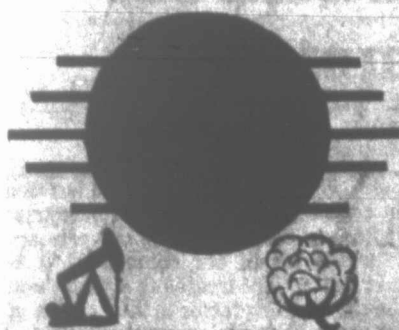

CHS football team honored

Despite a mixup on the 7 p.m. starting time, native son Clovis Hale arrived in Colorado City just in time to share a meal and a message with those in attendance at the Colorado High School football banquet held Thursday at the middle school cafeteria.

Hale, reared in Loraine and now an assistant football coach at Texas Tech University, shared some "hometown" memories, humor and counsel with guests and honorees—for whom all had gathered.

After a welcome by Wolverine president Yolanda Lee and invocation by superintendent Charles Uelton, Hale and dinner arrived simultaneously.

Highlight of the banquet was the recognition of award winners for the 1985 Wolves squad.

Stu Howell and Ruben Rivera were presented by coach Rick Robinson the KVMC Fighting Heart Award. Coach Mel Gierhart announced Raymond Martinez and Adam Alvarez as recipients of the Colorado City RECORD "E" Award and Cody Stice and Robert Lemons accepted from coach Jerold Epperson the Sportsmanship Award.

Robinson also presented the Hustlingest Wolf Award to Albert Rivera, who he described as not the biggest middle line-backer, but the "toughest." Rivera was the leading tackler.

CHS head coach Tom Ramsey announced running back Sam Rivera the winner of the Outstanding Player Award. Rivera finished his high school career with back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons—including over 1,400 this past season.

During the season, all seniors had served as captains and following the season, the players chose Albert, Ruben and Sam Rivera as captains. They presented A. M. Holman the No. 1 Fan Award, just before cheerleaders Yvonne Lujan, Yvette Camp, Kellie Beights, Denise

Jackson, Renee Whalen, Diane Gregory and Bluefoot, Shana Biggs ended the banquet by leading the school song.

Prior to the presentations of awards, coaches Mike Hart and Raymond Zamarripa presented the freshmen football team and coach Epperson assisted Gierhart and Robinson in presenting the junior varsity and varsity teams. Other seniors besides the award winners were Mike Ligon, Moises Molina, Jimmy Thompson, Dale Craighead and Andrew Pineda.

Captains revealed Diane Gregory as the team's choice for football sweetheart and Lee announced B. Rivera as Wolverine bean.

Hale began his speech lightly before getting "down to his business."

"It's a pleasure to be here," said Hale. "Especially since I consider it my hometown. Colorado City is a suburb of Loraine."

Hale expressed gratitude for being back in West Texas after 18 years—where a person "learns respect and courtesy." Hale shared "fond" memories of his life that included Loraine boys making appearances at the Lazy Day. Hale spoke of the very first football game that was played among the animals of Noah's Ark and starred the hippo and the centipede. An unorthodox duck hunting method by the Tuttle family in Abernathy was also revealed to be mastered by a certain son.

Hale closed with more serious advice to the students in attendance. "You have to start working on academics. Get after it. Know yourself and what you want to do. The quicker you know yourself, you'll be ahead of others. Most of all, be yourself."

"Don't try to be anything but what you are and do it perfectly. Believe in yourself. If you don't, who will? Figure out what you want to do and get after it. Don't ever stop. Only a mediocre person is always at his best," he said.

Council agrees to advertise for bids

The Colorado City Council, meeting in special session Wednesday, agreed to advertise for bids for a used car for the police department and formed a committee to study the possibility of selling some city-owned property.

A committee had been named at a previous meeting to study

the possibility of purchasing Mitchell County Sheriff's Wendell Bryant's car which is to be traded in on a new car.

Tom Carlock, chairman of the committee, recommended that the car, a 1983 Ford Crown Victoria with about 84,000 miles and equipped with a police package, be purchased and that Police Sgt. Pat Taylor be assigned the car. By law, the city will have to advertise for bids for the car.

Jury returns indictments

A Mitchell County grand jury returned 10 indictments Friday, five of which were sealed.

The other five indictments included:

—Jack Kitchens for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and illegal possession of a pistol;

—Francisco Condarco for driving while intoxicated;

—Alvin Allen for aggravated assault with threat by deadly weapon on a police officer;

—Larry Lain for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, and;

—Bryon Morris for forgery by passing.

Conaway seeks Pct. 2 post

William D. Conaway Jr. of Westbrook has announced his candidacy for election to Precinct 2 County Commissioner, the post currently held by Johnny Shackelford.

Conaway is a life-long resident of Westbrook and is a self-employed farmer-rancher.

Conaway said he is "entering the race for commissioner of Precinct 2 because I feel that my qualifications would enable me to supervise the operations of the precinct in an economical and efficient manner."

"If elected, as a member of the commissioner's court, I would strive to see that the needs of the county were met, while also considering the taxpayers," he said. "I look forward to working with our local Mitchell County

government and serving the residents of Precinct 2."

Conaway has served as a director and is currently vice-chairman of the Mitchell County Appraisal District. He also has been elected to serve as a trustee of the Westbrook Independent School District.

"I have experience in the operation, repair and maintenance of most types of large machinery," he said.

He was a charter member of the Westbrook Lions Club and is currently serving as secretary of the Westbrook Volunteer Fire Department. He is a member of the Mitchell County Farm Bureau and of the Westbrook Baptist Church.

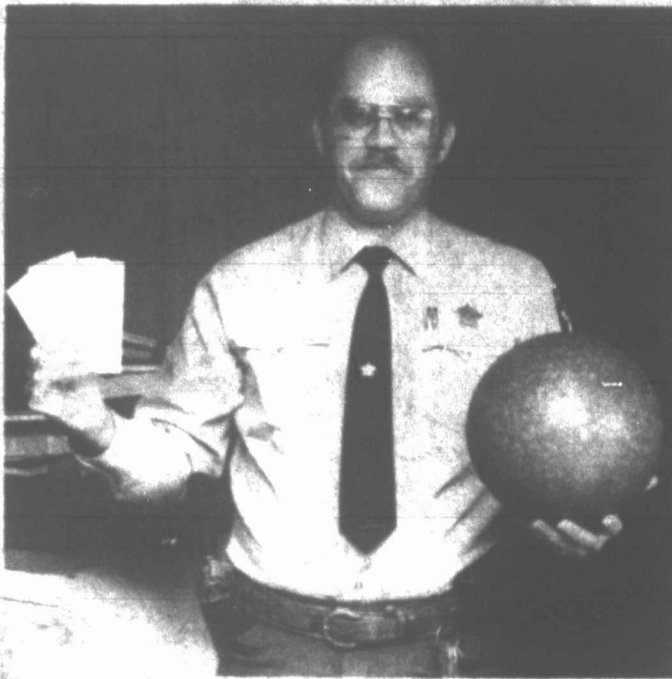

News from... Your Chamber of Commerce

"The Chamber of Commerce office serves as a central location for providing information to prospective residents, industries and businesses, and to visitors in the area. As I entered the theater, I was very impressed with the very tasteful decor. I was, frankly, quite surprised to see such a professional looking facility in a town the size of Colorado City. The lady who was in charge of the box office that night helped greatly to set the tone of the evening. She was in a good mood, she had a good sense of humor, and she made me feel good about being there."

"From the lobby to the ticket booth to the theater to the performance, the entire experience was a pleasurable one that I will long remember. After the performance, a gentleman asked me if I would like to go backstage and meet the cast and see the rest of the facility. I told him that I would, and he asked a nearby patron if he would escort me backstage. The patron readily agreed, and again I was pleased with the friendliness of those citizens toward me."

"My main reason for going to Colorado City, as I said, was to see THE DINING ROOM. I had read a notice in the Snyder paper telling about the production's run, but the real clincher, the real motivation behind my actually going to see the production was a review that I heard of the play by Jim Baum over KVHC radio. His review was a very succinct, honest, professional review, and it really made me want to see the show even more. Mr. Baum's review impressed me and whetted my appetite to see good theater. I went; I wasn't disappointed."

"In closing, I just want to say that if I had to be transferred to Texas, I'm really glad that I was transferred to the Snyder-Colorado City area. I thank the citizens of both communities for making me feel welcome here."

1986 TAX TIPS

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM THE MITCHELL COUNTY APPRAISAL DISTRICT

- 1 If you are 65 or over or disabled, and have not applied in 1982, 1983, 1984 or 1985, you may qualify for additional property tax exemptions on your home. Contact the appraisal office for details.
- 2 The Mitchell Co. Appraisal District reminds farmers and ranchers who have not applied in 1982, 1983, 1984 or 1985 that the 1986 filing deadline for agricultural productivity valuation in Texas is March 30th. Contact appraisal district office.
- 3 Texas taxpayers have the right to render their property...to provide local tax officials with their opinion of what their property is worth. For forms contact the appraisal district before April 1st.
- 4 Texas veterans with a service-connected disability, or their survivors, may qualify for property tax relief if they file an exemption application before April 1st. Those who applied in previous years, need not apply.

Cook's Corner

Lawson enjoys cooking for family

Sonja Lawson learned to cook by watching her mother and also on her own by preparing foods such as fried chicken at the age of 12 years old. "I learned to fry chicken at an early age, but it was not until after I married that I could make gravy to go with it."

"Being a single parent and working mother, I try to prepare good nutritious meals for my three children, Jason, a seventh grader at Colorado Middle School, Jennifer, a second grader at Kelley Elementary and Sarah, a pre-kindergarten student. My children are really easy to cook for except for my daughter, Jennifer. She is the only one of

my children that is not a good eater."

"I usually prepare meats such as steak and they really like spaghetti and are good salad eaters so they get a lot of good raw vegetables that way."

"I like to try new recipes on my family and most of the time they like them, but only a few times they didn't like what I prepared. Their favorite meal is when I prepare turkey and dressing and we usually go all out and use the china and make a very special meal and they are always excited about that. I try to stress the importance of sharing meals as a family together and being there for one another."

"I remember a time when we were going to have a family dinner. My mother-in-law called to ask if there was anything she could bring for the meal. There was to be around eight people eating and I told her no, that I had a whole half of a fryer I was going to prepare for all those people and I have never lived that down. I learned quick that you need more than that to feed that many so we ended up having spaghetti."

"I love to cook for my family and enjoy them very much."

"I am going to share some of my favorite recipes with RE-CORD readers today."

SPINACH SALAD

One loaf (ring) Hawaiian bread - cut top off and dig out middle to fill in with salad. Save top and you can use the middle to use spread on also.

1 cup mayonnaise
1 cup sour cream
1 small can water chestnuts, drained and finely chopped
1 package frozen chopped spinach, drained well until it seems dry

Add 1 package of Knor's vegetable dry soup mix, mayonnaise and sour cream and mix well. Then add spinach and chestnuts to make a spread. Spoon into center of bread and place top back on and refrigerate.

BARBECUE BRISKET

12 pound brisket (trim off some excess fat)
Salt, pepper and lemon pepper to season the meat. Wrap brisket in foil tightly and cook in a 275 degree oven for four hours. Remove and add your favorite barbecue sauce and re-wrap and place back in oven for an additional two hours.

AUNT MANTIE'S FRITO PIE

1 pound ground beef
1 onion, chopped
1 small can green chilies
1 can Cream of Chicken soup
1 small can evaporated milk
1/4 pound Velveta cheese
1 bag regular Fritos
Brown meat with onion and drain. Add green chilies, soup, milk and cheese to meat mixture and heat until bubbly. Layer mixture with Fritos and top with remaining grated cheese and heat in 350 degree oven until cheese melts.

TEXAS ONION BREAD

1/2 cup onions, finely chopped
1 tablespoon margarine
1 1/4 cups biscuit mix
1/2 cup milk
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 cup 4% American cheese, grated
1 teaspoon poppy seed
Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Sauté onions in one tablespoon margarine. Mix together biscuit mix, sautéed onions, milk, egg and 1/2 cup cheese. Pour mixture into a greased 8" baking pan and top with remaining cheese and poppy seed. Bake 25-30 minutes.

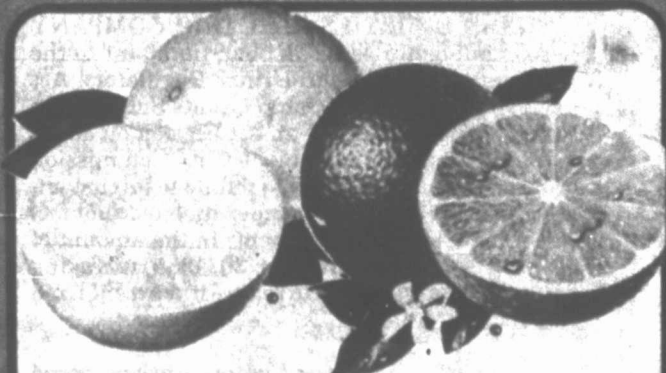

Do's and don't's of testing

(Part of a Series)
You can be a great help to your children if you will observe these do's and don't's about tests and testing:

Don't be too anxious about a child's test scores. If you put too much emphasis on test scores, this can upset a child.

Do encourage children. Praise them for the things they do well. If they feel good about themselves, they will do their best. Children who are afraid of failing are more likely to become anxious when taking tests and more likely to make mistakes.

Don't judge a child on the basis of a single test score. Test scores are not perfect measures of what a child can do. There are many other things that might influence a test score. For example, a child can be affected by the way he or she is feeling, the setting in the classroom, and the attitude of the teacher. Remember, also, that one test is simply one test.

Meet with your child's teacher as often as possible to discuss his/her progress. Ask the teacher to suggest activities for you and your child to do at home to help prepare for tests and improve your child's understanding of schoolwork. Parents and teachers should work together to benefit students.

Make sure your child attends

HELPING YOUR CHILD

school regularly. Remember, tests do reflect children's overall achievement. The more effort and energy a child puts into learning the more likely he/she will do well on tests.

Provide a quiet, comfortable place for studying at home.

Make sure that your child is well rested on school days and especially the day of a test. Children who are tired are less able to pay attention in class or to handle the demands of a test.

Give your child a well rounded diet. A healthy body leads to a healthy, active mind. Most schools provide free breakfast and lunch for economically disadvantaged students. If you believe your child qualifies, talk to the school principal.

Provide books and magazines for your youngster to read at home. By reading new materials, a child will learn new

words that might appear on a test. Ask your child's school about a suggested outside reading list or get suggestions from the public library.

It's important for children to review test results. This is especially true when they take teacher-made tests. They can learn from a graded exam paper. It will show where they had difficulty and, perhaps, why. This is especially important for classes where the material builds from one section to the next, as in math. Students who have not mastered the basics of math will be unable to work with fractions, square roots, beginning algebra, and so on.

Discuss the wrong answers

with your children and find out why they answered as they did. Sometimes a child misunderstands the way a question is worded or misinterprets what was asked. The child may have known the correct answer but failed to express it effectively.

It's important, too, for children to see how well they used their time on the test and whether guessing was a good idea. This helps them to change what they do on the next test, if necessary.

You and the child should read and discuss all comments written by the teacher. If there are any comments that aren't clear, the child should ask the teacher to explain.

Tips given on 1985 tax return filing

The Internal Revenue Service offers the following tips on preparing a federal income tax return.

-Have all your necessary records and forms available.

-Get an early start to allow plenty of time.

-Make sure you have a W-2 from each of your employers.

-Read your tax instruction booklet.

-If you need additional information, check with the IRS—they may have a free publication that will answer your questions.

Double-check the following before you mail your return:

-Attach all W-2 forms and related schedules.

-Verify all arithmetic.

-If you rounded off numbers, did you round consistently?

-Make sure you used the correct tax figure from the correct tax table.

-Sign and date the return, both spouses sign if a joint return.

-Use the peel-off label and pre-addressed envelope that was supplied with your tax package.

-Use the correct amount of postage on the envelope.

-Keep a photocopy of the return for your own records.

-Make sure social security numbers are entered correctly at the top of the return.

Tip income should be reported

The Internal Revenue Service reminded taxpayers who receive tips of the need to keep an accurate record of the tip income they receive.

Taxpayers have always been required to keep records to substantiate the amount of their gross income and deductions for income tax purposes. The requirement is a part of the general recordkeeping requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. It applies to records of tip income as well as to all other items. In addition, employees who receive tips as wages or compensation are required to report such tips to his or her employer each month by Section 6053(a) of the Internal Revenue Code. This requirement was added to the Code in 1965.

The Tax Reform Act of 1984 mandated regulations to identify specifically certain kinds of records as adequate under the law to substantiate tip income for income tax purposes. The temporary regulations were published in the Federal Register on July 23, 1985. The purpose of the regulations, in line with the legislative mandate, is to designate certain records as reliable in light of specific recordkeeping problems in industries in which cash tips form a significant part of the employee's compensation.

Under the regulations, a daily record or similar evidence of the tip income received constitutes sufficient evidence to substantiate reported tip income. The IRS publishes Form 4070A to help tipped employees keep a daily record of their tips. Form 4070A was originally published to assist tipped employees to comply with the reporting obligations to employers as described above.

The temporary regulations

apply to tips received on or after October 1, 1985. However, evidence considered sufficient by the temporary regulations will also be considered sufficient to substantiate tip income received before October 1, 1985.

The IRS noted, however, that neither the daily record nor other evidence may be sufficient if there are facts and circumstances indicating that the employee received a larger amount of tip income.
