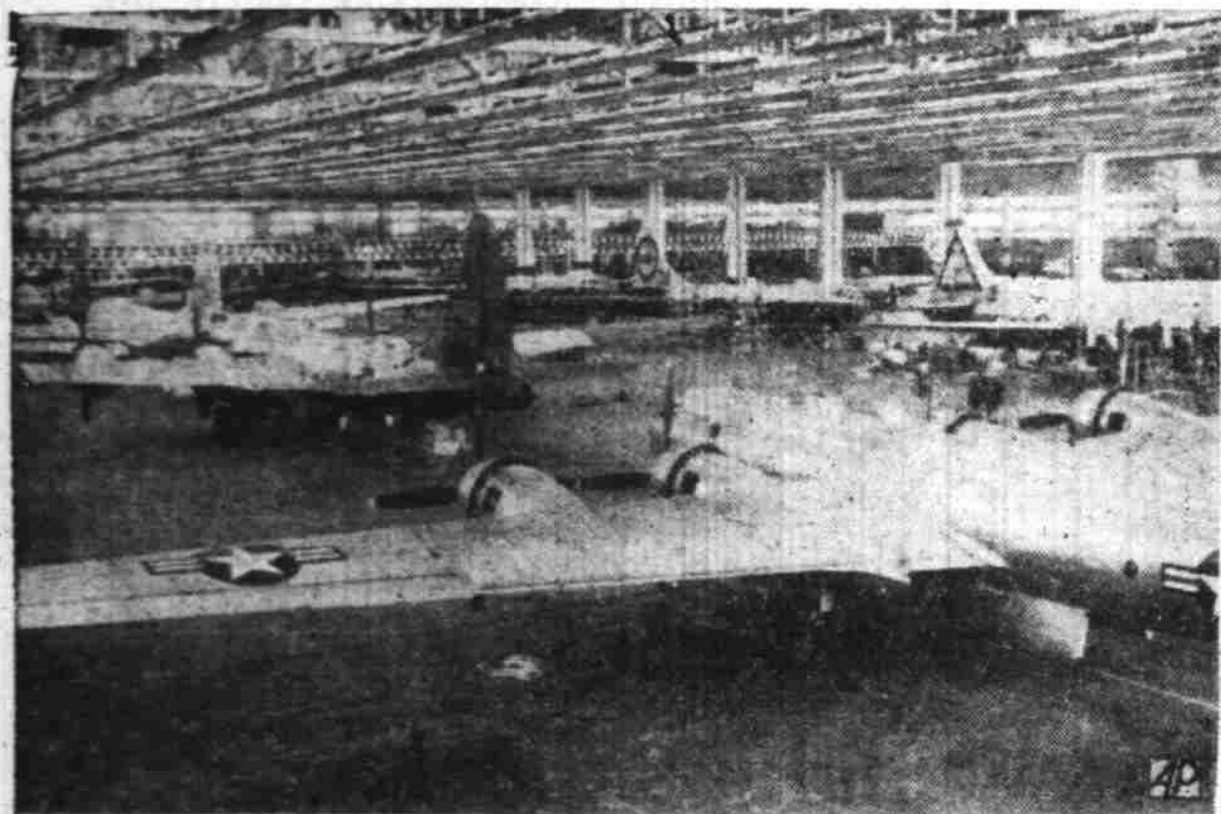

MEDIATION FAILING

Crippling Railroad Strike Appears Likely Next Tuesday

CHICAGO, May 4. (AP)—A nationwide railroad strike, set to start a week from today, appears likely, says a federal mediator who has been striving to head off the walkout of three operating brotherhoods.

"It looks very much like there might be a strike," said Frank Douglas, chairman of the National Railway Mediation Board yesterday. "The picture does not look good."

His comment followed four days of apparently unsuccessful meetings with the unions and carriers. However, he said the board planned further sessions today in a dispute.

TRIMMER TIED UP IN WORK

PASADENA, Calif., May 4. (AP)—Trials and tribulations of the tree trimmer, Vol. 1, Page 1, please.

The tree trimmer, Leo Erwin, was giving a crew cut to a towering specimen. He leaned back a few inches to see if the feather edge was even all around when, zounds! About a ton of trimmings and intertwined vines crashed down on him.

Leo was turned upside down in his safety belt. He stayed in that position for a half hour, too. It took that long for the fire department to show up and saw Leo out of the debris and carry him down the ladder to an ambulance. He suffered shock and internal injuries.

Group Approves Bill Designed To Stop Information Leaks

WASHINGTON, May 4. (AP)—A bill that would permit the jailing of newsmen who print leaks of confidential information given to congressional committees was approved today by the House Rules Committee.

It still must be passed by the House and the Senate and be approved by the President before becoming effective.

The measure would require all executive departments to provide congressional committees on demand whatever information the committees decide they need.

The committees would decide by majority vote whether the information, or part of it, should be made public.

On a committee decision that the information should be held confidential, it would be a misdemeanor for anyone to divulge it or publish it. The maximum punishment for a violation would be one year in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

The main monopoly case has been in court since 1938. By a 7 to 1 vote the Supreme Court upheld all but one of the findings of a special three-judge federal court sitting in New York last year. Justice Douglas wrote the majority opinion, with Justice Frankfurter dissenting. Justice Jackson took no part in the hearing.

The only point of disagreement was whether the companies should be ordered to dispose of their theaters. The government had argued that only by such a step could the movie industry be opened to free competition. The lower court had directed that first-run pictures be put on the auction block for competitive bidding, rather than be-

ing parceled out through company channels.

But the Supreme Court said such action either would call for court supervision of the sales or grant great discretion to the producing companies. It added: "Yet delegation of the management of the system to the discretion of those who had the genius to conceive the present conspiracy and to execute it with the subtlety which this record reveals, could be done only with the greatest reluctance."

Hearings Ordered On Taft-Hartley Law

WASHINGTON, May 4. (AP)—Congressional hearings on the question of tightening up the Taft-Hartley labor act today were ordered to begin May 24. Senator Ball (R-Minn.), in calling them, noted there are threatened nationwide railroad, coal and steel strikes.

Ball is chairman of the special "watchdog" committee set up by the 1947 law. This Senate-House group will hold the hearings.

Railroad brotherhoods now are exempt from the act. Ball's mention of the threatened railroad strike suggested the committee will study the question of bringing them under the law.

Colombians Stop Relations With Soviets

Third Latin American Nation To Take Action

BOGOTA, Colombia, May 4. (AP)—Colombia became the third Latin American nation today to sever diplomatic relations with Russia. A break has been expected ever since President Mariano Ospina Perez blamed international communism for the bloody April 9 revolution.

The Colombian cabinet decided on the break late yesterday. A short time later a note announcing the action was delivered in the Soviet legation. Its contents were not disclosed.

The government radio broadcast in English made announcement of the rupture last night. Informants believed the government will inform Colombian citizens of its decision today.

Colombia's action followed the suit of Chile and Brazil. Both broke with the Soviets Oct. 21, 1947. A 21-nation decision condemning international communism was passed by the Pan American conference.

For the past month responsible sources say, Ospina Perez and his Conservative cabinet colleagues have been trying to persuade Liberal Party members that Colombia should break with the USSR.

Observers believe the liberals were swung over last week when Carlos Arango Velez, Colombian ambassador to the Vatican, chief Colombian delegate to the Pan American conference and a top Liberal leader, declared in a radio speech that Communists engineered the April 9 uprising, which claimed 1,500 lives and disrupted the conference for several days. The assassination of Liberal Party Leader Jorge Eliecer Gaitan touched off the revolt.

Arabs Blamed For Shelling

JERUSALEM, May 4. (AP)—Jewish military sources said today Arab artillery atop a Judean mountain pounded two Jewish settlements north of Jerusalem during the night.

The informants said 30 shells landed in the area of Neve Yacov and Atarot. Both settlements are on the highway between Jerusalem and Ramallah. They said there were no casualties and little damage.

The Arabs had a warning today from Lt. Gen. Gordon MacMillan that Britain will resist "with full force" any Arab invasion of Palestine before the British mandate ends May 15.

The British commander made the statement yesterday to Maj. George Fielding Eliot, military analyst for the New York Post and Home News, even as the vanguard of strong British reinforcements began arriving in Jerusalem.

Arab sources in Amman, Trans-Jordan, hinted that it is unlikely the Arab states will launch any open invasion of Palestine before the mandate ends.

This was in sharp contrast to previous statements from Amman.

Arab military experts say the Arab armies are not well enough equipped to risk a clash with the British.

CHINA SHOP 'BULL' A PIKER

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 4. (AP)—The bull in the china shop was a piker.

Some 15,000 pounds of industrial glass shattered on the pavement 12 miles east of here yesterday when a trailer truck overturned in a collision.

The other machine? A junk truck—hardly scratched.

McKinney Snaps Back From Tornado

Three Are Killed In Storm Area

McKINNEY, May 4. (AP)—McKinney and nearby Princeton began to snap back to life today after the two North Texas towns were floored yesterday by a violent tornado that killed three, injured 53 and caused widespread damage.

The storm, lashing out of a darkened hail-swept sky, lengthened the list of tornado casualties in six states within a 48-hour period to 23 dead and more than 156 injured.

ARMY DISASTER TEAM IS ON JOB

SAN ANTONIO, May 4. (AP)—The Fourth Army disaster team went into full action today following an alert issued last night at Fourth Army headquarters by Gen. Thomas T. Handy, commander, when informed of the destruction caused by a tornado at McKinney last night.

The team, comprising officers and men of the various staff sections, commanded by Lt. Col. J. J. Jackie, plans and training section, totaled 30 members, and included two officers and 16 men of the Fourth Army Food Service School. It left Brooks Air Force Base last night for Hensley field, Dallas.

Chris O'Connor, Red Cross field director, Fort Sam Houston, relayed a request for 250 tents, 500 cots and 1,000 blankets from McKinney. Two C-54's, two C-47's and a C-82 have been assigned to the transportation of personnel and supplies.

Decision Near In U. S. Senate On Oleo Bill

WASHINGTON, May 4. (AP)—The Senate neared a decision today on what to do with the House-approved oleomargarine tax repealer. The vote could decide the final fate of the bill.

Eleventh hour efforts to compromise difference between oleo and butter supporters proved fruitless.

The bill, which the House passed last week after a bitter fight, was tangled up in the Senate in a complicated parliamentary snarl involving one rule which had not been invoked in more than a quarter of a century until yesterday and another in apparent conflict with that rule.

Senate President Vandenberg (R-Mich.) told reporters he was inclined to ask the full membership to vote on unscrapping the issue. It concerns whether the bill should go to (1) the calendar, where it might be called up for action at any time, (2) the tax-writing Finance Committee or (3) the Agriculture Committee.

Senator Aiken (R-Vt.), a member of the Agriculture Committee, tried to work out a compromise with some of the advocates of the bill last night, but no agreement was reached.

The lineups from the big voting cities will be watched with interest today. Led by Harris County the urban centers have great voting strength in the state conventions.

Pakistan Head Supports Arabs

KARACHI, Pakistan, May 4. (AP)—Pir Illahi Bakhsh, the new premier of Sind, appealed to the Moslems of Pakistan today to "rise to the occasion to help their Arab brethren of Palestine at this grave hour when their fate hangs in the balance."

Bakhsh is the successor to Mohammed Ayub Khurro, dismissed last week on charges of maladministration, gross misconduct and corruption. Sind is the third largest of Pakistan's five states. Its capital is Karachi.

Bakhsh added, in his statement today: "On one side are arrayed the formidable forces of Zionism, supported by American political and commercial interests. On the other side stand the dauntless Arabs, crusading for the very existence of Islam. Therefore, the Pakistan Moslems' foremost duty is at stake to save all Palestine."

Five Children Meet Deaths In Refrigerator

DUMAS, May 4. (AP)—Five children—three from one family, two from another—suffocated in an unused, airtight refrigerator here yesterday.

Dead were Charles Richard Nichols, 7; Allen Jackson Nichols, 3; Ralph Gordon Nichols, 4; Patricia Hill, 6, and Arthur Dennis Hill, 4.

Their parents were Mr. and Mrs. Ralph G. Nichols and Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Hill.

The children had been missing about three hours, when Mrs. Hill found them.

She saw them through the double glass doors of the display-type meat box. It stands abandoned on a vacant lot across an alley behind the Hill home.

Doctors tried to revive the children but failed.

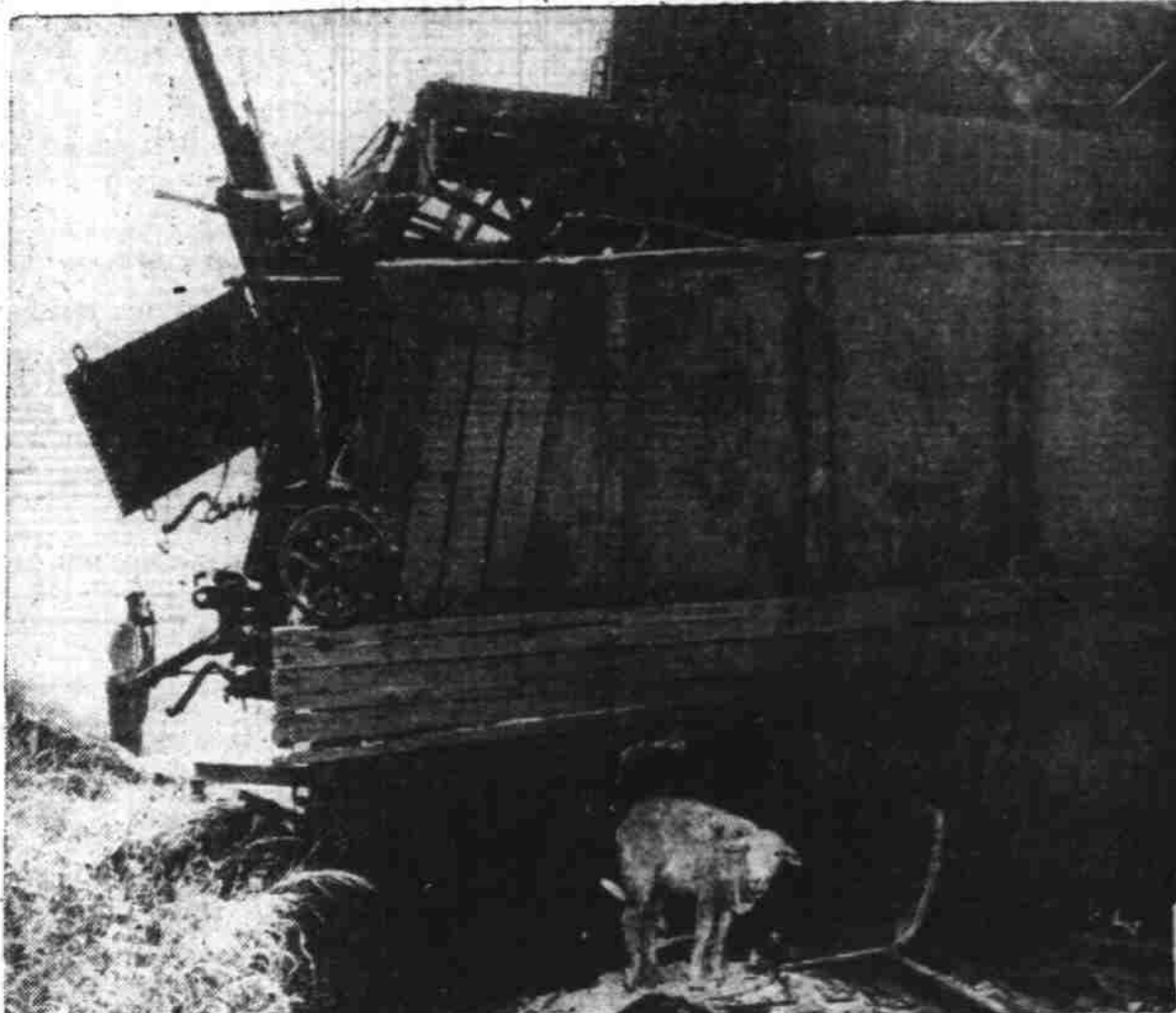
Hill said, "The wind must have blown the door shut."

"Either that," said Mrs. Hill, "or the youngsters closed the door after they got in the box."

A 30-mile-an-hour north wind was blowing against the face of the box.

One son remains in each family. "Our little boy (two and a half year old Shaun) had a cold today," Hill said, "and we kept him inside. Otherwise, he probably would have been with the others."

Charles Nichols might not have died, his mother said—but he felt ill and stayed home from school. He was the only one of the five of school age.

PRICE-FIXING ALSO HIT

Movie Industry's Big Five Have Court Order To Clean Up Film Distribution

WASHINGTON, May 4. (AP)—The movie industry's big five wrestled with a new script today—an order from the Supreme Court to get out of the super-colossal class.

The tribunal ruled yesterday that the five companies violated anti-trust laws through price-fixing and film distribution agreements. It also told lower courts to go ahead with new proceedings to determine whether the movie concerns must sell their interest in 3,137 theaters.

At the same time the high court set the stage for damage claims by independent theater owners which may run into millions of dollars.

The main monopoly case has been in court since 1938. By a 7 to 1 vote the Supreme Court upheld all but one of the findings of a special three-judge federal court sitting in New York last year. Justice Douglas wrote the majority opinion, with Justice Frankfurter dissenting. Justice Jackson took no part in the hearing.

The lower court had directed that first-run pictures be put on the auction block for competitive bidding, rather than be-

In his dissent, Frankfurter contended the trial court had gone far enough.

Warner Bros., and 20th Century-Fox. They produce, distribute and exhibit movies. Linked with them in the case were Columbia Pictures Corp., and Universal Corp., producers and distributors, and United Artists Corp., a distributor.

Among other things, the court said the firms acted in restraint of trade by:

1. Setting the price of admissions.

2. Giving "clearance" to some theaters—that is setting the time before a film could be shown in a rival house.

3. Block booking—by which a theater or a chain must take a number of pictures to get a particular one desired.

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BENEFITS UNEQUAL

Reports Reveal Injustices In Ad Valorem Tax System

AUSTIN May 4. — The annual reminder that the tax system upon which all local governmental financing, and some state financing, is based—the ad valorem tax system—works an injustice has just been issued by State Auditor C. H. Cavness.

Cavness doesn't say that in his report, which consists wholly of figures. The figures however speak for themselves.

The annual report is on the ad valorem tax position of each county in Texas. Demonstrable this report shows:

1. How much ad valorem tax you pay depends entirely upon what county you live in.

2. Because of this wide disparity, the beneficiaries of whatever benefits flow from spending tax money have no reasonable equality of benefits.

3. Because of the utter lack of uniformity, citizens in some counties may be said not only to bear their own tax burden but a portion of their neighbors'.

The many factors leading to these inequities have been pointed out many times. Commonest is the fact that there is no uniformity in determining the value of property for tax purposes. The state auditor this year did not even bother

to make his annual comparison of the wide range of percentage factors used as a basis. The lack of uniformity is not only between counties. Every taxpayer knows that there is no uniformity between taxing districts within any given county.

The variance is best shown in terms of dollars. Take two counties of somewhat comparable position, Nueces and Travis. According to the 1940 census, Travis is the larger. But it has no oil wells and few industries. This lack, however, would not seem wholly to justify that Nueces county collects twice as much in taxes as Travis County. That would seem to imply that the substantially equal populations of these two counties are lopsided in government-supported services. Total tax collections in Travis County last year were \$2,608,000 in Nueces County, \$5,259,000.

In areas of comparable population, one factor which would be about the same would be the number of children. Much has been said of late about inequality of educational opportunity as between states. How about between Texas counties?

Take the 1940 census for an approximation of populations, to show a representative group outside of the big-city counties, and compare the amount of local taxes for schools. The disparity is startling, no matter what it's based on:

Schools have been used as an example only because of ease of arriving at a comparison. Similar comparisons could be made on relative contribution to the state government; road building and building of public structures, all paid for by the ad valorem tax.

The bridge, the only link to the northeast out of Rome, served the only road to the town of less than 200 population.

Maine Only Chilly Spot In Nation

CHICAGO, May 4. (AP)—Maine was the only chilly spot on today's early morning weather map with other sections of the country reporting temperatures at seasonable levels.

The mercury dipped to below freezing in northern Maine, with Caribou reporting a low over the 40s. Early morning readings over the northern half of the country generally were between 40 and 50 and ranged between 50 and 70 in the southern half.

Rain fell in scattered sections. The heaviest falls were in sections of Tennessee, Mississippi, Arkansas and Louisiana. Memphis reported a fall of 1.22 inches in six hours. There also were showers in parts of Kentucky, Indiana, Missouri, Oklahoma and Montana.

Pro-Truman Faction Lashed By Calvert

AUSTIN, May 4. (AP)—Texas pro-Truman democrats want to turn the party platform over to "northern political bosses." Chairman Robert W. Calvert of the state democratic executive committee charged yesterday.

If the pro-Truman forces control the state convention at Brownwood, "Texas will be sold down the river," Calvert said in a statement here on the eve of today's county conventions.

The main issue before those conventions, Calvert said, is whether Texas wants its national convention delegates uninstructed or instructed for Truman.

"If those who wish to be committed to the renomination of President Truman control our state convention and our delegates to Philadelphia, we may be certain that they propose also to give northern political bosses a free hand in drafting the platform," Calvert said.

Calvert charged that Woodville J. Rogers of San Antonio, leader of the pro-Truman wing of the party, tried to prevent the nomination of Truman as vice-president at Chicago in 1944.

"I further charge that at the same time and place he was doing his utmost to bring about the renomination of Henry Wallace, then and now a notorious party bolter," Calvert said.

"Just when did support of Truman become a test of party loyalty with Rogers?" Calvert asked.

"When did party loyalty begin to mean so much Mr. Rogers?" was another question. "I charge

by his own public confession that he bolted the Democratic party's nominee for United States Senator in 1922.

"We know where Mr. Rogers stands on a candidate; but before Texas Democrats decide to accept his leadership I am certain they would be interested in knowing where he stands on principles."

Calvert said that Gov. Beauford H. Jester had made an "open, forthright and firm statement" that he would support the party's national nominees. The executive committee also committed itself to such support, he went on.

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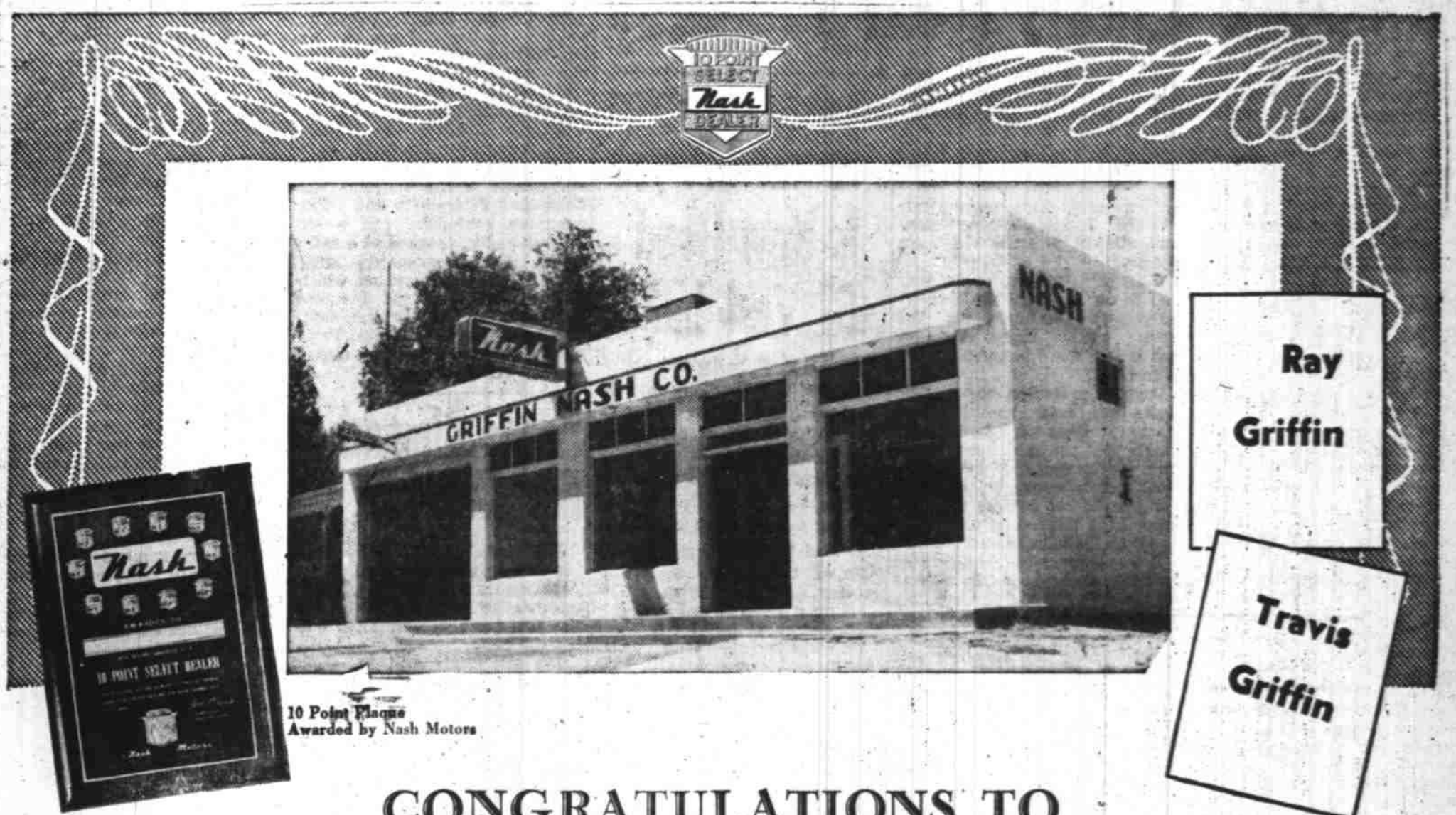

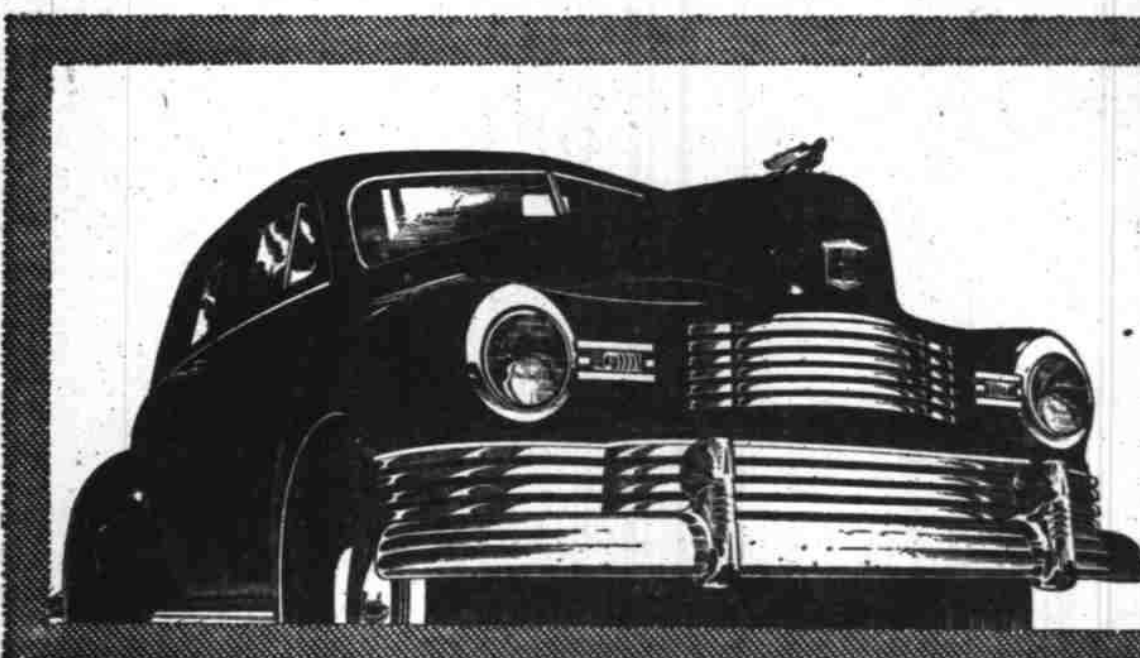

Man Gives Self Up After Bank Robbed

HUNTSVILLE, May 4. (AP)—Sheriff Lloyd Farris said charges would be filed today against a 24-year-old man who gave himself up three hours after the New Waverly State Bank, 12 miles south of here, was robbed yesterday.

Farris said he had recovered \$1,924 before the man gave himself up. A check with the bank indicated this was about \$123 short of the amount stolen, he said.

Farris said the man, whom he identified as William Carl Sullivan of Riverside, Tex., signed a written statement admitting the robbery. Farris quoted Sullivan as saying he took the money to try to make up for money he lost going broke in the cattle business.

The bank was robbed about noon. Farris said Sullivan walked up to Highway Patrolmen Elmer Nichols and A. L. Bouldin here about 3 p. m. and told them he

understood the sheriff was looking for him.

Farris had gone to Riverside after finding the money and a gun in a car driven by two persons. The patrolmen took Sullivan there, then to New Waverly so bank officers could see him.

The sheriff said the car was in William Carl Sullivan's name. He said that the two persons in it knew nothing of the robbery and that Sullivan told in his statement of trading cars with the man who was driving the automobile. He quoted Sullivan as saying he left the gun and money in a suitcase in the car.

The sheriff said Leon Bilnoski, vice president of the New Waverly bank, recalled after the robbery that a man answering the robber's description had spent a lot of time in front of the bank a week ago.

Laborer Files 104 Tax Forms

PHILADELPHIA, May 4. (AP)—Filling out income tax forms for an itinerant day laborer was more than just a headache—it was practically a steady job.

Francis R. Smith, collector of internal revenue for the Philadelphia district, said yesterday that a man who listed his occupation as "freight unloader" turned in 104 W-2 short forms to complete his tax return for 1947.

Smith said the man, father of three small children, was employed by 51 different firms in seven states, being rehired by some employers during last year to account for the difference between the number of forms and job totals. The mark of 104 short forms, Smith said, exceeded the previous record of 75 filled out by an individual. The government, Smith added, refunded the new record holder \$100 in tax overpayment on his \$80-a-week average pay.

Motor Freight Union Calls Off Strike

HOUSTON, May 4. (AP)—A threatened strike of 3,000 motor freight handlers in Texas has been called off.

M. W. Miller, international representative of the Teamsters Union, AFL, last night said a tentative agreement had been reached with the 20 freight lines involved in a wage dispute.

He did not reveal terms of the agreement, which must be approved by each of the 11 locals of the union.

Before a meeting between union and management yesterday the two groups had been five cents apart on wage demands.

The old contract between the companies and the freight handlers was to have expired at midnight last night.

ATHENS, May 4. (AP)—The Greek government intends to try Guerrilla Leader Markos Vafiades, in Absentia, on charges that he was the "moral author" of the assassination Saturday of a cabinet minister.

Constantine Rentis, the minister of public order, announced the government's intention last night after a broadcast from the secret rebel radio reportedly praised the man who assassinated Justice Minister Christos Ladas.

The broadcast also invited Communists to make similar attempts on the lives of Rentis, Premier Themistokles Sophoulis and Deputy Premier Constantin Tsaldaris. No date for the trial of Vafiades was given.

Ladas was slain by hurled grenades Saturday. His death was described officially as a Communist plot aimed at three cabinet ministers, including Rentis and Sophoulis.

Efstratos Moutsoyanis, 22, is being held as the assassin and police said he is under close guard to protect his life. Informal sources said he was giving information which can be termed "sensational" if confirmed.

It was reported in reliable quarters that approximately 100 persons have been arrested in connection with Ladas' assassination, presumably upon the basis of disclosures made by Moutsoyanis.

Twenty-four persons convicted of other slayings in various parts of Greece were executed this morning. One man scheduled to face a firing squad escaped just before his number came up.

A reliable source said there are nearly a thousand persons in Greece now facing the death sentence for various crimes.

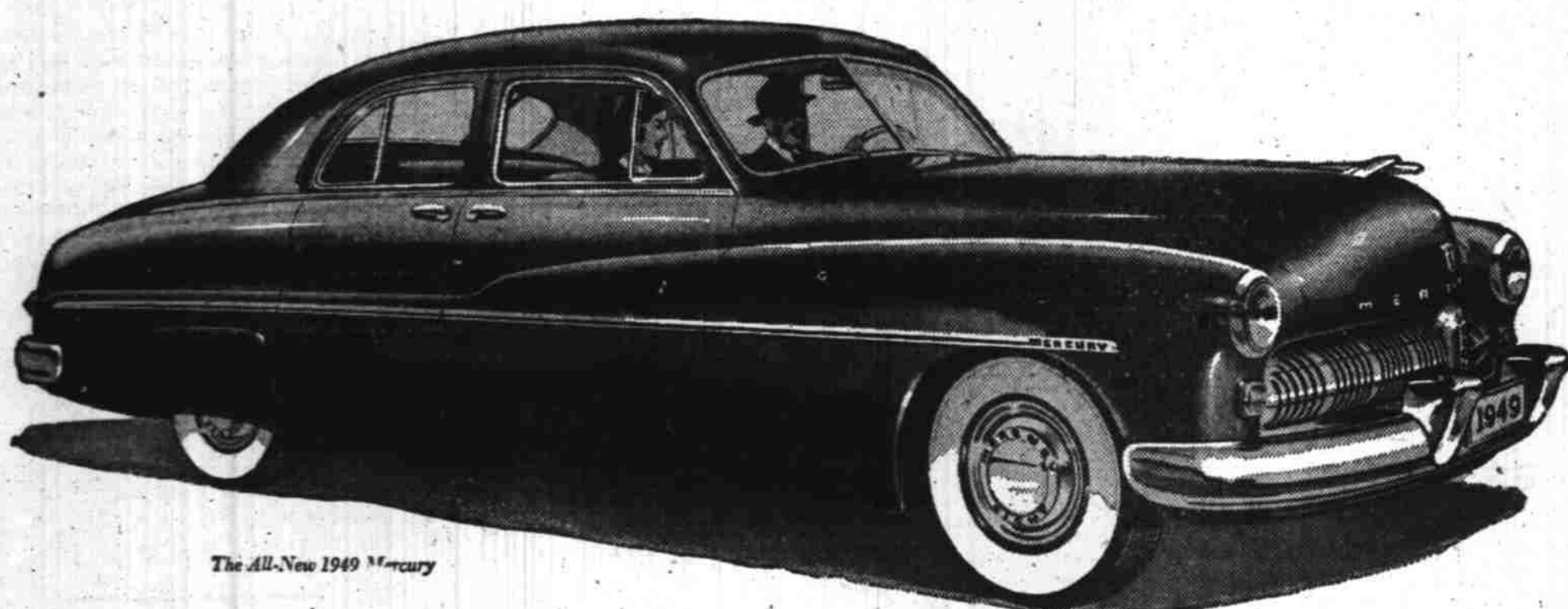

Advertising To The Nation

One of the most challenging of the community promotional type of projects that Big Spring has ever faced is now before the city's business interests, in view of the chamber of commerce directorate's approval of an ambitious advertising program.

The group has voted to undertake the raising of \$12,500 to finance Big Spring's share of an inter-community advertising campaign in one of the nation's leading magazines, the Saturday Evening Post.

In brief, the plan works like this: a group of Texas cities, ranging in population from 20,000 to 35,000, would band themselves together as the "Opportunity Cities of Texas" and finance a series of messages in the Post, directed to business interests, small industries and investors who are interested in ex- as. These folk would be invited to make inquiry as to what the Texas towns have to offer, and the cities in turn would then attempt to answer these inquiries in full.

Such an advertising program seems altogether timely, because there is no question but that the big trend is to Texas, and doubtless will continue so. Small businesses in the North and East are encountering labor, fuel and weather difficulties that can be overcome in this state, and can be interested in what Texas has to offer in the way of resources and labor and market potential. Another item is that Texas is distinctive in having neither a sales tax nor an income tax.

Such an advertising program seems feasible, because the smaller cities of Texas have a story to tell, to offset the advantages of size that are held by such places as Dallas and Houston. All small businesses that come to Texas do not necessarily need, or even want, location in a metropolitan center. It's up to the smaller cities to tell their story of opportunity.

Granted that \$12,500 is a handsome sum of money. It represents a real task for Big Spring to subscribe such an amount. But we have an opportunity to get into an integrated, continuing program of advertising (the series would run from 13 to 30 weeks) at the cost of one advertisement. Big things cost big money, and we have set our sights high. That is the only way we can achieve high results.

Demands From Pressure Groups

It is not so much the cost of a special session of the legislature that makes one objectionable as is the fact that usually they are called for the purpose of serving some special interest rather than the good of the entire population of Texas. Governor Jester has steadily refused to call a session though pressure from groups with considerable voting influence has been used on him. For his resistance to these demands he should be commended, instead of being criticised.

The session asked to provide more pay for school teachers appeared to be soundly based, yet the Governor was able to persuade some bankers to take care of the need for more money without the noise and cost of a special session. The demand for a session to provide a presidential preference primary was political, solely, and was very properly denied. The urge for a session to provide more money for old-age and dependent children allowances was useless, for the amount of money for those purposes is set by the Constitution, and cannot be changed by a special session. Nevertheless, the Governor will be charged with lack of sympathy with the people who receive that money, a charge wholly unjustified.

The regular session of the legislature next January will be pressured to provide more money for many groups. Many candidates are making promises for increases in old age assistance and some in other measures. Organizations are being formed or were already existent, with the avowed purpose of demanding more money from the State Treasury to meet their individual determination of what they should be given. The legislators will be inclined to listen to the people who make the most noise, and the others, who have no organization or lobbies, will be neglected.

Senseless Sabotage

The next few weeks will bring a concrete and most significant test of the condition of the Republican party. Will the men who are manifestly the most popular with the mass of the Republican voters—Stassen, Dewey and Vandenberg—be upheld or repudiated in the field of foreign policy by the Republican organization in Congress? The test will come before June 12 on the question of extending the reciprocal trade agreements act which expires on that day.

Since it was first passed in 1934, the act has four times come before Congress for renewal—in 1937, 1940, 1943 and 1945. On all these occasions it could fairly be said that, though there were many Republicans who supported it, it was a measure of the Democratic party, based on its traditional views in favor of moderate tariffs, and therefore one which the Republican party, long committed to high protection, could reasonably oppose. But this is no longer the case. The Republican party can no longer oppose the extension of this act without repudiating its own solemn and precise commitments, now the law of the land and an integral and essential part of the nation's foreign policy.

The economic co-operation act was passed by the Senate on March 13. The vote was 69 to 17. It was passed by the House on March 31. The vote was 329 to 74.

This law says (Section 115) (b) (3) that the participating countries are required to conclude agreements with the United States providing among other things for co-operation "to reduce barriers to trade among themselves and with other countries." If the reciprocal trade agreements act is not renewed or is nullified by destructive amendment, this country will not be able to negotiate and conclude the agreements which the law of the economic co-operation act requires.

U. N. Battle With Time

Eleven days from now Britain will surrender her mandate over Palestine and the lid will be off the Arab-Jewish war—unless a harassed United Nations can evolve a plan to prevent a catastrophe.

Eleven days, just the flick of an eyelid as times goes when a fast-moving emergency like this is faced: At best, the U. N. will have to pull a rabbit out of the hat to handle the situation. At worst, this Middle East conflict could develop into another world upheaval.

And when one stops to survey the whole complicated muddle the question naturally arises whether there would be greater danger in continuation of the Palestine upheaval or in an inability of the U. N. to do anything about it. Certainly a failure of the peace organization to do something constructive would be a terrible blow to the morale of its supporters.

Anyway, England is giving up her mandate on May 15, and expects to have her troops out of Palestine by August 1. Furthermore, the British say that after the surrender of the mandate they will employ their diminishing armed forces merely defensively, to protect the completion of their withdrawal.

In short, all restraint will have been removed from the developing conflict—unless there is U. N. intervention.

Meantime the situation in Palestine is (to use the language of the British Army) "seriously deteriorating." Yesterday the Britons announced that they were rushing troops, tanks and guns to the Holy Land from Malta and Cyprus to cope with the worsened conditions. This was to supplement a force estimated by competent observers to be about 25,000 troops.

Washington Merry-Go-Round—

Mrs. Roosevelt May Oppose Truman

By DREW PEARSON
WASHINGTON.—If Mrs. Roosevelt does what her friends say she's going to do about Harry Truman it's going to be one of the hardest political blows the President has ever taken—also a big personal disappointment.

Only a few insiders know it, but President Truman has counted on Mrs. Roosevelt to help him swing his nomination. That was one thing he had in mind when he first appointed Mrs. R. to the United Nations.

Mrs. Roosevelt was first asked to be a delegate to UNESCO, the United Nations educational and cultural subsidiary. This she turned down. Then Sec. of State Jimmie Byrnes suggested to Truman that she be made a full U. S. delegate to the U. N.

Truman even took the trouble to call Mrs. Roosevelt himself so as to make sure she accepted the U. N. job.

Now, however, word from Roosevelt circles is that Mrs. R. will not only oppose Harry for renomination, but may have a friendly talk with him, urging him not to run.

OIL LOBBY

Hard-working Senator Donnell of Missouri begins important hearings today on the most powerful lobby Washington has seen in a long time—tidelands oil.

Donnell and Harry Truman, both from Missouri, one a Republican and the other a Democrat, don't agree on a lot of things. But they do agree that the vast reserve of oil under the ocean bottom—namely tidelands oil—belongs to the federal government. And if Donnell is able to uncover some of the big money that was put into Truman's campaign by the big oil boys who thought they were influencing future tidelands votes, then it should be noted to President Truman's credit that he remained true to his convictions, not his political friends.

There is one phase of the tidelands oil pressure group that bears special attention. It is the fact that exactly the same group which overcharged the U. S. Navy for Arabian oil, which flinched lush loans from the U. S. Treasury for King Ibn Saud of Arabia, and which lobbied to kill the partition of Palestine, is now pulling wires to turn the rich tidelands oil reserve over to the coastal states—with considerable benefit to the oil companies.

In other words, Standard Oil of California and the Texas Oil Company, backed by the Guaranty Trust Company and various big bankers, are the real people to watch both in regard to the Arab lobby and tidelands oil. They go hand in hand.

NOTE—It's significant that the Wall Street firm of James V. Forrestal, now the most potent man in the cabinet, once handled the finances of Arab-American oil interests. Forrestal is the man who persuaded Truman to kill the partition of Palestine, thus leaving the United Nations and the near east with about the worst international mess since the war ended.

TAFT'S OHIO

One thing you have to remember about Senator Taft and the important Taft-Stassen primary today, is that Taft policies haven't been too popular in the Senator's home state. There is respect for the Taft courage and the Taft family, but no great love for Taft policies. For instance:

While a Republican congress, led by Taft, was cutting the federal budget to ribbons, the State of Ohio, also led by Republicans, was doing just the opposite. In 1947-48 the overwhelmingly controlled Republican Ohio legislature, and the Republican governor of Ohio in-

creased the state budget 47 per cent over Ohio's 1945-46 expenditures under Democratic Governor Frank Lausche.

Yet, in the Senate, Taft has been one of the most efficient leaders for a contrary policy.

COORDINATION
Few people realize it, but there are several hundred important British army and navy officers working full time in the Pentagon Building. They are members of the old wartime Combined Chiefs of Staff which has never been officially dissolved.

Therefore it has been quite easy for American army men to hold candid conferences with top French, Belgian, Luxembourg and Netherlands officers. They have already drawn up the paper work which would ordinarily precede signing of any alliance. Once the green light comes from the White House, the plan will go into high gear at once.

What the Benelux countries chiefly want is a new lend-lease act which would standardize military equipment and provide new arms for Europe. Truman is awaiting a new "crisis" before asking for a new lend-lease act.

Texas Today—

Is Precinct Convention An American Weakness?

Are precinct conventions a weakness in our Democratic structure?

Robert Oliver, state director of the CIO thinks so. Oliver, a husky, greying fellow of about 40 who hails from Corpus Christi, happened to be floor leader of the Democratic precinct preliminaries we attended Saturday.

It was precinct 133 at Dallas and 1,500 qualified voters could have attended.

Thirty-two persons turned out. "That's the weakness," Oliver said. "People should make themselves heard at precinct conventions but they aren't interested enough to show up."

Oliver handled the proceedings deftly and the whole thing was over in 30 minutes.

About 28 persons signed up as delegates to the county convention which will be held Tuesday. These included eight negroes who sat by themselves in the school auditorium.

Oliver read a resolution that nominees of the Democratic party should be supported. It passed without a dissenting vote. Then came time for the precinct to elect a chairman to the county convention. Oliver was nominated, and a man moved that the nominations be closed.

But just then a Miss Jean Waters got up and proposed the name of a man seated next to her. She hoped, she said, that she wasn't out of order. Oliver said no, of course not, that he would be glad to have opposition as precinct chairman. Then Miss Waters said she wasn't trying to get the man in as a candidate for the chairmanship, she just wanted him added to the list of county convention delegates. Oliver was elected chairman and Mrs. Melody Tune Douthit was named secretary.

Oliver then asked if anyone had anything to say further and it was at this point that Dr. Morris F. Waldman, an ear nose and throat physician, got up and started talk-

ing about zoning. It developed that he was not satisfied with the zoning in his section of the city and he had organized the Precinct 133 Civic Association, "because we've got to fight."

Dr. Waldman, clad in a sports outfit, invited all the people to come to a meeting, saying, "If you have any idea of what you want to fight for bring your fighting clothes."

After the meeting adjourned, Miss Rogers, a young woman who seemed to have an English accent, came down to the front of the auditorium and complained to Oliver and Miss Douthit that: "I thought this was the place where we could speak our political views."

Oliver said mildly: "You had a chance to say anything you wanted to."

Mrs. Douthit spoke up: "If you wanted to say something for Mr. Truman, why didn't you?" "I didn't want to say anything for Mr. Truman," Miss Rogers said.

She pulled out several copies of a statement and laid them on a table. "This is what I wanted to say," she said. Then she walked out.

We took the time to read her statement. It said Mr. Truman has the diplomatic vision of a gopher.

Deadwood Changed

DEADWOOD, S. D., May 4 (U.P.)—Day after day goes by here in this crossroads of the old west and nary a man falls, bullet-sieved in his own gore.

The thud of gold pokes has given way to the rustle of \$5 bills. The bus has replaced the stagecoach. The soft scraping of "The Kyards" is heard only behind locked doors, and so is the clicking roulette ball. The brick high school outshadows the biggest wooden saloon. The night is lit by the neon sign instead of the flaming six-gun, and the thudding hoofs of the outlaw's fleeing pony echo only in the pulp magazines. You get a ticket now for parking in the wrong place.

The grandsons of the posers that chased the bad men out of town hold conclaves on how to welcome the good tourist.

Yessiree, Podner, old Deadwood, capital of that vanished frontier where "the coward never started and the weak died on the way," has gone respectable. "Wild Bill" Hickok and "Calamity Jane," asleep in their Hill Cemetery, wouldn't know the town they helped make famous—or infamous.

Its present attack of civic virtue—gambling was banned two years ago—is deplored by some of Deadwood's citizenry. They'd like to keep it the wide open town it was for 70 years, a place where the miner, the stockman and the stranger could risk their stomachs at the bar and their pocketbooks at the blackjack table.

But not 78-year-old D. M. McGahey, curator of the Adams Memorial Hall, a museum of Deadwood's crowded past. He feels that Deadwood's flamboyant characters—Hickok, "Deadwood Dick," and "Calamity Jane," Army Scout and Lady Tossopot—have had entirely too much attention.

"Wild Bill Hickok" was, never anything but a gambler here," grumbled McGahey. "As for Calamity Jane, the best you can say for her is that she never did anyone any harm except herself."

He disdained even to mention "Poker Alice," famous gimlet-eyed, cigar-smoking female card sharp. And as for "Deadwood Dick," the man who foiled the stagecoach robbers in a thousand western pulp tales, listen here—

"Deadwood Dick—or at least one of the four men who called themselves that—was the dumbest fool that ever came over the pike," snorted McGahey. "He didn't know which end of a gun to hold away from him when he pulled the trigger."

Congress' Heavy Slate

WASHINGTON, (U.P.)—Congress has its hands full to finish up before the important summer coming up.

The Republicans meet in Philadelphia June 21 to nominate a candidate for president. The Democrats pick their candidate there in July.

The Democrats and Republicans in Congress want to finish before June 21 so that:

1. They can take part in the conventions.
2. Use the time between the conventions and the elections in November to campaign for their own re-election.

One-third of the 96 Senate seats and all 435 house seats will be at stake in the elections.

Here are some of the major items still unfinished:

1. Men for the armed forces—Congress will have to decide whether to pass a draft law.

2. Housing—Senate has passed the Taft-Ellender-Wagner long-range housing bill. It's now up to the House to okay it and thus make it law, or kill it, or let it die.

3. Margarine—The House voted to wipe out all federal taxes on margarine. Nothing will be changed though, unless the Senate votes as the House did.

4. The reciprocal trade agreements act—It dies June 12 unless Congress renews it. This act has been on the books 14 years.

5. Displaced person—Should this displaced persons in Europe come country let perhaps 200,000 or more into this country?

6. Civil rights—The idea of passing an anti-lynching law and a law to wipe out poll taxes has been kicking around Congress for months.

The Senate may tackle an anti-lynching bill this month. If so, the Southern Democrats will try to talk it to death. If it ever passes the Senate, the House still has to consider it.

7. Tidelands—The House last week passed a bill to give the states ownership of the land, rich in oil, off their coasts. The government says the government should control the lands.

If the Senate tries to act on this, to make it law, the whole business may get drowned in debate.

8. Atomic energy commission—The terms of office of the five members of the Atomic Energy Commission including Chairman David E. Lilienthal, end August 1.

President Truman has asked the Senate to approve the re-appointment of all of them, with Lilienthal appointed for five years.

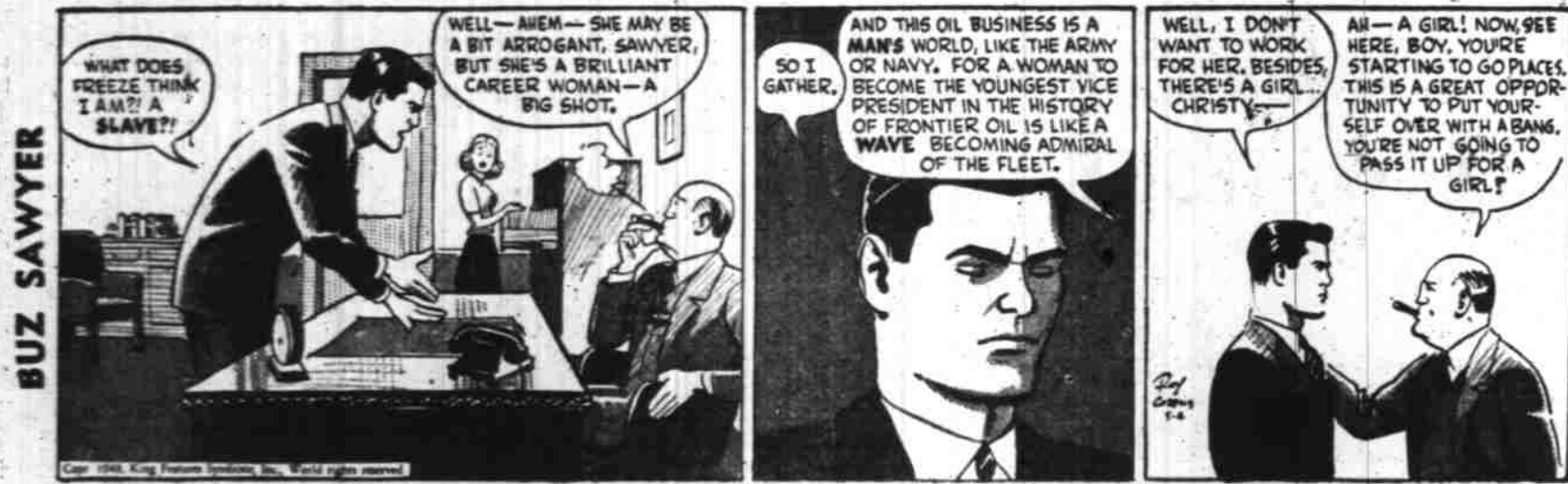

HITTING .383
This May Be Best Season For Musial

This may be Stan Musial's greatest year since he came up to the major leagues with the St. Louis Cardinals near the end of the 1941 season.
In his first 11 games, the 27-year-old native of Donora, Pa., has built up a robust .383 batting average. But that is not the entire story.
Stan's 18 hits include four doubles, three triples and two home runs. All figures are high up among the leaders. He has driven in 14 runs, almost one third of the Cardinals' total. Only Walker Cooper of the New York Giants and Hank Sauer of the Cincinnati Reds, with 15 each, have batted in more. Quite a difference from last year when he was hitting a puny .167 and had driven in only four runs.
The pride of Donora singled in his first two times at bat yesterday, the second blow sending in Red Schoendienst with St. Louis' first run. The Cards added two more to defeat the Chicago Cubs, 3-1, in the only day game in the National League.
The triumph showed the Cards in top place, past Brooklyn, and only a game and a half behind the pace-setting Pittsburgh Pirates.
Dave Koslo hurled a masterful four-hit 5-0 shutout for the Giants over the Reds before 28,424 fans in a night game in Cincinnati. It was his second win in two starts.
The Giants collected 13 hits off Johnny Vandermeer, Howard Fow and Ken Raffensberger.
The victory put the Giants in a virtual tie with the Pittsburgh Pirates for first place in the National League. The Pirates, however, hold a percentage point lead with eight victories and four defeats to a record of 9-5 for the Giants.
No other National League games were scheduled. Rain washed out the only scheduled American League game with Washington and Philadelphia.
C-C Combine Means Trouble To Other Nags
NEW YORK, May 4. (AP)—Those owners whose horses ducked Citation and Coaltown in the Kentucky Derby to await the Preakness and Belmont Stakes have found little room for comfort the last few days.
This seems to be the general attitude:
"If My Request was the standout Derby threat of the East and couldn't get close to Citation and Coaltown, how are our stay-at-homes going to fare against the Calumet one-two punch?"
The Preakness is two Saturdays away and the Belmont is slated June 12. That gives owners of rival three-year-olds plenty of time to decide.
Ben Whitaker's My Request, the Wood Memorial hero who was unbeaten this year until he ran up against the Calumet twins at Louisville, is expected to try again.
C. V. Whitney's Mount Marcy, a comparatively new development, is another likely challenger. Trainer S. E. Keith has been pointing Mount Marcy, second in the Wood and an impressive victor at Jamaica, Saturday, for the Baltimore Special.
As for the better sellers, Gasparillas, Salmagundis, River Lanes, Big Dials, etc., the prospect of facing Citation and Coaltown is a rather frightening thing.
The Belmont, of course, is a longer race—a mile and a half. It affords a horse of the plodder type—like Jacobson and Hart's Big Dial—a chance.
But Big Dial found Citation more than he could handle in the Flamingo Stakes at Hialeah last winter.

Courts Cannot Rule On Racial Housing Disputes
WASHINGTON, May 4. (AP)—White home-owners who want to keep colored residents out of their neighborhoods may no longer look to the courts for help.
The Supreme Court said so in two 6 to 0 decisions yesterday. But the tribunal at the same time told the white owners:
1. They can get together among themselves and make all the private restrictive agreements they wish so long as the purposes are carried out by voluntary means alone.
2. No matter how discriminatory or wrongful such private agreements may be, those excluded because of them can expect to find no redress in the 14th amendment to the constitution.
The two opinions written for the court by Chief Justice Vinson mentioned only agreements based on "race or color."
Hence there was widespread speculation as to what effect the decisions would have on restrictive agreements—or covenants—which bar other minority groups, such as Jews, Mexicans and Syrians.
Negro spokesmen praised yesterday's ruling. Real estate interests showed little alarm.
B-29 Crashes In Germany
FURSTENFELDBRUCK, Germany, May 4. (AP)—An American B-29 crashed here shortly before midnight last night, killing one crew member and injuring two others. Nine other U. S. airmen aboard escaped injury. The \$300,000 plane burst into flames and was destroyed.
The ship was part of a squadron taking off for a training flight in the Mediterranean area. The accident occurred about a mile and a half from the takeoff point. The other ships continued on their way.
Prompt action by base crash crews was credited with saving most of the big plane's complement. They were at the scene less than two minutes after the crash, pulling men out of the flames.
There was no immediate explanation as to the cause of the crash.
It was one of 28 B-29s which arrived here April 15 for training missions. Two of three squadrons have returned to the United States.

Taft Is Factor
Ohio Republicans Give Answer Today To Stassen Support
By The Associated Press
Ohio Republicans gave Harold E. Stassen, his answer today to how many of the state's presidential nominating votes he can take away from Senator Robert A. Taft.
The Minnesotan is seeking 23 of the 53 delegates Taft's home state will send to the Philadelphia convention next month. Stassen supporters claim up to 19. But Taft's backers said the former Minnesota governor would be lucky to get six the senator himself gave Stassen only one at most.
Stassen closed his Ohio campaign with a speech at Cleveland calling for higher farm price supports, a step Taft opposes.
Taft wound up his campaign in his home city of Cincinnati with a declaration that he would join anyone in a fight against communism—even Fascist nations, "because fascism now is no threat to our freedom."
Communism also was the subject of another GOP presidential aspirant, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, who takes on Stassen in Oregon's May 21 primary.
Campaigning for support in that contest Dewey last night attacked proposals—which Stassen has backed—to outlaw the Communist Party.
To take such action, the New Yorker declared, would be to adopt the methods of communism itself.
In addition to the Taft-Stassen headline race in Ohio, Democratic voters picked 50 national convention delegates and both parties chose candidates for 23 House seats, the governorship and the state ticket.
There was voting, too, in Alabama, Delaware, Florida and Indiana, but only in Alabama was any major political issue involved.
Democrats there selected 26 convention delegates from a field of 84 candidates—29 of whom have said they will quit the convention if President Truman's civil rights program is written into the party's platform.
The Florida primaries pick a 20-vote Democratic delegation and 16-vote GOP delegation plus candidates for six House seats, the governorship, and state ticket.
Indiana voters selected nominees for the state's 11 House seats as well as delegates to state conventions which later will name national convention slates.
Delaware's 10 democratic delegates are expected to support President Truman for the party nomination. Missouri's 34-vote delegation was named yesterday with those instructions.
A Republican faction in Georgia also named a convention slate yesterday, and left it unopposed. An opposition GOP group in the same state will meet later.
In another election yesterday, the lightest Maryland turnout in years chose six nominees for the congressional races in November. Two Republican and three Democratic incumbents were renominated. A fourth Democrat was defeated.

Post-Dispatch Wins Its Third Pulitzer Prize
NEW YORK, May 4. (AP)—The St. Louis Post-Dispatch yesterday won—for the third time—the Pulitzer prize for American newspapers.
The paper, which won the award in 1937 and 1941, was selected as the newspaper rendering the "most disinterested and meritorious public service" in the past year.
It was cited for its coverage of the Centralia, Ill., mine disaster, and its subsequent campaign which led to "impressive reforms in mine safety laws and regulations."
Pulitzer prizes for 1948 also went to "Tales of the South Pacific," a novel by James A. Michener, and to "A Streetcar Named Desire," a play by Tennessee Williams.
1948 winners in the field of letters:
Most distinguished book of history of the United States—Bernard DeVoto, for his "Across the Wide Missouri."
Most distinguished American biography—Margaret Clapp, for her "Forgotten First Citizen: John Bigelow."
Most distinguished volume of verse—W. H. Auden, for his "Age of Anxiety."
The prize for music was won by Walter Piston, a native of Rockland, Me., and professor of music at Harvard University. He won the award for his Symphony No. 3, performed for the first time by the Boston Symphony Orchestra last January.
In the field of art, Philip Anthony-Moose, 27, a free lance New York City portrait painter, was named to receive a \$1,500 scholarship as the art student certified by the National Academy of Design as "the most promising and deserving" in the country.

WALLACE CALMS CROWD

Says Hecklers Red 'Fellow Travelers'

COLUMBIA, Mo., May 4. (AP)—Henry Wallace, in a speech interrupted by shouts and occasional boos, told an audience of 5,000 yesterday he was not a Communist and accused his hecklers of being "fellow travelers."

The third party presidential candidate spoke on the county courthouse lawn to a crowd that included many college students. The University of Missouri, Stephens College and Christian College are located here.

Hecklers shouted and sang, "I don't want him, you can have him, he's too red for me." There also were cries of "We want Wallace."

Wallace said: "I propose to have you show me that the people still believe in the right to be heard. I am calling on you people to exercise the right of free Americans to free assembly and the right to speak."

Taylor Charges Police Tried To Provoke Him To Talk Back

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., May 4. (AP)—Sen. Glen Taylor (D-Idaho) faces disorderly conduct charges in police court here tonight.

The third party running mate of Presidential Candidate Henry Wallace goes before Judge Oliver Hall on charges growing out of the city's segregation laws.

The maximum fine for disorderly conduct is \$100 and costs and 180 days in jail. The minimum fine is \$1 and costs.

The Idaho senator was arrested Saturday night as he attempted to enter a Negro church where he was scheduled to address a meeting of the Southern Negro Youth Congress. He was released in \$100 bond.

In Washington yesterday Taylor told the Senate he doubts if he would be alive if he had let himself be provoked into "talking back" to police after his arrest.

He said two police officers taking him to jail drove through open country and along a lonely road. "It was obvious they had taken a detour, just hoping it would provoke something," he said.

Police Commissioner Eugene Connor said Taylor was taken directly from the spot where he was arrested to jail.

Relating his experience at the Birmingham jail, the senator said "I was locked up in the bullpen—I didn't even get a private cell befitting a United States senator."

Taylor was expected to arrive here this afternoon.

Murray, president of both the CIO and United Steelworkers, in a radio address, criticized the action of U. S. Steel and other steel firms in denying wage increases while cutting prices.

"The industry," Murray said, "could have made a sizeable price reduction and still have retained more than enough profits to grant our union's wage request. The industry has chosen to ignore the needs of its employees."

The CIO head said that the steelworkers union would live up to its no-strike agreement with the steel industry, running to next spring, adding that "The steel industry has not negotiated with us in good faith on the wage issue in the light of these facts."

Murray said the steelworkers would have welcomed a "real" price cut in steel but "the proposals now made with such fanfare by U. S. steel" will reduce steel prices only 1-20th of a cent a pound.

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
