**Platform of Republican Con-**  
**vention. Adopted at Dallas**  
**on the 20th Day of August,**  
**1873.**  
We, the Republicans of Texas,  
this 20th day of August, 1873, make  
the following declaration of principles.  
**Resolved, 1.** That we reaffirm our  
devotion to the principles enun-  
ciated in the National Republican  
Platform, and to the wise and just  
administration of President Grant.  
**2.** We are earnestly in favor of  
the establishment and maintenance  
of a system of Public Free Schools,  
such as is imperatively required by  
article IX of our State constitution,  
and of such improvements as expe-  
rience has shown to be desirable,  
and we strongly condemn the prac-  
tical abolition by the 13th Legisla-  
ture of the system that was in  
operation.  
**3.** We are in favor of the enact-  
ment of such laws by the Legisla-  
ture as will give full and ample  
protection to every citizen in the  
State, in the enjoyment of all his  
rights as a citizen.  
**4.** We are opposed to special  
legislation favoring that general  
law which may be framed which can  
obviate the necessity of special,  
which would be more just, and less  
apt to be enacted from corrupt mo-  
tives.  
**5.** We are in favor of a judicious  
State aid to Immigration, such as  
is contemplated by Article XI of  
our Constitution.  
**6.** We desire to be taxed for  
public purposes only, and that tax-  
ation should be imposed at equal  
and uniform rates upon property;  
very little, if any, to be put upon  
occupations. While we desire to  
have our State Government admin-  
istered with real economy, avoiding  
aided parsimony and extravagance,  
and we wish our public debt paid  
according to its terms, we are op-  
posed to the creation of any new  
public debt and we are forcibly  
opposed to repudiation in any form.  
**7.** The speedy development of  
the varied resources of our State  
we regard with favor and to this  
end do pledge ourselves to extend  
every reasonable facility and aid  
towards the establishment of an  
equalized and judicious railroad  
system for the State. That the  
success of railroad building in Tex-  
as, materially depends upon carry-  
ing out in good faith our obligations  
heretofore made whereby capitalists  
have been and may be induced to  
invest in our midst.  
**8.** We declare ourselves opposed  
to the enactment of any public law  
that may operate unequally upon  
citizens, on account of their race,  
nativity or belief, and that we are  
in favor of the largest amount of  
personal liberty consistent with the  
security of our people in the enjoy-  
ment of life and property.  
**9.** We respectfully as the Na-  
tional Government to dismount,  
disarm and put upon severely gried  
Reservations, the savage tribes  
that continually ravage our fron-  
tier.  
**10.** Again we ask our General  
Government to relieve such of our  
citizens as are under political dis-  
abilities, and to improve the harbors  
on our coasts, as the National inter-  
ests require. We trust the present  
Congress of the United States, will  
not permit itself to be prejudiced  
against our people, so as to treat  
them with injustice or illiberality,  
because the members of Congress  
dishonorably voted themselves, and  
took back pay, which they should  
be made to disgorge.  
**11.** We are in favor of short  
sessions of the Legislature. We  
desire to have our public printing  
law repealed, and the public print-  
ing let on contract to the lowest  
bidder who can do it as required.  
**12.** We express our strong dis-  
approbation of the bad acts and  
worse omissions of the 13th Legisla-  
ture, and condemn its useless ex-  
penditures of public money, chiefly  
upon itself, its indiscriminate squan-  
dering of the public domain to a  
large extent upon purely specula-  
tive and worthless corporations,  
and the unjust, discriminating legis-  
lating, in favor of the rich and  
against the poor. While we can-  
not take the time and space to enu-  
merate its misdeeds, we cannot for-  
bear to denounce its unscrupulous  
efforts to make honest men subject  
to sale under execution. At the  
same time we congratulate our-  
selves, and the people of this State  
that its oppressive "Landlord and  
Tenant Bill" was vetoed by the  
Governor.  
**13.** We trust that from this time  
forward the people will take steps  
to relieve themselves from the risk  
of vicious legislation, by electing  
Sensators and Representatives, as  
well as all other State officers, on  
account of their character and  
qualifications.  
**14.** We heartily commend to the  
consideration of the people the res-  
olutions adopted by the German  
Convention of this State, held at  
Austin on the 7th and 8th of Au-  
gust, 1873.

**Religious Items.**  
The Bishop of London has is-  
sued a pastoral letter to the Wes-  
leyan Methodists, in which he pro-  
poses a conference to the return of  
that body to the Established  
Church. He thinks the separation  
has lasted too long already, and if  
it continues, will widen more and  
more, to the great hindrance of the  
spread of the Gospel.  
There are six divisions of Metho-  
dists in North Carolina, known as  
the M. E. Church, the M. E. Church  
South, the Colored Methodist  
Church, the African Methodist  
Protestant. During the war an-  
other Methodist organization was  
formed, and as a title of distinction  
they are known as No-Handle  
Methodists.  
The Methodist Church in this  
country increased at the rate of  
two church edifices each day of the  
year.  
At Belfast, Maine, many of the  
Second Adventists have laid aside  
their ordinary avocations in the  
daily expectations of the second  
coming of our Lord.  
A Concord, New Hampshire,  
woman preacher is reported to  
have brought about a wonderful  
Second Advent revival at Colo-  
brook.  
It is said that the Presbyterian  
Church now building in Columbus,  
Indiana, will be, when completed,  
the finest in that part of the State.  
Rev. Joseph A. Russell, an Epis-  
copal minister has become Superin-  
tendent of Schools in Corning, Iowa,  
and also acts as Missionary of the  
Diocese.  
Dr. Withrow, of Philadelphia, is  
offered a salary of six thousand dol-  
lars per annum and a parsonage by  
the Second Presbyterian Church in  
Indianapolis.  
The Roman Catholics have grown  
with great rapidity in the city of  
Brooklyn. They now have thirty-  
three churches, besides a magnifi-  
cent Cathedral in process of erec-  
tion.  
Four Brooklyn churches—the  
First Presbyterian, the Church of  
the Pilgrims (Congregational) and  
two Reformed churches—met to-  
gether and hold union services dur-  
ing the vacation.  
Mr. Spurgeon's preachings have  
greatly impaired his health within  
the last ten years. Prior to that  
preaching was as easy to him as  
singing to a bird. Now every Sun-  
day's effort costs him forty-eight  
pains.  
Dr. Abraham Jarger, the Jewish  
Rabbi, who espoused the Christian  
faith in Mobile not long since, has  
been preaching in Chicago, New  
York, Newark, and other places,  
with acceptance. He proposes to  
labor as a missionary among his  
own countrymen.  
The Church Times, the organ of  
the High Church party in England,  
says of the Ultra-law Church party,  
that they never read or think, that  
they neither work nor pray, but  
scoff; and that the Broad Church  
party pray and work even less than  
the others.  
There are 358 church edifices in  
the city of New York, or one church  
to every 2,293 persons; but as 58  
per cent. of the population of any  
city are in a condition to attend  
church on any given Sunday, there  
are but 1,600 to each church, that  
all may be accommodated.

A Baltimore Fisherman's En-  
counter with a Shark.  
(From the Baltimore American, July 29.)  
Yesterday morning while a party  
of fishermen were hauling a seine in  
Chester River, just saw a number  
of monstrous fish in the seine, and  
at once started towards the shore  
to secure them. On reaching the  
land they encountered so much sea-  
weed that they could not land the  
net, and as the water where they  
were was only about waist deep, two  
of the party, James Green and  
James McCann, both of this city,  
jumped overboard and began tak-  
ing up the seine, while the rest of  
the party pulled it into the jawl.  
Nearly one-half of the seine had  
been taken in when suddenly the  
water was lashed to a foam by  
what seemed to be a school of mon-  
strous fish. The men grew excited,  
and Green waded out several yards  
for the purpose of holding the net  
down to the bottom. Just as he  
took hold of it his left leg was seized  
by a shark and he was dragged  
under the water, and a terrible  
struggle ensued between the man  
and the shark. Green's compani-  
ons were so frightened that they  
stood still for some time and gazed  
with horror at the terrible scene.  
In a few moments Green came to  
the surface and uttered a cry for help.  
This roused his friends, and they  
went to his assistance, when the  
shark retreated further into the  
depths of the seine. Green was ta-  
ken into the boat insensible, and  
remained so for some time. The  
shark had caught the calf of his  
left leg and completely stripped the  
flesh down to his foot. He was  
bleeding profusely from several of  
the larger arteries that had been  
severed. Mr. McCann knew enough  
about surgery to bind a handker-  
chief tight around the mangled limb,  
and prevented his bleeding to death.  
The wounded man was brought to  
the city about noon, and removed to  
the Infirmary at Green and Lombard  
streets, where his leg was ampu-  
tated. He is an unmarried man,  
thirty years old, and lived on Wil-  
liam street, a few doors west of  
Charles. It seems that the fishing  
party had surrounded a number of  
sharks, as there were more than  
one of the savage creatures in the  
net. The fishermen succeeded in kill-  
ing two of them, the largest of  
which was eleven feet in length.
