## Three Drown In Tank Near Spur To End Reunion Standard Telephone General Offices Moved Here

### Headquarters Of Firm Located In Myrick Building

Offices Brought Here From Amarillo Following Merger With State Telephone Company, Of Texas

### Has 84 Exchanges

Additional Force Of Eight Or Ten To Be Used Here In New Offices; City Is Headquarters For Both

THE GENERAL OFFICES of the Standard Telephone company of Texas have been moved from Amarillo to Lubbock and now are located in the Myrick building, according to an announcement made Tuesday by H. D. Phillips, commercial manager of the State Telephone company of Texas.

Moving of the offices came as the result of the sale and taking over of that company by the State Telephone company, sale of which was effective on July 1. No announcement was made as to the financial consideration involved.

Consummation of this merger now gives the State company 84 exchanges in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. They were operating 4 exchanges before the joining of the two organizations which involved 40 others.

Lubbock now is headquarters for general offices of both the Standard and Standard companies which will continue to be operated under the separate firm names. An additional force of about eight or ten men will be required with the opening of the office here. All equipment has arrived and is being installed while the old offices of the State company are being re-evaluated and enlarged.

The Standard organization, founded in 1926, has had headquarters in Lubbock since that time. R. B. Kirby is general manager with headquarters here.

### Charge Woman Of Attacking Hubby

A Lubbock woman, Mrs. Blanche Finch, following her arrest shortly after 8 o'clock Tuesday night on a charge of aggravated assault, was released on \$100 bond, while her husband, E. C. Finch, was taken to a local hospital for medical attention.

Mrs. Finch was alleged to have attacked her husband about 8 o'clock last night with a knife in front of the Lubbock county courthouse. As a result of the encounter he sustained a wound in the right side requiring 15 stitches and a minor cut on the right arm.

### Young Plan Given Support Of Great Britain At Meet

Philip Snowden, Chancellor Of Exchequer From England, Asks Support Of Plan At Hague Session

THE HAGUE, Netherlands, Aug. 6. — Philip Snowden, British chancellor of the exchequer today thrust into the foreground of the 1929 conference of the Hague, the young plan, his government's opposition to the repatriation of German reparations payments among the allies as defined by the Young committee in Paris.

Taking the floor immediately after the commencement of the first business session Mr. Snowden informed delegations from eleven other nations that Great Britain was in favor of the principle of the Young plan but was opposed to the division of payments which the Paris experts had evolved.

The chancellor evoked his fellow statement to forgive him for speaking plainly, but he continued, he was in accord with Premier MacDonald and all the political parties in Great Britain in opposing further sacrifice in reparations receipts by Great Britain.

He affirmed that this government was ready to cancel all reparations payments and all war debts under the principles laid down by the Young plan, but that as long as reparations were to be received and debts to be paid Great Britain intended to see that she received equitable treatment. The speech of the British delegate poses a grave issue between Great Britain and the three other principal reparations creditors, France, Italy and Belgium.

The spectre of revision of the Young plan, however, frightens the majority of the interested powers at the Hague conference. The Germans are strongly adverse to putting the arrangement arrived at by the Paris financial experts into question.

### Two Convicts Are Shot Down In Run To Gain Freedom

Five Long Term Prisoners Run From Guards On Reaching Top Of Mine Shaft Following Work

### All Are Captured

Prison Authorities Made To Act As Shield As Men Make Dash From Lines Of Convicts

### STATE PENITENTIARY, LANSING, Kans., Aug. 6.

Two prisoners were killed, one wounded seriously and a guard shot in the leg when six long term convicts made an unsuccessful break for liberty here today.

William Webb and Bob Collins were the convicts killed. Collins took his life when he saw he was about to be captured. Jack Knight, another prisoner, was wounded. Heslop, the guard was shot in the leg. His condition is not dangerous.

The prisoners made the break for freedom upon arriving at the top of a coal mine shaft after their regular work in the mine.

Elaboration of costumes and beauty of contestants will determine winners in a bathing beauty revue to be held at the swimming pool at the ranch.

Held Terrapin Races.

Terrapin races, in which \$100 worth of cash prizes will be awarded, will be open for any one who enters a terrapin in the race.

Dog races are being planned in which mechanical jack rabbits will be used and dogs will run on a straight-of-way track. Prizes will be awarded in ages of cold blood and puppy races.

An interesting feature will be horse races, open to all, in a one-half mile dash.

### SEEK IMPEACHMENT

Six Articles Are Returned Against Bank Head

BIRMINGHAM, Aug. 6. (P)—Six articles of impeachment charges were voted this afternoon against Judge C. E. Thomas, state superintendent of banks in a warrant report returned by a Jefferson county grand jury which has been investigating closing of banks in the Birmingham district.

The six articles handed to Judge Harrington P. Heflin by the grand jurors were: Negligence, willful negligence, incompetency, misfeasance, malfeasance and disqualification for office.

Grand jury investigation of the closing of five banks in Birmingham and Jefferson county had been under way for nearly four weeks.

### INDIANS WHO WORSHIP THREE-HEADED GOD TO TUNE OF CHRISTIAN SONGS ARE DISCOVERED IN JUNGLES

Chupson is inhabited only by the gnomes of the temple, who are supplied by the surrounding villages.

Temple is Hut

The temple itself is a mere hut.

At three o'clock each morning caravans of natives arrive at Chupson from the villages of the district, the praying beginning at that hour. The worshippers kneel and pound their hearts, singing and praying in a mixture of Maya, Spanish and Latin. The songs originally were learned from Catholic missionaries in the time of the Spanish conquest, nearly 400 years ago.

The explorers were granted the rare privilege of viewing the "Tatch" or book which the native priests consult for practicing the religious rites. The "Tatch" is of manuscript, written in Maya by a Spanish missionary in 1586 and setting forth the principles of the Catholic faith. The priests use its counsel to guide them in worshiping the three-headed god which sits on a pedestal in the middle of the temple.

### Fires Destroying Forests Of Four Northwest States

More Than 30,000 Acres Bared By Flames; 1,000 Men Fighting To Control Men's Fury

(By Associated Press)

SPokane, Wash., Aug. 6. (P)—Fires raged through the forests of Washington, Idaho and Montana today, leaving behind more than 30,000 blackened acres, while approximately 1,000 men fought to control the flames.

In Northern California a serious fire had burned over several hundred acres in the Sugar Hill district of the Modoc National forest.

Forest air patrol planes sent from Spokane to spot new fires were hindered by dense clouds of smoke. The planes charted the new fires, to which crews were dispatched by truck and pack train. Hot weather, low humidity, high winds and thunderstorms all fostered hundreds of new blazes, none serious, but all straining the resources of the foresters and timber protective associations to the utmost.

Montana foresters reported flames eating into many forests—the Lolo, Missoula, Blackfoot and Pend Oreille had bad fires.

Across the line in North Idaho the old Pack river fire raged over nearly 10,000 acres. New blazes were reported in the Clearwater, Selway and Nez Percé forests of Central Idaho.

### Big German Ship May Leave Today To Circle Globe

Fuel and Hydrogen Pumped Into Airliner For First Attempt To Be Made By Lighter-Than-Air Craft

(By Associated Press)

LAKEHURST, N. J., Aug. 6.—A score of pipes in the silver body of the Graf Zeppelin hissed today as fuel and hydrogen was pumped into the ship for her takeoff tomorrow on the first flight across the world by a lighter-than-air ship.

Lieutenant Commander Zeno Weeks, U. S. navy officer in charge of the refueling, said the task would be completed tomorrow noon for a midnight takeoff.

Orders to the refueling crew today Commander Weeks said reporters that he had resigned from the navy effective Aug. 8, and would thereafter be employed as an architect and construction superintendent at the Akron Ohio, plant of the Goodyear Zeppelin company, which is building a zeppelin in which will be constructed two navy airships.

### STRUGGLE WITH FIRE

Flaming Oil Well Defies Attempt Of 500

LIBERTY, Aug. 6. (P)—About 500 men struggled tonight to extinguish the flaming oil well, Doherty No. 68 in the Hull field, which caught fire early today when the derrick lights were turned off. Thatcher Barrett of Hull, a derrick man, was burned slightly.

The republic production company rushed fire fighting equipment to the well, which came in last night flowing around 1,500 barrels daily. Other wells close by, and the town of Dalstein, were not in danger barring an unexpected heavy north-east wind.

The high fire column of the Doherty could be seen for 10 miles.

### Attempt To Rescue Twelve-Year-Old Youth Costs Life Of Two Others As Pioneer Family Holds Annual Affair

Babies Die As Bus Overturns

Henry Smith, Lamesa, And Escell McBroon And Son Herman, Of Brownfield, Are Given Watery Grave

Bodies Recovered

Funeral Services Today To Replace Planned Festivities Prior To Home Going Of Relatives

(Special To The Avalanche)

SPUR, Aug. 6.—Death stalked near here this afternoon to claim the lives of three persons, bringing a tragic end to the first of what was planned to be an annual reunion of the C. J. Smith family, among the oldest pioneers of this section of West Texas.

The attempt to rescue a 12-year-old boy from drowning cost not only the life of the youth, Herman McBroon, but that of his father, Escell McBroon, 36, of Brownfield, and McBroon's brother-in-law, Henry Smith, 32, of Lamesa.

The father lost his life in attempting to save that of his son and Smith in turn died in an effort to prevent his brother-in-law's death.

The tragedy occurred at a fishing party and picnic on the S. M. Swenson properties, 25 miles southwest of here, planned by the men attending the reunion in the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Smith in Spur. Gathered here from various parts of the state, 22 members of the family were planning a final celebration before leaving tomorrow for their homes.

While on the fishing trip, the boy Herman, wading in the shallow water, was struck by a log.

### Integrity Of Dr. Snook Told By Defense Counsel

Former Professor Pictured Man Fallen From Ways Of Respectability Into Role Of Insane Killer

(By Associated Press)

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 6. (P)—Defense counsel for Dr. James H. Snook, confessed slayer of Theora K. Hix, began to show the jury today, in his trial for first degree murder, their picture of Snook as a man who in the last three years had fallen from the ways of respectability to the role of an insane killer by a series of misadventures.

Prosecutor John J. Chester, Jr., rested the state's case this morning.

Associates Testify

Middle aged men who were in contact with Dr. Snook, in the College of Veterinary Medicine at Ohio State university as long as 25 years ago and associates who have known him closely ever since, then said they had known him as a man of good character and high reputation for truth and integrity.

But these same men admitted under cross examination that of recent months Dr. Snook had been reprimanded for associating with women other than his wife and that once he was called before his superiors to explain why he had given a narcotic to a woman whose name was left out of the trial record.

Arguments Heated

The most heated argument of the trial developed between Prosecutor Chester and Defense Attorney E. O. W. Brown, in the questioning of Charles F. Galt, an examining physician who testified that Dr. Snook was insane at the time of the murder.

### British To Cease Egypt Occupation

Far Reaching Reforms Are Agreed To In New Anglo-Egyptian Draft Treaty Made Public Tuesday

(By Associated Press)

LONDON, Aug. 6.—British military occupation of Egypt ended for the Suez Canal Zone, is almost ended, and other important Anglo-Egyptian reforms agreed to in the new Anglo-Egyptian draft treaty, details of which were published today.

The proposals are a great advance on anything hitherto offered in the Suez Canal Zone, and the Egyptian problem. The agreement which Foreign Secretary Arthur Henderson has negotiated with the Egyptian Premier Mohammed Pasha Mahomud in a general way follows the lines of the abortive treaty of two years ago but makes important concessions to Egypt.

Occupation To Cease

The British occupation will cease and British troops will be withdrawn to the Suez Canal Zone.

The British government will use its influence to induce other powers to consent to the abolition of the capitulations or extra-territorial rights, and will assist Egypt to become a member of the League of Nations.

Recognizes Protection

Part of Great Britain's recognition is that the protection of foreigners in Egypt is a matter devolving solely upon the Egyptian government.

The agreement would give Egypt a greater measure of freedom than once had before.

### Martin Reported Improved Tuesday

Local Carpenter, Stabbed In Cutting Affray Here Monday, Thought Out Of Danger; Bowman On Bond

The condition of Walter Martin, Lubbock carpenter, who was seriously injured in a cutting affray near his home on 34th street Monday afternoon, was reported late last night to be improved. Attending physicians stated that he rested well Monday night and Tuesday and that he was practically out of danger as no complications have set in.

Martin is suffering of three cuts, the deepest and most serious being in his left chest, below and a little to the left of the heart. His left leg was punctured by the blade, according to physicians, who stated that had the thrust been a trifle higher and to the right he would have been instantly killed. The other two wounds are in the left loin and over the left shoulder.

W. T. Bowman, neighbor of Martin, was released Monday afternoon on \$1,000 bond following his arrest on charges of assault with intent to murder.

### MEET CAUSES TWO DEATHS TUESDAY

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Aug. 6. — Two deaths in Oklahoma were attributed to heat, which reached 100 degrees in several cities today.

W. D. Ward, 65, a cobbler, dropped dead while mending furniture in the rear of his store here, while the mercury was 106 degrees, a record for this season.

V. D. Grady, 30, was overcome by heat while working on the roof of a building at Tulsa. He fell to his death. The temperature there was 106 degrees, also a seasonal record. Okla., reported 113 degrees today.

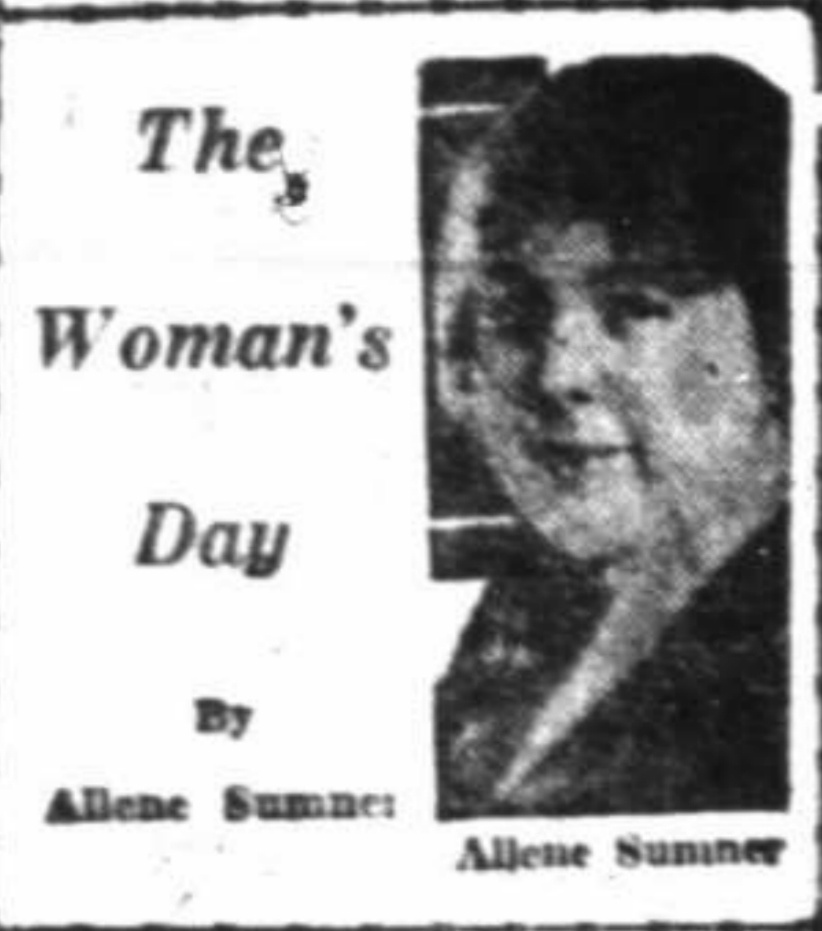

The city of Toledo, O., is carrying through one of its child welfare agencies for a small baby whose parents refuse to care for it. The mother insisted on leaving the child in the hospital where it was born, seeing it not more than once.

Her explanation was that, nearing middle age, she was entitled to respite from child caring; that she had raised several children; that she and her husband had planned a peaceful old age, and that she refused once more to dedicate a score of years to the care of a child.

WELL, WELL! There is a doughnut for thought of various kinds in the incident. Our first reaction is surprise at the "abnormality" of parents, a mother especially, who could thus abandon her child.

Perhaps, however, the little tale is really a tribute to the "normalcy" of life Nature designed men and women for parenthood in their early years. A child born in the 40's is more unnatural than natural. Perhaps the reaction of the Toledo mother is equally natural.

On the other hand, since nature's main job is to get the child cared for in their individual case, a natural or unnatural reaction does seem queer.

EASY! Another little angle of the story is a wonder that parents for a mere whim of like or dislike, can be relieved of the responsibilities of parenthood. If other cities and states are as willing to relieve all unwilling parents of their job, we will probably find plenty who de-viate from the so-called "normal" to put quite a burden upon the taxpayers.

PAPA DID IT! Speaking of parenthood, here's a father, James McMan Holt, 32, of Dayton, O., held for investigation by police for the shooting of his eight-year-old son, Leroy Robert.

The boy's mother was upstairs when she heard the shot and went down to find her son dead and her husband standing by with a gun in his hand. He said he was showing his pistol to the boy when it went off. His story is probably true. But a mother would never have been held on the same evidence. Even police would just have assumed that a mother couldn't have really killed her son, and let it go at that. Fathers could and have been known to.

So have mothers, for that matter.

NO SCHOOL! Chicago has been threatening "no school for our kids" for a long time. The Chicago School Board says that it must sell \$40,000,000 worth of tax anticipation warrants, money which it says it must have before the next tax payments if the schools open in the fall.

The City Council refuses to permit the sale, while it seems preposterous that any huge American city should close its schools. It is no more surprising than other things which seem to occur in this same city.

You couldn't make even a Hot-ent believe in the open machine gun gang warfare, either. But it's there.

## How to Achieve Beauty

Just as blue-green, creamy white and delicate flesh tones increase your apparent color and flatter your skin, so there are some shades which absorb your color and seem to drain all the warmth from your face.

These are the difficult colors to wear—and these are the colors with which it is most important to use becoming shades of powder, rouge and lipstick.

Black is the first of these. (Technically speaking, black is not a color, but for purposes of description in fashion language, it is usually called one.) Black, since it absorbs the light, seems to draw all color from the face. To most types it is particularly trying, unless bright rouge is worn. However, it offers marvelous opportunity to the sophisticated, for contrasting and "setting off" exotic make-up.

Women with florid skins wear black well. And most women find it becoming in the evening, since it emphasizes the pearly pallor of bare necks and arms.

Under a kindly, artificial light too, powder, rouge and lipstick blend more harmoniously with any skin, offsetting the tendency that black has to absorb all natural color.

If you are naturally pale, put on color with your costume of red, and be sure that both rouge and lipstick are of the same general color or tone as the red of your costume. Usually the off shades of red—those with orange or velvet in them—are more becoming than an intense, flat shade of unadulterated red.

Vivid blue and intense yellow are likewise often difficult. They both are liable to emphasize the tone of yellow that is in so many skins. Only the woman who has plenty of warm red-orange, or red-violet in her complexion, should attempt to wear them without exceptionally intelligent make-up.

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# Lubbock Postal Receipts Show Big Increase

## \$9,035 Boost Is Given For Seven Month Duration

Year's Total Promises To Exceed That of Last Year By Fifteen Or Twenty Thousand Dollars

Lubbock's postal receipts from January 1 to August 1 of this year aggregated \$62,806.09, a gain of \$9,035.48 over the corresponding period of 1928 according to a statement issued Tuesday by John L. Vaughan, postmaster.

Total receipts during the same period last year were \$53,860.61. July's receipts this year totaled \$8,133.49, as compared with \$6,430.72 for last year representing a gain of \$1,702.77.

Based on the present record this year's receipts at the end of December will probably exceed those of 1928 by \$15,000 or \$20,000.

(Special To The Avalanche) PLAINVIEW Aug. 6.—Postal receipts for July showed a substantial increase over the month of July, 1928. The receipts for the last month were \$5,023.53, an increase of practically twenty-four per cent over the same month of the preceding year when the receipts were \$4,052.67.

## ADJUST CONTROVERSY Use Of Roadbed Squabble Is Settled

AUSTIN, Aug. 6.—Adjustment of a controversy between the state and International-Great Northern railway over use by the company for its roadbed of property in Austin known as the old courthouse and jail site is probable within the next few days. Assistant Attorney General Jack Blacklock said today. "The case will either be settled satisfactorily to both parties or tried at the October term of court," Blacklock said. The case has been in court two years. The controversy arose when the company contended it had right to use the property under a statute that railroads could cross public property.

## Recover Pearls Farmer Gets String From Airplane

QUANAH, Aug. 6.—(P)—Charles Graveley, Hardeman county farmer, recently recovered a string of pearls he saw fall from an airplane as it was passing over the field in which he was plowing. The plane was believed to have been a commercial craft.

## Theft Mysteries Believed Solved

Arrest Of Two Men At Corpus Christi Is Thought To Clear Up Series Of Costly Burglaries

CORPUS CHRISTI, Aug. 6.—(P)—Solution of burglaries in four counties in which more than \$6,000 worth of merchandise was taken was expected to result from a series of arrests which Ike Edliff and Jim Shown, Nueces county deputy sheriffs have launched, after a long investigation. Six men were in jail today and at least that many more were sought.

Among the robberies which are expected to be explained was that of the Santa Mercantile company in which about \$3,000 worth of goods was lost. Smaller robberies at Austwell, Edouard and Driscoll were attributed to the same gang.

## INTERVIEWS GIL General Francisco May In Mexico City

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 6.—(P)—General Francisco May, chief of the Santa Cruz de Bravo Quintana Roo, who cannot speak Spanish and who never before left his native territory, has come to the capital by airplane to interview President Gil on matters of importance to his people. The Maya tribes over which General May rules are supposed to be remnants of the Maya nation which once built great cities in Southern Mexico.

## Hoover Plans To Relieve Crowded Federal Prisons

New Program Contemplated By President Includes Request For Additional Funds From Congress

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—(P)—President Hoover has determined upon a program to relieve overcrowded conditions in federal prisons which includes a request to congress for additional funds.

The program contemplates an increase in appropriations of \$5,000,000 for enlargement of the prison at Atlanta and Leavenworth and construction of a new prison in the northeastern section of the country.

Mr. Hoover has discussed the situation at length with Attorney General Mitchell and Sanford Bates, superintendent of federal prisons, and has statistics to show that the Atlanta institution is housing 120 per cent more inmates than its estimated capacity and Leavenworth 87 per cent.

This condition is regarded as a cause of demoralization and outbreaks of the prisoners. The large prison population, it was said, was attributed to an increase in crime in general which caused the president to appoint the commission now making an inquiry into the law enforcement situation.

Statistics which have been presented to the president show that 33 per cent of the prisoners at Leavenworth and Atlanta are serving terms for violations of the narcotic laws, 14 per cent for violations of the prohibition laws, and the remainder for other offenses.

## Reward Vote

## Oklahoma To Join Texas In Building Of Three Bridges

Red River Will Be Spanned At Points Where Traffic Is Heaviest; Both States To Cooperate

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 6.—(P)—The Oklahoma Highway commission will join Texas in building as soon as possible three bridges across Red river at points where traffic is heaviest, members of the commission said today.

The bridges will be located between Durant and Denison, at Gainesville, and at Terrell. After plans are drawn up and approved by both the Texas and Oklahoma commissions, bids will be received. Engineers were at work today on the details.

May Buy Tells "The fact that we are planning construction of new bridges across Red River," said S. C. Boswell, commission member, "does not prevent toll bridge companies now operating from offering to sell us their property."

Although their attention is centered on the three bridges bearing the heaviest traffic, the commissioners also will consider buying or building bridges at other points along the boundary.

Oklahoma and Texas each will provide \$400,000 to give motorists free travel across the river. It is probable that not more than \$600,000 will be spent at the three main points and that \$200,000 or more will be left for bridges at other points.

## Poisoning Claims Life At Houston

Ennis Woman Found Dead As Funeral Arrangements Made For Another Who Died Of Pistol Wound

HOUSTON, Aug. 6.—(P)—While funeral services were being arranged today for Mrs. C. O'Meara, 32, of Houston, who died of a pistol shot wound last night, Mrs. J. R. Hester, 44, of Ennis, was found dead at the rear of her brother's home in Kensington addition here.

Mrs. Hester left a note 'hiding her relatives' good-bye. Justice Campbell Overstreet said poison caused her death.

Suicide Is Verdict A verdict of suicide was returned in Mrs. O'Meara's death. Several days ago she received considerable publicity when she was the bride in an airplane wedding over Lake Charles, La. A short time later Mrs. O'Meara had the marriage annulled.

Barnard is her pilot, and Bob Little, her engineer and second pilot.

## Corn Bread Menu At Camp Palacios

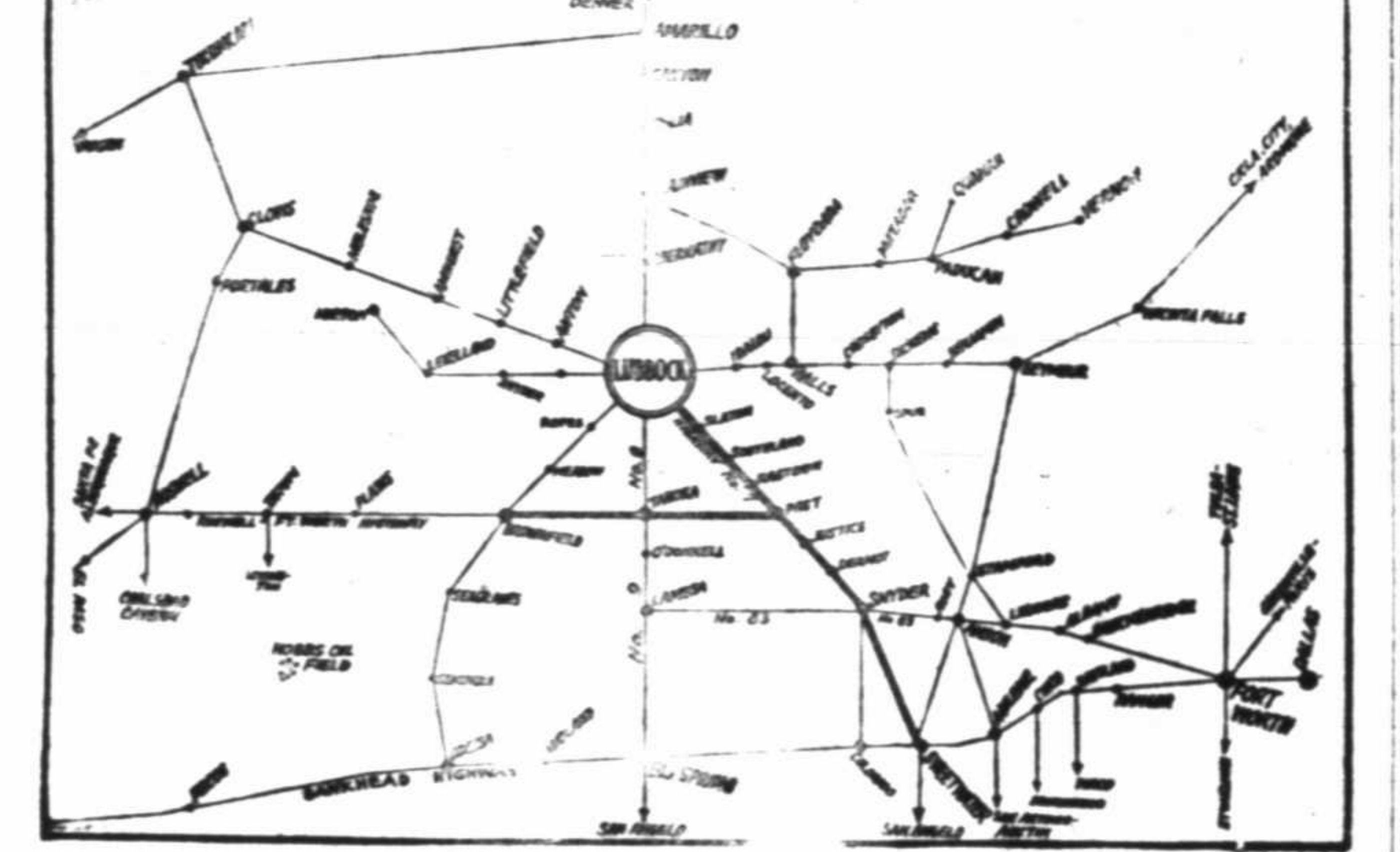
