

Lamesa to Play First Conference Game With Post Friday

Playing their first conference game of the 1936 season, Lamesa meets the Post Antelopes here on McCollum field Friday night. With the scalps of two non-conference teams on their trophy belt the Tornados will try hard to start the trek to the district championship in the coming game.

The Antelopes have also won their starts this year and have a team which played together last year, and although they were not winners in district championship gave a good account of themselves in their last season's play. Their coaches took the squad to Two Draw lake near Post for training last August which gives them an advantage in training which the Tornados did not get.

Local scouts have not seen the Antelopes in action this year, so their methods of attack and their tricks in play will be unknown to the Lamesa squad. Their style of defense is also unknown so the Tornados will be playing them "blind" in this tilt.

Post made two touchdowns against the Olton squad last Friday night, while holding the Buffaloes scoreless. Of course Lamesa did better than that against the Buffaloes, but comparative scores do not count for much in football. At any rate the boys will have to play football, if they expect to defeat the Antelopes.

Tornadoes Eke Out 6 to 0 Win Over Snyder Last Friday

A crowd of several hundred loyal fans braved a steady drizzle last Friday night, and were repaid for their time and discomfort by seeing the Tornadoes save the game in the final minutes of play when Bridgeman went through the Snyder line for the lone touchdown of the game. Attempt to kick goal failed. Only a few minutes remained before the final whistle and the score remained Lamesa 6, Snyder 0.

Starting the game in a drizzling rain Lamesa kicked to the Snyder team and on the first play recovered the ball when a Snyder player fumbled the pass from center. Failing to gain thru the line they were forced to punt. Snyder also punted on second down. After making two first downs Lamesa lost the ball on the five yard line. Snyder punted again and Lamesa got back within the first chalk mark but again lost the ball on downs. Another punt by Snyder was followed by the Lamesa team picking up 12 yards on a pass from Gorden to Jones as the first quarter ended.

The continued rain was holding both teams down on their open plays and passes. Starting the second quarter, the Lamesa team for the third time failed to have the punch to get over the goal line. Snyder seemed to be clicking better and made a first down, but another fumble cost them the ball on the 45 yard line. But Lamesa was forced to kick, and after two tries at the line a Snyder player got loose for a 25 yard gain. Two first downs and Snyder put the ball on the 12 yard line where they lost it on downs as the half ended.

Lamesa chose to kick at the third quarter and after making two first downs, Snyder was forced to punt. In an exchange of punts, Bridgeman kicked one over the Snyder goal line. Snyder could make only 8 yards and attempted punt was partially blocked. Lamesa recovering as the third quarter ended.

The fourth quarter was played entirely in Snyder territory and punting was the feature of the play with the Lamesa boys keeping the Snyder kicker crowded so closely that he could never get off a good kick. This blocking finally gave the Tornadoes the ball on the 13 yard line and a series of line plunges paved the way for Bridgeman to make the lone marker which broke the scoreless tie.

The teams were evenly matched. The passing attack of the Tornadoes clicked better than the Snyder passes, and Bridgeman had the edge on the Snyder punter, but the Snyder line was just a little more than the Tornadoes could easily handle. Lamesa made five first downs and Snyder seven.

Crops Begin To Move As Weather Clears Up

With three full days of real sunshine and prospects for it to continue, we feel that it is safe to release our good weather story which the rain last Thursday ruined. A visit to the gins of Lamesa reminded one of the past seasons with all of them fired up and going at full blast.

An unusual spell of weather for this country, it began raining on September 11 and with the exception of last Wednesday, it rained every day for 17 days, with a total waterfall of about 10 inches.

Things were becoming serious for the farmers of this territory. Feed was beginning to sprout in the head and cotton would have soon rotted on the stalk if the rain had continued longer. However, the damage was slight and the good done the ground by the season of moisture will more than outweigh the damage done, according to several farmers interviewed.

Every available picker was taken to the fields Tuesday morning and they are picking the fleecy staple in a hurry. And if this sunshine continues, there will be many bales of cotton ginned in the country in the coming weeks.

Kayal Begins Work on Addition to Building

Work was begun Monday on an addition to the building owned by R. N. Kayal on the east side of the square, and which is occupied by his dry goods store, The Fair Store.

Increasing business has made it necessary for him to seek additional room, and he had contracted for a twenty foot addition to the rear of his building.

Mr. Kayal came to Lamesa eleven years ago and began business in a modest way in his present location. Through close attention to the business and a practice of giving courteous service and merchandise values he has built an enviable business and now has branch stores in Snyder, Stamford, and Monument, New Mexico.

In addition to this building, Mr. Kayal recently purchased a brick on north side of the square and has some residential property here, having faith in the future of Lamesa and the South Plains.

Todd and Nieman, building caretakers, for a total of forty-two.

The heating systems of the school buildings were placed in operation for the first time Monday morning. The welcomed sunshine soon made their use unnecessary. Ordinarily the steam systems get a rest until well along in October.

WPA to Curtail Projects During Crop Season

Big Spring, Sept. 26.—R. H. McNew, District Director for the Works Progress Administration, announced Saturday that it would be the policy of the W. P. A. to curtail operations or temporarily close down projects as workers find jobs at seasonal work.

This is in line with the Works Progress Administration policy to carry out projects solely for the purpose of providing work for the unemployed, and not because the community needs a road or street, or some other worthwhile project.

The number of workers leaving WPA projects for cotton picking has already materially reduced operations on construction projects in District 18; an even greater reduction is expected as the crop season gets under way.

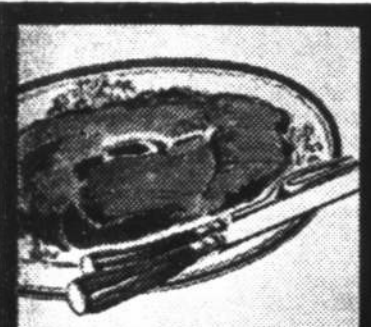

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF
LAMESA, TEXAS, Forbidding the sale,
possession for the purpose of sale, fir-
ing, discharging, igniting, or exploding
of fireworks, within the fire limits of
the City of Lamesa, Texas, describing
and defining such fire limits, and fixing
terms and fixing penalties for violations
of said ordinance.**
**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY
COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF
LAMESA, TEXAS:**

Section 1. The term "fireworks"
shall include firecrackers, Roman
candles, skyrockets, torpedoes, and all
packages containing combustible or ex-
plosive material, save and except am-
munition for firearms.

Section 2. For the purpose of this
act the "fire limits" are and shall be
bounded on the North by the North
boundary line of North Second Street
on the South by the South boundary
line of South Second Street, on the
East by the East Boundary line of
Dallas Street, and on the West by the
West Boundary line of Houston Street,
and shall include all blocks, lots,
streets, alleys and territory within such
boundaries.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful here-
after for any person to sell or to pos-
sess, for the purpose of sale, within
such firelimits, any fireworks.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful here-
after for any person to shoot, fire, dis-
charge, ignite or explode any fireworks
as herein defined, within, on or upon
the fire limits of the City of Lamesa,
Texas, whether the same be done by
means of fire, flame, spark, or im-
pact or contact with another object,
or otherwise.

Section 5. Any person who shall vio-
late any provision of this ordinance
shall be deemed guilty of a misde-
meanor and upon conviction shall be
fined in any sum not less than Five
Dollars nor more than two hundred

dollars, and each shooting, firing, dis-
charging, igniting or exploding any
fireworks shall constitute a separate
offense.

Section 6. In the event any section,
term, provision or part hereof shall be
adjudged or deemed invalid or uncon-
stitutional, this ordinance and all other
terms, sections, provisions and parts
thereof, shall nevertheless be held and
deemed to be in full force and effect
and valid in all other respects.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take
effect and be in full force and effect
on and after its due publication as pre-
scribed by law.

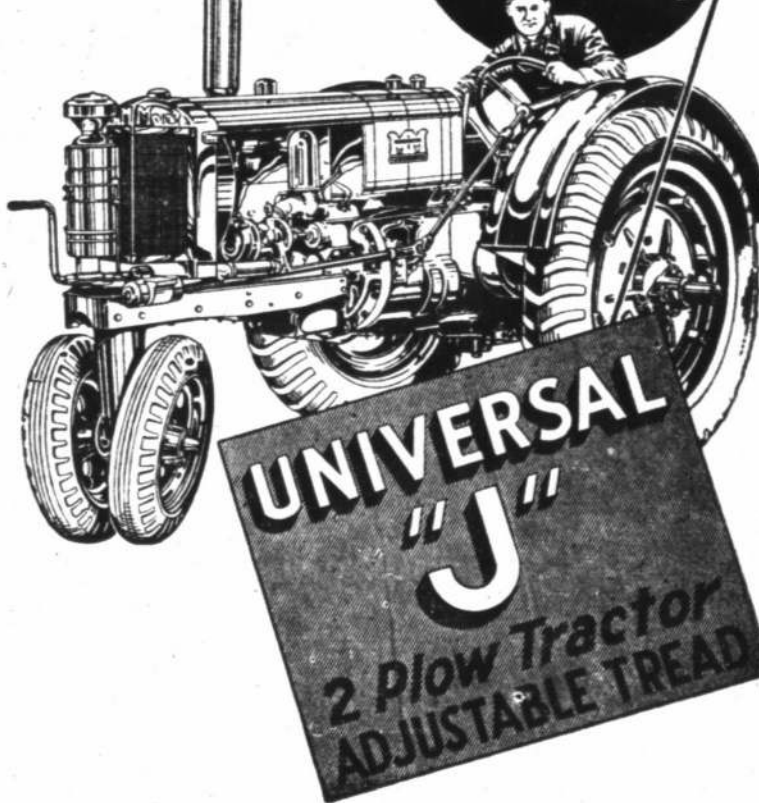

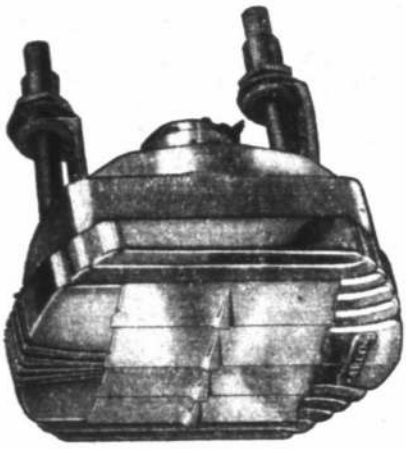

CHEVROLET TRUCK SALES REACH NEW HIGH PEAK

Sales of Chevrolet trucks during the current year have shattered all previous truck records in Chevrolet history. W. E. Fish, commercial car manager, announced this week.

Sales to date since Jan. 1 have totaled more than 25 per cent above those for the same period last year, and more for the corresponding year last than 17 percent above those of the corresponding period in 1929, the all-time record year, he said.

"Truck sales through August," said Mr. Fish, "were 163,675 units, as compared with 130,296 last year through

August, and with 139,387 in 1929. Chevrolet dealers sold more than 20,000 units a month for six consecutive months beginning with March of this year—a feat unparalleled in their history.

"The outlook for truck business continues good. There is every reason to expect a new all time high mark at the end of the current year."

ON TEXAS FARMS AND RANCHES

J. W. Emfinger of Lamb county proposes to have plenty of feed for his dairy cows this winter in the face of scarcity and high prices. He filled one four ton trench silo in August with he-gari, kafir, and corn bundles, and another one in September.

The first trench silo in Bailey county was filled in 1935 on E. L. Smith's farm in the West Camp community. Twenty-four trench silos were filled last fall and 30 more this fall, making a total of 55 now in use in the county.

Nine farmers terraced 1,097 acres of land in Precinct 2, Crosby county, during August. County agricultural agent, R. W. Howe, estimates that the work was done at a cost of 32 cents per acre with the use of the county grader secured by the cooperation of the county commissioner. Howe supervised the terracing of 500 other acres without the use of the county equipment, and reports the cost a little less per acre, but the terraces not quite so good as where the heavy county equipment was used.

Alfalfa demonstrations in Swisher county are planned by three farmers working with county agricultural agent P. C. Colgin. The agricultural conservation program has made many farmers legume-minded, and alfalfa demonstrations will be on the increase wherever this legume can be grown.

ESTIMATES ARE MADE FROM COUNTY PLANNING SURVEYS

College Station, Sept. 28—Farm men and women of Texas from 204 counties who turned in program planning sur-

veys instituted by the Extension Service estimate that if farm practices were adjusted to maintain soil fertility and control erosion that the farm population in the State would not in their judgement increase more than 115,000.

George E. Adams, assistant state agent of the Extension Service and chairman of the committee on program planning, pointed out that these figures are taken from estimates made entirely by those living in the country as farmers and farm homemakers.

Other things brought out in the survey, which has been sent to Washington for compilation with figures from other states in a national report, was that the farm men and women of Texas estimate that there should be a decrease in crop land, especially in cotton and wheat, and a corresponding increase in pastures and grain for feed.

They also estimate that there should be an increase of at least 550,000 head of cattle and 320,000 hogs on Texas farms, partially, at least, for home use. These committees also found that more gardens and orchards were needed to supply vegetables and fruits for home use in Texas.

This county planning activity will go ahead in Texas this year under the supervision of an Extension Service committee consisting of George E. Adams, assistant state agent, Miss Lola Blair, specialist in foods and nutrition, Miss Mildred Horton, vice director and state home demonstration agent, R. W. Snyder, supervisor of specialists' work, S. A. McMillan, economist in farm management and W. E. Morgan, economist.

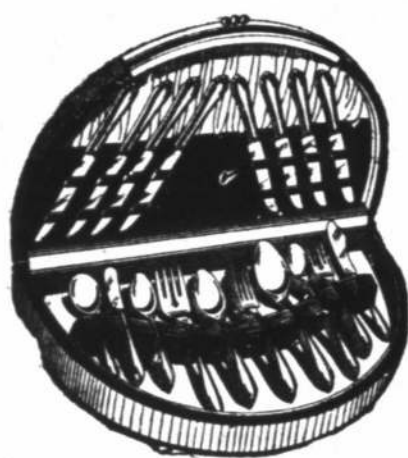

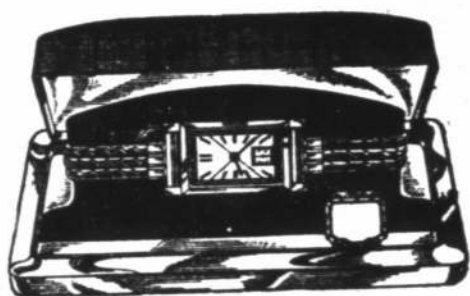

PECTIN TESTS FOR MAKING JELLY EXPLAINED BY AGENT

"How would you make jelly from pure fruit juice?" Mrs. Hohn, member of the Ballard home demonstration club asked the home demonstration agent. "Pectin is the essential jelly making substance found in fruit juice. It is tasteless so one cannot tell its concentration in any juice by this method. There are two tests which the home maker may use to determine the amount of pectin and thereby proportion the sugar correctly. "Pour into a glass one tablespoonful of the fruit juice and add to it the same amount of ragin alcohol (95 per cent pure), mix by turning the glass gently, then pour carefully into another glass. If the pectin precipitates in a solid mass or clot, it is usually safe to add a cupful of sugar to each cup of juice used in making the jelly," the agent reports.

Another test for pectin which is used in some localities but which is not generally considered as satisfactory as the alcohol test is made with Epsom salts in the following manner: Take two tablespoons of cooled fruit juice, two teaspoons of sugar, and one tablespoonful of Epsom salts. Stir the mixture until the salts and the sugar have dissolved, and allow to stand for 20 to 25 minutes. If the mixture forms a solid mass or large flocculent particles the fruit juice fill make a satisfactory jelly with the addition of the sugar in the proportion of three-fourths of a cup of sugar to one cup of juice.

Mrs. Hohn said she would have at least twelve different canned products to exhibit at the county fair.

Following is a short talk given by Mrs. L. B. Stewart of the Sparenberg club:

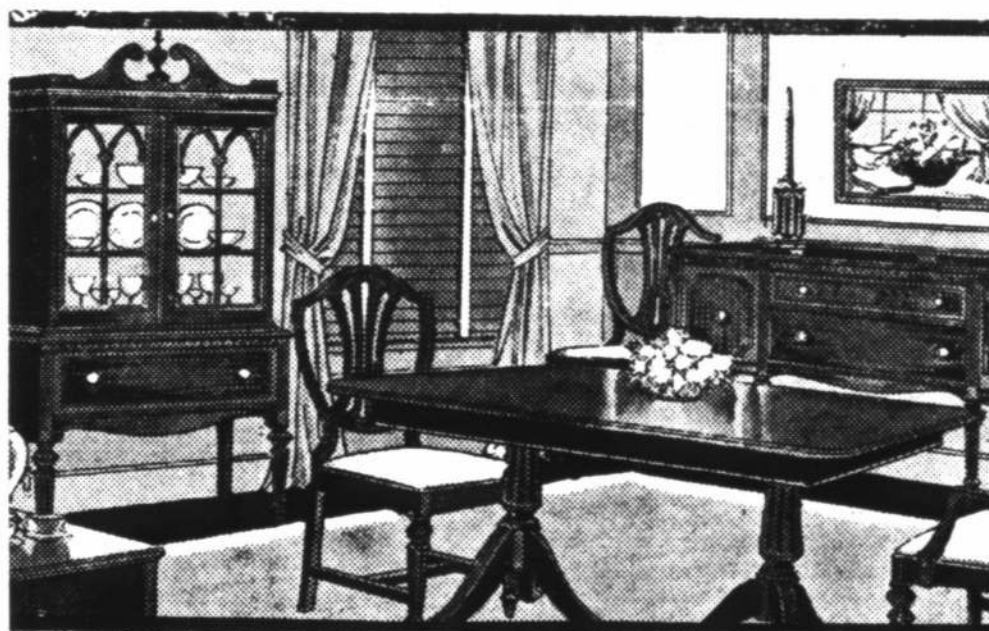

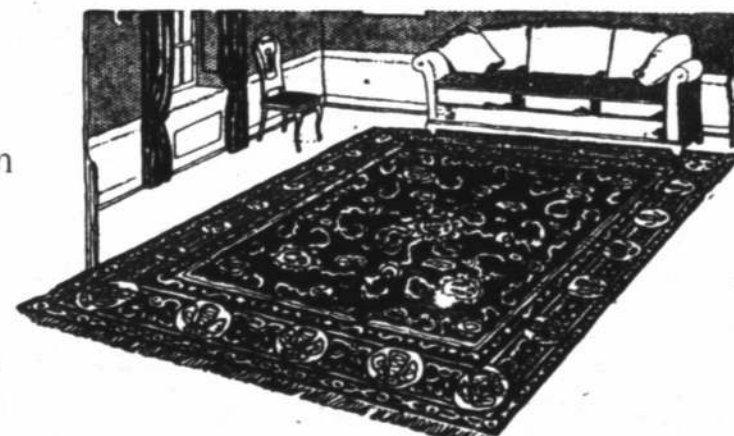

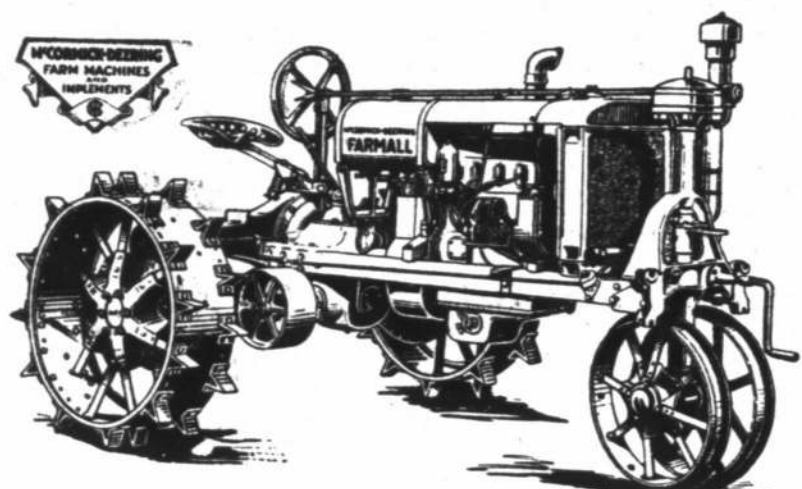
