Major Rhodes returned from active duty in Viet Nam as a pilot with the Army, last month. He was stationed in Viet Nam as a flier for one year.

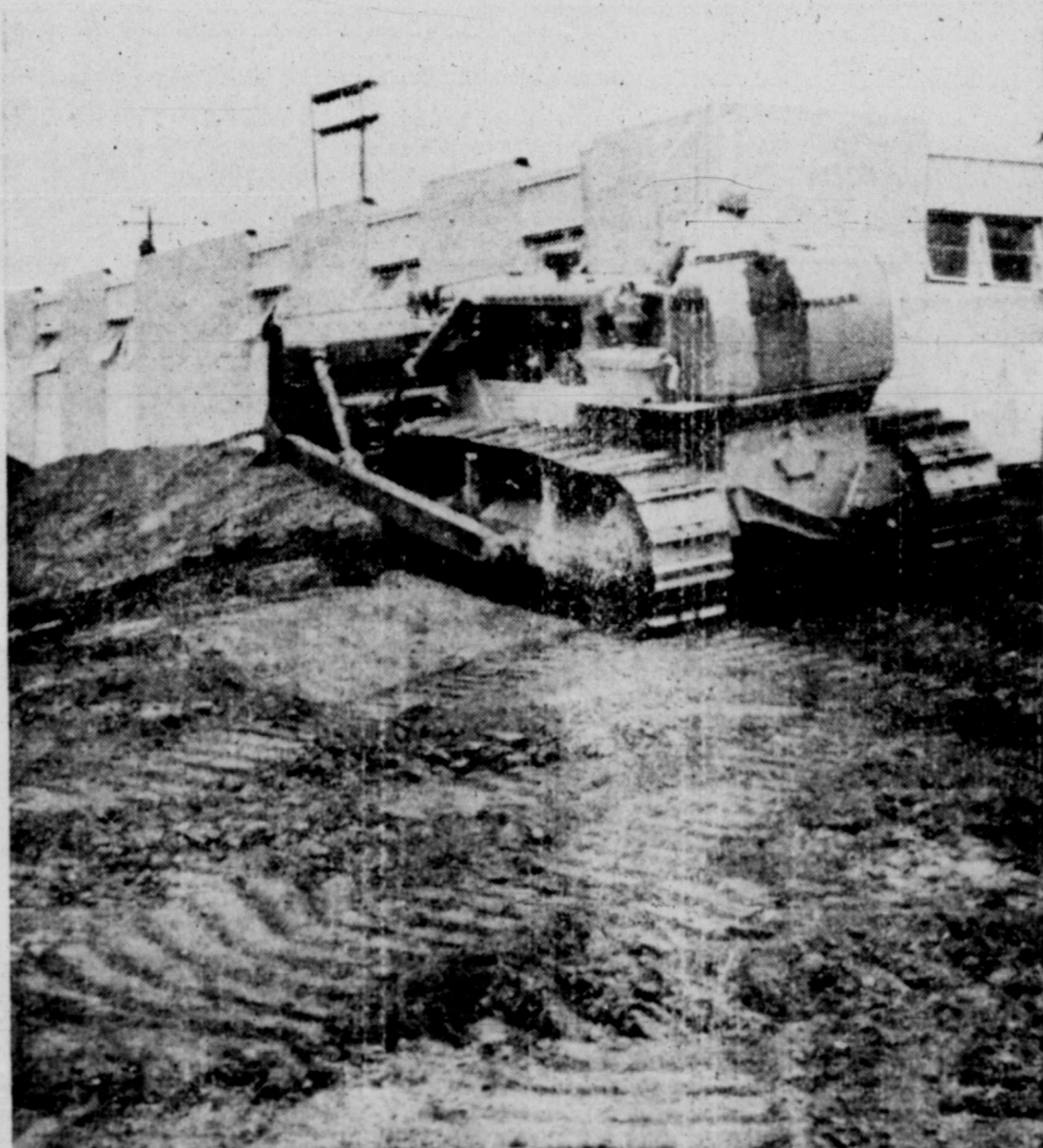
Graduate of Colorado High School with the class of 1950, he attended Texas Technological College for five years before entering military service.

### TEACHERS, AIDES ENROLL

## Workshop Set Locally On Learning Problems

Fifty-seven teachers and 15 aides are expected to enroll Aug. 22 for a five-day course on reading and learning problems.

Heading the list of consultants conducting the course will be Mrs. Winston Gann, a former C-City teacher, now in Abilene Public Schools.

The course is financed through Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Act and is the first of its kind taught locally.

Superintendent of Schools James McMath said the course was designed to better inform the classroom teacher with problems of their students and how to cope with the problems.

Four reading improvement teachers are employed in the local school system to work with students having learning and reading problems and the course is expected to strengthen this program through the increased knowledge of the

classroom teacher. McMath stressed that he hoped this year's program would set a precedent to be continued on a year-to-year basis.

Teachers will receive \$15 per day for attending the program and aides re to be paid \$5 per session according to Earl Cook Jr., Title I program coordinator.

Sessions for the in-service workshop are from 8:30-11:30 a.m. Aug. 22-26.

One of the consultants to take part in the workshop will be a staff member from the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene who will talk on a specific testing program for detecting problems.

Mrs. Gann taught a similar workshop earlier this summer at Hardin Simmons University. Mrs. Austin McCloud, reading improvement teacher at Primary School, attended the HSU session.

### Truman Nix Named Veep By Coaches

Colorado High athletic director and head coach Truman Nix has received one of the highest honors in Texas coaching circles with his election as vice president of the Texas High School Coaches Association.

A longtime member of the association and one of the best known coaches in the state, Nix was voted into the high office by fellow coaches during their annual convention in Houston.

And according to tradition, the new vice president is expected to succeed to the presidency of the organization at their meeting next summer.

Nix has served four years on the board of directors of the organization and worked two years on the all-star selection and nominating committees.

PFC Robert "Tiger" Davis Killed In Action

PFC Robert O. "Tiger" Davis, 20, died of gunshot wounds received during combat operations in Vietnam at 12:06 p.m. Friday.

Davis' death marked the first casualty of the Vietnam Conflict for Colorado City and Mitchell County.

Details about the incident were not available as to the location or type of action the C-City soldier was engaged in at the time of death.

A representative of the Secretary of the Army notified the parents, Mr. and Mrs. George E. "Buster" Davis in their home at 1215 Chestnut. The communique sent from Washington to Midland read—

"Secretary of the Army has requested me to inform you of the death of your son who died as a result of gunshot wounds received on combat operations against a hostile force at the time. The Secretary extends his deepest sympathy to you and your family in your tragic loss."

Davis had been in Vietnam since early this year and was with the 101st Airborne Division.

Place of death was listed only as the Republic of Vietnam.

The soldier entered the United States Army in January of 1965 and received basic training at Fort Polk, La. before going to paratroop school at Fort Benning, Ga.

A 1964 graduate of Colorado High School, he participated in football and track and was in the choral club.

Among the survivors is a brother, George, who is now stationed with the United States Air Force in Thailand. Arrangements were underway for an emergency leave for the airman.

The Army representative who delivered the tragic news in Colorado City said the body would be escorted by a soldier from Vietnam to the local destination.

The body will be flown to Travis AFB, Calif., but time of arrival in Colorado City was still indefinite Saturday.

Survivors in addition to the parents and his brother in Thailand include, Gene of Colorado City, Darrell and Billy, both of Odessa; three sisters, Maynette and Rebecca, both of Colorado City and Mrs. Max Leech of Hobbs, N.M.

Wilson Wyatt Post of Veterans of Foreign Wars is requesting that all flags in the city and county be flown at half mast until after the funeral of the Vietnam casualty.

### More Staff, Maintenance Up Budget

School trustees discussed the proposed budget for Colorado Independent School District Thursday night in a special session.

Public hearings on the proposal are scheduled Monday through Friday before final adoption can be brought through board action.

The 1966-67 budget calls for expenditures of \$978,838.51. This is an increase of \$18,574.51 over last year's budget that totaled \$960,264 according to Superintendent James McMath.

McMath explained the increase in costs of the district by noting that five additional teachers had been hired and additional maintenance expense required through the school building expansion program. On the income side of the budget McMath had the figure of \$1,014,838.52.

Final adoption of the budget is expected following the completion of public hearings this week.

Animals feel, too, of course, and often show fear, hate, affection, joy, hunger, maternal care of their young... even frustration.

But the feeling of compassion is a gift of God to the race of man... made in His own image.

The human heart is big and wide and elastic enough to hold many loves and much compassion. (The Chinese hold that the seat of emotions is the digestive system and could be right, of course. What hurts most when you're grieved or angry or shocked? The stomach, that's what!)

**THE HUMAN HEART** can hold sympathy, understanding, gratitude. But the greatest thing it can ever hold is compassion for a fellow man or woman or child in trouble or sorrow.

And the news on all fronts, most of these, days is enough to make you feel sorry for nearly everybody in the world. War. Murder. Violence. Riots. Bank robberies. Highway crashes. Mass slayings.

The human heart gets twisted sometimes and harbors violence as its dominant feeling. And that is the human tragedy.

The human heart can feel sorry for other human hearts across ten thousand miles, too, and maybe not show it by word or gesture or by putting it in writing.

The real pity of this world of ours is how little we all take the time to heed that commandment "That ye love one another."

Where love is and where compassion is there can be no cruelty in the human heart.

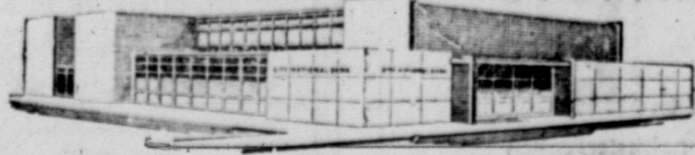

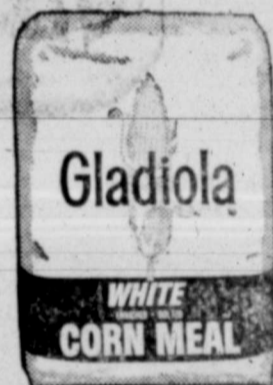
