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Agreement with developer in question

Interpretation of law brings up potential problem

Last month, the Mitchell County Commissioners approved an agreement with River Bend Development Group, a land development company out of Aledo. The court agreed to give the developers two pieces of land, one in an area east of Sonic Drive-In and another across I-20 from the Wallace and Ware Units.

Commissioners sought bids through the Board of Economic Development for the two county-owned properties, and the proposal by River Bend was recommended to commissioners by BOED representatives. Two other bids were also received as part of the bidding process.

On Monday, BOED Director Sue Young came before the commissioners again to discuss a potential problem recently brought to the attention of the economic development. Though no details were given in open court, it was apparent that the county has been notified that legalities of the arrangement to give land to River Bend have come into question.

Most land developers often ask for tax abatements or other incentives, but River Bend requested only one thing from the court: the county give the land to the development company. That's where the details get sticky.

County officials have been informed that the agreement to give the land to the company may be illegal.

Young told commissioners that the economic development board had recommended entering into a contract in good faith, and though using incentives, such as land deeds have come into question, the board stands behind its recommendation.

"We still believe we have done the right thing," Young said. As of Monday, commissioners had not signed a contract with River Bend. She said that River Bend had been recommended because the company was ready to

Bucking bulls, flying cowboys in town this week

Have you ever wanted to see a real, live bull riding event? If you said yes, this weekend is your chance. Preparations are being made for the 2nd annual Kerry Bradbury Memorial Bull Riding, and the event will raise funds for several organizations that serve Mitchell County.

The bull riding will be held Saturday, July 13th at the Mitchell County Rodeo Grounds, and all proceeds raised will benefit the fire departments of Colorado City, Westbrook and Loraine, as well as the Mitchell County EMS. The gate opens at 7 p.m., and the action kicks off at 8 p.m.

Experience may reign the arena on Saturday. According to Lynn Bradbury, participants riding in the event will be 35 years or older and members of the World Senior Professional Bull Riders. There will be approximately 30 riders participating in the event, and all will get a chance to ride in the preliminaries. A shoot out will be held following the prelims, where the top five riders will ride again to determine the overall winner.

XXXX Bucking Bulls out of Fort Worth will provide the bulls and other livestock for the event. Along with the animals, the company will also provide

two bullfighters. Unlike traditional bull fighters, these fighters will be more like bouncers whose mission is to protect the riders at all times.

The winning bull rider receives a cash prize for his performance, but Lynn said that an anonymous donor upped the ante this weekend. The donor contacted show organizers and pledged to donate another \$1,000 to be awarded to the winner of the event.

Cost will be \$5 at the gate for those 13 years old and over and \$3 for those 12 and under. A full concession stand will be available. Briskets, donated by Fuller Foods, will be smoked and served in the stand on Saturday.

The bull riding idea was first hatched to help raise money to cover the funeral expenses of Kerry Bradbury, Lynn's brother. After the event was held, Lynn received many calls from people who enjoyed the event and volunteered to help with a future bull riding, so he decided to get a group of volunteers together and hold another one and give back to the communities that had first supported his family.

This year's event will raise money to help the county's fire departments and emergency

CRP contract problem resolved by commissioners

Local Farm Service Agency representative Keith Hiser brought a solution to a potential problem before county commissioners on Monday during their regular meeting.

Hiser said that land purchased by the county from a pair of sisters is currently part of a CRP contract with the USDA. The previous owners have been receiving CRP payments on the

land for 13 years, and the sale of the land brings about complications. The land is being used for construction of the desalination plant.

Payments totaling \$104,000 have been and continue to be paid to the previous owners, but now the sisters are in breach of their contract with the federal government if they continue to participate in the CRP program.

Because of the contract breach, the ladies are now looking at having to repay the entire amount, but he offered a solution which the commissioners found agreeable. Hiser suggested that the county assume the CRP contract, negating the necessity for repayment by the previous owners.

Ultimately, Hiser had to leave

Fun in the sun is done!

There was no shortage of fun last week, as the Chamber of Commerce and Community Development people put on a day's worth of entertainment for all on July 4th.

Activities kicked off early, as the 51st Annual J.O. Dockrey Fly-In was held at the Colorado City Airport. The City National Bank cooks served breakfast to almost 500 people, and more than 30 planes landed to the delight of the large crowd attending.

Several plaques, donated by Fuller Foods, were awarded during a ceremony emceed by Nancy Masters. Following the Pledge of Allegiance, Masters pronounced the fly-in as "taking a stand for freedom."

Ted Bergdorf of Scoggins was presented two plaques. At 85 1/2 years old, he received the award for Oldest Pilot, and he also received a plaque for Farthest Distance Traveled. Lynn Hobbs was awarded a plaque for Most Unusual Aircraft with his Light Sport.

Jack Duncan and Jeff Smith, both

of Abilene, shared the award for Oldest Plane. Each of the men landed planes built in 1946.

After a break for lunch and rest, Independence Day activities relocated to Ruddick Park. There were bounce houses for the kids, washer and horse-shoe pitching tournaments, and several groups had booths selling items to raise funds for their organizations.

The crowd-pleaser of the day was the hot dog eating contest held in the east pavilion. Nine contestants participated in the race, trying to eat as many hot dogs as possible within 10 minutes.

Kelly Phillips, former member of the local EMS, was crowned the 2013 Mitchell County Hot Dog Eating Champion after downing 11 hot dogs in 10 minutes.

The competition was based on the national hot dog eating contest, Nathan's Hot Dog Eating Contest, held on Coney Island and televised annually on ESPN. This year's winner of

the national competition, Joey Chestnut, managed to eat 69 hot dogs in 10 minutes, breaking his own record of 68 set back in 2009. Chestnut has won the contest seven years in a row.

Contestants participating in the local hot dog eating contest and their total number of dogs eaten were: Kelly Phillips, 11; Jesse Hernandez, 10; Shaun Rees, 8; Michael Hernandez, 7; Austyn Rivera, 7; Jody Raschke, 3; Savannah Phillips, 2; Marcus Monroe, 2; and Tyler Rivera, 2.

Many teams participated in the washer tournament in the park, as well. Victor Ramirez and Junior Hernandez took home 1st place bragging rights and Dan and Ryan Gainey placed 2nd.

Sales tax holiday is Aug. 9-11

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reminds shoppers they can save money on certain items priced under \$100 during the state's annual sales tax holiday. This year, the sales tax holiday is scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 9-11.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales tax, which could

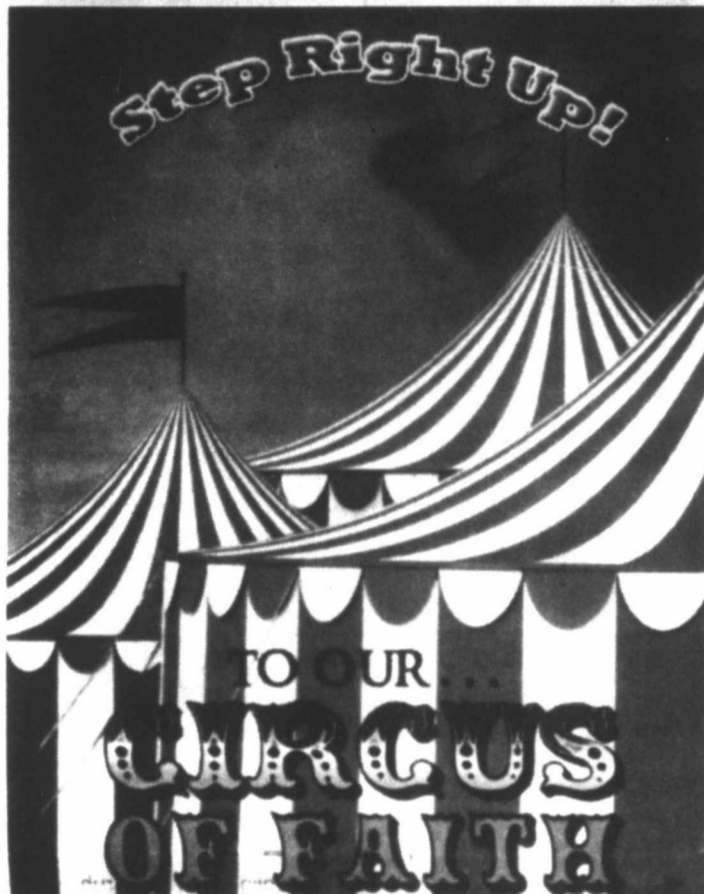
save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

"Texas families can take advantage of the sales tax holiday when doing their back-to-school shopping," Combs said. "The tax holiday applies to a variety of items ranging from pens to jeans to help shoppers around Texas save some of their hard earned money."

Lists of apparel and school supplies that may be purchased tax free can be found on the Comptroller's website at www.TexasTaxHoliday.org.

This year, shoppers will save an estimated \$74.1 million in state and local sales taxes during the Sales Tax Holiday.

The dates for the tax holiday weekend are established by the Legislature in the state tax code. The sales tax holiday has been an annual event since 1999.

proceed with development plans right away. One of the other companies had planned a year-long feasibility study before putting any plans into operation.

County Commissioner Randy Anderson said that the legality of the agreement depends on the interpretation of the law.

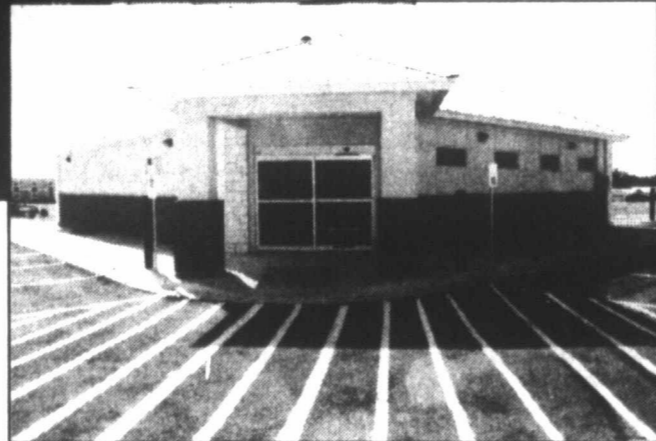
After some discussion on the next steps to be taken, the court decided to table any further action until legal counsel could be sought. County Judge Ray Mayo will contact Bickerstaff Heath Delgado and Acosta, a law firm out of Austin, for an opinion on how to proceed.

County Commissioner Jeremy Strain underlined the urgency for timeliness on the matter. "We don't want to miss out on \$6 million worth of hotels (and other businesses)" he said. "He (Chuck Kimbrough, attorney) has to understand we can't wait a month."

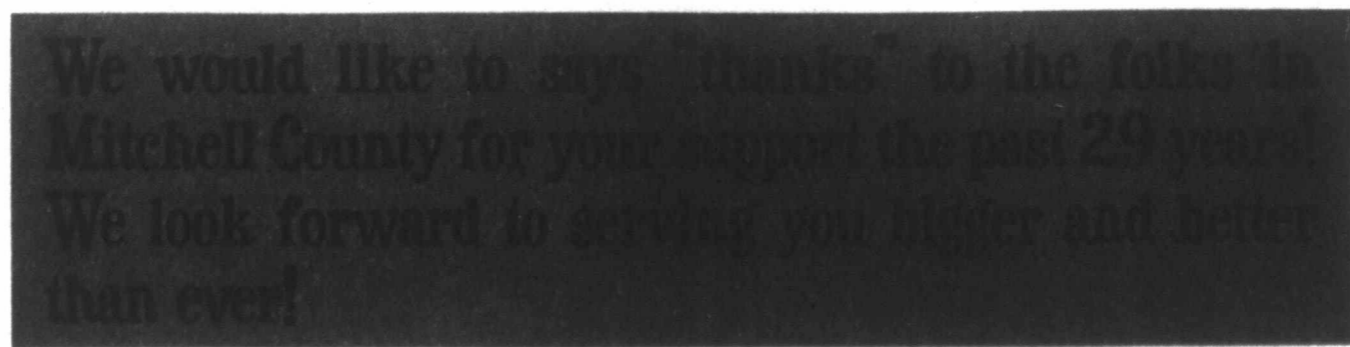
According to Young, incentives like the deedling of land have been used in the past to draw businesses to the area. "We have our hands tied and can't compete if we can't incentivize," she said.

TUMBLEWEED SMITH

Jan Hart is a professional patient

Scott and White Hospital in Temple is the home of A & M's Medical School. It's a training ground for doctors and patients. Jan Hart is known as a standardized patient.

"I have a script. And I'm supposed to play like I have some terrible malady that the residents or medical students must diagnose and figure out how to treat it. The exercise helps them learn how to communicate with patients and develop a pleasing bedside manner. They also learn how to do a proper physical exam. This is very satisfying to me to know that I'm doing something that will help my future physician treat me."

Jan has had some terrible maladies.

"The first I had was a terrible rash around my midsection. As soon as I got the script for it, I knew it was shingles. I had to act like it was very painful. The medical student would have to come in and find out what kind of pain I was having, where did it hurt, what did the skin look like. They would have to find out exactly what it was and then suggest a treatment."

The standardized patients have a training period. Once they get to the training area, they practice the script sent by email. They already know the background of their problems. There are several standardized patients and so far Jan has not had the same medical student see her more than once. She says if she keeps doing it she's bound to see some of the same ones.

"If and when that happens, they'll probably be amazed that I survived the last disease."

Jan has been doing this three years. She gets paid to act like she's sick.

"Even if I didn't get paid I think I would do it because I really enjoy it. It's a little acting job. The meeting with the doctor is usually recorded on video and there is usually someone watching in the control room. If the patients are misdiagnosed, the students get help when they have a review and look at the video."

The medical students have just a certain amount of time to spend with each patient before going to the next one. Sometimes the meetings are done in an office, sometimes in a room with the patient wearing a hospital gown.

"There might be three or four of us doing the same thing in different exam rooms, so that when the twenty students come in, one will come into my room, another will go to the next one and so on. The standardized part is that we all have the same answers to their questions."

Jan must be doing things right because she is getting more and more calls.

"Either they're getting more cases or they really really like me."

Jan is in good health.

Why do pencils have erasers, when pens don't?

Noma and I like to work word games. We buy a box of the outdated magazines from PennyPress at least twice a year. We even have found a favorite mechanical pencil from Papermate that writes well and has a fabulous eraser. When we make a mistake, it can be erased with no smudges or smears. We buy them by the box, too. We use pencils to work the puzzles because we are bound to make mistakes, and have to change directions, or a word or definition and start over. We do not use pens to work puzzles, because the mistakes are permanent.

Mistakes are something every person is bound to make. The ones you can fix or "erase" could be like written in pencil. The ones that become permanent are like those written with a pen, or inscribed in stone. They are there forever.

The best way to eliminate a mistake is to first of all admit you've made it. "Something is just not right here", or

"I take full blame for what happened." Then to erase that mistake there can be no better words than "I'm sorry." Then after that confession must come the determination not to make the same mistake again. It does no good to erase a mistake and then fill in the square or line with the same wrong word again.

Those mistakes made by a pen are more serious and cannot be easily erased or covered over. I get letters written with a pen. When a mistake is made it is lined through or covered with a big swirl of the pen and is very obvious. That does not make the letter unreadable, but it is messy. Mistakes, harsh words, drastic actions or attempts at retaliation are errors that cannot be erased. They leave a permanent smudge or distortion on a life or situation.

Mistakes made in typing are another matter. Remember the old round eraser with the little black brush that we used on the old typewritten manuscripts? They not only were inadequate to get

rid of the typo, but left a smudge as well. It is so nice to have the computer, which spots not only misspelled words, but questionable grammar or meanings as well. It is also nice to have the "delete" and "back" buttons to correct as you go.

Maybe the spell-check on the computer could be compared to a conscience. It points out the wrongs as we go along. However, if we chose to override the suggested correction, then the end product will have glaring errors. The computer does not make us write the right thing. It just points out the error and gives us a choice.

Admitting a mistake, even saying you are sorry, does not eliminate the mistake, it just lessens the impact. It would be wonderful to have a "delete" button on our lives so that anything that goes wrong could be instantly corrected and never show up at all.

Pencils have erasers. People have apologies. Use them.

the decision up to the court. "We can't make you guys assume the contract," he said.

Because the county is a government entity, payments cannot be paid on the contract that expires in September. In addition, assuming the contract means that the land must be left idle which could result in the delay of construction of the power plant.

BOED Director Sue Young said that the project has been given an extension due to the lack of turbine components being available from General Dynamics. She suggested that the entire project could be put on hold until October 1st.

Hiser told commissioners that the land could be purchased out of the CRP lease in small increments, such as 1/10 of an acre for the low price of \$668 per acre. After purchasing a portion of the lease, the land could be used for construction or any other use.

Commissioners gave their unanimous approval to assume the CRP contract on the land.

In other action, the court approved the seeking of bids for road base materials. Last month, two bids were received for the road materials, and both were rejected. Commissioners expressed their desire to be able to seek bids by precinct and change some of the specifications required.

Proposals will again be sought for road base materials, and the same specifications will be used in the bidding process.

The weight limit restriction on 1150 feet of County Road 145 was approved by commissioners. Robert Cox requested the limit be raised from 20 tons to 40 tons on the small section of road to facilitate the use of his water sales business.

Mitchell County will be getting a new extension agent since commissioners approved the hiring of Audra Graves as County Extension Agent-Family Consumer Science. Graves will be taking the position vacated nine months ago by Mary McMullen.

Graves is a recent graduate of Texas Tech University, and comes from Perryton. After a stringent 30-day training, she will begin her duties officially in the middle of August.

A contract for geotech testing services was approved, as part of the necessary testing regarding the FGE Texas power plant. The testing will be performed by Terracon of Midland, the only company to submit a bid for the testing. Total cost will be \$12,584.

Commissioners voted to submit a Reverse Osmosis Pilot exemption report. The exemption will allow the county to submit the RO report without pump-

ing millions of gallons of water out onto the ground. Instead, the report will be made using statistics gained by utilizing a model owned by Bob Johnson and Associates, the county's water treatment experts.

Use of the model will cost approximately \$58,000 which will be paid for by grant funds. The model program also expedites the process of compiling the report.

Only one bid was received for land behind the Steve Smith, CPA, office. The \$5,501 bid by Ricky Heady was approved. Bids will be taken on property owned by the county in the 200 block of Locust and will be opened on August 5th.

Notice was given to the court that the Loraine Senior Citizens organization is disbanding and turning over the building used in the Loraine to the county. When the county takes possession of the structure and property, the entity will become responsible for its maintenance.

The building is used as a voting location, as well as a location for many event in Loraine. County Clerk Debby Carlock agreed to look into possible alternative voting locations in case commissioners decide to sell the property.

Before adjourning, Young told

commissioners that she has been attending Cline Shale meetings around the area. During the last gathering, a representative from Devon Energy reported that the company has acquired permits for 32 wells but none of the permits are for locations in Mitchell County.

Nonetheless, experts were encouraging and said that the oil expansion will come to this area as technology advances are making drilling in the local shale formation possible.

The court recessed after an hour and a half-long meeting, reconvening for an executive session at 1 p.m. According to the agenda, the court spoke with legal counsel regarding a conflict of interest of the county attorney regarding the economic development agreement with FGE Texas, LLC. Mayo said no action was taken on the subject.

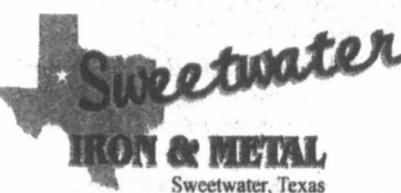

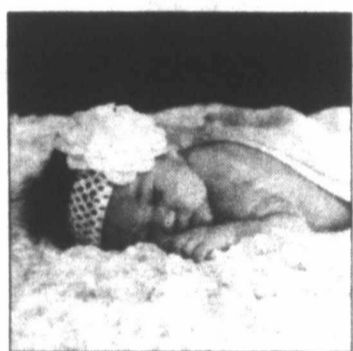

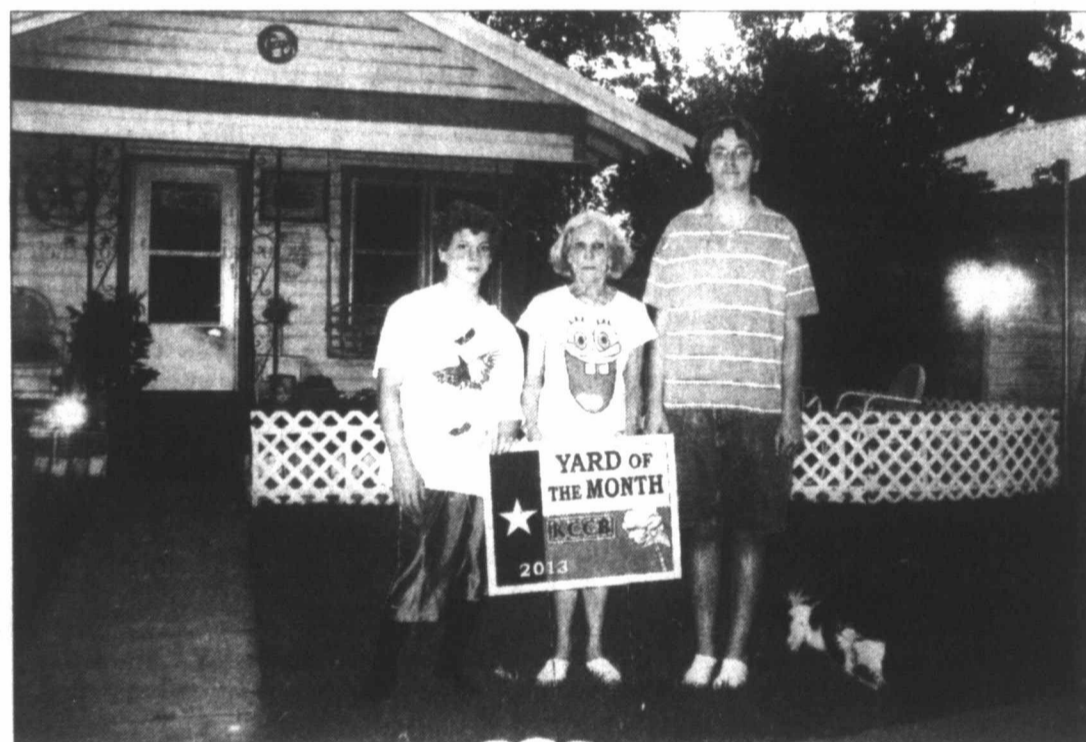

Jill said the experiences of other families who were dealing with the same challenges she was going through in her daily life provided a support that helped both her and Travis deal with those challenges head-on.

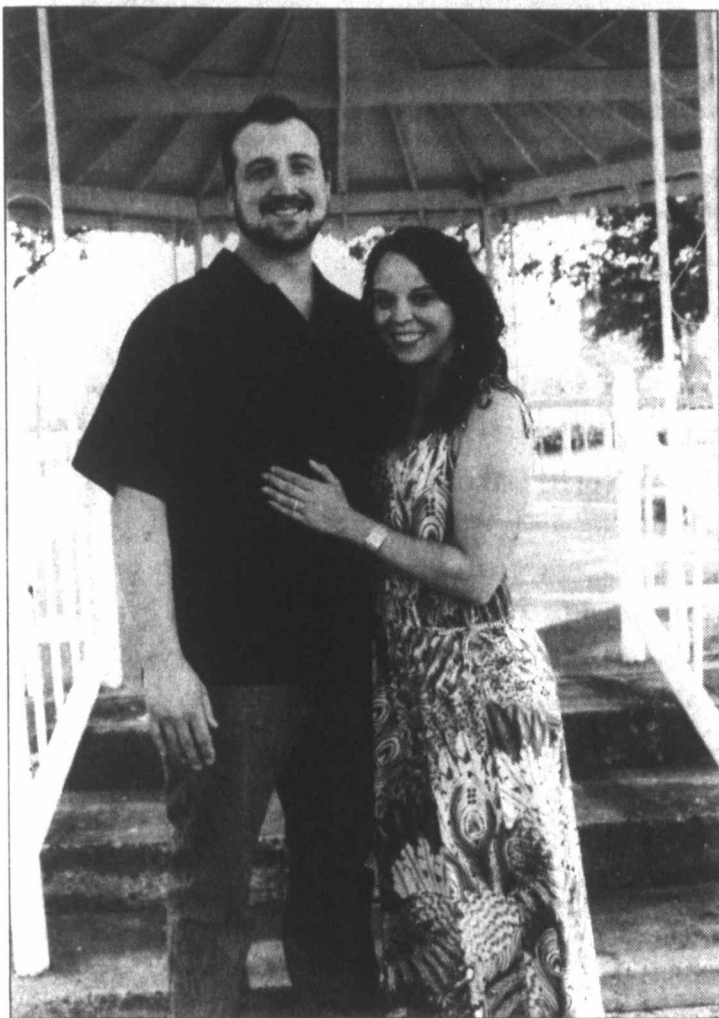

("Sharyland Utilities"), a regulated electric utility company, filed an application with the Commission entitled *Application of Sharyland Utilities, L.P. to Establish Retail Delivery Rates, Approve Tariff for Retail Delivery Service, and Adjust Wholesale Transmission Rate* ("Application").

The Application is based on a twelve-month test year ending December 31, 2012, and supports a retail distribution base rate revenue requirement of \$75,116,884. The primary purpose of this proceeding is to establish tariffs that will set the nonbypassable rates retail electric providers will be charged for delivery of electricity from the retail electric provider to the customer in order to transition to retail competition. The rates are to be effective on May 1, 2014, or ninety (90) days after Sharyland Utilities files its tariffs to implement the final Commission order approving the rates, whichever is later. The Application also supports rates sufficient to recover a revenue requirement of \$26,941,935, including amounts recovered through riders, for wholesale transmission service.

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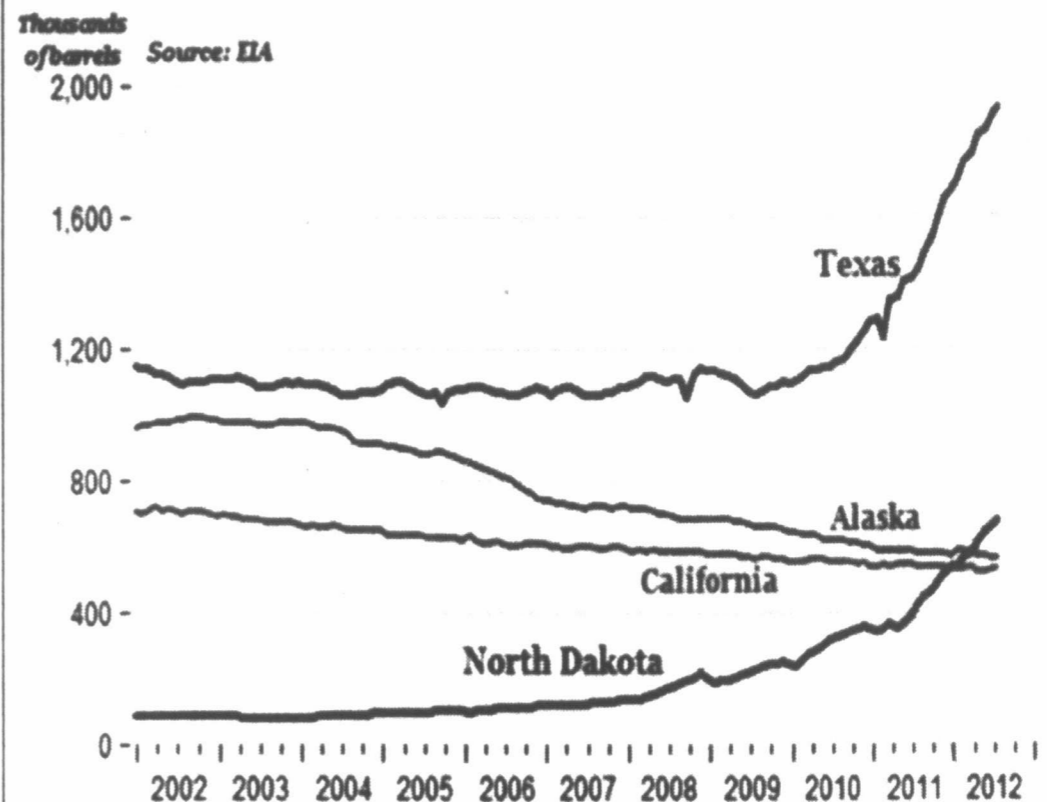

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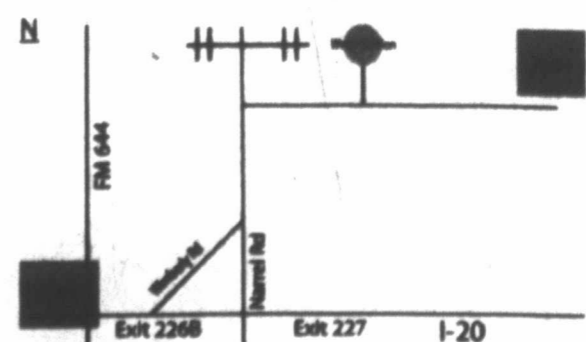

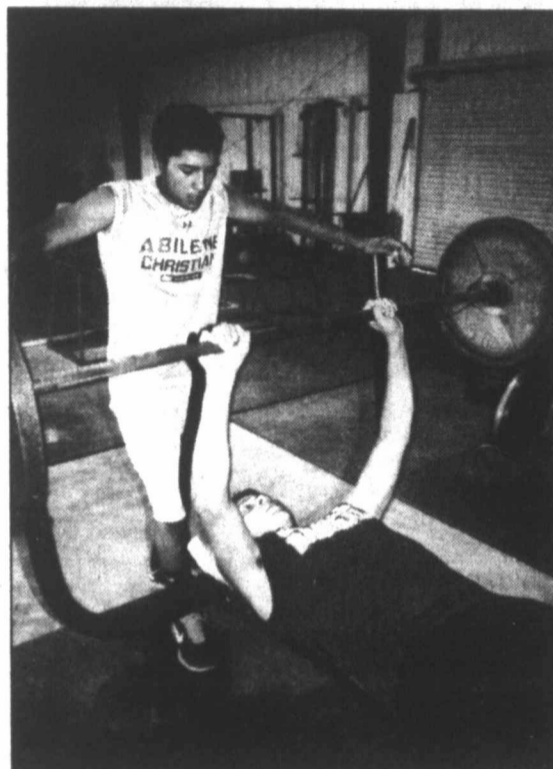

advance according to the magazine.

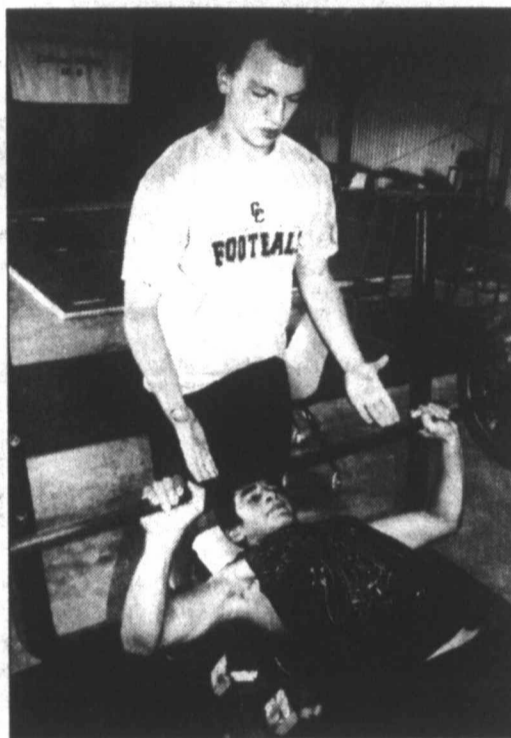

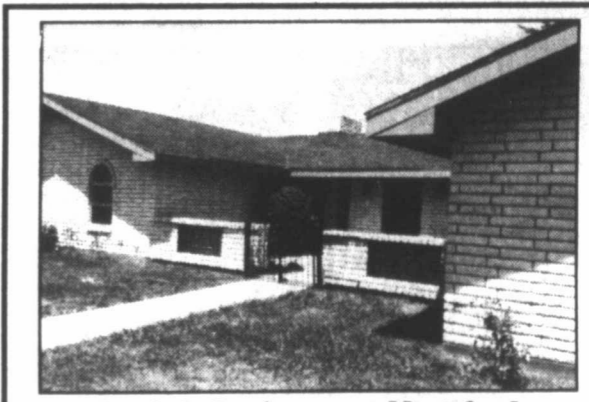

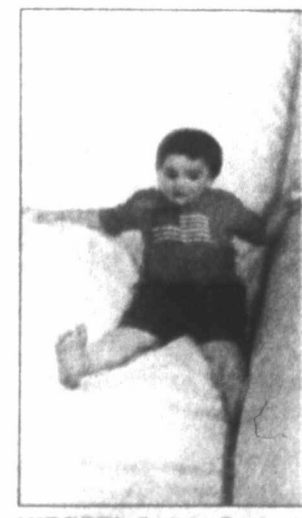
