COTTON MARKET.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—There was a rush to enter contracts which had been sold in the cotton market on Saturday's unconfirmed rumors of political disturbances in Germany and the possibility of a strike in the mines. Higher Liverpool cables and active Liverpool buying were factors in the advance which carried March contracts up to 27.50 and July to 25.50. A good deal of trading appeared in these figures and after the 11:30 a. m. hour of buying had been completed, the market was quiet. The market was quiet and further activity was checked by the reaction, however, and prices had advanced from 25 cents to 27 cents at the close of the morning.

Disturbances were irregular later in the morning and trading was much less active after the early excitement subsided. Liverpool was a good buyer of March and July during the first hour, but this demand slackened after the close of the market and later in the morning demand to meet actual needs in the market was limited. The market turned higher in the afternoon with March selling off to 28.00 and July 25.50. During the middle of the day when active months were about 25 to 25 cents, there was a high level of the morning, although they still showed gains of 25 to 40 points as compared with Saturday's closing. Cotton closed steady.

After selling off to 25.50 for March, the market showed a tendency to steady and buying appeared to be stimulated towards mid-afternoon by rumors that foreign interest had turned a pool to buy up low cotton in the south. March rallied to 26.50 with active months selling about 25 to 25 points per higher shortly after 4 o'clock. Demand then eased and activity was not fully sustained. Cotton closed steady.

New Orleans Cotton.—New Orleans cotton advanced the cotton market today and prices gained 10 to 50 points in the first half hour of business. March rallied to 25.00 and July to 23.00. The market was quiet and further activity was checked by the reaction, however, and prices had advanced from 25 cents to 27 cents at the close of the morning.

RADICALS RESPONSIBLE.

After dragging along ever since last September, the steel strike has been officially called off, and the few remaining strikers may now return to work without penalty from their abortive union.

The steel strike was lost before it was begun; it was evident within a few days after it started that there never was a chance for it to achieve what it demanded, and the official calling of it off is largely a matter of form, for it has been off for weeks.

It was the radical elements among the steel workers who precipitated the strike, which was wholly unsuccessful. It was the radical elements in the Mine Workers who were responsible for the bituminous coal strike which after inflicting enormous losses on the public, the strikers, the operators and even the railroads, and major industries as well, won a 24 per cent increase in miners' wages.

As an increase that would have been granted, if indeed it was not offered, without a strike. Signs that the majority members of organized labor are coming into their own and that the radical elements are losing ground are discernible in the abandonment of the steel strike and in the overwhelming vote by which the United Mine Workers approved the action of their officials in accepting President Wilson's plan for ending the coal strike and letting the men return to work. It seems fair to conclude that any major strike which is ordered and maintained in utter disregard of the rights of the general public is severely handicapped from the beginning, if it is not foredoomed to failure. The third party at interest in industrial disputes—heretofore ignored utterly by both sides—is getting some attention and exerting some strength in the settlement effected, at last!

These Democrats who were not at the Jackson Day banquet know just as much now about the intentions of President Wilson and of Mr. Bryan as do those who were there and close to the throne. The President's letter failed to give any definite statement about a third-term nomination, and Mr. Bryan was just as astute about mentioning his determination not to seek or accept a fourth-time nomination, although it had been freely predicted before the banquet that both would set ranges at rest by an unequivocal declaration. The President wants the peace treaty question made the paramount issue in the 1920 campaign. Mr. Bryan advises getting the least agreement possible from the Republican majority so the country may turn its attention to other things, including internal reconstruction. There is not so much a split as a wide divergence of opinion, both, we are sure, animated only by the highest motives. At that, we doubt if the President's letter has helped along early ratification of the treaty, for it gives the Republicans an alibi, a chance to shift responsibility back onto the administration where so far it has not rightfully belonged.

One of the most attractive features about the Democratic love-feast at Washington the other day and one that is calculated to make us forget the difference of opinion that arose between the President and Mr. Bryan was the absolute confidence the leaders there from all parts of the country expressed in a Democratic victory this year. The Republicans have had pretty much their own way in the claiming line since their victory in 1918 that gave them control of both houses of Congress; but their very control, with the responsibility accompanying that control, has created some obstacles for them to surmount and imposed some handicaps they will have to run under this good year. The Republicans have troubles of their own; their air of cocksureness about 1920 is camouflaged mainly and hides a lot they don't care to expose to public gaze. We'll put the presidential race this year a 50-50 play at present; it will change from that, one way or another, as the issues and candidate develop.

It has come at last and we may think high priced shoes for its arrival. We refer to the "shoe rebuilding" plants that are being founded in a good many of the larger cities now and are spreading to other centers. They are not of the old-fashioned cobbler type of repairs and mending shoes, but on real lasts and with expert workmen and modern machinery, the "rebuilding" plants are actually making old shoes over with full soles and new heels, or at any rate we judge so from their advertisements, which not only say they make the shoes "almost as good as new" but that their service is "very reasonable priced." The constantly ascending price of footwear has been a boon for shoe-repair shops and makers of shoe-repair machinery. It has become really fashionable to wear half-soled and re-shoed, and repaired shoes. But if the high prices continue, presently we shall see the shoe repairing outfit supplanted by the higher-ordering "shoe rebuilding" shops and everybody instead of merely the old man and the boys, will be patrons.

Frank A. Vanderlip brought back from Russia last summer the story that the Bolshevik had taken over the great Russian imperial mint and were busy counterfeiting the British pound sterling, the French franc and the Italian lira in paper issues most successfully. Comes now a later story from Moscow to say that the Bolshevik croppers have turned their attention to American currency and even to American liberty bonds. The Russian imperial mint and engraving plant was in its prime the greatest institution of its kind in the world, barring alone that at Washington. The counterfeiters are said to be so perfect that it is possible to detect them only by the duplication of numbers. One of the tasks the American secret service and immigration officials now are working on is to keep out of this country the counterfeit money and bonds uttered by a Bolshevik government, from whose attack no existing institution, even the world's currency, is immune.

With Babe Ruth's contract as a baseball player and demon home-run swatter bringing \$125,000 and promoters vying with each other in huge offers for the Dempsey-Carpenter mill—the two principals are now arguing over whether the \$400,000 purse shall be split \$300,000 and \$100,000 to winner and loser respectively, or on a 50-50 basis—the rewards of brain and brawn seem at first glance very disproportionate. But Ruth's \$20,000 for six months' work and even the huge purse hung up for the heavyweight pugilists are small compared with the rewards of brain workers who occupy similar roles in their sphere of brains as do Dempsey, Carpenter and Ruth in their sphere of sporting roles. The rewards at the top are munificent, even though it be only at the top of the chimney-sweepers.

There have been two daily paper suspensions in Texas reported within the past week—the Denison Gazetteer and the Kaufman Herald—both of which attribute their suspensions to the difficulty in obtaining paper and both might have added the high cost of the stuff when you ran at it. During the past four months there have been more than 200 newspapers suspended in the country from the same cause; and the end is not yet, for paper prices continue to soar.

It is announced that "Great Britain's" shipping tonnage is now 5 per cent greater than it was before the world war began." Great Britain has built, temporarily, it also has been aided by the acquisition of 150 of the German ships and it is to get 100 more, chiefly those reeled in South American waters and awarded to her by the supreme council. POET POLICEMAN ON WICHITA FALLS FORCE

Person thinks of a policeman, ordinarily the picture that is presented is that of a gruff, unrelenting, "hard boiled" individual, a man who by reason of his vocation has a ready hand on his hip to enforce his prerogative as a custodian of law for those who violate the characteristics that have become firmly associated with the average type of "fattie" by long years of precedent and usage so that although we value the policeman very highly for his services in time of danger, we are prone to underrate and fail to give him credit for possessing some of the qualities that are of the softer variety and find expression in tenderness and love.

Take for instance the names that usually become associated with the policeman. He is a "bull," indicating brute force and an uncompromising nature, a "cop," perhaps so-called because they "copy" many undesirable characters; a "flatfoot," suggestive of the effect upon the pedal of long walking soles, or arches broken by extended service with the force. All of these nicknames are widely used and show better than words of argument that the average opinion of a policeman falls to account for a higher and more thoughtful nature.

But prepare for a shock. What would you say if the statement were made that there is a poet, note we use the word advisedly, on the police force in this city. Such is the case, however incongruous it may seem and that writer of verse an admirer of tales is policeman No. 22, better known as C. C. Wheat.

Long years of service as a commercial traveler, enriched with the most valuable of all earthly possessions, experience, puncture and with more than the average man's share of trials and "hard knocks" have not soured this lover of nature and owner of the muse of poetry and his policy taking life and its offerings as it comes, all "with a smile." Mr. Wheat is a native Texan 40 years old, his father having come to Lone Star State 14 years ago and settled in Delta county, in the north-eastern part of the state. All of his life in his travels, one time when he saw a helpless being in distress that his big heart did not go out in sympathy and help. Mr. Wheat is very reticent concerning his poetry and his attempts to voice his feelings in verse but the writer was able to secure one of the most timely commented upon in an *Electra* paper close after the news had reached this country of the landing of the first American troops in France. The appeal of this verse is the more universal because it is on a subject that has been neglected in the numerous effusions of war.

"No Son To Give, But a Heart To Love," is the title of the poem which "Our brothers, sons and sweethearts have answered to the call of duty and to the battle front as bravely and as sweetly. As a mother answers to the call of her boy. Many have long since reached the foreign shores. Perhaps never to return. But for the sake of love and duty And peace of soul and courage they bid loved ones goodbye, With a heart for any fate.

"With these thoughts in mind we step our pen in The life blood of the bravest hearted mothers, Who ever lived on the earth, and write.

"Tell my babe that I love him As in days of long ago, Now our hearts would bleed together: Singing songs we used to know, How his gentle voice would cheer me But alas! We had to part, God forgive me if I'm guilty, Of the sin that broke my heart."

May the God of peace and kindness Share alike your weal or woe As you battle with the hardships, As you meet the German foe.

Should you meet their wives or mothers Bow head low in Heaven's name, They are more to be pitied, Than they are to be blamed.

As you're kneeling we'll be praying For the loved ones over there, Remember, darling as mother taught you God will answer your sweet prayer.

Lift your head! Line up for battle! For we know mighty well, That your heart is hot to conquer In spite of death or seething hell.

My dear, should you fall in battle, God will pity while we pray, You will be a white robed angel, On that Resurrection Day.

W good fortune smiles so sweetly As to bring our darling home To mother, sister and to sweetheart, This will then be "Home, Sweet Home."

Fight Promoters Facing Problem of Securing a Place

By HENRY L. FARRELL (United Press Staff Correspondent)

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—The rasping voice of Old Trouble has injected a few notes of discord into the lullaby that has been playing for Jack Dempsey. It will grate, also, on the ears of the promoters angling for the Dempsey-Carpenter fight.

The managers and the competing promoters for the world's championship fight have been groping around behind dark glasses. They have kept their eyes busy on columns of figures and have lost sight of the biggest stumbling block in the path—getting a place to hold the fight.

These promoters who want the fight staged in France or England are on a very tightrope compared to the faction that would like to see the title decided near some American objects.

The first voice crying in the wilderness comes from California, where Governor Stephens is reported to have taken an official wallop at the fight. Rather than allow the promoters to beat California laws on a technicality by holding the battle just across the line in Tia Juana, he will appeal to the federal authorities to refuse passports to the ringriders.

Like Tex Rickard, who signed up Dempsey and Willard and then set out on a quest for a place to hold the fight, the promoters are going ahead just as hopeful.

New York and New Jersey are the favorite spots, but both are hypothetical hopes. New York has to pass a boxing law and New Jersey must lease a house longer than eight rounds to meet the bill. This is under way and the New Jersey fraternity being sure that the Walker boxing bill will pass the legislature, has already put the boxing commission on the job to get longer bouts to compete with New York, where twelve rounds would be permissible under the proposed law.

Favors London. Charles B. Cochran, the London promoter who wanted the title fought for in London, seems to have been influenced by the trend toward America and he claims to be willing now to have Carpenter fulfill his contract with his America. He announces that he has received an attractive offer to stage the fight in New Jersey and has cabled Deschamps for an answer.

William Fox, the \$650,000 bidder, has expressed no concern over the problem. He claims he can stage the fight in such a manner that no reasonable objection can be made against it. Keenan so far seems to be playing one promoter against the other in the hope of boosting the price. He has given none of the seventeen bidders a definite answer and has remained silent on the ultimatum of Fox to act quickly on his offer.

CLARENCE ROWLAND SELLS THE MILWAUKEE BALL TEAM

MILWAUKEE, Jan. 12.—The Milwaukee baseball club of the American association today was sold by Clarence Rowland, former manager of the Chicago White Sox, to a company of local men, consisting of Jose O'Brien, secretary of the New York Giants; Otto Borcht, prominent in sporting circles as a freight promoter and a W. H. Parka, former publisher of the Milwaukee News.

FRED FULTON TO MEET FRANK MORAN TONIGHT

NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 12.—Fred Fulton is to make his first appearance since his European campaign here tonight in an eight-round bout with Frank Moran. Both the heavyweights claim the bout will be the stepping stone to a mill with Jack Dempsey for the world's championship. Protest against allowing Fulton to fight because of his confession of contracting with Dempsey and its subsequent retraction was lodged with the state boxing commission, but was not allowed.

EARL CADDOCK TO MEET STRETCHER FOR THE TITLE


NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—Sergeant Earl Caddock will meet Joe Stretcher here for the world's wrestling championship on or about January 20, if Stretcher is not billed as the world's champion, according to terms received by Promoter Jack Curley, who has offered a purse of \$40,000 for the bout. Caddock claims that after he left left the ring and went to the army the impression grew that he had renounced his title and the claim was taken up by Stretcher.

CHICAGO REPORTS A SUNDAY FREE FROM USUAL HOLD-UPS

CHICAGO, Jan. 12.—Chicago's crime wave had ebbed to zero early today, with a Sunday free from holdups and robberies, as a result of the city-wide roundup of criminals in which more than 600 suspects have been taken.

Unlike other days when long lists of crimes were reported to the police, yesterday passed without activities of gunmen or thugs and Deputy-Chief of Police Alcock, who is directing the raid on criminals, announced as the reason: "All are in jail, or most of them."

The police continued today the work of gathering in the remaining suspects but the arrests were fewer as it was announced that the majority of those sought already had been taken. Two criminal suspects have been killed and two others wounded since the raids began Saturday.

More than half of the number held had been photographed by the bureau of identification this morning and it was said that 25 per cent of the number had been identified as men wanted for various crimes or characters with police records.

SOUL UPLIFT NEEDS A DRINK WITH "KICK" SAYS GERMAN-JAPANESE POET

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—Soul uplift needs such a "kick" as can be provided only by alcohol, in the opinion of Sachal Hartmann, German-Japanese poet, who lectured at the Greenwich village inn last night on "great men with whom I have imbibed."

Hartmann mentioned "Swinburne, Poe and Whitman as some of the great writers who have drawn their inspiration largely from a bottle. Hartmann paid particular tribute to the Scandinavian poets saying, "The capacity of the Scandinavian is superb."

"Prohibition will deprive the world of art and letters of many a song from the soul from which the umbra might be lifted by the warmth that comes with imbibing," Hartmann declared. Hartmann's listeners were still wondering today where, in all Greenwich village, he found the inspiration for his lecture.

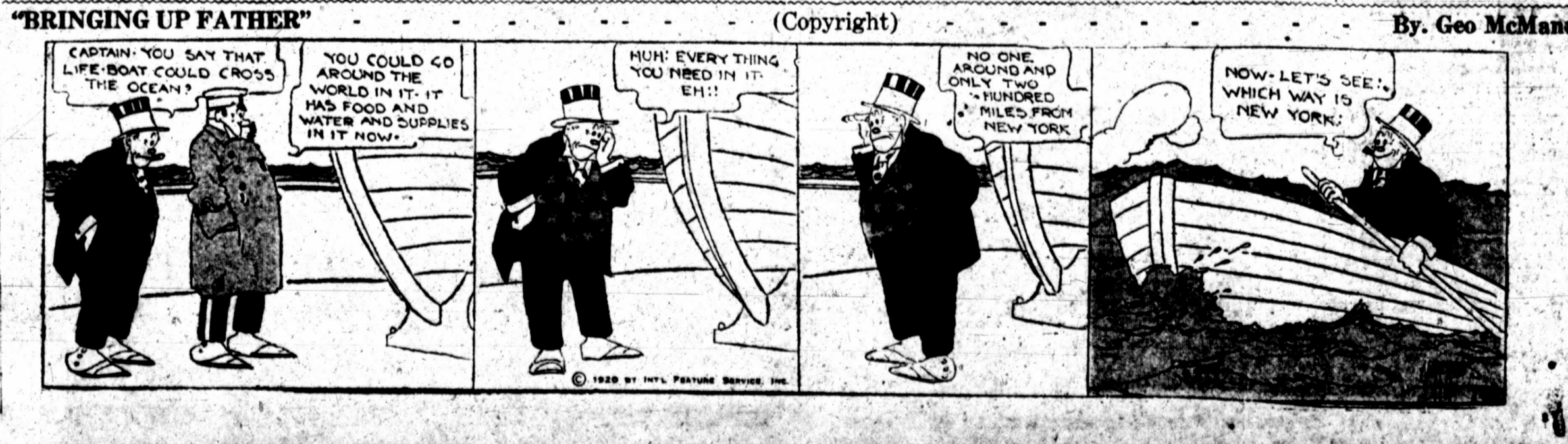
