newspapers, each serving its own community.

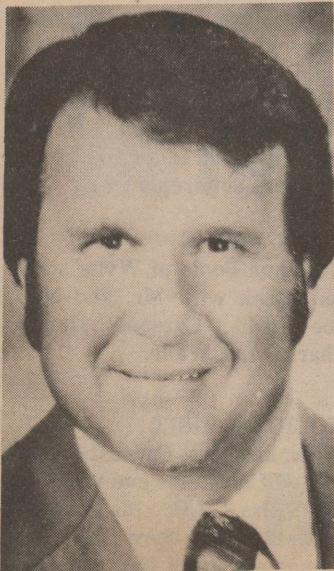
Evelyn Davis will continue to take news items and Mozelle Trotter and Janis Chaney of Olton will assume their former duties of interviews and advertising sales.

One World Government Predicted By Speaker

Area residents were among the crowd of some 350 people assembled in Hale County Agriculture Center Thursday to hear J.C. Lewis, a farmer and retired Air Force lieutenant colonel, warn of the dangers of multinational corporations.

Lewis, who has been speaking out forcefully for the past eight months stated that two organizations, the Trilateral Commission and the Council on Foreign Relations, are working toward a one-world government by "controlling energy, food and an international monetary system. How far along are they? They have said that it will be formed by 1980 and that's probably true-and it may come sooner than that."

When asked if she were shocked at statements made by Lewis, Mrs. Randall Roper of Olton stated that she was not really, "I have heard tapes made by Mr. Lewis before, and I appreciate the fact that he substantiates everything he says. Then, too, I have heard much of this information from other sources this past year."

Lewis explained that the Trilateral Commission has 200 members from Western Europe, Japan and North America, including 65 from the United States; and it is influencing the direction of American policy through economic, political and national media control.

He also charges that "Jimmy Carter was one of the first members of the Trilateral Commission when it was formed in 1973, and there are 18 members of the Commission in major positions of his administration."

He also specifically charged that David Rockefeller and the Rockefeller family controls many of the nation's major banks, including three of the top four, industries and energy companies through interlocking directorship and stock ownership...and are now at a

point where they can exert control on the nation's and the world's economy.

Lewis also asserted that 70 percent of the top 130 industries in the nation have interlocking boards of directors, which means that competing industries have the same directors and "this leads to price fixing."

He is concerned that progress of these controls has been gained through control of higher education, by major college grants and authoring textbooks used in teaching agriculture and economics.

Lewis lists three institutions, the nation's faith in God, patriotism and the family unit, as basic to our society and points out that all have deteriorated since World War II. Concerning the family unit he states "television shows are teaching young people the

concepts of new morality...which is immorality. The welfare system which gives increased aid to those with illegitimate children is legislating immorality."

He also pointed out that the outlawing of prayer in schools was one method of destroying the nation's faith in God.

To battle this influence and power, Lewis told his hearers to begin electing individuals to political office that will make the Trilateral Commission unpopular, work toward recall and referendum legislation, update anti-trust laws to make it illegal for anyone to serve on more than one corporate board of directors, fight against all forms of regional government, be more involved in the legislative and educational process, put more emphasis on religion and "get priorities back into life."

They will be reviewing legislature which convenes this week in Austin. Music will be provided by the LCC Chorus, and admission is free to the Rally.

CROCK POT TEA

1 qt. apple juice
6 oz frozen orange juice
1/2 t ground cloves or 16 cloves
1 t nutmeg
3/4 t ground ginger
4-7 whole cinnamon sticks
5 tea bags, steeped in 3 c hot water

1 c packed brown sugar
Cook in crock pot on high for 2 hours or low for 4 hours. Serves 12.

OLIVE BREAD

2 c flour
1/2 c sugar
4 t baking powder
1 t salt
1/4 c shortening
1/2 c nuts
3/4 c sharp cheddar cheese (grated)
3/4 c stuffed olives

1 egg
1 c milk
Cut shortening into dry ingredients. Blend in nuts, olives and cheese. Add eggs and milk, stirring only until flour is moistened. Pour into greased pan. Let stand 20 minutes; bake at 400° for 40-45 minutes.

SPANISH DEER STEAK

2 lbs steak or chopped deer steak
Flour for dredging
4 T lard
2 sliced onions
1 sliced green pepper
2 1/2 t salt
1/2 t pepper
1 No. 2 can tomatoes

Soak venison in salt water and vinegar overnight. Dredge steak in flour and brown in lard. Add other ingredients and simmer 2-3 hours stirring often.

CRUNCHY CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES

1 c quick oatmeal
1 c oil
1 c chocolate chips
2 c flour
1 c white sugar
1 c packed brown sugar
3 eggs, well beaten
1 t vanilla
1 t baking powder
1 t soda
3 c corn flakes

Mix in everything but the chips and flakes; add them by hand. Bake 8-10 minutes at 350°.

Legal Notice

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING THAT WATER LINES ARE NOT TO BE EXTENDED OUTSIDE THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF HART; PROVIDING FOR A PROCEDURE BY WHICH PROPERTY NOT WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF HART MAY OBTAIN WATER SERVICES FROM THE CITY OF HART; PROVIDING FOR A MINIMUM PAYMENT OF WATER USED BY PROPERTY OUTSIDE THE CITY LIMITS OF HART; PROVIDING FOR A REPEAL OF ANY ORDINANCES OR PORTIONS THEREOF AND CONFLICT HEREWITH; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas:

SECTION I.

THAT, no water mains will be extended to any property whether such property is subject to subdivision, or an individual tract, unless such property is included within or is annexed to the corporate limits of the City of Hart, Texas.

SECTION II.

THAT, upon a specific written request of an owner of property not within the corporate limits of the City of Hart, Texas, for permission to use water from the water supply system belonging to the City of Hart, Texas, the following procedure will be followed, to-wit:

A. The owner requesting such water services will pay to the City Clerk of the City of Hart, Texas, a meter deposit equal to that deposit required of property owners within the corporate limits of the City of Hart, Texas.

B. Upon receipt of such meter deposit, the City of Hart, Texas shall make a tap to a city water main and set a water meter on city property, at the location nearest the property described in the written request.

C. The property owner requesting the water supplied by the City of Hart, Texas, shall then make such connections as may be necessary to connect the facilities desired to be furnished with water to the water meter as set by the City of Hart, Texas.

SECTION III.

Any person requesting the use of water furnished by the City of Hart, Texas, shall pay any and all expenses connected with the setting of the meter and tap as above described together with all expenses as may be incurred by said property owner in connecting said premises upon which said water is to be used with the water tap furnished and made by the City of Hart, Texas.

SECTION IV.

The City of Hart, Texas, shall not be responsible to any person in any estate, corporation, or other entity, their heirs, successors or assigns, for the failure to supply sufficient water pressure, nor for excessive pressure furnished to the property supplied water pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION V.

The property owner requesting water furnished by the City of Hart, Texas, upon property not within the corporate limits of the City of Hart, Texas, shall pay a minimum of \$13.50 for the first five thousand [5,000] gallons of water as metered through the meter placed on the line supplying said property, and \$.50 for each one thousand [1,000] gallons used above the original 5,000 gallons, said fees to be paid to the City of Hart upon those terms and conditions and by those procedures applicable to citizens of the City of Hart, Texas, residing within the corporate limits receiving water from said City water supply.

SECTION VI.

Any other ordinance or part of ordinance heretofore passed by the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, in conflict herewith is hereby repealed and superseded by this ordinance.

SECTION VII.

The invalidity of any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, word or words, shall not invalidate any other part of this ordinance. It is the intent of the City Commission in enacting this ordinance that the provisions are separable and no provision hereof shall become inoperative or invalid by reason of the invalidity of any other provisions.

WHEREAS, an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of the health, safety, and general welfare of the public that requires this ordinance to become effective immediately; therefore, all rules to the contrary requiring three or several readings of said ordinance are hereby waived and this ordinance shall become effective from and after its passage.

PASSED AND APPROVED this 18th day of December, 1978.

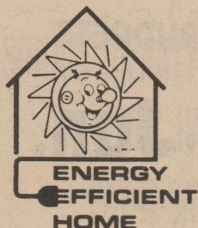

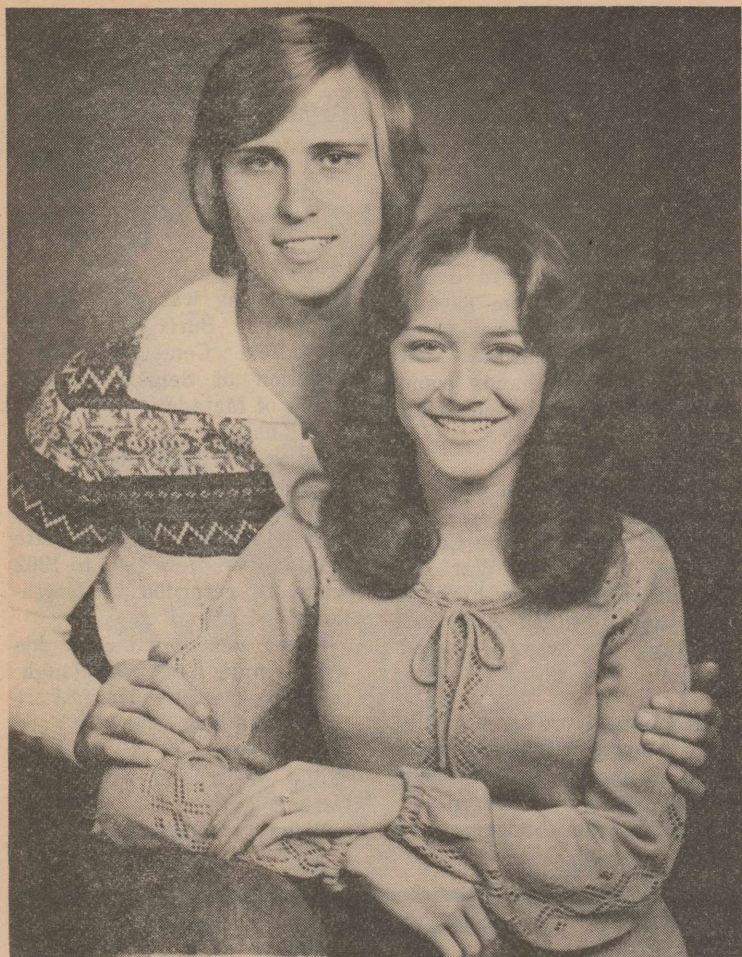

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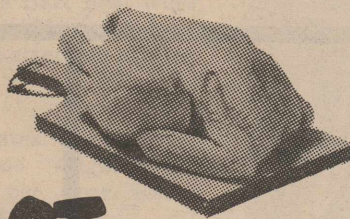
