LUDWIG VAN BEETHOVEN — of whom the great Wagner spoke these words—is regarded by musicians and music-lovers everywhere with an adoration and a reverence amounting almost to awe. Hardly any musical genius who ever lived can be ranked as high in the history of musical composition.

Born of an easy-going mother who was a domestic servant and of a besotted, brutal father, Beethoven never played the games of other boys. All his childhood was dogged by wretchedness, even slow starvation. Dragged from bed in the middle of the night by a drunkenly raging father, he would be forced to practice his music for hours.

Grown, he was ugly of face and figure, short, squat, lumpy and thick-fingered. Possessed of violent temper, a harsh tongue and careless, untidy habits, poverty-stricken always, Beethoven was anything but prepossessing.

Stories of his rudeness, his bitter humor, his uncouth manners have become legend. How he poured a dish of stew over the head of a waiter who displeased him. How he punished a cook for the staleness of eggs by throwing the whole lot at her one by one. How he sent a wisp of goat's beard to a lady who asked for a lock of his hair.

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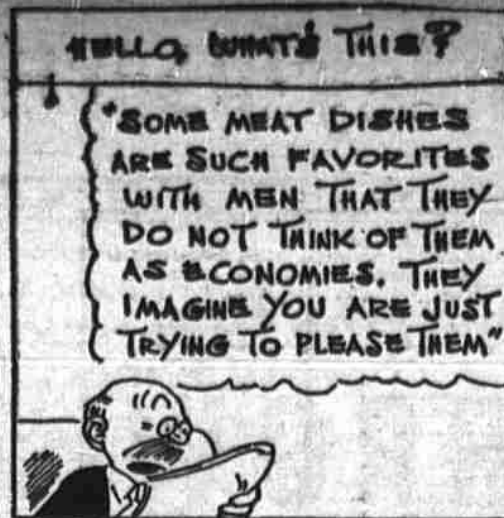

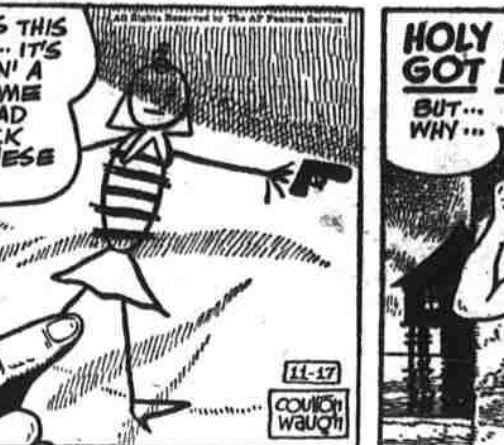


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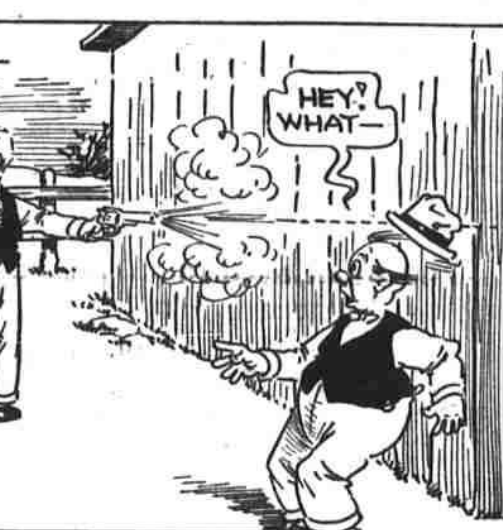

FD To Delay
Appointment
Of Justice

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Nov. 17 (AP)—President Roosevelt told reporters today he would wait until congress convenes in January, unless some emergency arises, to fill the supreme court vacancy left by the death of Justice Butler.

He said he had given no thought to a successor.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—Western senators were divided today over the need for appointment of a supreme court justice from beyond the Mississippi river to succeed Justice Pierce Butler.

Several of them said they would urge President Roosevelt to name a westerner, but Senator Borah (R-Idaho) questioned importance of geography in the selection.

The name of Attorney General Frank Murphy figured prominently in capital speculation. Although a resident of Michigan rather than of the West, Murphy is a Catholic, as was Butler.

The 73-year-old justice died early yesterday after a long illness, and his funeral was set for 10 a. m. (CST) today at St. Matthew's cathedral. Burial will be in St. Paul, Minn., his former home.

Farm Camps
Being Built

DALLAS, Nov. 17 (AP)—Appointment of managers of the four camps for migratory farm laborers now being built by the Farm Security administration was announced today by Regional Director C. M. Evans.

A. K. (Dad) Short and L. Burkett Arnold, both of Corpus Christi, are to serve as managers of the camps at Sinton (San Patricio county) and Robstown (Nueces county) respectively. Clay L. Cochran and James A. Moore, both of Austin, will manage camps at Weslaco (Hidalgo county) and Raymondville (Willacy county) respectively.

Camps are to be completed and ready for occupancy by the early months of 1940.

Evans said he believed the camps would furnish a vital service to farmers of the Texas fruit and vegetable growing area by making available to them a better class of farm laborers.

"Farm workers having clean clothes, a place to bathe and a warm place to sleep are in better physical and mental condition to do a day's work," he stated. "The camps will at least give them a temporary home while they work in the community and a place where they can find some measure of happiness."

Most of the migratory families numbering around 250 families in each camp will live in one-room mead shelters or groups of one-room units clustered in groups of six-apartment units. Permanent quarters for 147 families will be provided in the four camps, these families chosen from those who have practically permanent employment but are unable to pay higher rent.

Evans stated that he had recently talked with representatives of several North Texas cities seeking camps to relieve the "squatter town" situation in these communities and that extension of the camp program to North Texas is being considered.

PROPAGANDA FLIGHT

BASEL, Switzerland, Nov. 17 (AP)—A German propaganda bomber flew 60 miles into Switzerland today strewn thousands of anti-British pamphlets from Basel to Zug. The pamphlets were printed in French.

Either Garner Or Clark Preferred
By Alfalfa Bill Murray Who Wants
To Help Kick Out The New Deal

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 17 (AP)—William H. "Alfalfa Bill" Murray, grizzled, colorful former governor, was in a fine roarin' mood today as he settled down to discuss politics.

First off, the Hon. of Broken Bow wanted it known that "if there's any way to kick the new deal out in 1940, Bill Murray is going to take part in the kicking."

Secondly, he's whole-heartedly for

Texas' Jack Garner or Missouri's Sen. Bennett Champ Clark for the democratic nomination for president.

"Of course I'm working actively," said the ex-time presidential candidate. "I'm working for Jack Garner. But I'm for either Garner or Clark."

"I'm not for any man, living or dead, for a third term, but I'm dead against this man McNutt from Indiana. If neither Garner nor Clark can get it, then I'll be for Roosevelt if it's this guy McNutt."

He doesn't think Garner, 71, is too old because "this is an intellectual office, not a physical office and Garner knows right from wrong. He's got what this country needs now. Bennett Clark's got it, too, from his father, Champ Clark."

Murray turned his wrath on the national administration: "Roosevelt is leading us into war. He's violating the fundamental principles of international law. Repeal of the arms embargo won't get us into war but this dam fool 200-mile safety zone Roosevelt put around the western hemisphere very well might."

"Three miles is the limit of authority for any nation from its shores. We've got no more right to change the boundaries of the sea than Hitler has to change the boundaries of the land."

"Now if Hitler decides to send some submarines to within 300 miles of the American coast the president will go ahead without asking you or me and order the navy to sink the submarines and then we're in it."

RETAIL SALES STILL
AT FIRM LEVEL

NEW YORK, Nov. 17 (AP)—Retail sales turnover remained at substantially high levels this week despite a slight contraction in volume from the previous week, Dun & Bradstreet said today in a weekly survey.

"Active turnover was shared by practically all departments," the agency said, "although wearing apparel, particularly women's coats and furs was outstanding in most cities."

The increase above last year was placed at 8 to 16 per cent.

THREE SPIES BEHEADED

BERLIN, Nov. 17 (AP)—Three spies, convicted of treason for disclosing military secrets to a foreign intelligence service, were beheaded today.

They were Ewald Lakota, 29, of Beuthen; Johan Spoka, 26, of Beuthen, and Robert Schimpf, 33, of Kehl.

A fourth, whose name was not disclosed, was decapitated earlier.
