CISCO HAS Railroads leading four ways and stands 1,700 feet above sea level. That's what the Cisco Apert, a newspaper, said on Sept. 29, 1904. The old newspaper was loaned to us by Bob Mancill, who ran across it while looking through some old papers at his house.

The lead story reports as follows: Cotton has been rolling in rather lively of late, the wagon receipts daily being over 100 bales and as high as 200 in a day. Cisco as usual is paying the top price — yesterday the price ranged from ten to ten and an eighth cents. Wagon receipts up to last night were 3,500 bales, and the compress handled about 5,000 bales to say nothing of the bales from the oil mill.

Other little items in the 48-year old newspaper read as follows:

"The officers were rounding up a band of Gypsies this week . . . the pecan and acorn crop are reported as fair this season . . . five farmers near Cisco have agreed to experiment with hops the coming season . . . Carpenters and painters are busy."

There are several ads on the front page. J. W. Hartman & Co. called attention to their grocery store. W. F. Turner & Co. was in the real estate business and carried an ad . . . Lisenbee and Evans had an ad for their new and second-hand furniture store . . . Mistrot Bros. & Co. was opening a great red tag sale at their dry goods store . . . St. John and Moore were in the paint business, and H. L. Broadwell was manager of the Cisco Lumber Company . . . Butts and Jackson advertised their real estate firm.

THE OLD NEWSPAPER was proud of the fact that Cisco had two grins, a compress, a grist mill, an oil mill, an ice plant, electric lights, a bottling works, a steam laundry, two railroads, school and church buildings, a splendid waterworks, a fire department, a telephone and "Cisco is the center of a trade territory of six counties."

Mancill Bros. had a big ad about their store's feature of the week — wood burning cook stoves, the best that money could buy.

The old paper's personal column included these items: "Mrs. Dave Switzer will leave this week for Fort Worth . . . Pleasure parties continue to be in evidence at Lake Bernie . . . Born to Mr. and Mrs. Joe Wilson on last Saturday, a boy . . . Mrs. Moma Lee of Caddo visited the family of W. J. Rickard . . . Mayor St. John attended a very important session of the state democratic committee in Dallas and returned full of confidence for democratic success in November . . . The Famous Georgia Minstrels will appear at the Opera House in Cisco on Oct. 12 . . . The Texas Central Railroad way had in operation complete parlor car service on all its passenger trains."

San Antonio Man To Manage TMA Austin Office

Callan Graham, San Antonio attorney and for two terms a member of the Texas House of Representatives, will become legal counsel and manager of the Austin office for the Texas Manufacturers Association on January 1. Ed C. Burris, TMA executive vice president, said Mr. Graham who has resigned to enter the private practice of law. Mr. Whitworth has held the positions since 1950.

Mr. Graham, as representative of business and industry, will direct TMA's research into fiscal problems facing Texas, including appropriations, budgeting and fiscal control, and expenditures.

A native of Del Rio, Mr. Graham was reared in Kimble county where he has been active in public affairs since graduation from the University of Texas. After serving two terms as Kimble county attorney, he served a term as district attorney for the 112th Judicial District.

He served two terms in the Legislature. During the 52nd Legislature, he was chairman of the House State affairs committee and in its initial year of operation, head of the Legislative Council's study committee.

Mr. Graham was a practicing attorney in Junction for 15 years before becoming a partner in a San Antonio law firm (Dibrell, Gardner, Dotson and Graham) in 1951. In World War II, he was an Air Force pilot seeing overseas service in China, Burma and India.

Texas Christian University Plans Ministers Week

The annual Ministers Week will take place at Texas Christian University Jan. 12-15 with Disciples of Christ pastors from Texas, Louisiana and New Mexico attending. Noel L. Keith, assistant to the TCU president, announced today.

Addresses by national figures, worship services, and conferences are scheduled for the program. The Wells Lecture, an annual series of addresses, will be given by Dr. Robert James McCracken, minister of the Riverside Church in New York City. The McFadin Lectures will be given by Dr. William L. Reed, professor of Old Testament in TCU's Brite College of the Bible. The Oren E. Scott lectures will be delivered by Dr. Roswell Barnes, executive secretary of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the United States, and by Robert G. Storey of Dallas who is president of the American Bar Association.

TCU Ministers Week starts on Monday, Jan. 12, with registration in the afternoon at University Christian Church. First session will be at 8 p. m. with Dr. M. E. Sadler, TCU president, as chairman. Worship services will be arranged by Rev. Granville Walker, pastor of the University Christian Church, and the first Wells Lecture will be delivered that evening by Dr. McCracken.

On Tuesday, Jan. 13, the program opens at 8:50 a. m. with worship services arranged by S. W. Hutton, professor of worship ministries at TCU. Dr. Roy C. Snodgrass, dean of Brite College, will be chairman and first address will be the McFadin Lecture by Dr. Reed. A coffee at 10 a. m., and a general session at 11 follow. Dr. Sadler will be chairman and the first Scott Lecture by Dr. Barnes will be delivered.

Tuesday evening services will feature a Wells Lecture by Dr. McCracken. Wednesday's meetings will be similar. Prof. Keith will be chairman of the first session at 9 a. m. when Dr. Reed will deliver another McFadin Lecture. Dr. Sadler will preside at the Scott Lecture by Dr. Barnes at 11. A ministers luncheon is scheduled for noon. That evening Dr. McCracken will again speak.

Thursday sessions feature another of Dr. Reed's addresses followed by Judge Storey's Scott lecture. Dr. McCracken's evening lecture will conclude the 1953 Ministers Week at TCU.

Fort Worth Stock Show Will Hold Press Day, Feb. 2

'Press Radio TV Day' will be one of the highlights of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, which opens Jan. 30 and runs through Feb. 8. Newspapermen and representatives of radio and television will have Monday, Feb. 2, as their day, officials of the Fort Worth exposition announce.

The guests of honor will have the opportunity of seeing one of the most important events of the entire exposition, the selection of the grand champion of the open steer show, and will attend the afternoon performance of the world's greatest indoor rodeo.

The Stock Show presented the first indoor rodeo in the world and the visitors will see the biggest grand entry of them all, 600 riders.

This year's rodeo may well prove to be the most outstanding in the show's history because the producers will be the new partnership of Beutler Bros. and Verne Elliott. The latter, known as "Mr. Rodeo," has produced all but two of the Fort Worth rodeos, beginning in 1924, as well as Cheyenne Frontier Days, Calgary Stampede and the Denver, Chicago and Kansas City rodeos for years. Last year, Beutler Bros., presented 28 rodeos. The merger brings together the two top strings of rodeo stock in the world.

Interspersed with the rodeo contests are horse show events and on the afternoon of Feb. 2, two of the most colorful classes will be presented: the Palomino silver mounted stake in the cutting horse contest, with the horses carrying equipment valued at thousands of dollars, and the children's class of Shetland ponies, not exceeding 46 inches in height.

In fact, Press Day will be one of the fullest days of the entire exposition, with judging of Herefords, Palomino halter classes, open steers, open barrows, lambs, poultry, turkeys and sheep (Corriedale, Shropshire, Suffolk, and Cheviot). In addition there will be the Southwestern dairy judging and the general livestock judging for junior A & M and teachers' college students.

An all-time high, \$172,272 in premiums is offered at the '53 Show, an increase of almost \$10,000 over the previous year.

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WHAT THE SIGNPOSTS SAY

The Eisenhower Administration, all the signposts say, will be based on two patterns — that of the military and that of business. The military phase is found in the staff system which the President-elect has begun to establish as a functioning organism. He will be receptive to advice and discussion. Then, once a decision is reached, he will expect it to be carried out without dissent and with all good will on the part of the lieutenants concerned. It is extremely unlikely that the top men in his administration, especially those of Cabinet rank, will issue conflicting statements and advocate opposed policies — something that has happened time and time again during President Truman's tenure.

The business phase is found in his emphasis on getting full value for each dollar spent — whether it be in national defense, foreign aid, or anything else. His appointments reflect that attitude. Most of the men chosen have had to deal with budgets, payrolls and ever-mounting taxes. They have had to make their way in the intensely competitive world of industry. Eisenhower has shown no liking for theorists and academicians — the kind who pulled

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Much has been made over the rift between Eisenhower and Taft because of the appointment of Durkin as Secretary of Labor. Some say that Taft lost his temper — he is a sensitive man and often quick to anger. Others say that Eisenhower unwittingly violated political protocol because of inexperience. Still others say that this was a planned move, to show Taft who is boss. However, the idea that the Eisenhower-Taft honeymoon is over and warfare has begun is not given much credence in informed quarters. The men hold very similar views on most issues. It is expected that they will work very closely together and that the relationship will generally be amicable.

The Eisenhower cabinet has come in for a great deal of editorial praise and comparatively little criticism. One observation is that it may be lacking in men with wide experience in government — only one member, McKay of Oregon, has held high elective office, and that was on the state and not the national level. A virtue in this is that the cabinet men come to their jobs without the usual political commitments and associations.

There will be a wholesale turnover in the upper government echelons starting January 20 — to a man, the New Deal and Fair Deal appointees will go. That won't be true on the lower echelons, because of Civil Service. There the change will take place slowly. But on the policy level, the decks will be swept clean and a new start made.

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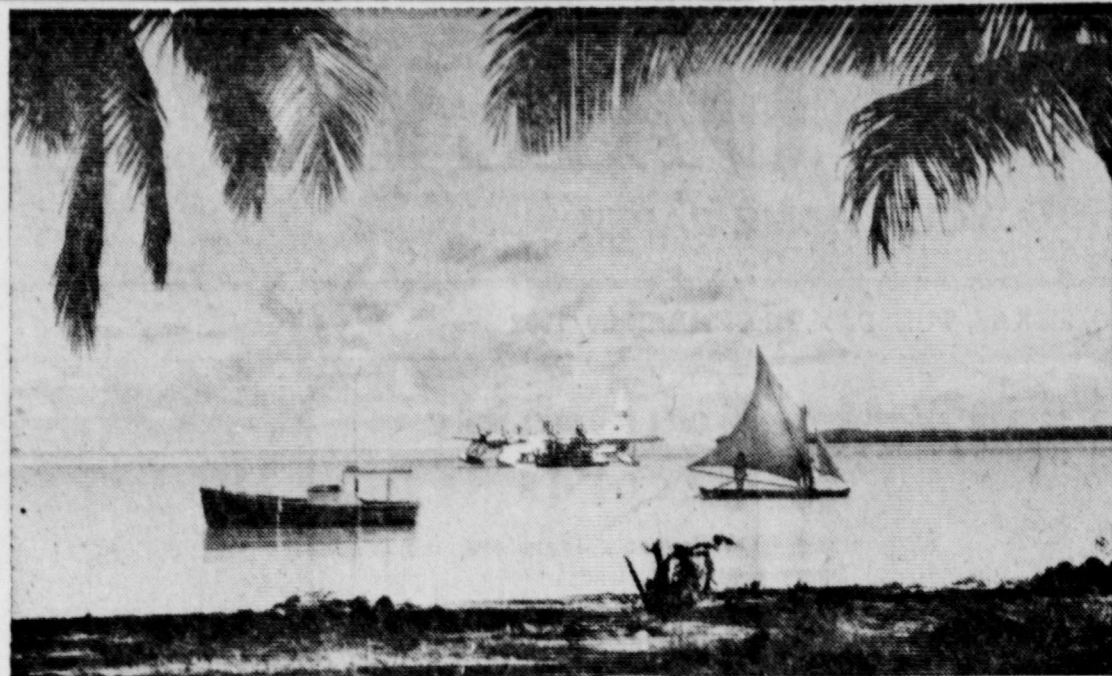
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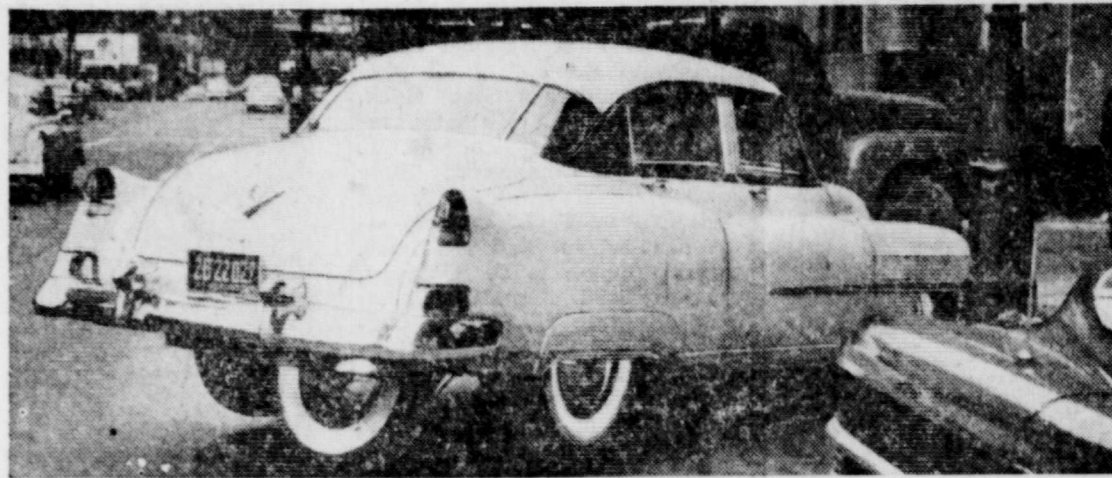

Bulbs Easiest Flowers to Grow and Most Rewarding

Spring flowering bulbs are the easiest of garden flowers to grow because nature has so well equipped them to endure the cold of winter, and bloom with the first spring warmth, before insects and weeds have appeared.

The bulb you plant contains food enough to develop its flower, provided it is of flowering size. It not only endures winter, but requires a chill to make it flower. Tulips intended for growing in the far south, and in greenhouses, are given this chill in cold storage before planting.

Growth must begin in the fall, because when the spring thaw comes they begin to bloom not in months, nor weeks, but actually in days. Snowdrops appear as soon as frost leaves the soil. Scillas and chionodoxas are a few days later. Crocuses, daffodils and tulips follow in due order, and together they provide the dominant displays of the first three garden months.

Many ideas about growing bulbs formerly held, have been discarded as a result of research. One is that bulbs do not need plant food. While the bulb is a storehouse of food for the embryo within, experience has demonstrated that more vigorous growth and larger flowers will be produced if the soil is enriched by commercial plant food when the bulbs are planted.

The greatest enemy of bulbs is dampness. To assist drainage it is sometimes the practice to put sand beneath each bulb. This is a useless measure. If you must plant in a spot where water stands long after it has drained from the rest of the garden, elevate a bed as high as necessary to insure drainage, and plant your bulbs there.

Depth of planting, in general,

varies with the size of the bulb, and the nature of the soil. In heavy soil, most of the bulbs need not be planted so deeply as in sandy soil. In average soil, plant snowdrops, scillas, chionodoxas, with three inches of soil above them. Grape hyacinths should have four inches of soil over them. Most lilies should be planted with 4 to 6 inches of soil over them and hyacinths and narcissi need six inches covering. Tulips which are intended to be lifted from the ground each spring, and replanted in the fall, may be planted at the same depth as narcissi. But if they are not to be lifted, but left in the ground for several years, deep planting, 10 or 12 inches down, is recommended.

The reason for this deep planting is that it prevents the formation of several small bulbs to replace the one you plant, bulbs too small to flower the following year. Deep planting concentrates the energy of the plant on the production of a flowering size replacement bulb each year.

When bulbs are planted among other plants, holes should be dug with a trowel rather than a dibber. Place the bulb firmly in contact with the soil at the bottom, and fill around it so no air pockets are left. When planting in a clear space, the soil is removed to the depth desired, the bulbs set in place on the bottom, and soil filled in.

Bulbs planted after mid October should always be covered with a heavy mulch to prevent the ground from freezing before root growth can begin. Bulbs which are frozen before growth starts may be prevented from growing, and lie dormant or decay during the winter. A mulch will delay freezing and permit the necessary root growth.

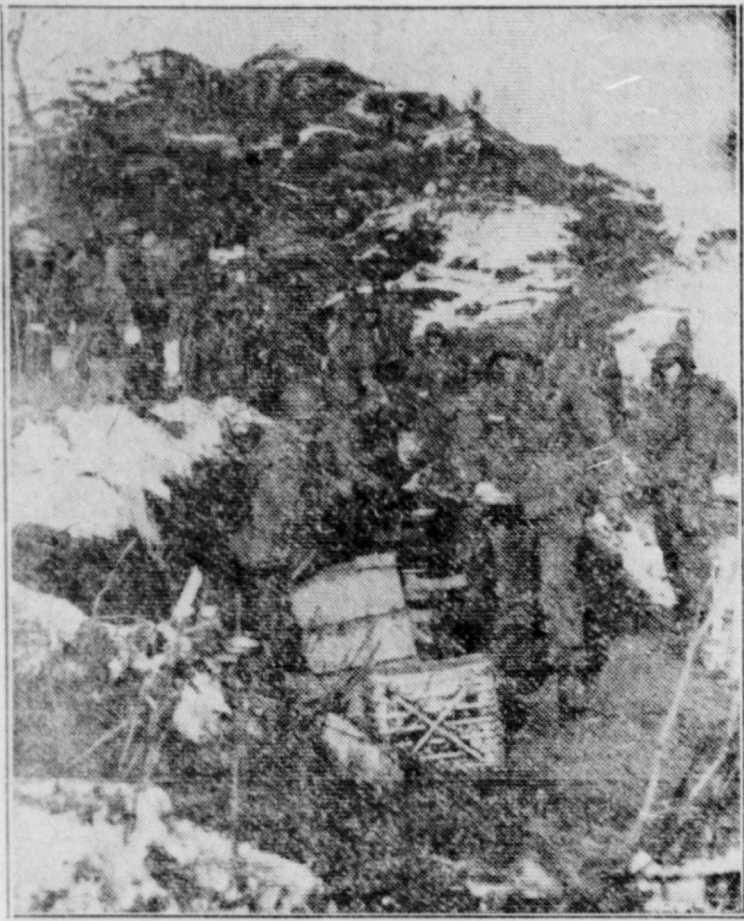

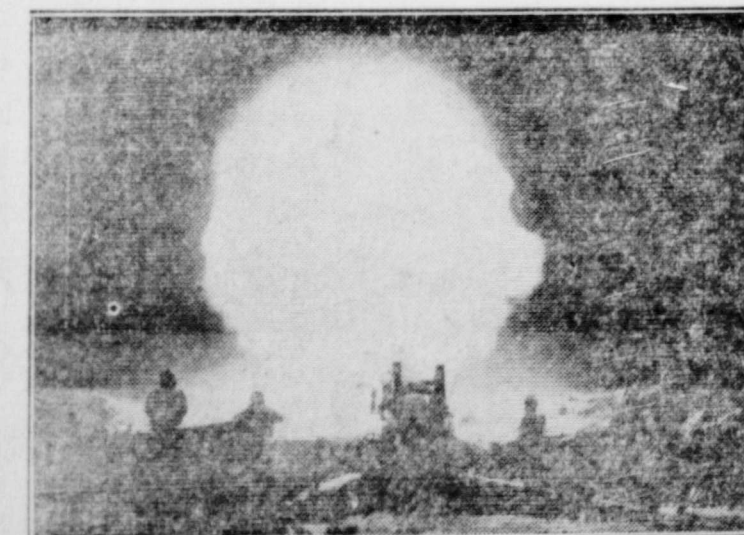
CHOW CALL means hot food at the front in Korea as well as in rear areas. Virtually all U.S. soldiers in Korea now are receiving two hot meals a day.
