PECAN PACKING HOUSE OPENING

Employment was furnished for about sixty-five men and women here during the past week with the opening of the pecan packing house in the T. W. Johnson building opposite the Wheat Belt Grocery. Dave Calhoun, manager of the store, is also manager of the packing house.

According to Mr. Calhoun, the pecans are being trucked in here, shelled and are being jobbed out of the Perryton house. Several men are already on the road with the products which are being put up in a number of containers and more will be added later.

It is the present plans to make the business a permanent one and as sales increase the plant will be enlarged in size. If for no other reason than to help the unemployment situation, Perryton people should patronize the plant and use more pecans. The products are being sold in a number of Perryton business houses.

You would find that these willing women workers are not quitters, like yourselves, but that they are carrying on and putting forth greater efforts to make easier the way for their fellow man and neighbor who unfortunately are now in distress.

You would find every woman busy. Some are repairing old cast-off garments; others will be cutting out materials to make underwear or night clothes for little ones or dresses and shirts for men; some will be out investigating the true needs of some applicant for assistance; another will be working on the records of the association keeping an accurate account of all food and clothing given to each person; others will be waiting on some one in need; and on and on, but you will find every woman at a worth while task.

Mrs. Jas. E. Barbour, general chairman, states that to date they have helped 36 families, giving direct aid to 155 people. A total of almost 400 garments and items of wearing apparel have been given out. In addition to the clothing, a number of families have been provided with food, medicine, and fuel.

Father of Vance Apple Dies In Enid Hospital Wednesday; Burial at Fairview

Vance Apple, Perryton insurance man, received word early Wednesday morning of the death of his father, Clint Apple, in a hospital at Enid, Okla., at four o'clock that morning. The cause of his death is unknown. He had been a patient in the hospital for about two weeks but his condition was not considered serious. Burial will be at Fairview, Okla., his present home, at two o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Clint Apple was a former citizen of this city living in the early days on Wolf Creek just south of old Ochiltree. In the early days of Perryton he was a resident of this city. A complete obituary will be published in the next issue of the Herald.

MRS. E. R. SULLIVAN

Mrs. E. R. Sullivan, age sixty-four years and nine days, died Sunday morning at 4:15 in the home of her son, Dr. J. C. May, in this city. Mrs. Sullivan had been in very poor health for many years and her death came after days of intense suffering. Funeral rites were held at the Christian church on Monday afternoon, Rev. J. Wm. Hart officiating. The remains were laid to rest in the cemetery at Ochiltree.

Mary Cornelia Johnson was born November 18, 1868, at Gunton, Miss., being the oldest of a family of seven children. Two brothers, Lee and Henry, and one sister, Ethel, preceded her in death. The three surviving are Mrs. J. H. Shearer, Temple, Texas; Mrs. Minnie Anderson, Los Angeles, Calif.; and Mrs. S. W. Callaway, Taylor, Texas.

On December 26, 1888, the deceased was married to George W. May at Cleburne, Texas. To them was born one son, Carl May. The husband and father died on May 23, 1894. Mrs. May remarried in 1906 to E. R. Sullivan at Fort Worth, Texas. After a four years residence in the latter city, Mr. and Mrs. Sullivan removed to Lindirith, N. M., where they resided for 13 years, coming to Perryton in April, 1920.

Mrs. Sullivan was converted to the cause of Christianity at the age of eleven years and only last September was received into the fellowship of the First Christian church of this city. Surviving relatives are



RELIEF WORK IS NOW UNDER WAY

THIRTY MEN NOW EMPLOYED BY FEDERAL RELIEF COMMITTEE; MUCH NEEDED IMPROVEMENT IS DONE

Thirty men are being employed by the committee in charge of the Federal Relief fund, so reports Mayor Dave Shanks. Caliche sidewalks have been built over a greater part of the east side of the city and many additional blocks on the east and northwest parts of town will be constructed this month.

A force of men are at work at the cemetery and several gangs of men are working along the highways, burning weeds and doing other needed work. Caliche will be placed two blocks running east and west just south of the school grounds. The placing of caliche on any other streets will depend upon the cost and results on these two trial blocks.

At the present time, plenty of men have registered for the amount of work planned. Additional registrations must be made, not at the Mayor's office, but with Roy Christopher at the city hall.

FOURTH ANNUAL POULTRY SHOW

DATES OF NORTH PLAINS SHOW TO BE DECEMBER 14-15-16-17; CATALOG IS NOW OUT

The premium list and catalogue of the North Plains Poultry show, scheduled for December 14-15-16-17, has been issued and is now available to poultry raisers over this territory. A request addressed to M. M. Cudd, president of the North Plains Poultry association will bring one.

During the past week arrangements have been made to secure C. C. Ward Guthrie, Okla., licensed in A. P. A. work, here for the judging of the show. Nearly four hundred dollars will be offered in cash premiums in the open and 4-H club and vocational agriculture departments. Guy R. Sheets, county agent, has accepted the position of superintendent of the show and J. R. Hewitt will act as superintendent of the jury department.

The 1932 show will be the fourth annual event staged by the North Plains Poultry association. The show this year is being financed jointly by the Perryton Chamber of Commerce, which organization is offering \$250.00 for this purpose and the Commissioners Court of Ochiltree county which has contributed \$100.

Two silver loving cups will be offered during the show, one to the producer having the best poultry display and the other to the winning team in the poultry judging contest being staged for 4-H clubs and vocational agricultural teams. The cups are being furnished by the First National Bank and the Purina Mills through the Perryton Equity Exchange. The latter firm will furnish feeds for the show.

OUTLAWS TRIM PHILLIPS "66"

LOCAL GRIDSTERS ADMINISTER 19 TO 6 DEFEAT TO BORGER DELEGATION

Perryton Outlaws administered a 19 to 6 drubbing to the Phillips "66" gridsters from Borger last Friday afternoon before a scant crowd of Perryton fans. The Borger squad arriving nearly an hour after the game was scheduled to start was probably accountable for the small number present.

With a strong wind from the north that proved a handicap to the team headed against it, the locals and Borger played in fairly even territory for the first quarter. Near the start of the second quarter, the Outlaws held for downs on their own 9 yard line and Don Shockley went through on the first down, slipping away from the secondary defense and the safety for a 91 yard run for a touchdown. The extra point was converted through the line.

Again in the third quarter Shockley scrambled through the line for the second counter. Borger came back strong after the kick off and completed a long pass for their lone counter. In the final quarter Glen Ragan plunged through for the final touchdown just before the close of the game.

PETTY THIEVES TRACKED DOWN

OFFICER W. J. POTTORFF IS RESPONSIBLE FOR CLEARING UP NUMBER OF SMALL JOBS

The abundance of petty thievery that has been very evident in Perryton during the last few weeks has been temporarily halted through the activities of Officer W. J. Pottorff this week when a number of cases have been cleared up and those responsible brought to justice.

Three bills of burglary and theft and one of chicken theft have been turned in on both Mr. and Mrs. Ray Compton by Officer Pottorff, assisted by Officer R. H. Gamel and the cases await grand jury action. All the property has been recovered and confessions are said to have been secured. They are being held in county jail.

A case of burglary and theft has been placed against Walter Jines who is also in jail awaiting grand jury action. The arrest was made by Officer Pottorff on Tuesday and the property alleged to have been stolen from the Jack Allen property recovered. A confession has also been secured in this case according to Pottorff.

Jesse Porter, arrested by Pottorff on Wednesday for theft from McClellans Store was tried before Justice Dewey Allen after a confession had been secured. A jail sentence of twenty-one days was assessed. The property was recovered.

County Attorney Max W. Boyer was relieved of an overcoat affid after property recently and Officer Pottorff was put on the case, securing arrests and convictions. Glen Langingham and Carl Donley were found guilty before Justice Dewey Allen and given fines and jail sentences.

Several other cases have been cleared up recently. This splendid work by Officer Pottorff should put a stop to much of the thievery that has been going on recently.

Rangers Defeat Miami Warriors In Turkey Day Grid Classic

IN LAST GAME OF '32 SEASON

RANGERS CLOSE SCHEDULE BY WINNING FROM STRONG MIAMI WARRIOR GRIDSTERS

The Perryton Rangers closed the 1932 grid season with flying colors on Thanksgiving day when they defeated the strong Miami Warriors, strengthened by a number of ineligible, taking the places of several of the regular team who were out of the game because of injuries, presented strong competition for the Rangers.

Starting a drive in the opening period of the game after receiving the kick-off, the Warriors were halted on the Ranger 3 yard stripe. Near the close of the quarter, the Rangers started in the opposite direction which resulted in a touchdown early in the second period when Morton snagged a long pass and tumbled over the goal line.

The third period was scoreless with both teams inside the opponents 20 yard tape. The final Ranger counter came near the close of the game when McClung plunged over from the 7 yard tape.

The running account of the game follows:

The Rangers kicked off to open the game, with Miami registering a 19 yard carry-back from the 24 yard stripe. A 5 yard Ranger off-side penalty and two line plays that netted 5 gave the Warriors a first down. A yard loss on a line play, 7 yards around end and a 4 yard plunge earned another first down. Talley went around end for 4 and Owens slipped through the line for a 21 yard gain and a first down, advancing to the Ranger 11 yard tape.

Rangers Hold For Downs.
A line play netted 2 yards, Talley went through for 5, a fumble recovered by a Miami line man accounted for a 4 yard loss, and another line drive that netted 2 yards and Miami was held for downs on the 5 yard stripe. Johnson punted to the 35, the Warriors returning to the 26. A pass was incomplete and the Warriors were thrown for a 4 yard loss around end. Another incomplete pass earned a 5 yard penalty and Miami punted outside on the 17 yard stripe.

Johnson went through the line for 3, McClung for 5 and Johnson repeated for 3 more and a first down. Two more line plays netted 4 yards and pass, Pattison to Morton was completed for 12 yards and a first down. Graves was substituted for Mounts and Cofer for Copeland. Pattison went through the line for 5 yards. Hull ducked off tackle for 4 and Johnson plunged for 2 and a first down. A pass was incomplete and Johnson plunged for 8 yards and again for 4 and a first down. Another pass was incomplete. A line play netted a yard. Hull raced around right end for 8 yards. Johnson made it a first down through the line for a 4 yard gain. Hull went off left tackle for 6 yards as the quarter closed scoreless, with the Rangers on the 15 yard stripe.

Morton Scores On Pass.
The Rangers substituted Mounts for Graves and Copeland for Cofer. Three line bucks gain 4 yards and a measure with the chain on the final down lacked but a few inches of making downs. The Warriors punted to the 50, Hull receiving and being downed for a yard return. A short pass, Pattison to Morton was good for 8 yards. Johnson plunged 2 and Hull clipped off tackle for 3 and a first down. Morton gained 4 yards around end and Copeland earned 2 around the opposite side. A line buck gained one and on the final down, with the ball on the 30 yard stripe, Pattison heaved a long pass to Morton who was waiting on the goal line, scoring the first Ranger touchdown. Ellis' kick from placement went wide.

The Rangers kicked off, Miami receiving on the 35 and returning to the 35. Three running plays netted a yard gain and Miami punted to Hull who fumbled, recovering on the 32 yard line. McClung, Hull and Johnson went through for an even 10 yards and a first down. Miami substituted Parrish for Talley. McClung gained 2, Copeland 3 on an end run, Johnson 4 and again for 3 and a first down. A pass, Pattison to Hull is good for 8 yards. A line play gains slightly and Johnson lunges through for 4 and a first down. McClung snagged a long pass but was out-of-bounds when he received it and it was called incomplete. Hull broke loose around end for 9 yards. Johnson made it a first down with a 5 yard plunge. Johnson went through for 3 more and McClung followed him for 5.

The Rangers fumble on the next down and the ball rolls back to the 25 yard stripe where it is recovered for a 12 yard loss as the half ended. Score, Rangers 6, Miami 0.

Rangers Held For Downs.

When I spoke he spit on the ground and then rubbed his foot on it like most men when they thinkin. "Meonin which" says he. An then "They nuthin but sky and geography in sight, and the sky is half of it", and "The Skys the limit" says I.

We climbed down over a dozen rocks the size of the Perryton Court house and over forty seven logs that was built to be cut up into tractor wheels, and I saw the last of him as he climbed on his boss with a pinyon club for an excellerator, and he says "You know, I feels just like I was gonna get lost for a day or two. Tell Lightnin (the coker) not to hold no cold fried eggs over for me, I don't like no day old eggs, specially fried".

I went back to camp early and goin in, I noticed that the big deer skull that Two Belly Glasgow had hung up on a dead tree was gone. I felt bad about that cause T. B. wanted them he said to hang on the front of his wife's auto as a sort of a cow catcher.

At camp, I saw Lightnin, with his snow white suit cookin the eggs for next mornins breakfast and when I got there, he said Houston had been in camp had got a roll of wire. I didn't think nuthin, and ambled down to the old brandin corral of the Oh bar Oh and noticed that the old brandin cow hide was gone.

Everybody was in before dark that night—you know it was the day following the one when a mountain lion dared Big Foot Barber to shoot, and started the record foot race. The boys was all clamatin for me to go out with em, and I just had to promise each one confidential like that I would go with him and no body else, I made those promises about as sweet and prono as any girl down there. All was in camp, captain Houston. Where was Houston?

After supper Two Belly was askin me "Just how fast a grown bear could run", and the other boys was wantin to know when I was goin to be a searchin party of one to find Houston.

It was close to midnight when I coaxed First National Banks Ranson to go with me. I took a gas lantern and he carried a gun. Somehow he did not think to carry no food ner first aid for the absentee. We went out about two miles, half of it strait up, and right where the canyon changes its mind and turned to the north, and where all hunters bound Eagle Peak and all point east and south had to pass, I spied a buck. But My eyes are not half as good as those of First National Banks. He saw him first, and grabbed me with one hand while he laid his gun on my shoulder for a rest, and blazed away.

I told him that he was not allowed to hunt after sun down, and he came back at me and said I was huntin too, so I saw he didnt have no sense for argument, and if he had of had, he would have noticed that the buck with his magnificent head of fourteen points was brindle in color or stripes and there was some of his skull that warent covered with no hair. After the fifth shot I was ordered to hold the lantern higher for him, and I seed he was layin behind a log now, but a vice would not have quieted that gun barrel. It was revolvoin about like a bent axle

on a Model Tee.

Each shot brought a muffled thud like a cow bell with the tongue covered with leather. And now, the buck actually was turnin his horns at us, and his head standin still.

First National turned to me with pleading voice and axed me to help him kill the buck. "Come on, says I and I will get him while you get some splinters to keep your legs from shakin to pieces. We walked closer, probably within 25 feet of the buck, and as the horns turned back to place, he tried to take the gun from me.

About that time, he could see a wire stretched between two trees, a wire was also attached to each antler, and disappeared in the night. The legs were swingin free of the ground, and the whole thing was rocking slowly in the wind. There was two holes in the hide, one where the bullet went in and one where it came out. First National had hit it ONCE.

"Listen, compadre" says he (notice he was learnin Spanish fast) "I dont know where Houston is, and I dont care. Furthermore, I am not going to the end of them two wires. But I'll give you two gallons of the finest grape wine that is made southeast of Perryton, if you will just keep your mouth shut for twelve hours. I think I know where some of Ma Ferguson's votes are goin to be in the mornin". "Bring on the wine" says I, and we climbed down to camp where First National said Houston was gone, but he was probably all right as he answered the signals.

Next morning whilst I was tryin to get a kink out of my back and a cramp out of my calf, I heard First National tellin Potlicker Brillhart and Bowen (the Indians had a name for him) that if they was to follow up the big canyon till it turned to the north, they was liable to find sumptin. Lightnin had breakfast ready when I got out o bed. And even at that before I got through eatin they came the darndest bombardment you ever heard outside of the fourth of July and the second battle of the Marne. Bowen came back for more ammunition "Its a heluva big buck he said" and Alibi trotted at his side pushing shells into his Chinbuster as they hurried back to the hills.

Houston wondered into camp about noon, with a wane smile on his face. "They have gone on" he said. "If it hadnta been for Alibi accidentally shootin the wire in two, er their ammunition had a lasted, they would a been there yet, pumpin lead over that fallen log and cussin that roan deer".

While Houston was reachin for a helpin of ham and eggs and fourth helping of coffee he informed "You know they hit it twice too".

THEM PERRYTON HUNTERS

Dear Ed:

Two Belly Glasgow said that Rome howled onct. Plum forgot when he said it was. But I aint forgot when Perryton howled. It was after we had been hunting a few days, and Lightnin McCoy cut up Alibi Cudd's spike buck for camp meat. Alibi got all filled up on big bad words, and didnt eat ary supper that night. But next mornin he was a sayin "Speakin o beaf steak—pass that buck again". After that Alibi was a passin the buck most of the time.

We organized a bear hunt to get the Glasgow bear. It was THE bear, the one that had a blister across his hind foot that showed so plain in his track that even Two Belly noticed it, and he warent payin much attention to tracks after the first day. We was still at breakfast when I was a thinkin this, and I was a thinkin slow kos I aint got no education like them Texas hombraes who was given a free education in the Tee You at the expense of their dads.

"I dont believe in NO signs" says Big Foot Barber and Two Belly allowed that he would when he seed the track of the O. G. bear. An then 1st National Ranson sorto licked the lasses offen his fingers and allow that he heard as how it was bad luck fer a cat to cross your track specially when it was twixt you and your boss, and then some damfof lefed and big Foot grinned and show his teeth.

Big Foot hunted with Alico Jesus Romero again that day, and Bowen he laugh and say they haint no one got no goods on him, yet. An Houston he say "por que" and show

sad face and glistening eye again.

We climbed ole Eagle Peak for about eight miles and goin up I seed a path in the snow where two sheep was goin down to water and a man's track in behind like he was drivin the critters, or he nout a been huntin em. "I know that shoe track" says I. "Notice he aint got no overshoe", and Two Belly he gets red in the face and lows that sumptin might happen if his saddle cincha broke on that climb, and hangs onto the man closter with both hands.

When we first struck the bear track, Potlicker Brillhart and Alibi Cudd stops their hoss and looks and thinks a bit. I seed em measure the track, and Alibi says "12 1-2 inches long and 5 inches wide". "En see too that his steps are 4 feet apart" said Brillhart. They got back on their hosses and started down the hill, and I calls "hey, that bear went this a way", and they answers "We is going back to where he was a cub and get a shot at his mother". An that is the last I seed them two that day.

Dead Shot Dick Houston met up with the bear first, and he didnt need no introduction. Said the bear was as big as a thousand pound hoss if you cut him off at the knees and pushed his head half way back in his body. He took a three foot fallen log (diameter not length) for a rest and started his argument. "The bear was eatin acorns 150 yards away and it took three shots to injure him that some one was shootin at him. The next six shots was a second battle of Manassas with Houston actin as the Confederate Army. That eliminated Houston. He ambled into camp next day with a sad smile and an empty gun and stood for a picture that Alibi said he was goin to put in his Bible. I am fixin to ask you does he have one?

The bear ran up the canyon (Houston went DOWN). An that brought the visitor up in front of Two Belly about the place where the mountain lion buried the leavins of Silent Cals buck and Potlickers turkeys. I was in the replacement camp down below and I have to quote Glasgow on what took place here. He missed his first shot at 25 feet and the bear ran up to within three feet of him and then stopped suddenly and stood up on his hind legs. Two Belly thinkin that it was a call for surrender pushed the gun forward at the bear and it went off accidentally and hit the bear in the heart. That's what he said. The bear then ran over the hog back and into a canyon that Glasgow said afterwards was four miles deep and a mile long. I couldnt find no blood when I got up there, but the tracks was thick an half of em was Obes. I went down to bring up the horses whilst Two Belly and Silent Cal went down to locate the carcass and skin out the bear. Bowen went down with me and told me confidential like that he was cold. I noticed that he was shakin but I thought it was sumptin else.

We stopped to call some turkeys and it was an hour or two before Bowen and me got the hosses and there was Silent Cal sittin on a log smokin "Wheres Obe" says I as I got in speaking distance. "Obes daid" he answers. "Hes what? Tell me about it" and I shook him to see if I could rattle a few words out of his mouth, er some loose teeth, and he just kept on sayin nuthin. "Where is he?" I says and he points to the canyon. He would not come with me and he wouldnt talk, so finally I appealed to Bowen and he got a few mixed words outa him that were arranged as follows "If he aint daid now he soon will be, kos hes in the bears den with the bear."

It was up to me to back track, then track Obe to the cave. I saw more tracks, and some that was goin in too. An there was Two Belly er part of im. Looked like he was crawlin out o that hole backwards and probably keepin the bear covered with his gun. Just then,

with a smashing of twigs in the fire, the bear come out the main entrance an was off before I could shoot. I noticed a big bloody hole in his right ear.

Well thats all. Cept that I forgot to tell that Obe had been lookin into the hole up above and was on his knees and reachin way down with a pole, tryin to prod the bear out, and he slipped in the snow. I tied his feet together, so as I could put a pole between the wet shoes like a crow bar, and pried him out. Obe axed me not to tell you about this hunt, but Im goin to tell it, cause I think the jokes on me.

Dear Editor:

I trust that my breaking into print at this time will not be misunderstood, and hasten disclaim other than constructive motives, but it would be inconsistent for me to refrain from comment at this time, concerning the matter about which this is written.

Having spoken individually to two or three, I take this means of suggesting that in the providing of work in connection with the expenditure of the Federal Relief money received for Ochiltree county, that the placing of caliche, filling of mud-holes and making caliche sidewalks, be not confined to the city of Perryton alone.

Of the suggestions printed in your issue last week, only the work at the cemetery and the burning of weeds along highways were mentioned as outside of Perryton. It is my sincere opinion, that if the work of improving the bad mud holes and providing caliche walks be spread over a larger area and include work in other parts of the county it would be appreciated by the residents of those communities and go far to build and maintain the good will that, speaking for Farnsworth, we are glad exists

There are many places on the country roads where men with shovels could be very profitably employed filling bad holes, building up approaches to culverts and bridges and cleaning culverts.

As a lover of trees, and with a measure of experience, I question the suggestion of setting trees at the cemetery, with no available water for irrigation, and no dependable assurance of providing future care and cultivation. If trees are to be considered, I suggest they be placed along the highways, where the water from the bar pits will go far toward maintaining them in a growing condition. Witness the fine growth of the trees along the highway by the school grounds. These could well be extended all the way along the highway. In this I think we would have the approval and cooperation of the Highway Department. I have understood that instructions have been issued that wherever trees were growing along the right of way, they were to be left and protected whenever possible. My point is that trees along the bar pits would stand a better chance of surviving and giving results in beautification, than would trees at the cemetery without water.
