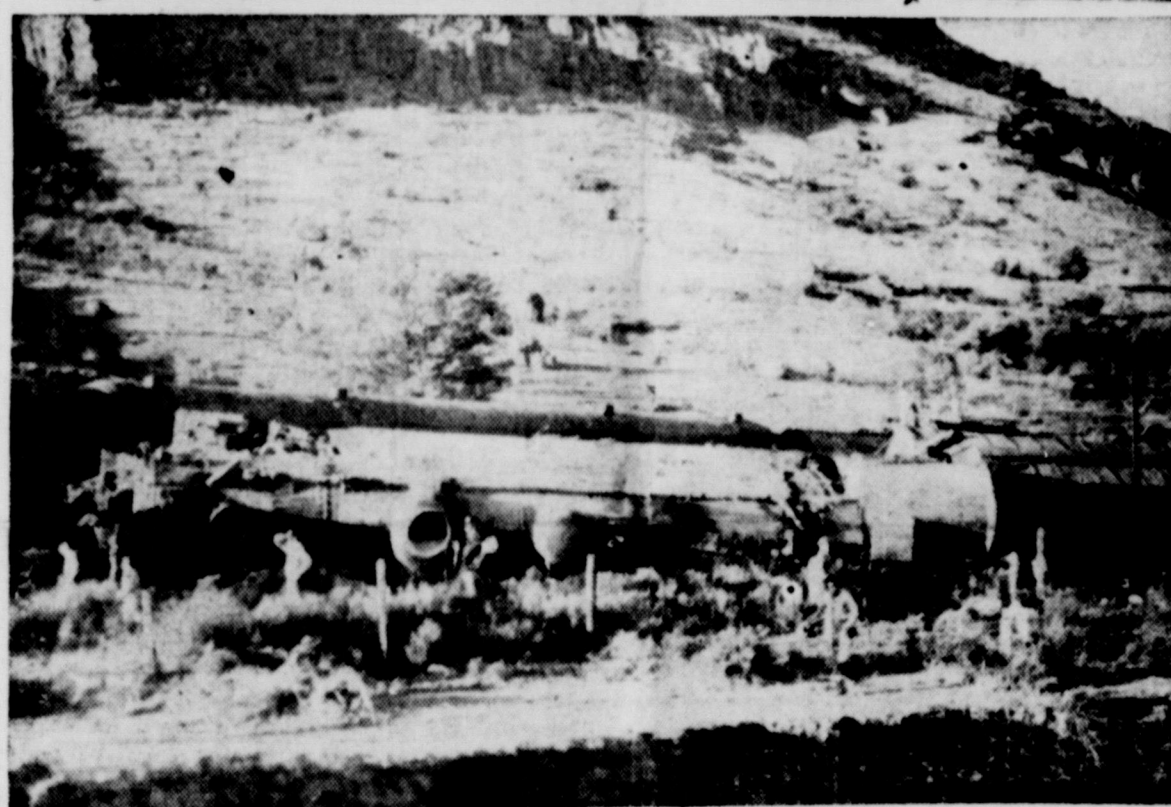
of the disease in active form. A positive tuberculin test is a very accurate means of detecting such an infection, but of course does not mean that the child is ill with pulmonary tuberculosis. To ascertain the extent of any infection in the lung each child who has a positive reaction will receive a thorough physical examination of the chest, including X-ray picture, which will be made at the sanatorium. All the above services will be free of charge. Every child, it is urged, should avail himself of this test, but no test will be given without consent of the parent or guardian. Each child will be given a card for the parent to sign signifying his or her consent. Further information regarding the test may be obtained from your doctor or teacher.

Longley Indicted In Fatal Shooting; Trial Set Feb. 3rd
Cam Longley, Terrell county rancher in the Pumpville section, was indicted by a grand jury in district court here Monday, on a charge of murder, in connection with the fatal shooting of his brother-in-law, Henry C. Young. The case has been set for trial next Thursday, Feb. 3, a special venire of 75 men being summoned from which to select a jury. Young was killed at the Longley ranch during the early morning hours of Wednesday, Sept. 8. Longley immediately came to Sanderson and surrendered to Terrell county officers. At the preliminary hearing his bond was set at \$1,000, and bound over to action of the grand jury. At no time did Mr. Longley make a public statement in connection with the tragedy. After indictment by the grand jury Mr. Longley made a new bond. In the trial he will be represented by Jones and Jones of Del Rio, E. B. Simmons and Ike S. Kampmann, attorney from San Antonio. The State will be represented by District Attorney Julian LaCrosse, Alfred E. Creigh, Jr., county attorney, and Ditzler H. Jones, Uvalde attorney, who has been employed to assist in the prosecution.

Wreckage In Sunset Limited-Freight Collision



Exclusive pictures of the wreckage of Southern Pacific's wreck passenger train, the occasional Sunset Limited, and an extra freight train at Toronto, 218 miles east of El Paso, are shown above. The trains collided late Thursday. In the top picture may be seen the overturned freight engine and its tender and one of the overturned box cars. At the extreme right may be seen the damaged passenger train engine. The lower picture shows how the freight train engine was turned completely on its side. The Sunset Limited cars are shown. DISTRICT COURT IN SESSION

The regular term of the 63rd Judicial District Court opened here Monday morning for a three weeks session, with Dist. Judge Brian Montague of Del Rio, presiding. Other officials in attendance were Julian LaCrosse, district attorney, and Mrs. Belle Sutherland, court reporter, both of Del Rio. The grand jury was empaneled Monday morning and remained in session only the one day, returning one indictment charging murder. Members of the grand jury were: W. J. Ferguson, foreman; John Williams, Joe F. Brown, A. A. Shelton, Hugh Rose, Ben Gilbert, Ira Deaton, Clyde Higgins, R. E. Fred, W. O. Prentiss, M. G. Northcut, and W. C. Vaughan. Bailiffs were R. M. Bogusch and C. M. Martin. The following cases were dis-

posed of at sessions on Monday and Tuesday: Four tax suits: The State of Texas vs. R. S. Eldridge et al; S. Minchen et al; J. L. Hume et al, and E. W. Whitney et al, were continued until next term, to allow plaintiffs to perfect service. The State of Texas et al vs. Mrs. Jessie McPhee Briggs et al, a suit brought to clear mineral title, was set for trial on Monday, Feb. 7. A number of out-of-town lawyers were here for this case, among them Hart Johnson, of the law firm of Johnson and Crumpton, Fort Stockton, who were representing some of the defendants; Walter Jones of the law firm of Jones and Jones of Del Rio, representing other defendants; Roger Thurman of the law firm of Wallace and Thurmond of Del Rio, representing the state,

while T. R. Kuykendall, local attorney, was appointed by the court to represent the defendants cited in the publication. The divorce case of Bertha Brown Mansfield vs. Francis Mansfield, was dismissed upon written request of the plaintiff in a letter to the court. The court recessed late Tuesday afternoon until Thursday, Feb. 3, at which time the case of Cam Longley, indicted, charged with murder, is set for trial. Many witnesses from over the state have been summoned to appear in the case. The petit jury, summoned for Thursday of this week, was notified to appear on Thursday of next week. Very few cases remain on the docket to be disposed of at this term.

Highway 51 Group to Hold Session Feb. 2nd On Big Bend Park Site

WITH OUR NEIGHBORS

Progress Items Taken From Our Exchanges

OZONA—

It is estimated that 150 athletes and their coaches, representing some schools in some 15 West Texas towns, are expected to be here this week end for the annual invitation basketball tournament sponsored by the athletic department of the Ozona high school, according to a report in last week's Ozona Stockman.

PECOS—

While no definite action has been taken, the Pecos chamber of commerce is discussing the possibility of a Trans-Pecos fair, to be held there, according to the Enterprise. Proponents of such a fair state that it would afford Pecos and surrounding territory a better opportunity to cash in on the benefits of the Red Bluff Dam and to advertise the advantages of the area to the outside world.

FORT DAVIS—

The newly constructed electric high line from Fort Davis to the state park has been placed in use, according to the Fort Davis Dispatch. The line is 2 1/4 miles long and the current will be used to light the Indian Lodge, and pump water in the park.

FORT STOCKTON—

Feeding pens, totaling 165 by 124 feet, and sub-divided into 10 pens, are being erected west of Fort Stockton, on land leased from the Santa Fe Ry., by O. W. Adams, the Pioneer stated last week. Completion of the pens will make available feeding capacity for 2000 sheep, or several hundred head of cattle. Mr. Adams is building the pens as a private enterprise, the Pioneer further states.

FLORESVILLE—

According to the Chronicle-Journal, Wilson county ranks 3rd in onion acreage, superceded by San Patricia and Willacy. These figures are based on reports for the year 1935. Last year Wilson had a total onion acreage of 2400. This year 3000 acres will be devoted to the onion crop.

SIERRA BLANCA—

Chances seem good that U. S. Highway 90 will soon be a 100% paved road, according to the Hudspeth County News, which last week stated that bids on that route from Valentine 22 miles east would be let this week, and that bids would be let on remaining unpaved gaps in Hudspeth county would be let by March 1.

ALPINE—

The Trans-Pecos Abstract Co., operated by M. L. Hopson, has let a contract for a new home. The building will be 26x50 feet, of reinforced concrete, tile and brick, with stucco finish. J. J. Finch of Dallas is the contractor, who hopes to have the building ready for occupancy by July 1.

UNEMPLOYED IN TERRELL

Figures compiled by the U. S. Government and released thru Associated Press, of unemployed, shows that Terrell county has a total of 93 unemployed persons; 14 employed on WPA, NYA, CCC or other federal projects. Seventeen were partially employed and wanting more work.

A meeting of prime importance is one scheduled to take place in the Chisos Mountains February 2.

It is being sponsored by the Highway 51 Association, an organization representing several Texas counties, who are interesting good road enthusiasts of other states in a direct north-south route from the Big Bend in Texas to the Black Hills regions of the Dakotas, thence to the Canadian border. The route, if and when built will, in this immediate section, enter the Big Bend area via Crane, McCamey, Iraan, Sheffield and Dryden, where it will intersect U. S. 90, on to the park.

Details of the meeting, which will be attended by delegates from northern states along the proposed route, were given out this week by the committee on arrangements, of which Judge G. J. Henshaw, Sanderson, is chairman. He is being assisted by J. T. H. Bickley and H. R. Richberg of McCamey.

Meals at the CCC campsite will cost 75c or less, and will include all one can eat. Beds will be \$1 per person. Meals will be served in groups of 40 each. At the camp are 30 beds. However, there are vacant halls sufficient to care for all people desiring to remain all night. Halls have stoves, and everyone will be made comfortable. There will be no charge other than for the beds.

The camp custodian states he had 150 army blankets that he will be glad to loan. In this way arrangements to care for approximately 200 people will be available.

Those planning to attend, however, should let the fact be known in order to determine the number who will be on hand for the one o'clock dinner Feb. 2, and the number for the evening dinner, and the number desiring to occupy the beds, and those planning to bring coats and other items of bedding; the number of people who will be on hand for breakfast February 3.

Officials of the National Park Service will appear on the program to tell of the many interesting things in the Big Bend National Park.

The meeting is looked forward to as an opportunity for Texas to demonstrate that the Big Bend is an all-year park. Invited to the meeting are highway officials, newspaper men, members of the National and State Parks Service, and our friends from Colorado, Oklahoma, Nebraska and South Dakota. You will want to meet all these people and see for yourself what we have planned for the future.

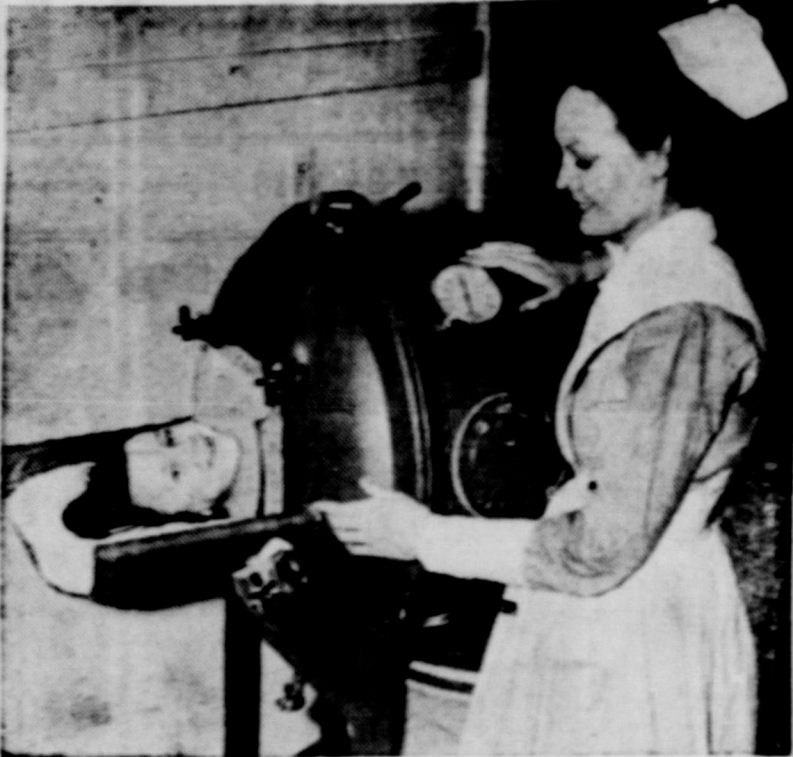

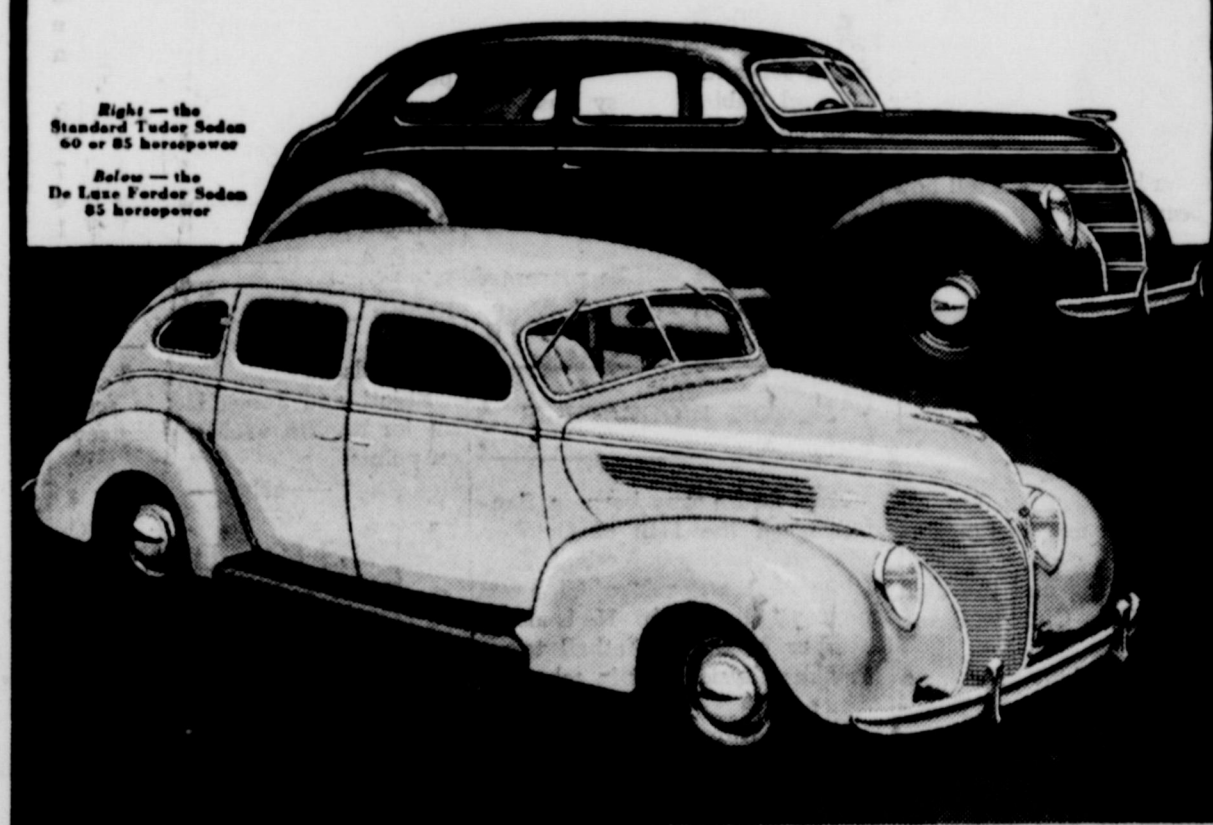

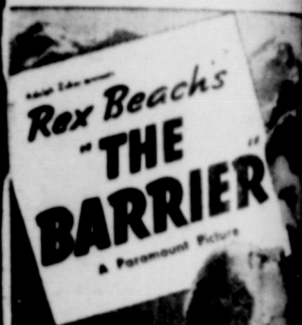
