The (8-2) (4-1) district 3-3A champion Colorado City Wolves head south to Ozona for a bi-district matchup with the (4-5) (3-2) district 4-3A runner-up Alpine Fightin' Bucks this Friday night at 7:30.

This marks the fourth consecutive year the Wolves

have entered post season play.

In 1995, 1997 and 1998 the Wolves entered the playoff as district champions and in 1996 were runner-up.

Head coach Gerald James, in his first year as Wolves head coach, has done an excellent job of guiding the Wolves into post season play.

The first round contest between C-City and Alpine will be a re-match of last year's first round game in which the Wolves burned the Bucks 56-30.

This season though, the Bucks face a much more balanced Wolf attack, perhaps more dependent upon a strong

passing attack than last year's edition.

And Alpine coach Ronny Stooksberry is very aware of that fact.

"We have got to stop Justin Hill and their passing game. Hill does an excellent job and has some great receivers," related Stooksberry.

"We're also going to have to stop #2 (Terry Green) if we expect to stop the pass," added the Bucks' coach.

Stopping the Wolves' passing attack may be a tall order for the Bucks as the Pack averaged 183 yards per game through the air this season.

## Coach James honored

With his team in the State UIL Playoffs in his first year as a head coach, Colorado Wolves Coach Gerald James has been named "Co-Coach of the Year" in District 3-3A.

He shares the honor with Coach Tim James of Lamesa (no relation).

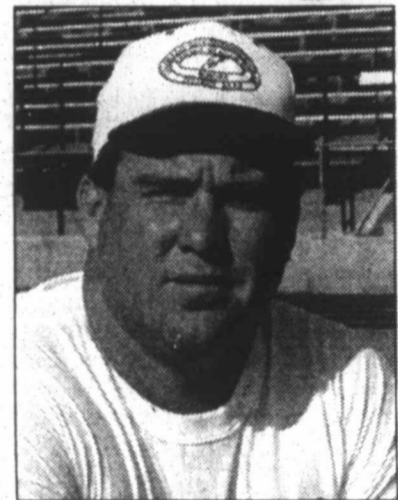
The selections were unanimous among other head coaches in the district, Army Salinas at Seminole, Steve Taylor at Denver City, Eddie Hooper at Brownfield and Louie Spinks at Slaton.

Coach James was well-seasoned when he came to Colorado City three years ago from Haltom City, near Fort Worth.

He was defensive coordinator and tight ends coach for Head Coach Bill Grissom here.

Coach Grissom moved to Coleman last summer, and Colorado City school board members named Coach James head football coach and athletic director to succeed him.

He worked for eight years in Haltom City, where he coached the varsity receivers, linebackers and defensive linemen and

served as defensive coordinator.

In discussing his teams' frequent winning efforts, Coach Grissom often cited Coach James' input and recommendations for halftime adjustments.

He recommended Coach James as his replacement after winning the District 4-3A title last season.

## Eddie's Pharmacy to close

Pharmacist Eddie Piland has announced that he will liquidate his store at 1001 Hickory St. to spend more time with family members and pursue other business and personal interests.

Eddie's Pharmacy dates to the earliest years of Colorado City through the store Piland bought when he moved here in 1965, Doss Rexall Drug downtown near East Second and Walnut Street.

Piland was born in Childress

and grew up in Memphis, in the upper Panhandle, before attending Texas Tech University in Lubbock and graduating from the University of Oklahoma in Norman.

He graduated from the University of Oklahoma School of Pharmacy and worked two years at Snyder Drug before buying out W. L. Doss Jr.

He has been an active member of the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce and of the First Baptist Church.

He helped organize the First National Bank in 1982 and is a member of its board of directors.

Piland said Tuesday that one of the highlights of his religious activities was in the mid-1970's at West Texas Ranch for Christ near Blackwell, where the Rev. Billy Graham attended Grady Wilson Day for one of his longtime assistants.

He has remained in touch with the ranch owner, Bill See EDDIES, page 2A

## Track resurfacing okayed by C-City school board

Being a good reader is perhaps the most essential part of succeeding in school, and Colorado City's four schools report significantly improved reading skills through their Creative Education Institute (CEI) laboratories.

Supt. Russell Merket told school board members Monday night that the 241 students who studied in CEI labs here during the 1997-98 school year averaged an eight-month grade level improvement.

Students who studied English as a second language made the most impressive gains, Supt. Merket said -- an average of 1 1/2 years.

He said 95 special education students averaged improvements of five months in instructional reading and nine months in reading comprehension.

CEI labs are in operation at Kelley and Hutchinson elementary schools, Colorado Middle School and the high

school. Other business in the 7 p.m. meeting, which ended at 8:06 with all members present, included Merket's report on the need to resurface the running track at Wolf Stadium.

He said the track is about 20 years old and needs two layers of rubberized asphalt to extend its life by another seven or eight years.

"It has been there long enough that it doesn't have See TRACK, page 10A

## Water wells project advances

City councilmen Tuesday authorized City Manager Steve Shutt to drill a third test well in a proposed new water well field five miles east of Colorado City and set a Nov. 24 meeting to discuss the project.

Shutt was authorized to investigate options for other land to drill on and to begin the application process for \$2 million in federal grants.

He has indicated in previous

meetings that the city hopes to end its dependence on water from Lake Colorado City and Champion Creek Reservoir south of town, although some lake water will still be mixed into the new, purer supply.

Engineers Ken Martin and Leland Godbee of Jacob & Martin Engineers in Abilene attended the 6 p.m. meeting, saying a survey of 115 wells in a three-mile radius of the proj-

ect showed 90 percent of them to have been plugged or to be without power.

Shutt said studies indicate that there are more than one trillion gallons of water in the Santa Rosa Aquifer under 300,000 acres of land in eastern Mitchell County and western Nolan County.

He said that would supply Colorado City until past the year 4000 even if the aquifer

did not replenish itself.

"I think the water that's under eastern Mitchell County and Nolan County has been one of the best-kept secrets in this part of the state for years," he said.

Shutt said he has been "receiving pressure" from sources he did not name about the new wellfield, and he addressed a question that has been raised about the city's

possible tapping of Lake Spence water, near Robert Lee 40 miles to the south.

He passed out an analysis of such an alternative that indicated it would cost the city \$8 to \$9 million to lay a pipeline and pump the water under a contract with the Colorado River Municipal Water District.

He said the water would cost 85 cents per thousand gallons. See WATER WELLS, page 10A

## Quilt-making perfected

"Spreading Maine Pine" and "Turkey Track" are not the guideposts of a wilderness tracker.

They're a couple of the quilting patterns that Mitchell County artisan Faye Maxwell uses in creations that have become popular with local residents.

The Taylor County native was once an avid deer hunter and still enjoys fishing on Lake Colorado City, but she is in such demand as a quilt-maker that the craft takes as much of her time as she is willing to employ on it.

"My mother used to make quilts when I was a kid," she said. "It was necessary back then. I don't know. I just liked it."

"I have made them for all the kids and grand-kids. I have quilts scattered all over the country."

"People want me to make a quilt, and they get the material and I make one for them. I do it by hand. Some take a couple of months. It depends on how much there is to do on them."

Ms. Maxwell, 81, has made about a half-dozen in the past year and showed one in a red and green Christmas style that she had just finished at her home along Cherry Creek on the west side of Lake Colorado City.

"I like the people around here," she said. "They've all been friendly to me. It's a little town, but that's what I like."

She was born and raised in the Caps area west of Abilene, where her father, Jeter McCarty, and mother Dona raised cotton, maize and cattle and

she attended the now defunct Caps School.

The eldest child, she had two brothers and two sisters, only one of whom, Kathy Fuller of Vermont, survives.

She has a daughter, Madeline Watkins of El Paso, a step-daughter, Judy Baker of Abilene, three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

She moved to the lake to fish in 1984, two years after the death of her husband, George Maxwell, who was a welding supplies salesman.

They lived in El Paso for four years after they were married and moved to Abilene in the mid-1950s.

She enjoyed deer hunting for many years and still has her single-shot .270-caliber rifle.

"Anything I can see, I can hit it," she said. "But I can't take the cold like I used to."

"I like to fish and try to make a garden, but then this weather don't cooperate with me."

"I was raised on a farm, and every time I go by a cotton patch my back goes to hurting," she said, recalling the years when her parents, brothers and sisters hand-picked their cotton, stuffed into long sacks and poured it into the trailer.

"I picked cotton and headed maize," she said. "You name it and I did it on a farm."

Pausing to light a cigarette, Ms. Maxwell said she is proud that a local woman had her make a quilt and then gave it to Dr. and Mrs. Dee Roach of Colorado City for a Christmas present.

"They don't know who made it, but it was me," she said.

She would like to go fishing more, but she is dedicated to her craft and works steadily on a quilt until she finishes, once she starts.

Ms. Maxwell recalls that her father had to work hard to survive financially during the Depression of the 1930's but was able to keep ownership of his land when many of the family's neighbors were not.

Hanks Sr. of Salado, near Temple, and Hanks' son Billie Jr., a Southern Baptist minister and theological writer.

"The people here have been extremely good to me and my family over the years," he said.

"I am extremely grateful for the love and support that they've shown to my family and myself these many years."

Piland said he and his wife Gaye will remain in Colorado City and he will probably continue to practice pharmacy on a part-time basis.

He has two sons, Mark, who is Mitchell County attorney, and Jay Lynn, a doctor of internal medicine in Alexandria, La.; a step-son, Cody Carpenter, a student at the University of Texas in Austin, a step-daughter, Cretia Cay Carpenter, a Texas A&M University student, and four grandchildren.

The sale will offer discounts of 20 to 50 percent on cards, cosmetics, fragrances, over the counter drugs, jewelry, health and beauty aids, candy, dishes, crystal, candles and other merchandise.

Piland plans to sell his prescriptions to another pharmacist but will continue to fill prescriptions until after Jan. 1.

The sale begins at 8 a.m. Thursday, Nov. 12, and will probably continue until after Jan. 1, he said.

In a 1965 article in the Colorado City Record, W. L. Doss Jr. said his uncle, John L. Doss, came to West Texas to hunt buffalo in 1881 and went into the drug business because of a "Saturday night bath" gone bad.

John Doss got "a severe itch" from the soap he used, went to a local drug store operated by a man named Hunt and bought some turpentine for his ailment, W. L. Doss Jr. said.

John Doss then went into a partnership with Hunt, who sold out to W. L. Doss Sr. after the second Doss came here in 1885 from Weatherford, working on the Texas & Pacific

Railroad.

W. L. Doss Sr. bought out his brother in 1905.

W. L. Jr. joined his father in the business in 1918 after earning a degree in pharmacy from the University of Texas and serving in the military.

In 1919, Piland's laminated copy of the CCR says, W. L. Doss Jr. and Shine Phillips of Big Spring were the only registered pharmacists in West Texas.

Doss purchased full ownership of the store in 1942 after the death of his father in 1937.

playoffs Friday against Alpine in Ozona with an 8-2 regular season record and a 4-1 mark in district play.

They won the district championship outright after defeating their closest competitor, Seminole, in the next to last game of the season and then overwhelming the Slaton Tigers last weekend.

From the smallest school in their new district, they were considered to have good players at the "skill" positions of quarterback, receivers and kicker.

But they were believed to be under-sized for competition in their new district last summer after being moved out of 4-3A, where they had competed against Crane, Sonora, Reagan County, Greenwood and Kermit, with whom they had more in common.

The Wolves were projected to finish no better than third in District 3-3A with only an outside chance to make the playoffs.

Asked at the start of the season in August why he coaches, James said, "I love to be around athletes who are willing to work hard and understand what it takes to be successful in athletics and in life."

Colorado City, Lamesa and Seminole represent the district in the playoffs this year.

Colorado averages 127 yards per game on the ground, Green being responsible for 102 of those yards per game.

The Fightin' Bucks gained a playoff berth by beating the Greenwood Rangers 12-9 last Friday night.

In that game, fullback Cody Carpenter rushed for 130 tough yards against a solid Greenwood defensive line.

The Bucks' two touchdowns were scored by senior quarterback Justin Yarborough and junior running back Cougar McBride.

Yarborough rotates at the quarterback position with senior Adam Llanez.

On the season, Llanez is 20 of 41 passing for 413 yards, and four touchdowns.

Yarborough is 14 of 39 for 172 yards with no touchdowns.

Carpenter leads the Bucks' rushing game with 588 yards on the season.

The Bucks feature a talented, good-sized front line against whom the Pack must "win the battle of the trenches" in order to make round two of the playoffs.

"We are going to have to stop their big offensive line and keep them from having long, sustained drives," says head coach Gerald James.

"We've got to find a way to get the ball to our offense and stop their wishbone running attack," added James.

"I imagine their game plan includes keeping the ball away from our offense and eating up the clock with the ground game. If we can get the ball back, then I think we can do some things to hurt 'em."

The game will be played at Ozona's Lion Stadium located on First street in north Ozona. C-City fans entering Ozona

on state highway 163 will come upon a blinking light at the First street intersection. Crockett National Bank will be on the right and you should turn right there.

The Wolves are the 'home' team and C-City fans will park and sit on the west side of Lion stadium.

Ozona is approximately 140 miles from Colorado City and gametime is set for 7:30.

## Stenholm thanks Mitchell County

Worth, on the eastern end of the district, in their futile attempt to claim the district for the GOP.

"There could very well be a challenge to the speakership," Stenholm said. "I don't know that it will be successful, but there's a lot of unrest right now."

"The more conservative right is very unhappy with the way things are going."

That is because for the first time since 1934, the party that does not control the presidency lost seats in Congress between presidential elections.

The GOP's House majority was trimmed to 223 seats to 211 -- a gain of five for the Democrats.

Gingrich had predicted that his party would gain up to 40 seats in the House on Tuesday.

Special interest groups in Washington, D. C., advocating term limits and radical environmentalism, also spent heavily in attacks against Stenholm.

The League of Conservation Voters (LCV) said in a news release following the Tuesday, Nov. 3, election that it had spent \$3.7 million nationally seeking to defeat various candidates.

One source of information in the 17th District indicated the LCV expended \$500,000 in the Stenholm-Izzard contest, mostly for a now infamous radio advertisement blaming Stenholm for what it said were possible nuclear waste spills on Interstate 20.

The congressman said in a Thursday telephone interview that he will continue to seek a reform in campaign finance laws to require such groups to report their financial sources -- a measure he sought unsuccessfully in the Congress earlier this year.

Known as "issue ads," such ads have now sparked a national controversy because of their narrowness and relative anonymity.

"They should have the same rules as everybody else," Stenholm said, noting that candidates must report the source of every contribution over \$200.

"The people of the 17th District need to know who is contributing that money."

"I'm just kind of slowly winding down now. I'll take a few days off and get away from it. It was a very exhausting campaign, mentally and physically, but most gratifying to me."

"It compares very favorably to 1978, when I was outspent but won. Hundreds, if not thousands, of people were working their hearts out for us this time, and that makes this victory even sweeter."

"Mitchell County was awful good to me again."

He alluded to the year when he first won election to Congress.

Stenholm carried Mitchell County by 1,230 votes to 513 as only 153 Democrats and 51 Republicans voted a straight party ticket here.

Congressman Charles Stenholm's win over Republican Rudy Izzard left him exhausted but happy after the Ballinger dentist's second aggressive campaign against him in two years.

Rep. Stenholm was going to take a week's vacation in Spain with his wife Cindy and then spend Thanksgiving with his daughter and son-in-law in Austin.

And he was looking forward to working in Congress next year with incoming Agriculture Committee Chairman Larry Combest of Lubbock.

Much improved prospects with the "Dynamic Duo" of Stenholm, top-ranking Democrat on the committee, and Combest, who has represented the 19th District since the early 1980's, have West Texas farmers and ranchers in a state of keen optimism.

"I'm really looking forward to that," Stenholm said. "Larry is a good friend, and he is going to be more proactive than Bob Smith was."

He referred to the previous ag committee chairman, an Oregonian who has retired after serving an extra term at the behest of Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich.

"I'm looking forward to riding shotgun with Larry."

Stenholm said he is particularly interested in passing new legislation to help row crops like cotton.

Although statewide Texas Republican candidates enjoyed a sweep last Tuesday, he said, the GOP did not fare well nationally and Speaker Gingrich came under attack from within his own party.

Then Gingrich resigned last weekend.

The congressman laughed when reminded of his statement at midnight Tuesday on regional television in Abilene, when he challenged Gingrich to "target" the 17th District again in two years.

Addressing Gingrich directly, he said, "If you want to try it again, you'll need to send more than you sent this time because we've got a lot of good friends down here who will take you on again!"

Stenholm said state and national Republican Party organizations spent more than \$1 million in Dallas and Fort

Citing recent generous rains, Mitchell County commissioners Monday lifted the burn ban that had been in effect since last spring.

County Judge Ray Mayo said a number of county residents have asked to be allowed to burn dead foliage since the heavy rains of weekend before last greatly alleviated the dry conditions.

"We have had rains in the area and a lot of requests for controlled burns from resi-

dents of the county," Judge Mayo said.

The burn ban was enacted last May 11, when Fire Marshal Billy Ray Williamson said the drought had become so bad that the fire department's grass fire calls had doubled over the previous month.

Mayo adjudicated requests for exceptions to the ban and granted 15 to 20 on recommendations from the Westbrook, Colorado City and Loraine volunteer fire departments, he said after the meeting.

"People really respected the burn ban and cooperated with it," he said. "We didn't have

any major fires."

Mayo said he is greatly relieved that the county is now no longer, in effect, a 910-square-mile tinderbox.

The commissioners commented that they have seen a large amount of wildlife, including numerous skunks and foxes, since the county was deluged with more than two inches of rain on Saturday, Oct. 31.

Marshal Williamson attended the 9 a.m. commissioner's meeting to request funding to refurbish the department's 1980 GMC firetruck, No. 32, which the county donated to the depart-

ment 21 years ago.

He said the truck's bed has rotted out and its plumbing needs to be replaced, and the court allocated a maximum of \$2,000 from its 1999 budget for the job.

Williamson said he will begin planning with Browne Brothers Machine Shop in mid-December for the work to begin after the first of the year.

Pct. 1 Commissioner Ed Roach was authorized to spend \$1,250 for a used shredder to be purchased from the estate of Loyce Briley of Colorado City.

The meeting ended at 9:30 with all members present.

That buys you a holiday meal and a recipe book, along with demonstrations concerning foods, crafts, table settings and decorations.

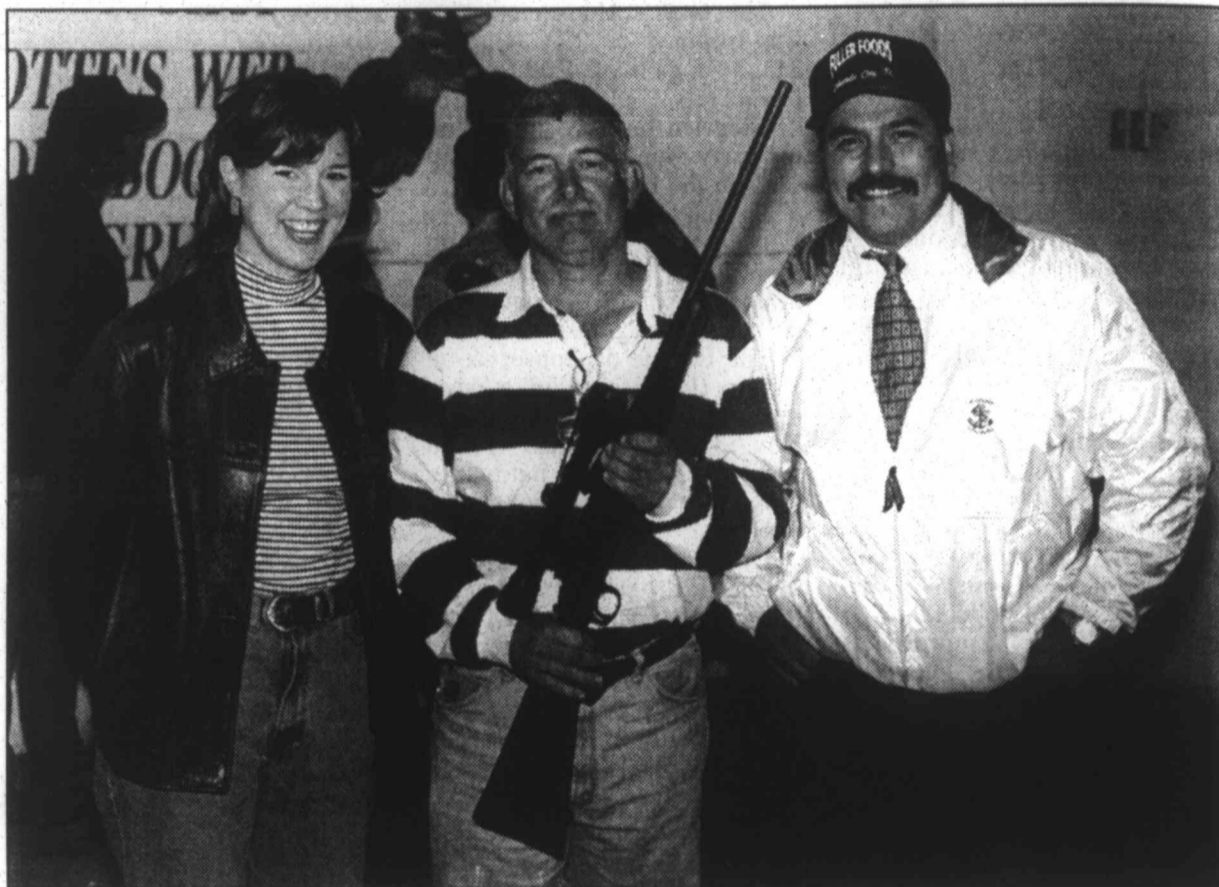
But you have to call the Extension Service now at 728-3111 and reserve a seat at the dinner table because there is only room for 60 people.

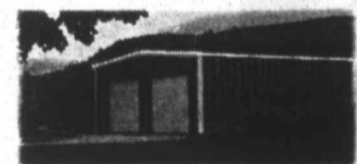

## Disaster payments received

The 1998 Mitchell County cotton crop has begun being processed at Producers Co-op Gin at 365 W. Second St., but with the crop being one of the worst in history, the work is not expected to last long.

Ginner Elroy Boedeker said he does not expect to process more than about 1,500 bales, compared to last year's bumper crop of 22,400.

The county produced a total of about 50,000 bales last year. Loraine Co-op Gin has not even opened this fall, and some eastern Mitchell County farmers will take their cotton to Nolan County gins, Boedeker said.

He said last Friday that he and gin workers Jesse and Carlos Hernandez and office manager Sylvia Martinez had handled 800 bales before the big Oct. 31 rainstorm and had shut down because of the wet conditions last week.

Most of that cotton had been brought in from the irrigated farms of Tony Turner southeast of Colorado City, Larry Don Watlington north of town, Mark Wright south of town and Robert Cox north of Loraine, Boedeker said.

He said there were perhaps 100 bales of irrigated cotton left and the rest would be from dryland farms -- the predominant method of farming here.

Boedeker said most of the dryland cotton this year is in the Buford area north of C-City, "in the low places."

He said not all of the dryland cotton will be ready for harvest when the ground dries and that farmers will wait for the bolls to open on their own rather than have it defoliated because the crop is too poor to justify any additional expense.

"It won't amount to very much," he said.

Mitchell County agricultural producers have received the first round of crop disaster payments that were authorized by Congress before it adjourned last month.

Mike Sweat, county manager for federal Farm Service Agency, said \$1.2 million was paid to 1,200 to 1,300 landlords and tenants here.

The marketing loss assistance payments were the first phase of Congress' \$6-billion ag relief package, and Sweat said officials are "still hammering out the details" for the rest of it.

"This is not the whole deal," he said. "It will be after the first of the year before we finally get to know what may or may not happen."

Sweat said he and a program technician from his office will take training in Lubbock next week on the package's livestock assistance program to begin implementing that phase.

The marketing loss assistance payments represented 49.72 percent of what should have been the local producers' 1998 production, he said.

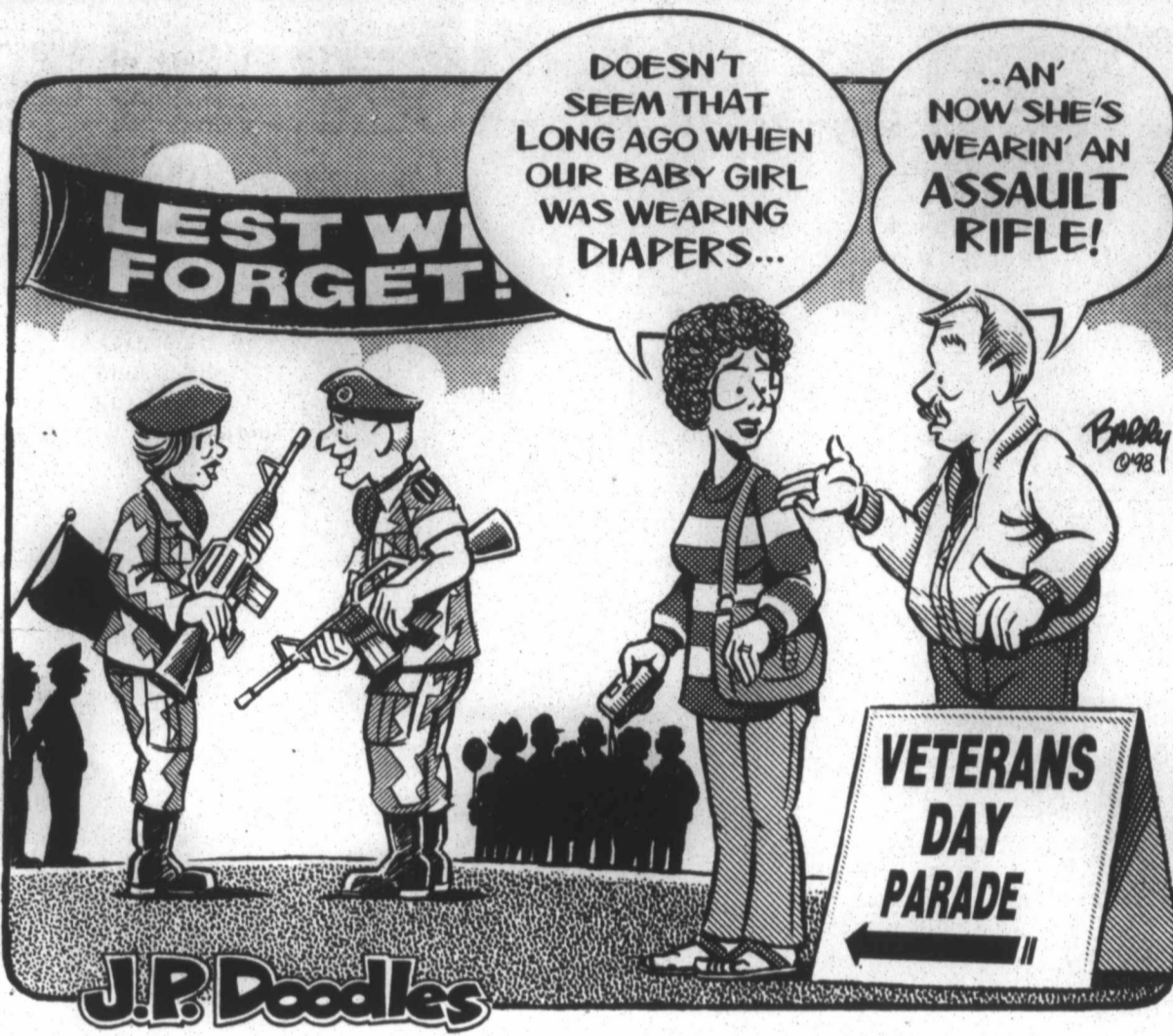

much resiliency left," the superintendent said.

He was authorized to advertise for bids for the project, which is expected to cost about \$20,000. A complete resurfacing in seven or eight years should run about \$45,000, he said.

Merket said the project must be undertaken this winter to resurface the track in time for track season next spring.

Board member Tony Turner asked if the work can be done in cold weather, and Merket said temperatures must be 45 degrees or higher when the two one-tenth-inch layers are put down.

The board accepted bids for band equipment from Caldwell Music Co. of Abilene of \$1,050 for three French horns, \$2,746 for two vibraphones, \$350 for a vibraphone cart, \$1,326 for a quad drum set and \$4,347 for an electronic drum set.

It approved advertising for bids for a half-ton pickup truck with a towing package for the bus barn and for towing the Wolf Band trailer.

The vehicle will replace a 1995 Chevrolet S-10 pickup that will be transferred to the maintenance department.

Merket said B&R Bus Sales of Bronte was going to conduct a Tuesday morning training session at the bus barn on how to operate the three travel buses it sold to the district last summer.

The buses have overheated and stalled several times while

carrying the band and football team this fall.

Computer programmer Larry DeBusk submitted his resignation, effective next June.

compared to the 35 cents per thousand that the city pays TU Electric for Lake Colorado City water, with a lot of impurities.

Martin said the city would not be allowed to tap into a CRMWD line from Spence to Midland that runs about seven miles south of town.

Other business in the meeting, which ran until about 9:15 with an executive session from 7:50 to 8:45, included approval of a \$257,000 contract with Roberts Construction Co. of San Angelo to lay new six and eight-inch sewer lines between Oak and Walnut Streets.

Godbee said the lines will be laid down the alley from East Second Street to 17th Street.

He said the project will take 120 working days and begin in about a month.

## HOCKEY: THE FASTEST GROWING SPORT

Hockey is the fastest growing sport of the 90's. Ice hockey, roller hockey and in-line skating have experienced phenomenal growth in the past five years. The growth of hockey in non traditional markets, those hot weather areas with little or no hockey history, has been dramatic in recent years.

The Southwest began to discover the joys and thrills of ice hockey in 1996 when the Western Professional Hockey League began its inaugural season.

The sport, which had its start in Montreal, Canada, combines the elements of football, basketball and rodeo. It is probably the fastest sport being played today. Fans of hockey are increasing daily.

In 1995, league officials took numerous surveys to determine which cities in the Southwest lacked a winter identity and could support a professional sports team. They thought that hockey could fill the void, just as it has in places like Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Wichita, Charleston, Charlotte and Greensboro, all successful franchises in the Central and East Coast Hockey Leagues.

In most cases, the WPHL discovered pre-existing rivalries through high school football or minor league baseball. Most have a population base of 100,000 to 1,000,000 people and have modern facilities with a minimum of 6,000 seats. All the target cities were extremely supportive to the possibility of bringing professional ice hockey to their communities. For most of the cities, it would be their first professional team of any sport.

In early 1996, a press conference was held in Austin to announce the league would begin play in October in 1996. The six franchises playing that first season were the Austin Ice Bats, the Waco Wizards, the Central Texas Stampede, the Amarillo Rattlers, the El Paso Buzzards and the New Mexico Scorpions.

Now the league has three divisions: Western, Central and Eastern. The Western division teams are the Abilene Aviators, the Amarillo Rattlers, the El Paso Buzzards, the New Mexico Scorpions, the Odessa Jackalopes (1998 WPHL Franchise of the Year) and the San Angelo Outlaws.

The Central division teams include the Austin Icebats, the Corpus Christi Ice Rays, the Central Texas Stampede, the Fort Worth Brahmas and the Waco Wizards.

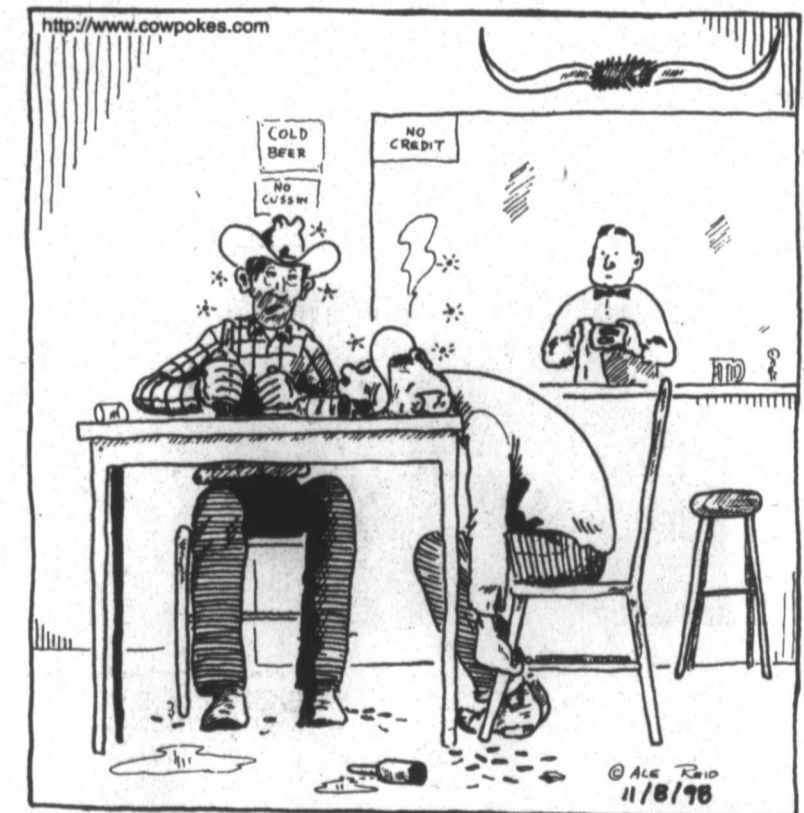
The Eastern division has the Alexandria Warthogs, the Arkansas Glacier Cats, the Lake Charles Ice Pirates, the Monroe Moccasins, the Shreveport Mudbugs and the Tupelo T-Rex.

The latest team to join the league is the Alexandria Warthogs. The team's unique logo features a snarling, stick-wielding warthog. It was created by a firm in Alaska and was released to the media at a press conference held at the Alexandria Museum of Art.

The name Warthog was chosen from over 1,000 names as part of a "Name the Team Contest."

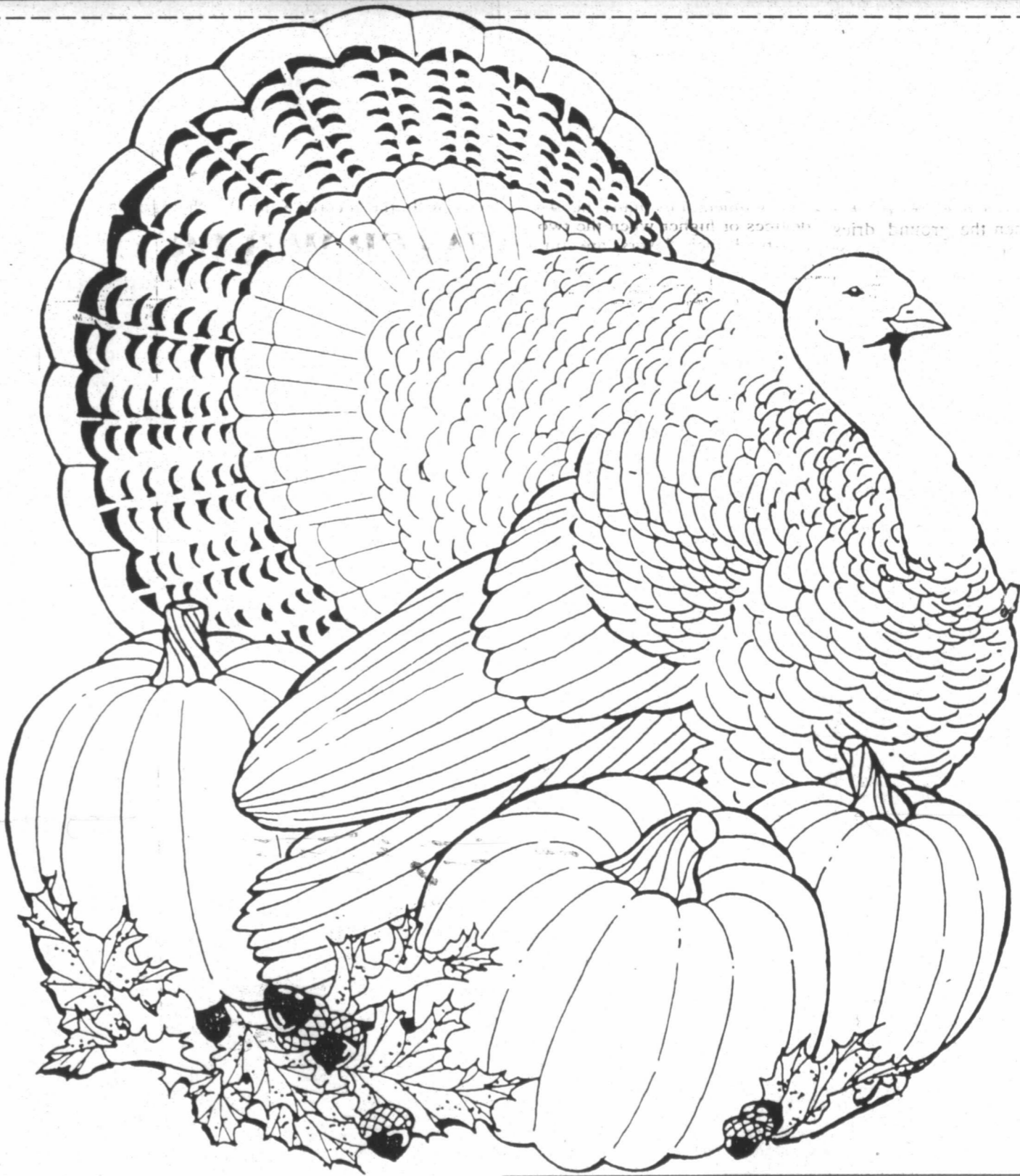

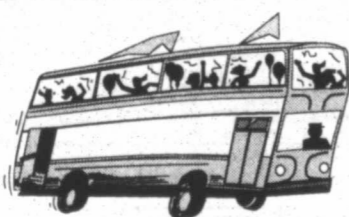

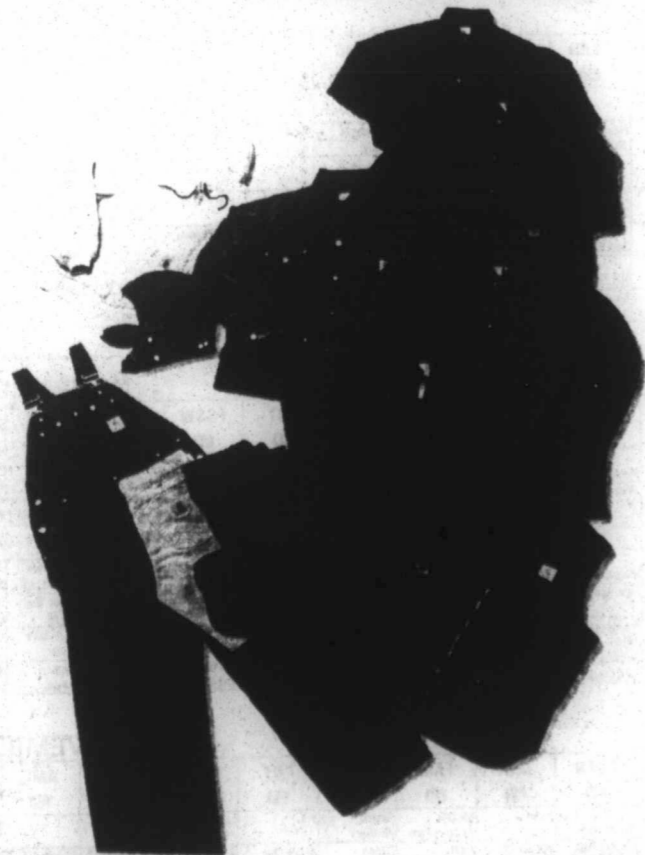

# Wolves District Champs after Slaton win

The Colorado City Wolves wrapped up the district 3-3A title Friday night in Slaton in a 35-7 rout of the struggling Tigers.

It was great November football weather, a steady northerly wind with wet drizzle in the low forties.

The Wolves won the toss and elected to force the Tigers to receive a Randy Byington kick with the wind at his back.

"We wanted to see how they handled the weather and the wet ball on the kickoff, so we deferred and let them have it," said head coach Gerald James of the decision. "It turned out to be a good call," said James.

The Tigers kick returner bobbled the ball but recovered to start at their own ten yard line.

On the first play from scrimmage, Abel Bonilla forced a fumble and recovered it for the Pack at the Slaton seven yard line.

Terry Green ran twice to get the ball to the Tiger three then walked in from there for six points following a great Ricky Molina block.

Byington's PAT was good and with only 1:28 gone, the Wolves led 7-0.

Green carried the ball 14 times for 141 yards and three touchdowns against the Tigers.

Averaging 6.56 yards per carry and 102.4 yards per game, Green surpassed the thousand yard mark in Slaton, bringing his rushing total for the regular season to 1024 yards.

"Terry's done an outstanding job for us in district play this year and basically we came into this game wanting him to go over a thousand yards and he did that early," said James of his 6-2, 190 pound senior running back.

The Tigers watched Byington's next kick go out of the endzone and began their second drive at their 20.

But Freddie Atkinson and the Wolf defense won this ballgame early as they stuffed the Tigers and forced them to punt.

"Freddie has stepped up the last couple of weeks and become a real team leader.

When he is healthy we expect alot out of him and he has delivered," boasted James.

The Wolves began their second possession at the Tiger 40 after a poor 23 yard Slaton punt.

Wolf quarterback Justin Hill handed off to Green on a draw play for 11 yards, then picked up a quick four yards on a pass to Jaime Alvarez.

Then Green ran right for another 16 yards to the Tiger nine.

Green then took the ball over the left side of the line for the score, his second of the night.

After a successful Byington extra point, the Wolves extended their lead to 14-0 with 7:11 still remaining in the first quarter.

Bonilla was on the warpath and was a big reason that Slaton would go three and out on their third possession.

This time the Slaton punter got 33 yards on the kick, placing the Wolves offense at their own 38.

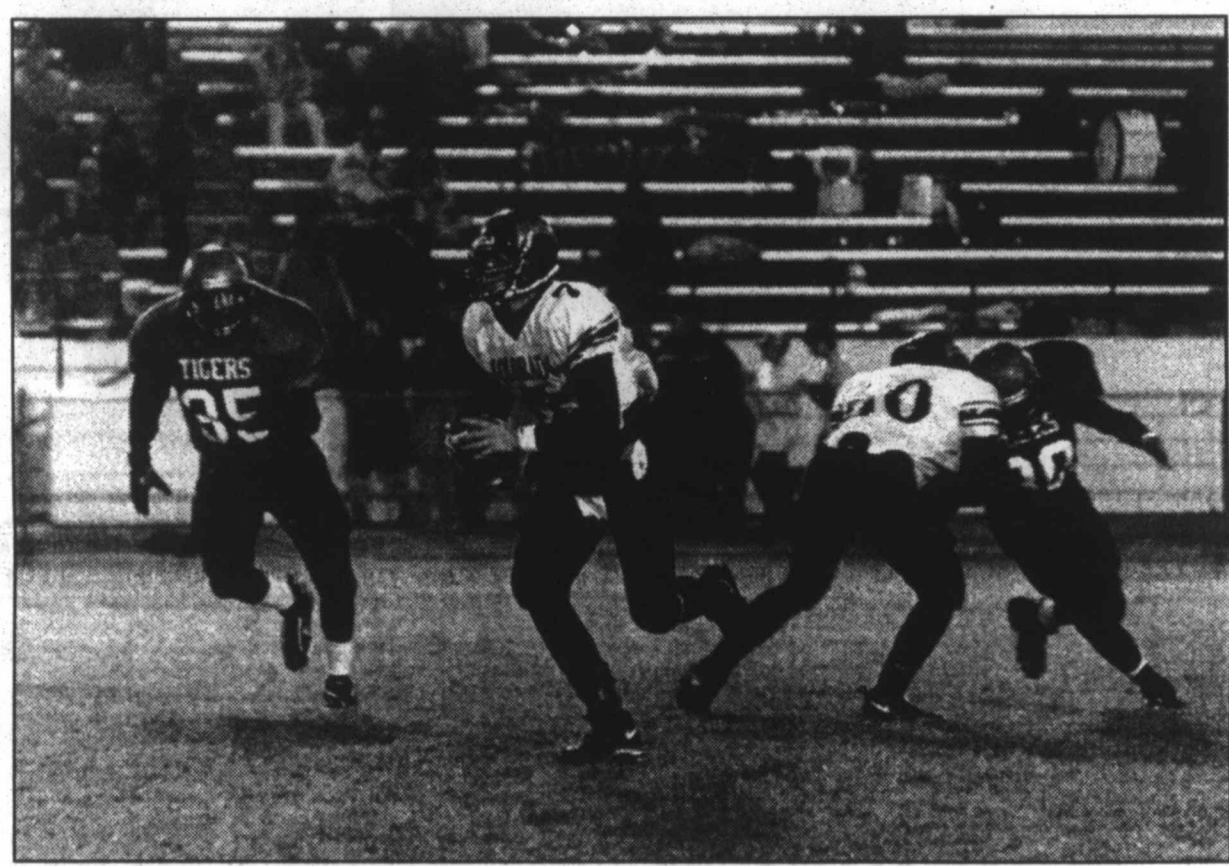
Hill hit Philip Castro for 22 yards to the Slaton 40, but the

drive stalled there and Byington stepped up to attempt a 57 yard field goal.

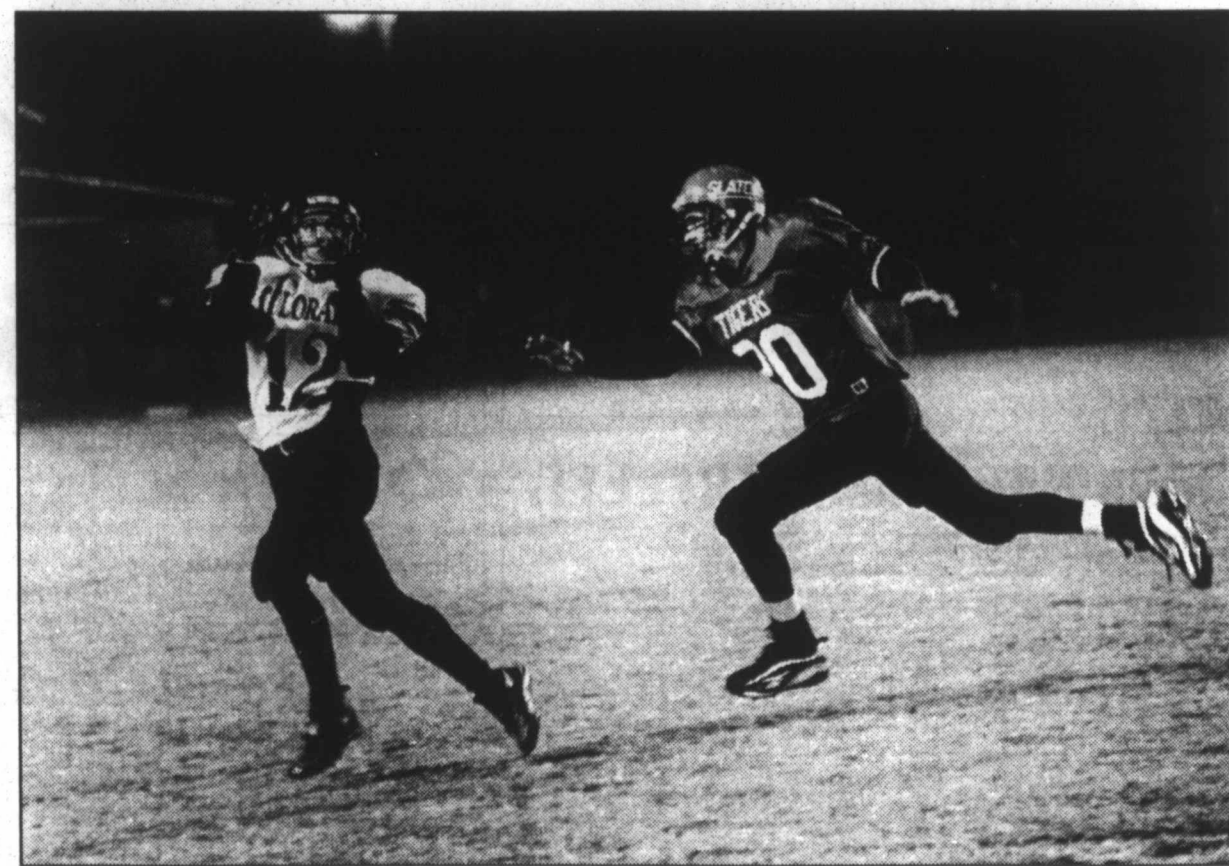
The attempt failed as the ball squirted up to the line of scrimmage in the drizzle.

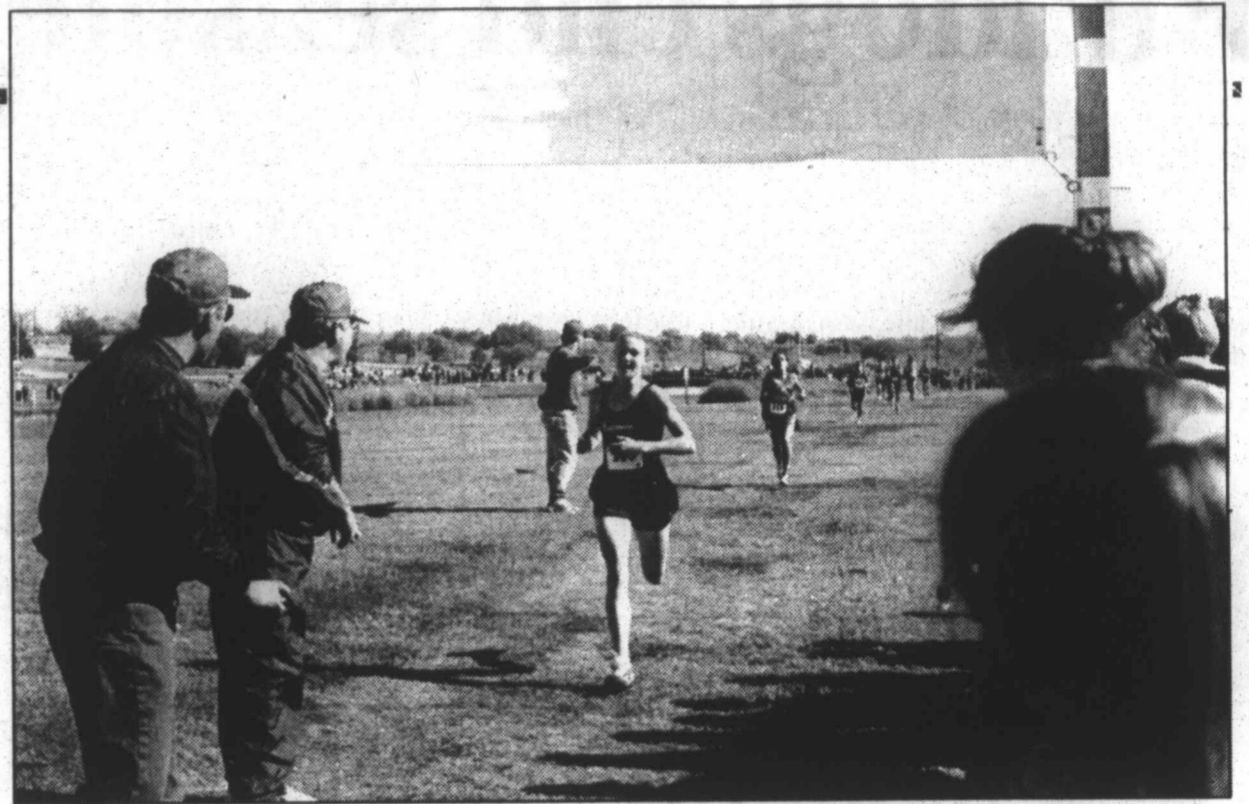

Region 2 winner Sarah Haydel of Atlanta had a time of 11:53.02. Ami Butler of Mabank finished second in region 2 with a time of 12:22.3.

From Caldwell, Region 3

winner Casey Jones' time of 11:48.2 led a strong regional group in which all ten runners turned in times of 12:23 or better.

Region 4 is a strong group as well with Heidi Simmerman of Port Isabel running the two-mile course in 11:38.2. Again, the first eight finishers in the region all had times of 12:17 or better.

The winners of regions 2, 3 and 4 all had better times than Sullivan, but they ran on courses which may be faster than the tough Mae Simmons trail.

Thirty seconds faster? Probably not, but the freshman runner just may be motivated to kick a little earlier if she sees the backs of her peers jerseys.

Team CHS finished eleventh out of 21 teams in the region.

Hill then turned up the heat in cold, wet Tiger stadium as he found a wide-open Chase Phariss on the right sideline for a 59 yard touchdown strike.

It was now 21-0 and the second quarter was only about to begin.

This may have been one of the fastest played games in Texas Friday night as the timekeeper let the clock roll, even in situations where the officials signaled for the clock to be stopped.

The game actually ended about 9:30, but was really done before 8 pm.

The Tigers did get a first down in the first half due to some nifty running by freshman running back Edward Roberts.

But Atkinson, Armando Rocha and Kyle Hammond all had tackles to force the Tigers to punt after only seven plays.

The Wolves got the ball back on their 24 and gave it to Green who busted out for a 51 yard pickup to the Tiger 25.

On first and ten, Green tackled on another six to the Tiger 19.

Then Rocha took the handoff and fought his way to

the one yard line.

On the next play, Rocha rumbled in for the score.

Byington, who was five-for-five on the night on extra points, nailed the PAT and the Wolves were crushing Slaton 28-0 with 4:27 left in the first half.

On their next drive, Slaton picked up another first down and advanced the ball to the Wolf 30 yard line where Green intercepted the ball and ran it back 89 yards to the Tiger one.

But the exciting pick-and-run was called back on an illegal blocking foul, giving C-City the ball at their 28 with only a minute left in the half.

Hill improved his passing statistics just before the half though, as he completed three passes for 67 yards including a nine-yard screen to Green, a 35 yard catch for Rocha and a 23 yarder to Phariss.

The Wolves received the opening kickoff in the second half and Hill went to work dropping off a 12 yard outlet pass to Green.

Then Green busted up the middle for another 18 yards.

The drive stalled though,

and Brett Hoyle was asked to punt for the Pack, as the backup punter for Byington.

Hoyle's 15 yard punt 'pinned' the Tigers at their 27 with around eight minutes left in the third.

Bonilla stuffed the Tigers' first attempt for no gain, but then Slaton's Edwards ripped off an 18 yard run for their third first down of the contest.

Atkinson recovered a Tiger fumble on the next play to give the Wolves the ball back late in the third quarter.

The Tigers never seemed to quit though, as they did manage to put together a 64 yard scoring drive early in the final quarter.

However, with a 28-7 lead, the Pack answered the Tiger score with an impressive 67 yard drive of their own.

The drive included a 19 yard pass to Hoyle, a 22 yard pass to Phariss and 15 yards tacked on to the end of a seven-yard Green run for hitting him late.

Green rounded out the scoring with a four yard touchdown run with 6:04 left in the game.

Hill was 10 of 15 passing for 201 yards and a touchdown in the regular season finale which gives him 1513 yards and 12 touchdown passes thus far.

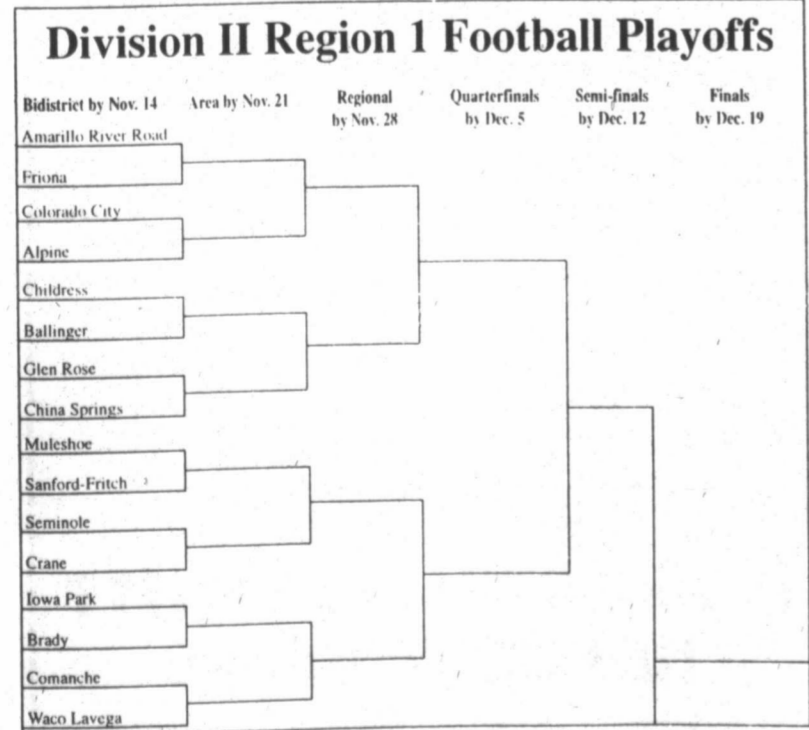
Green, Byington and Rocha lead the team in scoring with 90, 77 and 24 points respectively.

The Wolves head south Friday night to Ozona for a 7:30 bi-district match-up with the Alpine Fightin' Bucks.









was three of four passing for 52 yards with receptions by Barrera, Lujan and Elias Martinez.

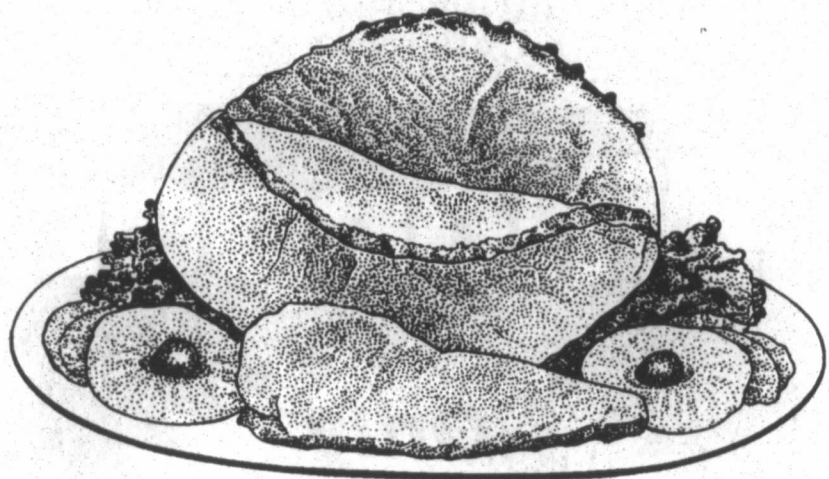
"We were really fired up knowing we were playing for the district championship," said Martinez of the victory.



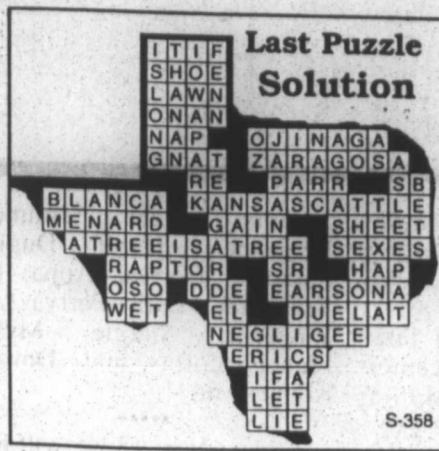
