JAKE HAMON DIES OF PISTOL SHOT

ARDMORE, Okla., Nov. 26.—Jake Hamon, Republican national committeeman from Oklahoma, died at eight-fifteen o'clock this morning from a pistol wound received last Sunday night, when, according to Frank Ketch, his business manager, he was wounded by the accidental discharge of a pistol Hamon was cleaning.

Since the accident, the officers have been sweeping the country, looking for a woman who is alleged to have been in Hamon's room at a local hotel when he was shot.

Jake Hamon came into prominence when he associated himself with Mr. Ringling, the circus magnate, and when he became actively engaged in the development of Texas oil fields and railroad building. He and his associates built a railroad in the Eastland-Ranger oil district. He recently visited Ranger and in an address before the chamber of commerce of that city, criticized the citizens and officials severely for the immoral condition of Ranger. He was reported to be worth about thirty million dollars in dollars and cents.

ARDMORE, Okla., Nov. 26.—With the death of Jake Hamon, Carter county authorities are today redoubling their efforts to locate Clara Smith Ringling, charged with assault and intent to kill, in connection with the shooting of Hamon at a local hotel last Sunday night. County Attorney Brown reiterated the belief that Miss Ringling had not left the county but was staying in a nearby town. A warrant for her arrest has been placed in the hands of the sheriff of Carter county.

After the death of Hamon this morning, Frank Ketch issued the following statement: "Jake Hamon died at eight-thirty this morning from the effects of a gunshot wound accidentally self-inflicted. The funeral services will be held at Ardmore Monday afternoon at two o'clock and burial will be made here at the request of Mrs. Hamon."



DR. PHILLIPS DIES ON THANKSGIVING

The remains of Dr. R. T. Phillips will be shipped from this place to his childhood home in Missouri Monday afternoon, and laid to rest in the Phillipsburg cemetery. Dr. B. A. Hodges, of Temple, and Rev. R. R. Rives, of Brownwood, will arrive here Monday at noon to conduct the funeral services which will be held at the Eighth Street Presbyterian church at two o'clock that afternoon, and the funeral procession will move from the church to the train.

In holding the remains here until Monday afternoon, Mrs. Phillips, wife of the deceased, is complying with a rule strictly observed by Dr. Phillips during his lifetime not to travel on Sunday. The destination could not be reached before Sunday.

Dr. Phillips passed quietly away at the Presbyterian manse on Eighth Street at eight-thirty Thanksgiving night, 1920, after an illness extending over a period of more than four months. He died peacefully as through one going to sleep, and a short time before his death, when his wife asked him if God should see fit to take him how it would be, he said, "everything is as clear as crystal and as bright as a sunbeam."

Deceased bore more than four months of illness without a murmur of complaint, often expressing only the regret that he could not preach and be about his Master's business. Dr. Phillips was stricken down with fever the last of July, the first illness to amount to anything during more than forty years in the ministry. After suffering with fever for about three months, and after the fever broke, pneumonia developed. For a time physicians successfully combatted the pneumonia, only to have heart trouble to take its place, and the day before he died pneumonia again developed. The wonderful vitality and strong will power carried deceased through the long siege.

Dr. Phillips was born sixty-six years ago on a farm near Phillipsburg, Mo., a town named for his father. His father was born in New Hampshire, and was twenty-one years old when Texas entered her struggle with Mexico. He came to Texas and entered the war against Mexico, and was wounded. After the war he turned his face towards his home in the New England state, but stopped in Missouri, where he married a Methodist minister's daughter, established his home and raised a family. Dr. Phillips was a member of that family.

At the age of sixteen, when a mere lad, Dr. Phillips was converted and immediately accepted a call to the ministry. He began at once to prepare himself for the work, and in 1878 he was educated at Morrisville College, Morrisville, Mo., and ordained to preach the same year. Later he took a theological course at Lebanon, Tenn., and a short time afterwards the D. D. degree was conferred upon him. He came direct from the seminary to Texas and established a Cumberland Presbyterian church at Tyler, and served the church there for nine years as pastor. His pastoral work covered a period of forty-one years and was spent at Tyler, Texas; Moberly, Mo.; Ennis, Texas; Corsicana, Texas; Ft. Smith, Ark.; Springdale, Ark.; and at Ballinger, where he had been one year.

He loved to do home missionary work, and while he served the above churches as regular pastor, he answered many calls to represent his church in its various activities, serving on important boards and committees, and was Moderator of the Texas Synod when the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A., were united. His regular work was as pastor and he refused to accept places in church work where he could have received a

FOUNDER OF SINN HOBBY LEAVES FEIN ARRESTED

DUBLIN, Ireland, Nov. 26.—Sir Arthur Griffith, founder of the Sinn Fein organization, and Prof. John MacNeill, a Sinn Fein member of parliament for the city of Londonderry, together with a number of other prominent Sinn Feiners, were arrested today by the auxiliary police.

LONDON, Nov. 26.—The Irish office here in reporting the arrest of Sir Arthur Griffith, in Dublin this morning, said that no formal charge had yet been preferred against him, and that Griffith had been taken to a place not yet made public.

ROME, Nov. 26.—Pope Benedict received a protest today, couched in the strongest terms, from the Irish Episcopal clergy, headed by Cardinal Logue, primate of Ireland, against the ferocious and bloody attacks made by the British police and troops on defenseless citizens in Ireland.

NEW METHODIST PASTOR ARRIVES

Rev. C. E. Simpson, pastor of the Methodist church, arrived with his family Wednesday, and they are now comfortably located in the Methodist parsonage on Tenth Street. Rev. Simpson comes to Ballinger from Weatherford, and succeeds Rev. J. B. Curry here. He will preach Sunday morning and evening at the Methodist church.

GOV. HOBBY LEAVES FOR MEXICO

AUSTIN, Nov. 26.—Lieut. Governor W. A. Johnson arrived in Austin today to assume the duties as chief executive of the state, when Gov. Hobby enters Mexico some time tomorrow afternoon, according to present plans.

Gov. Hobby, accompanied by his personal staff, is scheduled to leave Austin tonight for Mexico City, to be present at the inauguration of Gen. Alvaro Obregon as president of the new Mexican government. Gen. Obregon has notified Governor General Trevino, appointed to receive the Texas delegation when they cross the international line at Laredo, to accompany them to Mexico City. Gov. Elect Pat Neff is also scheduled to attend the inauguration, but he is going to Mexico City with another party of Texans.

RAILWAY WOULD QUIT OPERATION

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—The Interstate Commerce Commission has ordered a hearing at Marshall, Texas, before Examiner Howell on December 15th, on application from the Marshall & East Texas Railroad Co. for permission to abandon their line of road in Upshur and Harrison counties.

WATERSWAYS TO GET LARGE SUM

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—Harbor and waterways improvements and maintenances will require an appropriation of more than seventy-eight million dollars for the fiscal year 1921, according to estimates of Major General Beach, chief of United States army engineers, in his annual report.

Gen. Beach recommended in his report the adoption of the harbors bill, carrying a total appropriation of fifty-seven million dollars to be supplemented by the sundry civil items aggregating nearly eleven million dollars for continuing contracts and other items to be included in other money bills. His recommendations will be incorporated in the annual estimates submitted to Congress on December 6th.

The recommendations include appropriations for the Southern districts, including Pass Cavallo to Aransas Pass, \$27,000; Aransas Pass to Corpus Christi, \$180,750; Freeport, \$222,000; Port Aransas, \$300,000; Harbor of Sabine Pass and Port Arthur canal, \$175,000; and the Sabine-Neches canal, \$135,000.

WEST TEXAS COUNTIES IN FT. WORTH DRY DISTRICT

FT. WORTH, Nov. 26.—Forty-nine West Texas counties have been attached to the Fort Worth "prohibition district," and enforcement officers with headquarters here will prosecute most vigorously the enforcement of the Federal amendment in these counties.

much higher salary than the pastorates paid him.

Thirty-nine years ago Dr. Phillips and Miss Elizabeth Montgomery were married, following a courtship which started in school where they were schoolmates for three years and a half. Two sons were born to them, both dying in infancy.

Deceased was well known among the Presbyterian ministry throughout Texas and in other states, and those who knew him best knew that no preacher was truer to the cause and more devoted to his work than Dr. Phillips. He was always in the thick of the fight for the right. Most of his work during the forty years was in Texas, and Dr. Hodges, the preacher who will conduct the funeral services, was converted under his preaching, and it was Dr. Phillips' request that Dr. Hodges preach the funeral sermon.

Since he became ill Dr. and Mrs. Phillips have received letters of sympathy from churches where he served as pastor for many years. The Corsicana church session passed an order expressing sympathy and love, and an Elder from that congregation came here to see them.

Dr. Phillips had served the local church one year. He came to Ballinger on Nov. 21, one year ago, and the local church had be-

gun to thrive under his ministry, and plans for a greater work were being arranged when he was stricken down. The church and citizenship as a whole had just begun to appreciate him when he was called away to receive his reward, and the religious interest of Ballinger and the citizenship as a whole has lost a friend.

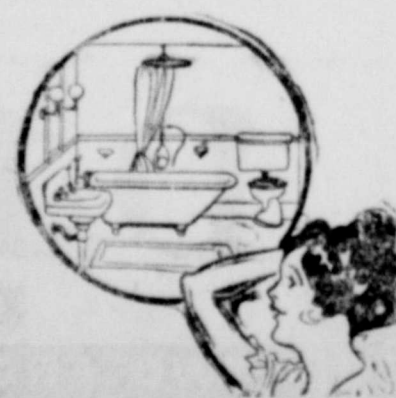
