The company will continue to handle LP gas and fertilizer and anticipate continued service by buying, selling and storing grain.

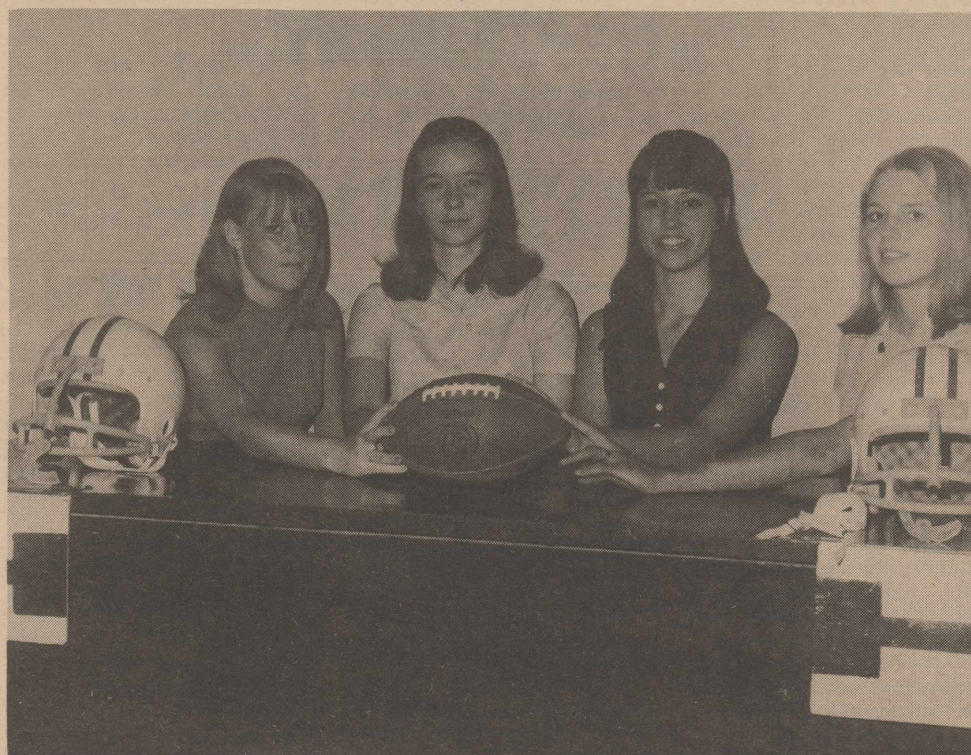
Hart Schools Enrollment Up

Enrollment figures inched upwards in Hart schools with 47 more students enrolled Friday, Sept. 3 than opening day, Aug. 30.

Total enrollment is now set at 723 as compared to 676 opening day.

A slight increase was noted in almost every grade except the eleventh and twelfth which record small decreases. An enrollment comparison is given by grades with first day enrollments in parenthesis.

First grade, 82 (77); second, 77 (72); third, 57 (52); fourth, 69 (65); sixth, 47 (46); special education, 12 (12); seventh, 66 (59); eighth, 47 (44); ninth, 59 (51); tenth, 47 (39); eleventh, 35 (38) and twelfth, 36 (34). Kindergarten enrollment increased two with 29 now enrolled.

Panhandle-South Plains Fair Slates Wildlife Exhibition

An educational wildlife exhibit, featuring many of the animals, birds, snakes and fish found throughout Texas, will be one of the free attractions scheduled for the 54th annual Panhandle South Plains Fair here Sept. 27-Oct. 2.

The exhibit is a feature of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Tom Abbott, 40, of Austin, supervises the popular display and Jack Acrey, 42, of San Marcos is his assistant. Both will be here to maintain the exhibit.

The first continuing mobile show sponsored by the department, it has been in operation for more than two decades, traveling to fairs, sports shows and other events. The exhibit attracts more than a quarter million persons each year.

It spotlights live wildlife specimens representative of the various geographical sections of the state and furnishes accompanying educational data.

Among the animals due here are the ringtail, chachalaca (tree-nesting game bird of the southern brushlands and lower Rio Grande Valley), the porcupine, puma, badger, squirrels, raccoons, armadillo, foxes, a bobcat and others.

In addition, the roadrunner (a member of the cuckoo family), American bald eagle,

ducks, geese, quail, dove and other various species of wild birds will be shown. Rough fish, including largemouth and spotted black bass, carp, buffalo, drum, suckers, chad and gars, are to be shown.

Snakes, especially the poisonous ones, usually attract the most attention of the children, and they won't be forgotten at the fair either. Rattlesnakes, cottonmouths, copperheads and coral snakes will be on display.

This exhibit will be in addition to the popular Children's Barnyard, which once again will feature a host of animals and their young. Persons interested in loaning their animals to the fair for this display are urged to contact officials at 763-2833 as soon as possible.

The fair this year is returning Tennessee Ernie Ford for its three opening dates. The Celebration, a singing and dancing group, and comedian Glen Ash will round out the Ol' Pea Picker's show.

On Thursday, an all-star Mexican variety show headlined by singer Lucha Villa and recording star Jose Alfredo Jimenez, plus the Guadalupe, a mariachi group, will take over the spotlight.

Country and western singer Merle Haggard, his wife, Bonnie Owens and The Strangers will close out the weeklong fair engagement Friday and Saturday.

Show will be presented at 5:30 p. m. and 8:30 p. m. daily. Tickets are priced at \$2.50, \$3.50 and \$4.50. All seats are reserved. Tickets purchased prior to the fair opening will be accompanied by free gate admission passes.

Social Security Benefits Education For Students

More than 500,000 students are presently receiving benefits from social security each month under the child-student provisions of the law, John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock office, reported.

Children, between the ages of 18 and 22 who are unmarried and fulltime students in an accredited school, are entitled to these student benefits on the accounts of their insured parents, he explained.

Hutton stated that one out of every 12 students attending school is receiving assistance toward the advancement of his education as a result of these benefits. Students attending professional and business schools, as well as educational institutions, may qualify for these benefits.

Hutton said that many children eligible for student benefits, as well as routine children benefits (under age 18), may not be getting them because of a failure to understand amendments which were

enacted in 1967.

Prior to February 1968, a child could qualify for benefits on his mother's account only if the mother was currently insured (work six quarters in the 13-quarter period prior to her death) or she was contributing more than one-half of the child's support when she died. The amendments allow a child to qualify on his mother's account if she was fully insured at the time of her death, the same provisions under which the child may qualify on his father's account.

Hutton emphasized that any student eligible for benefits on his mother's account and presently not receiving them should contact the nearest social security office by phone or in person to file the necessary application as soon as possible.

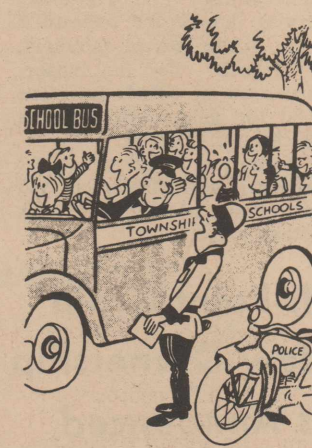

Financial Facts

Do you know how long half cents were issued in this country?

Begun when George Washington began his second term of office in 1793, the half cent was issued with several intermissions until 1857.

When considered from the standpoint of face value, the half cent is the smallest coin ever struck by the United States. Any half cent in existence today is rare and worth far more than its face value. However, because the series hasn't enjoyed maximum popularity, the more common dates are reasonably priced.

The liberty cap type half cent (plain edge, no pole) that was minted in 1796 is the rarest and most valuable. Other difficult-to-obtain mintings are the ori-

ginals and restrikes of 1831, 1836 and all coins between 1840 and 1849.

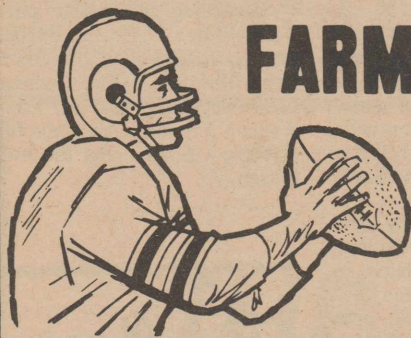

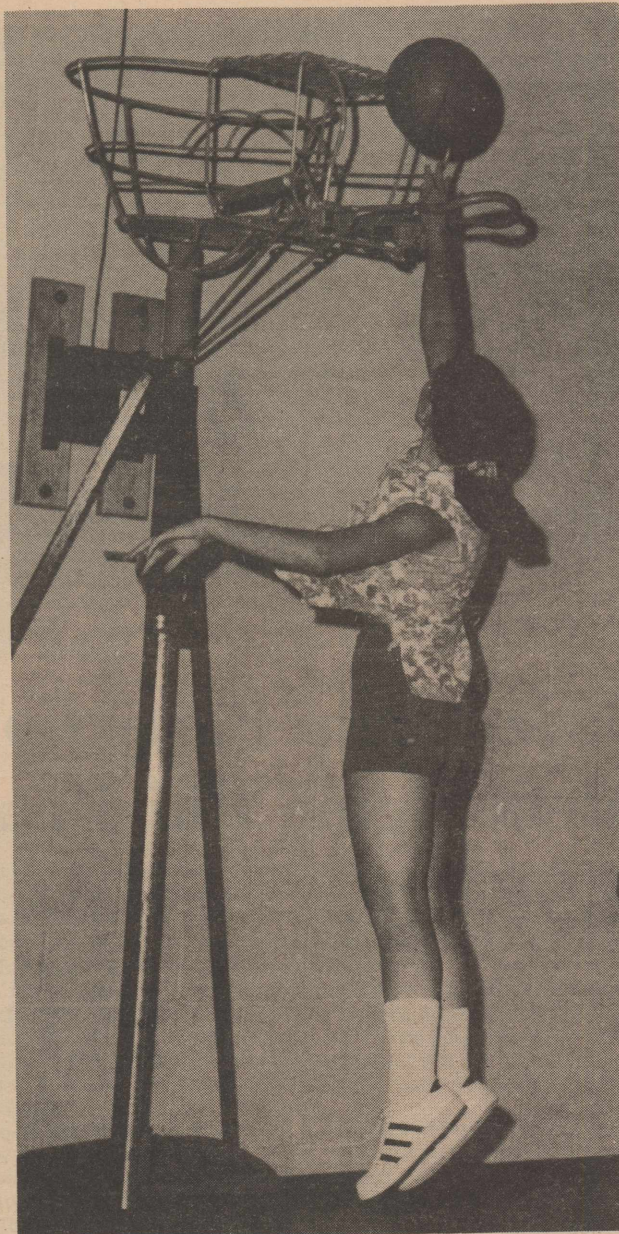

Tax Man Sam Sez:

HIGHWAY USE TAX DUE

When Congress passed the Interstate Highway plan they set up a system to help pay for the nationwide network of highways. They imposed a highway use tax on large trucks, truck-tractors, and busses. If you are not sure as to whether your truck is big enough to put you in a taxable category, IRS will be glad to send you Publication 349, Federal Use Tax on Trucks, Truck-Tractors and Busses. 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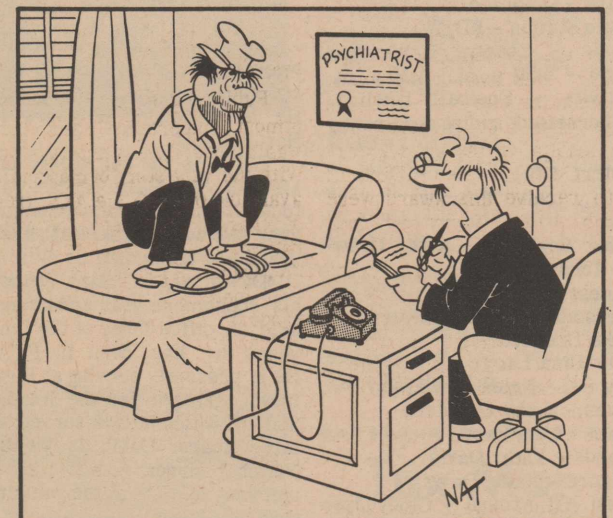
