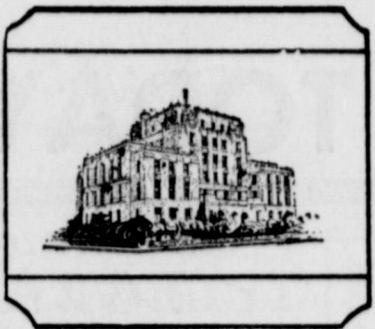

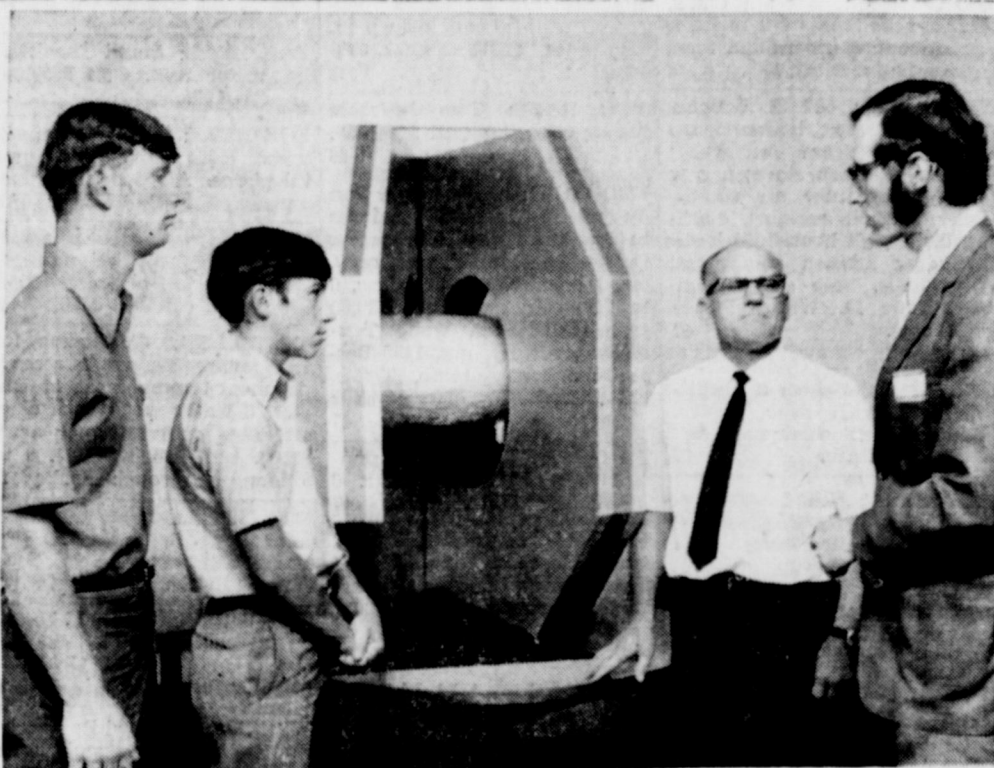

2 Eastland Women on Criswell Holy Land Tour

Mrs. H. W. Sims (Lucile) and Mrs. Adele Whitten met Thursday, June 10, at the JFK International Airport in New York, N. Y., with 400 other members for the "Dr. W. A. Criswell Holy Land Tour."

"In the ancient Roman province of Asia we shall visit the seven churches of the Apocalypse and we shall hold services at each site.

"On the Isle of Patmos we shall meet in memory of the Sainted Apostle John, who was given the visions of the second coming of our Lord.

"In Israel we shall meet on the Mount of Beatitudes above the Lake of Galilee and hold a service in praise of the Lone Galilean. Likewise we shall meet at Calvary, at the Holy Sepulchre, at Bethlehem,

American Flag Wished Happy 194th Birthday In Saturday Ceremony

America's national rallying spirit, the Stars and Stripes, was honored in Eastland Saturday at the 15th Annual Flag Day Celebration on the Post Office lawn.

Military and civilian personnel joined in paying tribute to the Colors. A 21-gun salute was a new feature this year as military men from Fort Wolters joined in helping Eastlanders show their patriotism. A color guard and full band joined in the celebration. A band-led parade first went down Main St. and around the square, returning to the Post Office for the official ceremonies.

The Rev. Haston Brewer, pastor First Baptist Church, gave the invocation, and Mayor Pro Tem W. Q. Verner extended the city's official welcome. Presentation of colors to the color guard was by Mrs. Marene Johnson, former postmaster and prime mover of all Flag Day Events. Pledge of Allegiance was led by Supt. Wendell Siebert and Attorney Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. introduced the guest speaker, Lt. Col. John B. Holder, assistant secretary of the Army Primary Helicopter School at Fort Wolters.

Members of the VFW Post and Auxiliary served refreshments on the lawn following the ceremony. Boy Scout and Girl Scout Troops and Little League members, all in uniform, joined in the patriotic celebration. Rev. Eugene Williams, pastor First Christian Church gave the benediction.

(ED. NOTE: This is the text of Col. John Holder's Flag Day speech in Eastland.)

It is indeed a pleasure to join you in commemorating the 194th birthday of our flag of the United States of America — and what is even more pleasurable is witnessing and being around Americans like you here in Eastland that remember and care enough for our American Heritage to do something about it. It is very inspirational. Most all Americans have a certain amount of patriotism and certainly will meet the call in defense of our country should the need arise; however, during times of prosperity and military engagements, short of all-out war, many are prone to forget and do very little to let those both past and present that have made our country the greatest nation in the world. If some of us here today are in that category, I'm sure we will be motivated by your enthusiasm to do something about our forgetfulness.

In my job at Fort Wolters, we sit down each quarter and sort of take stock of things. We review and analyze what we have done — what we are presently doing — and what we are going to do — I would like to use that method to briefly express my thoughts in regard to our flag, our Armed Forces, and our country.

Cisco, Eastland Commissions Meet, Discuss Common Problems

A new dimension in community cooperation has been achieved with the meeting of the Eastland and Cisco City Commissions this week.

The Eastland Commission hosted an informal luncheon meeting at the White Elephant Restaurant Thursday and common problems and projects were discussed.

Future expansion of the projects to include other neighboring government bodies is planned and will be announced.

Cisco officials included Mayor Doug Fry, City Commissioners Vernon Honea and Wayne Webb, City Secretary Sutton Crofts and Cisco Chamber of Commerce Manager Gene Abbott.

Representing Eastland were Mayor James Reid, Commissioners Dale Bakker and H. V. O'Brien, and City Manager Lewis Tiner.

First, where have we been? One hundred ninety-six years ago — on June 14, 1775 — our first official army was formed, and we all know that 194 years ago — on June 14, 1777 — that our flag was adopted as a visible symbol of our new spirit of freedom. It has also served as a record of our heritage and a national rallying point. From the revolutionary war through the War of 1812, The Mexican War, The Civil War, The Spanish American War, Two world Wars, the Korean War and Viet Nam War, it has represented the unity and pride of our people and the courage and sacrifice of our men and women in uniform. Our nation is the only nation that does not dip our colors to royalty. England dips their flag to the ground in the presence of the Queen, for instance. We are the only country that has a national anthem to our flag. We also have certain laws regarding courtesies that will be rendered to our flag. We have the highest esteem for our flag of any country in the world. And our Armies have never come up second best.

That is where we have been — where are we today? I feel that we are in an era that at times seems pretty confusing — what is important? What is the truth? We have problems today that we have never before faced. The war in Vietnam — A new word, Ecology problems, pollution, over-population — our very democratic process is being tested. The requirement for an all volunteer army — seemingly not working. Sometimes it seems that the rights of one individual deny the rights of many — disrespect for authority seems more prevalent, and crime rates are higher than ever. Drug abuse and racial tension are other problems.

So — where are we going? What are we going to do?

First of all, most of our problems are caused by a very small segment of the population. We have more visibility of our problems today because of quicker and better communication systems and news media. So, we hear about these problems more often — and sometimes we don't get the complete story. We are beginning to hear more of the other side, though. There is a definite plan to end the war in Vietnam, and the outlook for the end of the war is better than ever. The outlook for an all volunteer army is looking better. Some of you may disagree with me on this point. I would like to digress on that for a moment if I may.

The objective is to have an all volunteer army. In order to achieve this, there are three intermediate goals — these are: First, develop a more professional and efficient army; second, remove the irritants, pay a decent wage, and provide good facilities and housing, and good equipment; third, improve our public image. The overall plan is a very good one; however, the publicity has sorta gotten the cart before the horse. You have heard. I am sure about beer in the mess hall, longer hair, rap sessions, etc., however, have you heard of the new standards that are being required of our officers and non-commissioned officers?

We must attain certain promotions by a certain time in the service, or cut we go — we must attend certain schools — more emphasis is being placed on good leadership qualities, and more training in that area is being given. Leadership

THE GORDON SPOT

By DE GORDON, County Agricultural Agent

Several people have asked us if this is the best time of year to prune large trees. The best time to prune is in late winter or in early spring while the trees are dormant, because rapid healing of wounds occurs in early spring. Summer pruning of large trees is not advisable since the trees are likely to bleed.

If large limbs must be removed during the summer, they should be cut smoothly next to the trunk so as not to leave a stub. The cut should be treated with a wound paint immediately. Unprotected stubs left on the tree are opportunities for insects, diseases, and decay. Drastic pruning such as that

done following storm damage, which usually involves the removal of much potential leaf surface, may seriously effect the food supply and weaken the trees.

Removal of large portions of the top of any tree may favor fungus and insect attacks, and also increase the possibility of bark scalding due to sudden exposure of the tender tissues to strong sun rays.

Summer pruning may be necessary when trees have been damaged by spring and summer storms. When this is necessary avoid skinning the bark from the trunk. This can be done by making three saw cuts—the first from the underside twelve to eighteen inches from the trunk. When the saw begins to bind from the limb weight, make a second cut on the top side about two inches beyond the first cut. This will allow the limb to fall without tearing the bark from the tree. The third cut then is made as near the trunk as possible to remove the remaining stub.

Be sure to treat the wound with a tree wound paint to seal out insects and disease causing organisms. Orange shellac is a good temporary dressing, but an asphalt dressing gives longer protection. They are available from nursery or garden supply centers.

Weakened crotches can be braced by inserting lag screws through the trunk at the base of the crotch and by installing cables in the top of the tree to aid in supporting the weight of the branches. This work should be done by a reputable tree repairman.

Now is the time to control bagworms in Eastland County. Bagworms, which normally infest cedar trees and shrubs, will attack almost any type of foliage that grows. Trees that were infested last year and still contain the old bags will normally be infested this year. Examine these very closely for bags, which are about 1/4 to 1/2 inch long and are covered with old leaf parts. This pest overwinters as eggs in the old bags and newly hatched larvae emerge from the base to begin feeding.

Bagworms may be controlled by spraying with one of the following: Malathion, toxaphene, lead arsenate and Sevin.

Bagworm larvae are easy to control on plants that are thoroughly covered with insecticide since the larvae will not only crawl across the insecticide, but also will eat some of the foliage that has the insecticide on it.

For people who do not want to use insecticides, handpicking and destroying the larvae by mechanically mashing or putting them in a garbage can in an enclosed container is an effective control.

Caution must be used in handling all insecticides.

The Fort Griffin Fandangle is a gentle satire of life at the famous western outpost of Ft. Griffin, Texas, and the lively and lusty town of Griffin which sprang up in the shadow of the fort. The fort was situated on a hilltop for protection from bands of marauding Indians. The town nestled between the bottom of the hill and the Clear Fork of the Brazos River; during the 1870's and 80's it was the scene of the wildest of westerns. Doc Holliday lived in Griffin before he went to Tombstone.

Doc Holliday spent a night in jail at Griffin for trying to burn down a hotel. Lottie Deno, the gracious lady of the gambling tables saw her lover shot to death there. Wyatt Earp, who came to visit Doc Holliday, stayed only a few days, remarking that "Griffin is too wild for me."

The Fandangle portrays the different facets of life in pioneer times — the soldiers; the saloon characters; the buffalo hunters who spent weeks hunting and skinning; the lonely cowboys who drove herds of longhorn cattle up the Western Trail to Abilene, Kansas; the mother who feared Indians, disease, loneliness; the children; the old folks, the Indians in their kingdom and in their realization that all was lost. The spectator is transported into yesteryear. He is there with history as it happened.

Since 1933 the Fort Griffin Fandangle has been recreating prairie history through pageantry and comedy and showing off Western style. During its six night summer run the Fandangle Prairie Theatre's 1600 seats are filled with people from all over the United States — people who find the show enchanting and return again to bring others with them.

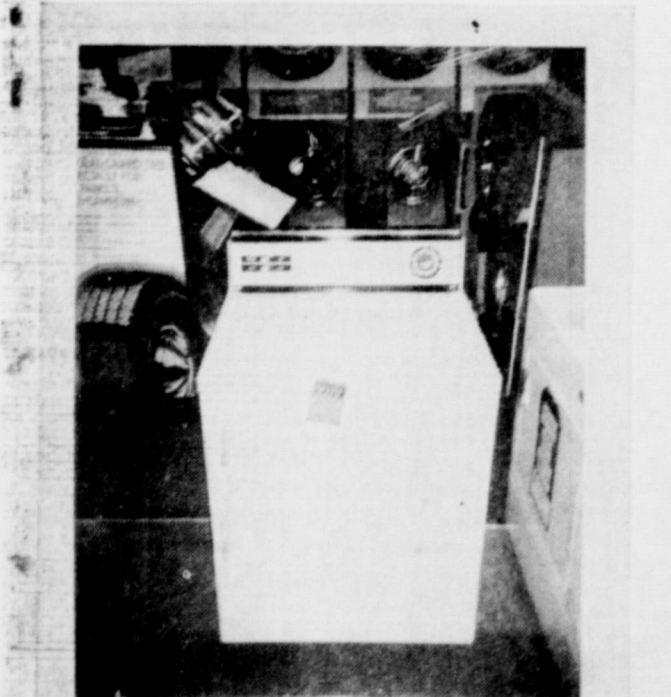
