HOUSE TO VOTE ON ROBISON TODAY FLAMES DESTROY SCOGGINS DAIRY

EXPLOSION OF STOVE CAUSE; MAN IS HURT

LOSS IS ESTIMATED AT \$3,000; DAIRY STOCK ARE SAVED

The frame barn of Scoggins Dairy, two miles north of Lubbock was destroyed by fire early this afternoon, and Joe Stewart, employee, sustained a badly burned left hand, resulting explosion of a gas stove at 1:00 o'clock.

Loss resulting from the fire is estimated at \$3,000, which is covered by insurance.

A considerable amount of feed, office and all dairy equipment were consumed by the flames. The barn was a structure measuring about 100 by 40 feet.

No dairy cattle were in the building when the fire occurred.

Mr. Stewart, who was working in the building at the time of the explosion, suffered the burns while trying to fight the flames.

MEXICO WILL HOLD MASSES

FIRST PUBLIC MASSES IN 3 YEARS TO BE HELD FRIDAY

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO CITY, June 27.—The first public masses in almost three years will be said in Mexican churches tomorrow. The first service will be at the church of Nuestra Señora de la Guadalupe, the national shrine, while three others would be given back in other capital city altars.

Archbishop Pascual Diaz announced that eleven churches, including that of "Our Lady of the Guadalupe," had been returned to the priests yesterday, while three others would be given back to them today. The priests taking charge have registered according to law.

Bells To Be Pealed

The church bells will be pealed for tomorrow's masses, sounding a joyful note where on July 31, 1926, the tolling carried foreboding to Mexican Roman Catholics.

The promptness with which the government went about turning back the churches to the priests after last Friday's settlement made it possible to move the time for the first mass up one day. Originally, it had been planned to have it Saturday, the feast of Saint Peter and Saint Paul.

Amarillo Arrests May Aid Solutions

Arrest of three men in Amarillo late Wednesday, who are alleged to have had possession of property identified as some which was stolen here, is expected to lead to solution of a series of burglaries committed here during recent months.

Chief of Police John Lemond left Lubbock today to make an investigation of the matter.

Although city police officials refused to make announcement as to the recovered property, it is believed here that many of the stolen items were included in loots obtained through burglaries of several homes in this city.

DOCTORS ADOPT EASY PAYMENTS

CHICAGO, June 27 (P).—The installment plan has been invoked by the Chicago Medical society for the benefit of those who are sick and unable to make prompt payment.

The new financial arrangement is called "the modern medical budget plan," and its purpose is to finance worthy sick persons on a cost basis, the patient to make repayment in weekly or monthly installments over a period commensurate with his ability to pay.

Dr. James H. Hutton, president-elect of the society, said the plan "simply adapts to the sick the modern method of financing employed by the automobile, the radio and other industries, and enables the family of moderate means to arrange for medical or hospital care on a time-payment plan."

IOWA SENATOR SAYS OFFICE HOLDERS MUST DONATE

(By Associated Press)
SAN ANTONIO, June 27.—While federal officeholders might not be asked to contribute to \$100,000 fund being raised by the republican organization in Texas, that campaign is a good reminder to them to donate, Senator Smith W. Brookhart, Iowa, chairman of the Senate Patrons committee, said today while introducing a witness in the Texas patronage investigation.

Eugene Nolte, Seguin, state executive chairman had denied that officeholders were asked to contribute, and declared that the \$100,000 was being raised only for maintenance of the state republics organization.

Controls Conventions?
"The principal business of that organization is to control the delegations to national conventions?" Senator Brookhart asked.

"It is not," Nolte replied.

"And then to control patronage?" "No, sir."

"I have been unable to discover any other state in which either party is now campaigning for funds, and if you know of any I would appreciate it if you would tell me of them," Senator Brookhart said. "Your campaign is a good suggestion to officeholders whose terms are about to end that they should contribute."

Don't Intend It

"We don't intend such a suggestion."

FOREST FIRE IS ON IN COLORADO

DENVER, Colo., June 27 (P).—Timber in the National forest and in the heavily timbered region at the head waters of the Blue river, near Breckenridge, were being uncontrolled today. A half dozen other fires of less importance were reported in various sections of the state.

More than 200 men were battling the Roubt forest fire, in the northwestern corner of the state. A high wind swept the flames hundreds of feet in the air and threatened the entire forest.

AIR RECORDS ARE GOALS OF WORLD FLIERS

ENDURANCE, NON-STOP AND TRANS-OCEANIC FLIGHTS ON

Endurance, non-stop, cross-country and trans-oceanic flights were the center of interest in aviation today as air activities in these various phases held the attention of the world in a least a half-dozen different points over the globe.

In the United States, Martin Jensen with his young wife aboard is soaring above Roosevelt Field, N. Y., in the monoplane "Three Musketeers" in his third attempt to break the refueling endurance record while on an 80 mile course between Minneapolis, Hastings and Northfield, Thorward Johnson and Owen Haugland are approaching the 100 hour mark in the air in their plane, "Miss Minneapolis."

Hawks Takes Off

Captain Frank Hawks took off from New York at 5:15 today on an attempt to set three air records, for the round trip to Los Angeles and back, for the east-west to Los Angeles and to the west-east to New York.

Captain Charles Kingsford Smith and his three companions took off from Sydney, Western Australia, in "The Southern Cross" for Singapore in an attempt to set a record for a flight to India.

Search Goes On

In the meantime, scores of ships and airplanes are still scanning the sea between Spain and the Azores and near the Azores in search of the missing Spanish aviators who disappeared in an attempted hop to the United States.

Captain Albin Ahrenberg, Swedish flier, who is attempting a trans-Atlantic flight to the United States in his plane, "Sevigne," returned to Reykjavik, Iceland, after attempting a take-off during the day to Livigt, Greenland.

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., June 27 (P).—With his wife at his side, Martin Jensen in the monoplane "Three Musketeers" today was making his third attempt at a refueling endurance record.

He took off at 7:32 o'clock last night. He must remain in the air one hour longer than the record of 172 hours, 22 minutes and one second.

Pioneer Plainsman's Body Is Moved

(By Associated Press)
BORGER, June 27.—Fifty-four years ago today a wind-bitten plainsman, who, with 87 comrades, had been besieged for two days by a band of 700 Indians, drew a careful bead on his long-barreled buffalo gun and toppled a bronzed warrior upon a cap rock 1,300 yards away.

The remarkable accuracy of Billy Dixon on that day broke the spirit of the attacking aborigines and, in all probability, saved the lives of the little band

of buffalo hunters. Medicine men had assured the Indians they were immune from white men's bullets, but Dixon's marksmanship shattered the illusion.

Ceremonies Mark Deed
Today, at the famous Adobe Walls fortress, 25 miles from here, impressive ceremonies will mark the interment of Dixon at the site of his noted achievement. The body of the great Indian fighter, who died in 1913 and was buried at Texline, was disinterred yesterday and escorted here by Boy Scouts of the local Adobe Walls camp. His tomb, situated within the adobe obliterated walls of the old fortress, is expected to become a shrine for West Texans.

HOUSE VOTES TO STAND PAT ON FINANCES

DEADLOCK SEEN OVER APPROPRIATIONS FOR SCHOOLS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 27.—The House of Representatives voted to stand firm behind its conferees considering differences between the House and Senate on the Educational bill, instructing members of the conference committee to stand pat in their demand that the Senate reduce the total of its bill to \$16,500,000. The senate was holding out for \$17,000,000. The original bills called for approximately \$21,000,000 for the Senate and \$16,000,000 for House.

Representative John F. Wallace, chairman of the house appropriations committee, declared that even should the house agree to \$16,500,000 that amount would bring the total of all appropriations to \$750,000 more than the available revenue of the state for the next two years.

He stated that the revenue as estimated by the Comptroller would aggregate \$44,725,986, and that the legislature had already agreed to appropriations of \$34,037,921, leaving a margin of \$10,688,065.

Representative George Kemble of Fort Worth wanted to instruct the committee to hold to a maximum of \$14,750,000, but the \$16,500,000 figure carried, 80 to 52.

FAMILY TROUBLE ENDS IN DEATHS

McALESTER, Okla., June 27 (P).—Two men were dead today at a mining camp near Hartsboro as the result of a shooting which authorities said was the climax of a triangle problem. Bud McMullen, 30, died three hours after killing Earl Brown, 24, and turning the gun on himself.

Dr. C. M. Pearce, county physician, said the shooting was the outcome of a fight between McMullen and Brown. The shooting occurred at the home of Brown's father soon after Brown was released from the Latimer county jail where he had served on a liquor charge. Each man is survived by a widow and one child.

City Commissioners In Session Today

The semi-monthly session of the Lubbock city commission opened this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, and the commissioners will likely be concerned with matters which will require the full afternoon, according to early indications.

Approval of bills and discussion of present city projects will probably be chief items before the group.

Zimmerley Plans Cross-Nation Hop

MARSHALL, Mo., June 27 (P).—Barney Zimmerley, claimant of the American altitude record for light airplanes, will hop off from here tomorrow for Brownsville, Tex., from where he expects to begin an attempted non-stop flight to Winnipeg, Canada.

Zimmerley plans to begin the non-stop flight with 98 gallons of gasoline and five gallons of oil.

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif., June 27 (P).—May McAvoy, film star and Maurice J. Cleary, Los Angeles banker, were married yesterday in the Church of the Good Shepherd here.

Two Children Are Drowned Near Waco

WACO, June 27 (P).—George Dworsky, 13, and his sister, Helen Dworsky, 11, were drowned in the waters of Cottonwood creek, near West, late yesterday when the girl fell into the swimming pool and the brother, who could not swim, attempted to rescue her.

J. L. Dworsky, father of the pair, barely escaped. Although he could not swim a stroke, he went in after the two children and was taken out, almost unconscious, by Louis Gast, 20, who also rescued the bodies of the children.

Get A Fan

KANSAS CITY, June 27 (P).—Farmer Percy Smith, brought a truck load of hogs to town yesterday and was arrested for speeding. "Forty-five miles an hour," the arresting patrolman told the judge. "The hogs got hot packed in like that, and I was driving that way to keep them cool," Farmer Smith explained. "Get a fan," said the judge, "You are fined \$25."

A married woman reported that a negro last night entered her home where she and her three children were sleeping. She was awakened by the negro stroking her arms. When she screamed the negro fled. The attempt was the second of its kind in two days.

IMPEACHMENT HEARING TO BE CLOSED WITH ARGUMENT BETWEEN ATTORNEYS TODAY

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 27.—Six hours of oratory, to be divided between five attorneys, was begun today in the house of Representatives prior to taking a vote on whether charges of impeachment shall be preferred against J. T. Robison, commissioner of the general land office.

It will be late today before a vote can be reached, since Robert B. Allen, sr., of Dallas, attorney for proponents, did not begin the opening address until 11 a. m.

Each Has 3 Hours

C. T. Freeman of Sherman, will close for the proponents. Each side will have three hours. E. F. Smith of Austin, will open for Mr. Robison. He will be followed by former Senator Lloyd Price of Fort Worth and Dayton Moses of Fort Worth will close for the land commission.

After the attorneys have discussed the testimony, members will be privileged to debate his innocence or guilt.

Allen Says Robison Should Be Indicted

AUSTIN, June 27 (P).—Not only should J. T. Robison, commissioner of the general land office, be impeached and removed from office for "high crime and misdemeanors," but he should be indicted and tried for a felony, Robert A. Allen, sr., of Dallas, attorney for proponents of the house, argued today.

"If you give him a clean bill of health and whitewash him in the face of this record you will create a stain in the nostrils of the people of Texas and ultimately destroy this government," the attorney argued.

Reading court decisions to show the interpretation of "high crimes and misdemeanors" as "meaning no more than grave official misconduct" he said the proponents had not only proved this in "many, many instances," but that he had also violated the felony laws.

"If we were district attorney he would be indicted and tried for felony."

AIR MERGER IS PROPOSED

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, June 27.—Creation of the largest aviation company in the world through merger of Wright and Curtiss interests was proposed to stockholders today.

Directors of the companies have approved plans for the formations of a \$70,000,000 holding corporation to be known as the Curtiss-Wright Corporation. It will take over, by an exchange of stock, the Wright Aeronautical Corporation and the Curtiss Aeroplane and Engine company and 10 affiliated organizations.

The new company will bring under one head the concerns founded by America's air pioneers, the Wright Brothers and Glenn Curtiss.

Clement M. Keys, president of Curtiss, will be president of the holding company and Richard E. Hoyt, chairman of the board of Wright Aeronautical, will be chairman of the Curtiss-Wright Corporation. In addition to the Curtiss and Wright Corporations, the companies to be taken over are: Keystone Aircraft Corporation of Bristol, Pa.; Curtiss-Robertson Airplane Manufacturing company of St. Louis; Curtiss Airports Corporation; Curtiss Flying Service, Inc.; Curtiss Aeroplane Export Corporation; Curtiss-Caproni Corporation; New York Air Terminal, Inc.; and New York and Suburban Air Lines.

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BROWNWOOD BOY DIES IN CRASH

TUSOOLA, June 27 (P)—Hubert P. Parker, 26, Brownwood, was killed when the car in which he and two other men were riding to Abilene overturned at a sharp corner of Highway 77, 3 miles east of here, Wednesday.

J. D. Holt and I. B. Burns, his companions, escaped with minor injuries.

Parker's neck was broken. He is survived by his wife and parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Parker, Brownwood.

Student Nurse Gets Slight Injury Here

While riding on the fender of a light roadster automobile, Miss Mary Collins, student nurse in the Lubbock sanitarium, sustained a dislocated foot and numerous minor bruises and injuries about 9 o'clock last night when the car on which she was riding collided with another at the intersection of Broadway and Avenue M.

The roadster, said to have been driven by Will Thornton, also included Misses Inez White and Marie Gwyn as passengers. None of the others were hurt.

Seventy Jailed For Pro Law Violation

MEMPHIS, Tenn., June 27 (P)—More than 70 persons were in jail here today because federal prohibition agents have determined to "raise the price of liquor in Memphis to the national level."

Forty-two agents started out yesterday with thick sheafs of warrants sworn out by under cover agents, and by nightfall all the jails in the city were crowded.

SOLDIERS KILLED IN ERROR

MEXICO CITY, June 27 (P)—Fifteen federal soldiers were killed and an officer and fifteen others wounded on Sunday when a federal aviator bombed by mistake a group of federal soldiers at Barranca Tamara, state of Jalisco. He was under the impression they were rebels.

Dispatches to Excelsior today said the secretary of war has ordered an immediate and thorough investigation.

LOCAL GRAIN MEN SAY NO OUTLET HERE

BOWER'S PROTEIN SALE PLEA CANNOT BE MADE HERE

Replying to an inquiry by the Daily Journal, Lubbock grain dealers, who have purchased about 125,000 bushels of this season's wheat say that wheat is not purchased locally on protein basis, due to increasingly high protein value of wheat in the northwest, created by dry weather in that section. In other words, they say there is not the normal outlet for protein wheat, and that wheat marketed in Texas at protein premiums was sold to special mills demanding high protein value.

Prof. H. J. Bower, of Texas Technological college, advocated through a letter to Al Hill, editor of the South Plains Farmer, the sale of wheat in Lubbock on protein

content the same as the farmer sells his milk and cream on butter-fat basis.

He includes in his letter clippings from state papers showing that premiums are being paid on wheat in other sections.

Average Not High
"The average wheat marketed in Lubbock this season has not rated high enough in protein value to command a premium," is the explanation of George M. Roach, who says further, "unless it is some isolated portion we know nothing about. Wheat marketed here has tested about 12 per cent protein, and premium is offered on none testing less than 13 percent. A premium of one cent per bushel is offered on 13 per cent protein wheat." One article referred to by Professor Bower was clipped from the Amarillo News and relates sale of a load of wheat at Friona, where a premium of 12 cents was paid to Brown brothers, who farm north of that town. "Wheat, which was in fine condition, was taken to the Santa Fe Grain company elevator where it tested 61 1-2 pounds, and the growers received \$1 per bushel which was a premium of 12 cents over the regular price of 88 cents," the article read. "I wonder why there is a premium of 12 cents per bushel?" Professor Bower asked in his letter.

VIRGINIA G. O. P. ATTACKS DEMOS

RICHMOND, Va., June 27 (AP)—Excoriating the democratic party for what he termed "flagrant abuses of political power and inringencies upon the rights and liberties of the people," Henry W. Anderson, of Richmond, in his keynote address to the Virginia republican convention last night called for the removal from power of those guilty "of its abuses" as the only remedy.

"The remedy for the situation lies, not through changes in the structure of government, but in the spirit," Anderson said. "This can only be affected by the complete removal from power of those guilty of its abuses, by the restoration of popular government in spirit and in fact. We must not only smash the machine, we must also smash the spirit which makes the machine possible in Virginia."

The speaker denounced the democratic party for alleged waste and inefficiency in state and county government and for alleged failure to carry out campaign promises.

on the first day of the battle. They were mowed down by the 28 marksmen behind the adobe ramparts. On the second day there were about a dozen assaults, with like results.

Medicine Men Worked
During the second night the medicine men produced their entire bag of tricks, and before dawn they assured the braves

view of the beleaguered hunters three quarters of a mile distant. He dropped, pierced by Dixon's bullet, and the chiefs decided to retire.

Three defenders were killed during the two-day fight and were buried within the walls of the fort.

W.T.C.C. PLANNING CALIFORNIA TOUR IN INTEREST OF SOIL CONSERVATION AND MARKETING, WHITEKER REPORTS

B. M. Whiteker, manager of the agricultural division of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, was in Lubbock Wednesday afternoon for the purpose of interesting farmers or business men of Lubbock and this county in uniting with a group of West Texans to make a tour of California to study soil conservation and marketing of products.

"We are selling our farm products in the form of chicken feed, which is kaffir corn," said Mr. Whiteker. "In California it is being manufactured into eggs and sold back to us. Californians are getting more dollars for their eggs than we get for our feed."

"We are depleting our soil to that extent, and they enrich theirs by putting on to their land fertilizer produced with our feed and are manufacturing with our feed a dainty breakfast food wrapped in egg shells, and getting the highest market price, because they are producing what the market demands. We are trying to sell what the market doesn't want."

"The mere fact that a farmer has 1,000 good hens or 10 milch cows doesn't mean independence to him unless he knows how to care and feed them to get profitable production."

Referring to soil conservation, Mr. Whiteker said, "West Texas' agricultural industry has a future and that is in conservation of fertility of soil and moisture as we get it, and that will be obtained by careful terracing of both farms and pastures and contouring roads in order to hold all rainfall on land."

"If West Texans would study California we could step up 25 years in farm methods and marketing systems."

Instead the American, a former general sometimes called affectionately "Hell n Maria" Dawes, will wear plain swallow tail evening dress. Both former ambassadors, George Harvey and Alanson Houghton, donned knee breeches for court functions.

No reason was assigned by the sources revealing the former vice-president's intention, which was in defiance of the convention laid down by the Lord Chamberlain's office.

The ambassador and his wife met both Queen Mary and King George when General Dawes presented his credentials recently, and tonight's attendance at the court will be merely in compliance with formality.

Member of Dalton Gang Wednesday

WICHITA FALLS, June 27 (P).—Bob Davis, 77, one time friend of the James boys and the Dalton gang, was buried with ceremony here Wednesday. He was fatally injured in an automobile accident near Bellevue Monday night.

A two day inquiry by officers failed to reveal a relative or friend. Most of the last 50 years of Davis' life was spent in prisons. Department of justice records revealed he was given 10-year sentence 35 years ago from Denton, Texas, for bank robbery and had served three terms in San Quentin prison for bank robbery, one term being for 35 years.

NEW YORK, June 27 (AP)—A heavyweight man of destiny may rise tonight in the ring at the Yankee stadium in answer to the call of the fight faithful for another world champion.
A mantle of greatness has hovered over Max Schmeling, young belting beauty from Germany, ever since he caught up with Johnny Risko, lashed out twice with his right hand and shattered the Cleveland rubber man's reputation for durability. Tonight a bigger and better trained Schmeling will attempt to do the same thing in fifteen rounds to Paulino Uzcudun.
Paulino is Test.
The squat man from the Basque country, almost as broad as he is tall and hitherto punch proof as a block of steel, will furnish the final test of Schmeling's ability before a crowd of about 45,000 in the American League ball yard. The faithful are expecting to pay more than \$500,000 to sit in on the experiment with the bulk fund for needy children.
In his sensational rise to the front ranks of the heavyweight contenders, the German bomber has displayed all the punching power, skill and ferocity that goes to make a champion. His knifing right hand bounced Risko to the floor and kept him there, something no other heavyweight of the present era had been able to do.
Must Weather Storm.
But in his short American campaign, one test has been lacking. At no time has Max been hit solidly and hurt. At no time has he been belted in the body until the skin blotted and then turned purple. Max has yet to stand that test before the critical eyes of the faithful and come back to weather the storm.
Of all the contenders for the heavyweight crown, Gene Tunney seems most fitted to bring out the strength and possible weaknesses in Schmeling's fighting equipment. He has a body as staunch as the oaken timbers he once hewed in the snow Pyrenees, experience, unlimited courage, and a rushing, roughhouse attack that never falters no matter how fearful the shelling about his own head.
Both In Condition
The burly Basque, a most difficult target as he plunges into close quarters with his arms folded across his jaw, has yet to face an opponent who could hit him hard and cleanly enough to hurt him. In perfect condition after a full month of work in open air training camps, only in height and age will there be any material difference in their physical proportions. Schmeling has trained to the ring at 187 pounds and Paulino at 190.
The winner of tonight's fracas, said of the major outdoor shows is to meet Jack Sharkey, the Boston tar, in another heavyweight festival here in September. Unless Jack Dempsey returns to the glove wars for another fling at his own crowd, the victor in September probably will be accepted as the new world champion.
Buffs Are Poison.
While the buffs have been nothing more than an occasional source of irritation to the six other clubs this season, they have been plain, everyday poison to Manager Milt Stock's henchmen. Wachtel's triumph yesterday gave the Bisons a sweep of their three games on the Dallas lot and five victories out of their last six starts against the herd.
There is one bit of consolation available to the Steers. Those obnoxious buffs were in Wichita Falls today, and it might be they can continue their mad career against the new leaders, San Antonio, become somewhat doleful on the road, supplies opposition for Dallas the next three days. It is possible the two clubs will stage a battle for the first half round, if there is a first half, right down to the tape, with Shreveport, perhaps, mixing in the festivities.

If ghosts of prize fights like that storied wraith of Banquo come back to haunt the scene of their existence, the Schmeling-Paulino brawl tonight may well be the shadow of another and now historic scrap on the same ground—the Dempsey-Firpo battle of 1933.
That struggle now rests in the archives of history as the greatest duel of modern ring warfare. It was jungle battle with the savagery of a maddened tiger pitted against the titanic sinews of a bull elephant gone wild. Those who thrilled at the spectacle can never forget it.
Perhaps faint hopes of seeing something like it will draw thousands to the Yankee stadium to watch the burly Paulino Uzcudun match his oaken strength against the hammer blows of the younger Max Schmeling.
The setting is the same: Yankee stadium at night. The principals resemble those mighty warriors of 1922. Though infinitely a better boxer than Luis Firpo ever was but lacking his size, Paulino has the same iron frame, the same metallic jaw, the same formidable appearance of the South American. And Schmeling is known as the German Dempsey. Probably lacking the full measure of tigerish ferocity which Jack possessed in younger days, the black browed Berlin boy has punching power and ring grace reminiscent of old Giant Killer Jack.
And again, in a measure, Paulino and Schmeling are fighting for the same bauble which brought Firpo and Dempsey into conflict. While the actual heavyweight championship is not at stake as it was in 1923, the winner of the set will be closer to the world's heavyweight title than any other man fighting today.
The stern countenance of the course was somewhat softened by lack of rain as the championship play started, and a smile instead of a scowl will be seen at some of the long holes when a long drive will be even longer over the hard fairways.

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INTEREST IN DAIRY DEVELOPMENT IN TEXAS REVEALED IN ATTENDANCE FOR OPENING OF TYLER PLANT, IS REPORT

K. M. Renner, head of the Department of Dairying at Texas Tech. and A. B. Davis, manager of the Lubbock chamber of commerce, returned Tuesday from a trip through East Texas during which they visited the opening of the new \$200,000 whole milk plant at Tyler.

"East Texas is rapidly developing into one of the leading dairy sections of the state," said Mr. Renner. "During the past year two whole milk plants have been established and another will soon be built."

"Last August the first powdered milk plant using the Guy Jensen spray system of powdering milk opened at Marshall. On June 22, another plant, using the same process, was formally opened at Tyler. There will be another plant erected at Mt. Pleasant in the near future."

Section Enthusiastic
Farmers, business men and bankers alike are all enthusiastic over the new era in agriculture as they term the development of the dairy industry in that section of Texas. They have found that the one crop system of agriculture, formerly car-

ried on, is not a safe business proposition. Texas is still a large importer of dairy products so why not go into the business of producing these products at home? The citizens of Tyler and vicinity decided that they could and would produce their own dairy products, and in choosing a market decided that the whole milk market was best suited to their community. Sufficient funds were raised and they now have a \$200,000 milk plant representing the latest type of manufacturing equipment.

Many Present
Mr. Renner stated that there were a large group of prominent people present at the opening of the Tyler plant pointing to the fact that the industry is being studied and that the different types of dairy plants are being weighed in the balance. "Governor Moody was present," said Mr. Renner. "The presidents of the T. & P. and of the Cotton Belt railroads were there. Dr. Grey and Mr. Jensen, inventors and patent holders on the milk powdering equipment, were there. Dr. Grey is also president of the California Golden State Milk Products company, which is perhaps the largest single organization of its kind in the world. Mr. Douthitt, president of the Douthitt Engineering company, Chicago, exclusive builders of the Grey-Jensen powder equipment, was also there. Delegates from Kansas, Missouri and Kentucky were to be seen while practically every section of Texas was represented. West Texas had the largest visiting delegation, composed of some 50 business men, county agents, chamber of commerce officials and farmers."

Tyler Plant Modern
"The plant at Tyler represents the latest and best in equipment. It has a capacity of 100,000 pounds of whole milk per day. No expense has been spared to insure the successful operation of this plant. Mr. Short, who is manager of the plant at Marshall, will also be manager of the one at Tyler. The superintendent was secured from New Zealand and is considered one of the best milk plant operators in this or any other country. The plant has a well equipped scientific laboratory for the chemical and bacteriological analysis of the milk which they receive and also for the manufactured products which they make."

"The whole milk is received at the

plant, separated and the cream churned into butter. The skim milk is manufactured into skim milk powder and the butter milk from the churn is also converted into butter milk powder. In this way there is no loss, the entire quantity of milk received is converted into some form of salable product.

"The farmers are enthusiastic, and in talking with numerous patrons of the plant they all seem to be well satisfied. The plant is carrying on an intensive educational program among the patrons. Bulletins are being organized and purebred bulls are being introduced to build up the quality of the dairy cattle. Arrangements are under way to secure a number of good dairy cows to add to the present existing herds."

Field Man Employed
"A full time field man is employed by the plant who has had special dairy training. He assists the patrons in their feeding problems, breeding problems and in any other way that he may. He instructs the farmers in the care and handling of their milk so that it will be of high quality at all times. In this manner the plant keeps in constant touch with the producers."

"Trucks gather the cream at each farm once daily. A nominal charge is made for hauling and the farmer is saved the expense of a daily trip to the city. Cooling stations will be erected in nearby towns and the milk received at these stations will be hauled to the Tyler plant. In this manner it is possible to reach out and cover a territory of twenty to thirty miles and still get the whole milk into the main plant in good condition."

"There is still much work to be done and some obstacles to be overcome before the plant will develop to its full capacity but the people of Tyler are working, they are enthusiastic and they are determined. There is no question but that they are in the dairy business to stay and that they will be successful."

"RED" MOHUN BACK IN JAIL AGAIN

COLORFUL FLIER OF REVOLUTION MARRIES ON HOT CHECK; ANNULMENT SOUGHT BY WIFE

EL PASO, June 27.—Philip (Red) Mohun, colorful soldier of fortune whose aerial activities for the late Mexican revolution landed him in jail here for a time, is back in jail again, not because he married too often, but because he allegedly gave the justice of the peace a bad check. In the meantime his partner in the wedding ceremony, fearing that she had one husband too many, and that Mohun might have one wife too many, has obtained an annulment.

Mohun was held one of the most reckless fliers in the rebel squadron. He bombed the federal forces at Jimenez and continued with the rebels into Sonora where he saw a great deal of aerial action. When the revolution collapsed he was arrested by federal authorities and held here for a time for violation of neutrality laws.

His personality appealed to many people here and since his release his escapades have furnished many stories for the papers.

The latest incident in his colorful career started with a party in Juarez in celebration of a wedding. The power of suggestion was too great and Mohun decided that it would be a good thing to get married. It seemed a good idea to Alice Sparks Bouchard, another member of the party, too, and they set out to accomplish it. The new Texas law requiring three days notice precluded a Texas wedding so Red chartered a taxi, cab drove to Las Cruces, N. M., and

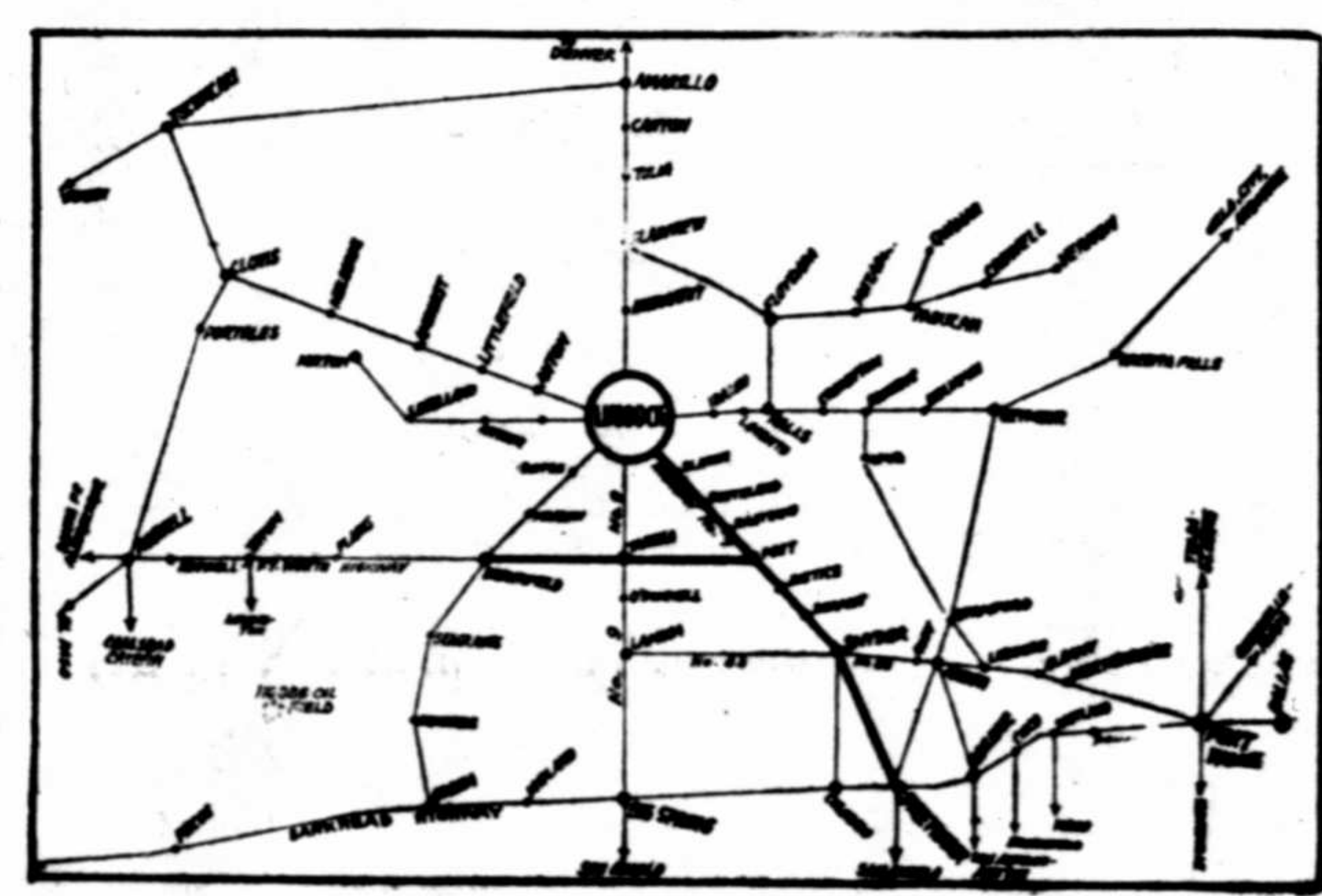

Cowboys And Planes

This modern age has a most per-
plexing way of scrambling things.

Out on the great range lands of
Montana roam thousands of wild
horses. Each summer half a century
ago to round them up. In the
open plains the task is relatively
easy; but as the hunt progresses the
wild horses retreat into the broken
bad lands, where ancient upheavals
of earth have left long gullies, deep
canyons, tumbled boulders and high
cliffes. In such a country the task
of finding them is almost impos-
sible.

And here is where things are get-
ting scrambled.

The round-up of wild horses is a
relic of the old west. It is done
just as it was done half a century
ago. The cowboys are riders of the
old, almost legendary breed. But
this year—

This year they are going to use
airplanes!

The airplanes can do a lot of
things that the cowboys cannot.
They can soar high over the bad
lands and spy out the hiding places
of the untamed, roaming herds.
They can easily balk the cunning
of the wild fugitives. This year's
round-up accordingly, will be more
successful than any that have gone
before.

Most of us have had time to get
reconciled to the fact that the old
west is gone. We are aware that few
cowboys carry six-shooters any
more, we know perfectly well that
the picturesque days of the old west
have slipped over the last frontier
gone forever. Yet this business of
airplanes is a bit of a shock. What
have airplanes to do with Montana
round-ups?

The fact is that two eras are
dove-tailing in this business, each
bringing its own special type of ro-
mance.

The romance of the old days—of
the old west, and of the whole of
the individual. The cowboy was
only one form it took in other sec-
tions there were prospectors, trappers,
river pilots, and so on. All were pre-
eminently individuals—men who
played a lone hand, stood on their
own feet, made their mark by dint
of their own sturdy, uncompromis-
ing self-reliance.

The romance of today is the ro-
mance of machines, and the air-
plane fills the topmost niche. No
longer is it the individual man who
is glorified; it is the mechanical
contraption that he uses. Individual-
ism is passing; even the pilot,
severe and alone in the vast sky,
is up there as the representative so
to speak, of the scores of men who
put his machine together.

It may be that this new era will
be quite as satisfying and heart-
warming as the old, once we get
used to it. But there is no use de-
nying that, with the passing of the
old, we have lost something valuable.
An epoch in human history is clos-
ing. No longer can a man go to
distant frontiers and stand or fall on
his own unaided efforts. He cannot
escape from the machine.

Those Who Lost

It is a bit unsettling to us ordi-
nary folk to read about the half-
dozen lucky ones who held winning
tickets in the English Derby lot-
teries.

An Irish widow sets a quarter of
a million; and Indianapolis fan-
tists get some \$80,000; a Calcutta clerk
draws down \$100,000—and so on.

Reading these stories, one's natural
conclusion is that the best way to
get along in life is to spend all one's
money on lottery tickets.

But, of course, there's another
side to it. All of the money that
these people won came from scores
of thousands of other people who
bought tickets and did not win.

There were half a dozen winners
and a couple of hundred thousand
losers.

Blamed For Blast

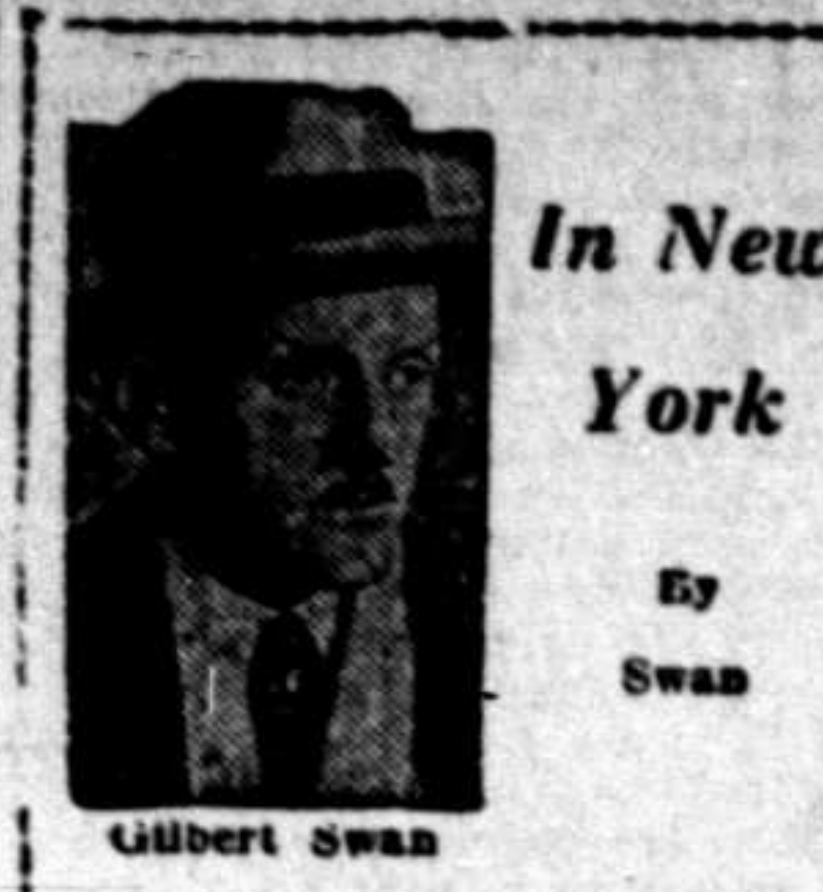
HOUSTON, June 27 (AP).—Labor

Diet and Health

POISON FROM PLANTS DIES
OUT OF ITSELF, SAYS
DOCTOR PETERS

DERMATITIS VENENATA (Part 4)
In the preceding articles I de-
scribed the poison ivy and oak and
sumac plants, and told you that the
poisonous property is an oil, most
of which can be borne in the heat
of the sun.

For the relief of itching, the im-
mersion of the part in water as hot
as can be borne is about the best
remedy. If the eruption is on the
face, you can use towels saturated
in hot water.

Importance of Destroying Poison Ivy
poisonous vegetation is destroyed
on his premises, and the community
should see that it is destroyed on
public waysides and parks. Natu-
ally, those who are employed to
eradicate these plants should not be
susceptible to the poison, but if they
exercise the precautions of wearing
heavy gloves, putting an application
of soap solution on the face, neck
and ears, they might do the work
without any injury.

The pamphlet issued by the United
States public health service, on
Ivy and Sumac Poisoning states
that the most rapid and efficient
method of dealing with the plants
is to grub them out, taking care to
remove the running root stalks
which produce another crop of the
plants the following year.

The plants in the fields may be
destroyed by plowing up the soil
and planting cultivated crops.
Where injury to other plants is not
to be feared, the use of kerosene,
applied by a sprayer or spray
gun, has proven an effective method.
It may have to be used more than
once, and it is more effective if the
oil, around the roots is cut up,
so that the oil will also get a
little dose. The usefulness of the
oil is not long impaired by this
method.

Jensen carried 165 gallons of gasoline at the takeoff, enough to carry the plane through the night, and planned to refuel in the air twice a day through a pipeline from a plane flying overhead. His wife, an Auburn-haired young woman of 26, holds a private pilot's license and arranged to take her turn at the controls.

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., June 27 (AP)—Captain Frank M. Hawks took off at 5:15 a. m. (E. S. T.) on a round trip flight to Los Angeles where he expects to stop only long enough to refuel.

He hopes to establish three records, for the round trip, for east to west and west to east. The non-stop record to the Pacific coast is 24 hours 51 minutes established by the late C. B. D. Colver and Harry Tucker. The west to east record is 18 hours, 21 minutes established by himself.

Colonel E. M. Roberts, representing the National Aeronautic association, gave \$12,500 as the official takeoff time.

Carries 550 Gallons
The plane carried 550 gallons of gasoline, an earlier plan of carrying 615 gallons being abandoned due to the additional weight making the plane tail heavy. Captain Hawks said it would take him three hours to refuel and then would immediately take off again for the return trip. The plane's engine is capable of 185 miles an hour.

Making the first alone means he will have to let the plane fly itself fifteen minutes of every hour while he pumps fuel from the main tank in the fuselage up to the wing tanks from which it will feed the motor by gravity.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 27 (AP)—Nearing the 100 hour mark in its effort to set a new world record for refueling flight for airplanes the Miss Minneapolis, piloted by Thorwald Johnson and Owen Haudman, today flew through rain clouds which had begun early in the night. As the plane passed the 93 hour total this morning, officials observing the progress of the flight at old Chamberlain Airport here, reported the single motor airplane to be functioning perfectly.

With more than half the necessary time elapsed toward setting a new record, the Miss Minneapolis

last night gave up its system of lap flying temporarily. Since the start of the event at 5 a. m. last Sunday the pilots have sent the ship back and forth over an eight mile course between Minneapolis, Hastings and Northfield.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., June 27 (AP)—Captain Charles Kingsford Smith and his three companions, took off in the Southern Cross from Derby, western Australia, today for Singapore, Straits settlement, enroute to England. The distance is about 1,650 miles, over the Indian ocean, Java and the Java sea.

The Southern Cross left here Tuesday, completing the first lap of its English flight to Derby Wednesday. It was hoped to better Bert Winkler's record of 15 days.

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BITTERNESS IS FELT ON TARIFF ROW

CONTROVERSY RAGES OVER SUGAR DUTY IN HEARINGS

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, June 27—The Senate finance sub-committee told off to consider the tariff proposals affecting sugar import found itself today in the midst of the controversy which raged around that schedule of the tariff bill in the House and is expected to be characterized by even more bitterness in the Senate.

Although all four of the finance committee's sub-committees are busy with hearings preliminary to the task of rewriting the House tariff bill for consideration by the Senate after August 19, and most of them are taking testimony on sharply disputed sections, the sugar sub-committee's hearings are overshadowing all in the interest they are engaging.

Adopt New Policy
Not only are more witnesses striving to be heard and more delegations and individuals striving to hear, but the committee members themselves have clearly demonstrated their estimate of the schedule as probably the most controversial in the bill by adopting a policy of cross-examining those who appear before them at unusual length.

The controversy has centered mainly on the sugar rates voted by the House affecting Cuban raw sugar imports, which, allowing for the preferential reduction from the world level, were raised in the bill to 240 cents a pound as compared with the present rate of 176 cents. The House bill places the world rate at 3 cents and leaves sugar from the Philippines and Porto Rico on the free list, another point bulking almost equally large in the controversy.
