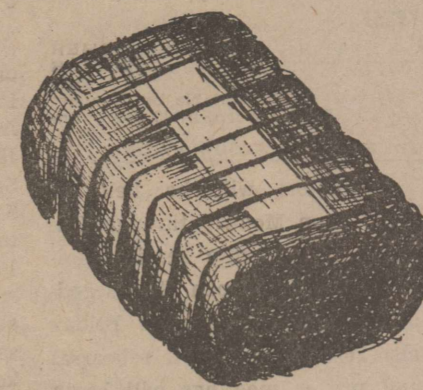
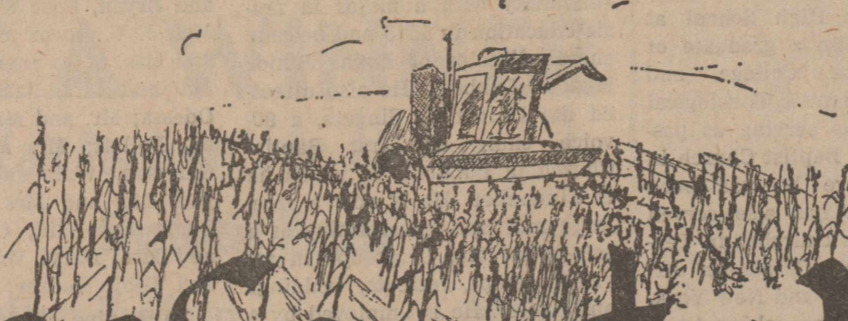
Burial was in the City of Lubbock Cemetery. Mr. Richardson died at 7:12 p.m. Sunday in West Texas Hospital following a brief illness.

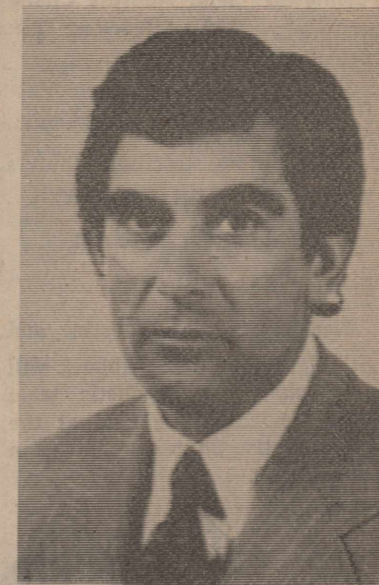

The Texas Tech University College of Engineering Friday, April 20, will present Distinguished Engineer Awards to four of its graduates, including Norman M. Jasper of Austin, a former Silverton resident.

Presentations will be made at a noon luncheon in the University Center Ballroom. Tickets are available to the public and reservations can be made by calling the office of the Dean, 806 742-3451.

The Distinguished Engineer Award, first presented in 1967, recognizes graduates of the Texas Tech College of Engineering who have become community leaders, as well as leaders in various engineering fields.

Jasper, now IBM account executive for the State of Texas, earned his Texas Tech industrial engineering degree in 1960 and has been chairman of the Industrial Engineering Department's advisory board.

He first worked for the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation and in 1962 joined Mason & Hanger, a division of the Silas-Mason Company as manager of quality engineering. He was a senior process engineer when he left Mason & Hanger to join IBM in 1967.

Silverton residents have been opening their hearts, closets and pocketbooks this week to help relieve the suffering of those in Wichita Falls who lost so much in the tornado early last week.

All of this brings back a flood of memories for Silverton residents who have themselves been tornado victims and know firsthand how much help from other communities can mean.

The project has been spear-

headed by Mrs. Clarice Douglas, and is being carried out by Silverton Rainbow Girls and Brownie Girl Scouts in cooperation with local residents.

Clothing, canned goods, household goods, furniture, etc. is being gathered at the Silverton City Hall, and money is being deposited in the First State Bank in a special account. All of this will be taken by truck, hopefully Saturday, to the disaster victims in Wichita Falls where approximately 20,000 have been left homeless.

It has been requested by the Red Cross working in Wichita Falls that everything being sent be clean (no water is available for washing clothes or anything) and be boxed and marked on the outside of the box as to what it is, what size it is, etc.

If you have anything you would donate, you may take it to Jerry Patton at the City Hall or call Mrs. Fred Hill, 823-2447, to have it picked up by the Rainbow Girls.

According to Red Cross workers, men's pants, shirts and underclothes are especially needed. The Brownies conducted a house-to-house drive for donations Tuesday afternoon. Donations of money may also be left at First State Bank.

## Crop, Livestock Reports Needed

During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the acreage devoted to the various crops and mid-year livestock numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

Crop and livestock reports provide a dependable, unbiased picture of Texas' most important industry—agriculture. The estimates in these reports are tools to help farmers and ranchers work out their planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing and marketing plans.

Farm organizations and legislatures use them in planning programs. The estimates are also used in establishing the various government program acreage and payment levels to farmers for the state and county.

Extension economists and private farm and ranch management consultants use them as a basis for advising farmers and ranchers.

Exporters use them in planning and promoting the sale of agricultural products abroad.

Prompt and accurate completing of the survey forms provides for more reliable estimates and helps to reduce survey costs.

All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

This is a cooperative effort of the USDA's Economics, Statistics and Cooperative Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

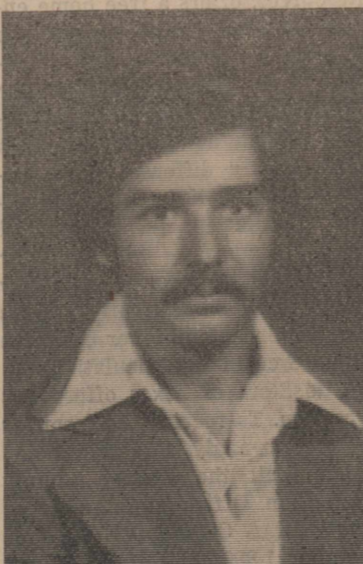
## Strange Elected To Board Of Directors of Bankers Assn.

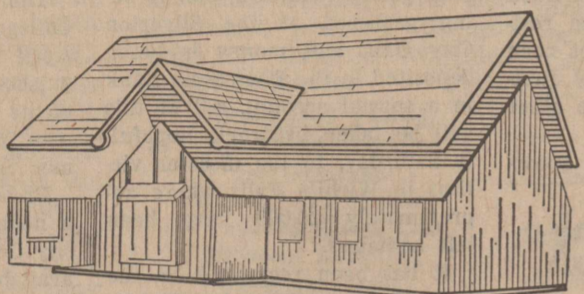

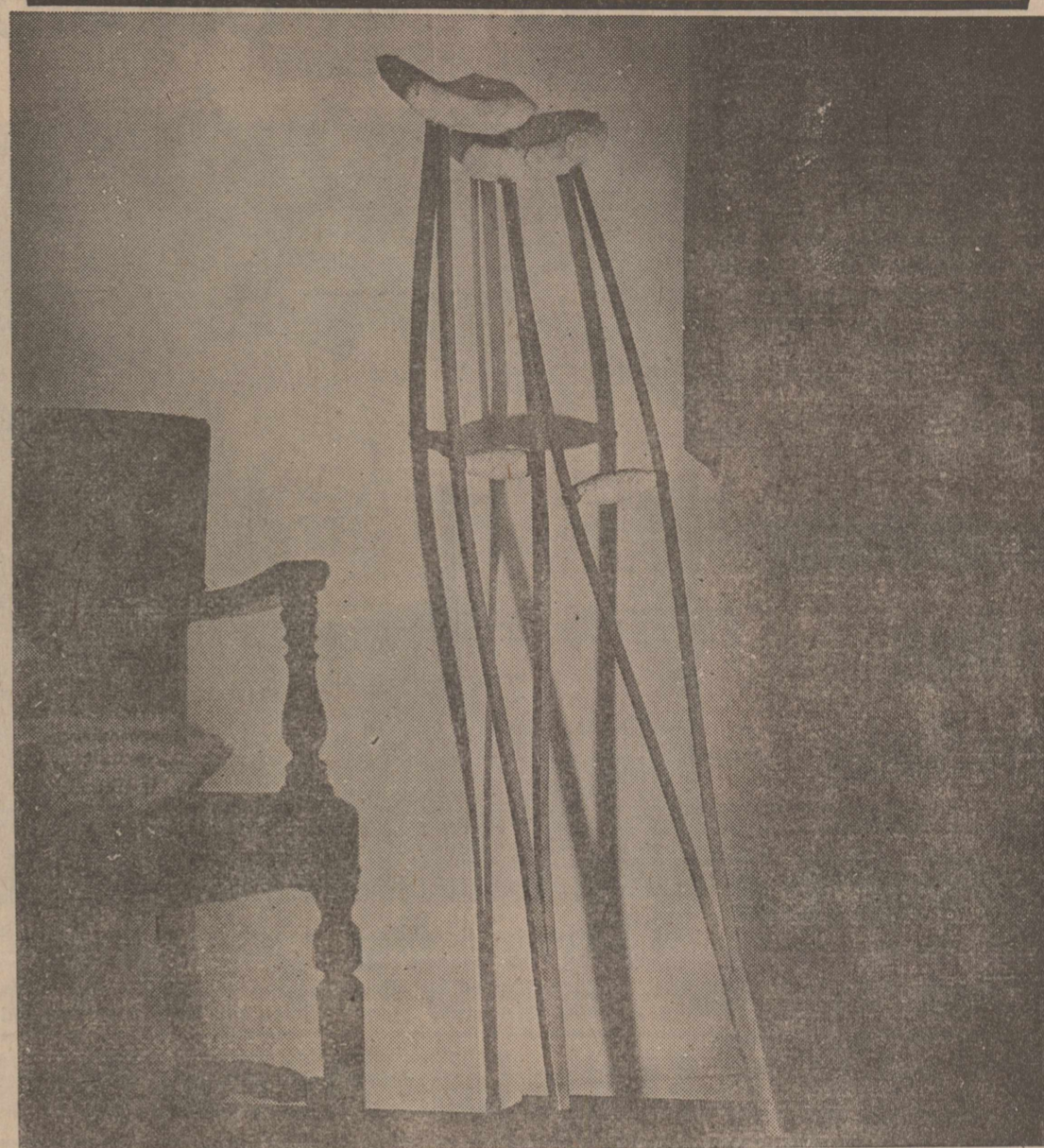

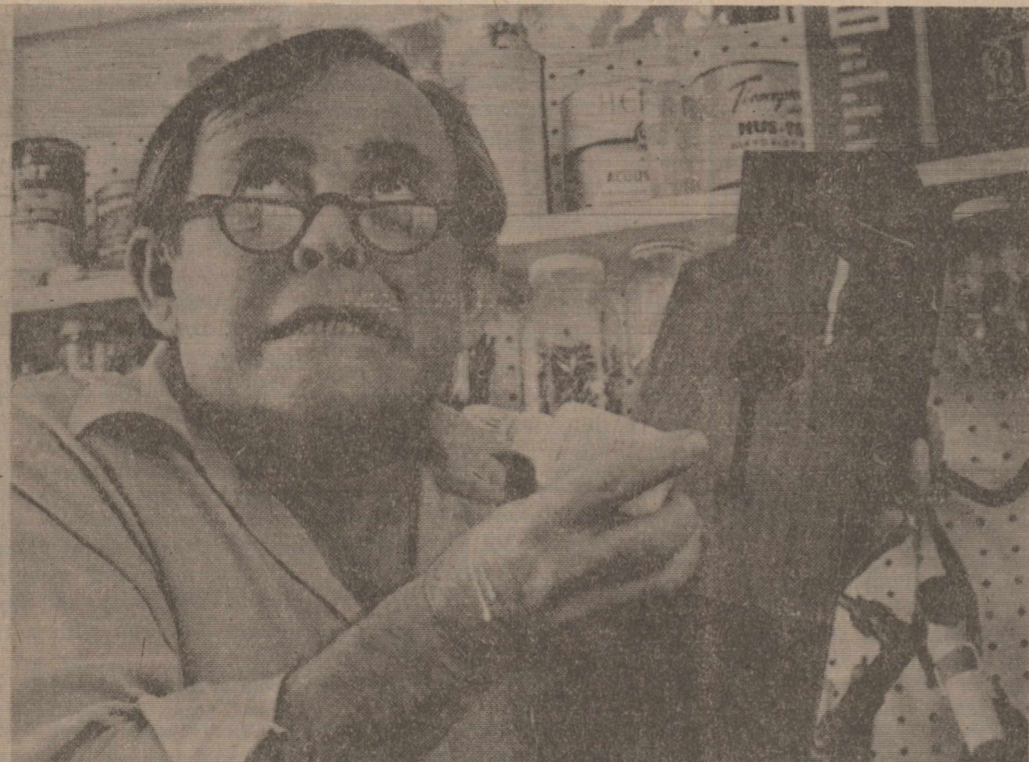
