### HOME TOWN TALK

Radio, undoubtedly, is one of the outstanding accomplishments of the century. Its usefulness has been shown in many ways. It has grown rapidly. It is here to stay.

The larger cities, with powerful stations, entertain tens of thousands every day and night. These great national and regional stations are worth much to their cities and communities in building up good will over large territories.

There are many small local stations scattered over the country which sprang up when radio was a fad more than an industry. They flourished until their programs, not entertaining chiefly because there was not sufficient local talent available or cash on hand to obtain good professional performers, began to get "old." Then the folks in the home town started twisting the dial away from the small station to get the better programs of the larger ones.

It is extremely difficult to obtain permit for a local station, not to speak of a regional broadcast permit.

It is gratifying to note that Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Settles, who are building the 15-story hotel here, are also interested in obtaining permission to build and operate a first class radio station in the hotel. Big Spring could profit much by such a station provided it were operated efficiently and made more powerful just as rapidly as the federal radio commission would permit.

West Texas needs and ought to have a powerful station. It has none. Fort Worth's the nearest powerful station, large enough to obtain the splendid chain programs offered each night over national networks. West Texas ought to have one.

With persons of such unusual financial resources behind the proposition it is safe to predict the Settles station would be built up as rapidly in power and importance as the commission would allow. To begin with, it would appear, the fact that ample funds for operating the station would be available, ought to be an aid in obtaining the initial permit.

If Big Spring could obtain a powerful regional station it would be of much value. If it could obtain only a small local station and have no chance of being permitted to make it more powerful it would not be of any benefit to us.

This column would like very much to see a large station established here. It would be money well spent for the Settles and for the town. It would be a means of communicating with the six or seven hundred families in Big Spring who use radio sets, especially during the winter months. It would place the name of the city before the throughout West Texas who have sets.

### PRISONERS STRIKE FOR MORE MEAT

150 Refuse To Leave Dining Hall Of Prison

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., March 26. (AP)—Seven hundred and fifty prisoners in the Missouri penitentiary mutinied this afternoon refusing to move out of the prison dining hall until they were "fired some meat."

Dissatisfied over the noon menu, the prisoners said they would remain in the dining room, and prison officials at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon were marshalling forces to cope with the situation.

The prison was immediately closed to outsiders, and no information could be obtained there, but Governor Caulfield and his secretary, who were in close touch with the situation, told of reports they had received. Prison officials were assembling all available men and arming them and planned to enter the dining hall under guard and equipped with tear gas bombs for a parley with the convicts.

The governor said he had been advised there had been no violence and that the officials had hopes of peacefully settling the situation. Governor Caulfield also called A. V. Adams, assistant general and instructed him to prepare all available national guardsmen to stand ready for duty at the prison if necessary.

### April 6 Announced As Date For New Features To Appear

The House of Dorgan has long been associated with the laugh-making industry and one noted member of the family will entertain readers of The Herald with his daily cartoon, Colonel Giffith.

### ASSAILANT WOUNDED BY PARTNER

Texarkana Sheriff Rushes Blacks To Safety

TEXARKANA, Ark. March 26. (AP)—Rufus Thompson, 34-year-old negro, today shot and killed Lucian Adams, 28, Miller county deputy sheriff and former Texarkana high school star athlete, when Adams attempted to arrest Thompson's brother-in-law.

Shot Four Times The officer's companion, Dick Card, 28, shot the negro three or four times with an automatic pistol after Adams had been slain, but did not kill him.

Sheriff Flett Magee and Deputy Sheriff Everett Mills placed the wounded negro and his brother-in-law in an automobile and hurried them away to guard against mob violence. The party was reported to have crossed Red river a few minutes later.

Adams and Card had gone 13 miles north of here to arrest Thompson's brother-in-law, Roland Cheatham, 21, on a glove theft charge.

It was thought officers would lodge the negro in jail at Prescott, Ark., or take him to the state penitentiary at Little Rock.

Cheatham was a former tenant on Adams' plantation. He was alleged to have stolen a stove when he left the farm last week to live with his father.

Officers procured a warrant for his arrest and today went to the home of his father, General Cheatham, 60. Adams said he had come after Roland. The officer and the elder Cheatham started arguing, and the negro was knocked down when he made a move toward his hip.

Roland Cheatham then threw himself upon the deputy sheriff, and Adams struck the younger negro with his gun. Rufus Thompson ran out of a house across the road. As Adams turned to face him, he shot the officer over the right eye with a shotgun.

General Cheatham was arrested later. Officers declined to reveal where he was being held.

### Bond Denied Man In Orange Shooting

ORANGE, Texas, March 26 (AP)—N. E. Perkins, 41, was remanded to jail without bond today after a preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace L. J. Miller in connection with the slaying of Will C. White, policeman, here yesterday.

Mrs. Fannie Perkins, his wife, was allowed \$5,000 bond. Statements of both Perkins and his wife were taken, but no new evidence was uncovered. Perkins declined to say whether he did the shooting.

White was shot at a joint store and residence of the couple after he had stopped to quell a disturbance. He was a brother of former Mayor Sol M. White.

### Marconi, In Italy, Flashes On Lights In Sydney, Australia

GENOA, Italy, March 26 (AP)—Short radio waves cutting across the Atlantic, America and the Pacific today carried the voice of Marquis Guglielmo Marconi, inventor of wireless, from his yacht Electra here to Sydney, Australia, to open the electrical exposition there.

At 8 a. m. he spoke across 11,000 miles to the director of the electrical association, Fink, reading a message which outlined what he intended doing.

At 11:30 a. m. the inventor pressed a telegraph key, which radiated a minute quantity of electricity to Sydney 11,000 miles away, with sufficient power to close a circuit of thousands of lights, signifying formal opening of the exposition.

SYDNEY, New South Wales, March 26 (AP)—An electrical radio impulse initiated on the Marquis Guglielmo Marconi's yacht Electra in the harbor at Genoa today switched on electric lamps lighting the electric radio exhibit here.

The signals from the yacht were picked up at Dorchester and flashed by beam radio from Grimsby to Australia, where they were picked up at Victoria and conveyed by land-line to the town hall here. The impulse there closed a switch lighting the 3,000 lamps.

A radio message from Marquis Marconi congratulating Australia on her strides in recent years in world-wide wireless communication also was picked up.

Sealed bids for purchase of \$260,000 in Big Spring municipal bonds, publicly opened and read Tuesday evening at the district court room by the city commission were all rejected. The highest bid was 96 cents on the dollar.

But three bids were considered. Five were filed but after one had been read Mr. Crosby, representing a large bond house, arose and asked that he be allowed to correct one of two bids he had filed. He said he had just noted that he had made an error in figuring the discount.

Considerable discussion followed. J. W. Wheeler, who, as representative of Brown-Crummer and Caldwell & Company had just heard his bid read, said he had no objection to Mr. Crosby being allowed to correct his bid. The city manager, Mr. Smitham, strenuously opposed the procedure, as did members of the commission, who took the position that the bid had been filed competitively along with the others and that if it were withdrawn at all it would have to be kept out.

The result was that Mr. Crosby was given his choice of either allowing both his bids to be considered along with the others or of permanently withdrawing both of them. He withdrew them.

Bids considered were: Brown-Crummer and Caldwell & Co., Nashville, Tenn., 95 cents on the dollar. Submitted through J. W. Wheeler. H. C. Burt & Company, Houston, par and interest provided the city allow \$10,865 for legal expenses. This, according to the representative of the bidder, actually figured 95.90.

Ryan-Sutherland Company, Toledo, Ohio, \$251,900 for the three issues, par value of which totaled \$265,000. This, a discount of \$13,200, figured 95.02, said the bidder's representative.

Immediately after the third and last bid had been read by Mayor Cunningham Commissioner Piner moved that all bids be rejected. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Inkman, and was unanimously passed.

Following the meeting the bidders were informed, in answer to questions, that the city commission would not consider selling the bonds, which would carry five per cent interest, for less than par. The commission announced that a new date for receiving sealed bids would perhaps be set and advertised so that all reputable houses might enter bids if they desire.

The bond men said that the fact San Antonio was selling \$2,000,000 in bonds Tuesday very likely prevented a number of concerns from sending representatives to enter bids and that that was one reason for lack of competition in the bidding.

Mr. Piner of the commission, a banker, told the bidders he felt their bids were too low, considering the greatly improved condition of the bond market. Houston and Haskell counties a few days ago received bonuses for bonds, he pointed out. Houston's bonds, too, carried a bonus.

### New Pecos Murder Mystery Puzzles West Texas Officers

FORT STOCKTON, Mar. 26 (AP)—Another murder mystery confronted Pecos county officials today as they sought identification of the body of a 45-year-old man, third murder victim recovered from the brackish waters of the Pecos River within the last six weeks.

The nude body of the man, a bullet hole through his back, was recovered by fishermen from the river 25 miles from here, near Imperial, about half a mile from the place where the bodies of a woman, about 35, and a 12-year-old girl, were discovered on Feb. 21. The man's body had been stripped of clothing, and nothing with which to identify him was found in the vicinity. The body was held today in a mortuary at Fort Stockton.

Sheriff W. P. Rooney and state rangers who investigated said the man could not have been dead more than two days.

The murder victim had grey eyes, was of brunet type with hair turning grey. His face was closely shaven, and his hair had been neatly trimmed. A small pit scar on the left cheek and a large scar on the left side of the neck were the only marks on the body which might afford identification.

Pecos county and seven neighboring counties posted rewards of more than \$1,000 for apprehension of the slayers of the woman and girl, and Sheriff Rooney predicted other rewards would be posted in the latest case, which he believed might have some connection with the other two deaths.

## APRIL 17 IS NEW DATE FOR VOTING

New Statute Causes Change From April 5

Date for the \$125,000 school bond election in the Big Spring independent district was postponed from April 5, to April 17 Wednesday when it was learned a recent act of the legislature destroyed validity of the first election order.

One Each Year Under the existing law affecting school bond issues, at least one bond must fall due and payable each year. In the first order passed by the Big Spring independent school board, the first bond would become payable two years after the election, which is not in accordance with existing statutes.

Announcement that the election date had been changed was made at the Business Men's Luncheon club Wednesday noon by W. C. Blankenship, who presented a new petition and secured signatures from those present. The corrected petition and order will be presented the school board Wednesday afternoon for confirmation.

With the forced change effective, voters will go to the polls April 17 to elect trustees of the board, but will not cast a ballot for or against the school bonds until April 17.

Other features of the regular weekly Business Men's club luncheon included talks by B. E. Robbins, Wilburn Barcus, R. L. Portwood, Salvation Army campaign director, C. T. Watson, V. R. Smith, and B. Reagan. Harvey L. Rix was in charge of Wednesday's program.

Salvation Army Mr. Portwood of Dallas, who is in Big Spring in the interest of the Salvation Army financial drive which is now in progress and which will be closed with a general appeal April 2, 3 and 4, explained how the charity organization is operated. The budget adopted by the local executive committee of the Salvation Army calls for \$3,500 on which to operate the post in Big Spring and surrounding territory during the ensuing 12 months.

Out of this budget \$250 will be sent to state wide departments of the Salvation Army. One hundred dollars will be apportioned to the Salvation Army maternity home in San Antonio to which Big Spring cases will have access. Fifty dollars will take care of Big Spring's share in maintenance of the Salvation Army officer's training school, and \$100 will go to furtherance of extension work. When Captain and Mrs. Scott opened the Salvation Army post in Big Spring, \$400 was apportioned them from the state extension fund which has been used in charity work in this city during the past three and one-half months. Another \$250 has been set aside for financial campaign expenses. However, results of the campaign will reveal whether the entire \$250 has been required for that work.

### Treasurer

Following the meeting, Mr. Portwood explained that B. Reagan, president of the West Texas National Bank, is treasurer of the local Salvation Army organization and that money spent during the year is under his supervision and is issued in allotments of 12 equal payments to the individual Salvation Army account here to carry on its work. Only \$1,200 of the money raised is spent on salaries, Captain and Mrs. Scott, which averages ap-

## CITY COMMISSION REVIEWS PUBLIC AND PRIVATE WATERWORKS OWNERSHIP

The Herald has received the following public statement, signed by all members of the city commission. It deals with a topic addressed to the entire citizenship. The question reviewed is relative merits of private or public ownership of the local waterworks. The full statement follows:

March 25, 1930.

To the Citizens of Big Spring: The city commission has noted a considerable amount of publicity and some discussion on the question of selling the city water works to a private corporation. One of the local newspapers has been carrying articles almost every week advocating such a sale and advancing as reasons therefore first, that it would get the water system out

of politics and, second, that the proceeds from such a sale would be sufficient to retire all of the present outstanding indebtedness of the city.

This commission feels that intelligent public discussion of this or any other matters connected with city government is always beneficial, and heartily welcomes such evidences of interest from the citizens.

The city water system, whether publicly or privately owned, we must all agree is the one most vital thing upon which the growth and prosperity of the city is based. We, therefore, feel that any discussion concerning the transfer from municipal to private ownership should be conducted with a very full con-

sideration of all the factors and elements applicable to the situation. We do not believe that any action should be taken until the mature judgment of the people is expressed after full consideration of all the facts and conditions. We think it would be well to bear in mind at this time that for many years the water works here was a privately owned enterprise and that the only expression of the public will on this question, up to the present time, has been in that action which directed the city government many years ago to purchase the system from Mr. C. L. Alderman, the private owner, and continue its operation as a public enterprise.

Visits The present agitation for the sale

of the water works appears to result from a number of visits which have been made to our city by one Col. Hamblin, a representative of the People's Light and Power Company. Col. Hamblin is a very interesting character and has discussed this question at great length with various members of the City Commission from time to time.

Without exception, he has told that if he cared to submit us in writing a proposition to buy the water works at a fair price, and under the terms of a fair franchise, that he was at liberty to do so and might rest assured that this Commission would not take the responsibility of either accepting or rejecting such a proposition, but would submit the matter at once

to the people for their consideration. Up to the present, he has never done this. Therefore, no proposition has been laid before the people to consider. Col. Hamblin has indicated from time to time that he would like to buy this waterworks at around \$500,000 but we have never been able to pin him down to a discussion of the terms and conditions of the franchise, which we feel is as vitally important as is the price. Our present belief is that the price he mentions is far less than this utility should bring if sold. So far as the present commission is concerned, it will never be a party to any private negotiations for the sale of such an important asset to the first person who comes along with a desire to

buy it. These franchises are both valuable and vital to the city and, if sold, should be sold after wide publicity and to the highest bidder.

## VALUE OF MILK DIET INDICATED

Health Committee Of  
County Furnishes  
Half Pint Daily

A survey of the benefits to be derived from a daily milk diet was made Tuesday afternoon by the Howard County Health committee under whose direction 150 underweight school children of the city have been given one half pint of milk daily, the last two months.

Each child receiving the daily milk has gained from one to four pounds in weight after two months of the milk diet. The milk has been given the children by the health committee with the aid of the teachers in the schools. Fifty children in each ward school have received the milk.

Interest in the milk diet has so grown among children of Central Ward that even children of normal weight who have not taken milk daily, have begun to drink from a half pint to a pint daily. Thirty-five mothers of children in this ward send milk to school for their children. The total number of children now on the milk diet is 85.

Steps are being taken by the health committee in cooperation with city officials to enforce the Standard Milk Ordinance. Enforcement of the ordinance is awaiting only the arrival of a state food inspector.

Those persons who have not yet paid their Christmas Health Seal contributions are sending the money in, according to those in charge. Such persons have needed only the stimulation in interest afforded by a realization of the use to which the money has been put. It was said by the committee.

In cooperation with the health movement, Mrs. M. R. Showalter, county health nurse, has sent out leaflets and pamphlets on health to the various schools of the city and county, where teachers have cooperated in dispersing the knowledge of health rules.

## Tarrant County Will Ask Pay For State's Prisoner Lodging

FORT WORTH, Tex., March 25 (AP)—Failing to leave their prisoners on the state prison's doorstep, Tarrant county may seek to collect from the state for their board and keep.

Acting on a resolution passed by commissioners' court, county judge S. D. Shannon said he planned to write the state prison board informing members that Tarrant county expected to be reimbursed for those prisoners kept in the county jail until the state could find room for them. The fee named 50 cents per day per prisoner.

## Brady Counsel To Call 190 Witnesses

AUSTIN, March 26 (AP)—Dayton Moses of Fort Worth, of counsel for John W. Brady, under indictment for the murder of Miss Lehlis Highsmith, stabbed to death last November 9, filed with district clerk S. A. Philquist a list of 190 witnesses the defense desires summoned for the second trial of Brady set for April 14.

None of the witnesses used in the first trial were on the list, and those named represented persons in all walks of life all from Travis county.

Brady's first trial resulted in the jury failing to agree. Eleven of the jurors were for conviction.

Tucker, executive secretary, at association headquarters here.

## BRIDGE BILL PASSED

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP)—The Cartwright bill to authorize the states of Texas and Oklahoma to construct and operate a free highway bridge across the Red river on United States highway No. 77, between Gainesville, Texas, and Marietta, Okla., was passed today by the house and sent to the senate.

## CORN ACREAGE DOWN

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP)—A 28 per cent increase in the acreage of corn this year, a 15.0 per cent decrease in that of Durum wheat and a 0.1 per cent increase in the acreage of all other spring

wheat as compared with last year's harvested acreage, were indicated by farmers' intentions on March 1 to plant this spring as announced today by the department of agriculture.

## DIRECTORS NAMED

DALLAS, March 26 (AP)—All officers of the Central and Southwest Utilities Company were re-elected at the annual meeting of the board of directors here today. Stockholders chose Frank M. Kemp of Dallas as a director to fill the vacancy caused by the recent death of George W. Fry of Abilene.

BIG PLANE TO VISIT U. S. FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, March 26 (AP)—The huge German Dornier DO-X will attempt a flight to the United States this summer providing trial flights with American motors to be installed next month prove satisfactory.

## Two Sentences of Death Reversed

AUSTIN, March 26 (AP)—Two death and one life imprisonment sentences were reversed and remanded by the Court of Criminal Appeals today because the indictments did not allege the defendant killed with malice aforethought. The court had previously ruled that under the law, unless one killed with malice aforethought they could not be given a sentence of more than five years in prison.

Murray on February 28, 1929; Will Fritts, against whom the extreme penalty was inflicted in Jones county for the murder of Earl Hamilton on October 24, 1928, and E. Gilbert of Tyler county, given life for murder of Wesley McCarty on January 19, 1929, won new trials because of this defect in the indictments.

## Huge Darst Creek Gusher Completed

SAN ANTONIO, March 26 (AP)—The Darst Creek pool in Guadalupe county today claimed the honor of having become one of the greatest in Southwest Texas.

The No. 1 Mrs. M. E. Roemer of the Magnolia Petroleum Company came in as a gusher yesterday, officially gauged as making 32,800 barrels at 2,317 feet.

However, the field was under production and the new well was making more than double the allotment daily runs from the entire field.

## Pro Administrator Fired in Defense of Life, Attorney Says

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP)—E. S. Chapman, assistant prohibition administrator from the Northern Mississippi district, who shot and killed J. L. Doggett yesterday, will not be suspended, because Assistant United States Attorney Sack reported to Prohibition Commissioner Doran today that Chapman acted in self-defense and was fortunate to be alive.

## Government Seeks Bristow's Release

SAN ANGELO, Tex., March 26 (AP)—A telegram received here today from Rep. C. F. Hudspeth at Washington said the state department had announced that all possible means to effect the release of J. E. Bristow of San Angelo, held for ransom by Mexican bandits, would be taken immediately.

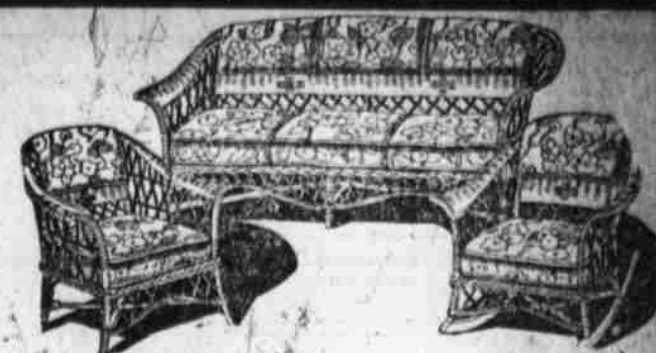

approximately \$18 per week, according to Mr. Portwood.

C. T. Watson, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, urged support of the Salvation Army and told how Big Spring is criminally neglecting its charity work. "We are passing the buck," said Mr. Watson. "I and hundreds of others away from the Chamber of Commerce every month and tell individuals to see the city manager or the county judge and literature to say they have told their cases to the Chamber of Commerce."

Mr. Smith, city manager, asked whether the \$3,500 budget provided for all charity work in the city and Mr. Portwood replied that the Salvation Army will be glad to assume all the burdens of charity work if the city, county and other organizations conducting that type of work will make substantial donations to enable the Army to do the job in a satisfactory manner.

"If the city and county care to go through records and base donations to the Salvation Army according to the amounts spent on charity during the past 12 months, we will be glad to handle the entire work," said Mr. Portwood.

Petition  
Prior to the discussion concerning the Salvation Army, Mr. Watson presented a petition to the Federal Radio Commission asking that permission be granted for establishment of a broadcasting station in Big Spring. The petition was circulated among members of the club to secure signatures.

R. Reagan, a guest of the club, was called on to make a few remarks and he scored proponents of the movement to sell the water works system. "I recall, and probably a number of you do too, how we had water service only two hours each day when the water works system was in private hands. I think we should come out and express our opinions against this proposition and keep what water we have under our own control," said Mr. Reagan.

## University Athletic Council Has Long Session, But Fails to Agree

AUSTIN, March 26 (AP)—After a session that began last night and lasted until the small hours of today, the University of Texas athletic council apparently was no nearer out of the woods than it was before it started, insofar as solution of its athletic row was concerned.

Dr. D. K. Brace, chairman of the council, said no action had been taken on electing a basketball coach. Fred Walker's contract had expired, and there existed disagreement within the athletic family whether he should be re-employed. Testimony on complaints against Walker was heard.

The council had abandoned its usual meeting place and secretly notified members of its new gathering place in order to avoid annoyance of newspaper reporters and others.

## Simmons Becomes Prison Management

HOUSTON, March 26 (AP)—New hope for prison reform in Texas was seen by members of the prison board as the result of Lee Simmons' acceptance of the system management. It will counteract, board members believe, to a large extent, the legislature's failure to provide a new plant and pave the way for obtaining such a plant from future legislatures.

Meanwhile, Chairman W. A. Padlock of the board appointed two committees to plan improvement; allowed under the \$575,000 appropriation passed at the recently adjourned fifth called session of the legislature, Mr. Padlock will act as ex-officio chairman of both committees. One of these consisted of Joseph Wearden, Gollard, Fred Horton, Greenville, Dr. A. C. Scott, Temple, and J. B. H. Holderby, Fort Worth. They will have charge of improvements to be made at the Huntsville walls. The other is composed of E. H. Astin, Bryan, Frank Tiller, Rosenberg, and Dave Nelson, Orange. They will plan work to be done the farms.

The meeting was the first one attended by Mr. Nelson since his appointment by Governor Moody to fill the place made vacant by the resignation of Rabbi Henry Cohen, Galveston. Governor Moody now has another place to fill on the board, since Simmons was a member himself and by acceptance of the management necessarily had to resign from the board. He has been a member for the last ten years.

Mr. Simmons succeeds W. H. Mead, who resigned last fall. Since that time Padlock has been acting manager.

Acceptance of the position by Mr. Simmons followed repeated efforts by board members, legislators, and other friends of prison reform to persuade him to undertake the work.

## TEXAS U TO BE HOST AT RELAY MEET

Forty-Three Colleges And Universities Will Compete

AUSTIN, March 26 (AP)—Eyes of sports fans of the nation will turn toward the capital of the Lone Star state Friday when more than 1,000 athletes from universities, colleges and high schools compete in the sixth annual University of Texas relays.

Forty-three colleges and universities and 30 high schools will be represented and other entries are expected before the deadline arrives. Officials have planned the meet to afford a maximum of interest to all sports followers.

Century Features

The contest that may attract most attention will be the 100-yard dash in which the greatest track stars of the Southwest, Cy Leland of Texas Christian University and Claude Bracey of Rice Institute, will participate. Pitted against them will be George Simpson of Ohio State University, holder of the official world's record for the dash, and Ford of Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., who recently defeated Simpson in a special match.

It is not known if Jack Elder, speed merchant of Notre Dame University and one of the leading backfield football players in the country last year, will be entered. Should he compete he probably will be matched against Leland, who also established an enviable position in the gridiron world.

440-Yard Classic

Another feature race will be a 440-yard run between Robert Greenwood, coach of San Antonio Junior College; Clyde Blanchard, member of the Los Angeles Athletic club, and Nelson Greer, former Rice star and holder of the Amateur Athletic Union 400-meter race with a time of 49.3 seconds. Greer also is the 550-yard junior champion of the United States.

Canby of Iowa and Warner of Northwestern are the pick of the pole vault entries. Canby holds the Western Conference indoor pole vault record at 12 feet, 7 1/2 inches, and with Warner is co-holder of the Texas relay record. They tied last year with 13 feet, 3 1/2 inches. Iowa also has entered L. D. Weldon, National A. A. U. junior champion javelin thrower with a distance of 166 feet, 4 inches; George J. Saling, junior high hurdler with a mark of 14.9 for the 120-yard high hurdle, and Clarence Hubbard, anchor man of the Iowa relay team.

Todd of Indiana

Indiana University will be represented by Todd, one of the best all-around track and field men in the country. He is expected to be one of the leading contenders in the pole vault, shot put and discus throwing events. Indiana also has entered Shapman in the 3,000-meter run which has been substituted for the all-round championship of the relays.

Swenson of Illinois, who won the championship in the 70-yard indoor hurdles, is to compete in the low hurdle event; Butler University of Indiana will send its star, Burt Nelson, into the high jump competition while Bausch of Evansville will be one of the outstanding contenders in the weight events.

The Southwest Conference champions, the Texas Aggies, have entered 25 men. The Aggies opened their bag last year and showed the lads from the east and central west a few things and are expected to furnish plenty of competition again this year.

Henry F. Schulte, track coach of the University of Nebraska, will bring along his entire track squad. Schulte also will be referee of the meet. All Southwest conference schools will be represented. Approximately \$1,500 in prizes will be awarded.

many minor extensions which should be charged to capital investment rather than to current expenses. Please bear in mind that the city water system has been called upon to practically double its service and connections within the city limits in the past three years, and during that time, also, it has been compelled to more than triple its expenditures in the field from which our water is procured. This has been done at a time when money rates were high and the sale of long-term bonds, therefore, exceedingly inadvisable. For that reason, this construction has been financed by the issue and sale of short-term warrants bearing interest at six per cent. These warrants have found a ready local market. To retire these, however, there is now set up an annual requirement of some \$36,000 which must be added to the operating expenses of \$45,000 making a total of \$81,000 which the water works can and is paying easily; and this, too, after granting the consumers a reduction in price which will reduce the gross revenue at least \$11,000. This means that these improvements which have been made in the last few years are not being paid for out of taxes but are being paid for out of the earnings of the water works. If the city is stabilized at its present size, further extension after the present bond money has been spent will be very small. Therefore the earnings will, within a few years, retire the outstanding warrants and leave an additional profit approximating \$40,000 per year, which can be used either as a further reduction in rates or to retire long-term indebtedness represented by bonds.

Note Improvements

The Commission would appreciate it highly if every citizen would make it his business, not only to note the improvements and extensions carried on in town, but to go into the area south of the city where the water is secured, and see for himself just what has been done there. Please bear in mind that when this era of growth started, in addition to the wells at the old waterworks, which were almost exhausted, there were only a few

wells in a small tract of land adjoining Section 17 available for the city's needs. Under the direction of a nationally known hydraulic engineer, all our Section 17 has been developed and additional water has been secured as far south as Section 33. The result of these operations has been to demonstrate beyond any doubt that the city now has developed sufficient water bearing territory to supply a city of some 16,000 people, and we believe sincerely that the successful outcome of these development operations, carried on under the direction of Maj. Hawley was one of the greatest factors contributing to the decision of the Texas and Pacific Railway Company to finally locate its new terminals at this point.

Some facts to be considered in connection with the proposed sale to a private corporation are, first, the city itself is a large user of water for fire-fighting and, also, for other municipal purposes such

as street sprinkling, park and public building uses, sewers, etc. The city, too, should be at all times in position to quote to industrial enterprises seeking location here fair rates of water for their use. That, we believe, is one of the surest methods of bringing in industries and their constant payrolls upon which so large a portion of our prosperity depends.

The statement has been made that we could always expect to have at least the same rates under private ownership as under municipal ownership, even though the private corporation should be called upon for a large expenditure in order to secure additional supplies of water. We do not believe this statement will hold true for the reason that utility corporations are permitted by law to make a fair return upon their invested capital and, if their rates are such that a fair return is not being had, they have only to make proper showing of this condition and an adequate rate will be granted them. Under municipal ownership, it is not necessary to make a profit and, therefore, it follows that under such conditions cheaper rates might reasonably be expected from municipal operation.

We agree heartily with the statement that the operation of a water system should be kept out of politics. In fact, we go even further and believe that the city will be better off as long as politicians can be kept out of the city government. Under the City Manager System, as we see it, all that is necessary for the citizens to do to insure sufficient and economical administration of their city in all of its departments is to elect honest and competent men as commissioners. These, we believe, can be relied upon to employ a manager who has the practical and technical knowledge necessary to properly administer the city affairs. It may take several years under present conditions of stress for the Commission Manager form of government to fully demonstrate its usefulness and desirability, but we are firmly convinced that it is the ideal form of government for cities our size.

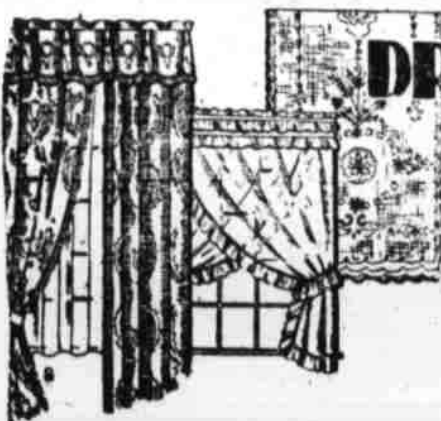
