Export Plan Vote Postponed a Week

(By International News Service)
WASHINGTON, May 4.—A decisive vote on the export de-benture plan has been postponed until next week due to the sudden and unexpected trend of opposition to President Hoover. The revolt spread through the entire insurgent bloc into the ranks of regular republicans and won over nearly solid the democratic side of the senate. The reason for this revolt is said to be caused by Norris' amendment under which the rebate paid farmers under the de-benture plan will be reduced if a surplus of any crop increased from year to year. This will eliminate one of the most serious objections Hoover has to the bill, and administration leaders wish to delay the vote until they are more certain of the outcome, as it is not wished that the president be defeated in his first test with the new congress.

RE-MARRIAGE OF DIVORCED COUPLES IS ON INCREASE

LONDON, May 4.—Re-marriage after divorce is becoming increasingly popular in England. During 1928, an investigation of marriage lists reveals, no fewer than 70 couples in London were re-united in bonds of matrimony after some marital spat caused a rift in the household.
In most cases, the re-marriages take place in registry offices, and very rarely are there any persons but the necessary legal witnesses present. On one or two occasions divorced couples have staged a gala wedding in honor of the re-union, but usually the marriages are extremely quiet affairs.

FORT WAYNE IMBIBER BLAMES VOLSTEAD LAW

League of Nations Adopts Resolution

GENEVA, May 4.—The Franco-American resolution for limiting war materials through publicity of government budgets was adopted today by the League of Nations preparatory to forming a disarmament commission. Twenty-two nations voted for the resolution, China and Soviet Russia voting against it. Germany did not vote.

DRUG DEN FIXED UP
LIKE MOVIE "HOT JOINT"

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 4.—Police here found an alleged opium "den" that was equipped with all the paraphernalia of a motion picture portrayal of a "hop" joint when they arrested two negroes on charges of violating the narcotics law.

To obtain the drugs, the prospective customer was forced to arrange the ace of hearts, the four and the deuce of diamonds in proper order beneath a red-shaded lamp before the critical eyes of the woman attendant, who simulated playing solitaire, according to the police.

The drug fiend, after displaying the proper knowledge, would receive a tiny capsule of cocaine, a playing card and a table knife, police said. Then he would place the white cocaine on a hard surface, separate it into squares with the knife and use the playing card as a tube to aid in inhaling the powder according to the police, who said that the rattling of finger nails against a door panel meant that an addict had shaken off "shadowers" and had come to buy.

Police said they found 43 capsules of narcotics in a secret compartment in an ornamental paper weight, which they were forced to smash because they could not operate the opening mechanism.

Five rooms were furnished with beds where the "dope" victims might sleep off the effects of the drugs. The floors were heavily carpeted to deaden sound and the interior was illuminated only by soft red lamps, according to the raiding officers.

British Woman's
\$100,000 Yacht to
Race in America

LONDON, May 4.—Built at a cost of \$100,000 what is claimed to be the fastest speedboat in the world will be launched within the next few weeks at Cowes, Isle of Wight, for Miss M. B. Carstairs, wealthy English speed-boat and automobile racer.

It is Miss Carstairs' intention to race the craft herself on Lake Michigan in September in a second attempt to wrest the Harmsworth and International Motor Boat trophy from the American holders.

The boat has motors, capable of generating 3000 h. p. and is reported to have a theoretical maximum speed of 140 miles an hour.

In speed-boat racing circles here, it is understood it is highly probable Miss Carstairs will challenge Commodore Gar Wood, the famous U. S. speed-boat designer and racer, for the world's championship, and make further attempts to break the world's speed record at Miami, Florida, which Segrave failed to do with his Miss England.

Miss Carstairs' boat will have its first trials in the early summer on Lake Windermere or the Solent. It has taken six months to build, and is the triumph of a woman's ambition to be the "Segrave of the Water."

When in Detroit last year for her ill-starred attempt to recapture the Harmsworth Trophy, Miss Carstairs was approached by a Canadian motorboat engineer, who guaranteed to design a boat that would travel at well over 100 miles an hour.

Miss Carstairs accepted the proposition, and a small shipyard at Cowes was selected. Ten shipwrights were engaged and sworn to secrecy.

The hull of the boat is understood to be 39 feet in length, with a beam of 9 feet. Three of the latest type Napier engines of maximum power of 3000 h. p. are being fitted in line, running most of the length of the boat, and the drive will be taken through a gearbox to two shafts and propellers.

In shape the hull is like a high-powered naval gun shell with an exaggerated bulge towards the razor-like bow, and tapering off in its lines to the stern. It has a one-step hydroplane bottom. There is said not to be a nail of any kind in the hull, which looks to fragile to support the weight of the engines.

The outer hull is of mahogany inside this is a special waterproofed silk, and then another lay-

er of thin mahogany, the whole sewn together with a specially tough alloy, giving a flexibility of hull hitherto unheard of, it is claimed.

The boat is reported to have an "enormous and peculiar rudder."

Senior examinations will be held on May 8 and 9 and the announcement of all those who will graduate will be made on Saturday afternoon at 5 o'clock.

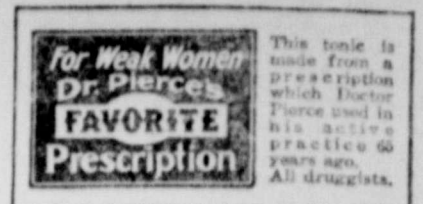
Other examinations will begin next Monday morning and will take most of next week to be completed.

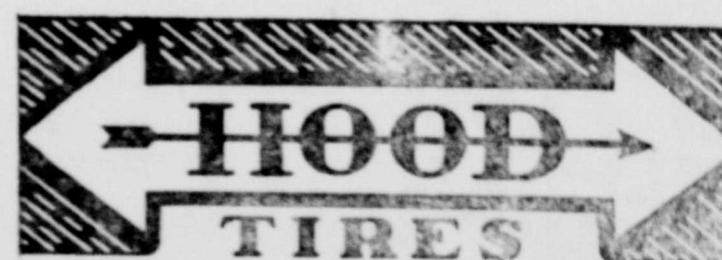

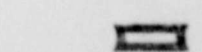

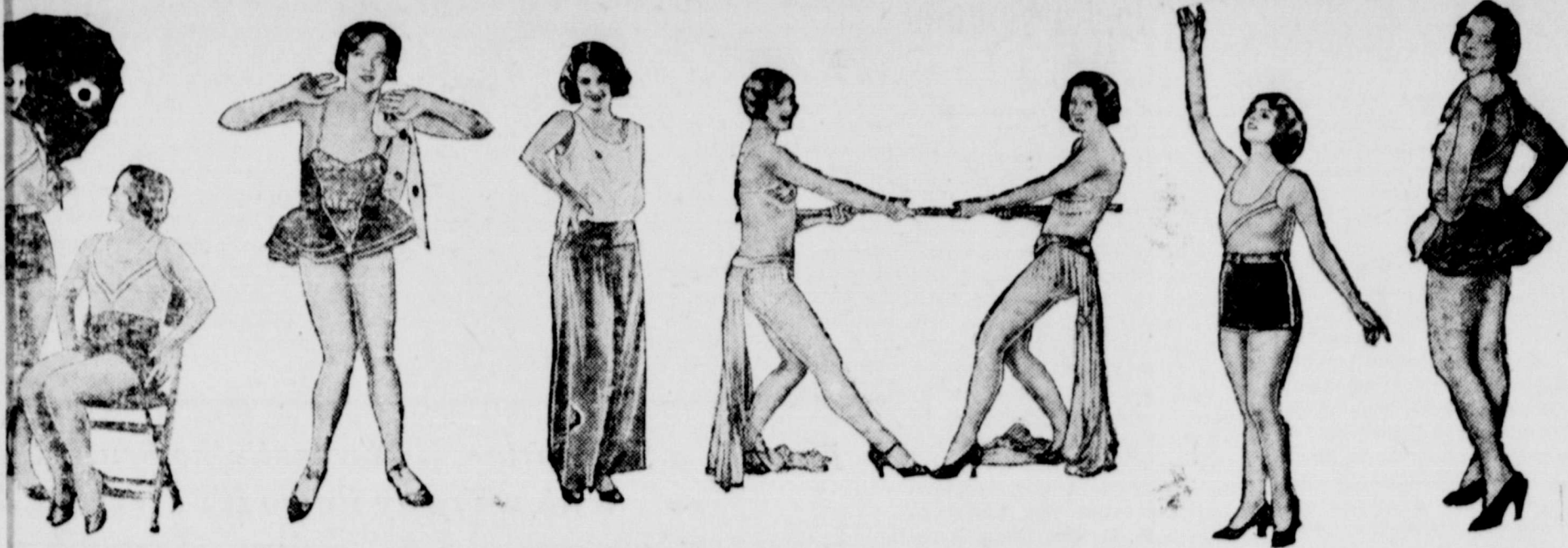

In a lengthy "nomination speech" in the form of a telegram to Mrs. Edith Munger, president of the Michigan Audubon Society, Ford set forth the song sparrow as "our earliest singer in spring and our latest in fall, a well behaved, clean nesting bird and worthy to represent our state in the pantheon of birds."

Ford, who was one of the authors of the federal migratory birds law and who is a promoter of bird-house building for school children, recalled his first acquaintanceship with his "candidate."

"The earliest event I remember is that of my father taking my 15-month-old brother in his arms while my mother and I followed on foot to see a song sparrow's nest under a log near our home. I was three years and nine months old at the time."

Ford stated however that it was not only on the grounds of sentimentality that he favored the song sparrow but also because of its accomplishments, character and economic usefulness.

LONDON, May 4.—A Diesel yacht costing \$720,000 is being built for Sir Richard Cooper, famous British yachtsman, to the design of Cox and Stevens, naval architects, of New York.

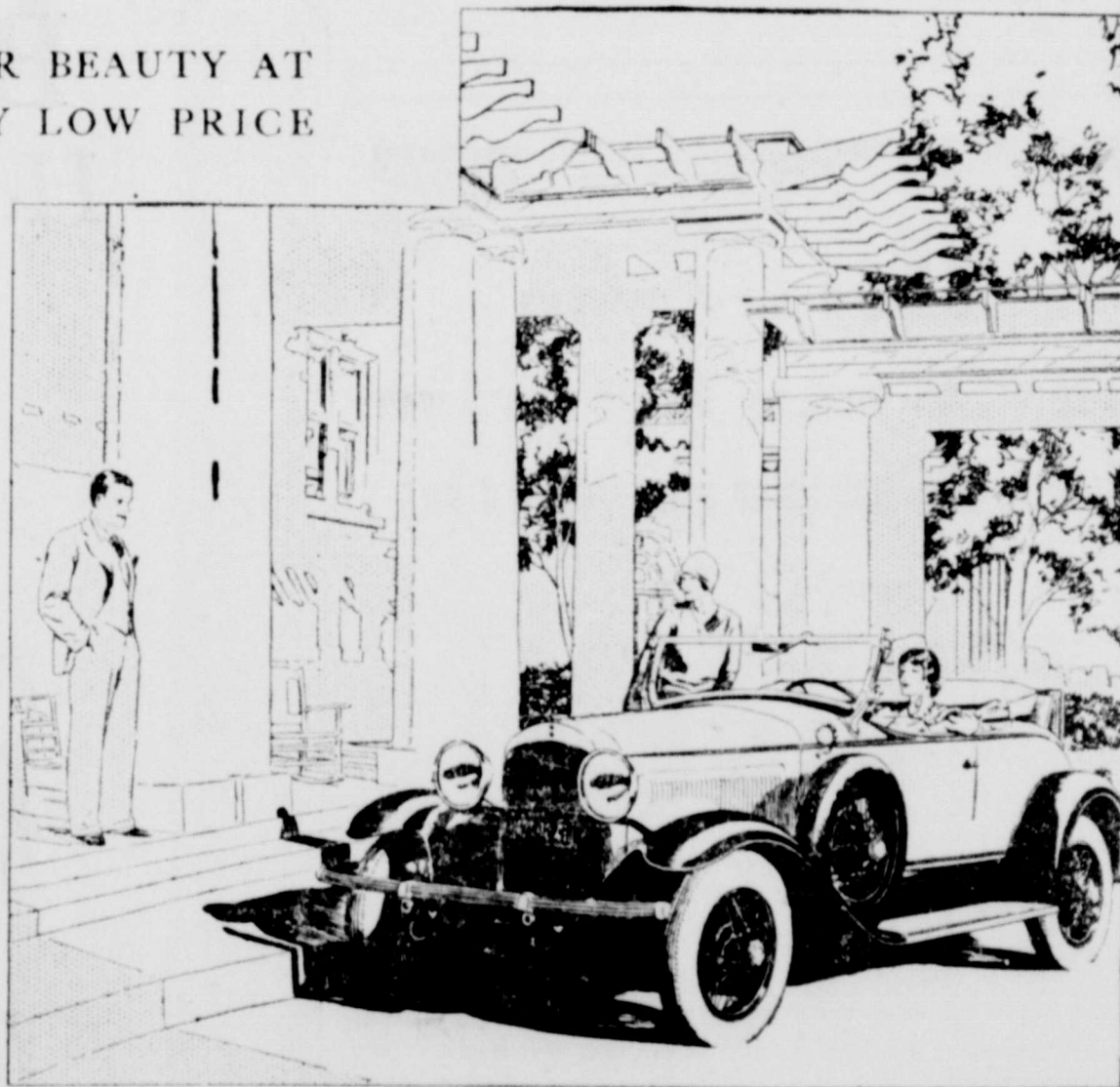

Radio--the Fourth R--is Added To the Little Red School House

NEW YORK, May 4.—Reading, 'Riting, 'Rithmetic and Radio— from now on there are four R's and the biggest of these is radio.

The most elaborate radio educational program system to date is being installed in the new high schools at White Plains, N. Y., Greensboro, N. C., and Schenectady, N. Y. Prof. N. L. Engelhardt, of the Education Administration department, Teacher's College, told International News Service today.

There will be radio connection in each class room, as much a part of the room as the fixtures. There will be a central radio set feeding the classroom loudspeakers and three programs will be available throughout the day.

"The introduction of radio into the school instruction tends to eliminate the isolation of schools from the workaday world," said Professor Engelhardt.

"They will now teach children in terms of everyday life instead of in remote academic terms. It will bring the parents and children together, giving them a common interest in being both radio-minded."

Professor Engelhardt pointed out the ways the radio could be used as an auxiliary arm of education. He said that public speaking classes could tune in on addresses of important public officials; the social hygiene classes would pick up lectures by state health officers, drawing classes would turn the dial to art talks. Classes in French or other languages could study pronunciation by listening in on various programs in foreign languages; home economics classes would hear subjects relating to this topic.

Professor Engelhardt further pointed out the elasticity of the radio in education, the new system permitting groups of children interested in aviation or some other subject absent from the curricula to tune in on a treatment of that subject on the radio.

F. C. Blom, who is assisting Professor Engelhardt with research work in connection with the subject, said that radio as a tool to aid instruction is in use in some form in schools of Oakland, Calif., Birmingham, Detroit, Chicago, Rochester, Atlanta, Cleveland, Buffalo, New York and other cities.

"One of the biggest troubles in the past has been to get the schools and the broadcasters together," said Blom. "From a commercial standpoint, it is reasonable to expect that the large chain broadcasters will look with favor upon the educational programs for schools because these programs

would be given during those hours of the day when the traffic for stations is very low.

"However, the large national broadcasting stations are not the only sources from which educational programs can be obtained. Nearly every section of the United States has at least one good local commercial station and there also are stations operated by large universities and colleges.

"Extensive broadcasting is done by some of the state schools like Kansas State Agricultural College, Iowa State College of Agriculture, South Dakota State College and Ohio State University.

"These already include in their programs material suitable to supplement the work of elementary and secondary schools. The published program of the Kansas State Agricultural College indicates that daily programs of 25 minutes are intended for rural schools. The programs include music, instructional talks and calisthenics.

Connecticut and Ohio state departments of education have used broadcasting in carrying out their work. Recently, Governor Graves of Alabama, announced that radio would be used in expanding the state's educational program.

"In Fort Bend county, Texas, the county school board recently placed in operation its own broadcasting plan serving 36 rural schools.

"THE WODA Free Grammar and High School of the Air at Patterson, N. J., gives radio courses in English composition, grammar, algebra, arithmetic, general science, social science, anthropology, history, agriculture, nature study, drawing and home economics."

Eskimo History To be Read in Alaska Mounds

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 4.—

The University of Pennsylvania will make excavations of the unusual mounds of Eskimo origin near Point Barrow, Alaska, as soon as weather condition permit possibly some time in June. It was announced at the museum here.

The expedition, it is hoped, will throw more light on the early history and culture of the Eskimos. The work will be carried on by Eskimos under the direction of Alfred H. Hopson, an Alaskan who has been selected for the task.

The first group of mounds which will be excavated was found in 1918 when W. B. Van Valin, a research worker of anthropology, was engaged in collecting specimens and conducting researches in the neighborhood of Point Barrow for the university museum.

It was supposed they were of natural origin until one of Van Valin's helpers discovered human bones protruding from one of a group of six mounds situated near the settlement of Utkiavik, about eight miles from Barrow.

Excavation then revealed that each of the mounds contained a structure resembling a house. These houses varied greatly in shape and ranged in size from 10 by 15 feet to 45 by 18 feet. All were built of driftwood, with walls from two to three feet high, and ceilings of logs.

A thick covering of sod had been placed over the roofs and the walls and the skylight which had been cut into each roof was covered with seal or walrus entrails.

Within the structures were found the remains of 83 persons, ranging in age from infancy to senility, and in no instance could any evidence of violent death be found.

With few exceptions the bodies lay on beds on the earthen floor, these beds being composed principally

of moss and ground willow covered with robes of brown bear, polar bear and musk ox. The body of one child was lying on two sled runners of a very ancient type.

Beside each body, male or female, lay the implements and possessions of daily life, including wooden drinking cups, baleen vessels containing small pieces of seal flippers and blubber, and a three-pronged fish-spear.

"It was at first believed the 'houses' were part of an Eskimo settlement whose inhabitants had perished in their beds as a result of starvation, cold and epidemic of disease, or poison. The orderly manner in which the bodies had been placed and the apparent grouping of the personal belongings

of the dead, however, later led scientists to conclude that the structures were intended for charnel houses," Dr. J. A. Mason, curator of the museum stated.

Discovery of such a large collection of skeleton material under such conditions constituted a most important find, but no immediate effort to carry on further research work was made by the museum at that time. Late last year, however, the skeletal material was examined by Dr. Alex Hedlicks, of the National Museum at Washington, who reached the conclusion that the bodies found resemble those of the present Eskimo of southern Greenland and Labrador, and differ therefore from the West Coast Eskimo.

Further examination by archaeologists from the museum also revealed the objects found with bodies to be typical of a prehistoric Eskimo culture, scientifically called the "Thule culture" which had been very well established in the central Arctic regions not so well in Alaska.

The V-4, in addition to being the largest of our under water boats, with a length of 381 feet and a surface displacement of 2,680 tons, also holds the record for deep diving. In a recent test she forced her way downward to a depth of 318 feet below the surface. Ordinary under water cruising is at least half this depth.

Despite all the factors that might be expected to prevent or disturb re-

ception, housed within a steel shell filled with complex machinery, largely electric driven, the sets aboard the V-4, the submarine's officers state, bring in programs from distant shore stations with the same clarity and volume that would be obtained were they in the average home or apartment.

When running submerged, with water above and machinery whirling on every side, volume and clarity remain apparently unaffected. Even Davy Jones, the V-4's officers say, if he had an Atwater Kent set in his locker, could get National Broadcasting Company programs in the deepest recesses of his ocean retreat.

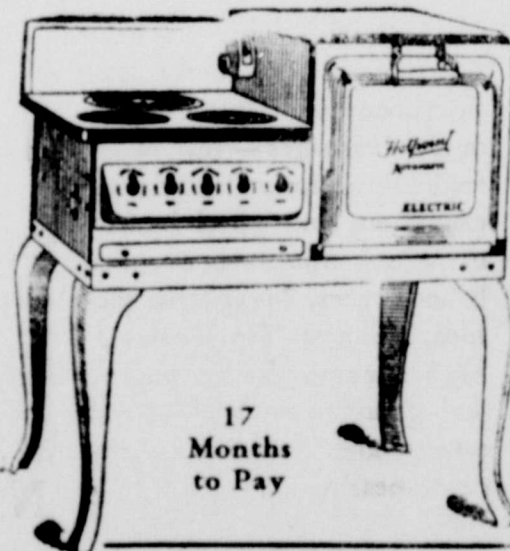

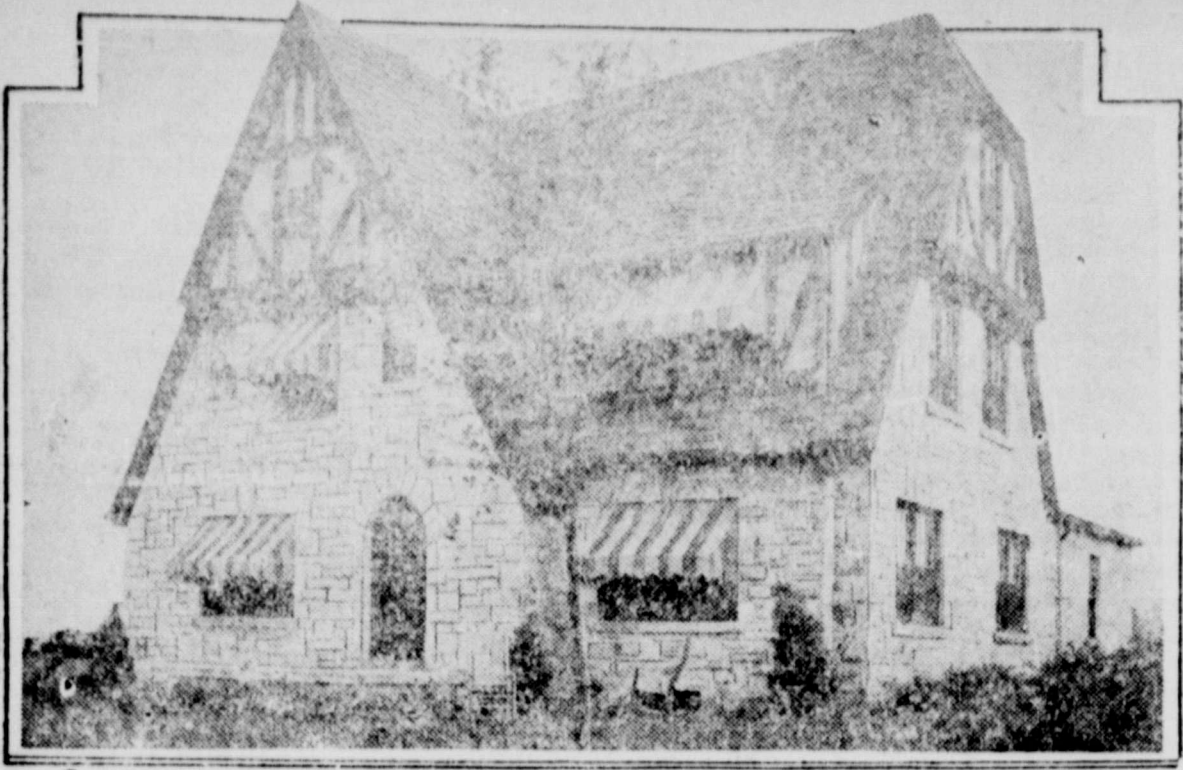

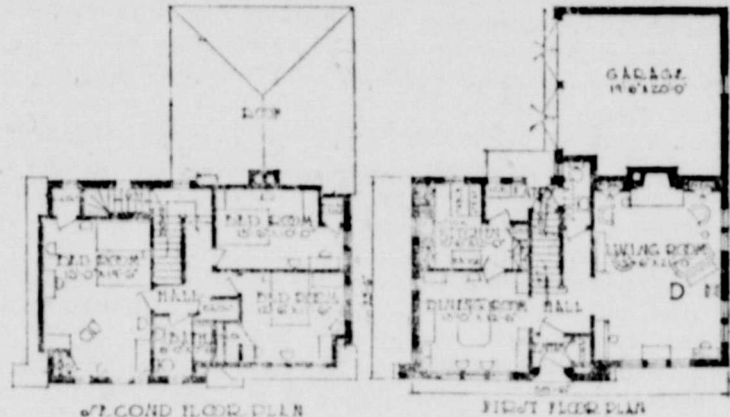

Peking's Glory Declining Fast Since Uprising

NEW YORK, May 4.—The imperial city of Peking is on the wane and is rapidly becoming of less importance in the national life of China. Once the heart of China, Peking is rapidly becoming a skeleton of the old Peking, as it was then known, where imperial families ruled for thousands of years. With the removal of the capital to Nanking on the Yangtze River, Peking is fast assuming the general aspect of a museum. The streets where the gaiety of a capital city once held sway are now desolate. The exotic buildings, the brain children of famous Oriental architects, are untenanted and the splendor of the Forbidden City, veiled to the eyes of foreigners, is now seldom viewed by even the Chinese.

This is the picture brought back from China by Professor Edward S. Corwin, of Princeton University, upon his return here from a lecture tour in China. He spent four and a half months on a traveling fellowship sponsored by the Carnegie Foundation.

Like the downfall of Rome, military aggrandizement began the fall of Peking. Almost three decades ago the Boxer Rebellion brought the intervention of foreign troops and the upheaval of the imperial government. Chaos then reigned in the land of Confucius. Bandit leaders throughout the country organized "armies" and took on the title of "general."

Away from the confusion of the north, discontented radicals in Canton—adherents of Sun Yat-sen—formed the Kuomintang party, placed Chiang Kai-shek, brilliant young military leader, at the head of its army, and revolted against the northern government.

With the removal of the government to the city at the foot of Socony Hill, where only a year before foreigners were outraged and killed by warring Chinese troops, the glamor of Peking went too.

Foreigners murmured in protest

at the prospect of residing in a dingy city bordering on the mud-flats of the Yangtze while the natives of Peking were momentarily stunned by the thought. That the capital would be taken away from Peking, where it had been for countless years, was unthinkable to the tradition-steeped Chinese.

As a result Peking is fast losing its cosmopolitan aspect and the constant stream of camel trains entering the city from the Gobi Desert and beyond the Great Wall give the lie to the magnificent edi-

fices erected there during the reign of the glorious empire.

Gone is the gaiety of the Legation Quarter. Its successor at Nanking is strictly business-like. All China has felt the change. Only in the inaccessible districts of the interior are the encroachments of western civilization not felt.

Mexico Soldier Marksmanship Much Improved

NOGALES, Sonora, Mexico, May 4.—Traditionally inaccurate, the marksmanship of the Mexican soldier has nevertheless improved considerably within the past few years.

It is jestingly said—perhaps not without exaggeration—that the safest position on a battlefield in Mexico is squarely in front of the enemy's rifles and that men are usually killed by accident, rarely on purpose.

During the engagement at Naco, Sonora, during the recent revolution only about 25 attacking rebels out of an army of more than 3000 were killed, while the entrenched federals lost no more than five men. This, despite the fact that the battle raged from sunup until late afternoon.

In the siege of Mazatlan, one of the fiercest engagements of the revolution, involving some 7000 troops, the most liberal estimate of casualties placed the dead at two hundred on both sides.

Only in the decisive operations on the Jimenez, Chihuahua, front did the estimated casualties total approximate figures of battle in portions of the world where more modern methods of warfare prevail. And, at that, subsequent developments proved both federal and rebel statistical claims to be fantastically exaggerated.

Observers on the firing line at Naco, when the rebel General Faust to Topete sent his columns into a determined push against the pow-

erful federal fortifications, stated that there appeared to be greater danger from federal bullets at a distance of 2000 yards than at 500 yards. This is explained by the entrenched soldiers' disinclination to lift their heads above the breastworks in order to take aim.

Despite this incompetency with firearms, however, old-timers along the Mexican border aver that the Mexican soldier of today is a much better marksman and a much better soldier, for that matter, than his predecessor of 10 or 15 years ago.

In those days, it is related, two opposing divisions would fire at each other all day without drawing a single drop of blood.

The marked improvements in Mexican soldiery is attributed to the fact that, within the past decade, military and political leaders have concentrated on building up an army, modeled after that of the United States and European nations. Systematic importation and manufacture of arms and ammunition has tended to modernize the available means of warfare, while under the powerful impetus of such men as the late Alvaro Obregon, a heretofore unknown discipline has been introduced into the ranks. Pay for the Mexican soldier has been raised to a more attractive level, while the quality of provisions and clothing has been measurably improved.

Border old-timers say that the present rebel forces are better equipped and training than the insurgent armies of any previous revolution. The rebel armies, it must be remembered, are compos-

ed mainly of members of the regular army who deserted their government to follow the revolutionary leaders in mutiny.

First Roundup Held at Rowena

The first summer round-up work to be held in Rannels county was held Friday at Rowena. Twenty-eight infants and children of pre-school age were present for the examinations which were held by Dr. J. J. Schiller and Dr. C. W. Cheatnam, assisted by the county health nurse, Miss Addie Alexander.

The Rowena Parent-Teachers Association was among the first in the county to sign up for the work of staging the summer round-up work and are the first to finish the examination of small children.

This work will be carried on by Parent-Teachers Associations over the county until all children of pre-school age have been examined.

In many places over the county it seems that this summer round-up is not understood. Since the starting in Rannels county of the health work all the children in schools of the county have been inspected and a record made of their defects and recommendations made as to how these defects might be corrected. The summer round-up work is exactly the same only with the pre-school children or children who will enter school this fall. These children are examined and a record made of their defects. If their eyesight is bad, they are underweight or any other ailment is noted, recommendations are made to their parents as to how these defects can be corrected and the child start to school in the fall in perfect physical condition.

Miss Alexander will leave Monday for Amarillo to attend the state meeting of health nurses. She will have a part on the program there and will be away from Ballinger the greater part of next week.
