COMMISSIONERS' COURT

Commissioners Court of Kimble County met at Court House in Junction, Dec. 13. Present: J. B. Randolph, Co. Judge; Commissioners: C. P. Bruce, M. C. Reese, B. T. Joiner, W. B. Miller; Sheriff G. R. Ivy, and O. C. Reid, clerk.

The following proceedings were had:

It is ordered by the court Will Eikenloff be and is hereby allowed \$25 for a strip of land about 20 yds. wide by 100 yds. long, same being land now fenced and forming a part of the Junction and Sonora public road, East of the ranch house of the said Will Eikenloff and at the crossing of North Llano river. East of said ranch house. And the said Willie Eikenloff appeared in open court and waived all his right and title and interest in said land.

W. B. Waggoner employed as Janitor for the Court House and yards at a salary of \$10 per month, beginning Nov. 1. until March 1, 1916.

Action deferred in the matter of 3d class road through land of J. W. Little, and Jury of View to appear before court at next regular term.

Thedford, road work, 4.20; Dorsey Co., binding tax roll, 7.50; John Munn, board of prisoners, stamps, etc. 3.25; G. T. Knight, road work, 31.05; Kimble county citizen, Stationery, etc. 5.50; J. L. Wright, road work, 8.80; J. C. Abbott, road work, 19.50; Junction Hdw. Co., material for Court House and Jail, and roads, 29.40; Ben Hamm, road work, 3.40; Light, pub. notices, 2.20; Schreiner-Hodges Co., road supplies, cement, etc. 320.07.

Proposition from Alamo Construction Co., to pay par and accrued interest to date for the \$13,000 Road Dist. Bonds. History of bonds to be subject to the approval of the Construction Company's atty, and the Commissioner's court to pass such resolutions as may be required by the Co's attorney. Proposition

accepted by court Dec. 13, 1915

Proposition from Alamo Construction Co. to grade the streets and roads as specified below, and also to build four steel and concrete bridges as follows:

Will grade 60 ft. wide, with 18 inch crown, and gravel 20 ft. wide, 6 in. deep, 1 mile. Also will grade 6 miles 40 ft. wide, 16 inch crown, and gravel two miles 14 ft. wide, 6 inches deep. Also will build a low water concrete bridge 75 ft long, 12 ft wide, with 15 ft. apron on East end and 30 ft. apron on West end also will build 100 ft. bridge over Bear Creek, consisting one 60 ft. span and two 20 ft. approaches 14 ft. wide. Also will build one 50 ft. bridge, 12 ft. wide over Criss Hollow.

Also will build one 60 ft bridge 12 ft. wide over North Llano river at Gordon crossing. All to be completed in a good and work man like manner and subject to specifications and plans to be agreed upon. All for sum of \$15,300. Terms and manner of payment to be agreed upon by parties thereto. Accepted by the court Dec. 14.

Ordered by the court that 5 pieces of scrip issued against Road and Bridge Fund be issued by clerk of this court payable to Junction State bank, due 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 years after date respectively. First piece for \$1300 due Feb. 1, 1916. Second piece for sum of \$1240, due Feb. 1, 1917. Third piece for \$1180, due Feb. 1, 1918. Fourth piece for \$1120, due Feb. 1, 1919. Fifth piece for \$1060 due Feb. 1, 1920. Said scrip shall not bear interest. The said scrip is issued in lieu of other scrip heretofore issued and held by Junction State bank. The County Treasurer is hereby instructed to cancel the scrip hereby taken up by the issuance of the aforesaid five pieces of scrip.

Ordered by the court that Coke R. Stevenson be and he is appointed County Attorney of Kimble county for period of one year from this date at a salary of Forty Dollars per month. Same to be Ex-officio salary.

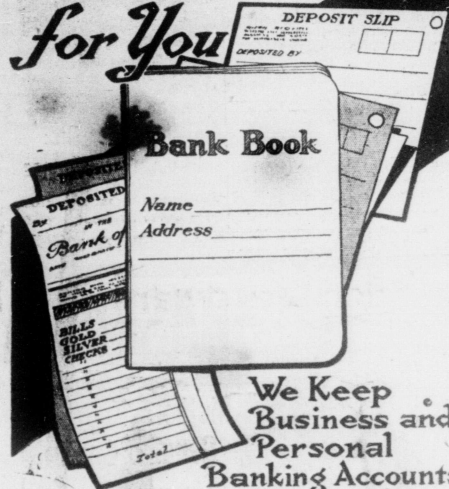

West and Mountain Regions

Pretty soon the big wool and mohair house of Capt. Chas. Schreiner will look like a ball room after the ball. A shipment of nine hundred thousand pounds of Mohair and eight hundred thousand pounds of wool has just been completed. The remainder of the wool and mohair in the big building will be shipped within the close of the year, and the house made ready for the spring clip, which promises well at present.

All of the wool and mohair in the last big shipment was sold for eight months product. The prices received for both the wool and mohair are very gratifying to the grower.

Speaking of the existing conditions Capt. Schreiner said:

"Of course no one can predict at this time just what will transpire in the next six months or a year, but so far as present conditions indicate, the outlook for the wool and mohair business is quite promising. Sales that have recently been made are entirely satisfactory, and there now appears no immediate change in conditions that have kept prices favorable to the grower."

Reports from ranches in this section of the state indicate that animals are going into winter in excellent condition. Recent rains will make an abundant supply of water, the divide ranches and materially benefit the range. I can see no reason why the coming season should not be of prosperity for the wool and mohair grower."
